Motion: S. B. Wilford moved that we have a session from 2:00 until 4:00 o'clock in the afternoon. The motion carried.

Journal: W. C. Scroggin, Jr. reported that the journal for the first day had been read and was in order. It was approved.

Conference Council: S. B. Wilford moved that the agenda planned by the Conference Council and printed in the Pre-Conference Digest be adopted, with the understanding that Bishop Pope have the privilge of making adjustments as he deems necessary. The motion carried.

Report of the District Superintendents: Lloyd M. Conyers, Secretary of the Cabinet, made the report of the District Superintendents.

Area Council: The report of the Area Council was presented by the Executive Secretary, Cecil R. Culver. It was adopted.

Conference Statistican: Harold D. Womack, Conference Statistican, presented his report in mimeographed form, and spoke to the report. It was adopted.

Board of Education: Chairman Harney Chaney presided in the presentation of the report of the Board of Education. William Wilder moved that reports 1, 2, and 3, be adopted. Dr. Ira A. Brumley, Bob Edwards, Dr. Marshall Steel and James Marior speke to the report

Marshall Steel and James Major spoke to the report.

J. W. Moore presented Dr. Steel with a check for \$500.00 to be added to a previous gift of \$1000.00 and to be used as a scholarship fund for a ministerial student. The endowment fund will be known as the J. W. Moore Scholardship Fund.

Bishop Pope conveyed greetings from Dr. Roosevelt Crockett, President of Philander Smith.

A. W. Martin spoke to the report of Wesley Foundation. He introduced Miss Marybeth Prewitt who spoke of the Methodist Student Movement in Arkansas.

Dr. Brumley, a trustee of Southern Methodist University, brought

greetings from that school.

Dr. Brumley presented the following resolution and moved its adoption: "We recommend that of the present Wesley Foundation Building Fund balance, that \$20,000.00 be appropriated to the Tech Center at Russellville and the other \$24,000.00 to the University of Arkansas Center at Fayetteville. This recommendation is being made with the approval of the Executive Committee of the Steering Committee of the Building Fund Program." Committee of the Steering Committee of the Building Fund Program." It was adopted.

The report in its entirety was adopted.

Appreciation for the Martins: Bishop Pope expressed appreciation to Dr. and Mrs. A. W. Martin for their leadership and help in the Wesley Foundation building program at the University. Bishop Pope noted that Mrs. Martin had given \$25,000.00 for the building of the chapel.

Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications: Dr. James S. Upton, Chairman, moved that Report No. 1 as printed in the Pre-Conference Digest

be adopted. It was adopted.

World Service and Finance Commission: The Chairman, Dr. Fred G. Roebuck, presided in the presentation of this report. He presented the following resolution:

Whereas, Mr. R. E. Cooley, our Conference Treasurer, has given of himself freely and sacrificially at a salary far less than would normally be expected for this service,

And Whereas, he has shown technical efficiency along with a gracious understanding spirit in all his relationships with the local churches and the Commission on World Service and Finance,

Be It Resolved, that Mr. P. E. Cooley be openly commended for his fifteen years of devoted service as Treasurer of the North Arkansas Annual Conference.

The resolution was adopted unanimously.

Ben Jordan moved the adoption of the report as printed in the Pre-

Conference Digest with certain amendments. It was adopted.

Robert Paul Sessions moved that the figures concerning Salary be the same as printed on page 27 of the Pre-Conference Digest. This motion carried and became a part of the report.

Area Treasurer: Grafton Thomas, the new Treasurer for the North Arkansas Conference and the Little Rock Conference, was introduced.

Standing Rules: Harold O. Eggensperger presented the following proposed changes in the standing rules of the Conference: RULE (7) Add

to end of paragraph: "or by the Annual Conference." and read as follows:
When a member of this Conference becomes a member of the Bishop's
cabinet he shall automatically become ineligible to serve on any quadrennial board, committee, commission, or an officer of the Conference administration, except members specifically designated by the Discipline or by the Annual Conference.

DELETE RULE (9) AND RULE (10), and substitute as follows:

RULE (9) The Annual Conference shall elect upon nomination by the Bishop a Conference Entertainment Committee to serve during the quadrennium. This Committee shall make arrangements for the facilities needed for the session of the Annual Conference and administer the funds for its entertainment, including the honorarium for the conference preacher.

RULE (10) All members attending the Annual Conference session shall pay two dollars registration; except 1) those from minimum salary charges, who shall pay one dollar; 2) retired ministers not

serving charges and supernumeraries, who shall pay no registra-tion. The offerings in the public worship service shall be used for conference entertainment expense. The Conference Entertainment Committee shall provide during the session of the Annual Conference full entertainment for retired ministers not serving a charge, and room for all pastors of charges whose pastoral support from all sources is \$3,600.00 or less.

AMEND RULE (12) to read:

A list of lay members elected to Annual Conference shall be compiled by the district superintendents and sent to the conference secretary prior to the opening of the session.

AMEND RULE (13) to read:

The district stewards shall apportion all annual conference askings to the several charges in each district on an equitable basis.

ADD RULE (20)

Each Annual Conference session shall designate a moving date. Any exceptions to the designated date shall be agreed upon by the pastors

AMEND RULE (14) by substituting the word "allocate" for "distribute" and read:

The conference treasurer shall close his books for the Conference Year seven days before the opening of the annual confrence, and shall allocate to the several boards and commissions the moneys to which they are entitled (and continue to end of paragraph).

These changes will be voted on the following day. A. W. Martin stated he would move the deletion of the words "or by the Annual Conference" in the suggested change in rule 7.

St. Paul School of Theology, Methodist: John Bayliss, a trustee of the school, spoke concerning our seminary in Kansas City.

Council of Churches: James Major, representing the Arkansas Council of Churches, addressed the Conference.

Arkansas Methodist: Alfred Knox, Editor of the Arkansas Methodist spoke of the work of our Area paper and of Methodist Information. He moved that the report of the Joint Commission on page 38 of the Pre-Conference Digest, be adopted. The motion carried.

Chaplains: Chaplain Lyman Barger and Chaplain LeRoy Henry were presented to the Conference. Bishop Pope read telegrams from Chaplains Marvest Lawson, Willie Walker and Robert Howerton.

Introductions: Dr. Matt Ellis presented Mrs. W. Kenneth Pope to the Conference. Mrs. Pope graciously responded.
Other visitors introduced were Clifton Rule, Roy Fawcett, William Brown, V. Earle Copes, George Stewart, Otto Teague, Cecil Culver, Ewing Wayland, Sam Auslam and Fred Harrison.

Motion: Raymond Franks moved that the Conference instruct the Secretary to send greetings to Dan Robinson, Pastor of North Little Rock, First Church, who could not attend Conference because of recent surgery. It was so ordered.

Second Day - Afternoon Session

Publishing Interests: J. William Watson presented the report of the Committee on Publishing Interests. Richard Fenno, representative of the Methodist Publishing House was introduced. He presented the Conference with a check for \$6,523.39 for retired preachers. Ewing T. Wayland, Editor of the Christian Advocate, spoke to the report. It was adopted.

Hospitals and Homes: Earl Hughes presided in the presentation of the report of the Board of Hospitals and Homes. Charles Lewis moved that the report as printed in the Pre-Conference Digest be adopted and that a second report be filed with the Secretary. The motion carried. George Stewart, Chaplain of the Methodist Hospital, and Bates Sturdy, Chaplain of the State Sanatorium, were introduced.

Motion: Lloyd M. Conyers, Superintendent of the Paragould District, moved that the Community Methodist Hospital Association of Paragould, Arkansas, be authorized to so mend its constitution and by laws as to reduce the required number of Methodists in its membership and the membership of the Board of Trustees from the customary ¾ majority of the total, as followed by the Discipline. The motion carried.

Children's Home: Dr. W. Henry Goodloe brought greetings from the Methodist Children's Home in the place of the Superintendent, Connor Morehead, who could not be present.

Civic Foundation: Dr. William E. Brown, Executive Secretary of the Arkansas Christian Civic Foundation, addressed the Conference.

TRAFCO: Hubert Pearce moved that the report of the Commission on Television, Radio, and Film Commission as printed in the Pre-Conference Digest be adopted. The motion carried and it was so adopted.

Minimum Salary: W. L. Douglas presented the report of the Committee on Minimum Salary, and moved its adoption. The motion carried.

Group Insturance: Harold Spence read report No. 1 as printed in the Pre-Conference Digest and moved its adoption. A. W. Martin moved that the exact amount of insurance be included in the report. It was agreed that this would be done. The report was adopted.

Report No. 2, concerning hospital insurance, was presented by Dewey Dark Jr. Harold Spence moved the adoption of the report. Dewey Dark spoke to the report. Jack Carter, representative of Blue Cross-Blue Shield addressed the Conference and answered questions concerning our insurance.

It was adopted.

Privileged Matters: Ethan W. Dodgen announced that Rev. J. M. Barnett was absent from the Conference due to the critical illness of his daughter, and that W. A. Downum was absent due to the death of a sister. He moved that the Secretary of the Conference be instructed to send sympathy and greetings to both of these men and their families. It was so ordered.

Resolution: John Bayliss presented the following resolution: "Resolved, that the World Service and Finance Commission be authorized to make adjustments in approtionments to districts which are justified by the transferring of charges from one district to another, and that these adjusted apportionments be the ones published in the Journal of the Conference." It was adopted.

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

To Bishop W. Kenneth Pope and the Members of the North Arkansas Conference:

As we begin to reflect upon the work of Methodism in this Conference for the past twelve months, it is in order to make note of two things that has undergirded our work with strength through this time. First; our total program of work throughout Arkansas Methodism this year has been undergirded by the organization of our Area Council and the leadership of its Executive Secretary, Dr. Cecil R. Culver. This has been our first year of work with this organizational structure. It has proven itself of value in integrating and guiding our work. Our approach to many phases of our program has been strengthened in the sense of unity which it has offered us. Second: It is probably true that the charges of our Conference have been more solidly staffed with pastoral leadership this year than at any time in recent years. When the appointments were read a year ago, but few places were left to be supplied and without exception each District Superintendent had a plan in mind for providing for those places which appeared to be left open. As openings developed through the year, these were filled without seriously disturbing our work at any point. This state of things was largely the immediate and direct result of the movement in our Conference to organize our work into larger pastoral units and to give each pastor a challenging work load. This program is being promoted by our Town and Country Commission under the leadership of its Executive Secretary, Rev. Elmer J. Holifield, and is being given the whole-hearted support of each member of the cabinet. There is no question but what this emphasis will be continued and we trust its benefits may be as apparent in future days as through this past Conference year.

As we attempt to survey the high points of our regular on-going program of work, our minds soon center upon that area of endeavor of great concern to us all—that of Evangelism and Church Membership. Our Conference will be delighted to know that our reports indicate a net gain in membership of this year of 1,818. This is in marked contrast to a loss in membership for the past three years and is the largest net gain we have had since our United Evangelistic Mission in 1950. An analysis of our reports indicates a substantial increase in every way that we receive members into the Methodist Church. The break down is as follows: a 20% increase in members received on Profession of Faith; a 17% increase in members received by transfer from other Methodist Churches; and a 10% increase in the number received from other denominations. We rejoice in these gains and wish to express our appreciation to Bishop Pope for the emphasis and leadership he has given us in this regard. Under the same challenging leadership, we anticipate going on to further and greater gains along this significant line. It must be noted, however, that we cannot rejoice in this gain except in the consciousness of our continuing lack. A further study of our membership figures indicates that the most significant difference to be observed between our figures of this year and last is the decrease in the number removed by Quarterly Conference action. There is no question but what the gains registered this year are the result of a great concern and more diligent effort in this respect. This but suggests, however, what might be done if every minister and congregation could be possessed by a Divine sense of evangelistic mission. We cannot be content with ourselves or with our work until our gains reflect a real concern for the lost and an abiding zeal for righteousness.

We rejoice in the special opportunity that is to be ours in the year before us in observance of the 225th anniversary of Mr. Wesley's Aldersgate experience. We call upon North Arkansas Methodism to enter whole-heartedly into the program that will be presented by our Board of Evangelism. Let each pastor and congregation enter into that manner of prayer, planning, and work that will result in a great engathering of people and that will leave our Churches strengthened both in spirit and in organiz-

ational structure for the great responsibility that is ever ours of making Jesus Chirst known as Lord to all men.

Our Conference Program of Christian Education has gone forward in an excellent way under the proven leadership of Dr. Ira A. Brumley. The special interest of his assistant, Bobby Edwards, in Children's work has served to strengthen our program in this vital area in many ways. Conference, District, Area, and Local Church Training Schools, Institutes, Work Shops, and Coaching Conferences have been held. A total of 3,388 Training Credits have been issued and many more were inspired and better fitted for various places of responsibility in the many churches of our Conference.

The statistical record of our Church Schools this year is a matter of concern. We report a small decrease in both Total Church School enrollment and average Sunday School attendance. The number in each instance is quite small but the movement is in the wrong direction. It goes without saying that our evangelistic ambitions will be but futile dreams until this condition is corrected. One of our most serious faults is in the fact that our local units come to be too closely identified. This is seen in both small rural congregations and in the classes and circles of our town and city churches. If our many units could each become a center of evangelistic concern and activity, our problems in this regard would be immediately solved.

We are happy to note that we have again this year increased the amount given to the basic support of Hendrix College. We hope this trend will continue through the years and we are most happy for the fine progress that is being made on the Hendrix Campus under the leadership of Dr.

Marshall T. Steele.

Our Student Center Building program is moving forward in a good way. Our work this year has removed all questions in reference to the successful completion of the program and we are looking forward to soon having a good Methodist Student Center on the campus of every state-supported col-

lege in the state of Arkansas.

This year has marked the beginning of more systematic support of Mt. Sequoyah. This matter has been called to our attention again and again through the years, but the idea of a minimum contribution of \$10 from each charge is beginning to take hold throughout the Jurisdiction and promises to put the strength of a solid on-going support behind this great institution. It is certainly in order that our own Conference be among those to first enter

into this program and we are glad that such is being done.

Our Conference Treasurer reports that every District has exceeded its quota on World Service and that we are making a new record in contributions to the Church Builders Club. Our total for Advance Specials this year does not quite equal that of last year due to the fact that we then had the Bishop's appeal for the Congo which has not been repeated this year. Our giving to our regular quadrennial specials has been strengthened. The Kinandu project is moving on towards completion. A real interest is being taken in the Indian, Spanish Speaking, and Central Jurisdiction Specials. We are now reaching our quotas on these and there is every indication that this work will be continued throughout the quadrennium. In the area of Church extension we can report that a new Church has been organized at Rogers. A building has been erected and the congregation is moving forward with its work. Work will begin soon on the construction of a building for the new congregation that will be organized at Marked Tree. We are happy for these gains and they serve to remind us of other like projects that should be gotten under way soon. Plans have been made this year for a basic and bold advance in this respect. The Executive Secretary of our Area Council plans to lead in a survey of every city in our state with a population of 10,000 or more with the idea of determining just where new centers should be established. The established Churches in these areas will be urged to secure building sites in these areas and to begin moving into them as rapidly as possible.

The signs of progress being made in our missionary work is a source of great encouragement. However, we are mindful of the call and challenge

of a much greater work urgently needing to be done and long for the day when Methodist people will all be united and undergirded with a Divine sense of Mission that will move us forward in this great work with an un-

bounded eagerness and enthusiasm.

We continue to move forward in those phases of our work where material and financial matters are involved. Salaries of the pastors in charge have been paid in full and in many instances are being substantially increased for another year. We continue to make improvements in our parsonages and Church plants. Our progress along these lines is due both to the material abundance of our day and our improved methods in Church Finance. The Every Member Visitation program as promoted by the General Board of Lay Activities is becoming an accepted part of the Annual program of more and more of our Churches. The District work-shops under the direction of Rev. Elmer J. Holifield, Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission, have proven their worth and done much to strengthen our efficiency in this work from year to year. More of our Churches are also recognizing the value of balancing their Budgets on a quarterly basis and some few are endeavoring to bring everything into line at the end of each month.

It is worthy of note that 26 new Churches Educational Buildings have been built. The debt has been lifted on 11 Buildings which have been dedicated. Six new parsonages including one District Parsonage, have been built and substantial sums of money has been spent in retiring debts

and accumulating reserves for future building programs.

Recounting our works along these lines brings us a sense of accomplishment and satisfaction. However, our elation is tempered with a consciousness of greater responsibilities that are ours and the greater things that could be done by a people of our strength and ability. In respect to our stewardship, we are mindful that more of our people are doing bigger things than ever before, as instanced by the gift of Mr. Buhler to Hendrix College. We are also mindful of many unnamed heroes of the faith who stand in their place and give strength and stability to our work with their sacrificial giving "in season and out." By and large, however, it must be confessed that we are giving smally out of a great abundance. The idea of tithing most with galaxy response on the cort of most of our people. of tithing meets with a slow response on the part of most of our people and too few of us have caught the larger demands of life's total interests and resources being fully dedicated in service to Him who is indeed Lord of all.

One of our most significant projects this year has been the work done by our Pension Study Committee. This has been a subject of much concern, thought, and debate among us for a number of years. This committee has now formulated and will present for the consideration of this Conference a definite program that is calculated to be the first step in the direction of undergirding our pension program with substantial reserve fund and also move our Conference more rapidly towards the pension standards of our Church.

As we make this brief glance back over the accomplishments of the past year and sense something of the challenge that is ever present and before us, we both "give thanks and take courage." As we review our experiences of the past and reflect upon those before us, we are reminded of the words of the final testimony of our spiritual Father, "the best of all is, God is with us."

AREA COUNCIL OF ARKANSAS METHODISM

The Area Council setup is Methodism's newest method of correlating and sharing in the creation and promotion of the Area program. Many of the areas now have such a setup. This is true in Missouri to the north of us, Oklahoma to the west of us, and Louisiana to the south of us presents such a program to the Conference this year.

As the Executive Secretary of the Area Council of Arkansas, which organization was formed last June by the two Annual Conferences of Arkansas, I have found great satisfaction in pioneering with my fellow Methodists in this program.

We have made our mistakes. For these, we are sorry. Some of our efforts have accomplished little. In many things, however, we have sensed a forward movement, the reaching out to greater things, the movings of the spirit that bring to us courage and hope and assurance.

We have tried to work with every agency and board and to get a comprehensive picture of the area program so that we could guide each agency in such a way that the least possible overlapping of services might take place. It has been a joy to work with these boards.

I propose to direct this report toward next year's program, but I would like to mention a few things we have done this year.

We began by setting up our office in the Methodist Headquarters

Building at 1723 Broadway, Little Rock.

We have served in making Arkansas a pilot state in helping to locate inactive members and to help them become active in the communities in which they live. This has been a most unselfish effort on the part of the leadership of Arkansas in that it has meant that the churches have lost many members as we have notified communities in other states of the residence of these inactive members. Ordinarily, 60 per cent of the people move within the state in which they live, but in our situation, more than 60 per cent of our people who have moved, moved out of the state. Literally thousands of cards have passed through our office, and we feel that this has been a real program of evangelism in that many people have become active in their new communities.

We rejoiced in the privilege of promoting the Layman's Rally on November 7. The largest group of laymen ever to attend any one meeting in Arkansas gathered at First Methodist Church in Little Rock to be guided

and directed in a most inspiring and informative program.

Our office handled the publicity and the executing of the program for the Bishop's Conference on the Ministry held February 2 in Pulaski Heights Methodist Church in Little Rock. More than 175 young men attended this very important meeting and were given guidance and help as they considered the possibility of the ministry for their life's work.

We have worked closely with the program of evangelism in our state. We have shared in many District, Sub-District and local church meetings as we have dealt with this most important phase of the church program. report in evangelism thrills us. We do rejoice that this year we have changed the tide from the usual net loss in membership to a net gain. The records reveal that we have a net gain of 2361 members in the Area; 1817 in the North Arkansas Conference and in the Little Rock Conference, 549. The report of our Church School enrollment is also encouraging. Little Rock Conference shows an increase of 389 persons in Church School enrollment and an increase in average attendance of 151 persons. The North Arkansas Conference reports a loss of 65 in Church School enrollment and a loss of 31 in average attendance. This gives the Arkansas area an increase of 324 in Church School Enrollment and an increase of 120 in Church School Attendance.

We have launched a study to determine where new churches will be needed in the next ten to twenty years. All communities in Arkansas of over ten thousand population, and I am convinced that many under ten thousand population, will be studied for the purpose of determing where new churches may be needed now, five years from now and even fifteen years from this present time. Districts and communities will be encouraged to purchase land where churches may be established some time within the next fifteen

years.

I am sure that our greatest contribution has been in the realm of helping Arkansas Methodism move as a unit in its program. When 180,000 Methodists launch out in some great endeavor for our Christ "like a mighty army moves the Church of God."

We face next year with eager anticipation. We begin the year with a great emphasis on Christian Education. This program under the able leadership of Dr. Brumley and Dr. Fawcett will be promoted during the first four months of the Conference year climaxing on Sunday, October 7, at which time reports will be made by all local churches telling of their enrollment and attendance. We believe that the Church School is the greatest evangelistic agency in the Church. If we can build the enrollment and attendance of the Church School, then our evangelistic program will develop. Each year this quadrennium, we are holding one big state rally emphasizing some phase of the Church program. Two years ago, we looked at the Commission organization of the church; last year, we considered the layman's work in our program, and next year, we hold a great rally on September 5, dealing with this important matter of Christian Education.

Next year, we celebrate the 225th Anniversary of John Wesley's heartwarming experience on Aldersgate Street. Led by the Council of Bishops of our Church, we hope to make 1963 a great year in the history of Methodism. The Boards of Evangelism have planned for us a great program of evangelism for the Conference year just ahead of us. The area office will give its full cooperation and effort to this evangelistic crusade. I believe that this Aldesgate Witnessing Mission in Arkansas will command the full cooperation and finest effort of every minister and layman in the state. Sub-District meetings, District meetings and a Pastor's Warm Heart Quest for all ministers in the Area are planned. Details of this program are furnished you in the brochures the Boards have provided.

The program of establishing outpost Sunday Schools, the purchase of new lots for future church sites and the establishment of new churches will be one of the major considerations of your area office for next year. Surveys being made of the Methodist Church reveal that our growth in membership depends on our establishment of new units.

We plan to give special attention to recruitment of full time Christian workers. Through the Boards of Ministerial Training, we hope to develop a real recruitment program and set up a system whereby we may keep in touch with life service volunteers encouraging them and helping them to fulfill their calling.

In the field of missions our able leadership in these boards will direct us in accepting more advance specials and to greater World Service giving as we work to educate our people in the privilege and responsibility we have in the missionary task of the Church.

We want to share in the fine work being done in the field of Social Concerns. As a church we must make our voice heard and our influence felt as we come to grips with the vital social issues of our day.

Next year, we propose to share in giving careful consideration to our work in the field of higher education. We want to hold before our people the work of Hendrix College and encourage all our churches to reach and many churches to exceed the \$1.00 per member payment to Hendrix. Our Wesley Foundation Capital Funds program must be held before our people this year that we may finish our task begun two years ago and raise at least the minimum amount suggested, \$517,000.00, for Wesley Foundation buildings on state college campuses in Arkansas. We want to help the Methodists in Arkansas to go beyound the 30 cents per member for Wesley Foundation work which has been our goal. This simply is not enough to operate our program. We join heartily in the recommendations that this amount be raised to 50 cents.

Progress that thrills us is being made in the field of Stewardship and Finance under the capable leadership of the Reverend Elmer Holifield. The financial response to the church program is a statistical salute to this leadership.

We rejoice in the fine progress being made in the Methodist Children's Home. We commend Dr. Moorehead for the fine leadership he is giving in caring for our children. We covet your continued support in this Christian work.

I am grateful for the fine cooperation and help that has been given am grateful for the fine cooperation and help that has been given me in this first year in the Area Council setup. Next year, we hope to have regular meetings of all connectional persons to better plan and promote our program. We are also asking the Conference to hold simultaneous mid-year board meetings that our work may be better correlated and the Pre-Conference Digest prepared with the Area program in mind.

If I can be a good representative of Jesus Christ and help our Church to represent Him well, then the deepest desires of my heart and life will be realized.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1

We recommend that the first four months of the conference year of 1962-63 be a special period of emphasis for enlisting new church school

members and increasing average Sunday School attendance.

That the period of late June through July and August be a time for district or sub-district group meetings in preparation of the following groups: pastors, church school superintendents, chairmen of Commissions on Education, chairmen of Commissions on Evangelism, and superintendents of membership cultivation. That these meetings be conducted with the purpose of giving guidance in the program.

That the month of September be Christian Education Month, with Church School Rally Day being held September 30; and that Christian Edu-

cation Week be September 30-October 7.

That each charge report to the District Superintendent the first of September the plan for increasing church school membership and average attendance, a report on church school prospects and the date for a period

of special emphasis.

That each pastoral charge report to the District Superintendent October 8 the number of persons enrolled in the church school, increase or decrease as compard with the report made to Annual Conference in June; the average Sunday School attendance from June 1 through October 7 indicating gain or loss as compared with the June report; and the Church School Rally Day offering made on Church School Rally Day, the offering being sent to the Conference Board of Education.

That churches and sub-districts be encouraged to plan for as much

leadership training during the summer and fall as seems wise.

That a state-wide rally on Christian education be held in Little Rock on September 5.

That the Children's Workers' Conference be held March 12-14, 1963.

That the annual conference Youth Rally be held April 5, 1963.

That January 1 to Easter be a time for special evangelistic emphasis in our church schools, with special emphasis on classes for membership training for children, youth, and adults.

That a Coaching Conference be held in September using the course on FOUNDATIONS OF CHRISTIAN TEACHING.

That a Camping Conference be held April 23, 24, and 25, 1963.

That special emphasis be placed on Christian vocations; recruitment for the ministry and other full time services in the Methodist Church.

That a committee on camping be set up in each district of which the District Superintendent, the three district age group Christian education leaders, at least one additional minister and one additional layman shall be members.

That local churches be encouraged to plan and conduct local training schools, planning them well in advance of the time to be held so that the applications can be in the Board office a month or more before school be-

That we encourage persons to attend area and jurisdictional opportunities for training and that we assist conference and district leaders in at-

tending leadership school programs at Mt. Sequoyah as finance permits.

That the program of Children's Work, Youth Work, Adult Work, formal and informal training, vacation church schools, camps, coaching conferences, literature cultivation, promotion of Christian Higher Education (Wesley Foundations and Hendrix College), and all general cultivation in terms of Christian education be continued.

That Wesley Foundation funds received from the 30c per member program be apportioned on a basis worked out by the Inter-Conference Com-

mission on College and University Religious Work.

That no funds be paid to Wesley Foundation Centers unless these centers present to the Board of Education nominations for their Foundation

Board of Directors for election by the Annual Conference; and then the funds be paid only to the Treasurer of the Board of Directors.

That the North Arkansas Conference continue its emphasis on the minimum of \$1.00 per member for Hendrix College and 30c per member for Wesley Foundation Work.

That special emphasis be given to completing the Wesley Foundation Building Fund Program during the conference year of 1962-1963.

That the Board of Education cooperate with other boards and agencies in promoting the total conference program: for example, with the conference Board of Evangelism; the conference Board of Ministerial Training; and the Commission on Christian Vocations.

The Conference Board of Education recommends the continuation of the certification of Dr. Ashley Roy Coffman, Miss Edna Earle Massey, Miss Clara Weir, and Mr. Jo Lee Fleming as Ministers of Music; and the continuation of Mr. Robert W. McDaniel as a Director of Music.

That we request the Commission on World Service and Finance for the following apportionments:

BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATION

The Board will conduct its work in harmony with the 1960 Discipline (par. 669-674).

The funds of the Board will be expended in the following way:

Seminary students

The Board will pay 2 scholarships worth \$400. to Perkins

School of Theology to be administered by Perkins.
The Board will pay 2 scholarships worth \$400. to St. Paul's
Theological School to be administered by St. Paul's.

Students in theological schools, accredited or approved by the University Senate, who are working toward the B. D. degree or equivalent, who show need of help may borrow from the Board up to \$210.00 per year. This loan is to be paid back by a year of service in this conference. This loan will be available to the student who signs the following state-

"It is my understanding that the funds of the Ministers' Loan Fund are limited and that I may receive not more than \$105.00 per semester. I further understand that if I remain in, or return to the North Arkansas Conference, after attending seminary that this debt will be repaid at the rate of \$210.00 per service year. In the event I discontinue my training for the ministry, or do not return to the North Arkansas Conference upon graduation from seminary, it is agreed that the amount of this loan will become due at the rate of \$210.00 per year. This first payment will be due at the second annual conference following graduation or discontinuance. If I do not enter the ministry this loan is to bear interest at the rate of 4% per annum from the date of issue."

4. In order to qualify for a loan the student must submit the application for such loan to the Board not later than 30 days after the opening of the school which he is attending.

II. College Students

1. The Board will pay fees and tuition for the college student up to the equivalent of the fees and tuition of the institution which he is attending plus extra fees for courses which are especially helpful to him in his preparation, e. g., speech courses, courses in general science, etc. This help is a loan which will be available to the student who signs the following statement:

"It is my understanding that the funds of the Ministers' Loan Fund are limited and that I may receive not more than the equivalent of the fees and tuition of the school which I attend plus fees for certain helpful courses such as speech, general science, etc. I further understand that if I remain in, or return to the North Arkansas Conference after attending seminary, that this debt will be repaid at the rate per service year of an amount equal to the fees and tuition per year of the institution which I attend. If I discontinue my training for the ministry, or if I do not return to the North Arkansas Conference upon graduation from seminary, it is agreed that per year of the amount received per year. The first the amount of this loan will become due at the rate payment will be due at the second Annual Conference following graduation or discontinuance. If I do not enter the ministry, this loan is to bear interest at the rate of 4% per annum from the date of issue."

2. In order to qualify for a loan the student must submit his application for such loan to the Board not later than 30 days after the opening of the school he is attending.

III. The course of Study Schools

- 1. The men who attend the Course of Study School at Perkins will receive from the Board \$25.00 for the purchase of books. The list of books and their prices are to be sent to the Board Treasurer for payment. Perkins furnishes each man room, board, and 2 cents per mile for one round trip to Dallas.
- 2. The Board will pay \$250.00 to support the St. Paul Theological Course of Study School. The Supply men who attend St. Paul's Course of Study School will receive room and board scholarships from St. Paul's. The Board will give \$25.00 for the purchase of books to each man who attends the St. Paul's school. The list of books and the prices will be sent to the Board Treasurer.
- The books must be paid for by the men themselves who, in turn, will send the list to the treasurer for re-imbursement. They are not to be charged to the treasurer or to the Board.

IV. Correspondence Work

- The Board will pay fees for all men in the courses of study including:
 - (a) license to preach
 - (b) introductory studies
 - (c) the course of study
- The expense of papers re-submitted for grading will be paid by the minister himself.

V. Part-time Approved Supplies

 The Board will pay room and board for part-time approved supplies who attend the Arkansas Pastor's School. The Board urges these men to attend this school.

VI. Recruiting Ministers

- 1. The Board will cooperate in planning for the continuation of the annual Bishop's Conference on the ministry.
- 2. The Board will cooperate with Wesley Foundation Directors in recruitment. Books used in License to Preach studies and in Introductory Studies will be placed in the Wesley Foundation libraries which do not now have them.

VII. Exchange with Little Rock Conference

Loans made to men for educational purposes may be repaid by service years in either the North Arkansas Conference or the Little Rock Conference, providing the Little Rock Conference Board approves a similar exchange policy.

THE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

A. INTRODUCTORY STATEMENT:

Your Commission on World Service and Finance of the North Arkansas Conference has met, or corresponded, with Representatives of all Boards, Commissions, Committees, and Agencies of the Annual Conference, and in seeking to cooperate with them in the furtherance of Christ's work in the churches of the Conference, we respectfully submit for your approval the following recommendations for the Conference year of 1962-63.

B. GENERAL ITEMS:

- We wish to go on record as favoring a joint Treasurer for the North Arkansas and the Little Rock Annual Conferences, and we recommend that Mr. Grafton Thomas of Searcy, Arkansas be elected to that office for the Conference Year 1962-63.
- 2. We recommend that the North Arkansas Conference contribute \$7,500.00 to this Office.
- 3. We recommend that the Treasurer be selected by a committee of of the two World Service and Finance Commissions, three members from each Annual Conference to serve on the committee, selected by the chairman and including the chairman of each World Service Commission. The recommendation of this committee shall be subject to the approval of the two World Service and Finance Commissions.
- We recommend that a job analysis be worked out by the joint committee which shall set up satisfactory identical procedure for the two Conferences.
- 5. We recommend that the executive committees of the two Conference Commissions on World Service and Finance supervise the work of the Treasurer subject to the approval of both World Service Commissions.
- 6. We recommend that an assistant be employed by the Treasurer and that the Treasurer have the privilege of determining who the person shall be.
- 7. We recommend that the North Arkansas Conference carry a bond on the Treasurer in the amount of \$125,000.00.

- 8. The Treasurer's office, Methodist Headquarters Building, 1723 Broadway, Little Rock, Arkansas, shall receive and disburse the following funds in compliance with the directives of the Annual Conference: World Service, Episcopal Fund, District Superintendents' Fund, Conference Claimants' Fund, Minimum Salary Fund, General Administration Fund, Jurisdictional, Area, and Conference Administration Funds, Interdenominational Co-operation Fund, World Service Specials, General Advance Specials, Conference Advance Specials, The One Great Hour of Sharing, Fellowship of Suffering and Service, Television Ministry Fund, Methodist Student Day, Methodist Youth Fund, Race Relations Day, Wesley Foundation Fund, Higher Education Offering for Hendrix College, Golden Cross Fund, Race Relations Day Offering, Methodist Hospital Building Fund, Church Extension Shares, the Arkansas Christian Civic Foundation, Inc. Fund, and any other fund or funds which may be specifically directed by the Annual Conference or the World Service and Finance Commission. The depositories for all Funds are to be included in the Treasurer's report to the Annual Conference.
- The following Conference funds are to be sent to the office of the person herein designated:
 - (1) Arkansas Methodist Children's Home, Christmas Offering and other special offerings, to the office of the Superintendent, 2002 Fillmore Street, Little Rock, Arkansas.
 - (2) Woman's Society of Christian Service Funds to Mrs. William Hall, Widener, Arkansas.
 - (3) Arkansas Methodist subscriptions to P. O. Box 3547, Little Rock, Arkansas.
 - (4) District Fund to the designated District Treasurer.
 - (5) Church School Rally Day Offering to the Executive Secretary, Board of Education, Hendrix College, Conway, Arkansas.

of \$10.00 from every Pastorial Charge, and that additional personal gifts be encouraged. We recommend that every local church include the Western Methodist Assembly in its budget Planning. That the Annual Conference continue to support the Arkansas State Council of Churches in the amount of \$2,430.00.

JOINT COMMISSION FOR THE ARKANSAS METHODIST AND THE LOUISIANA METHODIST

Recommendations

We make the following recommendations to the Annual Conferences:

That the Circulation Campaign for 1963 be held during the week of January 6 to 13.

That the campaign goal for 1963 be 400,000 for the two papers with the quotas based on one subscription for each seven members in the local church.

That the subscription price be continued at \$2.00 per year with the provision that where a church secures subscription list equal to one for each three members the rate will be \$1.50.

That local churches be encouraged to include the papers in their budgets and to send them to every family on their mailing lists. In such case payments could be made monthly or quarterly.
That the North Arkansas, Little Rock and Louisiana Annual

Conferences each be requested to apportion \$4,600 per year from benevolences for the support of the papers.

That the back page arrangement with local churches be continued, provided that any new contracts be on the basis of actual cost.

That the executive committee be authorized to act for the (7)commission in matters which seem to require action between meeting of the whole commission.

That the editor and chairman of the commission be authorized to sign notes at the Union National Bank for money that must be borrowed for current operation.

That the appreciation of the commission be expressed to those many persons whose cooperation has made possible the progress of the past year. This includes Bishop W. Ken-neth Pope, Bishop Aubrey G. Walton, the 21 district super-intendents of Arkansas and Louisiana and all the pastors and laymen who have worked in the interest of the papers during the year.

(10) We request that the Rev. Alfred A. Knox be reappointed

as editor and business manager.

THE BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

We recommend that the budget of this board remain the same as last year of 8.43% of World Service funds plus \$400.00 additional granted by the World Service Commission. That the salary, travel expense, annuity, and insurance premiums of the Booneville Sanatorium chaplain, board chairman expense, conference Golden Cross director's expense and expenses of the board members be deducted from this sum and the remainder be dispensed as follows: 42% to the Methodist Children's Home in Little Rock and 58% to the Methodist Hospital in Memphis.

We recommend that the second Sunday in March be designated as Hospital and Homes Sunday. We urge the continued support of the Children's Home through the Christmas offering.

We recommend the election of the following as trustees of the Methodist Hospital in Memphis: Mrs. Tom Tucker, J. Frank Fogleman, H. K. Barwick, Jr., Dan Portis, Hubert Pearce and Harold Womack.

We recommend the election of the following as trustees of the Methodist Children's Home, terms to expire in 1965: Homer H. Fulbright, Earl Hughes, James R. Chandler, and A. P. McKeithen.

We recommend the election of the following as trustees of the Methodist Nursing Home of Fort Smith, terms to expire in 1965; W. P. Connell, Jack Ragon and Dr. Harold Wright.

We further recommend that Bishop W. Kenneth Pope be elected as ex-officio trustee of the Methodist Hospital in Memphis and the Methodist Nursing Home of Fort Smith and that the District Superintendent of the Fort Smith District be elected as an ex-officio trustee of the Methodist

Nursing Home of Fort Smith.

We recommend that the trustees of the Methodist Home of Fort Smith be granted permission to construct a wing to their present building so as to provide space for 20 more persons. The cost of this construction to be paid for as follows: 50% by the institution and 50% Hill-Burton funds. The estimated cost is \$90,000.00. We further recommend that permission be granted the trustees to refurnish the two brick buildings which were a part of a previous institution so that these buildings may be used for ambulatory residents of the Home. That permission be granted to solicit funds for this work the cost of which is not to exceed \$30,000.00.

We recommend that Harvey Hazelwood be elected as Conference Gold-

en Cross Director.

We recommend the fine work of Dr. Connor Morehead, superintendent of the Methodist Children's home; Mr. J. M. Crews, administrator of the Methodist Hospital; Mrs. Idavonne Rosa, administrator of the Methodist Nursing Home, and Chaplain Bates Sturdy.

Your Committee on Publishing Interests submits the following report: Methodist with the warm heart has long been our proud trade-mark, but we have along with the warm heart also believed in the alert trained mind. Herein lies the story of our Methodist Publishing House.

We feel that the following items should be called to your attention. This year some 800 new libraries have been registered in the Church Library program. This brings the total number to over 8,000 registered church libraries.

A total of 5,300,000 books were printed and bound in our print shops. Twenty-one new children's books were published making a total of 193

Abingdon childrens books now available.

Methodisms family magazine continues to gain the acclaim of the library critics across the nation. Its editors are charged with the responsibility of supplying information about the church in an interesting and colorful way. In 1961, Together showed circulation of 908,901. The North Arkansas Conference lists 1820 subscribers. Let us make a more deligent

effort to place Together in every home.

The Interpreter's Bible has afforded us a quick source of information and new insight again and again in the preparing our hearts and minds for the tasks that are ours. Now we anxiously await The Interpreter's Dictionary of the Bible; the first complete English dictionary of the Bible in more than fifty years. The four volumes with over 7,500 entries will be available in October.

Let us remember the Methodist Publishing House exists to serve the needs of Methodism and is ready to serve the Church at every level of its work.

TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION

The opportunities of service for TRAFCO in each of its three fields of

service—Television, Radio, and Audio-visuals—continue a rapid growth.

General TRAFCO, which did so well with THE PASTOR, THE WAY and TALKBACK has completed its fourth - and greatest - series of TV programs. It is the new Children's series known as BREAKTHRU. cost of production was something over \$400,000.00.

The films of this series will be released to the television stations after

the churches in the viewing area have given it suitable publicity and have made arrangements for its thorough utilization in the families of the chil-

dren in the churches.

Station KFSA-TV, which is the only television station within the bounds of the North Arkansas Conference, has arranged to place the program as soon as these requirements are met.

It is hoped that the ministers within the viewing areas of other stations will watch for the announcements and utilize this fine program in

their work.

In the area of Audio-visuals plans had been begun for the long-range development of a film library. However a suggestion has come from the Area Council that this be done on an area basis. Possibilities of this are

being studied by the commissions of each conference.

In January we purchased three 16mm sound films that are part of our current church program. They were DAY FOR WITNESS, SKIPPY AND THE FOURTH R, and MORE THAN WORDS. These, in addition to the films we already had of IMMORTAL LOVE have been used at least once a week since that time. We hope to purchase other films to go with our 1962-63 program.

We continue to insist that our pastors make an increasing use of the local radio stations in the promotion of their program.

MINIMUM SALARY COMMISSION

The Commission on Minimum Salary shall be composed of one minister and one layman from each district of the conference, and including representatives from urban, village, and rural churches. This Commission shall elect quadrennially a president, vice-president and secretary to perform the usual duties of such offices. These officers shall also compose the Executive Committee of the Commission. Whenever a vacancy occurs on the Commission between sessions of the Annual Conference, the vacancy shall be filled by the District Superintendent of the District involved.

Charges may become eligible to receive salary aid for the pastor from

minimum salary fund by meeting the following requirements:

1. Conduct an Every Member Program on Stewardship following the procedure outlined by the Town and Country Commission.

2. File with the District Superintendent and the Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission.

a. A report of the Every Member Stewardship Program.

b. A budget of each church approved by the Official Board.

c. An application for minimum salary assistance.

3. Each charge shall be encouraged to increase the salary \$100.00 a year. No charge shall be eligible to receive salary aid if there is a reduction in salary or travel expense.
4. Plans for a Larger Parish Program shall be presented to the Com-

mission for approval and for funds to be received.

5. All pro-rated connectional claims shall be paid by the charge to be 1960 Disicipline, Paragraph 823.6. Minimum Salary Charges shall be grouped as follows:

- Type A-At least four churches with a membership of 300. Pastors preach three times on Sunday. Salary, travel expense, mission aid and minimum salary not to exceed \$4,200. Where there are four churches on a charge and they merge to form three churches, they shall qualify for the same amount as a charge with four churches.
- Type B-At least three churches with salary, travel expense, mission aid and Minimum Salary aid not to exceed \$3,600.
- Type C-Student pastors married, at least three churches, salary, travel expense, mission and minimum salary aid not to exceed \$3,000. Student pastors single, at least three churches, salary, travel expense, mission and minimum salary aid not to exceed \$2,400. Minimum Salary Charges must be composed of at least three churches with salary and travel expense as much as \$1,800.

Maximum Schedule Allowances: Student Single \$500 Student Married \$600 **Fulltime** \$700

Ministers with dependent children eighteen years of age and under may draw \$100.00 for each child without reference to the above schedule of allowances and salary levels.

7. Payment from this fund are made without regard to the amount the pastor receives from pension or educational funds. No part-time pastor is eligible to receive minimum salary aid.

8. In the event the income of the fund becomes insufficient to meet the claims upon it each claimant shall benefit in his proportionate share of the available fund.

9. An amount not to exceed a total of \$500 shall be allowed from this fund on the expenses of men serving minimum salary charges to attend the Rural Seminar July 9-12, 1962.

10. Exceptions to the above requirement may be made by the Commis-

11. If a charge becomes qualified as a minimum salary charge within the first three months of the conference year the effect becomes retroactive to the beginning of the conference year.

12. All pastors and charges shall be asked to pay into the Minimum Sal-

ary Aid Fund according to the following schedule:

Connectional men shall be invited to voluntarily pay through the Con-

13. The Bishop and the District Superintendents, the Town and Country Commission and the Commission on Minimum Salary shall work out a pattern of Enlarged Charge arrangements. The Conference, and all concerned, shall begin immediately to work to achieve these arrangements within the next five years.

The executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission shall

serve in an advisory capacity to the Commission on Minimum Sal-

ary. (1960 Discipline, Paragraph 1231, 1) Hospital and Group Life Insurance premiums of pastors serving minimum salary charges shall be paid their share from this fund.

COMMITTEE ON GROUP INSURANCE

Report No. 1

Group Life Insurance

1. All members of the North Arkansas Conference, except students serving appointments in conferences which themselves have compulsory insurance program, every approved supply pastor receiving an appointment, and every full time lay employee of the North Arkansas Conference shall participate in the North Arkansas Conference Group Life Insurance Plan subject to its laws and regulations.

Annual premiums shall be paid by charges and participants at the premium rate of 50 cents per thousand per month for participants

and 75 cents per month for charges:

3. Annual premiums shall be paid by participants and charges and collected through district organizations.

- 4. District treasurers of the Life Insurance shall send the district reports and premiums to the Conference Treasurer by February 1, 1962.
- 5. No man who retired before February 18, 1948, even though he had served as a supply since, shall be eligible for insurance.
- 6. Members of the Conference who retire will have \$1,000 Life Insurance carried for them with the premium paid by the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions, except in the case of those who continue to serve as supplies, and these persons shall pay the premium in accordance with the above listed schedule.
- Approved supplies whose annuity claims are approved by the Conference will have \$1,000 Life Insurance carried for them, with the premium paid by the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions.
- Members of the North Arkansas Conference who are left without appointment to attend school, who do not serve a charge, shall carry \$1,000 Life Insurance and pay the annual premium of \$6.00, and the North Arkansas Conference Board of Ministerial Training will pay the remaining \$9.00.
- Those who are not now participating in our Group Life Insurance Plan who will be participating under the provisions of this report shall pay two-thirds (2/3) of the annual premium, according to above listed schedule, by July 1, 1962.
- There is an increased cost of \$.71 per thousand on Group Life Insurance due to an increase in the average age of participating ministers. However, dividends accumulated will allow us to maintain the present premiums actually paid by the church and the minister.

Report No. 2

In our Pre-Conference Journal report we stated that our committee was in the process of contacting a number of insurance companies asking for bids on hospitalization insurance. This was felt necessary in light of the general and increasing pressure and complaints from ministers in our Conference with reference to our present policy rates and coverage. Since our pre-conference with reterence to our present poincy rates and coverage. Since our pre-conference report we have been advised of a forth coming premium increase of about nineteen percent by Jun 15, 1962. Not to question the justification of the increase we did feel, however, that we were faced with a possible rejection of our present program by the conference, thus losing our coverage altogether. Also, we wanted to keep faith by making good our promise to investigate other possibilities.

We have received bids from several companies, and we labored at

length to present the best possible program to the conference. For reasons we will be glad to elaborate on we recommend acceptance of the Blue Cross Blue Shield plan. We believe it to be the best offer in light of our needs.

We further make the following recommendations:

1. Members of the Conference who retired at the 1958 session of the Annual Conference and those retiring at any date thereafter will have the Conference Hospitalization Policy carried for them with premiums paid by the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions except those who continue to serve as supplies and these shall pay the premium in accordance with the established schedule.

Retired approved supplies whose annuity claims are approved by the Conference and who meet qualifications set by the Board of Pensions shall have the Conference Hospitalization Policy carried for them with premiums paid by the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions.

Widows and dependents of claimants mentioned in 1 and 2 above will have premiums paid by the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions.

- 4. The first quarterly payment is due and payable June 15, 1962, and all funds must be remitted by the District treasurers to the Conference Treasurer by July 10, 1962.
- 5. The Blue Cross Blue Shield rates issued by the Conference will be as follows:
- 6. Single Employee ______\$ 69.00
 Employee and One Dependent ______ 153.00
 Employee, Wife and 1 or more children ______ 153.00

These premiums are to be shared equally by the ministers and the churches.

- 7. The group hospitalization program be placed on the same level of importance as our group life insurance program in that it become mandatory for each minister in the conference to participate. Otherwise, our hospitalization coverage will always be in jeopardy. Exceptions to this rule will be persons with no annuity claims on the conference, and students not serving a charge in the bounds of the conference.
- 8. Some employees now hold a Blue Cross, Blue Shield policy. Since they have an option to continue under their present coverage, we recommend that the churches involved assume an amount equal to no more than 50% of the appropriate premium listed in the proposed policy.

This shows an increase of 12 over currently chartered groups for the same time last year. Seven new groups have been started with five others getting out of the delinquent class. Four groups are in various stages of organization at this time. (March 15)

There were 138 registrations for our Fifth Annual Conference Meeting or Retreat held on Mount Petit Jean August 4-5. The total registration was a little under the year before but with a larger percentage spending the entire time at the meeting. Matt Ellis, John Moore and Joe Pierce assembled an excellent program resulting in a most informative and inspirational meeting. A similar meeting is planned for this summer, using the same location with the dates being August 11-12. We are hoping for an increase in attendance from each district.

Laymen's Day, October 21, saw an increase in participation by the laymen in all the districts. We will continue to work toward an improvement of this phase of our program; our goal being that of having two laymen in every pulpit in the Conference on Laymen's Day. This will be October 14 this year. We acknowledge and appreciate the excellent help given by the Ministers in this part of our program.

Many districts are giving excellent assistance to the District Superintendents by filling vacant pulpits. This work is being done in co-operation with the local pastor, giving support to the total program of the Church. The Batesville District is setting an excellent example of this, planning three month schedules, printing them and getting them out well ahead of assignment dates. Reports are coming in confirming the fact that some of our laymen are availing themselves of the opportunity to become Certified Lay Speakers as provided by the 1960 Discipline.

On June 29-July 1 there will be a Jurisdictional Workshop of Lay Activities for Conference and District Lay Leaders at Mt. Sequoyah. As this important meeting is within the bounds of our Conference we are hoping that we will have complete attendance of these conference leaders at this meeting. Our Board has approved paying the expenses of those attending.

We wish to urge the use of the Methodist Layman. In its new format, it is second to none in church publications. Complete suggested programs for monthly meetings of Methodist Men are always included as well as inspirational articles from laymen and ministers throughout the Church. \$3.00 for an individual subscription; \$2.00 each in clubs of five or more to one address. Include this in the budget of your Methodist Men and see that each member receives a copy each month. Complete support is to be given to the Arkansas Methodist, The Christian Advocate and other church

papers and magazines.

At its annual Mid-Winter meeting, the Board unanimously approved the following nominations to be presented to the Annual Conference in June: For Conference Lay Leader — E. Clay Bumpers; for Associate Conference Lay Leaders — Matt L. Ellis, John G. Moore and Joe S. Pierce. Also, at this meeting the Board approved the budget for the coming Conference Year and authorized a request to the Commission on World Service and Finance for an appropriation of \$1,500.00. As the General Board of Lay Activities is discontinuing the mailing of free copies of the Methodist Layman to members of this Board with the close of this Conference Year, it was unanimously decided that this expense should be included in our budget. Although we will have an expected increase in our expenses of three or four hundred dollars for another year, with our balance we will be able to carry forward, we feel that the above request will take care of our needs.

During the remainder of this Quadrennium special emphasis is to be given to Stewardship and Tithing and members of the General Board will be invited to share this program with us. Special dates are to be selected

working toward a coordinated effort throughout the conference.

We urge a continuance and deeply appreciate the cooperation of the ministers of our conference. Working together great things can be accomplished, not only in the program of Lay Activities, but in the entire program of our church.

CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Recommendation of the Board of Trustees of the North Arkansas An-

nual Conference of the Methodist Church.

This recommendation of the Board of Trustees of the Annual Conference has to do only with a bequest made in the last will and testament of Kate V. Nelson, deceased.

The pertinent fact are these:

1. The late Kate V. Nelson in her last will and testament bequeathed to the North Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Church a house and the lot on which it is located together with an adjacent vacant lot in the City of Atkins, Arkansas, and \$1000.00.

1. The will stipulated that the \$100.00 is to be used for repair and maintenance of the property, and that the property is to be used as a home

for retired Methodist ministers.

3. The will further provides that after certain provisions are made, the residue of the property will go to the Conway District of the Methodist Church with one-half of said residue to be used to aid rural churches of the district and one-half to be used in the financial assistance of retired ministers and their wives.

4. This matter was presented to the Board of Trustees of the Conference at a meeting in Little Rock in November of 1961, and inasmuch as the Conference has found maintenance of such homes impractical in other situations, a special committee composed of Robert H. Williams, as attorney in Russellville, the Reverend George G. Meyer, and David P. Conyers, was appointed by the Board to investigate the situation and to make a recommendation to the Board concerning this bequest.

5. Finding the property to be in a bad state of repair, being of the opinion that to repair the property would involve expense considerably beyond the \$1000.00 provided by the will, and knowing that if this bequest be rejected, it would become a part of the residue of the estate and go to the Conway District, the committee recommended to the Board of Trustees, and the Board recommends to the Annual Conference that this bequest be rejected.

1962-63—THE ALDERSGATE YEAR

"I felt my heart strangely warmed." Wesley

In view of the fact that 1963 has been designated by the Council of Bishops of the Methodist Church as ALDERSGATE YEAR for the celebration of the 225th anniversary of John Wesley's experience of the warmheart, the Boards of Evangelism of the Arkansas Area have united in planning a special emphasis on Evangelism which will be called the ALDERSGATE WITNESS MISSION. The plans and goals are set forth as follows:

I. THE PLAN OF SPIRITUAL PREPARATION.

The most vital part of this strategy is not the weeks of simultaneous preaching, although we trust every church and preacher of the conference will cooperate with this phase of the program. . . . It is not a committee alignment which will be suggested even though we all know that the success of any such effort will require the dedicated work of many committees. The most important part of the plan is that which is designated: "Spiritual Preparation Committee" on the Conference, District, and Local levels. On a local level this committee will be designated as

Prayer Committees.

This is how is will work. . .

First of all, the ministers of the conference will be brought together in small groups for fellowship, prayer, and study of the Book of Romans. They, in turn, will lead their respective churches in becoming involved in the same sort of activity. We believe this method will lead us to a Spiritual Renewal in our day. It is being included in this strategy for the specific purpose of leading us to an ALDERSGATE EXPERIENCE. This peak is vital to a satisfying revival.

Specific recommendations concerning various ways this can be done will be placed in the hands of the ministers prior to July 1, 1962.

-To broaden our understanding of the experience of the "Warm-heart"

and its effect in our own Christian Discipleship.

-To find and, under God's guidance and help, to win others to a saving knowledge of Christ.

-To strengthen our loyalty to the Church.

-To build our morale in the field of evangelism by dramatizing to ourselves and demonstrating to others, the continuing concern of Methodism for the souls of men.

RECOMMENDATION:

We recommend that the Book of Romans be used for intensive study by all groups—a study of the Book and not about the Book. All the great Reformation and Evangelistic movements of Christianity have found their inspiration in this Book; such as—Augustine, Luther, Wesley, etc.

WE FURTHER RECOMMEND:

-The program of evangelism in the local church be organized and

functioning in every local church.

The full cooperation with the Board of Education in their efforts for evangelism through the Church School in which they have offered to assist us in the period of preparation for the ALDERSGATE YEAR.

THE BOARD OF PENSIONS

A. Distribution:

Fulfilling our responsibility as the Conference Board of Pensions, we have authorized the payment of claims as follows:

- To 63 members retired by North Arkansas Conference, with a total of 1899 service years.
- To 66 members retired by other conferences with a total of 350 service vears.
- To 74 widows of members retired by North Arkansas Conference with a total of 1656 service years.
- To 74 widows of members retired by other conferences with a total of 515 service years.
- To 13 children of deceased ministers of North Arkansas Conference with 95 service years.
- To 14 approved supply pastors of North Arkansas Conference with 127 service years.
- To 8 widows of approved supply pastors of North Arkansas Conference with 111 service years.
- To 1 child of deceased approved supply pastor with 5 service years. We have a total of 313 claimants with 4758 years of service.

These annuity claims have been paid on the basis of the following rates established by the annual conference:

Payment of these annuities is made by the General Board of Pensions as a service to the Annual Conference.

B. RESPONSIBILITIES:

Other services rendered by the Board of Pensions:

I. Eight retirment benefits at \$300.00 each. Total \$2400.00

- II. One necessitious allowance grant. Total \$100.00

 III. Four death benefits at \$200.00 each. Total \$800.00

 IV. Premiums in the amount of \$2,101.61 for 17 claimants eligible for Group Hospitalization Insurance coverage.
- V. Premuims in the amount of \$540.00 for 36 claimants eligible for Group Life Insurance Coverage.

C. RECOMMENDATIONS:

- We recommend that the annuity rate be set at \$42.00 per year of service for retired members and \$29.40 per year of service for special conference claimants.
- We recommend that the apportionment to the charges for Conference Claimants be an amount equal to 17 per cent of the pastor's salary.
- We recommend that each minister appointed by the Conference with annuity claim on the conference shall contribute annually to the conference claimants fund an amount equal to the following

percentages of his total salary which shall include minimum salary and missionary appropriations:

That there be organized from the membership of the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions a committee on proportional payment of ministerial support for the purpose of comparing records of amounts paid on support of pastors and conference claimants by each pastoral charge and by each minister, computing the proportional distribution thereof and keeping a permanent record of refaults. In event of default by either pastor or charge, after due notification by the committee, liens shall be filed against future pensions, and the name and amount of the default shall be printed in the Annual Conference Journal (Par. 1624 and Par. 1634 of 1960 Discipline)

That the Secretary of the Annual Conference be requested to print in the Conference Journal individual amounts paid by pastors dur-

ing the year to the Conference Claimants fund.

That necessitous Allowance grants, retirement and death benefit payments, and local expenses of the Board be paid by the Treasurer, subject to approval by the Executive Committee of the Conference Board of Pensions and 1960 Discipline (Par. 1611.10 and Par. 1625.2).

That the regular annuity payments be made monthly in advance to the Conference Claimants from the office of the General Board

of Pensions, Chicago, on the first day of each month.

That in accordance with the generally accepted principle of the Church, the institution, board or organization, paying the salary of a minister on special appointment without annuity claim on the Conference shall make provisions for the pensions of such person.

That there be apportioned to each agency and institution served by a ministerial member of the Conference under special appointment, with annuity claim on the Conference, the sum of \$360.00 for the Conference year 1962-63, in accordance with Paragraph 1623, section 7 of the 1960 Discipline; and that said apportionment be paid prior to June 1, 1963; and that this money be paid to the Treasurer of the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions.

That as a matter of policy, this Board will not make any retroactive settlements prior to the year in which a claim is approved by our Board, except that in the case of men who have been serving in the capacity of Chaplain, and that notice for any claim for years

of service shall be made in writing.

That it shall be the policy of the Board in determining years of service, that after careful examination those years listed by the XIII. Journal shall be accepted as valid years; except that any years in question shall be subject to validation by applicant and by approval

of Board and Conference.

That the Treasurer of the Board of Pensions of the North Arkansas Conference be paid \$300.00 for administrative work during the year 1962-63. We recommend that the Rev. George G. Meyer be designed as the Treasurer of the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions in accordance with the provisions of Par. 1611.4 of the 1960 Discipline.

That the Executive Committee elected by the Board be designated

in the Journal with the roster of the Board of Pensions.

That all Approved Supply Pastors comply with the request of the Conference Secretary and the Board of Pensions Secretary in supplying all information and data necessary in supplying a service record of all Approved Supply Pastors — to be printed and maintained in the Journal of the North Arkansas Conference. XVI.

That, at the suggestion of the Bishop and the Cabinet, the vote on the proposed pension program be postponed until the 1963 Session of the North Arkansas Conference; provided, however, that the proposed pension program shall, (as may be amended after further study) be recommended and voted upon by the 1963 Annual Conference and, if approved, made effective in 1963-64; and, provided furthermore, that a series of District Pension Study Meetings for both laymen and ministers be conducted in all districts prior to the 1962-63 District Conferences; and provided, furthermore, that the said District Pension Study Meetings be under the direction of the District Superintendents and the Conference Board of Pensions.

Eligible Conference claimants and special conference claimants of the Conference will have their Conference Group Life and Hospitalization Insurance carried for them with the premiums paid by the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions in accordance with the program of the Committee on Group Insurance

of the North Arkansas Conference.

PROPOSED PENSION PROGRAM

(1) The Current Income Program continued for previous entrants with a goal of a Minimum Annuity Rate of 1% of the average salary of

the Conference.

(2) An additional 3% apportionment to the churches for 20 years, the income from which shall be invested in an unrestricted Endowment Fund, the earnings from which shall be used to reach and maintain the goal of the Minimum Annuity Rate under the Current Income Program. The total apportionment to the charges, will be an amount equal to 20% of the Pastor's Salary, an increase of 3%.

(3) An assessment of 2% of total cash salary for 20 years to all

ministers who are appointed with annuity claim on the North Arkansas Conference, the income from which shall be invested in an unrestricted Endowment Fund, the earnings from which shall be used to reach and maintain the goal of the minimum Annuity Rate under the Current Income Program. The total assessment to the ministers will be 2% of the total cash salary, an increase of 11/2, 1, or 1/2% depending on the percentage now paid under the present scale.

(4) At the end of the twenty-year program, the Endowment Fund (approximately \$800,000) may be used for an initial reserve for the New Entrants Program or down-payment for the full transition program in the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund, or, may be retained in the Endowment

Fund.

The cost of reaching, and maintaining the Minimum Annuity **(5)** Rate of the Conference shall be met by using the earnings from the Endowment Fund; provided, however, that when the earnings from the Endowment Fund are sufficient to reach and maintain the Minimum Annuity Rate of 1% of the average salary of the Conference, the surplus earnings shall be invested in the Endowment Fund.

(6) That the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions conduct a vigorous program to encourage Methodists to place the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions before the various local church committees

on wills and legacies.

We recommend the adoption of this Proposed Pension Program at the North Arkansas Annual Conference June 1962 and for this program to be inaugurated in June 1963 for the 1963-64 Conference Year.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

In order that our witness may be more effective in the areas of Peace and World Order, Temperance and General Welfare, and Human Relations and Economic Affairs, the Board of Christian Social Concerns makes the following recommendations:

Division Of Peace And World Order

A. On the Annual Conference level we recommend:

1. that an Area Convocation on the "Race for Peace" be planned

with the Little Rock Conference.

that the Conference Board continue to plan for a United Nations Seminar during the quadrennium, and cooperate with area, district and local groups planning M. Y. F. United Nation Seminars.

that the Board of Managers of the Arkansas Pastor's School give consideration to the inclusion in the school of a course

relating to peace and world order.

4. that the program of the annual Laymen's Retreat include a review of the official statement of The Methodist Church relating to peace and world order, with particular emphasis this that the Board of Education strive to qualify more persons to teach the course "Christian Action for World Order."

B. On the Local Church level we recommend:

1. the observance of World Order Sunday, October 21, 1962.

participation in United Nations Day observances.
participation in community Trick or Treat for UNICEF programs.

the use by local churches of the study books Peace and Power and None Shall Make Them Afraid, published by the General Board of Christian Social Concerns.

the use in local and area training schools of the course "Christ-

ian Action for World Order."

6. that local church commissions express their convictions on issues relating to peace and world order to state and national

representatives.

7. that local church commissions seek to enlarge the horizons of concern over the vital issues of this Division, using every opportunity offered by church or community (such as Great Decisions study)

that local church commissions publicize the official statements of the Methodist Church as found in the Social Creed and in

the Discipline (pars. 2020 and 2024).

We emphasize the responsibility of the Christian to have an informed and urgent concern over the many issues relating to international peace and order. Among many critical areas for such responsibility are the following:

- We call attention to the priority given by the General Board to the "Race for Peace pro-1. Disarmament: gram and urge its diligent promotion.
- 2. Nuclear Testing: We repeat the warnings of scientists and statesmen to the dangers inherent in continued testing and urge continued efforts to be made toward international multilateral cessation of such weapons tests.

- Educational and Cultural Exchanges: We favor such exchanges with the nations of the world in order that international understanding may be furthered.
- United Nations: We urge continued support of the United Nations as the "best political hope for peace" and of Christ, His gospel, and His church as our best hope for world order, brotherhood and
- International Communism: We appeal for an awakened con-cern over the dangers of Communism and urge the use by local churches of the study being prepared by the General Board to aid in promoting intelligent anti-communism.
- The National Council and World Council of Churches: We urge attention to pars. 1594 and 1959 of the 1960 Discipline stating the relationship of the Methodist Church to these Councils. We urge that Methodists inform themselves on the work of these and other agencies that are working for greater cooperation and harmony and understanding between all Christians; and that they give strong witness to all legitimate and Christian efforts to aid mankind on behalf of a united Christendom.

DIVISION OF TEMPERANCE AND GENERAL WELFARE

We recommend the following in view of existing needs within this area of concern:

We are concerned about the persons who have become alcoholics, about the prevalence of the disease, and about the help the clergy needs in ministering to these sick persons. We recommend that a course be offered in Pastor's School on counseling in this field. That pastors cooperate in the ministry to alcoholics through local

Alcoholics Anonymous groups.

That pastors take recognition of the yearly alcohol program, Clergyman's Seminar, sponsored by the Arkansas Commission on Alcoholism, and that each pastor try to attend.

That a scholarship be given to a member of the North Arkansas Conference to attend Rutgers School of Alcohol Studies (formerly

That local churches support programs of education on the prob-

lems related to alcohol. Specifically we would call attention to the work done by the Christian Civic Foundation in public schools. That December 2. 1962 be observed as Commitment Day in the local church in keeping with the General Conference action establishing the Commitment Day in the local church in keeping with the General Conference action establishing the Commitment Day of the Commitmen lishing Commitment Day as a church-wide observance; and that each pastor secure the related materials and distribute them to the people of his charge.

That each pastor include materials in his preparatory membership classes on the subjects of alcohol, pornography, narcotics, gambling and smoking as they relate to the Christian faith.

That study courses be continued in churches, area training schools and youth camps. The course on "Compassion and Community" recommended. To assist in youth camps, training schools and assemblies, this Board will furnish related materials not to exceed

a total of \$200.00. Materials may be secured by listing needs and ordering them from Byron McSpadden, Division Chairman. Plenty of time to secure materials should be given in program planning.

That each pastor be on guard in relation to the many issues arising in the community which lead our young people into gambling. Many activities are going under the disguise of worthy causes and are sponsored by legitimate organizations.

That our conference be alert to the problems which arise from the lack of planned parenthood and that we seek to accept some re-

sponsibility in this field.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT

Addition Number One

We heartily concur with those groups who have pointed out the inconsistency with Christian principles as exhibited in the "reverse freedom rides." These actions stand as a denial of the Christian and democratic principles of our society. They have brought embarrassment upon the people of Arkansas.

We repudiate any conduct which degrades the individual by using him

as an object of personal or political gain and noteriety.

Addition Number Two

In view of the fact that 1962 is a General Election year we call upon our membership to exercise the privilege of the vote as those who are responsible Christian citizens handling a sacred trust. We urge Methodist Christians to accept the following disciplines:

1. —that they be intelligently informed on issues relevant to the cam-

paigns.

-that they confront candidates with any of their statements, positions, or platform "planks" which are inconsistent with Christian

morality and ethics.

3. —that they labor earnestly and pray fervently to the end that Christian principles be expressed in all life, thereby giving witness that the committed Christian makes no dintinction between the sacred and the secular, but rather seeks to live the whole of life as an expression of his Christian witness.

4. —and that their own personal social example be a clear and unmistakeable expression of, and a vigorous response by, lives which have been redeemed by God's saving grace in His Son, our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

It is always with a deep sense of humility that I bring the report of the work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Serv-ice Guild to the Annual Conference. My feeling of inadequacy for the task and my knowledge of my shortcomings as President are seasoned with joy and thankfulness for the opportunity that is mine to serve in this capacity, sharing my life with those who serve in this the largest organization of Christian women in the world—The Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild.

Fourteen thousand members of the North Arkansas Conference W.S.C.S. and W.S.G. set our mind, heart, and energies to renew the springs of our faith and to engage in spiritual discipline and discoveries to make Jesus

Christ the Lord of every phase of our life during 1961-62.

The Quadrennial emphasis "Our Mission Today" has been to continue to unfold a program that unites us in witness and service and strengthens the local church while we serve around the world - A program that develops the spiritual life — A program that studies the needs of the world and improves conditions of the community, nation and world—A program that recruits workers for home and abroad—A program that secures funds for the support of the work throughout the earth.

To be united in witness and service is to be organized, and our annual report shows that we have only 274 of the 513 churches in the Conference with an organization of the Woman's Society or Guild. This is a point of great concern for Conference and District leaders. What of the other 239 churches? We know that a great many of these are small churches in rural areas with membership greatly scattered and yet we cannot excuse ourselves at this point, when we have such an excellent plan for the small

society and the circuit society. Our concern is for the many who are untouched. They need the challenge, the fellowship and the sharing that comes with membership in the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

We call upon the District Superintendents and Pastors to help us as we seek new ways in meeting the needs of the women of the church and to help us have an organization in every church in North Arkansas Conference.

We commend the Batesville District Superintendent for his concern in this field during 1961-1962. He is responsible for an outstanding accomplishment in that district this year. He has had one of the district officers to speak on the work of the Woman's Society and Wesleyan Service Guild at every Quarterly Conference in his district and results have been most

encouraging.

In a recent membership study, we learned that less than half of the women of the church are members of the society and Guild combined; half of the women of our church are employed outside the home half or full time, one third of the women in the Society and Guild are 35-55 years of age, one third are 56-70, and we have more members over 70 than under 30 years of age. Our concern is for all the women of the church. We seek, with your help, to unite every woman in North Arkansas Conference in Christian living and serving, through active membership in the W.S.C.S. and W.S.G. This means an active organization in every local church or a circuit organization, where that plan seems best.

this, God willing, is or objective!

This, God willing, will be achieved!

The strengthening of a local church comes as the spiritual life of its members is developed. When we affirm that Jesus Christ is Lord, it makes a difference in our thought and action. Jesus said, "Tarry to receive power." 73% of our 274 societies and 116 Guilds indicate that they are involved in Prayer Groups, Prayer Circles, and Prayer Retreats. In this way, we seek a zone of calm from the surrounding turbulence of the world and therein we find assurance of our Sonship of God and rise up to walk. We can do no less when we have our sings forgiven and are trusted with the message—"He is risen!"

Bishop Raines said at the Assembly of Methodist Women meeting in Atlantic City, N. J. last month, "There were no missionaries between the Resurrection and Pentecost. No missionaries until the Holy Spirit came and sent them out." Methodist women tarry to receive power and go out

to the ends of the earth to serve.

The unfolding of our program that leads us to study the needs of the world and to improve conditions, brings us into a hall of mirrors where we see ourselves as we are. We no longer play parts! We know if we preach Christ as Divine Love, we must be possessed by that love and molded by His life. Countless women have engaged in hundreds of study classes through which we saw ourselves in a world of uncertainty and fear, a world of revolution and chaos, a world of complacency, yet we see it is still God's world where He is still at work judging and redeeming. We find ourselves living in a new, creative time and where God calls, we must meet Him and serve Him.

We see the mission field begins at our doorstep and we must be aware and be involved. We can be a great voice for the Christian faith if we are unafraid to speak prophetically. Acts 1.8 records the words of Jesus, "Ye shall be my witnesses to the ends of the earth." We know that we may be witnesses of a trial or witnesses at a trial", said Dr. Ralph Sockman. We must be witnesses at the trial going on the world today, where the principles of Christ are pitted against the practices of the crowd. We know that we need to move from the spectators gallery down to the witness chair. We are making history today, as we study the needs of the world and engage in activities that improve conditions. It takes courage and sacrifice. A soldier said to his history teacher after returning from World War II, "It is far more difficult to make history than to read and study it". World peace, freedom, justice for all mankind are dreams which can become

realities, but they must germinate in the Woman's Society and Wesleyan Service Guild in the local church for all accomplishment is local. All work is done by individuals and God! We seek to unite every woman in every local church in this great task of Christian living and serving.

The program that recruits workers is a program for the entire church. The local committee on Christian Vocations is the most effective means of recruitment within the church. The college campus is important and we must support the Methodist Student Movement; we must support the Wesley Foundation program but real recruitment begins at the local level. The Woman's Society program for recruitment is in cooperation with the local committee on Christian Vocations.

The 75th anniversary of Deaconess work will be celebrated in 1963. The goal is 75 new recruits during that year. This has significant challenge. It could have significance for your family and mine. We appreciate the ministry of the two Deaconesses who are active in our Conference—Miss Mary Chaffin of St. Paul and Miss Leota Krueger of Searcy. We must interpret this work to our youth for many do not know of this possibility of service in the church.

If we can challenge our young people they will answer the call for full time service as a missionary, deaconess or minister or a short term worker or part time service.

Each district in our conference interpreted the need in some way during 1961-62 by sponsoring mission tours, career days, vocation weekends, and by sending representatives to missionary conferences, camps, and assemblies. We have one fine young person awaiting acceptance of the Mission Board to do U. S. 2 work, after a short training period at Scarritt College. We look toward an employed worker coming to our Conference very soon. God may be calling your child, or you, into service for His Church and Kingdom. Let Jesus Christ be Lord.

If we care enough and what we are doing is worth the investment of our resources, we will find time, energy and funds to accomplish our pur-

Perhaps we talk too much about our bigness as an organization, our goals, our budget and our range of service for our real concern is persons. Yet, we know there must be organization; there must be goals; there must be funds!

In the year 1961-1962 Methodist Women of North Arkansas Conference gave for all mission purposes \$101,139.56. \$80,196.25 from the W.S.C.S. and \$20,943.31 from W.S.G. or \$6.71 per capita. These figures do not include any part of the pledge of students, youth and children nor local work. The item for local work done in local churches by the society and Guild is, on the average, twice as much as we pledge and pay toward our missionary program outside the local church, which indicates we probably paid an approximate \$200,000.00 for local work.

When we review the giving of self and money on the part of women to the work which the Lord has committed to us, we feel there are no words fitting to express the praise due His name for that, which by His blessing has been accomplished. No woman has made real sacrifice in her giving and because the need is so great, we are asking every woman to increase her pledge to missions 2% to 5% for next year. The women of North Arkansas Conference are compelled by a faith that will not let them stop.

This report of the unfolding of a program portrays the joy of dreams fulfilled, the hurt of opportunities unrealized, the satisfaction of achievement, the disappointment of the unattained; thus it reveals both strengths and weaknesses. Where it is strong, you have helped us make it so. Where it is weak, you have responsibility, with us, for its change. It solicits your prayers that "those who are sent" may bring to bear on all of life His will and way and with it may come Peace in our Time.

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

With the General Conference urging that careful attention, throughout the quadrennium, be given to the need for, and the importance of, recruitment for Christian Vocations, we make the following recommendations:

- 1. That each minister organize and activate the "Committee on Christian Vocations" as set forth in paragraph 145 Section 9 of the 1960 Discipline. We request the District Superintendents to ask the question "Who are members of the "Committee on Christian Vocations"? at the first Quarterly Conference.
- 2. That early in the new conference year a meeting be held of the ministers in each district to study the philosophy of Christian Vocations and the call to serve as Ministers, Missionaries, Deaconesses, and Directors of Christian Education. We furthermore urge all ministers and leaders of youth to work with and counsel youth and parents concerning the need for youth to serve in church related vocations. The yearly "Service Projects" Booklet should be given wide distribution. It is available from the Interboard Committee on Christian Vocations, P. O. Box 871, Nashville 2, Tennessee.
- 3. That at least one meeting on the Sub-District or District M.Y.F. level be devoted to helping youth attain a better understanding of the meaning and he challenge to full time service in a church related vocation. That th North Arkansas Methodist Youth Council give guidance in this area and make program suggestions relative to Christian Vocations. Wesley Foundation Fellowship teams are eager to cooperate in this program area.
- 4. That church leaders seek to cooperate with the High Schools and colleges in their "Career Day" programs.
- 5. Where advisable the chairman of the District "Committee on Christian Vocations," the District Director of Youth Work and the District Secretary of Personnel in cooperation with the District Superintendent plan for a Vocation Clinic in each district.
- 6. We urge each minister on one Sunday during the conference year, to lift up the philosophy of Christian Vocations that recognizes the potential sacredness of all useful work and also to point out the opportunities for Christian life service. We suggest that Labor Day Sunday might be a good time for this emphasis.
- 7. We furthermore urge all ministers on May 19, 1963 (Ministry Sunday) to speak on the "Call to Preach."
- 8. That during the summer in camps and assemblies courses and programs be devoted to Christian Vocations.
- 9. That laity and ministers cooperate with Bishop W. Kenneth Pope, the District Superintendents, and other leaders in the promotion of conferences on the ministry and in all phases of recruitment for the ministry and other church related vocations.
- 10. We again call attention to the four filmstrips dealing with youth and vocations and suggest their use in the local church and on the Sub-District level as soon as these are produced. They will be available from the secretary of the Commission.
- 11. To aid in this work we request the Cabinet to appoint a representative from each district to the Conference "Commission on Christian Vocations." Where a District "Committee on Christian Vocations" is organized, the chairman might serve in this capacity.

PROGRAM OF THE COMMISSION ON PROMOTION AND CULTIVATION

1. We shall ask the Commission on World Services and Finance to grant \$300 to the Commission on Promotion and Cultivation to be used to buy film, film strips, literature for the promotion of missions and stewardship.

We shall ask the Chairman of the Commission to be responsible for the distribution of the Methodist Calendar at Annual Conference.

3. The Chairman shall be responsible for a display at Annual Con-

ference on the work of the Commission.
4. We shall have a Workshop if the General Board representative requests it, and providing it is approved by Bishop Pope.

1. The Annual Town and Country Meeting and Workshop shall be held in Conway on December 13-14, 1962.

2. We shall promote a Workshop in areas where Pastors are serving

many tourists.

We shall encourage the very small and struggling church to join with the nearby Methodist Church to have their servives, and to maintain their church as a Chapel particularly if it serves a Cemetery, and to organize Cemetery Associations for its upkeep: and have an Annual Home Coming Service. On invitation of the District Superintendent and Pastor the

Executive Secretary shall be available to give guidance where this procedure gives promise of more adequately meeting the needs of people.

4. We shall cooperate with the University of Arkansas in the promotion of the Rural Seminar to be held at Fayetteville, July 9-11, 1962, and ask that each Conference Commission on Minimum Salary to provide \$500 for

expenses of men serving minimum salary charges to attend.

5. The Executive Secretary shall be responsible for holding Town and Country Workshops in each District when requested by the District Su-

perintendent.

6. The Executive Secretary shall be responsible for promoting stewardship through the Every Member Canvass, the Lord's Acre and Lord's Hour program. District and Sub-District Workshops shall be held when desired

by the District Superintendent.

7. The Every Member Canvass Plan shall be adapted for use by the small membership church, (fifty members or less), and we shall have as our goal an Every Member Canvass in Every Church, and shall ask that the Minimum Salary Commissions shall require the churches to meet this goal for minimum salary funds are used to supplement the salary of ministers.

8. The Tithing Emphasis in the Program of Stewardship: We shall ask that Dr. Edwin A. Briggs be at our Town and Country Workshop, December 13-14, 1962 to lead us in the Quadrennial Emphasis outlined by the General Conference; and follow-up of this emphasis shall be made in our

Every Member Canvass Workshops in 1963 in each District.

9. We ask that the Guide for a Pastor's Study and Standards for Parsonages, prepared by the Rev. James E. Major, and adopted by the Little Rock Conference, be adopted by the North Arkansas Conference, and the Executive Secretary by charged with the responsibility of encouraging all the Charges to meet these standards for their parsonages and Pastor's Study.

10. We would set as a goal: "A Sign on Every Methodist Church in Arkansas." The Survey shows that 25% of the churches do not have a sign.

We shall promote the arrangement of Charge lines or boundaries in each District so that no area in the State is without supervision.

12. A Workshop on Administration of the Work of the Church shall be held on July 31 for Supplies serving as pastors in their first and second

13. THE ENLARGED CHARGE PROGRAM, which has as its goal, no pastor serving less than 300 members, shall be promoted by the Town and Country Commission in the Annual Workshop and in every other possi-

ble way; and the Little Rock Conference shall be asked to adopt a policy in respect to this type of Charge, which was adopted by the North Arkansas Conference at its last session. (see supplement)

14. We shall encourage the setting-up of Larger Parishes and the promotion of the Group Ministry in order that no Methodist may be left

without the supervision of a trained minister.

15. We shall promote the organization of Charge Councils on Circuits and ask that the District Superintendent designate one Charge in his District to serve as a Pilot Charge, and the Executive Secretary be invited to

work with this Charge to promote this Council.

16. The Executive Secretary shall be available to give guidance in building and remodeling programs when invited by the Pastor and District

Superintendent.

- We shall continue our In-service Training Program with ministerial students.
- 18. Special Training Courses on Town and Country Work shall be held. 19. Farm and Home Committees shall be organized in Town and Country Churches.

20. We shall continue to explore the possibility of setting up Larger

Parish programs with other denominations.

- 21. District Directors of Town and Country Work and of Stewardship shall be appointed by the District Superintendent in consultation with the Executive Secretary.
 - 22. Harvest Festival and Rural Life Programs shall be promoted.

23. The Rural Church of the Year Program shall be continued.24. We shall cooperate with the United States Government in the Rural

Areas Development program.

25. We request the Board of Missions to ask that Dr. Cecil R. Culver

be responsible for spear-heading the program for new churches.

26. We ask that E. J. Holifield be re-elected to serve as Executive Secretary for the Area and that Bishop W. Kenneth Pope and the Cabinet appoint him to this position for another year.

27. In order to finance this program we ask that the Commission on World Service and Finance of each Conference grant \$8000 each, a total of \$16,000 for both.

Memoirs

WILLIAM WATSON ALLBRIGHT

Reverend William Watson Allbright was born near Capps, Arkansas June 26, 1882 and died at Heber Springs, Arkasas, November 7, 1961. He accepted Christ as his personal Savior and Lord in his youth and joined the Methodist Church. He heard and responded to the call of God to preach the gospel and was licensed to preach. He was received on Trial into the Arkansas Conference at Bentonville in 1907 and in full connection at Morrilton in 1909. He was ordained Deacon by Bishop E. R. Hendrix in 1909,

and ordained Elder by Bishop James McCoy in 1911.

Brother Allbright's first charge was Mountain Home Circuit where he received \$100 as salary for a years service. He also met Miss Estella May Barnett whose home was at Gassville, Arkansas, who became his life's companion. They were united in the Holy Bonds of Matrimony at the home of the bride, May 5, 1907, Reverend W. T. Martin, Presiding Elder, performing the ceremony. They lived, loved, and served together for more than half a century. The union was blessed with twelve children, all of whom survived him, save one who died in infancy. large family of children and provided for their education and sent them out to be a blessing to humanity and thus glorify the Father in heaven.

He served the following charges: Mountain Home Circuit; Huntsville; Quitman; Green Forrest; Netonia, Missouri; Yellville; Central Avenue, Batesville; Tuckerman; Kensett; Marked Tree; Augusta; Marion; Wilson; Corning; Midland Heights, Fort Smith; Springdale; Clinton; Heber Springs and Bald Knob. After superannuation, he supplied Kensett, Mammoth Springs and Moorefield. He took the superannuate relation at the Annual Conference in 1950 ater baying served forty, two and one helf wears in the Conference in 1950 ater having served forty two and one-half years in the industry. He and his companion selected Heber Springs as the place for their retirement home. Here he had his longest pastorate and was loved and honored by all the people. Here he and his companion lived until God called him home.

Brother Allbright was a good man, a good gospel preacher. He provided food for mind and soul in his pulpit ministry. Perhaps his greater service was in his personal contacts with men as he met and greeted them on the street, at place of business and in the home. Having met and been greeted by him, one felt that he had met a man of God. He left for his family, loved one, friends, a heritage that is richer than silver or gold; that of a good, consecrated, dedicated, Christian life.

Olen Cole came to hold a revival for me on my first charge. Under his fatherly guidance I found new spiritual insights into the revelation of the love of God that I had never imagined existed. As we lived together through those weeks and walked the dusty county roads in the setting sun, I realized that Olen Cole had an ethereal understanding of our heavenly father that few men would ever know. Olen Cole knew and presented to me the philosophical theology of a higher God than I had ever known. His was the most totally dedicated life to the service of God and the souls of men that I have ever known. Because he lived, hundreds of people were led to God through his

dynamic evangelistic preaching. With a thunderous voice that would seem to make the devil quake, he presented the power and majesty of an infinite God. In a quieter voice you could almost hear the angels whisper as Olen made you see a vision of that house not made with hands, where he has surely gone. I know that he is not done with his work but at the feet of God he is testifying for you and me.

Rev. Olen L. Cole was born at Branch, Arkansas, July 21, 1886. He died in a Fort Smith Hospital, August 14, 1961. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jonathan Cole. Part of Brother Cole's ministry was spent in the Little Rock Conference. There he served as pastor at Smackover, McGehee, Stuttgart, and at Capitol View and Highland Methodist churches in Little Rock. He returned to the North Arkansas Conference in 1938 and was appointed pastor at Newport. Among other appointments in the North Arkansas Conference he served Gardner Memorial, North Little Rock; West Helena; Trumann and Beebe.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by one sister, Mrs. Maggie Hill of Fort Smith; four brothers, Millard of California, Fred of Alabama,

Connie of Six Mile, and Jesse Cole of Fort Smith.

SESSIONS OF THE CONFERENCE

The "Arkansas Conference" and the "White River Conference" were united in 1914 to form the present "North Arkansas Conference."

The Conference determined that its annual notation should date from the time of the organization of the Arkansas Conference in 1836, instead of following the date fixed by the consolidation of the Arkansas and White River Conferences, when the name was changed to North Arkansas Conference in 1914.

The Conference session of 1939 voted to maintain the numerical notation of the Conference in The Methodist Church.

STANDING RULES OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

- (1) That each undergraduate, each approved supply pastor, and each candidate for conference membership be required to meet with the Board of Ministerial Training before or during the session of the annual conference unless hindered by circumstances beyond his control.
- (2) That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one member from each church in each Pastoral Charge; provided further, that each station charge shall have three elected members.
- (3) That the figures answering the question the pastor's report to Annual Conference: "Members reported last year" shall in every case be the number of members printed in the statistical tables of the Journal of the last Annual Conference.
- (4) That the District Superintendent's figures of all apportionments be accepted as the official figures.
- (5) That the apportionment for Conference and General Work be combined in the statistical report: and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.
- (6) All statistical reports shall be delivered by the district superintendents to the conference statistician seven days before the opening session of the Annual Conference, and all settlements shall be made with the Conference Treasurer by June 1st.
- (7) When a member of this Conference becomes a member of the Bishop's cabinet he shall automatically become ineligible to serve on any quadrennial board, committee, commission, or an officer in the Conference administration, except members specifically designated by the Discipline.
- (8) That the Secretary of the Bishop's cabinet be instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or District Superintendent's District for insertion in the Conference Journal.
- (9) The Annual Conference shall elect upon nomination by the Bishop a Conference Entertainment Committee to serve during the quadrennium. This Committee shall make arrangements for the facilities needed for the session of the Annual Conference and administer the funds for its entertainment, including the honorarium for the conference preacher.
- (10) All members attending the Annual Conference session shall pay two dollars registration; except 1) those from minimum salary charges, who shall pay one dollar; 2) retired ministers not serving charges and supernumeraries, who shall pay no registration. The offerings in the public worship service shall be used for conference entertainment expense. The Conference Entertainment Committee shall provide during the session of the Annual Conference full entertainment for retired ministers not serving a charge, and room for all pastors of charges whose pastoral support from all sources is \$3,600.00 or less.
- (11) Every board, commission, and committee receiving any money from conference funds shall present to the Commission on World Service and Finance annually by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference a detailed financial report including all receipts and expenditures.
- (12) A list of lay members elected to Annual Conference shall be compiled by the district superintendents and sent to the conference secretary prior to the opening of the session.
- (13) The district stewards shall apportion all annual conference askings to the several charges in each district on an equitable basis.
- (14) The conference treasurer shall close his books for the Conference Year seven days before the opening of the annual conference, and shall allocate to the several boards and commissions the moneys to which they are entitled by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference, and each board and commission receiving money from conference funds shall close its books on the opening day of annual conference.
- (15) No one shall be nominated for re-election to a board or commission on which has served more than a quadrennium immediately preceding his election.
- (16) The secretary of the Board of Conference Claimants shall be a member of the secretarial staff of the conference and this person shall be charged with the responsibility of seeing that all records pertaining to service years be made identical
- (17) Any proposal to change the Standing Rules shall lie on the table overnight, and then its passage shall require a ¾ vote of those present and voting.
- (18) That part of the report of all boards, commissions, committees and other agencies of the conference which provides for changes in policy or makes recommendations shall be mimeographed, printed, or otherwise duplicated and distributed to the membership of the conference prior to the time scheduled for action on said report.
- (19) All churches employing more than one member of an annual conference shall pay all percentages based on pastor's salary on the salaries of all ministers so employed.
- (20) Each Annual Conference session shall designate a moving date. Any exceptions to the designated date shall be agreed upon by the pastors involved.
