

### COMMISSION ON HIGHER EDUCATION

The Commission voted to make the following recommendations to the annual conference of the Methodist Church in Arkansas:

1. That each district superintendent preach at least one sermon on Higher Education and Hendrix College in each charge in his district during

the quadrennium.

That there be a layman in each district appointed by the district superintendent to represent the interest of Hendrix College throughout the district, and that such a layman should not serve in that capacity for more than four years.

3. That the World Service and Finance Commissions of the two conferences set the Quadrennial goal for the conference of \$1 per member and that for the ensuing year the North Arkansas Conference advance toward this goal by raising \$45,400 for Ministerial Training and Higher Education, \$35,000 of which will come through the November Special.

4. That thirty cents per member be the goal for the support of the Wesley Foundation work in the two conferences; and that the World Service and Finance Commissions recommend that this apportionment be made in

the same way the support for Hendrix College is made.

5. That Hendrix College be represented by the administration and faculty as belonging to the Methodist Church, and then that it be so treated and supported by The Church.

### REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARY

We recommend that pastors and Charges become eligible to receive

Minimum Salary by complying with the following regulations:

1. Submit a budget planned by the Commission on Stewardship and Finance, and adopted by the Official Board to the District Superintendent, Executive Secretary of the Town & Country Commission, and the Commission on Minimum Salary.

2. Conduct an every-member canvass, using the procedure approved by the District Superintendent, Executive Secretary of the Town & Country Commission, and the Commission on Minimum Salary.

- 3. Submit to the District Superintendent and Conference Treasurer copies of the questionnaire for pastors concerning their earnings. That ministers whose husband or wife earns as much as \$600.00 per year shall be paid according to the scale for single ministers.
- 4. Pay basic salary equal to or above the following: \$1,100 for a student pastor and \$1,400.00 for a full time pastor.
- 5. Charges must be composed of at least three churches, and therefore, Stations and two point circuits are not eligible to receive Minimum Salary assistance, except as item 13(b) herein directs.
- 6. That Charges seek to become self-supporting by increasing their support to the pastor by not less than \$100.00 per year over the previous year's figure. That Charges reaching the self-supporting level be given special recognition by the Town & Country Commission.
  - 7. That the Minimum Salary be paid according to the following table:

- (a) \$50.00 to be paid for each dependent child under 18 years of age.
  (b) The minimum salary for a fulltime, married minister may be \$3,000.00 provided—the pastor serves 5 or more churches
  - —with at least 300 members
  - -and preaches regularly, at least 3 times each Sunday.
- 8. That all supplementary salary received from all other sources be considered in the total salary of any minister being assisted by the Minimum Salary Plan with the exception of the Pastor's Expense Fund, and with the exception of pensions.
- 9. That no pastor be eligible to receive Minimum Salary until he and the Charge which he serves pays the designated percentages according to the schedule of payment into the Minimum Salary Fund.
- 10. That the Conference Treasurer present a mimeographed report showing the standing of all ministers with reference to this fund, at each session of the Annual Conference.
- 11. That we continue payment into the Minimum Salary Plan according to the following schedule:

- 12. That money received from the local churches, from the Board of Missions, from the Minimum Salary Fund and from any other church source be considered as a part of the total salary upon which the ministers shall pay the above percentages. Churches will also pay the above percent on the basis of the actual salary paid the pastor. However, ministers are not expected to pay Minimum Salary on Pastor's Expense Fund or Retirement Annuities. Neither is it expected that churches pay Minimum Salary on mission appropriation or Pastor's Expense Fund.
- 13. That exceptions be allowed in the application of these rules provided that the District Superintendent involved state the nature of the exception in writing to the Conference Commission on Minimum Salary, that such exceptional cases shall be subject to the review and approval of the World Service and Finance Commission each year, and in accordance with the 1956 Discipline; and furthermore, that the total spent from the

Minimum Salary Fund shall not exceed the total revenue for this purpose for the year in question.

# TELEVISION, RADIO, AND FILM COMMISSION

Last October at least one representative from every Methodist area in the United States gathered in Cincinnati, Ohio for a three-day workshop on Television. The main emphasis was on television—for that is the biggest field the Methodist Church has failed to enter as it should. The impact this workshop had on the three Arkansas-Louisiana representatives was tremendous. This report is just a general account of that impact. Limited space and time do not allow a detailed report yet the impact of the potential of religious TV must be transported into every church of this conference.

Not many churches can afford financially to undertake televising their services. Many churches cannot undertake this great challenge because they feel that they have nothing to televise. Yet, the truth is that the gospel prolaimed by the Methodist Church is one that must be taken to every home the church does not reach. The Methodist church cannot afford not to take advantage of the free time, free facilities, and free brain-power that the Television industry is willing to give to good religious programming.

Think of the time television sets are turned on in your local situation! This time is spent educating our people to buy certain products. Think of the time and effort WE must put forth in order to counteract some of the messages set forth by certain interests: 1. The message of alcohol and all its misconceptions, 2. the message of violence, 3. the message of immorality, 4. the message of fear.

Each one of us concerned about the effectiveness of the Methodist Church knows how much personal visitation and cultivation it takes to win one person or family to Christ. Yet, here in the Television and Radio industry is a tool to help each program of the Methodist Church get before all the people. TRAFCO is neither a super-agency or a super-commission—it is merely a way of bringing the varied interests and programs of Methodism before all the people.

We would not overlook the value of the local radio stations in reaching the people of an area with the program of their own church. Many times people would rather listen to someone they know from a church they know than to hear a national figure.

The Commission's first year has been well received. We thank those who made the Arkansas Television, Radio, and Film workshop in Little Rock last January a success. We wish to thank the Commission on World Service and Finance for including us in their budget. We hope to challenge North Arkansas Methodism with these goals:

- 1. A Workshop in every District this conference year.
- 2. A careful consideration of churches and individuals to increase their giving to the Television ministry so that we can do production work of our own.
- 3. Each church make known and publish the time and channel of station of programming concerning the program of the Methodist Church.
- 4. Each church publicizing and promoting the finer programs of a religious but non-church nature.
- 5. Each charge to set up a Television, Radio, and Film Commission to promote the preceding goals on a local church level.
- 6. That our churches make every possible use of the local radio stations to keep their own programs in the minds of people in the surrounding territory.

7. Lists of available audio-visual aid material be made for use in our smaller charges that are unable to bear the costs of purchase or rental.

## TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION REPORT

This year has been a most productive year in the work of the Town and Country Commission. The main activities and items of interest in the year's work are as follows:

- 1. The Executive Secretary, along with other conference preachers and leaders, attended the Town and Country Workshop at Emory University, This Workshop was of great value in guiding the leadership of the conference so that they might better meet the religious needs of individuals in a changing world. Also, it gave guidance to both rural and urban ministers in ways and means of meeting the problems that arise from a changing population trend.
- 2. Our Executive Secretary, along with District Superintendents and Ministers, spent much time in the conference wide program of Stewardship and Finance. Time was spent in each district and subdistrict in setting up and promoting the Every Member Canvass drive. A great response was received from the program and it was felt that this program was one of the most outstanding and progressive adventures in Stewardship and Finance that the conference has ever launched.

3. Assistance in building programs has been given by the Executive Secretary. He has helped in fund raising campaigns and served as a counselor and advisor in setting up the plans for many building programs. He furnished architectural designs, gave helpful suggestions, and met with official boards and church leaders to work out the best building plans for new churches and for the remodeling of old building.

4. The Executive Secretary, working with District Superintendents, Ministers, and Local Church Leaders, organized Group Ministries in Yell County and in Independence County, and he is working on Group Ministry

programs in many other areas.

5. The Executive Secretary served as Program Chairman for the Town and Country Seminar held at the University of Arkansas February 12-15th. This Seminar, co-sponsored by the State Council of Churches and the University of Arkansas was set up for all protestant ministers of the state. The Methodist Church had a much larger representation than any of the other denominations represented. Those who attended stated that it was of great value in relating to them the way the program of the church can be re-geared to better meet the spiritual, intellectual, and economic needs of people, in a changing world. The Theme of the Seminar was: "The Church, The Hub of The Community." Some of the most outstanding Church leaders, Rural Sociologist, and Agricultural leaders in America were present as teachers and discussion leaders.

The Town and Country Convocation was held March 19th at Madison Church near Forrest City. The Speakers were Mr. Jim Wiseman, prominent layman from Searcy, and Mr. R. G. Mayfield, executive secretary of the Board of Lay Activities. During the morning and evening services there were ministers and lay leaders alike that shared ideas on the bright spots in the Town and Country Churches. Various ideas were presented that

would strengthen the rural church program.

The Executive Secretary attended the National Town and Country Commission meeting at St. Louis sponsored by the National Council of Churches. He attended the Jurisdictional Town and Country Commission Meeting at Stillwater, Oklahoma, and he attended the Workshop on Stewardship and the Every Member Canvass at Alexandria, Louisiana.

8. Rev. A. N. Story was the inspirational speaker at the State Rural

Improvement Convocation held in Little Rock on March 5th. Further he

was the speaker at the Annual Agri festivities at Arkansas Polytechnical College at Russellville, Arkansas.

## (Recommendations for the New Year)

1. We recommend that the Town and Country Commission continue its policy of working with other boards and church groups on Conference, District, and Local levels, where its services are needed and requested.

2. We recommend that great emphasis be placed on attending the

Town and Country Work Shop at Emory University.

3. We recommend that the commission continue in helping organize

the various commissions in the local churches.

4. We recommend that the commission continue its fund raising campaigns for the building of new churches. That even greater emphasis be placed on building programs in growing urban situations.

5. We recommend that much time and effort be spent in working out

a more effective program in weak rural situations.

6. We recommend that more importance be placed on the Town and Country Seminar at the University of Arkansas. The Commission wishes to urge the larger Urban Churches to help in supplying Scholarships for those attending the Seminar, provided this is in accord with the wishes of the World Service Commission.

7. We recommend that the Commission assist in organizing Group

Ministries where needed.

We recommend that the commission help in directing and strengthening the Every Member Canvass Program . . . That a simplified plan for smaller rural churches be worked out in cooperation with the minimum salary commission.

Our appreciation goes out to the Arkansas Methodist for their help in

publisizing the Every Member Canvass.

- 9. We recommend that the Commission send a delegate or delegates to the National Town and Country Commission meeting (sponsored by the National Council of Churches).
- 10. We recommend that the Commission send a representative, or representatives to the Jurisdictional Town and Country Commission meeting.
- 11. We urge that the Executive Secretary attend a meeting on Church Finance sponsored by the board of Lay Activities of the Methodist Church.

  12. We recommend that the Commission work with other Community

Agencies in an endeavor to bring about community improvement.

13. We recommend that the Executive Secretary's salary be increased \$600 to keep it on a par with similar Conference Positions, provided the World Service percentage assessment will not have to be increased.

14. We recommend that a state wide Town and Country Convocation be held at Hendrix College. Both the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences will participate in the Convocation.

- 5. We recommend the election of Mr. Paul E. Cooley as Conference Treasurer for this quadrennium; and that the Bond for the various Treasurers of the Annual Conference (covered under the joint bond) be raised from \$100,000.00 to \$125,000.00.
- 6. That in view of the world's needs and demands upon the churches for leadership, our Conference under the direction of the Cabinet, Town & Country Commission and in cooperation with other Conference Agencies, continue to plan to promote a definite financial program in all churches.
- (1) By stressing through preaching and teaching in stewardship of time and talents and possessions that the tithes be the minimum basis for all giving for all Christians.
- (2) By holding financial clinics in each district wherein methods, procedures, and motives be studied.
- (3) By further seeing that local church leaders receive help and encouragement in planning and promoting a sound financial system, preferably the unified budget including necessary specials and that an every member pledge campaign become a regular part of the financial program.
- 7. That the North Arkansas Conference continue to recognize the disciplinary right of the pastoral charges to pay pastors on pastor's expense incurred in his work of the parish in accord with paragraph 829 of the 1956 Discipline. And that the maximum amount which a charge may pay for pastor's travel expense be \$900.00 per year. A salary may not be lowered to initiate an expense fund or to increase an existing expense fund.
- 8. That each church in our Conference pay to the Conference Treasurer for Conference Claimants an amount equal to 17 per cent of the salary paid to the pastor. The ministers appointed by the Conference and serving within the Conference shall contribute to the Conference Claimants Fund an amount equal to the following percentage of their salaries:

- 9. (1) That the item of the Pre-Conference Report which asked for the publishing of the financial reports of all Boards and Agencies of the Annual Conference be withdrawn due to the great expense involved in printing each detailed report in the Journal; and that each Board and Agency be requested to comply with the provisions of Paragraphs 793 and 812 of the Discipline. The reports under Paragraph 793 to be filed with the Secretary of the Annual Conference to be published in the Journal and the reports under Paragraph 812 to be filed with the Secretary of the World Service and Finance Commission.
- (2) That the Secretary of The Annual Conference be requested to receive bids from established printing concerns as to the printing of the Journal; and that the date as to the completion of the printing as to an early release date for the Journal be given primary consideration. That the contract for printing the Journal shall not exceed \$3,500.00, unless as an emergency it is acted upon by the World Service and Finance Commission. That \$300.00 be the allowance to the Secretary of The Annual Conference for travel expenses. etc. in connection with the printing of the Journal.

(3) That \$150.00 be the allowance for printing Conference pro-

grams, roll call blanks, etc.

(4) That \$300.00 be the allowance for mimeographing, stenographing, etc. of the Conference reports in compliance with Standing Rule 18.

10. That an amount up to \$300.00 be made available to the Committee of Promotion and Cultivation and an amount of \$350.00 be apportioned for the Visiting Conference Preacher from the Conference Expense Fund.

11. (1) We recommend that the sum of \$2,430.00 be allocated to the Arkansas State Council of Churches to be paid quarterly by the Conference Treasurer after the State Council has presented a statement of previous expenses and the proposed budget for the ensuing year to the World Service and Finance Commission of the North Arkansas Conference for its consideration, in compliance with the procedures of other Boards and Agencies receiving funds through the allocation of World Service and Finance Commission. This amount to be paid from the Contingent fund of the Annual Conference.

(2) That an amount up to \$100.00 be made available for the

Deaconess Board, and

(3) That an amount up to \$75.00 be apportioned to the co-ordinating council for mimeographing and mailing of conference calendars, from the Contingent Fund.

12. That the percentage for the Episcopal Fund approved by the Gen-

eral Conference is an amount equal to 2% of the pastor's salary.

13. That we continue to approve action of the Annual Conference with reference to the recommendation concerning the Board of Temperance and recommend that pastors open their pulpits to representatives of the Temper-

ance League, and accept offerings.

14. We recommend that every Pastor and every Church within the bounds of The North Arkansas Annual Conference give enthusiastic and actual support to the "Statewide program of Evangelism" as directed by our Conference Board of Evangelism; and that the expenses of "the enlarged program (State-wide promotion, etc.) be met by each Church within the North Arkansas Annual Conference be asked to receive "a special evangelism offering" during the time of their designated District-wide evangelistic emphasis and that this offering be sent to The Conference Treasurer to be credited to the Budget of The Conference Board of Evangelism.

15. We recommend that the Board of Lay Activities be commended for the enlarged program of lay activities that it is carrying on within our Conference; and that in addition to the percentage recommended for Lay Activities that an additional sum of \$210.00 be allocated from "the contin-

gent fund.'

16. We recommend every consideration of The Annual Conference as to the proposed enlarged program of the Television-Radio-and-Film-Com-

mission (TRAFCO) and in order to meet "the emergency" of this enlarged program we recommend that the sum of \$250.00 be allocated to Annual Conference TRAFCO.

17. We recommend that the expense and honorarium of the visiting Conference Preacher be paid as directed under Number 11 (above) and that the offerings received at the worship services be given to the entertaining

church for expense of entertainment of the Annual Conference.

We recommend that the salary for the District Superintendents for the Conference year 1957-1958 be set at \$6600.00, with the amount of \$2000.00 to be added for travel and office expense. We further recommend that a special Study Committee be created by the World Service and Finance Commission to explore the various expenses of the District Superintendent and the various sources of District Funds available to the District Superintendents for these District expenses, in view of establishing an equitable and uniform salary and expense fund for the District Superintendents. We further recommend that the sum of \$50.00 each be continued as a travel allowance for the District Superintendents to area meetings.

# As Supplements to Our Pre-Conference Report We Recommend:

1. That the Conference Treasurer be authorized to advance June, 1957

minimum salary checks to Minimum Salary Charges.

2. We recommend that all the Boards and Agencies of the Annual Conference prepare their pre-conference reports and submit them to the Secretary of the Annual Conference in time for "The Pre-Conference Digest" to be published and released at least sixty (60) days prior to the convening of the Annual Conference. And that this be the only mailing by the Boards and Agencies to the clerical and lay delegates to the Annual Conference.
3. That attention be called to Paragraph 823 of the Discipline which

provides that payments on Ministerial Support items MUST be sent to the

Conference Treasurer at least quarterly.
4. That the matter of Wills and Legacy be brought to the attention of the Pastor's and Members of the local churches; and that the Quarterly Conference Committee on Wills and Legacy be established in each local church and that this Commission be respectfully requested to secure and use the various materials which are available through the office:

That the expenses of the members of the joint study commission to meetings already held be paid by the various Boards and Agencies which the member represented. ## THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

Repeating the opening statement of the Board of Christian Literature of the conference session of 1956, "Your Conference Board of Christian Literature has two purposes: (1) to emphasize the importance of the reading of Christian literature by our people, and (2) to represent the Conference in its relations with the Arkansas Methodist."

Following previous reports, this report is also divided into two parts,

the better to deal with the two purposes.

## PART I.

In the recently distributed Manual of the General Board of Education on GOALS AND MATERIALS FOR CHRISTIAN TEACHING in Methodist Schools, there is a very interesting Introduction which we wish to include in this report, (quote)—

One of the first things John Wesley did was to produce printed materials for Methodists to read and study. He said: "Reading Christians are growing Christians. When Christians cease to read, they cease to grow." Wesley realized that the Methodist movement must have a literature and must use it faithfully if the movement was to help people develop as Christians.

Ever since Wesley's time the Methodists have kept the printing presses humming. We have maintained one of the most complete programs of periodical and book publishing in American Protestantism.

We must always keep clear that the chief aim of this writing, editing, and publishing is to help persons UNDER-STAND, ACCEPT, AND SHARE THE CHRISTIAN GOS-PEL. No other goal is worthy of the people called Methodists. (end of quote)

Your Board of Christian Literature calls your attention also to the book room of the conference, and to the splendid display of Christian Literature provided by THE METHODIST PUBLISHING HOUSE, Kansas City,

Missouri, Branch.

And we recommend to pastors, officers, teachers, members of official boards and commissions on education, the reading and study of paragraph 233, section 3, Discipline of 1956, with particular attention to these words, ". . . and shall see that the literature used is appropriate for each class and group, and that it is selected from the literature approved by the Curriculum Committee of the General Board of Education." Your board believes in the use of Methodist literature in all departments of the church: for as often stated, "It is sound in teaching; it is based on the Bible used

as Jesus used the Scriptures—to nurture religious growth; it is attractive and easy to use; it leads to real faith in Christ and growth in grace; it builds loyal Methodist Christians; it is a unified whole; it meets the needs of churches of all types and sizes; and our people deserve the best."

We also recommend the use of FREE LITERATURE (leaflets and booklets) provided by the various General Boards for the information of our people as to the progress of the Kingdom Advance at home and abroad. This free literature is excellent material for bulletin inserts or enclosures with church letters.

We approve and recommend the observance of SPECIAL DAYS on the Conference Calendar emphasizing the importance of Christian Literature—and especially the month of January, 1958 designated as "Good Literature Month." For suggestions for emphasizing and securing good literature for every department of the church, your board suggests direct correspondence with the Editorial Divisions of the General Boards, and with our own Conference Board of Education.

#### PART II.

As representing our Annual Conference in its relations with The Ar-

kansas Methodist and Methodist Information, your board reports:

1. Its official relationship is by representative membership on the Joint Commission which comprises the three Area Conferences, the Little Rock, Louisiana and North Arkansas conferences, with both ministerial and lay members. Dr. Aubrey G. Walton of First Church, Little Rock, is Commission chairman, and Rev. Joel Cooper of First Church, Conway, is Secretary.

2. The Reports of the Arkansas Methodist and Methodist Information are included as a section of this report. The Senior Editor, Rev. Ewing T. Wayland will give the Report of our conference paper; and Miss Jeanne

Mason will report for Methodist Information.

3. In the report of the board of last year, it was noted with regret that one of the members of The Arkansas Methodist Staff had discontinued her relationship to the paper, and the board spoke affectionately of Mrs. E. T. Wayland "whose years of service had been a labor of love, done with very little financial renumeration." The board spoke for all the Methodists of Arkansas and Louisiana in saying, "Thank you, Mrs. Wayland, for the unselfish service you have given to Christ and His Church through our

church paper."

On this occasion of the 122nd Session of the North Arkansas Conference, the Board of Christian Literature of the new quadrennium, notes with deep regret the discontinuance of another valued member of The Arkansas Methodist Staff, in the person of its Senior Editor and Business Manager, the Rev. E. T. Wayland, who retires from his position and duties, this session, after 16½ years as Editor and Manager. During his time the circulation of The Arkansas Methodist increased from 5000 to 35,000. Not only has the circulation increased but under Dr. Wayland the subject matter and general appearance of the paper has improved, and the paper financially stabilized, but he has also trained his successor, thus insuring the continued growth and success of the outstanding church conference paper of Methodism. Your board of 1957 desires to say to Dr. Wayland, "THANK YOU, DR. WAYLAND FOR YOUR UNSELFISH SERVICE GIVEN TO CHRIST AND HIS CHURCH, AND FOR YOUR HIGH STANDARDS OF EDITORSHIP AN FINANCIAL ACHIEVEMENT AS SENIOR EDITOR AND BUSINESS MANAGER OF THE ARKANSAS METHODIST FOR YOUR SIXTEEN AND HALF YEARS OF OFFICE." And for adequate expression of regard and well-wishes we shall rely upon the Personal Word of our Beloved Bishop, PAUL E. MARTIN and the Chairman of the Joint Commission, the Rev. Dr. Aubrey G. Walton.

4. And, we here record our whole-hearted approval of the promotion of the Rev. Ewing T. Wayland, by the Joint Commission, to the position of

Senior Editor and Business Manager of The Arkansas Methodist and the Louisiana Methodist, and predict for him "continued success and support of the Area Conference."

5. We submit for printing in the Conference Journal of 1957, the Report of Brother P. E. Cooley, Conference Treasurer, relating to our board interests. Also, we include as part of our report the Report of the Joint Commission of the Arkansas Methodist and Louisiana Methodist and Methodist Information, and concur in their recommendations.

The Joint Commission of the ARKANSAS METHODIST and THE LOUISIANA METHODIST met at the First Methodist Church, Little Rock, February 15, 1957, 12:30 P. M. with Dr. Aubrey G. Walton, Chairman, presiding. Those present included Aubrey G. Walton, R. J. Rice, J. G. Moore, O. C. Landers, Arthur Terry, C. O. Holland, Charles Richards, R. Leonard Cooke, R. R. Branton, Virgil Morris, W. Henry Goodloe, William Hightower, Joel Cooper, Golder Lawrence, E. T. Wayland, Ewing T. Wayland and Jeanne Mason.

After discussion of various matters of business, the Commission voted to make the following recommendations to the three Annual Conferences of

(1) That the circulation campaign for 1958 be January 12-19 and that

the same general plan of circulation that has been used be employed.

(2) That the campaign goal for 1958 be 40,000 for the combined publications with a quota for each charge of one subscription for each 9 members.

(3)That the subscription price for both publications be continued at \$2.00, provided that the church which sends in a subscription list representing one-third of the members of that church as reported in the last journal be given a special rate of \$1.50.

(4) That the Little Rock, Louisiana and North Arkansas Conference's Commissions on World Service be requested to apportion the same percentage ("amount" in case of Louisiana Conference) for Arkansas Methodist and

The Louisiana Methodist as was apportioned the past year.

(5) That the sincere appreciation of this commission be expressed to those who have contributed in various ways to the publications during the past year.

(6) That the back page arrangement be continued on the same basis

as at present.

(7) That Rev. Ewing T. Wayland be appointed as editor and business

manager of the Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist

That Miss Jeanne Mason be continued as director of Methodist Information for the Arkansas-Louisiana Area.

# METHODIST INFORMATION

## Report to North Arkansas Annual Conference, June 1957

Your present Methodist Information Director assumed her duties Monday, December 17, 1956, and since that time more than 75 different stories have been written and released by this office. Twenty of the releases have been area-wide in scope (including a mailing list of 325 Arkansas and Louisiana daily and weekly newspapers); one story was district-wide; four of them were of state-wide interest; six were written on a conference level; and more than 40 have been local releases.

Some 15 or 20 articles have been written for Arkansas Methodist by

Methodist Information, three of which have been feature articles.

THE METHODIST STORY, a new promotional magazine, has accepted a feature from this office on a New Orleans District church extension campaign. The article will be published in the July issue.

A special project of your MI office during the past three months has been the Every-Member Canvass. Four area-wide releases have been sent

out on this event, and one local story with a picture.

Since the first of the year, Methodist Information has travelled more than 6,000 miles covering news at Methodist meetings. Included among the trips were the national district superintendents conference in Chicago, the South Central Jurisdiction WSCS meet in Albuquerque, the Louisiana Methodist Student Movement in Lafayette, and the Louisiana WSCS in Alexandria.

Methodist Information is well received in all newspaper offices. Contacts have been established and MI news is recognized and welcomed in

every instance.

With the continual splendid cooperation on the part of the Methodist ministers and other leaders, and with the growing relationship between this office and the secular press, we predict that Methodist Information will continue to progress in the years to come, and through this vital function, contribute to the growth and development of the church.

#### THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

## Report No. 1

We are happy to report that in most of the work of the Board of Edu-

cation we show splendid progress again this year.

This has been the best year in our Wesley Foundation program that we have ever had. We have had workers in the four centers where there are four-year state colleges: Fayetteville, Russellville, Conway, and Jonesboro. The reports we have indicate the best year's work in these centers. The plans for a student center on the Arkansas State College campus of Jonesboro are moving along satisfactorily. The other three centers each have a building for their student program.

Hendrix College has had the best year this year it has had in a number of years. The student body has been of a very high type. There has

been an increased enrollment.

Our children's work under the leadership of the Conference Council on Children's Work shows another good year with the Children's Workers'

Conference being the high point.

Youth work under the leadership of Rev. Pryor R. Cruce and the Youth Council reports an excellent year of progress. The Youth Rally was very successful in spite of the stormy April 12. Youth camps and assemblies report splendid interest. The Youth Council has had an excellent year of work. Their youth paper has been a new accomplishment.

The outstanding event in our adult program was the Adult Convocation of the Area. There has been good interest in the total adult program of the conference, under the leadership of Mr. Jim Wiseman, Adult Di-

rector.

The training program of the conference has been at an all-time high both in the number of new certifications and in course cards grantedin training schools.

The institute program and general cultivation have received splendid

response.

Detailed reports of the year's work can be found in the June issue of the CHRISTIAN EDUCATION BULLETIN.

We recommend that the North Arkansas Conference conduct during the summer of 1957 three Adult Summer Conferences: Young Adult, June 8-9; Senior Adult and Adult Leaders' Conference, July 1-3.

That a weekend conference for adult workers with youth be held during the summer of 1957.

That Dr. Meredith F. Eller be secured for a series of Bible schools to be held during the months of June, July, and August, and that he offer the course on "St. Mark's Gospel," which is the special Bible study course of the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

That the month of September be Christian Education Month; and that a series of district Christian Education Institutes be held the week of September 8-13.

That the month of September be used as a time for increasing church school membership and attendance.

That Church School Rally Day be held September 29, and that Christian

Education Week be observed September 29-October 6.

That we continue the policy of using seventy-five per cent of Church School Rally Day offerings for district Christian Education cultivation; and that we urge more churches to participate in the Church School Rally Day plans.

That we encourage local churches to continue and expend the plan of planning and conducting local churh formal training enterprises, but request that all applications be in the conference office at least thirty days in ad-

vance of the schools.

That a coaching conference be held during the fall of 1957, using the course on "Christian Worship," and that persons be encouraged to use the course on "The Gospel of Mark" in the Pastors' School as a coaching conference opportunity.

That in cooperation with the Commission on Christian Vocation we plan

for a conference meeting on church vocations.

That larger emphasis be placed in local churches upon the importance of the November Special for Ministerial Training and Hendrix College; and that November 10-17 be designated as the period for November Special.

That the period of January 1-April 6 be a time of church school evange-

That a conference-wide Youth Rally be held March 28, 1958.

That the conference children's workers' meeting be held March 3-5, 1958. That the program of children's work, youth work, adult work, formal and informal training, vacation church schools, camps, coaching conferences, literature cultivation, promotion, promotion of Wesley Foundation work, promotion of Hendrix College, and all other general cultivation program in terms of Christian Education be continued as in former years.

That our Board of Education give every cooperation in promotion of the four-year emphasis on the work of the local church and Christian higher

education.

We recommend that summer and fall meetings of conference age-group leaders be held to plan the program of Christian Education for the various age groups of the conference.

That we continue our policy of sending delegations of workers to area

and jurisdictional training opportunities.

We request the World Service and Finance Commission to make an appropriation of \$9,600 for Wesley Foundation work in the North Arkansas Conference, and that these funds be apportioned to the four centers where there are four-year state schools, the funds to be used only for the purpose of providing leadership, leaving student groups the responsibility of raising funds for their own program.

We request that the World Service and Finance Commission make an

appropriation of \$10,400 for Hendrix College.

We request the World Service and Finance Commission to make an appropriation of \$15,041 for the cultivation fund of the Board of Education.

We request that the World Service and Finance Commission in the light of the action of the Joint Commission on Higher Education that a goal be set for the conference year of 1957-58 f \$35,000 to be raised through the November Special, the first \$5,500 of which is to be used for the Board of Ministerial Training, and all above that amount to be used for Hendrix College current expenses.

That this amount of \$35,000 be apportioned to the districts by the Commission on World Service and Finance in consultation with the district superintendents.

We recommend to Bishop Martin and his Cabinet that Ira A. Brumley be appointed as Executive Secretary of the Board of Education for the conference year of 1957-58.

# REPORT 2 A

## HENDRIX COLLEGE

During this year the four-year program of Methodism, which includes "The Higher Education Emphasis," has developed in an encouraging manner. The Joint Commission on Christian Higher Education, established last June by the two annual conferences of Arkansas, has held two meetings and its executive committee had two additional meetings. Growing out of these discussions have come important recommendations to be presented to this conference, asking that our people increase their annual giving until in this quadrennium they will contribute annually per member an average of not less than \$1.00 for college support and not less than 30 cents for Wesley Foundations.

We sincerely believe that this Conference should adopt these recommendations and move to do its share in this worthwhile program.

We urge our churches, through preaching and teaching, to emphasize the importance of Christian higher education and particularly the needs of Hendrix College. The cost of college operation and maintenance continues to rise, and at the same time some budget support has been lost. During the years 1952-57, Hendrix received through the program of the Arkansas Experiment in Teacher Education from The Fund for the Advancement of Education, a Ford agency, budget support totaling \$129,693.00, but that aid has now been discontinued and the college has to find ways to make up the loss. Furthermore, substantial increases in legislative appropriations to state colleges have made possible faculty salary adjustments in these institutions, and this has tightened the budget pressure in church colleges.

To meet these problems Hendrix has to turn to its parent body, the Church, and to other friends for greater annual support. We commend those churches in Arkansas which are giving \$1.00 per member this year. Support from all our churches should continue to increase until the annual goal set by the General Conference will be fully realized.

There is encouragement from the report of the Arkansas Foundation of Associated Colleges. The seven non-tax-supported institutions of Arkansas, united in this organization, are grateful for the response which has come from business in and out of the state. In 1955, the first year, 220 gifts totaled \$156,000.00; in 1956, 255 contributions amounted to \$189,000.00. Hendrix received during these two years from this program a total of \$29,351.19. During this third year, we believe there will be increased support.

Enrollment at Hendrix will increase with new housing facilities. East Hall, new dormitory for men, was opened last September and a new dormitory for women, after many unexpected delays, is now being built and should be ready for occupancy in 1958. Long-term loans at low interest rate from the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the federal government have been secured for both these buildings. Hendrix had 471 students enrolled in 1956-57. We believe the enrollment will greatly increase during the next few years.

We call attention again to Methodist Student Day, which this year is June 9, and urge our churches to increase their offerings which support the National Methodist Scholarship program. Hendrix now is allotted two of these scholarships per year. With larger support from our two conferences, more worthy students may be given an opportunity for a college education.

# THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

# Recommendations for 1957-1958

# Part One

As a part of the National Program of "Tell America About Christ," we recommend that the North Arkansas Conference and the Little Rock Conference join in a program to "Tell Arkansas About Christ" during the Conference Year of 1957-1958.

Purpose: To have a crusade of evangelism to culminate in a great "Week of Evangelism" during Lent, 1958.

Theme: "Tell Arkansas About Christ."

# I. EARLY PREPARATION

A. That an outstanding evangelism emphasis and launching of the campaign be made at the meeting of the Annual Conference.

- B. That early in the Conference Year an attractive printed brochure be produced for guidance of pastors and leaders in both Conferences.
- C. That in the late Summer of 1957 Prayer Retreats be held in every District:
  - (1) For Pastors under direction of the District Superintendent, assisted by the District Secretary of Evangelism.
  - (2) One for women under direction of Conference WSCS Spiritual Life Secretary and the District Secretaries.
  - (3) One for Laymen under direction of the Conference Lay Leader and the District Lay Leaders.
  - (4) We suggest that those planning camps and assemblies for youth include a day of prayer and emphasize Bible reading in the camp schedule.

## II. LATER PREPARATION AND IMPLEMENTATION

- A. That January be set aside as the period of discovering prospects through emphasizing the "County-Wide" census.
- B. That a State-wide Rally be held in Little Rock on February 18, to launch the intensive campaign, under direction of Bishop Paul E. Martin.
- C. That a 24 hour prayer vigil be conducted in every charge on the first day of Lent, February 19. (Midnight Tuesday to midnight Wednesday).

## III. THE WEEK OF EVANGELISM

- A. That each District select the type of week of Evangelism that it desires to conduct:
  - -A simultaneous preaching revival
  - -"Four Nights For God"
  - -Visitation Evangelism
  - ---United Evangelistic Mission
- B. That the Districts arrange to have a District-wide "Week of Evangelism" during January, February or March, with March suggested as the best month.
  - C. That Palm Sunday and Easter be Membership Sundays.
- D. That the time from the end of "The Week of Evangelism" to Easter be used by the pastor to follow up and train every person making a decision and to see that he is received into the church. That membership training classes for children, youth, and adults be held prior to Holy Week.
- E. That every District have a plan for assimilating members of the churches.

## IV. OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

- A. Goals That each Conference, District and Church have a goal of new members for the year and for "The Week of Evangelism."
  - (1) Local Church sets own quota.
  - (2) Conference Secretary receives a report from District Superintendent November 15.
  - (3) State goal reported by December 1.
- B. Materials That the special materials prepared by the General Board of Evangelism be used widely.
- C. Advertising That a State-wide committee be appointed to effect use of Radio, T. V., Newspaper and Billboard advertising. That this coverage be especially at the time of the rally and during the months of February and March. That \$1000.00 be given by each Conference to underwrite the advertising and brochure.

# CONFERENCE PROGRAM OF EVANGELISM

#### 1957-1958

## Part Two

#### INTRODUCTION:

With the reading of the appointments and the singing of "A CHARGE TO KEEP I HAVE" the ministers of the North Arkansas Conference went out to carry out the program of Evangelism adopted by the conference. With deep appreciation for the fine cooperation in this work we submit the following recommendations for our conference program this year:

I. Goal — We challenge the North Arkansas Conference to truly "Tell Arkansas About Christ" in 1957-1958 and every local Church to reach a minimum 3% net increase in Membership.

# II. PROGRAM SUGGESTIONS

A. Full participation in the nation-wide "Tell America About Christ" program by joining with the Little Rock Conference in a "Tell Arkansas About Christ" program. "See outline of State Program." The following will implement this:

1. We suggest that prayer retreats for ministers be conducted in each District by the District Superintendent, assisted by the District Secretary of Evangelism.

(a) That these retreats be held during the last two weeks of August at a place selected by the superintendent and that they be in a location where there will be a minimum of interference and distraction.

(b) That they deal primarily with aiding the pastor to develop his own spiritual life and in lifting up, for prayer, the evangelistic emphasis.

emphasis.

(c) The Conference Board of Evangelism will pay room and board costs for the retreats, not to exceed \$5 per pastor. Each pastor is to pay \$1 for registration.

(d) If deemed wise, the Board will also secure an inspirational resource person for the District prayer retreats.

2. We recommend that each District Superintendent, and Board members and District Secretary, attend the Jurisdictional Workshop on Evangelism, August 5-8. The Board will pay the room and board for those doing so. We commend the plan of the Fayette-ville District and the General Board for making this a practical

project in a special evangelistic endeavour.

B. We suggest that we have a page in the Arkancas Methodist for

Evangelism.

C. We recommend that the Conference Board Officers and the District Directors attend the Council on Evangelism, Oct. 17-22, 1957, at the Hotel Curtis, Minneapolis, Minn., and that \$500 be alloted for this.

## III. DISTRICT SUGGESTIONS

A. We recommend the organization and use of the District Committee on Evangelism with special emphasis on studying unproductive charges and encouraging work where needed.

B. We recommend that the District Superintendent, the District Secretary of Evangelism, and the District Lay Leader comprise a committee in each District to see that every baren church has a revival or three nights of visitation.

C. We recommend that the District Secretary of Evangelism counsel with local churches, as well as being a chief promoter of the District committee, and encourage the use of evangelistic programs and materials. Each District Director is allowed an expense account of \$50 for this work.

D. We recommend that the District Superintendent go over the membership records of every church, with the pastor, to make suggestions as to improvement and accuracy of these records. Also, that Pastors give careful and prayerful consideration before submitting any names for removal to the Quarterly Conference.

# IV. OTHER SUGGESTIONS

A. We commend the plan used by some Districts in Set-up Meetings for training of the Commission Chairmen, by instructing them and helping them plan programs for the ensuing year.

B. That the pastors and District Directors encourage each charge to

have an active Fisherman's Club.

C. The Board stands ready to assist wherever special evangelistic needs

exist and "Commando" Teams would be useful.

D. We especially commend the use of the following programs and materials of the General Board of Evangelism: "KEEP CHRIST IN CHRISTMAS," "CHURCH ATTENDANCE CRUSADE," "HOLY WEEK OBSERVANCE," and "THE UPPER ROOM."

E. That Easter to Pentecost be used as a time for Spiritual Enrich-

ment.

Whereas The Methodist Church has always lifted up the Word of God, and whereas the faithful reading of the Holy Scriptures, by Methodists has made for growth in Christian understanding, faith, and action, therefore be it resolved that the period January first through Pentecost be designated for the FELLOWSHIP OF THE READING OF THE SCRIPTURES, and that an Area-wide Schedule of readings be provided for this purpose.

## RESOLUTION:

Whereas the year 1957 is a most significant one in the history of the people called Methodists being the 250th Anniversary of the birth of Charles Wesley, Methodism's great singer and gospel poet, writer of some 6,500 Hymns of great beauty, and power, bringing to people the gospel truths, and whereas the American Executive Committee of the World Methodist Council has asked the General Board of Evangelism to promote this quartermillennial observance of the birth of Charles Wesley, therefore be it resolved that Methodists of the North Arkansas Conference join with Methodists throughout the world in special observances, with a Charles Wesley Hymn Service, of the 250th birth anniversary of Charles Wesley on Dec. 18, 1707, for the purpose of understanding and appreciating the Wesley Hymns and their contribution to the Spirit, theology, and power of the Methodist Churches are urged to use the material being prepared for this purpose.

# BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

The World Service and Finance Commission of the North Arkansas Conference has set aside for the Board of Hospitals and Homes 9.60% of the amount, or a sum of \$9,475.00. Fifty-eight per cent of this amount will go to the Methodist Hospital at Memphis, Tennessee, and 42% will go to the Methodist Children's Home in Little Rock, Arkansas.

Our Conference pays one-half the salary of the Rev. Bates Sturdy, Chaplain of the Booneville Sanatorium, and \$180.00 of the annual pension

fund and the insurance premium of \$27.000.

We recommend that an additional \$150.00 be paid to the salary of the Chaplain of the Booneville Sanatorium to match a raise made by the Little Rock Conference and if the hospital insurance become effective that our

Board pay its share with the Little Rock Conference.

We recommend that the expense of the Board Chairman be paid to the National Meeting to be held in Chicago next February. That the expense of Board Members be paid if a called meeting is necessary.

the Golden Cross Director be allowed expense money.

We ask that the following be recommended as Trustees of the Methodist Children's Home: Lay Members—George Kell and E. Clay Bumpers. Clerical

-Alf A. Eason and Byron McSpadden.

We recommend that the fullest cooperation be given in the building of the Chapel-Activities Building on the Methodist Children's Home grounds. We appreciate the fine work and the excellent administration of our Superintendent, Dr. Conner Moorehead.

We ask that Golden Cross Sunday be observed on Mother's Day and that a special offering be taken in every church. If a church does not take the special offering, that a substantial amount be placed in the budget.

We appreciate the fine service rendered by our Chaplains and recommend that Gilbert Hyde be re-appointed to the Veteran's Hospital in Little Rock and that Bates Sturdy be re-appointed to the Booneville Sanatorium.

We appreciate the fine spirit of cooperation, the ability to plan, and the safe administration of Mr. J. M. Crews, Superintendent of our Hospital.

We recommend the following as trustees of the Methodist Hospital: Mrs. Tom Tucker, J. Frank Fogleman, H. K. Barwick, Jr., James H. Crain, Hubert Pierce and Earle Cravens.

The construction of our Hospital is being carried forward, according to plan, by the Harmon Construction Company of Oklahoma City, at the

we note a total pledge for the North Arkansas Conference of \$205,000.00, with \$116,090.48 being collected, leaving an unpaid balance of \$96,000.00. A total of \$33,000.00 was pledged in special gifts, with \$26,000.00 being collected to date, leaving \$7,000.00 unpaid.

By July 1st, the campaign funds will have been exhausted on the construction program. Then it will be necessary to begin drawing on money borrowed from B. C. Zeigler Company. Borrowed money will increase the cost of the operation tremendously.

Every effort is being made to keep ministers and the Superintendents informed of the progress on the campaign in each district.

## THE METHODIST CHURCH

Conference Board of Lay Activities North Arkansas Conference Annual Report, June 14, 1957

During the Conference year 1956-1957, the Board of Lay Activities has broadened its program more than in any other year in which your present Conference Lay Leader has served. As in every case of growth there have been disappointments and discouragements, but they are small compared with the horizons which are opening up in the development of our laymen. Let me mention the specific areas of our growth.

# Stewardship Cultivation

The word Stewardship is all-inclusive. It actually embraces all the work that a Christian should do. Therefore, it is not a new development with us. But we are happy to announce that our laymen are coming, even though slowly, to a better understanding of their stewardship duties. In the new year we are sure we shall go farther. We plan to conduct Laymen's Clinics in all the districts, in which we shall give primary emphasis on the development of Stewardship.

## Methodist Men

Now we can report a total of 92 clubs of Methodist Men in the Conference. This is an increase of 14 for the year. We are happy to report this because our clubs are the best means that we have to train our laymen. The programs suggested in THE METHODIST LAYMAN will help program committee. In addition, our training plans for the new year have no better place to start than within our men's clubs. We are always glad to visit the clubs, and have been giving high priority to any invitation we receive to deliver a charter.

# Laymen's Day

Regardless of what some may say, the observance of Laymen's Day is a very worthwhile project. It is not what we men tell the congregations, but the value lies in the opportunities that men have to testify and witness publicly. No church can prosper spiritually until its laymen are trained and admitted to witness in the pulpits of our churches. We continue to observe Laymen's Day in 95% or more of our churches. Please make your plans to observe it again on October 20. If you do not receive the materials, please let us know and we shall gladly send them to you.

# Lay Speaking

During the year just closed we have made diligent effort to improve the ability of our lay speakers. We have held 10 Lay Speakers Workshops in

the Conference since January 1st. They have covered the subjects of Methodist Beliefs, Conduct of the Worship Service, choice and development of texts for messages. Over 175 men have attended. A number of our pastors have been very helpful and we appreciate their work very much. To the best of our knowledge we have 200 men who are doing this work with some degree of regularity. The devotion of these men never fails to astound their pastors when we have a study course. We plan to hold as many this year as are requested by the laymen.

#### Retreats and Clinics

Our retreat last July at Hendrix College did not bring as many men as we had hoped. The spirit, however, was good, and those who attended entered into the spirit of the services with a great warmth. Don Calame of the General Board of Lay Activities made a fine contribution to our meeting. We have taken a poll of the Conference Board and they have voted by a wide margin to dispense with the Conference-wide retreat this year. The principal reason is that the Second National Conference of Methodist Men will be held at Purdue University on July 19-20-21, and will be of such importance that we all feel we should place primary emphasis on the attendance there by a large number of our men. We are planning to hold Laymen's clinics in every district of the Conference this year, and we are sure that we can reach more men through this means than in the retreat. These clinics will bring to the men such emphases as Stewardship, tithing, work on Official Boards and the commissions. If we are successful in this work, we shall make it a permanent part of our development program for laymen. Two of our districts have held district retreats. We are happy that they are doing it, and feel that they will work as well as, and probably better than the Laymen's Clinics. Both types of work will be very profitable.

# **Every Member Canvass**

The direct promotion of the Every Member Canvass was not made by this board. However, I am proud to tell how thousands of our laymen joined earnestly and prayerfully in this great program. The vision of our laymen probably exceeded that of our pastors, and even though the results were not all that we had hoped, we feel that our laymen are ready for a continuing emphasis on systematic giving and on tithing. I subscribe to this promotion with no mental reservations.

## THE CONFERENCE LAY LEADER

You are aware of my decision made last fall to devote my full time to Christian work as a layman. On January 1st, 1957, I began this new type of work in earnest, although I had been doing it almost as a part-time work before. This new relationship with my church has been far happier than I dreamed. Without making any statement of my activities outside the Conference area, here are statistics of my work for the past Conference year in the North Arkansas Conference:

## I have—

Addressed 15 clubs of Methodist Men
Visited in every district of the Conference
Held 10 Lay Speakers' Clinics
Attended 3 district retreats
Attended 1 annual retreat
Brought Rev. E. Leonard Tudor, a British pastor into our conference for a series of messages to our churches
Preached 1 series of messages in one church on spiritual emphasis
Addressed the Wesley Foundation at Arkansas State College
Addressed the Hendrix College student body
Used my office to promote the Every Member Canvas
Distributed a large amount of literature to persons who have
requested it.

The new Conference year is already scheduled to be a busy one. I want, however, to go into every district again as I have done in the past year, and this year I want to visit in the areas of the districts where I did not visit last year. I shall be glad to work out these details with the Lay Leaders and Associates of the respective districts.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

For the year 1957-58, we recommend the following goals:

1. Twenty new clubs of Methodist Men.

2. At least one Laymen's Clinic in every district, and more in the larger districts.

District Retreats in all districts which have a place to hold them and wish to use this means of promotion.

 Lay Speakers' Clinics in all areas where Lay Speaking is done. Study any areas where it can be introduced, and where the pastors and laymen want it.

5. A continuing emphasis on tithing as a means of grace.
6. A minimum of 50 men at the Second National Conference of Methodist Men on July 19-20-21 at Purdue University.

## Recommendations and Policy of Procedure of the Board of Missions North Arkansas Conference

We recommend that all applications for either Church Extension grants or donations; and for Mission appropriation be made on the correct forms, and that they be completed in detail, before any action will be taken on them by the Board of Missions.

We recommend that, due to the limitations of the available funds, we find it necessary to maintain as our general policy of \$3600 being the maximum salary of a pastor for which the board will grant aid. With the provisions agreed upon that in a special situation, by a unanimous vote of the Cabinet, as an emergency case deserving special treatment, the ceiling

may be raised to \$4200., including travel expense, as the Board may determine.

We recommend that all charges that are receiving minimum salary, be required to adopt the Every Member Canvass by the Quarterly Conference. And that all charges receiving mission aid, reduce their asking each year

and work toward becoming a self-supporting charge.

We recommend that, Robert E. L. Bearden be appointed Conference

We further recommend that Local Churches provide the additional expense for attending the Workshop.

We recommend that every Charge conduct an Every Member Canvass

according to the recommended plan of the Town and Country Commission.

We recommend that each District Superintendent certify in writing that each charge receiving Mission aid has conducted and Every Member Canvass according to the recommended plan.

# Report of Conference Missionary Secretary

"The Conference Missionary Secretary has been concerned each year with establishing an itinerary for an outstanding missionary personality to appear at District Missionary Institutes. For two years the Board of Missions has not been able to supply us with a speaker but we hope next year to secure an outstanding person for this work. The Institutes this year were built around the local church commission emphasis and our reports are that they were well attended and had great value. Some mission speakers are available for this summer and the Secretary is now in the process of scheduling them for visits in our local churches. We are particularly concerned with the training opportunities in the field of missions during the summer and urge that all churches remember the School of Missions, WSCS June 24-29 at Mt. Sequoyah. Also, the Jurisdictional Missions sionary Conference August 20-23; the Local chairmen Commission on Missions meeting on Mt. Sequoyah August 23-25 is of particular interest and every church should seek to send its chairman or a representative.'

## CHURCH EXTENSION SECTION

The North Arkansas loan fund is administered by the office of the Division of National Missions of the Board of Missions of The Methodist Church as a regular loan fund. This means that the same procedure and rules governing a General Board loan will be followed, namely that the loans be secured by first mortgage, be repaid in a maximum of ten years, and constitute the only indebtedness on the Church property. The plans for building or remodeling must be submitted for approval by the Department of Architecture of the Board of Missions in Philadelphia. Most of the funds in our conference loan fund has been loaned but as soon as money is available your board will be glad to consider other loans.

The requests for "donations" to the Church Extension Sections of the Board of Missions exceed the income each year. The needs for Church Extension in our conference cannot be provided through World Service alone.

We recommend a supplementary program which will provide opportunity for Conference and District Projects through the following "special" program for Church Extension:

1. That the North Arkansas Conference provide for two "new" churches each year during the 1956-60 Quadrennium.

a. That local churches, and organizations of local churches, be given an opportunity to help finance these approved churches by the

purchase of \$10 shares helping to meet district quotas:

b. We recommend that quotas to the districts be assigned on the basis of "membership and amount paid pastors," which gives the following base figure to raise \$20,000 in the conference each year in the Quadrennium:

- c. All funds raised in excess of one-half of the District Quota in each of the districts may be used for Church Extension "projects" in the bounds of that district.
- 2. That this program of the Annual Conference be carried through the regular channels of the District programs with each District Superintendent responsible for the program in his own district.

3. That the Board of Missions certify the projects on the basis of the

following:

a. Urgency of need

b. Recognized Potential Growth

c. Resources of community in which the project is located The "First" half of the District Quotas be used for the Conference

Church Extension Projects.

5. We recommend that the new Church in Fayetteville and the Wesley Church in Russellville share equally in the funds received for Church Extension through the "shares program" for the Conference year 1957-58.

# REPORT OF WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE Mrs. Jessie Gilstrap, President

The Woman's Society of Christian Service, with its inspiring purpose, offers tremendous challenge and adventure to all Methodist women who

participate in its far reaching program.

The glorious heritage of the past, together with our consciousness of the needs of the present, and our awareness of the seven goals to which we have dedicated ourselves are, indeed, a challenge to each of us to give of our best to the Master.

The accomplishments of the past year are due largely to the efficient work of the conference officers to whom I would pay loving tribute, to the loyal service of the district and local officers, to the membership as a whole and to the gracious cooperation of the Bishop, the District Superintendents and pastors. In fact, the success of the over-all program is the result of all of us working in harmony together.

There has been an increased interest evidenced in every line of work

but, in this brief report, I can mention only a few items.

Our Conference School of Missions at Hendrix College last year had the largest enrollment in its history and was judged by many to be the best school ever held. However, the one planned for this year bids fair to surpass

Two of our missionaries, home on furlough, Miss Edith Martin from the Belgian Congo and Dr. Pearl McCain from Japan, were itinerated through

the conference. Personal contact with these consecrated workers and their reports of the needs in their respective fields have greatly increased the

interest of our women in missionary projects.

We would not forget our own workers in the home fields, Miss Mary Chaffin who is completing her seventh year in our conference and Miss Iris Bell who came to us as a U.S.2 worker and was commissioned a deaconess in January. Many have been led to Christ through their witness and ministry. Woman's Societies and M.Y.F.s have been organized by them and church schools and churches strengthened by their services. These girls can not be praised too highly for the contribution they have made and are making toward the establishment of Christ's Kingdom on earth.

Our women feel keenly their responsibilities of citizenship and keep well informed upon community, state, national and world affairs and let their views be known by voice and vote when they feel that it may be a help

in promoting the enaction of constructive legislation.

Believing that the "effectual, fervent prayer of the righteous availeth much," we strive to undergird all our work with earnest prayer. Prayer groups have increased as has the use of numerous types of spiritual literature. The total number enrolled in the Fellowship of Intercession the past year was 2238. The Holy Habits are being emphasized and practiced in an effort to deepen our spiritual lives.

Subscriptions to the Methodist Woman and World Outlook have increased as our women have realized the informational value of these two

publications.

We realize that finance is just a means unto an end but it is very necessary means. For a detailed report I refer you to the June 6th issue of the Arkansas Methodist and the Annual Report of the Woman's Society. The total amount received from the eight districts, which includes the Wesleyan Service Guild, was \$80,422.25, this includes the pledge to missions, special memberships, supply work, week of prayer, results of mission studies etc.

The women of our conference also responded generously to the plea for financial aid for "better beds" for Mt. Sequoyah. This did not go thru the regular channels and is not listed in our receipts. The amount was \$700.00.

While we rejoice over the more than 600 new members gained the past year and the new units organized we are challenged by the fact that we still have 71 unorganized charges in our conference. We challenge the pastors to read and comply with Sec. IX, p. 108 of the Methodist Discipline.

Realizing that a Woman's Society of Christian Service enriches the life of the womanhood of a church, makes possible a wider ministry on the part of the pastor and extends the area of service of the total church, we prayerfully trust that by the close of this quadrennium there WILL BE a Woman's Society of Christian Service in every Methodist Church in the North Arkansas Conference and that EVERY Methodist woman will be a member of a Woman's Society.

May we all work together to have "The Spirit of Christ for all of life"

as we go forth to "Tell Arkansas and all the world about Christ."

# BOARD OF SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RELATIONS

It is this Board's responsibility to encourage the study of the basic documents of the Church, especially the Social Creed; to promote the planning of Christian Social Relations Sunday, on which the pastor is encouraged to preach on the Social Creed; and to sponsor discussion groups and studies dealing with race relations, industrial relations, social welfare, community life, political and international life.

Numerous study and discussion groups with racial relationships have been conducted during the year by pastors, The Woman's Society of Chris-

tian Service, and other local church groups during the year. Particularly outstanding in this area of Christian leadership is the work of The Rev. H. L. Robison, pastor of our Church at Hoxie. Magazines of nation-wide circulation have recorded and commended his forthright and courageous leadership.

We are deeply grateful for these examples of pastors and other church leaders recognizing and accepting responsibility for Christian leadership in this highly important area.

We urge local churches to organize the optional commission of Christian Social Relations as provided by the 1956 Discipline, and that these commissions within the local churches avail themselves of the abundance of literature, visual aids and other resource material provided by the General Board of Social and Economic Relations.

We urge the prayerful consideration of all social and economic problems of our day. Under the leadership of our Lord, let us move forward in the building of God's Kingdom which is the kingdom of love for all men.

We invite the attention of ministers and congregations to paragraphs 2020 III E and 2020 III G of the Discipline of the Methodist Church 1956:

- E. Freedom from Discrimination: We stand for the rights of racial groups and insist that the social, economic, and spiritual principles set forth in this creed apply to all races alike. We urge individual Christians and churches to make a serious and prayerful examination of their attitudes and practices in regard to racial equality and fellowship with the determination to bring our practices into conformity with Christian ideals.
- "G. Civil Liberties and Civil Rights.—We stand for recognition and maintenance of the rights and responsibilities of free speech, free assembly, and a free press, and for encouragement of free communication of ideas essential to the discovery of truth. We stand for the right of all individuals and groups to advocate any peaceful and constitutional method for the solution of problems that may confront society. We stand upon the principles of testing every such proposal in the light of the teachings of Jesus." We recommend:
- That as Christians we cultivate a deeper interest in our relations with individual Christians of other races.
- 2. That the local churches of our Conference and the institutions jointly owned with other Conferences take cognizance of the legislation of the 1956 General Conference, which was ratified by this session of our Conference, and study the manner in which this legislation affects the program, the services and the responsibility which we have in ministering to peoples of all racial, social, cultural and economic backgrounds.
- 3. That all Methodists consider, in the light of Christian teachings, recent decisions of the Supreme Court of the United States on segregation in our public schools.

We call attention to the Interracial Conference, October 29-30, 1957, at Aldersgate involving delegated personnel from all districts in Arkansas of The Southwest Conference, The North Arkansas Conference, and The Little Rock Conference and invited our people to prayerful study of the issues that confront in these areas.

## BOARD OF TEMPERANCE REPORT

To Bishop Martin and members of the North Arkansas Conference. In Session at Rogers, June 13, 1957

We, the Board of Temperance submit the following report: We commend all who in any way have and are giving leadership in seeking to combat the evils of the uses of alcoholic beverages and other narcotics and especially to Bishop Paul E. Martin, Chairman of the General Board of Temperance, to Dr. Caradine R. Hooten and his staff; to the editors of our Church papers and Church School Literature; and to the pasters and laymen for their cooperation in this battle against the liquor traffic.

We are grateful to the young people who entered the Essay Contest and to the sponsors who encouraged them in their work. Six Districts participated, thirteen awards were made to the young people who were selected as first, second, and third place winners. These Essays reveal a great amount of study and research on the part of the young people. We believe that it is an excellent way to present the cause of abstinence, and to show to our young people the dangers of alcohol.

We wish to make the following recommendations:

- 1. That pastors and local Temperance Committees make full use of the wide range of materials available through our General Board of Temperance. These excellent films, filmstrips, and literature will be able to serve only as we use them in our local churches.
- That Greater emphasis be given to Commitment Day, the First Sunday in December. That every pastor order materials early and give every member an opportunity to sign a commitment card.
- That pastors famaliarize themselves with the work of the Alcoholic Anonymous in reclaiming alcoholics and cooperate with such groups wherever possible.
- That our churches cooperate with the Arkansas Temperance League and the Woman's Christian Temperance Union. That their support be included in the annual church budget with the money being sent through our Conference Treasurer.
- That the Conference Board be authorized to continue its plans for the Annual Essay Contest on a temperance theme, and that awards be given our youth on district and conference levels.
- That the conference authorize the following budget for 1957-58 and that our percentage be continued at 1.69%.

## COMMITTEE ON GROUP INSURANCE

- 1. Every member of the North Arkansas Conference, except students serving appointments in conferences which themselves have compulsory insurance programs, every approved supply receiving an appointment, and every fulltime lay employee of the North Arkansas Conference shall participate in the North Arkansas Conference Group Life Insurance Plan, subject to its laws and regulations.
- 2. Annual premiums shall be paid by charges and participants at the premium rate of 50 cents per thousand per month for participants and 75 cents per thousand per month for charges:

#### a. ANNUAL PAYMENTS

Pastors receiving less than \$1,000 salary.	\$ 6.00
Charges paying less than \$1,000 salary	\$ 9.00
Pastors receiving \$1,001-3,000	\$12.00
Charges paying \$1,001-3,000	\$18.00
Pastors receiving \$3,001 and up	\$18.00
Charges paying \$3,001 and up	\$27.00

- 3. Annual premiums shall be paid by participants and charges and be collected through district organizations.
- 4. District treasurers of the fund shall send the district reports and premiums to the Conference Treasurer by February 1, 1958.

5. No man who retired before February 18, 1948, even though he has served as a supply since, shall be eligible for insurance.

6. Members of the conference who retire will have \$1,000 insurance carried for them with the premiums paid by the North Arkansas Conference Group Insurance Fund.

7. Approved supplies whose annuity claims are approved by the conference will have \$1,000 carried for them with the premium paid by the

North Arkansas Conference Insurance Group.

8. Members of the North Arkansas Conference who are left without appointment to attend school, who do not serve a charge, shall carry \$1,000 insurance and pay the annual premium of \$6.00 and the North Arkansas Conference Group Insurance Plan will pay the remaining \$9.00.

9. Those who are now participating in our Group Insurance Plan who will be participating under the provisions of this report shall pay 2/3 of

the annual premium according to the above schedule by July 1, 1957.

10. Due to the number of death benefits paid during the past conference year, the conference will not receive any dividend from the Metropolitan Insurance Company. As a matter of fact, a larger amount was paid in death claims than was remitted to the insurance company as premiums. The balance in the Group Insurance Fund at the end of the 1956-57 conference year is approximately \$10,000. The conference now has \$606,000 of insurance in force and there are 257 number of men insured.

#### COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

#### I. Activities

The Conference Committee on World Peace has sought to enlarge its activities in the way of Peace Cultivation and Peace Education. It has also contacted some of the Congressmen relative to issues that have a bearing on World Order and Peace. A case in particular is the Middle East situation. The Chairman of the Committee wrote seven letters—four to the Senate and three to the House—urging action through the UN and in cooperation with the other nations of the free world in an attempt to prevent war and to strengthen the basis for a just and lasting peace. The Committee Chairman has also written five letters to the People's Column of the Arkansas Gazette on issues which have a bearing on World Peace. One article was also written to the Arkansas Methodist. The following are among the other activities and programs sponsored by the Conference Committee:

- 1. The enlisting of the Wesley Foundations in the Conference territory for peace education and peace cultivation. Twenty five dollars was given to each of the foundations for this purpose.
- 2. Twenty five dollars was also given to the Hendrix Peace Team. A friend supplemented this by another twenty five, thus giving Hendrix College fifty dollars for peace cultivation.
- 3. The Committee also gave the Chairman seventy five dollars to help defray his expenses to the Churchman's Washington Seminar. The Chairman was selected as a participant in this seminar by the General Board of World Peace in Chicago.
- 4. Good reports have been received from Hendrix and some of the foundations relative to their peace cultivation. The Hendrix Peace Team, under the supervision of Dr. James Upton and Miss Ethel Millar, have visited several churches and rendered World Peace programs. Good reports have also come in from Russellville, Conway, and Jonesboro. Batesville First Church has also made a contribution by helping to send one of its college students to a UN Seminar in New York City.

#### II. Some Objectives for 1957-1958

- 1. Plans are being worked out with the General Board of World Peace in Chicago to send 7 delegates in October or November to a UN Seminar in New York City.
- We expect to keep up the program of Peace Cultivation in our Wesley Foundations.
- 3. A peace Secretary for each District in the Conference will be selected. He will work with the District Superintendent and others in formulating a Peace Program for the District.
- 4. If possible, a Conference wide work shop or forum will be conducted in some town or city conveniently located.
- 5. An effort will be made by the District Secretaries to have World Peace included in the District Conference Programs. We appreciate the fine attitude of the District Superintendents and Bishop Paul E. Martin.
- 6. The placing of World Peace literature in Colleges for our Young People, and in town and county libraries.

#### III: Committee Position

The Committee supports the United Nations and the United Nations Charter. It believes that the UN Charter should be applied to all nations without discrimination. In this atomic age the church must become vitally interested in a Peaceful World Order. It is not enough to pray for peace. We must also work for peace. Everything possible must be done to lay a sound spiritual and cultural foundation for a world order that will stand even when there are uprisings and threats from those who might be potential enemies. We believe in preparedness to prevent war and yet we believe that all nations should seek to reduce their armaments in keeping with principles of integrity and good faith. The horror of war in an atomic age should increase the efforts of all nations to come to some workable agreement for the control of nuclear power and to transform it into peaceful pursuits.

#### URBAN COMMITTEE

The shift of population from the rural sections to the larger towns and cities has continued. The trend is not finished. More will move.

This means that the Methodist Church must re-double its efforts to minister effectively to those who remain in the country. It also means we must re-study our methods of reaching those who live in the larger towns and cities.

We note with approval the new Methodist churches being organized in larger towns like Searcy, Russellville, Springdale, and Conway. There are second churches needed in other towns of this size and smaller. Rogers, Morrilton, and Forrest City are examples where all who might be Methodists are not willing to join the first church. In the larger centers, new churches have been organized, almost as fast as needed; but we suggest that the existing urban churches make positive efforts toward the meeting of needs already evident to them and others in the rapidly growing edges of our cities.

The establishment of preaching points, extension Sunday Schools, and the definite acquiring of Land Sites in the developing areas where churches might be established can be accomplished best by the already strong, urban churches.

A primary need in the North Arkansas Conference is to continue and strengthen the work of Church Extension Shares, formerly the Thousand Club. It now helps to start two new churches a year. We suggest that the goal be four.

The established churches in the cities need to re-study their effectiveness, to see if they are meeting the needs in their communities. An adequate program, led by an able staff, is a necessity.

We urge each district to send representatives to the Conference on Urban Work to be held in Washington, D. C. in February, 1958.

# Memoirs

## REV. CAROLOS H. BUMPERS

#### 1876-1957

The Reverend Carolos H. Bumpers was born July 27th, 1876, in Jacksonville, Alabama. His parents were Joel Jasper Bumpers, and Lydia Pritchett Bumpers, and came with them to Arkansas, and settled in Franklin County in 1876, where he began to "grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ" which resulted into a happy personality, and was one of the noblest character the writer has ever known.

He was converted and joined the Methodist Church early in life, and later, he had a great inner desire to be about his Father's business. The great Sower, sowed seed in his heart which bore fruitful harvest, until he was called home.

He attended Franklin County public schools, and later attended Hendrix College, at Conway. He was well-qualified to lead both young people and adults into a richer experience in the Christian life.

He was married to Miss Irene Elizabeth Moore, on February 8th, 1899, in Cecil, Arkansas. Three children were born into this good Christian home, and they are: Mrs. H. H. Boyington, of Pampa, Texas, E. Clay Bumpers, of Wabash, Arkansas, and W. L. Bumpers, of Pampa, Texas. Left to survive him in addition to the children, include his widow of Pampa, Texas, a brother: Lane Bumpers, of Sigler, Oklahoma.

Brother Bumpers was licensed to preach, and was admitted on trial in the Arkansas Conference 1908 — admitted into full connection, and ordained deacon 1912, and ordained elder in 1915. He gave thirty-two years of his life to the Methodist ministry in the Arkansas, and North Arkansas Conferences, and retired in 1941, and later moved to Pampa, Texas, where he served as visiting minister of the First Methodist Church from 1950 to 1953, when his health failed him. On March 4th, 1957, his soul departed this life to hear the blessed words, "Well done thou good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of the Lord."

During his thirty-two years in the ministry, he served the following appointments along with his good wife—Plainview, Huntington, Mulberry, Midland Height, Fort Smith, Holly Grove, Elaine, Lepanto, Manila, Trumann, Heber Springs, and McCrory, and took the retired relation at the Conference meeting at Harrison, Arkansas, November 1941.

Funeral services were held at the First Methodist Church, March 6th, 1957, with the Rev. Woodrow Adcock, pastor officiating, assisted by Dr. Orin Carter, former pastor of Big Springs, Texas, and the Rev. Finley Vanderburg, of Clarendon, Texas. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery, Pampa, Texas.

The writer has known Brother Bumpers for more than thirty-five years, and found him to be a faithful husband, kind father, true friend, and a loyal and faithful servant of God. He is sure Brother Bumper's life and ministry will live in the lives of those he served, and through them in the lives of others.

"The eternal God is thy refuge, and underneath are the everlasting Arms."—And when all the todays have been translated into the tomorrows, and the tomorrows have merged into the eternities of God, we shall meet and greet you on the other side.

### J. J. DECKER

Jesse J. Decker was born December 25, 1889, at Modoc, Phillips County, Arkansas, on the Mississippi River south of Helena. As a boy and young man Mr. Decker was of high moral character, and loved the Church and its ministry. When a child there was no church at Elaine or at Modoc, so occasionally a minister from Mississippi would cross the river at Modoc and preach in the Decker home or at a school. Mr. Decker was an active layman in the Elaine Church before he entered the ministry. He was first licensed to preach at a conference that convened in Helena in 1917.

Mr. Decker had a good understanding of human nature which enabled him to win the confidence of his people and he was a fearless, yet tactful, leader, serving to the best of his ability wherever the conference sent him. He often said that the conference had been good to him. He loved the brethren and felt that the conference was a great brotherhood, no other organization being like it. His whole life reflected the joy of living and

He was well rounded in his interests and activities in the ministry, giving emphasis to every phase of the program of the church. He had the heart of an evangelist, with a passion to tell the good news. While he was evangelistic, he was no less interested in his pastorate. He loved people, and had the heart of a kind Shepherd. He knew his flock and could call them by name. He visited the aged and shut-ins and they loved him. He loved the children, too, and was happy to give his time to the pastoral work of his calling.

Mr. Decker was blest with a fine physique and good health, rarely missing a preaching appointment. However, last winter he worked for more than two months, unaware that he was having coronary attacks, until the doctor detected it and put him to bed on April 19, where he lay for more than two months. He missed his first conference roll call in June 1956,

after giving 35 years to the ministry.

He served the following charges: Hunter, Bellefonte, McRae, Judsonia, Magazine, Aubrey, Harrisburg, Piggott, Midland Heights in Ft. Smith, Manila, Rector, West Helena and Prairie Grove.

His membership was transferred to the Church Triumphant on June 21, 1956. The service was held in the Methodist Church, West Helena, conducted by Rev. Glen Bruner, assisted by Rev. Norris Steele, Rev. J. T. Byrd, Rev. Garland Taylor, and Rev. Jimmie Chandler. Rev. A. N. Story of Conway preached the sermon using II Samuel 3:38 for a text, "And the King said unto his servant, know ye not that a prince and a great man has fallen this day in Israel?"

## MRS. JAMES B. EVANS

Florence Augusta Evans, daughter of John R. and Rosebud Houston Wier, was born at Hot Springs, Arkansas, March 22, 1892. Her education was in the Hot Springs schools and Henderson State Teachers College, Arkadelphia, with an additional degree earned at Arkansas Polytechnic College at Russellville. She was grounded in the Christian faith from birth, knowing the religious nature of a Christian home and growing through faith into a lovely and devoted member of the Church.

She was married to James B. Evans, then pastor of the Malvern Avenue Methodist Church, June 11, 1914, and channelled the strength and beauty of her life through the parsonage home and a generous friendship in wide circles to the enrichment of life in the church and communities where their service called them. Soon after their marriage a transfer took them from the Twenty-eighth Street Church in Little Rock to the Florida Conference and a pastorate at Fort Lauderdale. Returning to Arkansas and membership in the North Arkansas Conference they served the Church at Parkin, Brinkley, Helena, Clarendon, Clarksville, Paragould, Morrilton and Russellville. In 1929 Mrs. Evans was subjected to the heart break that comes to a minister's wife who sees her husband break under strain at the point of highest ability. Leading congregations in two great church-building achievements at Paragould and Russellville proved too much of a drain for even robust health and Brother Evans was forced to retire from the pastorate.

Mrs. Evans loved youth and children adored her. On their retirement they moved to Hot Springs where she turned happily to teaching. Her specialty was with small children and she entered this new phase of creative service in the city and schools of her nativity, continuing as a skilled and much loved teacher till her own health failed almost four years before her death.

The end came to her earthly activities August 5, 1956; but the charm and courage of her spirit live in the hundreds of children and youth she gave a spark from her flame of life in the church and school and in her home. Dr. E. D. Galloway, her pastor, conducted the funeral service at First Church, Hot Springs, and she was laid to rest at Greenwood cemetery there, survived by her husband and one daughter, Mrs. A. R. Smith, Jr., of Little Rock and five grandchildren. The end of her life came and found her ready and unafraid. As Brother Evans left the hospital the night before her death she smiled happily and told him she would not be there when he should come again but assured him she had no uncertainty of the future. Ripening faith had come with companionship of service and the parting was in the traditional pattern of the Christian order of life, life that is eternal in its scope and in its quality.

#### M. A. GRAVES

July 10, 1956 the writer was called to Wynne, Arkansas to deliver the message in memorium of his friend and brother, The Reverend Marvin A. Graves. He did not have access to the obituary and therefore, cannot give many details but will have to be content to embody here that which is generally known.

Brother Graves served 7 years as supply pastor; 26½ years in the traveling Connection, and four years as a retired minister. It was my happy privilege to work with him in a number of revivals and so I came to love and respect him as one of God's noblemen because of his Christian character; because of his faithfulness to his Methodist doctrines, his people, his church, and his Lord. He was always a minister in spirit. Long after his body failed him his heart cried out for his church and he continued to think and plan for "another appointment." He led his people from their doubts and fears into a renewed faith and courage, and lifted many a brother minister's drooping spirits. Like David, he sang his church to victory and led his people through battles against sin to glorious triumphs as he continued to cry: "Behold the Lamb of God." Hence, for nearly 40 years, as a minister, "He went about doing good." We believe that if the angels would turn on the cosmic wave-length and broadcast from heaven you could hear Marvin A. Graves singing as he loved to sing—not in the feeble, shaky voice—but as a "Sweet Singer in Israel" lifting the songs of Zion to the Lamb of God.

A number of years ago, on the occasion of Father's Day, his daughter, Mrs. Laura Clark, wrote and dedicated to her father the following poem.

> "While a war torn world lies bleeding, Caught in tangled, hectic schemes And we feel the breath of battle— Searing all our hopeful dreams;

"In these brief suspended moments, Steeped in herror yet untold Let me once more journey homeward, Glimpse again the scenes of old: "There's a plain old-fashioned garden, Back beyond the Ozark trails; Where wild roses flank the roadsides— Down along the old fence rails.

"And the scent of pine-wood greets you, As the sun climbs in the sky; What a landscape spreads before you Where the hill spring rushes by!

"There each leaf and blade of field grass Has been splashed with gems of dew, And the blue air, filmed with wood-smoke, Thrills your body through and through.

"You feel the strength of sturdy oak, Whose feet grip the deep soil, And a sense of satisfaction—
Seems to bless each week day's toil.

## STANDING RULES OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

- (1) That each undergraduate, each approved supply pastor, and each candidate for conference membership be required to meet with the Board of Ministerial Training before or during the session of the annual conference unless hindered by circumstances beyond his control.
- (2) That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one delegate from each church in each Pastoral Charge; provided further, that each station charge shall have three elected delegates.
- (3) That the figures answering the question the pastor's report to Annual Conference: "Members reported last year" shall in every case be the number of members printed in the statistical tables of the Journal of the last Annual Conference.
- (4) That the District Superintendent's figures of all apportionments be accepted as the official figures.
- (5) That the apportionment for Conference and General Work be combined in the statistical report: and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.
- (6) All statistical reports shall be delivered by the district superintendents to the conference statistician seven days before the opening session of the Annual Conference, and all settlements shall be made with the Conference Treasurer by June 1st.
- (7) When a member of this Conference becomes a member of the Bishop's cabinet he shall automatically become ineligible to serve on any quadrennial board, committee, commission, or an officer in the Conference administration, except members specifically designated by the Discipline.
- (8) That the Secretary of the Bishop's cabinet be instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or District Superintendent's District for insertion in the Conference Journal.
- (9) That all members of the conference who attend the annual session shall pay the host church two dollars registration fee, with the following exceptions: 1) Men from minimum salary charges shall pay one dollar; 2) Retired men and supernumeraries shall pay no registration fee. The offerings in the public worship services shall go to the host church, and the honorarium from the conference preacher shall be paid from the conference expense fund.
- (10) At all sessions of the Annual Conference entertainment provided by the host church shall consist of bed and breakfast. except for superannuates, for whom full entertainment shall be provided.
- (11) Every board, commission, and committee receiving any money from conference funds shall present to the Commission on World Service and Finance annually by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference a detailed financial report including all receipts and expenditures.
- (12) The list of lay delegates elected to Annual Conference shall be compiled by the district superintendents and sent to the host church and to the conference secretary thirty days before the opening of the Annual Conference.
- (13) The District Stewards shall apportion the askings for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and for General Administration Fund, and Jurisdictional Expense, to the several charges in each district on an equitable basis.
- (14) The conference treasurer shall close his books for the Conference Year seven days before the opening of the annual conference, and shall distribute to the several boards and commissions the moneys to which they are entitled by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference, and each board and commission receiving money from conference funds shall close its books on the opening day of annual conference.
- (15) No one shall be nominated for re-election to a board or commission on which he has served more than a quadrennium immediately preceding his election.
- (16) The secretary of the Board of Conference Claimants shall be a member of the secretarial staff of the conference and this person shall be charged with the responsibility of seeing that all records pertaining to service years be made identical.
- (17) Any proposal to change the Standing Rules shall lie on the table overnight, and then its passage shall require a  $\frac{34}{4}$  vote of those present and voting.
- (18) That part of the report of all boards, commissions, committees and other agencies of the conference which provides for changes in policy or makes recommendations shall be mimeographed, printed, or otherwise duplicated and distributed to the membership of the conference prior to the time scheduled for action on said report.
- (19) All churches employing more than one member of an annual conference shall pay all percentages based on pastor's salary on the salaries of all ministers so employed.

## SESSIONS OF THE CONFERENCE

The "Arkansas Conference" and the "White River Conference" were united in 1914 to form the present "North Arkansas Conference."

The Conference determined that its annual notation should date from the time of the organization of the Arkansas Conference in 1836, instead of following the date fixed by the consolidation of the Arkansas and White River Conferences, when the name was changed to North Arkansas Conference in 1914.

The Conference session of 1939 voted to maintain the numerical notation of the Conference in The Methodist Church.
