



First Day—Morning Session
June 9, 1959

MEMORIAL TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE

We recommend the following memorial to General Conference:

We recommend that Para. 439 of the 1956 DISCIPLINE be amended to

read as follows:

"Each jurisdiction having 500.000 church members or less shall be entitled to four bishops, and for each additional 500,00 church members or two thirds thereof shall be entitled to one additional bishop, provided however, that in those jurisdictions where this requirement would result in there being an average of more than 70,000 square miles per episcopal area, such jurisdiction shall be entitled to four bishops for the first 400,000 church members or less, and for each additional 400,000 church members or two thirds thereof shall be entitled to one additional bishop; and provided, further, that in those jurisdictions where this requirement would result in there being an average of more than 90,000 square miles per episcopal area, such jurisdictions shall be entitled to five bishops for the first 400,000 church members and for each additional 400,000 church members or two thirds thereof shall be entitled to one additional bishop; and provided, still, further, that the General Conference may authorize any Jurisdictional Conference to elect one or more bishops beyond the quota herein specified in order to provide episcopal supervision for mission fields outside the territory of a jurisdictional conference."

Amend the 1956 Discipline of the Methodist Church by adding to paragraph 2005 (3) the following words: "and is hereby authorized according to the provisions of paragraph 8 (4) and paragraph 439 to have one bishop in addition to its membership quota in order to provide for this supervision so that amended paragraph 2005 (3) would read:

"The South Central Jurisdictional Conference shall provide for episcopal visitation to the Latin America Central Conference and to the affiliated autonomous churches in Latin America, and is hereby authorized according to the provisions of paragraph 8 (4) and paragraph 439 to have one bishop in addition to its membership quota in order to provide for this supervision."

That ministers and secretaries of youth work make themselves available

to their youth for counseling on vocation problems.

That each pastor be asked to provide the Commission on Christian Vocations a list of persons in his charge who have made commitments for church-related vocations. Forms will be provided for such reports.

A STATE-WIDE PROGRAM WHEREBY THE METHODIST CHURCH IN ARKANSAS MAY CARRY ON A MORE EFFECTIVE MINISTRY TO ALL METHODIST STUDENTS

In order to accomplish this purpose, the following program shall be set up for the next four conference years. In the conference year, 1959-60, we re-double our efforts to secure \$1.00 per member for Hendrix College and \$.30 per member for Wesley Foundation. It is understood these amounts are district quotas to be divided among individual churches as a permanent program insuring operating funds for Hendrix College and Wesley Foundation. The conference years, 1960-1961, 1961-1962, and 1962-1963 shall be designated as a period to secure capital funds for the purchase or construction of student centers on state campuses where 4,000 Methodist students are now enrolled in college.

1. A Steering Committee, composed of the following members from

each Conference shall direct the Campaign:

The Bishop
Chairman and Secretary of each Cabinet
Executive Secretary and Chairman of Board of Education
Conference Lay Leader
President of Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service
President and Vice-President of Commission on Higher Education
Two MSM Directors from each Conference
President of State Methodist Student Movement
State Director of Methodist Student Movement

2. The following Wesley Foundation Buildings are designated as the Buildings to be included in this Campaign. The amounts shown are the designated amounts for each building project:

3. Each District, where a project is located, may keep within the District all funds raised for use on the project, except where the District quota is greater than the designated cost of the project.

4. Each conference shall maintain a separate treasurer for these funds:

each Conference remitting its fund to its own treasurer.

- 5. Funds raised each year shall be sent to the proper treasurer and dispersed at the close of the Annual Conferences and dispersed according to the Chart.
- 6. Designated projects shall receive aid from these funds only at yearly intervals; at the close of the Annual Confernces of 1961, 1962, and 1963, except from the District in which the project is located, or in cases where commitments are now made.
- 7. A project to receive aid from these funds shall meet the following condition: 1) The District in which the project is located must reach one third of its quota in cash, yearly. 2) must have found a suitable location available for donation, purchase, or long-term lease.
- 8. If at the end of the Campaign, a project has not qualified for aid from these funds because the District in which the project is located did not reach its quota, then that District may keep all its funds for said project and continue to raise funds for its construction without aid from these funds.
- 9. A chart in the Report of the Commission on World Service and Finance, showing the quotas for each District and designating the amount for each project, shall be the basis on which funds are solicited and distributed, provided the District Superintendents shall have the privilege of making any adjustments of quotas upon which they may agree; but, in the event of no such agreement, the quotas set by the Chart shall prevail.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARY

We recommend that pastors and churches become eligible to receive Minimum Salary aid by meeting the following requirements:

1. Submit a budget planned by the Commission on Stewardship and Finance, and adopted by the Official Board, to the District Superintendent, and the Commission on Minimum Salary.

2. Conduct approved every-member canvass, using the procedure planned by the General Board of Lay Activities and adopted by the North Arkansas Conference.

3. Submit copies of the "Application for Minimum Salary Assistance" to the District Superintendent and the Commission on Minimum Salary.

4. Minimum Salary Charges must be composed of at least three churches. Stations and two-point circuits are not eligible to receive Minimum Salary Aid.

5. Charges seek to become self-supporting by increasing their support to the pastor by not less than \$100.00 per year.

6. Minimum Salary charges shall be grouped as follows:

7. No pastor is eligible to receive Minimum Salary aid until he and the charge which he serves pay the designated percentages.

(a) All pastors and charges shall pay into the Minimum Salary Fund according to the following schedule:

- (b) Charges will pay the required percentage on the basis of the actual salary paid the pastor by the charge.
- (c) Pastors will pay the required percentage on the basis of the total of salary from the charge plus Minimum Salary Fund payments plus Board of Missions payments.

Pastors will not pay percentage on Pastor's expense Fund or (1)Pension annuities.

(d) The Conference Treasurer shall present a mimeographed report (to the session of the Annual Conference) showing the payments the ministers of the conference have made to this fund.

8. Payment will be made from the Minimum Salary Fund according to the following schedule:

TELEVISION, RADIO, AND FILM COMMISSION

The big emphasis in religious programming in television this year is "Talk Back." This program is a series of 13 everyday problems common to all of us and presented by a 12 minute filmed story, followed up by a panel discussion of how our Christian faith can help us solve the problems.

This series has been shown recently over the Ft. Smith television station

and we hope that next year at conference time we can report that it has been presented to the viewing audiences of the Little Rock stations. When this program is available in your area you will find it well worth your view-

ing as a family or individual.
Your North Arkansas Conference TRAFCO plans to purchase copies of "Talk Back" this fall and train district personnel in presenting this as a pro-

gram in each local church that will use it.

We are interested in what Methodist families in our conference are viewing on their television screens. In view of this interest we hope and pray that each family will be selective in their choice of programs. We want you to use the television and radio as constructive tools in the building of your lives. There are programs that make this impossible when they are viewed in our homes.

REPORT OF THE TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

1. This year, as in the past three years, the Executive Secretary has given much time to the Simultaneous Every Member Canvass. Dr. Edwin Briggs of the General Board of Lay Activities was invited and came to our Conference for a series of meetings emphasizing a month of Stewardship emphasis. This called for preaching on Stewardship for one month and a program of Stewardship reading and Education.

A good number of our pastors and Churches followed this program

with excellent results.

The Executive Secretary participated in the Inter board Schools of Instruction in each of the Districts. In these meetings he had excellent contacts with the representatives of the Commissions on Stewardship and Fin-Attendance was superior in both these series of meetings.

Our total gain in money raised for all causes in the Conference reflects the efforts and fine work done by District Superintendents, Pastors and local church officials. We believe that the Every Member Canvass had much to do with the increase along all lines of church finance.

- 2. We held a number of Workshops during the year.
- A. A Workshop for District Superintendents and Pastors serving Enlarged Charges was held at Batesville. Five District Superintendents and twenty-five pastors attended. These were pastors serving enlarged charges.
- 3. The Executive Secretary worked with the Minimum Salary charges that had not qualified for Minimum Salary and thus enabled all charges to meet the requirements for drawing Minimum Salary Benefits. This was done as fast as possible after the Annual Conference last year. Many of our Minimum Salary charges are responding to the Every Member Canvass in an excellent way. This helps these charges to carry our a good financial program. In fact the small churches may have as good an every member Canvass as any large church.
- 4. The Executive Secretary has worked with new churches and older churches on their building and remodeling programs. This as all of our work, has been on request of District Superintendent and pastors.

We recommend for the coming year that Workshops for the following groups be held.

- 1. Pastors serving their first and second year in the pastorate.
- 2. Pastors, District Superintendents and laymen dealing with the enlarged charges and their programs.
- 3. District Superintendents, Pastors and Laymen in town and cities where new Churches have been established and where new Churches are needed,
- We recommend that a technique be developed for dealing with very small and struggling churches that face the possibility of closing. We recommend that on invitation of District Superintendents and Pastors and local Church leaders that the Executive Secretary assist in conducting surveys and making a study on the ground with the local people; that no church be closed until proper study be made and all means used to meet the needs of the local situation.

If the membership can best be served by some consolidation that then an effort be made to assist the local people in finding a solution.

Let us keep in mind that our major responsibility is to serve in the best possible way the spiritual needs of people of each community.

We believe that in some situations some change in program is inevitable.

5. We recommend that we continue to cooperate with the University of Arkansas and the State Council of Churches in sponsoring the Town and Country Seminar.

This seminar will be held on the Campus of the University of Arkansas February 16 to 19, 1960.

The North Arkansas Conference had twenty-nine men attending last

year. This was the largest group attending.

We appreciate the assistance given by a number of our larger churches in providing scholarships for our pastors to attend.

6. This is the year for our National Town and Country Convocation.

This meeting will be held at Wichita, Kan., July 21-24. Plans are being made for a car load from each District to attend. We urge that these plans be completed as soon as possible and that the names of those persons attending be given to Rev. E. J. Holifield at the earliest possible date.

7. We recommend the following Budget for the coming year:

WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE COMMISSION

A. INTRODUCTORY STATEMENT:

Your Commission on World Service and Finance of the North Arkansas Conference has met, or corresponded, with Representatives of all the Boards, Commissions and Agencies of the Annual Conference and in seeking to cooperate with ALL in the on-going of Christ's work in the churches of the Conference we respectfully submit for your approval the following recommendations for the Conference year of 1959-1960.

GENERAL ITEMS:

1. The Conference Treasurer, Mr. P. E. Cooley (P. O. Box 26, Blytheville, Arkansas) is bonded in the amount of \$125,000.00.

(1) The Conference Treasurer's office shall receive and disburse the following funds in compliance with the directives of the Annual Conference; World Service, Episcopal Fund, District Superintendents, Fund, Concret Lynindistrict Interdents of the Control Lynindistrict Interdents Superintendents Fund, General-Jurisdictional-Interdenominational Co-operation-State Council of Churches and Television Ministry (designated as GJ&I Fund in Treasurer's Report), Wesley Foundation Fund, Minimum Salary Fund, Golden Cross Fund, Methodist Youth Fund, Race Relations Offering, World-Wide Communion Offering, Advance Specials, Week of Dedication, Methodist Student Day Fund, Methodist Hospital Building Fund, Church Extension Shares (1000 Club), Arkansas Christian Civic Foundation, Inc. Fund, and any other fund or funds which may be specifically directed by the Annual Conference or the World Service and Finance Commission.

The depositories for all Funds are to be included in the (2)Treasurer's report to the Annual Conference.

The salary of the Conference Treasurer shall be \$4500.00

annually. The Treasurer of the Annual Conference shall deduct the amount of 2.7% from all funds handled by his office, with the exception of the funds for Conference Expense Fund.

The Conference Statistician shall pay the Auditors expenses from the amount allocated.

That the Conference Statistician's recommendations as to the reporting of items to the Annual Conference be followed unless otherwise directed by the President of the Annual

Conference.

The World Service and Finance Commission wishes to recognize the great improvement that has been made over the past few years in the keeping and reporting of statistical records by the Pastors of the Annual Conference and respectfully request that this fine spirit of co-operation on the part of of the District Superintendents and Pastors be continued that our Conference shall meet all Disciplinary requirements and shall fully co-operate with the recommendations of The General Statistician's office.

We recognize the splendid work of the Conference Statistician, The Reverend Harold Womack, in preparing and reporting the statistical items of the Annual Conference. The Commission, on behalf of the Conference, expresses its sincere

appreciation.

The Salaries and other expenses of the Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Education and the Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission shall be included in the financial reports of their Board and Commission in compliance with para-

graph 812 of the 1956 Discipline.

All Boards and Agencies receiving support from the Conference Benevolence program are respectfully requested to file copies of their financial expenditures for the past Conference year and proposed budgets for the new Conference year with the Secretary of the World Service and Finance Commission in compliance with paragraph 793 of the 1956 Discipline.

That increased support be given to the program of Christian Education within our Conference through the observance of Church School Rally Day, with an offering to be taken in every Church and this offering be sent to the office of the Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Education, Hendrix College, Conway, Arkansas.

4. That the recommendations of the Commission on Minimum Salary as contained in their report to the Annual Conference be accepted as the basis for the Minimum Salary program of the Annual

Conference.

That the North Arkansas Conference continue to recognize the Disciplinary rights of the Pastoral Charges to pay Pastors on Pastor's expenses incurred in his work in accord with Paragraph 829 of the 1956 Discipline. 9. That the Annual Conference approve the program of a maximum of \$4,000.00 to the support of the newly created organization known as The Arkansas Christian Civic Foundation, Inc. This amount to be raised within the bounds of the Annual Conference through a special day offering, placed in the budget of the local church, or by special gifts. And that the amount of \$500.00 as allocated to the Arkansas Christian Civic Foundation, Inc. by the Conference Board of Temperance be included as a part of the maximum total of \$4,000.00 asked of the Annual Conference as a special contribution to this organization. The apportionment to the districts shall be as follows and each district will choose its own procedure for the raising of these funds within the district:

- 18. This report is made in compliance with the outline and suggestions as contained in the MANUAL ON FINANCE FOR THE METHOD-IST CHURCH 1956-1960 QUADRENNIUM.

We would repeat that statement previously made that "The Board of Christian Literature of the North Arkansas Conference is related in a recommendatory-way but not in a specifically-defined-way" to the work of the Conference and the Worldwide Church. The Discipline of 1956, Paragraph 651, Section 4, subsection "w" allows "optional commissions and committees"

(and/or boards) but specific duties are not defined.

Our Board, according to the information and records available, was created chiefly for the promotion and cultivation of the Conference Paper, now THE ARKANSAS METHODIST. Since then the Uniting Conference of 1939, and the expansion of THE ARKANSAS METHODIST to the status of an Area Paper, through "a Joint Commission" of the three Area Conferences (Little Rock, Louisiana and North Arkansas) the responsibility for promotion and cultivation now rests with the said Joint-Commission. And the World Service and Finance commissions of all three conferences make and direct their percentage apportionments directly to THE ARKANSAS METHODIST and THE LOUISIANA METHODIST. Our board has no conference funds at its disposal, all expense of travel, promotion and cultivation incured by members of the Board is borne by THE ARKANSAS METHODIST. Therefore, the Board's responsibility is limited, and limited to general approval of the literature of General Boards, Commissions and Committees and Churchwide publications such as Together, The Christian Advocate, The Methodist Story, World Outlook and other notable Christian Literature and especially the books bearing the imprint of Abingdon Press and for sale by The Methodist Publishing House.

We approve and recommend the observance of "Bible Sunday" and "Good

Literature Month.'

Following a long standing custom of courtesy the Board is privileged to include the reports of THE ARKANSAS METHODIST and METHODIST INFORMATION and THE JOINT COMMISSION OF THE ARKANSAS METHODIST AND LOUISIANA METHODIST, which will be made, respectively by Editor Rev. Ewing T. Wayland, Miss Jo Ann Newby, Director, and Rev. Dr. Aubrey Walton, Chairman of the Joint Commission.

(2) That the campaign goal for 1960 be 40,000 for the combined publications with a quota for each charge of one subscription for each 9 mem-

(3) That the subscription price for both publications be continued at \$2.00, provided that the church which sends in a subscribtion list representing one-third of the membership of that church as reported in the last confer-

ence journal be given a special rate of \$1.50.

(4) That the Little Rock, Louisiana and North Arkansas Conferences' Commissions on World Service be requested to apportion the same amounts for the Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist as was apportioned

the past year.

(5) That the sincere appreciation of this commission be expressed to those who have contributed in various ways to the publications during the past year.

That the back page arrangement be continued on the same basis (6)

as at present.

(7) That Rev. Ewing T. Wayland be appointed as editor and business manager of the Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist.

(8) That Miss Jo Ann Newby be continued as director of the Methodist

Information for the Arkansas-Louisiana Area.

(9) That the executive committee be authorized to act for the commission in such matters which in its judgement may need action between now and the next meeting of the commission.

DEACONESS BOARD

Recommendations For 1959-60

We are constantly confronted with the lack of information and understanding about the implications of deaconess service. It is therefore important that the Conference Deaconess Board plan so that adequate interpretation may be available to local churches and youth meetings.

To that end the following suggestions are made:

I. That the leaflet, "The Methodist Deaconess" be distributed at the annual meetings of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild and the North Arkansas Annual Conference.

II. That an interesting and informative presentation of the meaning of

deaconess service be prepared for Annual Conference.

III. That letters be sent to District secretaries of Missionary Personnel, Youth, and Student Work urging that deaconess service be presented in special career days, in sub-district and district meetings, at youth assemblies,

camps, etc.

IV. That, in cooperation with the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations, deaconess service be adequately interpreted in youth meetings. It is suggested that there be a general statement in such meetings about deaconess service and that it be so presented that those interested in becoming directors of religious education may consider becoming deaconesses, those in social welfare may see that as the role of the deaconess, those interested in nursing may think of becoming deaconesses also. The office, unrelated to vocation, has little appeal. The way in which it is presented can make a great difference.

That the itineration of accepted deaconess candidates among youth

groups be considered for next year.

VI. That the film, "Make All Things New", (27 minutes, rental \$6.00, Publishing House) be used to present the challenge of deaconess service in youth and other church groups.

VII. That the names of young women who are interested in church related vocations be sent to the president or secretary of the Conference Deaconess

Board.

That deaconesses living within the bounds of our Conference be invited to speak in Senior Youth Camps, at MYF sub-district and district meetings and in local churches.

Adult Leaders Conference, August 29-30, 1959
Senior Adult Conference, August 29-31, 1959
That the month of September be Christian Education Month.
That September 27 be Church School Rally Day and that each church be used to observe the day with program and offering. school be urged to observe the day with program and offering.

That we continue our policy of using 75% of Church School Rally Day offerings for District Christian education cultivation.

That September 27-October 4 be Christian Education Week.

That a series of district institutes on Christian education be held during September.

That October and November be emphasized as good months for leader-

ship schools.

That November 8-15, 1959, be the period for November Special, at which time each church will give special emphasis on Christian vocation, and the offering for ministerial training and Hendrix College.

That greater emphasis be placed on laboratory schools as a means of

training church school workers.

That the 1959 Children's Workers Conference be held April 4-6, 1960.

That the annual Conference Youth Rally be held April 8, 1960. That the Conference Youth Assembly be held May 31-June 4, 1960.

That the Young Adult Conference be held June 4-5, 1960.

That the period of January 1 to Easter be a time for emphasis on church school evangelism.

That the Board of Education cooperate with other boards and agencies

in promoting emphasis on Christian education.

That we encourage local churches to continue and expand the plan of planning and conducting local church formal training enterprises, and request that all applications for such programs be in the conference office at least one month before time of the school opening.

That we continue our policy of sending delegations of workers to area

and jurisdictional opportunities for training.

That meetings of age group workers be held during the summer and fall months to plan program of Christian education on the age group levels.

We recomend that four major emphases be made in the training pro-

gram of the conference:

Basic Biblical foundation (1)

(2)

Basic foundation in Christian faith Fundamental understanding of Christian education (3)

Continued development of techniques in Christian education

We recommend an increased emphasis on Christian vocation with a special emphasis on recruitment of persons for service in the employment of the Methodist Church.

That the program of Children's Work, Youth Work, Adult Work, formal and informal training, vacation church schools, camps, coaching conferences, literature cultivation, promotion of Wesley Foundation Work, promotion of Hendrix College, and all other general cultivation program in terms of Christian education be continued as in former years.

That no funds be paid to Wesley Foundation centers unless these centers present to the Board of Education their list of Foundation Board of Directors for election by the Annual Conference; and then the funds be paid only to

the Treasurer of the Board of Directors.

That the North Arkansas Conference reaffirm its purposes concerning Christian Higher Education and that we seek to reach during this conference year the goal of \$1.00 per member for Hendrix College and 30c per member

for Wesley Foundation Work.

We recommend to the Commission on World Service and Finance that all funds received for Wesley Foundation funds on 30c per member plan be apportioned to the four centers on the same ratio as Conference Benevolences are now apportioned to these centers. That churches within the corporation limits of any city having a four year college may use the funds they raise for the Wesley Foundation or Wesley Fellowship for their own student center's work, without sending said funds to Conference Treasurer.

We recommend that the Commission on World Service and Finance approve the plan of permitting Wesley Foundation Center representatives making contact with persons for the purpose of securing funds for perma-

nent building plans. (Wesley Foundations in North Arkansas Conference).
We request the Commission on World Service and Finance for the same apportionment from Conference Benevolences as of the past conference year: for Hendrix College (\$10,400.00) for Wesley Foundation Work (\$9,600.00); for Cultivation (\$15,041.00).

The Conference Board of Education recommends the Certification of

Miss Barbara Meacham and Rev. James T. Fleming as Directors of Christian Education; and Rev. James T. Fleming as a Minister of Music. We recommend the continuation of the Certification as Ministers of Music: Dr. Ashley Roy Coffman; Miss Sarah Moore Robinson; Miss Edna Earle Massey; Miss Clara Weir.

We recommend to Bishop Martin and his Cabinet that Ira A. Brumley be appointed as Executive Secretary of the North Arkansas Conference

Board of Education for the conference year of 1959-60.

THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Jesus said, "Go . . . Make Disciples!" We see this as the primary task of the Church and our answer is to gird ourselves and say, "I will arise and go." The North Arkansas Conference has a great challenge before it and we desire to submit a program that will help to meet this challenge with serious and worthy effort.

To fulfill our calling, we recommend the following program of evangelism

for every church in our Conference:

I. COOPERATIVE EVANGELISM MEASURES—"A UNITED CHURCH"

- A. We commend the spread of interest in prayer and urge that further efforts be made to develop a greater prayer life. Specifically we suggest:
 - Prayer retreats for pastors, laymen, and women on the District 1.
 - Prayer programs in every church, utilizing the Prayer Vigil, cells, chains and services.
 - The use of special materials prepared by Tidings for helping in prayer.
- We are grateful for the increased efforts toward organization both in local churches and Districts in the field of evangelism. To further implement this we suggest:

1. Organized and Active District Committees on Evangelism.

- 2. District Seminars on Evangelism, to be conducted for Chairmen and Pastors of local churches. These to be under direction of the District Superintendent with assistance from the Conference Board wherever requested. We suggest that January might be a very good time for these.
- C. We ask that three major joint projects be undertaken during the Next year. Each of these calls for united effort and the Methodist "spirit" and can produce great victories:
 - 1. A United Evangelistic Mission to be conducted during October and November. The Conference to be divided into two sections,

Western and Eastern; Western section to have a week's preaching mission in every charge, drawing from the Eastern section for workers as selected by local churches; these services to be simultaneous, October 25-30; Western Section will consist of Fayetteville, Ft. Smith, Conway Districts.

The Eastern section will follow the same plan, drawing from the Western section for workers; Eastern section will have its week of services November 15-20; it will consist of Paragould, Jonesboro, Forrest City and Batesville Districts. The Conference Board will plan with the District Superintendents in working out other details. Each Church is to take an offering one night during the missions for use of the Board of Evangelism.

- 2. We are glad to recommend cooperation with the Board of Education in the field of Youth Evangelism. We ask that there be Youth Witness Missions in every District and that these serve as "pilots" to bring about such undertakings in every church.
- 3. We feel that every church should have special evangelistic emphasis during Lent, and therefore recommend that:
 - (a) Each Pastor conduct a class for children in church membership.
 - (b) Every charge have a "Week of Dedication and Evangelism" —featuring visitation evangelism in the period set aside for this special week.
- 4. We recommend that the Conference set as a goal for 1959-60 a total membership of 97,500; and further that we strive to attain the goal of 100,000 members in 1960-61.

II. FEATURES IN EVANGELISM FOR EVERY LOCAL CHURCH—"YE ARE MY WITNESSES"

- A. To give each church an opportunity to "rate" itself according to the evangelistic job it is doing, we recommend that the Board of Evangelism be authorized to prepare an "Evangelistic Rating Chart"— to be distributed to every church, placed in a prominent place, and marked up according to the completeness of accomplishment in evangelism.
- B. We heartily recommend to the Churches the following helpful programs and resources in the field of evangelism:
 - 1. Promotion of Bible Reading. We are grateful to The Arkansas Methodist for running the suggested readings each week.
 - 2. Cultivation evangelism, using the new materials and promotion of the "Personal Evangelism" theme.
 - 3. Regular use of visitation evangelism in every church.
 - 4. Publicizing the "Keep Christ in Christmas" theme.
 - 5. The January to Easter Attendance Crusade.
 - 6. The World Day of Prayer as a good time for a Prayer Vigil.
 - 7. Special emphasis on the spiritual implications of Pentecost.

III. THE PROGRAM OF THE BOARD—"HE SENT THEM FORTH—"

In order to keep our Board active and informed, we recommend that it be allowed to participate in national and jurisdictional meetings as seem necessary. Also, that it direct the training and cultivation of conference leaders in the field of evangelism wherever it is possible. To these ends we recommend:

- A. That all the district Directors of Evangelism and the District Superintendents be invited to participate in the Jurisdictional Workshop on Evangelism on Mt. Sequoyah, August 3rd through 6th. And that their expenses at the Workshop be paid.
- B. That the Conference Secretary and Conference Board Chairman be our delegates to the National Council on Evangelism and that \$500 be alloted for their expenses.

- C. That encouragement be given for a carload of ministers to attend the National Council on Evangelism, paying most of their own expenses, with \$200 alloted to assist.
- D. That the Board make every effort to give recognition to those churches and pastors who are doing an exceptional job in the field of evangelism.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

We recommend that the budget of this board remain the same as last year. This being 9.6% of \$98,708 or \$9,475. Of this sum the salary, travel expense, annuity, and insurance premiums of the Booneville Sanatorium Chaplain, Board Chairman expense, Conference Director of Golden Cross, and expenses of board members be deducted and the remainder disbursed as follows: 58% to the Methodist Hospital in Memphis and 42% to the Methodist Childrens Home in Little Rock.

We recommend as trustees of the Methodist Childrens Home, terms to expire in 1962, Homer Fullbright, Earle Cravens, James R. Chandler, and A. P. McKeithen.

We call for the continued support of the Methodist Childrens Home by the local churches in the Christmas offering.

We ask that Charles Lewis be named Conference Director of Golden Cross. We ask that Golden Cross Sunday be observed on Mother's Day and that a special offering be taken or an amount be included in the budget of each local Church.

We ask that Sunday, March 13, be observed as Hospitals and Homes Sunday.

The Board made every effort to receive the management of the North Little Rock Hospital but the management was turned over to another organization before our Annual Conference met.

We wish to commend the Woman's Society of Christian Service for their assistance of the Booneville Sanatorium Chaplains Salary.

We wish to urge all churches that have not completed their pledges to the Hospital in Memphis to do so as soon as possible.

We recommend as trustees of the Memphis Hospital: Mrs. Tom Tucker, J. Frank Fogleman, H. K. Barwick, Jr., James H. Crain, Hubert Pearce, and

Earle Cravens.

We favor the establishment of a rest home at Ft. Smith and would like for a full report to be made to the annual conference with the idea that this home may come under the supervision of the North Arkansas Annual Conference.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

During the past Conference year your Board of Lay Activities has arranged for and carried out 7 workshops and retreats in 4 of the Districts. The subjects that have been presented for discussion were Methodist beliefs, Christian beliefs, personal evangelism among men and boys, prayer, Lay Speaking, and operation of Methodist Men Clubs. Approximately 700 men have attended these workshop periods. The response to the studies has been very gratifying. There have been a number of other single training sessions, so that more than 1000 men have been reached by some form of instructional meeting.

At the mid-year meeting of the Board, it was voted to

(1) set up a Department of Lay Speaking within the Conference,

(2) hold a Conference-wide retreat at Mount Sequoyah in August. After discussing the matter of finances with the Commission on World Service, I find that we shall be unable to finance both of these projects and still carry on the normal Conference program of Lay Activities promotion. A questionnaire has gone out to the Board asking them what activity they prefer that we carry out. At the time of writing this report I cannot report the decision. By Conference time I shall be able to make a report as to these two matters.

Our records now show that we have 99 clubs of Methodist Men in the Conference. One of the problems of operating the Clubs is that of well-defined programs for the meetings and of an overall program for the year. We have several pieces of literature available at no cost which I believe will be helpful. You are urged to write or to ask for them. The Clubs are excellent vehicles for promoting workshops and clinics. They are also the best means that we have for informing our men about the program of the Church.

Laymen's Day continues to be a day of opportunity for many men and churches. It is observed by nearly all of our churches now. It is urged that the men continue to make it a regular observance. This year the date is October 18. Pastors and Church lay leaders are urged to begin plans for the day by midsummer in order to have the speakers that they might want.

The Conference Lay Leader's Report

It is the responsibility of the Conference Lay Leader to give an accounting of his stewardship to the Annual Conference, since he is elected by that body. During the past Conference year I have taken part in all of the retreats and workshops that have been held in the Conference, I have visited and spoken in 28 of our churches, and I have held one revival meeting within

the bounds of the Conference. My visits have taken me to every District in the Conference. My office has produced a number of materials which are available to anyone interested. We now have them available on nearly every subject of interest to Methodist laymen. Several are studies that have been made within our Conference, and can be used by many of our churches. In addition to this, I try to keep a file of available materials in my office at all times so that I can assist any lay person in finding information that he or she may be seeking. We now have a Handbook for Lay Speakers, which seeks to fill a long felt need for information in this field. Within the past year, I have had the thrilling privilege of seeing 11 young people come forward and offer their lives in full-time service to Christ in meetings where I have spoken. While this may not seem to be a large number to some, it is as far as I am concerned probably the greatest result of my lay ministry for the past year.

Recommendations

Your Board recommends:

A continuing emphasis on training of our laymen through the means of workshops and clinics in every district where we can arrange it. Better functioning of Methodist Men's Clubs through better information. Observance of Laymen's Day in every church in the Conference.

BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATION

Report No. 2

Item 1

In the examination of persons applying for admission on trial into the Annual Conference and in the annual meeting with all persons in the approved supply relationship the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualification is required by the Discipline to ask, among other things, the

following question:
"Are you willing to make a complete dedication of yourself to the highest ideals of the Christian ministry with respect to purity of life in body, in mind, and in spirit, and to bear witness thereto by abstinence from the use of tobacco and other indulgences which may injure your influence?" (Par. 322.5 (5).)

The Judicial Council ruled (Decision 111) that in order to be satisfactory, the answer to this question "must be in the affirmative and without qualification." The enforcement of this requirement, therefore, is not left to the discretion of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualification; it is made mandatory by the Discipline.

It is common knowledge, however, that some ministerial members of the conference see fit, for various personal reasons, to disregard this requirement of the Discipline in so far as it applies to the use of tobacco; thereby making it more difficult for the Annual Conference through the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualification to uphold "the highest ideals of the Christian ministry with respect to purity of life" as set forth in the above quoted paragraph.

Furthermore, it is our judgment that the laity as a whole are aware of this requirement and must consider its repeated violation as a disregard for the authority of the Discipline; and indirectly at least, as encouragement for

the flouting of all law and authority in the state and nation.

It is not our purpose to argue the wisdom or the justice of this rejuirement as it now stands in the Discipline. There are many who feel that abtinence from the use of tobacco is a worthy standard to be maintained by the ministry as a sign of purity of body and of self-discipline. There are some who feel otherwise. If a law seems unfair or unjust, let those who feel that it is seek relief in the legal processes by which laws are changed or abolished. But until such time as this law is changed or abolished, the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualification feels that every responsible person is under obligation to abide by it and uphold it. We therefore, call upon the ministerial members of this Conference to support by their personal example and influence, the efforts of the Conference Board of Ministerial training and Qualification to uphold the standards for the Christian ministry as set forth in the Discipline; thereby "giving no offense in anything, that the ministry be not blamed." (II Corinthians 6:3)

Item 2

For the purpose of clarifying the procedure of licensing persons to preach, the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualification calls attention to the interpretation of Paragraph 306 of the Discipline Of The Methodist Church as given in Judicial Council Decision 100, that "where there is a District Conference the final authority for licensing local preachers and for renewing their licenses is vested in the District Conference.

Item 3

The Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualification recommends that financial aid for ministerial students in college be given only when a student is a licensed preacher. Such aid may be given for one semester provided the student has completed the Studies For License To Preach and has been recommended by his Quarterly Conference for license to preach before registering for admission in college.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

WE RECOMMEND THAT:

All applications for either Church Extension grants or donations and for Mission appropriations be made on the correct forms, that they be complete in detail before any action will be taken on them by the Board of Missions and that they be in the hands of the Secretary of the respective section by February 1 of each Conference year.

- 2. Due to the limitations of the available funds, we find it necessary to maintain as our general policy the maximum salary of a pastor of \$3600 for which the board will grant aid, with the provision agreed upon in a special situation, by a unanimous vote of the Cabinet, as an emergency case deserving special treatment, the ceiling may be raised to \$4200, including travel expenses, as the Board may determine.
- 3. All charges receiving Mission Aid be required to have an Every Member Canvass, and that the report of such a canvass be certified by the District Superintendent in writing to the Board of Missions before any action can be taken on their application for Mission appropriation.
- 4. The Board of Mission provide scholarships for the chairmen of the Commission on Missions to the local churches of the Conference to attend the Jurisdictional Workshop on Missions at Mt. Sequoyah on the following basis:

- 5. Every charge conduct an Every Member Canvass according to the recommended plan of the Town and Country Commission.
- 6. The District Missionary Institute be held in every district in January. An effort will be made to secure a missionary to visit each district.
- 7. The District Missionary Secretaries attend the meeting of the Jurisdictional School of Missions on Mt. Sequoyah and urge every Chairman of the local church Commission on Missions to attend the Conference for Chairmen.
- 8. The Annual Mission Study be held in every charge and that the District Missionary Secretaries present this to each pastor and commission chairman.
- 9. The cause of missions be continually presented to our people by the pastors and District Superintendents in order to familiarize them with every phase of the work, world and national.
- 10. Robert E. L. Bearden be appointed Conference Missionary Secretary and Glen F. Sanford be appointed as Superintendent of the Department of Town and Country Work, Division of National Missions of the General Board of Missions.
- 11. It be the policy of the Board of Missions to approve loans from the Local Board for the completing of a building project only.

CHURCH EXTENSION SECTION

The North Arkansas Conference loan fund is administered by the office of the Division of National Missions of the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church as a regular loan fund. In order to secure a loan from the fund, the applications must be processed through the conference Board and National Board of Missions on the proper forms and according to the rules of the Divisions of National Missions.

the Divisions of National Missions.

The request for "donations" to the Church Extension Section of the Board of Missions exceed the income each year. The needs for Church Extension in our Conference cannot be provided through World Service alone.

We recommend that we continue the supplementary program which will provide opportunity for Conference and District projects through the following "special" program for Church Extension.

1. That The North Arkansas Conference provide for two new churches

each year during the 1956-60 Quadrennium.

That local church and organizations of local churches be given an opportunity to help finance those approved churches by the purchase of \$10 shares helping to meet the district quotas. We recommend that quotas to the Districts be assigned on the

basis of "membership and amount paid pastors," which gives the following base figure to raise \$2000 in the Conference each year in the Quadrennium.

The "first" half of the District Quotas be used for the Conference

Extension Projects.

Thousand Club money is to be used for building purposes only, and not to be released until the building project has begun.

We recommend that Umstead Memorial, Newport, Arkansas; Beacon, in North Little Rock and Harrison new church be approved, in this order for Thousand Club money in the year of 1959-60.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Report to North Arkansas Annual Conference of Methodist Church Ft. Smith — June, 1959

It is indeed, an honor and joy to bring you greetings from the more than 15,000 women of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild of the North Arkansas Conference.

We deeply appreciate the privilege of participating in this annual (history-making) church conference. We are ever mindful of the fact that our Woman's Society, which includes the Guild, is an integral part of the church. It is authorized by the Discipline as one of the three Divisions of the Board of Missions. Our Division functions through three departments, viz; Work in the Home Field, Work in the Foreign Field and the department of Christian Social Relations. We have twelve main lines of work, each with a strong missionary emphasis.

During the past three years of this administration, I have noted, with both pleasure and pride, an increased interest in every line of work. This is, I believe due, mainly, to the increased attendance at workshops, clinics, officers training schools, seminars, schools of missions, prayer retreats and days apart, convocations and other meetings on the district, conference, jurisdiction and national levels. We had our full delegation at the Jurisdiction meeting in Kansas City in April, and we will have full representation at the Jurisdiction School of Missions at Mt. Sequoyah this month. We make it possible for our secretaries of the various lines of work to attend these meetings where they learn new techniques and gain information and inspiration to aid them in the promotion of their respective lines of work. By discussion groups, the interchange of ideas and reports, they are able to evaluate their methods and achievements and to improve in efficiency.

Our women are accepting the challenge of these changing times and the increasing role of women. This change, economically, is indicated in a

report on Woman Power by the National Manpower council, politically, in

the newly independent nations of the world where women officially are arriving at a new status and in the National Council of Churches of Christ.

These changes are reflected in the work of the Woman's Division and, as always, our leaders are alert and are adjusting to these changes.

For years, the Division has been recommending that more women serve on the official boards of the church, that they also be given the opportunity of serving as delegates to church conferences on the various levels. The idea back of this is NOT to dominate, but they believe that by serving in these various capacities they have an opportunity to learn about the organization of the church (which is quite complicated), church government, etc., and by knowing more about the total program of the church they are better able to cooperate in the promotion of the over-all program.

Even though women have been given full clergy rights not many have

shown a desire to go into the ministry.

One very fine avenue of service for women is in deaconess work. A brief glimpse at the scope of their work will be revealed to you a little later,

when our deaconesses are presented to you.

Women have always shared with men in the dangers, the hardships and the sacrifices of missionary work even before they were accepted as missionaries by the church. In fact, they have served from the very first because it was to a woman that Jesus first revealed himself as the risen Christ and "commissioned" her to go tell the others the good news. And women

are still carrying the good news around the world.

Whether we have deaconesses in a conference or not we are urged to have a conference deaconess board whose function is one of education and recruitment. You will hear from this Board. Since we do have Rural workers it is required by the Division that we have an active Conference Rural Advisory Committee and one has been set up. The required members of this Committee are, in addition to the president of the conference, the Executive Secretary of the Board of Education, Dr. Brumley, Town and Country, at the present time, Dr. Storey and all the District Supts. and the pastors with whom these deaconesses work. Do not confuse the two—our rural workers could be some one besides deaconesses.

These deaconesses, as I have said are paid by the Division, some of the expenses of upkeep of cars is met by the Woman's Society of the

Conference.

I spoke of the increase in interest now I should like to give you just a few figures concerning the increase in giving. While, of course, "Money isn't everything, I believe you will agree that it is way ahead of whatever

has second place."

This time last year I reported a total on appropriations sent to Division—\$58,500.00. with additional gifts—we call second mile giving of \$15,000.60. Total Disbursements, \$83,944. (This includes our conference projects such as contribution to Chaplain's salary at Booneville, Narcotic Education, etc.) For the year just closed—Total on Appropriations sent to Division, \$62,265.38, an increase of \$4,265.38. Total sent to Division, \$80,099.98. Our total disbursements, \$91,375.76.

Last year and the year before that I made an urgent plea for the cooperation of the Bishop, the District Superintendents and the pastors, in our efforts to organize a Woman's Society in every church in the conference, or if too small for a society to secure one district member. (A lot of

somebody's flunked that assignment.)

There are still 244 unorganized churches in our conference—

I may have said this last year, I have said it on many occasions, but it is worth repeating that a tremendous task has been committed to the women of Methodism by our heritage and by the challenge of our day. It is our task to interpret the aims and purposes of our church and our woman's organization, the objects of which are Religious, Philanthropic and Educational. To enlist all the women of the church in Christian Living and service and to establish a World Christian Community. We need your help. My sincere prayer is that we may work together in the various organizations of the church for a "spiritual recrudesence of all the peoples of earth," but may we begin with ourselves that we may have the urgency of missions as did the early church." How shall we escape if we neglect so great salvation" if we do not respond to this challenge of Mission and Witness for Christ.

We report that we are withdrawing our proposed, capital fund-raising campaign in favor of the Commission on Higher Education who is presenting a capital fund-raising campaign covering the period of time originally designated for the Board of Pensions.

We further recommend that a Conference Pension Study Committee be appointed to serve with the Executive Committee of the Board of Pensions during the Conference Year 1959-60, to re-study the pension program and possibilities of the North Arkansas Conference, and that the Board of Pensions bring to the Conference in 1960 report and recommendations resulting from this cooperative study, and, furthermore that this Committee be composed of the following persons:

- 1. The presiding Bishop
- 2. One district superintendent appointed by the Bishop,
- 3. The Chairman of the World Service and Finance Commission, and one lay member of the Commission appointed by the Chairman of the Commission,
- The Conference Lay Leader and the Associate Conference Lay Leader, and
- 5. The Executive Committee of the Board of Pensions.

BOARD OF SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RELATIONS

The function of the Board of Social and Economic Relations of the Methodist Church is stated in Section 1547 of the Discipline (1956 Edition) as follows: "It shall be the function of the Board to implement the actions of the General Conference and of the Methodist Social Creed; to make available to the church membership resource material relating to the field of social and economic relations; to respond to requests of local-church groups for information and guidance; to encourage and stimulate interest and activity in the relation of the program of the church to social and economic problems; to establish 'service projects' where Methodist youth may render Christian service and express their Christian convictions in pioneering and other endeavors at home and abroad, co-ordinating such work with other general agencies of the church; and to work with other general agencies in stimulating Christian social thinking and action. This Board shall work in co-operation with the Department of Christian Social Relations of the Woman's Division of Christian Service."

In carrying out the above, we, the Board of Social and Economic Relations of the North Arkansas Conference, report and recommend as follows:

1. We urge each local church to create and use a Commission on Christian Social Relations in accordance with Section 276 of the Discipline. Such Commission is there enjoined to "... co-ordinate activities in the areas of social and economic relations, temperance, world peace, and community cooperation.

2. We urge each of our churches to observe Church and Economic Life

Week during the last week in January of each year.

3. We acclaim the importance to Methodism and all Christianity of the freedoms enjoyed by citizens of this country, including freedom of religion, of speech, of the press, and of assembly.

4. We believe that one of the greatest needs in modern life is for active

participation in politics by increasing number of Christians of sound charac-

ter and integrity.

5. We regard free public education as indispensible to the progress of Methodism and Christianity, and to the well-being of individuals of all faiths in this country. In the critical situation which exists in Arkansas at the present time, we call upon all Methodists to support the cause of free education and if need be to work actively for its continuance.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

We, The Board of Temperance submit the following report: We commend the District Directors of Temperance, the pastors and laymen for their efforts to promote the cause of Temperance in the local churches of our Conference.

In view of the decreasing interest in the Temperance Essay Contest among our young people, the Board voted to discontinue the contest and use this money in a Visual Aid Program under the direction of the District Directors. Films and Film-Strips will be made available to the local church youth groups, Sub-District and District M. Y. F. Meetings.

A Coaching Conference was held at Hendrix on April 30-May 1, Sponsored by the Board of Temperance and the Board of Christian Education, in which several leaders were acredited to teach the Course on Alcohol in training schools in the Conference.

We make the following recommendations:

1. That there be a Local Church Committee on Temperance in every church. And under the authority of the Discipline, (par. 278.3) this Committee, in co-operation with the pastor, promote in the local church the observance of Commitment Day, on the first Sunday in December. That adequate plans for the Day be made and every Methodist be given the opportunity to sign a Commitment card.

That pastors cooperate where possible with Alcoholic Anonymous Clubs in reclaiming the alcoholics in the community.

That our churches give full cooperation to the Arkansas Christian Civic Foundation Inc. which has taken over the work of the Arkansas Temperance League, and to the Women's Temperance Union.

That all churches make full use of the new films and filmstrips pro-

vided by the Board through the District Director.

That the Conference authorize the following budget for 1959-60 and that the percentage be continued at 1.50%.

BOARD OF WORLD PEACE

I. ACTIVITIES

The North Arkansas Conference Board of World Peace participated in the South Central Jurisdiction Conference on "Christian Social Relations" at Mt. Sequoyah in July, 1958. Those taking part from our board were Mrs. Nels Barnett, Rev. Luther Wilson, Rev. John Flynn, Miss Ethel Millar, and Rev. H. W. Jinske. Mr. Jinske and Mrs. Barnett had a part in panel discussions arranged by Dr. Carl D. Soule of the General Board of World Peace.

In August, 1958 Mr. Jinske was sent to Lincoln University at Jefferson City, Missouri by the General Board to conduct discussion groups on World Peace at the St. Louis Area Youth Convocation. He also spoke on World Peace at the conference on World Trade in the Grace Methodist Church of Springfield, Missouri. This conference was sponsored by the General Board and the South West Missouri Conference.

Through Miss Ethel Millar of Hendrix College our Conference Board placed fifty dollars worth of United Nations Booklets in various libraries

over the conference.

OBJECTIVES

Our Conference Board is planning to charter a special bus from Little Rock to New York City on which delegates will travel to a United Nations Seminar sponsored by our Board and the South Central Jurisdiction. We hope this can take place in October or early November. Negotiations are under way with Dr. Charles F. Boss of New York and Dr. Paul D. Womeldorf of Oklahoma City. We are asking the Woman's Society of Christian Service to join us and we hope that at least thirty people can go from our conference. We shall participate in another Jurisdictional Conference on "Christian Social Relations" to be held again at Mt. Sequoyah, July 28 to 31.

III. BOARD POSITION

We reassert our faith in the United Nations and urge that questions which can not be settled through the regular channels of diplomacy be placed in the hands of the United Nations. A case in point is the Berlin issue. If the East and the West can not resolve the issue through regular diplomatic channels we urge that this issue be taken to the United Nations. We believe there is enough good judgement in the UN where some eighty nations take part to resolve such issues with some degree of fairness and justice to all concerned.

We favor a wider dissemination of information between the United States and other countries. Cultural exchanges and exchanges of visitors are to be encouraged to the end that there may be better understanding among the peoples of the world and the foundations of World Peace thereby strengthened. We highly commend the Fulbright Scholarship program whereby our college and university students study at institutions in other countries and in turn their students study in institutions of our country. This will help lay the spiritual and cultural foundations for a peaceful world order.

We believe that the Christian Church has a moral obligation to take the Gospel of Peace and love to all races throughout the world. If the church is to be truly Christian it must rise above race hatred and prejudice, so much of which our land is experiencing today. We must meet them in a Christian Spirit. The church must also have a program for World Order and World Peace. We can not leave this important matter to government alone.

We favor the use of Atomic energy for peaceful purposes and we urge that there be International Cooperation in the control of this energy and in

the channeling of it to Man's welfare.

COMMITTEE ON GROUP INSURANCE

Report No. 1

- 1. Every member of the North Arkansas Conference, except students serving appointments in conferences which themselves have compulsory insurance programs, every approved supply receiving an appointment, and every full time lay employee of the North Arkansas Conference shall participate in the North Arkansas Conference Group Life Insurance Plan subject to its laws and regulations.
- 2. Annual premiums shall be paid by charges and participants at the premium rate of 50 cents per thousand per month for participants and 75 cents per month for charges:

- 3. Annual premiums shall be paid by participants and charges and collected through district organizations.
- 4. District treasurers of the Life Insurance shall send the district reports and premiums to the Conference Treasurer by February 1, 1960.
- 5. No man who retired before February 18, 1948, even though he has served as a supply since, shall be eligible for insurance.

- 6. Members of the Conference who retire will have \$1,000 Life Insurance carried for them with the premium paid by the North Arkansas Conference Group Insurance Fund, except in the case of those who continue to serve as supplies, and these persons shall pay the premium in accordance with the above listed schedule.
- 7. Approved supplies whose annuity claims are approved by the Conference will have \$1,000 Life Insurance carried for them, with the premium paid by the North Arkansas Conference Insurance Fund.
- 8. Members of the North Arkansas Conference who are left without appointments to attend school, who do not serve a charge, shall carry \$1,000 Life Insurance and pay the annual premium of \$6.00, and the North Arkansas Group Insurance Fund will pay the remaining \$9.00.

9. Those who are not now participating in our Group Life Insurance Plan who will be participating under the provisions of this report shall pay two-thirds (2/3) of the annual premium, according to above listed schedule,

by July 1, 1959.

10. Other matters concerning the Group Life Insurance program, the amount of insurance in force, balance in insurance account, and amount of current dividend, if any, will be reported at the session of the Annual Con-

Report No. II

1. Members of the Conference who retired at the 1958 session of the Annual Conference and those retiring at any date thereafter will have the Conference Hospitalization Policy carried for them with premiums paid by the North Arkansas Conference Group Insurance Fund, except those who continue to serve as supplies and these shall pay the premium in accordance with the established schedule.

2. Annual premium payments are due and payable June 15, 1959, and all funds must be remitted by the District Treasurers to Mr. P. E. Cooley, Conference Treasurer, by July 10, 1959.

3. A complete and detailed report of the claim experience for the 1958-59 Conference Year will be given at the session of the Annual Conference.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORTS OF THE COMMITTEE ON GROUP INSURANCE

Addendum To Report No. I

The Metropolitan Insurance Company has returned a dividend check in the amount of \$7,814.00. This added to the balance from previous years gives us a total of \$12,725.05 in our reserve fund.

Addendum To Report No. II

The North Arkansas Conference has had for the past two years its hospitalization program with Mutual of New York. The total premiums paid in during the past year amounted to approximately \$30,508.00, with 245 policy holders and their dependents covered. According to Mutual of New York Officials, claims against this group policy were approximately 100 per cent

Because of this high claim experience, the Conference has this alternative: We can absorb a 13 per cent increase in premium rates over last year's. or we can introduce a \$25.00 deductible clause on the miscellaneous hospital expense benefits, followed by payment of 100 per cent of the next \$150.00, with 75 per cent of the balance up to \$2,325.00. The retired policy holders will be subject to the deductible clause with no co-insurance.

Your Committee on Insurance recommends that the Conference introduce the deductible feature in its group hospitalization insurance policy for

the 1959-60 Conference Year.

The premium rates will continue the same as the past year, with Mutual of New York as our carrier.

James Beverly Evans was born at Prescott, Arkansas, November 25, 1888. He was the second son of William Fletcher and Eliza Thomasson Evans. His boyhood home was in Methodist parsonages and his education in the public schools of Prescott, Camden and Warren and at Henderson-Brown College at Arkadelphia. While a student at Henderson-Brown he was licensed to preach by the Arkadelphia district conference in 1908, appointed supply pastor of the Arkadelphia circuit and Lonoke while continuing his studies. He was admitted on trial into the Little Rock Conference at Fordyce, November 18, 1911, after which he served pastorates at Twentyeighth Street, Little Rock, and Tigert Memorial and Malvern Avenue at Hot Springs. He was transferred to Florida as pastor of the First Methodist Church at Fort Lauderdale in 1914. On returning to his native state he became a member of the North Arkansas Conference and served churches at Parkin, Brinkley, Clarendon, Helena, Clarksville, Paragould, Morrilton and Russellville.

While stationed at Hot Springs he was married to Miss Florence Wier of that city, and they became the parents of one daughter, now Mrs. Richard Smith, Jr., of Little Rock. Mrs. Evans died in 1957. Brother Evans was making his home with his daughter at the time of his death, February 6, 1959. He is survived also by a brother, W. F. Evans of Helena and by a sister, Mrs. Luta Mayo who lives at Marianna. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Roy Fawcett and burial was at Hot Springs.

There was enacted a scene of intense drama when the Annual Conference convened in the new church three months later and loving hands bore him tenderly to the chancel in order that he might answer to roll call

at the opening session.

His physicians had led his family and friends to expect complete invaladism after his partial recovery, yet such was his courage and will to live that he was selected by his fellow citizens of Pope County to serve as Representative in the Legislature the following year. When his strength permitted him to engage in light business enterprise he moved to Hot Springs and opened a shop in which he assembled and sold antique items of historical and cultural significance. The venture was successful and he found great satisfaction in the business which afforded contact with people from all over the world. He continued in this business which afforded contact with people from all over the world. He continued in this business until 1956 when his health again failed. A severe heart malady demanded complete rest and his business was sold. A year later his wife died and after a few months alone he sold his home in Hot Springs and made his home with his daughter and her family.

Not many hours before the end came he was found cheerful and undaunted in the face of death. Through the veil of an oxygen tent he recognized and welcomed a friend and led the visit through happy memories of youth and the concerns of the church. He died as he had lived, in love with life and positive in the assurance that the Saviour's conquest of death is the glad extension of his victory over evil in the heart and in society. His passing was serene, undimmed by doubt or any occasion for tears, the glad following of a Voice well known.

MRS. OSCAR E. GODDARD

Mattie Hoskins Goddard, daughter of Robert and Nancy Hoskins, was born in Nashville, Tennessee in 1874 and died at Little Rock on February 4, 1959. A graduate of Vanderbilt University, a woman of unusual native ability and broad culture, a devoted Christian and a gifted church worker, she brought to her labors in the parsonage and in the church a spirit and a capableness which made her a perfect helpmate for her distinguished husband. And never did a couple in the ministry find, each in the other, a source of more lasting pride and greater inspiration.

Many were her interests and fields of usefulness. Among these were the WSCS and the church school. In the former she made herself felt among the women through her vision of missionary work and her constructive leadership, and in the latter she was a powerful influence among the children and the young people. In social service she was particularly effective for the causes of temperance, good citizenship, and world peace. But her greatest service was in her Christian spirit, which made her the warm friend and the practical helper of her fellow human beings. It was life to her to give, and never was she happier than when she was helping somebody. In his retirement years Dr. Goddard started a movement to give financial aid to needy

SESSIONS OF THE CONFERENCE

The "Arkansas Conference" and the "White River Conference" were united in 1914 to form the present "North Arkansas Conference."

The Conference determined that its annual notation should date from the time of the organization of the Arkansas Conference in 1836, instead of following the date fixed by the consolidation of the Arkansas and White River Conferences, when the name was changed to North Arkansas Conference in 1914.

The Conference session of 1939 voted to maintain the numerical notation of the Conference in The Methodist Church.

STANDING RULES OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

- (1) That each undergraduate, each approved supply pastor, and each candidate for conference membership be required to meet with the Board of Ministerial Training before or during the session of the annual conference unless hindered by circumstances beyond his control.
- (2) That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one member from each church in each Pastoral Charge; provided further, that each station charge shall have three elected members.
- (3) That the figures answering the question the pastor's report to Annual Conference: "Members reported last year" shall in every case be the number of members printed in the statistical tables of the Journal of the last Annual Conference.
- (4) That the District Superintendent's figures of all apportionments be accepted as the official figures.
- (5) That the apportionment for Conference and General Work be combined in the statistical report: and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.
- (6) All statistical reports shall be delivered by the district superintendents to the conference statistician seven days before the opening session of the Annual Conference, and all settlements shall be made with the Conference Treasurer by June 1st.
- (7) When a member of this Conference becomes a member of the Bishop's cabinet he shall automatically become ineligible to serve on any quadrennial board, committee, commission, or an officer in the Conference administration, except members specifically designated by the Discipline.
- (8) That the Secretary of the Bishop's cabinet be instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or District Superintendent's District for insertion in the Conference Journal.
- (9) That all members of the conference who attend the annual session shall pay the host church two dollars registration fee, with the following exceptions: 1) Men from minimum salary charges shall pay one dollar; 2) Retired men and supernumeraries shall pay no registration fee. The offerings in the public worship services shall go to the host church, and the honorarium from the conference preacher shall be paid from the conference expense fund.
- (10) At all sessions of the Annual Conference entertainment provided by the host church shall consist of bed and breakfast, except for superannuates, for whom full entertainment shall be provided. (Suspended for one year.)
- (11) Every board, commission, and committee receiving any money from conference funds shall present to the Commission on World Service and Finance annually by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference a detailed financial report including all receipts and expenditures.
- (12) The list of lay members elected to Annual Conference shall be compiled by the district superintendents and sent to the host church and to the conference secretary thirty days before the opening of the Annual Conference.
- (13) The District Stewards shall apportion the askings for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and for General Administration Fund, and Jurisdictional Expense, to the several charges in each district on an equitable basis.
- (14) The conference treasurer shall close his books for the Conference Year seven days before the opening of the annual conference, and shall distribute to the several boards and commissions the moneys to which they are entitled by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference, and each board and commission receiving money from conference funds shall close its books on the opening day of annual conference.
- (15) No one shall be nominated for re-election to a board or commission on which he has served more than a quadrennium immediately preceding his election.
- (16) The secretary of the Board of Conference Claimants shall be a member of the secretarial staff of the conference and this person shall be charged with the responsibility of seeing that all records pertaining to service years be made identical
- (17) Any proposal to change the Standing Rules shall lie on the table overnight, and then its passage shall require a $\frac{3}{4}$ vote of those present and voting.
- (18) That part of the report of all boards, commissions, committees and other agencies of the conference which provides for changes in policy or makes recommendations shall be mimeographed, printed, or otherwise duplicated and distributed to the membership of the conference prior to the time scheduled for action on said report.
- (19) All churches employing more than one member of an annual conference shall pay all percentages based on pastor's salary on the salaries of all ministers so employed.
