

First Day, Morning Session

June 10, 1958

Opening: The 123rd session of the North Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Church convened in the First Methodist Church, Searcy, Arkansas, June 10, 1958 at 10:30 a. m. with Bishop Paul E. Martin presiding. Hymn 402, "And Are We Yet Alive" was sung. Dr. E. T. Wayland led the opening prayer.

Secretary Nominations: Alf A. Eason, Secretary of the Conference, nominated as assistants to the secretary: James R. Chandler, James M. Meadors, and O. D. Peters.

Roll Call: The roll was perfected by James M. Meadors.

Planning Committee: Alvin C. Murray, host pastor, presented the report of the Planning Committee. The report was adopted.

Amendment to the Agenda: Ethan Dodgen moved that the order of the day for June 11, be amended so that the decision as to where the next session of the conference will be held might be made immediately following the report of the Committee on the Journal. The motion carried.

Welcome: Clarence Snowden, Chairman of the Official Board of the host church was presented to the conference by Alvin C. Murray. Mr. Snowden delivered a welcome address, to which Bishop Martin responded.

Representative of the Publishing House: Robert A Thornton, representative of the publishing house spoke to the conference and presented a check for \$6,425.91 to the bishop, who in turn gave the check to O. D. Peters, Chairman of the Board of Pensions. Mr. Thornton also gave the book, "The World is Learning Compassion" by Frank Lauback, to Bishop Martin. The bishop recommended "The Methodist Way of Life" by Gerald Kennedy.

Bar of the Conference: All the space in the sancturay from the middle window in the back section forward was designated as the bar of the conference.

The District Superintendents and one layman from each District, One Executive Secretary in the full employ of the Conference, the President of the Conference Womans Society of Christian Service, the President of the Conference Methodist Youth Fellowship and four clerical "Members at large." The Cabinet shall nominate and the Conference elect all members who are not ex-officio, annually. The resolution was adopted.

Presentations: George Meyer, pastor of First Methodist Church, Rus-

Adjournment: The conference adjourned for the afternoon session with the benediction by W. J. Spicer.

Second Day — Morning Session

Journal: Arnold Simpson reported that the minutes of yesterday's sessions were in perfect order.

Board of Ministerial Training: Jesse Johnson, Chairman of the Board of Ministerial Training, presented Dr. A. W. Martin who gave Report No. 1. Report No. 1 was adopted. Robert Simpson read Report No. 2 which included the state of the state cluded the recommendation that the following men be Admitted on Trial by the Annual Conference: Harold Wilson Brent, Hugh Weldon Burtner, and Allen Burnell Stephens. COMMISSION ON HIGHER EDUCATION

The Executive Committee of the Commission on Higher Education offer the following recommendations to the Little Rock, and the North Arkansa Conferences:

1. We request the conferences to re-affirm their support of the program for the support of Higher Education and Wesley Foundation worl as it was passed by the 1956 session of the General Conference of Th Methodist Church.

2. We commend the Little Rock Conference for the action it too last year when it made an amount equal to \$1.30 per member the goal fo each district for the support of Higher Education, and Wesley Foundatio work.

3. We recommend that every charge develope a financial program fo itself that will pay the amount apportioned to it for Higher Education an

Wesley Foundation in full by the end of this quadrennium.

We recommend that there be in each conference a committee, know as the Committee on Methodist Student Activities, to develop, and to student Methodist Student Center programs for the Methodist Students, fo whom these conferences are responsible, attending the colleges within th state and the University.

A. That this committee be composed of eleven (11) members That the cabinet shall be represented by one superintendent, and eacl

district shall be represented by a least one member.

B. That this committee shall be under the supervision, and re sponsible to, the Conference Board of Education.

5. We feel that we must increase our financial support to Philande Smith College. Therefore, we recommend that every charge take an offer

ing, or make a gift, to the support of that institution.

6. We recommend that the World Service and Finance Commissions of the two conferences request the conferences to grant authorized representatives of Hendrix College, and the established Wesley Foundations under the supervisions of these conferences the right to solicit funds for their respective institutions.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARY

We recommend that pastors and churches become eligible to receive Minimum Salary aid by meeting the following requirements:

- 1. Submit a budget planned by the Commission on Stewardship and Finance, and adopted by the Official Board, to the District Superintendent, and the Commission on Minimum Salary.
- 2. Conduct an approved every-member canvass, using the procedure planned by the General Board of Lay Activities and adopted by the North Arkansas Conference.
- 3. Submit copies of the "Questionnarie for Pastors concerning their Earnings" to the District Superintendent and the Commission on Minimum Salary.
- 4. Minimum Salary Charges must be composed of at least three churches. Stations and two-point circuits are not eligible to receive Minimum Salary aid.
- 5. Charges seek to become self-supporting by increasing their support to the pastor by not less than \$100.00 per year.
 - 6. Minimum Salary Charges shall be grouped in the following way:

- 7. No pastor is eligible to receive Minimum Salary aid until he and the charge which he serves pay the designated percentages.

- (b) Charges will pay the required percentage on the basis of the actual salary paid the pastor by the charge.
- (c) Pastors will pay the required percentage on the basis of the total of salary from the charge plus Minimum Salary Fund payments plus Board of Missions payments.
 - (1) Pastors will not pay percentage on Pastor's Expense Fund or Pension annuities.
- (d) The Conference Treasurer shall present a mimeographed report (to the session of the annual conference) showing the payments the ministers of the conference have made to this fund.
- 8. Payments will be made from the Minimum Salary Fund according to the following schedule:

TELEVISION, RADIO, AND FILM COMMISSION

The realization of the importance of the work of the Television, Radio, and Film Commission is growing quite rapidly, not only in the Methodist Church, but throughout Protestantism. Last year the National Council's Broadcasting and Film Commission placed 15,000 TV programs. Of these 56 were half-hour network programs over 140 stations. In addition, it sponsored 260 radio programs. The Methodist TRAFCO is a large part of this program.

On May 6-8 representatives of our conference attended a TRAFCO workshop in Dallas on the production and distribution of a new television series entitled "Talk Back." This will be the most extensive program of

the year.

In addition our conference TRAFCO is planning the production of a series of five-minute TV devotional programs - using members of our conference as personnel.

During the coming year we wish to place special emphasis on the work of TRAFCO on a district level. We hope to have a workshop in each district and through it promote three primary objectives:

- The publicizing of the best religious TV and Radio programs.
- The most effective use of Visual educational materials and equipment.
- The increasing use of the community radio stations by the local churches.

TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

1. The Every Member Canvas

1a. A major part of the Commission's time has been spent in the promotion of Stewardship and the Every Member Canvass. The Executive Secretary attended a Workshop held in Chicago, that was a special study of the Every Member Canvass as developed under the direction of the General Board of Lay Activities.

The Executive Secretary worked in fifteen Workshops in the North Arkansas Conference, and helped organize a Workshop on an Area basis

at El Dorado.

The Executive Secretary is developing a Film Library that will help tremendously in the promotion of the Stewardship emphasis and the Every Member Canvass. The films are available to any Church in the Conference without cost to the Local Church except the return postage for mailing.

In addition to the work on the Conference and District level the Execu-

tive Secretary has worked with many churches on the local level.

The Executive Secretary has worked with Men's Fellowships and with the board of Lay Activities in promoting the Every Member Canvass.

2. The Commission has worked most effectively in building programs across the conference. The Executive Secretary has given assistance in both the planning of the building and the promotion of the financial campaign, when invited by the District Superintendent and the Pastor.

3. At the request of the Conference Board of Evangelism the Execut-

ive Secretary helped in organizing the conference on a County basis for the evangelistic survey. Where this survey was earnestly and systamatically

conducted, great good resulted.

4. Again this year Rev. A. N. Storey helped plan and promote the Town and Country Seminar at the University of Arkansas. There were twenty five from the conference present. Forty signed to attend but because of conflicts and very bad weather the attendance was cut.

The response of the churches in providing scholarship help was excellent. Thus, there is a balance in the fund due to the small number attending this year. This surplus will be held over for the large number who have al-

ready expressed a desire to attend next year.

5. Great emphasis was placed upon organizing Group Ministries where desired. Rural Life Conferences were held periodically throughout the year. Dr. Marvin Judy helped teach a course at Walnut Ridge on the Group Min-

The Executive Secretary attended a meeting of the General Conference Interboard Committee on ministry to the neglected areas. He is a member of this General Conference Committee and plans on attending other similar meeting to help render a greater ministry to the neglected areas, and thus strive to overcome one of the most critical problems within Methodism.

Emphasis has been given to the Lord's Acre and the Lord's Hour Plan, with the belief that the Every Member Canvass is basic for the budget of the church. Yet, the Lord's Acre Plan and the Lord's Hour Plan are excellent extra projects that prove to be of tremendous value in certain local situations.

- 9. The Executive Secretary participated in the State Wide Town and Country Convocation held at Hendrix College January 14th. A very worthwhile meeting was held even though Dr. G. Ross Freeman was unable to reach Conway because of Bad weather that grounded his plane.
- 10. The Executive Secretary participated in a workshop at the Amboy Church in North Little Rock. Many valuable ideas were presented that will strengthen the Rural Program in the conference.
- 11. There has been a continuation of the Work Shop room at Hendrix College for Student pastors.
- 12. The Executive Secretary has done much research on the rural and urban churches so that both might be strengthened.

We feel that this has been a great year in the work of the commission.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE NEW YEAR

1. We recommend that the Town and Country Commission continue its policy of working with other boards and church groups on the Conference, District, and Local levels, where its services are needed and requested.

3. Workshops will be held for the purpose of grappling with the prob-lems of the Rural Church. Those participating will be pastors serving more than one church, and will be urged to give deep thought and study to particular and specific problems, in advance of the meeting.
4. We recommend that the commission and conference be ever alert

to the possibilities of building new churches in growing urban areas.

5. We recommend that great effort be made to organize better smaller churches so that a more meaningful spiritual program might be a reality. This might include improving the physical plant, better financial support, and the maintaining of a hopeful and optimistic outlook where there are not large numbers. A diligent effort will be made to improve both the ministerial and lay leadership, with the realization that just because there are small numbers is no reason for not rendering great spiritual service to the few that are left.

6. We recommend that the commission work with other Community and State Agencies in an endeavor to bring about community improvement. These agencies might include Vocational Agriculture, Soil Conservation, Rural Community Improvement Agencies, etc.

7. A Mid-year meeting of the Town and Country Commission will be

We recommend that the Commission strengthen its efforts in directing the Stewardship and Every Member Canvas program. Outstanding resource leaders will be used to help emphasize stewardship in the Local Churches. These leaders will help ministers plan their preaching program on stewardship. One will be Dr. Briggs.

We recommend that even more importance be placed on the Town and Country Seminar at the university of Arkansas. The Commission wishes to thank the larger Urban Churches for scholarship help, and urge

them to keep up this important Christian undertaking.

10. We recommend that ministers attend the Town and Country Workshop at Emory University, July 1-17th. Scholarships will be available for those who will attend. Rev. Glenn Sanford stated that this workshop was one of the finest of its kind in America.

We recommend that the commission assist in organizing Group Ministries where needed and desired. To help in this enterprise the commission is buying the film None Goes His Way Alone.

12. We recommend that plans be made to send a large delegation to the National Methodist Town and Country Convocation held in Wichita, Kansas, July 21-24, 1959. Plans are underway to promote attendance at this meeting.

We recommend that the commission send representatives to the Jurisdictional Town and Country Commission meeting October 14-16 at

Devil's Canyon, Oklahoma.

- 14. We urge the Executive Secretary to attend a meeting on Stewardship and the Every Member Canvass held in Chicago September 15-17.
- 15. For the work of the coming year we recommend that A. N. Storey be reappointed Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission to direct this work.

WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE COMMISSION

A. INTRODUCTORY STATEMENTS:

Your Commission on World Service and Finance of the North Arkansas Conference has met with Representatives of all the Boards and Agencies of The Annual Conference and in seeking to co-operate with all in the ongoing of Christ's work in the churches of the Conference we respectfully submit for your approval the following recommendations for the Conference year of 1958-1959.

B. GENERAL ITEMS:

- 1. The Conference Treasurer, Mr. P. E. Cooley, P. O. Box 26, Blytheville, Arkansas is bonded in the amount of \$125,000.00.
 - (1) The Conference Treasurer's office shall receive and disburse the following funds in compliance with the directives of the Annual Conference; World Service, Episcopal Fund, District Superintendents Fund, General-Jurisdictional-Interdenominational Co-

operation-State Council of Churches and Television Ministry (designated as GJ&I Fund in Treasurer's report), Wesley Foundation Fund, Minimum Salary Fund, Golden Cross Fund, Methodist Youth Fund, Race Relations Offering, World-Wide Communion (Overseas relief) Offering, Advance Specials, Week of Dedication, Methodist Student Day Fund, Methodist Hospital and Building Fund, Church Extension Shares (1000 Club) and any other fund or funds which may be specifically directed by the Annual Conference.

- (2) The depositories for all Funds are to be included in the Treasurer's report to the Annual Conference.
- 2. The following special offerings are to be sent to the office or person herein designated.
 - Arkansas Methodist Children's Home, Christmas Offering and other special offerings to the office of the Superintendent, 2002 Fillmore Street, Little Rock, Arkansas.
 - (2) Higher Education offering for Hendrix College and Ministerial Training to E. W. Martin, c-o Hendrix College, Conway, Arkansas.
 - (3) Woman's Society of Christian Service Funds to Mrs. William Hall, Widener, Arkansas.
 - (4) Arkansas Methodist subscriptions to P. O. Box 1066, Little Rock, Arkansas.
 - (5) District Fund to the designated District Treasurer.
 - (6) Arkansas Temperance League offering to the Arkansas Temperance League, Waldron Building, Little Rock, Arkansas.
 - (7) Church School Rally Day offering to the Executive Secretary, Board of Education, Hendrix College, Conway, Arkansas.
- 3. The Salaries and other expenses of the Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Education and the Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission shall be included in the financial report of their Board and Commission in compliance with paragraph 812 of the 1956 Discipline.
- 4. All Boards and Agencies receiving support from the Conference Benevolence program are respectfully requested to file copies of their financial expenditures for the past Conference year and proposed budgets for the new Conference year with the Secretary of the World Service and Finance Commission in compliance with paragraph 793 of the 1956 Discipline.

Since any deficit in payments to the General Administration Fund and the Jurisdictional Administration Fund is charged against the Annual Conference for future payment that these two (2) items of fund designated as the "G.J.I. and T.V. Fund" shall have prior claim on the fund and shall be paid in full each year from receipts to the fund; and that the other items of the fund shall then receive their percentage of the balance; this in the event that the amount received for this fund falls below the established apportionments.

D. OTHER RECOMMENDATIONS AND MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS:

- 1. Pertaining to the office of Conference Secretary we recommend:
 - (1) that reports required under paragraph 812 of the 1956 Discipline be promptly filed with the Secretary of the Annual Conference for inclusion in the printing of the Journal.
 - (2) that the contract for printing and mailing of the Conference Journal not exceed \$3,600.00 unless as an emergency it is acted upon by the Executive Committee of the World Service and Finance Commission.
 - (3) that the sum of \$300.00 be paid to the Secretary of the Annual Conference for travel expenses, etc., in connection with the publishing of the Journal.

- (4) that the sum of \$150.00 be the allowance for printing Conference programs, roll call blanks, and for memographing and stenographing at the session of the Annual Conference.
- (5) that the sum of \$300.00 be the allowance for memographing, assembling and mailing the Pre-Conference Digest.
- (6) that the items of budget and expenditures in the report of Conference Boards, Commissions, and Agencies be deleted from the reports as printed in the Journal unless required by the 1956 Discipline.
- (7) that Memorials to be printed in the Journal be limited to a maximum of 500 words.
- (8) that all Boards and Agencies of the Annual Conference prepare their Pre-Conference reports and submit them to the Secretary of the Annual Conference in time for the publication of the Pre-Conference Digest at least 60 days prior to the convening of the Annual Conference and that this be the only mailing by the Commissions, Boards and Agencies of the Annual Conference to the clerical, lay delegates, and other Conference offices.
- 2. That the Arkansas Historical Commission of The Methodist Church of the North Arkansas Conference, be paid the sum of \$50.00 from the Conference Contingent Fund to be used in the placing of historical markers in places of interest to The Methodist Church in Arkansas.
- 3. Pertaining to Higher Education:
 - (1) that full co-operation of all local churches be given the Commission on Higher Education as it continues to lead us toward the accepted goal of \$1.00 per member for Hendrix College and that the Commission request that we expand this program toward the acceptance of 30c per member for Wesley Foundation work within the Conference be recognized as our Conference goal for this Quadrennium.

AMENDMENTS

- (a) That the proportion of what each church pays to World Service and is thereby applied to Hendrix College and Wesley Foundation be counted toward the Higher Education Quota and also those amounts contributed to Philander Smith College shall be counted in Higher Education payments.
- (b) That \$5,500.00 of the amount collected for Higher Education be allocated to the Board of Ministerial Training.
- (c) That the "November Special" be designated as An Emphasis on "Christian Higher Education and Ministerial Training."
 - (2) that authorization be given to the Boards of Directors of each Wesley Foundation of the North Arkansas Conference to make individual solicitation of funds for Capital Funds for Building with the consent of the Pastor and District Superintendent of the Charge and District within which the solicitations are to be made.
 - (3) that the person or persons so designated by the Trustees and Administration of Hendrix College be authorized to solicit individual gifts of money for the College within the bounds of the North Arkansas Conference.
 - (4) that favorable consideration be given by the Annual Conference to the recommendation of the Commission on Higher Education requesting the appointment of a special Committee to study future Wesley Foundation programs and to make recommendation to the next session of the Annual Conference. This Committee to be organized as set forth in the report of the Commission on Higher Education.

- 4. That increased support be given to the program of Christian Education within our Conference through the observance of Church School Rally Day, with an offering to be taken in every Church and this offering be sent to the office of the Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Education, Hendrix Station, Conway, Arkansas.
- 5. That the recommendations of the Commission on Minimum Salary as contained in their report to the Annual Conference be accepted as the basis for the Minimum Salary program of the Annual Conference.
- 6. That the North Arkansas Conference continue to recognize the Disciplinary rights of the Pastoral Charges to pay Pastors on Pastor's expenses incurred in his work in accord with Paragraph 829 of the 1956 Discipline. That the maximum total to be paid by Pastoral Charges for the Travel and Utility Expenses of The Pastor shall not exceed the sum of \$1,200.00 per year; and that no Conference percentage item is to be charged against this amount. A salary may not be lowered to initiate an expense fund or to increase an existing expense fund.
- 7. That the apportionment to the Charges for Conference Claimants be an amount equal to 17% of the Pastor's Salary; and that each Minister appointed by the Annual Conference with annuity claim on the Conference shall contribute to the Conference Claimants fund according to the schedule of percentages and other provisions as set forth in the report of The Board of Pensions.
- 8. That the Television-Radio-and-Film-Commission (TRAFCO) be given permission to solicit funds for its ministry to the people of Arkansas through private solicitation with the consent of the Pastor and District Superintendent within whose Pastoral Charge and District the solicitation are to be made.
- 9. That the sum of \$2,430.00 as allocated to the Arkansas State Council of Churches to be paid quarterly by the Conference Treasurer; and that the State Council be respectfully requested to comply with the requirement of the Annual Conference pertaining to Conference Commissions, Boards and Agencies in that statement of expenditures for the past year and a budget for the new year (fiscal year of the State Council) be filed with the Secretary of the World Service and Finance Commission.
- 10. The World Service and Finance Commission is in hearty accord with the report of The Board of Temperance and respectfully requests that each Pastor and District Superintendent co-operate with our Board of Temperance in getting increased revenue for the TEMPERANCE PROGRAM in our State.
- 11. That the percentage for the Episcopal Fund approved by the General Conference is an amount equal to 2% of the Pastor's salary.
- 12. That the salary for the District Superintendents for the North Arkansas Conference for the year 1958-59 be the amount of \$7,000.00 annual salary with the amount of \$2,000.00 to be added as Office, travel, and utility expense. We further recommend that the sum of \$50.00 each be continued as travel allowance for the District Superintendents to AREA meetings.
- 13. That the following amount be paid from the Conference Expense Fund for:
 - (1) Deaconess Board _____\$100.00
 - (2) Honorium for Conference Preacher _____ 350.00
 - (3) Committee on Promotion & Cultivation ____ 300.00
- 14. That the offerings received at the Worship Services during the session of Annual Conference be given to the Host Church for expenses in connection with the entertainment of the Annual Conference.
- 15. That in view of the World's needs and demands upon the Churches for leadership, our Conference under the direction of the Bishop, Cabinet, Town & Country Commission and in co-operation with other Conference Agencies, continue to plan and promote a definite program of Stewardship throughout the Conference.

16. That the Quarterly Conference Commission on Wills & Legacies be established in each Pastoral Charge and that this Committee be respectfully requested to secure and use the various materials which are available through the office of Dr. J. Homer Magee, Director of Wills & Legacy, 740 Rush Street, Chicago, Illinois.

That special recognition be given to Mr. E. W. Martin, Treasurer of Hendrix College, who as a member of "the Central Arkansas Estate Council" is available upon call in assisting members of the Methodist Church who desire to place Methodist Interests in their Wills.

- 17. That all local Church Treasurers be respectfully requested to comply with the provision of Paragraph 823 of the 1956 Discipline which provides that payments on Ministerial Support items must be remitted to the Conference Treasurer at least quarterly.
- 18. (1) That the Conference Statistician be paid the sum of \$600.00 to collect and prepare "the required statistics" for reporting to the Annual Conference and for publication in the Conference Journal and General Minutes.
- (2) That the suggestions coming out of the Jurisdictional meetings of Conference Statisticians be followed in that the Conference Statistician select the District Auditor or Auditors and shall instruct them, meeting with them when necessary, in the preparing of the District Statistical Tables. The Conference Statistician shall pay the Auditors expenses from the amount allocated.
- (3) That the Conference Statisticians recommendations as to the reporting of items to the Annual Conference be followed unless otherwise directed by the President of the Annual Conference.
- (4) The World Service and Finance Commission wishes to recognize the great improvement that has been made over the past few years in the keeping and reporting of statistical records by the Pastors of the Annual Conference and respectfully request that this fine spirit of co-operation on the part of the District Superintendents and Pastors be continued that our Conference shall meet all Disciplinary requirements and shall fully co-operate with the recommendations of The General Statistician's Office.

The Reverend Ewing Wayland, Editor and Business Manager of our conference publication will report for The Arkansas Methodist; and Miss Jeanne Mason, Director of Methodist Information who has earned area recognition in promoting publicity favorable to The Methodist Church will present her report; and Reverend Doctor Aubrey Walton, Chairman of The Joint Commission of The Arkansas Methodist and Louisiana Methodist will present the Joint Commission's Report.

JOINT COMMISSION OF THE ARKANSAS METHODIST AND THE LOUISIANA METHODIST

The Joint Commission of the ARKANSAS METHODIST and THE LOUISIANA METHODIST met at the First Methodist Church, Little Rock, February 12, 1958, 12:30 p. m. with Dr. Aubrey G. - (8) That Miss Jeanne Mason be continued as director of the Methodist Information for the Arkansas-Louisiana Area.
- (9) That the executive committee be authorized to act for the commission in such matters which in its judgement may need action between now and the next meeting of the commission.

Since the year's work is far from complete we will make our report of the year's work through June Christian Education Bulletin, which will go to all pastors, district superintendents, and church school superintendents.

We desire to make the following recommendations to the Annual Conference with reference to the conference year 1958-59:

That the North Arkansas Conference cooperate with the Little Rock and Louisianna Conferences in a year of emphasis on Christian education in the local churches during the conference year of 1958-59, under the leadership of Bishop Paul E. Martin.

That a district institute on Christian education be held in each district as soon after annual conference as convenient, with the following local church representation: pastors, church school superintendents, superintendents of membership cultivation, and chairman of commissions on education.

That the month of September be Christian Education Month with emphasis on increasing church school membership and attendance; and a local church period of planning in preparation for the new church school year.

That a conference goal of 10% increase in church school membership and average attendance be set for the conference year of 1958-59.

That a series of three Christian education rallies be held in September under the leadership of Bishop Martin as a part of the Christian education emphasis, to be held as followed: Jonesboro, First Church, September 8; No. Little Rock, First Church, September 9; Ft. Smith, First Church, September 10.

That September 27 be Church School Rally Day and that each church be urged to observe the day with program and offering.

That we continue the policy of using 75% of Church School Rally Day offerings for district Christian education cultivation.

That September 28-October 5 be Christian Education Week.

That October and November be special period for local church and area training schools.

That November 9-16, 1958 be the period for November Special, at which time each church will give special emphasis on Christian vocation, and the offering for ministerial training and Hendrix College.

That a coaching conference be conducted on the course on "How to Improve the Church School," as a means of improving the quality of work in our church schools.

That a greater emphasis be placed on laboratory schools as a means of training church school workers.

That the 1959 Children's Workers' Conference be held March 2-4, 1959.

That the annual Conference Youth Rally be held April 3, 1959.

That the Conference Youth Assembly be held June 2-6, 1959.

That the Young Adult Conference be held June 6-7, 1959.

That the period of January 1 to Easter be a time for emphasis on church school evangelism.

That a conference-wide meeting of adult workers with youth be planned for late summer of 1958.

That a meeting of local church adult leaders be held August 30-31; and that the Senior Adult Conference be held September 2-4.

That the Board of Education cooperate with other boards and agencies in promoting emphasis on Christian education.

That we encourage local churches to continue and expand the plan of planning and conducting local church formal training enterprises, and request that all applications for such programs be in the conference office at least one month before time of the school opening.

That we continue our policy of sending delegations of workers to area and jurisdictional opportunities for training.

That the Board of Education give every possible cooperation in the promotion of the four-year plan emphasis on the Work of the Local Church and Christian Higher Education.

That the summer and fall months provide for conference meetings of age-group workers to plan their program on Christian education.

That the program of Children's Work, Youth Work, Adult Work, formal and informal training, vacation church schools, camps, coaching conferences, literature cultivation, promotion of Wesley Foundation Work, promotion of Hendrix College, and all other general cultivation program in terms of Christian education be continued as in former years.

That no funds be paid to Wesley Foundation centers unless these centers present to Board of Education their list of Foundation Board of Directors for election by the Conference Board of Education; and then the funds be

paid only to the Treasurer of the Board of Directors.

That the North Arkansas Conference reaffirm its purposes concerning Christian Higher Education and that we seek to reach during this quadrennium the goal of \$1.00 per member for Hendrix College and 30c per member for Wesley Foundation Work; and that each local church in the conference

seek to increase its contributions to these programs an amount above the amount paid this past conference year; and that such amounts paid to Wesley Foundation funds become a budgettery matter.

We recommend to the Commission on World Service and Finance that all funds received for Wesley Foundation funds on 30c per member plan be apportioned to the four centers on the same ratio as Conference Benevolences are now apportioned to these centers.

We recommend that a Wesley Foundation Study committee be set up as follows: three members from Commission on Higher Education (Conference), three from Conference Board of Education, and one from each of the four Wesley Foundation Boards of Directors; the three from the Board of Education to be its three members of the Inter-conference committee on Wesley Foundation Work.

The Conference Board of Education has approved the Certification as Ministers of Music of the following persons: Dr. Ashley Roy Coffman, Hendrix College; Miss Sarah Moore Robinson, Hendrix College; and Miss Edna Earle Massey, First Methodist Church, Ft. Smith.

We recommend that the Commission on World Service and Finance approve the plan of permitting Wesley Foundation Center representatives making contact with persons for the purpose of securing funds for permanent building plans. (Wesley Foundations in North Arkansas Conference).

We request the Commission on World Service and Finance for the same apportionment from Conference Benevolences as of the past conference year: for Hendrix College (\$10,400.00); for Wesley Foundation Work (\$9,600.00); for Cultivation (\$15,041.00).

We recommend to Bishop Martin and his Cabinet that Ira A. Brumley be appointed as Executive Secretary of the North Arkansas Conference Board of Education for the conference year of 1958-59.

THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Recommendations for 1958-59

INTRODUCTION:

"How beautiful upon the mountain are the feet of them that bringeth good tidings, that publisheth peace; that bringeth good tidings of good, that publisheth salvation; that saith unto Zion, Thy God reigneth!" Isaiah

The Conference Board of Evangelism is deeply grateful to the Pastors and people who did "Publish glad tidings, tidings of peace; Tidings of Jesus' Redemption and Release" as you told Arkansas About Christ last year.

We would like to publicly thank the Conference Board of Education for following up our program of Tell Arkansas About Christ with "Teach Arkansas About Christ;" The Arkansas Methodist and Methodist Informa-

tion for their support and coverage of our program; The Town and Country Commission for their help in carrying the Good News through the Conference; The Bishop, District Superintendents, Pastors, Laymen, and District Directors of Evangelism for doing so much in support of our program.

As you know we set some goals for our Conference last year. One was a 3% increase in church membership. Our reports show a net gain of 84 in membership. Another goal was the elimination of barren charges and churches. This year we can report 0 barren charges and 97 barren churches. The cultivation of the prayer life of our people was another goal. Each District participated in a Prayer Retreat. This was most helpful. Hearty commendation has come from over the conference.

With this hasty look back we turn anxiously to the suggested program for the new year.

We earnestly request that every Church join in the following suggested program for the coming year, seeking to go forward in growth and in winning persons to Christ and His Church.

- I. THAT LENT 1959 BE OUR "SEASON OF SPECIAL CONCERN." The theme to be: "Tell God's Good News." During this period it is requested that every District and Charge have a special evangelistic emphasis.
 - A. AS PREPARATION FOR THE "CONCERN," we recommend:
 - That during the Summer each District Superintendent conduct a prayer retreat for his Pastors, which will center upon spiritual dedication and evangelistic preparation.
 - That every minister, chairman of each Commission on Evangelism, and leading laymen and lay women attended the two day Conference on Evangelism to be held for the two Arkansas Conferences October 27 and 28 in Little Rock.
 - 3. That January be used for two purposes:
 - (a) The securing of complete prospect lists; and
 - (b) The enlistment of evangelistic workers to serve during the "Concern" period.
 - B. FOR PARTICIPATION IN THE "CONCERN" WE RECOMMEND:
 - 1. That there be a District-wide program of "The week of Dedication and Evangelism,"
 - (a) The week's schedule to include:
 - Begin with Sunday morning sermon by the pastor and service of dedication.
 - (2) "Four Nights for God" beginning on Sunday night and led by visiting pastor.
 - (3) World Day of Prayer, February 13, to be a day of participation in a 24 Hour Prayer Vigil.
 - (b) That the "Four Nights for God" program be held during Lent, "OUR SEASON OF CONCERN."
 - 2. Six Sundays of Evangelistic Preaching, February 8 to March 22. Since most of our people hear preaching on Sunday morning more than at any other time, we feel that each pastor should preach special evangelistic sermons on each Sunday during the "Concern."
 - 3. That every church have Membership classes for children, youth and adults during the period February 8 to March 22. It is suggested that this class for Junior aged children include both members and non-members of the Church.
 - 4. For Conference-wide Promotion of the "Concern" we recommend:
 - (a) That the Conference Board of Evangelism cooperate with the Districts and local churches and give helpful guidance in the program.

- (b) That the "Concern be promoted by the District Committee on Evangelism which should be organized and activated as early as possible following the meeting of the Annual Conference.
- (c) That special Guide-Sheets be produced through the cooperation of the General Board of Evangelism and be followed by the District Committee on Evangelism and the local churches in promoting the "Concern."

2. FOR CONTINUED AND GROWING EFFORTS IN WINNING PERSONS AND DEVELOPING DISCIPLES. WE RECOMMEND:

- A. That each local church set a goal of persons to be won on profession of faith and to achieve a net increase in membership. To do this; "Each pastor win one person a month, each teacher win one person a year, and Chairman of the Commission on Membership and Evangelism win one person a year."
- B. That all Churches should have at least one other period of evangelism in addition to the "Concern" and that many churches have weekly or monthly programs of visitation evangelism.
- C. That each church and pastor remember that the mission of the Church is to win persons to Christ, and therefore constantly cultivate people toward winning them to Him and church membership.
- D. That Prayer Groups and Prayer Cells be encouraged and promoted in each local church and that all efforts be made to increase our effectiveness as a praying church.

3. FOR FURTHER DEVELOPMENT OF EVANGELISM LEADERSHIP, WE RECOMMEND:

- A. That the Chairman of the Conference Board of Evangelism, the Conference Secretary and the District secretaries of Evangelism attend the National Convocation on Local Church Evangelism, July 3-6, 1958, at Washington, D. C., and that \$1,000 be divided toward their expense.
- B. That the North Arkansas Conference join with the Little Rock Conference in promoting a State Conference on Evangelism to be held in Little Rock October 27, 28. This conference to inspire and instruct leaders from each church in evangelistic work.
- C. That each District conduct special schools of instruction for Commission Chairmen and other laymen, for the purpose of training them in the work of Evangelism in the local church.

4. FOR A CONSTANT PROGRAM OF EVANGELISM, WE SUGGEST THESE OTHER CONSIDERATIONS:

- A. That all Youth Camps and Assemblies use their opportunities to: encourage prayer, Bible study, and commitments to Christ.
- B. That Prayer Retreats be carried on by and for the Laymen and Lay Women in each District; also for Youth.
- C. That Districts give consideration to a plan for having special evangelistic efforts in strategic places. To do this there may be a District plan for financing where Laymen would contribute one dollar toward paying a preacher and a singer to go into the situation for the period. This to be done in such a way as to strengthen the church and win persons.
- D. That every church heed the great results from these churches participating in the "Attendance Crusade," and make plans to enter the program January 1st.
- E. That there be a "Family Altar Sunday," emphasizing the value of family worship and the need for daily worship in the home.

BOARD OF HOSPITAL AND HOMES

The World Service and Finance Commission of the North Arkansas Conference has set aside for the Board of Hospital and Homes 9.60 per cent of the sum of \$9,475.00. After paying the salary and expenses of the Booneville Sanatorium Chaplain and Board expenses 58% of the balance will go to the Methodist Hospital in Memphis, and 42% will go to the Methodist Childrens Home in Little Rock.

Qur Conference pays one half of the salary of the Booneville Sanatorium Chaplain, and \$180.00 of the Annual Pension fund and insurance prem-

iums of \$27.00 and \$43.32.

We recommend that \$100.00 be paid to the travel expense of the Chap-

lain of the Booneville Sanatorium.

We recommend that the expenses of the Board Chairman, Conference Director of Golden Cross, and board members remain the same as last year. We ask that the following be recommended as Trustees of the Methodist

Childrens Home, terms to expire in 1961: Lay Members Faber A. White

and R. J. Rice, Clerical-Charles Lewis and Henry Goodloe.

We commend the splendid administration of the Superintendent of the Methodist Childrens Home, Dr. Conner Morehead. Under the direction of Dr. Morehead a new Chapel-Activities building has been added this conference year. While many ministers have given excellent leadership in this office we realize that we have a shortage of ministers for our Churches. We, therefore, entertain the idea that in the future a worthy layman may be found to fill this position.

We appreciate the fine work of our chaplains and recommend that

Gilbert Hyde be re-appointed to the Veterans Hospital in Little Rock, that Bates Sturdy be re-appointed to the Booneville Sanatorium, and that Robert

Simpson be re-appointed to the Veterans Administration.

We ask that Golden Cross Sunday be observed on Mother's Day and that a special offering be taken in every church. If a church does not take the special offering, that a substantial amount be placed in the budget.

We recommend the following as Trustees of the Methodist Hospital: Mrs. Tom Tucker, J. Frank Fogleman, H. K. Barwick, Jr., James H. Crain, Hubert Pearce, and Earle Cravens.

RESOLUTION concerning commitments of all kinds made to the Methodist Hospital Building and Development Fund.

WHEREAS when the Campaign was initiated as a three year program

WHEREAS many commitments have not been paid due to other campaigns and causes,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED — That all commitments made to the Methodist Hospital Building and Development Fund at the time of the

Campaign in 1954 are to remain active until they are collected unless death or some unforeseen financial difficulty prevents the collection of the commitments.

We recommend that a Sunday be set aside as Hospitals and Homes Sunday with a special service if possible and especially to distribute literature on that Sunday and that that Sunday be March 8, 1959.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The concept of the term "Lay Activities," is sometimes narrowed to include only a few of the works which are a part of the total program of Methodism. It is the feeling of the Conference Lay leader that Lay Activities in its fullest sense means nothing less than urging all the men of our Church to become active in all the phases of the Church. There are many talents among Christians, so probably the biggest job of the Lay Activity page in the book of Methodism is to find the talents for which every man is best suited, and to furnish a program of training which will make that man more useful in the growth of the Kingdom. Here are some of the doings that your Board of Lay Activities and your Conference Lay Leader have done in this past conference year to implement such a concept.

Laymen's Workshops and Retreats

During the conference year our laymen have held retreats and workshops in four districts, prayer retreats in three districts, lay speaking clinics in three districts. Interest in this form of spiritual development is growing, as these statistics will prove. These meetings have reached over 350 men. In the new year we should be able to double this figure. Of course the more our men study the work of the Church and of the Kingdom, the more useful laymen they will become in all areas of the Church life.

Methodist Men

Records show that we now have 98 clubs of Methodist Men. Some of these are not very active. We should try to revive all the inactive ones so that they can be useful centers of operation for better training of our men. In several places the clubs are coming together in quarterly mass meetings. These large meetings have been very helpful in promoting better fellowship and more knowledge of our church. Better use of The Layman's Magazine will help the clubs in preparation of the programs.

Laymen's Day

Laymen's Day continues to be observed by nearly 100% of our churches. This is worth much more to the laymen who take part in the program than to those who listen. If we want our laymen to be more useful, it may be necessary for our congregations to be willing to endure some programs which are not as interesting as others. After all, useful lay speakers and Church School teachers are not born. They must have practice, and Laymen's day has one advantage of being a means to help some of our men to become better witnesses for Christ. There are a number of other advantages. A laymen's viewpoint heard in the pulpit at least once a year is always healthy. Laymen's Day certainly should not be a time when the pet compaints of certain men are heard, however. It should be a vital experience for minister, congregation, and speaker in which all find an approach to God through the leadership of a devoted layman.

The Every-Member Canvass

Our men have joined enthusiastically in the emphasis for the Everymember Canvass. Under the leadership of Rev. A. N. Storey, we have achieved successes which many said could not be done. The Conference Lay Leader has spoken strongly in favor of tithing all this conference year whenever he has had an opportunity to speak to any church groups. Let us continue to follow Brother Storey in an effort to bring every Church in the Conference into this fine program of stewardship.

THE CONFERENCE LAY LEADER

The Conference Lay Leader owes a report of his stewardship to the Conference. During this past year I spent nearly three months on an evangelistic mission to the Philippines, during which I had the opportunity to see a great deal of our mission work there as well as in India, Burma, Japan, and Hawaii. The experiences that I had on this trip were of value that I cannot count. I have been brought face to face with the great missionary need of the world, and of the need for us to have a greater appreciation for other nations. While in the Philippines, I had the experience of finding myself totally helpless to minister to the people until I had placed myself completely into God's hands. The gracious results of the work in my own life are more than I can tell. This conference will be interested to know that since my return to the States, I have been privileged to hold five revival meetings, two of which were in this conference. But I have found no new formula. The story of Jesus and His redeeming love has been the burdon of proof that I have offered to the people. A number of people have accepted Christ in these meetings.

My visits during this conference year to Methodist Men, to the Churches, to workshops, to retreats, to missionary institutes, and to meetings with the Women's Societies of Christian Service have totalled 57 in this conference. My Church has used me more than I dared to hope or believe. This field of work which I have chosen to enter is becoming increasingly fascinating and challenging.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Board recommends for the Conference year 1958-1959:

1. At least one Laymen's workshop in every district

2. Ten new clubs of Methodist Men 3. A Lay Speaker's clinic in every area where Lay Speaking is done

4. Continuing emphasis on tithing by all laymen

5. One Hundred per cent observance of Laymen's Day, October 19th

BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS

Report No. 1

Your Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications wishes to thank everyone - the pastors in the various classifications, the District Superintendents, and Bishop Martin - for their cooperation and support in the Board's efforts throughout the year to bring all procedures affecting the qualifications of ministers for admission on trial and in full connection, ordination, and approval of supplies into complete harmony with discip-

linary requirements.

We deeply appreciate and wish to record our sincere gratitude to all who at the request of the Board have agreed to comply with the requirements of Paragraphs 306 and 323 regarding the use of tobacco and other harmful indulgences. Some men, we know, have committed themselves to a course of total abstinence in these matters at considerable difficulty to them-

selves.

On behalf of greater efficiency and a more complete dedication to all that is highest in our Christian ministry. We sincerely and respectfully re-

quest the following:

1. That the Superintendents lead the District Committees on Ministerial Qualifications to exercise fully their responsibilities under the Discipline in preparing all candidates for admission on trial, into full connection, ordination, and for approval as supplies.

2. That the members of the Conference examine afresh their responsibilities to the church, to their brethren in the ministry, and to the larger interests of the Kingdom of God in regard to their obligations under Para-

graphs 306 and 323.

3. We recommend further that the Chairman of the Board arrange with the Cabinet for a joint meeting early in the year of the Board and the Cabinet for the consideration of all matters affecting the qualifications of men for the various ministerial categories.

4. Finally, we recommend that scholarship aid be continued to ministerial students in college beyond the first semester of their freshman year only on the basis of an academic average grade of "C", or better on

a minimum of 12 hours.

Due to the limitations of the available funds, we find it necessary to maintain as our general policy the maximum salary of a pastor of \$3600 for which the board will grant aid, with the provision agreed upon that in a special situation, by a unanimous vote of the Cabinet, as an emergency case deserving special treatment, the ceiling may be raised to \$4200, including travel expenses, as the Board may determine.
- 3. All charges receiving Mission Aid be required to have an Every Member Canvass, and that the report of such a canvass be certified by the district superintendent in writing to the Board of Missions before any action can be taken on their application for Mission appropriation.
- 4. The Board of Missions provide scholarships for the chairmen of the Commission on Mission in the local churches of the Conference to attend the Jurisdictional Workshop on Missions at Mt Sequoyah on the following basis:

Fayetteville District	\$ 5.00
Other Districts	10.00

Local churches will provide the additional expense to the workshop.

- 5. Every charge conduct an Every Member Canvass according to the recommended plan of the Town and Country Commission.
- 6. The District Missionary Secretaries attend the meeting of the Jurisdictional School of Missions on Mt. Sequoyah and urge every Chairman of the local church Commission on Missions to attend the Conference for Chairmen.
- 7. A District Missionary Institute be held in every district in January. An effort will be made to secure a missionary to visit each district.
- 8. The Annual Mission Study be held in every charge and that the District Missionary Secretaries present this to each pastor and commission chairman.
- 9. The cause of missions be continually presented to our people by pastors and district superintendents in order to familiarize them with every phase of the work, world and national.
- 10. Robert E. L. Bearden be appointed Conference Missionary Secretary and Glen F. Sanford be appointed as Superintendent of the Department of Town and Country Work, Division of National Missions of the General Board of Missions,
- 11. It be the policy of the Board of Missions to approve loans from the Local Board for the completing of a building project only.

Report No. 2

CHURCH EXTENSION SECTION

The North Arkansas Conference loan fund is administered by the office of the Division of National Missions of the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church as a regular loan fund. In order to secure a loan from the fund, the applications must be processed through the conference Board and National Board of Missions on the proper forms and according to the rules of the Division of National Missions.

The requests for "donations" to the Church Extension Sections of the Board of Missions exceed the income each year. The needs for Church Extension in our conference cannot be provided through World Service alone.

We recommend that we continue the supplementary program which will provide opportunity for Conference and District Projects through the following "special" program for Church Extension.

1. That the North Arkansas Conference provide for two "new" churches each year during the 1956-60 Quadrennium.

a. That local churches, and organizations of local churches, be given an opportunity to help finance those approved churches by the purchase of \$10 shares helping to meet district quotas.

b. We recommend that quotas to the districts be assigned on the basis of "membership and amount paid pastors," which gives the following base figure to raise \$20,000 in the conference each year in the Quadrennium.

c. All funds raised in excess of one-half of the District Quota in each of the districts may be used for Church Extension "projects" in the bounds of that district.

2. That this program of the Annual Conference be carried through the regular channels of the District programs with each District Superintendent responsible for the program in his own District.

3. That the Board of Missions certify the projects on the basis of the

following:

a. Urgency of need.b. Recognized potential growth

c. Resources of community in which the project is located.

4. The "first" half of the District Quotas be used for the Conference Extension Projects.

5. We recommend that the new Church in Blytheville and the St. Mark's Church in Paragould share equally in the funds received for Church Extension through the "shares program" for the Conference year 1958-59. The new Church in Fayetteville is to receive \$1,000 of the amount designated the conference of the conferen nated for the St. Mark's church in Paragould.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Mrs. Jessie Gilstrap, President

To the women of Methodism has been given a tremendous task, that of "seeking to enlist all the women of the church in Christian living and service" and the "establishment of a world Christian Community."

The North Arkansas Conference, Woman's Society of Christian Service has responded to that challenge in a very fine way but we are not satisfied because we realize that the unmet need is still so very great. When we compare what we have done with what there is to be done, and what we really could do and should do, we feel quite humble as we list our accomplishments. However we are encouraged by the increase in interest in the total program and the increase in giving.

total program and the increase in giving.

We feel that much of the enthusiasm of the women in their dedication to the challenging task of the Woman's Society is due, in a measure to the Mission Study courses, because when we learn of a need we have a concern to do something about it. More than 9000 women were enrolled last year in the more than 500 classes, with 943 women in the Seminars held in all the districts. Our incomplete report reveals that the subscriptions to the "Methodist Woman" were 1,925 and to "World Outlook" were 775. These are our trade journals.

Also the fine workshops, held in every district, resulted in a greater awareness of their responsibilities, on the part of the women, and a greater appreciation of their church and their relationship to it. These workshops on promotion followed the conference workshop which was held in October by the Conference and District officers who had attended the Area Workshop at Aldersgate early in October.

We realize that the source of our inspiration and strength is in the realm of the spirit and that the spiritual enrichment of our lives has resulted from the Prayer Retreats which were held in every district the past year and which are to continue as a part of our program. The use of the Spiritual Life Book Shelf has increased and a greater number of women are participating in the Fellowship of Intercession and in the study of the Bible.

All of the eight district presidents and the Conference Secretaries have sent in reports of outstanding accomplishments. Practically all districts have had Mission Tours, as a result of which, many young people are deciding to enter full time or part-time Christian Service. One district had twelve

young people expressing this desire.

The Conference and many of the districts have scholarships for students

especially interested in full or part-time Christian Service.

The Forrest City District pioneered in a new project this year—the observance of "Laywoman's Day" in which women appeared in the pulpits of 37 churches, giving a message on the Woman's Society and its relationship to the church. The District Superintendent cooperated with the District President and District Secretary of Promotion in working out the plans. In every church where the women spoke, there seemed to follow an increased interest in, and understanding of the work of the Woman's Society, its aims

and purposes, which, of course, was the objective.

This experiment was so successful that we hope and trust, that, with the permission and cooperation of the Bishop, the District Superintendents and the pastors, that this may be made a conference-wide observance this coming year. It will take this kind of working together to reach the goal of being organized 100%, which the Methodist Discipline clearly sets forth on page 108, Sec. IX—"There shall be a Woman's Society of Christian Service in every local church" and "there may be a Wesleyan Service Guild." We wish to emphasize the fact that the goal has been set for us by the Discipline and we are seeking most earnestly to enlist "your help" in trying to reach it. As nearly as we can estimate it there are 125 charges in our conference unorganized.

We are especially proud of and truly thankful for the constructive work in the two rural areas that is being done by our beloved and highly esteemed deaconesses, Miss Mary Chaffin who was transferred to the Madison County project a year ago is working in perfect harmony with the pastor, Rev. J. E. Linam. Miss Iris Bell is continuing in the Imboden area with most gratifying results. Both of these young women have been reassigned to the

North Arkansas Conference by the division Woman's Society.
We have helped promote the "Ministry to Migrants" during this year. This has been done in cooperation with the United Church Women of Arkansas and the National Council of Churches. Special programs for Migrants were carried on at Forrest City, Blytheville and Springdale. Local and district secretaries of Christian Social Relations were responsible for promoting

our part of this program.

For a statistical report I refer you to the Arkansas Methodist and Annual Report of the Woman's Society, but I will give you just a few figures here; we have around 284 societies and some ninety or more Wesleyan Service Guilds. The total membership of the Woman's Society and the Wesleyan Service Guild is approximately 15,000. The pledge to missions was \$58,000.00. The total sent to Division was \$73,113.60 which includes the Supply giving to the work in Home and Foreign Fields, the Week of Prayer and Assembly offerings. A contribution of \$400.00 to the Chaplain's Salary at Booneville and a \$1,000.00 to the Narcotic Education Committee of Arkansas.

During the past year the vision of our women has been broadened by attendance at various district, conference, state, area and national meetings. The most recent one was the Fifth Assembly of the Division Woman's Society of Christian Service held in St. Louis the first week in May at which 89 of our North Arkansas women were in attendance, 41 from the Woman's Society and 48 from the Guild, also one youth delegate. In addition to the Assembly, the Conference President also attended the South Central Jurisdiction meeting and the Wesleyan Service Guild week end in St. Louis. Other

important meetings attended by officers and conference secretaries of lines of work were, the World Federation of Methodist Women in Junaluska last summer, the National Conference on Spiritual Life at the Upper Room in Nashville, the meeting for Secretaries of Literature and Publications held at Literature Headquarters in Cincinnatti, the Rural Workers Conference at Scarritt College, the Jurisdiction School of Missions at Mt. Sequoyah and our Conference School of Missions at Hendrix College, and the State Conference of Secretaries of Student Work and Representatives of the Wesley Foundations of state Colleges held at the University of Arkansas.

I mention the above meetings merely to show something of the scope of our work. We realize that this is God's world and we are His children and we take quite seriously the statement that Jesus made—"Ye are my

You will recall that it was to a woman that Jesus first revealed himself as the Messiah (the woman of Samaria) and it was to a woman that He first revealed himself as the Risen Christ (Mary Magdalene) and He said to her "Go tell the others." We still feel the urgency of that commission and are dedicating our lives to that purpose until all shall declare Him "King of Kings and Lord of Lords."

BOARD OF PENSIONS

Report No. 4

I. RESPONSIBILITY

A. The responsibility of the Conference Board of Pensions is defined in the 1956 Discipline, Paragraph 1611, Section 1, as follows:

"The Conference Board of Pensions . . . shall have charge of the interests and work of providing for the support of its conference claimants, except as otherwise provided for by the general board."

II. NEEDS

- A. The North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions considers it its responsibility to present a pension program which will take into consideration both the immediate and long-range needs of the conference claimants and of the conference itself.
- B. The present pension program is inadequate in relation to our retired ministers. In the last year sixty-three (63) retired ministers in our conference received an average pension of nine-hundred and fifty-seven dollars (\$957). The amount will fluctuate, depending upon the amount of money available and the number of annuity years responsibility.
- C. The present pension program is inadequate in relation to the ministers who will retire in the future. Our present program does not recognize need but is based entirely on length of service. The pension program for the minister who becomes physically disabled, or for the widow and dependent children of the minister whose death comes prematurely, is wholly inadequate.
- D. The present pension program is inadequate in relation to the future ministerial members of the conference. When young men enter the service of other major denominations (such as the Baptist, Presbyterian, Episcopal, and of the Y.M.C.A.) a modern acturial reserve pension program is provided.

- A. The long-range pension program which the Conference Board of Pensions will propose includes provision for:
 - 1. An increase in the annuity rate for the conference claimants.
- 2. The entering into the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund program of all ministers being received in the conference on trial and in full connection beginning with the conference session, 1960.
- 3. A long-range program for the complete transition to the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund program of all ministers of the conference.
- B. In order to achieve this goal the Conference Board of Pensions presents the following program for study with the findings to be acted upon at the 1959 session of the Annual Conference.
- 1. That there be a conference-wide campaign to secure the net amount of five-hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) during the conference years 1960-1961, 1961-1962, 1962-1963.
- 2. That the first two-hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) of this amount be allocated as an initial reserve to be used to enter the new entrants of this conference into the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund beginning with the conference session of 1960.
- 3. That three-hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000) of this amount be designated as an endowment fund, the income from which shall be used for current distribution to the conference claimants as part of the annuity rate to be determined from year to year.
- 4. That the annual conference approve a long-range program of completing the full transition to the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund for all ministers of the conference, and, that at that time the aforesaid threehundred thousand dollars (\$300,000) be made available to achieve this goal.

IV. CONCLUSION: SUMMARY

A. The Conference Board of Pensions believes that the program herewith presented will achieve the goals set forth; namely, the increasing of the pensions for the conference claimants, the adopting of a modern pension program for ministers being admitted after 1960, and, eventually, the bringing of all ministers of the conference into a modern and adequate pension system.

BOARD OF SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RELATIONS

We, the Board of Social and Economic Relations, urge our people to study and strive to put into practice the Christian teachings found in the Social Creed of our Church. We encourage our Churches to observe Christian Social Relations Sunday, and our pastors to preach on the Social

We urge and pray that our Church will give a Christian emphasis to equal political freedom to vote; that we cultivate a fuller sense of responsibility on the part of all citizens; that equal opportunity to work and equal pay be given to all who share a similar responsibility.

We are reminded that Christ was not a Methodist by blood, heritage, wealth, or social prominance. We do not believe that Methodists can become Christians by blood, heritage, wealth, or social prominence.

We believe that the souls of many Christians in Arkansas are in peril because of mental thought and attitudes that are shackled by fear and hate. True Christian love and brotherhood for all people of every rank and station and lineage can be brought about only by the teaching of Jesus' principles.

The greatest social concern and one of the greatest moral dilemmas facing the people of North Arkansas today is in the area of race relations and especially as related to our public schools. Sincere Christians in our state are experiencing intense inner conflict between their cherished customs on onehand and their Christian convictions on the other. Extremists on either side may have fenced in their attitudes with closed minds, but hundreds of thousands of our citizens, within and without the church, are earnestly seeking a Christian answer and looking to the church for clear and effective moral leadership.

Our ministry as individuals and as a church in this hour can be to hold ever before our people a high ideal, while recognizing that the practical working out of that ideal cannot be done overnight but will require

time, patience, understanding, and even at times compromise.

Therefore, we reaffirm the conviction expressed by this conference four years ago, that the decisions of the United States Supreme Court in this area are a reflection of the highest ideals of our Christian faith. Removing barriers of discrimination is not only technically the law of the land, but ethically and morally right. This is not to minimize the diffi-culties in achieving this ideal in many communities where traditions are strong and of longstanding. But the greatness of our problem is an indication of the greatness of our opportunity to give our disturbed people an effective Christian witness in a spirit of love and understanding.

Recognizing that people will become no greater than the leaders whom

they follow, we recommend:

1. That the ministers and leaders of Methodist churches and institutions use every opportunity within their institutions and communities to teach and preach and practice Christian love and brotherhood for:

a. Individuals of every rank whether they be rich or poor, manager

or laborer,

Individuals of the highest to the lowest social position,

Individuals of every lineage and heritage, and

The outcast and downtrodden delinquents of youth and adulthood. That we broaden our horizons to include within our responsibility every unchurched individual in North Arkansas.

3. "We recommend to the ministers and the churches of the North Arkansas Conference that an observance of Traffic Safety Sunday or Traffic Safety Week be planned for the purpose of encouraging our people to obey all traffic regulations for the protection of human life and property.

BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

We, the Board of Temperance submit the following report:

We commend all who are giving active support to the battle against the evil forces of alcoholic beverages and other narcotics.

We are grateful for the increased interest in the Essay Contest among our young people. The study and research put into these papers cannot help but produce advocates for abstinence among those who have entered the contest. For the first time all Districts are represented in the contest winners. A total of eighteen District awards were made. The three Conference winners are, 1st Place—Francis Brinkley—Whitton Church, Jonesboro District—2nd Place winner—Beth Martindale Love Methodist Church, North Little Rock, Conway District—3rd Place winner—Mary Murphy, 1st Methodist Church Batesville. We express our appreciation to the pastors and District Directors for their help in promoting the contest and request their continued support.

We make the following recommendations:

1. That pastors and local Temperance Committees promote the cause of Temperance by making full use of the materials provided by our General Board.

That Commitment Day, the first Sunday in December, be observed in every church. And that materials be ordered early with full preparations made for the day, giving every member an opportunity to sign a commitment card.

That pastors cooperate where possible with Alcholic Anonymous

Clubs in reclaiming the alcholics in the community.

That the churches cooperate with the Women's Temperance Union and the Arkansas Temperance League and we also recommend that the churches of the North Arkansas Conference put an amount equal to at least one-half of one per cent of the pastor's salary in the local church budget for the support of the Arkansas Temperance League.

That the Conference Board be atuhorized to continue the plans for the Annual Essay Contest on a temperance theme, and that awards be given our youth on district and conference levels.

That the Conference authorize the following budget for 1958-59 and that the percentage be continued at 1.50%.

BOARD OF WORLD PEACE

I. ACTIVITIES

The following are among the programs and activities sponsored by our Conference Board on World Peace during this Conference Year:

Nine delegates attended a United Nations Seminar in New York City. Two of these were College Students — one from Hendrix College, Miss Marilyn Duro, and one from Jonesboro State College — Mr. Willard Womack. Assistance was also given to Harold Wells, Director of the Wesley Foundation at First Church, Conway and to two students at the Wesley Foundation at First Church, Russellville. These three students were sponsored by the Board of Christian Education and attended MYF UN Seminars in New York. Therefore our Conference Board had a part in sending twelve people to New York City to UN Seminars sponsored by the General Board of World Peace of the Methodist Church and the Board of Christian Education.

Eleven Conferences of the South Central Jurisdiction were represented at the January 20 to 24 Seminar in New York. The North Arkansas Conference was second in the number attending. The Board is proud of this and feels that this has been a good investment of its funds for the Cause of World Peace. These people are speaking in churches and before civic clubs on the new insights gained at the UN Seminars.

The Board Chairman in cooperation with Dr. Richard E. Yates and the Peace team of Hendrix College sponsored an Essay Contest on the theme "How Can World Peace be Assured." Dr. Yates was in charge of this contest and the Peace award was given to Paul Han, Korean Student at Hendrix College.

A Peace Forum was held in the First Methodist Church of Batesville, April 9 with Herman Will Jr. of the Staff of the General Board of World Peace as the Principal speaker. Echoes were also given by some of those who attended the UN Seminar.

World Peace was also presented at some of the District Conferences. We are grateful to the Bishop and the District Superintendents for their fine interest in World Peace.

II. OBJECTIVES

On the whole the Conference Board plans to continue the program that is already under way. We want to send delegates to UN Seminars and also assist students where possible to UN Seminars where topics connected with World Peace will be discussed. We will also spend some money on general Peace Education and promotion in the Conference. A case in point is the South Central Jurisdictional Conference on Christian Social Concerns which will be held at Mt. Sequoyah, Fayetteville, July 8 to 11. The General Board of World Peace is a co-sponsor of this conference.

III. BOARD POSITION

We believe that the United Nations is the best political hope for World Peace. We also believe that the Christian Church has a definite responsibility for maintaining the peace and order of the World.

The UN should be strengthened. It needs more muscle to carry out its peaceful purpose and to strengthen its prestige in carrying out a program that will serve as a foundation for a just and lasting peace.

We believe that more attention should be given to the problem of controlling nuclear power and the missiles and rockets of outer space. These forces which have been placed in the hands of modern man need to be transformed to peaceful purposes if civilization is to survive. Here again the church has a challenge and a definite responsibility. The problem of peace and war can not be left to governments alone. They are of such magnitude and significance as to require the interest and cooperation of all peace loving peoples. Toward this great issue the church can not be indifferent if it wishes to be truly Christian.

The church must also be interested in bringing about those social, moral and economic conditions that make for peace and good will. World peace is not possible as long as many men are still in chains, as long as millions are on the verge of starvation, as long as millions are deprived of opportunities because of race hatred or other forms of oppression. The Christian Conscience stands for freedom and justice.

We commend the Conference Youth Council and the Conference Board of Education for using the theme of "International Relations" for their Conference Youth Rally. Members of the Board of World Peace who at-

tended UN Seminars assisted in the program.

COMMITTEE ON GROUP INSURANCE

Report No. One

1. Every member of the North Arkansas Conference, except students serving appointments in conferences which themselves have compulsory insurance programs, every approved supply receiving an appointment, and every fulltime lay employee of the North Arkansas Conference shall participate in the North Arkansas Conference Group Life Insurance Plan, subject to its laws and regulations.

-in

2. Annual premiums shall be paid by charges and participants at the premium rate of 50 cents per thousand per month for participants and 75 cents per thousand per month for charges:

a. ANNUAL PAYMENTS

Pastors receiving less than \$1,000 salary Charges paying less than \$1,000 salary	
Pastors receiving \$1,001-3,000	
Charges paying \$1,001-3,000	\$18.00 *
Pastors receiving \$3,001 and up	\$27.00

3. Annual premiums shall be paid by participants and charges and be collected through district organizations.

4. District treasurers of the fund shall send the district reports and premiums to the Conference Treasurer by February 1, 1959.

5. No man who retired before February 18, 1948, even though he has

served as a supply since, shall be eligible for insurance.

6. Members of the conference who retire will have \$1,000 insurance carried for them with the premiums paid by the North Arkansas Conference Group Insurance Fund.

7. Approved supplies whose annuity claims are approved by the conference will have \$1,000 carried for them with the premium paid by the

North Arkansas Conference Insurance Group.

8. Members of the North Arkansas Conference who are left without appointment to attend school, who do not serve a charge, shall carry \$1,000 insurance and pay the annual premium of \$6.00 and the North Arkansas Conference Group Insurance Plan will pay the remaining \$9.00.

9. Those who are not now participating in our Group Insurance Plan who will be participating under the provisions of this report shall pay 2/3

of the annual premium according to the above schedule by July 1, 1958. 10. Other matters concerning the Group Life Insurance program, the

amount of insurance in force, balance in insurance account, and amount of current dividend, if any, will be reported at the conference session.

11. The committee deeply appreciates the splendid manner in which pastors and local churches responded in establishing the conference Group Hospitalization program during the past year. It is not possible at this time to determine what the recommendations will be for 1958-59 as the insurance year does not end until June 15. A full report, amount of insurance in force, and premium rates for 1958-59 will be announced at the annual conference session.

12. Members of the conference who retire at the 1958 session or later will have the conference hospitalization policy carried for them with premiums paid by the North Arkansas Conference Group Insurance Fund.

Report No. Two

At the 1957 Session of this Conference, we entered into a contract for hospitalization insurance coverage for pastors, their dependents and other employees of the Conference and local churches who desired coverage. During the year 254 policies have been in force. We have paid in premiums \$22,092.00.

We want to express our appreciation to Mutual of New York and their representatives Mr. Joe Thompson, Mr. Philip English, and Mr. Percy Goyne, for their interest and co-operation in this hospital insurance program. We appreciate the support and diligent work of our Bishop, the District Superintendents, and the District Treasurers in this program.

Because of the high claim experience of the past year, our insurance carrier has found it necessary to substantially increase our annual premium in order to continue our insurance coverage. After consultation with the Minimum Salary Commission, your committee recommends that we set aside \$3,000 from the Minimum Salary Reserve and an equal amount from the insurance reserve to subsidize part of the premium increase. With this subsidization, there remains a 15% increase over last year's rate. This increase must be borne by the policy holders and the local churches.

We recommend that our contract be continued with Mutual of New York according to the schedule as outlined.

The annual premiums are due and payable June 15, and all funds must be remitted by the District Treasurers to Mr. Cooley by July 10.

FRANK MOTT SWEET

Rev. Frank Mott Sweet passed to his Heavenly home on May 7 at the rich age of eighty two years. He was born in Arlington, Tenn., the son of Dr. Fred T. and Belle G. Sweet. Early in youth he joined the Methodist Church. He was a member of the Masonic Chapter No. 588 of Manila.

As a young man Rev. Sweet went to Oklahoma and was engaged in the mercantile business. Here he met and married Miss Bessie Mildred Cowan of Manila November 14, 1911. To this union was born one child, Frank Mott Sweet, Jr.

In 1914 he answered the call to the ministry and became a member of the West Oklahoma Conference and was ordained Elder in 1918. He transfered to the North Arkansas Conference in 1920 and along with his gracious wife, who was always in the background giving of herself as well as he, served the following charges: Manila, Dell, Vandale, West Memphis, Hulbert, Luxora, Monette, Black Oak and Blytheville.

He was appointed District Missionary for the Jonesboro District in 1940 and organized churches at Riverdale, Weona, Harrisburg Corner, Poplar Corner, Sunnyland and Center View. He served five years as Missionary rounding out 39 years of service to the church. During his ministry he built eight churches and three parsonages. This was not always easy, during the depression Mr. Sweet was building a church at Vandale and he pledged \$100.00 on it. He worked this amount out at 25c per hour excavating the basement of the church. He married 3,000 couples and preached many more funerals.

It was nothing for him to walk ten miles in the country visiting the sick and needy, he loved little children and always carried candy and gum in his pockets for them, he loved his fellowman, he walked the plowed fields with them, no night was too dark for him to answer the call of the needy, he visited in their homes, he was as much at ease in the home of the wealthy and the great, but always where ever he went, just before leaving he would raise his hand and say, "Let us have a word of prayer." Although he retired from the ministry he never retired from the hearts of those who loved him. After his retirement he spent his days at his home in Manila, visiting the aged, the shutins, the hospitals and all who needed him.

In summing up the life of Bro. Sweet we found this little poem by Guy Simmons, which seemed to fit him well.

Many Many years ago, Bro Sweet came our way, to preach the gospel in our town, Lest some of us should stray.

Right off we knew that he was one, who loved his fellow man; And

soon he'd won the hearts of all, who paused to shake his hand.

Although the years dimmed his eyes, and slowed his measured pace,
And father time with sculptural touch, had etched lines in his face.

He was still the friend of all mankind, both saints and sinners too,

And baptist loved him just as well as Brother Methodist do.

And though he preached the gospel truths, within the Methodist Wall, No church can claim him for its own, For he belonged to all!

Albert Gatlin, District Superintendent of the Paragould District officiating assisted by Rev. Clyde Crozier, pastor at Manila, Rev. E. J. Holifield, Jonesboro District Superintendent, and Rev. E. H. Hall of Dell. Rev. Gatlin used as his text, 11 Samuel 3:38, "And the King said unto his servant, know ye not that a prince and a great man has fallen this day in Israel." Mrs. W. E. Lawhorn sang "The Ninety and Nine," which well depicted the life of Rev. SESSIONS OF THE CONFERENCE

The "Arkansas Conference" and the "White River Conference" were united in 1914 to form the present "North Arkansas Conference."

The Conference determined that its annual notation should date from the time of the organization of the Arkansas Conference in 1836, instead of following the date fixed by the consolidation of the Arkansas and White River Conferences, when the name was changed to North Arkansas Conference in 1914.

The Conference session of 1939 voted to maintain the numerical notation of the Conference in The Methodist Church.

STANDING RULES OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

- (1) That each undergraduate, each approved supply pastor, and each candidate for conference membership be required to meet with the Board of Ministerial Training before or during the session of the annual conference unless hindered by circumstances beyond his control.
- (2) That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one member from each church in each Pastoral Charge; provided further, that each station charge shall have three elected members.
- (3) That the figures answering the question the pastor's report to Annual Conference: "Members reported last year" shall in every case be the number of members printed in the statistical tables of the Journal of the last Annual Conference.
- (4) That the District Superintendent's figures of all apportionments be accepted as the official figures.
- (5) That the apportionment for Conference and General Work be combined in the statistical report: and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.
- (6) All statistical reports shall be delivered by the district superintendents to the conference statistician seven days before the opening session of the Annual Conference, and all settlements shall be made with the Conference Treasurer by June 1st.
- (7) When a member of this Conference becomes a member of the Bishop's cabinet he shall automatically become ineligible to serve on any quadrennial board, committee, commission, or an officer in the Conference administration, except members specifically designated by the Discipline.
- (8) That the Secretary of the Bishop's cabinet be instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or District Superintendent's District for insertion in the Conference Journal.
- (9) That all members of the conference who attend the annual session shall pay the host church two dollars registration fee, with the following exceptions: 1) Men from minimum salary charges shall pay one dollar; 2) Retired men and supernumeraries shall pay no registration fee. The offerings in the public worship services shall go to the host church, and the honorarium from the conference preacher shall be paid from the conference expense fund.
- (10) At all sessions of the Annual Conference entertainment provided by the host church shall consist of bed and breakfast, except for superannuates, for whom full entertainment shall be provided.
- (11) Every board, commission, and committee receiving any money from conference funds shall present to the Commission on World Service and Finance annually by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference a detailed financial report including all receipts and expenditures.
- (12) The list of lay members elected to Annual Conference shall be compiled by the district superintendents and sent to the host church and to the conference secretary thirty days before the opening of the Annual Conference.
- (13) The District Stewards shall apportion the askings for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and for General Administration Fund, and Jurisdictional Expense, to the several charges in each district on an equitable basis.
- (14) The conference treasurer shall close his books for the Conference Year seven days before the opening of the annual conference, and shall distribute to the several boards and commissions the moneys to which they are entitled by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference, and each board and commission receiving money from conference funds shall close its books on the opening day of annual conference.
- (15) No one shall be nominated for re-election to a board or commission on which he has served more than a quadrennium immediately preceding his election.
- (16) The secretary of the Board of Conference Claimants shall be a member of the secretarial staff of the conference and this person shall be charged with the responsibility of seeing that all records pertaining to service years be made identical.
- (17) Any proposal to change the Standing Rules shall lie on the table overnight, and then its passage shall require a $\frac{9}{4}$ vote of those present and voting.
- (18) That part of the report of all boards, commissions, committees and other agencies of the conference which provides for changes in policy or makes recommendations shall be mimeographed, printed, or otherwise duplicated and distributed to the membership of the conference prior to the time scheduled for action on said report.
- (19) All churches employing more than one member of an annual conference shall pay all percentages based on pastor's salary on the salaries of all ministers so employed.
