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III. DAILY PROCEEDINGS

First Day-Afternoon Session May 30, 1966

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper: The one hundred thirty-first ses-The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper: The one numered unry-nist session of The North Arkansas Annual Conference convened in First Methodist Church, Jonesboro, Arkansas, May 30, 1966 at 4:30 P.M. for the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper with Bishop Paul V. Galloway, resident Bishop of the Arkansas Area officiating. After the singing of the opening hymn "And are we yet alive" Bishop Galloway led the Conference in prayer. The Bishop was assisted in the service by Elmo A. Thomason, Ralph Hillis, Howard Williams, Clint Burleson, Myers B. Curtis, Elmer Holifield, and S. B. Wilford members of the Cabinet. The organist was Mrs. Fred Troutt and the soloist was Mrs. Bruce Choate.

First Day—Evening Session

Worship and Commissioning Service: The Conference met in worship at 7:30 P.M. with Bishop Paul V. Galloway presiding. The hymn "O Word of God Incarnate" was sung, the Scripture was read by Alvin C. Murray, and Dr. A. W. Martin, Sr. led the prayer. Bishop Galloway called on Clint Burleson, Secretary of the Cabinet, for the Report of the District Superintendents. Action on the report was deferred until Tuesday morning. The evening sermon was preached by James Argue, Minister of Pulaski Heights Methodist Church in Little Rock, Arkansas. Following the sermon Bishop Galloway, assisted by A. W. Martin, Sr. and Alvin C. Murray, commissioned the Reverend and Mrs. A. W. Martin, Jr. as missionaries. The hymn "In Christ there is no East nor West" was sung and following the Benediction by A. W. Martin, Sr. the evening session was adjourned.

Second Day-Morning Session May 31, 1966

Opening: The second day's session opened with devotions by Bishop Galloway.

Organization: Bishop Galloway called the Conference to order. The Conference Secretary, James M. Meadors, Jr., was recognized for the naming of his assistants, Jim Beal and John Workman. Announcements were made concerning registration for the Conference and Roll Call.

Welcome: Dr. Grover Poole of First Church welcomed the Conference delegates to Jonesboro and First Church.

Publishing House: Charles Judge representing the Cokesbury Book Store in Dallas was presented to the Conference. Mr. Judge recommended a group of new books that are available in the Book Room. He also presented Bishop Galloway with a check for \$7,348.84 for the Pension Fund. Bishop Galloway recommended further books, ESPECIALLY THE BIBLE.

The Reverend Roberto Pedrazza: The Reverend Roberto Pedrazza, who has been associated with Lydia Patterson Institute in El Paso, Texas, was presented to the Conference and spoke in behalf of the Institute and our work among Spanish Speaking Americans.

World Service and Finance: Worth Gibson presented a matter supplementary to the Report of the Commission on World Service and Finance as printed in the Pre-Conference Digest. The supplement recommended that as printed in the Fre-Conference Digest. The supplement recommended that the churches of the Conference raise by apportionment \$98,246 per year for three years for Hendrix College beginning this Conference Year. Also that the College be given permission to raise \$250,000 over the next three years from individuals in the two Conferences of Arkansas. Brother Gibson moved the adoption of the supplement.

Clint Burleson, Secretary of the Cabinet, endorsed the recommendation in behalf of the Cabinet. Arvill C. Brannon, Chairman of the Board of Education endorsed the recommendation in behalf of the Board of Education.

Dr. Marshall T. Steel, President of Hendrix College, spoke of the need of the foregoing funds to match those that are to be given the College in a Challenge Grant by one of the major Foundations of the nation. He also outlined the uses to which the funds from the churches, individuals and Foundation (approximately five million dollars) would be put at the College.

The supplement was adopted by a standing vote. The full report of the Commission on World Service and Finance will be acted on later.

Methodist Hospital: J. M. Crews, Administrator of the Methodist Hospital in Memphis, Tennessee, brought greetings and a report from our hospital. He announced that Bishop Galloway has recently helped to dedicate the new ten million dollar wing at the hospital.

Chaplain George Stewart was presented to the Conference.

Chaplains: Bishop Galloway announced to the Conference that he had in his hands letters from the Office of Chaplains relative to members of our Conference serving as Chaplains to the Armed Services. He announced that these Chaplains would be reappointed.

Christian Vocations: Aaron Barling presented the report of the Commission on Christian Vocations which is printed in the Pre-Conference Digest. He moved its adoption as printed. It was adopted.

Pensions: Dr. James D. Huskins introduced Clyde Parsons for the presentation of supplements to the report of the Board of Pensions as printed in the Pre-Conference Digest. The supplements were adopted. The entire report of the Board, with these supplements, was adopted.

Reports Filed With the Secretary: Allan E. Hilliard, Treasurer of the Board of Pension, requested permission to file with the Secretary of the Conference those reports for which the Treasurer is responsible, that they might be included in the Journal. Permission was granted.

Hospitality Committee: Bishop Galloway named William Wilder, John McCormack and Sam Teague as a Committee on Hospitality to introduce guests.

Hospitals and Homes: Dr. W. Henry Goodloe announced the resignation of A. P. McKeithen as a Trustee of the Arkansas Methodist Children's Home. He nominated Wiley Robbins of Heber Springs to fill out Mr. McKeithen's unexpired term. The Nomination was approved. Dr. Goodloe moved the adoption of the Report of the Board of Hospitals and Homes. It was adopted.

District Superintendents: Clint Burleson called attention to the Report of the District Superintendents which was read last evening but not acted on. He lifted out for special attention that part relating to the Bishop not naming for the new Conference Year an Executive Secretary for the Area Council, and the use of the same funds to provide short-term special leadership for the Area in particular areas when needed. Dr. John Bayliss asked for clarification as to the status of the Area Council without an Executive Secretary. Bishop Galloway replied that its place and existence is unchanged by the fact that it will not have an Executive Secretary. It will continue to have the same over-all personnel with that one exception and will continue to meet.

Brother Burleson also called attention to that part of the District Superintendent's Report calling for the creation of a Conference Committee to work out the problems of insurance coverage when a person is transferred from one Conference to another in the Area.

Dewey Dark, Chairman of the Committee on Group Insurances, announced that beginning now persons transferring into the North Arkansas Conference from the Little Rock Conference would be covered by our hos-

pitalization insurance. The insurance in this Conference is not so adequate as that in the Little Rock Conference, however.

Brother Burleson moved the adoption of the Report. It was adopted.

Missions: Albert Gatlin was called for the Report of the Board of Missions. Harold Eggensperger presented Dr. Paul Lewis to speak on the Urban Life Convocation he attended in Chicago. The remainder of the Missions Report will be presented later.

Miss Edith Martin, Missionary to Africa was introduced to the Con-

Communications: Bishop Galloway announced that he had several letters and telegrams from those who were unable to attend the Conference. He instructed the Conference Secretary to communicate with those who are unable to attend because of illness, sending the greetings of the Conference.

Hendrix Choir Records: The announcement was made that records of the Hendrix Choir are on sale in the entrance to the church.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: The report of the Woman's Society of Christian Service was read by the Conference President, Mrs. R. K. Bent of Fayetteville. It was adopted.

Presentation of Guests: William Wilder and Sam Teague presented the guests to the Conference.

Statistician: Luther K. Wilson presented the report of the Conference Statistician. It was received.

Recess: The Bishop recessed the Conference for fifteen minutes.

Service of Commemoration: The Service of Commemoration was led by Service of Commemoration: The Service of Commemoration was led by Dr. W. Henry Goodloe. The Scripture was read by Kenneth Renfroe. J. Clarence Wilcox preached the Commemoration Sermon.

V. Earl Copes, Editor of MUSIC MINISTRY, spoke to the Conference concerning the response of the church as a whole to the new hymnal, and resources that are being prepared to help introduce the hymnal to the churches in Methodism.

The report was adopted.

Arkansas Methodist: David Conyers was recognized for the report on the Arkansas Methodist. He noted that the subscription price has been increased to \$2.50 per year. The report was adopted.

Deaconess Board: Clarence Wilcox was called to give the report of the Deaconess Board. He introduced Willis Alderson who spoke on the organization of a Group Ministry in the Harrison Area.

Miss Bernice Rogers, a Deaconess who works in the Group Ministry,

also commented on its work.

Clarence Wilcox recommended that the Conference concur in the request of the Deaconess Board that Miss Mary Chaffin be given a year's Sabbatical Leave for reason of health. The entire report was adopted.

Arkansas Historical Commission: Eugene Hall gave the report of the Historical Commission. The report was adopted.

Minutes: James R. Chandler reported that the Minutes of the previous sessions of the Conference had been examined and found to be in order. His report was adopted.

Christian Civic Foundation: Alfred Knox, representing the Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas, Incorporated, expressed appreciation to Dr. William Brown for his 7 years of leadership in the Foundation. Dr. Brown has just retired as the Executive Secretary. Dr. W. Henry Goodloe was introduced as the new Secretary.

Area Council: Bishop Galloway called attention to the report of the Area Council in the Pre-Conference Digest and spoke words of gratitude and appreciation for the late Dr. Cecil R. Culver who was Executive Secretary until his death this year.

Presentations: The Reverend and Mrs. Sam Watson were presented to the Conference. Brother Watson's father was a member of this Conference as is his son J. William Watson.

Alvin Murray asked that Charles McDonald please escort Mrs. Paul

V. Galloway to the front to be presented to the Conference.

Antonio Rolleen was presented to the Conference by the Bishop. He

resides in Brazil.

Mr. and Mrs. Horace Jones of the Mountain View Church (Crawford County) were presented. They are lay delegates and are celebrating their 58th Wedding Anniversary.

Town and Country: Clyde Crozier gave the report on Town and Country Work. W. O. Scroggin, Jr. spoke to the report. The report was adopted as amended.

Group Insurances: Earl Hughes presented the report from the Committee on Group Insurance. Dewey Dark spoke to the report, and announced that a representative of Blue Cross-Blue Shield is available to counsel with persons about our group insurance. The report was adopted.

Lay Activities: The report on Lay Activities was given by E. Clay Bumpers, Conference Lay Leader. The report with its amendments was adopted.

Methodist Foundation of Arkansas: W. Henry Goodloe presented the following Resolutions concerning the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas.
RESOLUTIONS OF THE ACTIVE MEMBERSHIP OF ARKANSAS
METHODIST FOUNDATION

Upon recommendation of the Board of Directors of Arkansas Methodist Foundation, the active membership of said corporation adopts the following Resolutions:

BE IT RESOLVED that Article First of the Articles of Incorporation of Arkansas Methodist Foundation be and it is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"FIRST: The name of this corporation is THE METHODIST FOUNDATION OF ARKANSAS."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Article Eight of the Articles of Incorporation of Arkansas Methodist Foundation be and it is hereby amended so that it shall read as follows: "EIGHTH: The affairs and business of this corporation shall be controlled and conducted by a board of Directors consisting of such number as may be fixed by the By-laws of this corporation, but in any event shall consist of not less than thirteen (13) nor more than twenty-six (26) directors. Education: Dr. Ira A. Brumley spoke to the Conference on the New Day in Christian Education. Parts of the New Day will be the new curriculum materials for Adults and Youth to appear in 1967 and 1968.

Conference Relations: Byron McSpadden moved the adoption of the following report of the Committee on Conference Relations. "The committee recommends the passage of the character of all ministerial members of the Conference.

Ralph Clayton and J. William Watson as trustees of the Methodist Hospital in Memphis, terms to expire in 1967. These replace Alvin C. Murray and Harold Womack. The nominations were accepted.

Methodist Children's Home: J. Edwin Keith, Superintendent of the Arkansas Methodist Children's Home, spoke in its behalf to the Conference. The session of the third day was adjourned with the Benediction by Charles Casteel.

Fourth Day—Morning Session June 2, 1966

Opening: The fourth day of Conference was opened with devotions by Bishop Galloway.

Minutes: Gail Anderson reported that the Minutes of the previous day's session had been examined and found to be in order.

District Conference Journals: M. L. Kaylor reporting for the Committee on District Conference Journals said that the Journals from the seven Districts had all been examined and found to be in order. The report was adopted.

Treasurer: Grafton Thomas, the Area Treasurer, distributed his report to the Conference and spoke to it. The report was adopted.

Social Concerns: Bob Edwards, Chairman of the Board of Christian Social Concerns introduced Travis Williams for the reading of an addition to the report. The addition having to do with the attitudes of our people in changing racial neighborhoods was adopted. Gaither McKelvey spoke of the interest of the Board in a jail ministry in local communities. A Workshop to train laymen for this purpose will be held in Harrisburg later in the year. Bob Edwards spoke of the changing image of Social Concerns in the local churches and Conference. Persons are recognizing that the concerns are more than just those in the area of race relations. He also encouraged churches to follow the recommendation of the Board in helping laymen better understand the right use of the Sabbath. The report was adopted.

Program.

it includes the whole scope of concern of every Board and Agency in the Annual Conference. We know, further, that our resources would not allow us to have as many staff persons as our various Boards might wish-nor should any one Board have a corner on the market.

"Therefore we request of the Annual Conference that this study of an Interboard Administration System be continued and that such a committee have the authority and commission to bring a specific proposal to the Annual Conference in 1967 for its consideration.

"We further suggest that this Committee be expanded to include repre-

sentatives of other major Boards and Agencies with program responsibilities, at the discretion of the Bishop.

"Bishop Galloway I move the adoption of this portion of the report."

VI. REPORTS OF BOARDS, COMMITTEES, COMMISSIONS

AREA COUNCIL OF ARKANSAS

Received June 1, 1966

I am delighted with the interest and cooperation that we receive from the Boards and their chairmen and executives in the planning of the program of Arkansas Methodism. This year we have had monthly meetings of the paid staff of the field workers in Arkansas. This has enabled us to do some effective planning and to coordinate the program of the churches in the state.

The planning committee or the executive committee of the Area Council has met every other month this Conference year and has given us guidance and help in the work that we try to do. The Area Council has had two and help in the work that we try to do. The Area Council has had two meetings this year, and there has been a fine spirit, good planning, and helpful suggestions in showing us how we can implement the program that has been outlined by the various Boards, Commissions and Committees of the two Conferences. The vision, the well-planned programs, and the willingness on the part of the Boards to promote their programs has made the work of the staff much easier and more effective. I rejoice in the fact that the growing concern of one program in the two Conferences of Arbaness Methodism is more and more being accepted and appreciated by kansas Methodism is more and more being accepted and appreciated by greater numbers of people.

This year at the present time, February 16, we are showing a net in-

crease in church membership. We are showing increased giving in our world service, in our advance specials, national and world, in our ministerial training offerings, and in the other concerns of the church. In 1961 and 1962 we handled a total of \$1,741,169.97 thru the Area Treasurer's office. Last year 1964 and 1965 we handled \$1,936,877.00, which makes an increase last year over 1961 and 1962 of \$195,707.12 handled in our Treasurer's office.

A study of the work of Methodism in Arkansas during the past four years reveals that the membership in Arkansas Methodism has grown from a total of 180,734 to 183,023. Our church school membership has grown from a total of 123,199 to 123,622. Our most disappointing statistic reveals that the average attendance in our Sunday School has decreased over the last four years from an average attendance each Sunday of 66,649 to 63,099.

In the new day in Christian education, we hope to be able to share with our people in such a way that this unusual loss will be changed to a won-

derful gain. We look to the future with confidence and hope.

In Bishop Galloway, we have a great leader who will guide us on to great achievements. In the District Superintendency, we have capable leaders. In the pastorates, we have trained, efficient and dedicated men. In the connectional offices, we have outstanding leaders. And in the laity, we have unexcelled leadership which is dedicated to making the Kingdom of this state and this world become the Kingdom of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORT Adopted May 31, 1966

It is with a mixture of pride and humility that we, the Cabinet of the North Arkansas Conference, present our report for this year. We rejoice at the progress reflected in this year's work, but we quickly acknowledge that in reporting these gains, our report becomes the report of the over 300 ministers and the 99,842 laymen of North Arkansas Methodism.

We are pleased to report that 1965-1966 has been a year of member-

ship gain for our conference. 5,706 persons were received into membership this year, resulting in a net gain of 798 members. The North Arkansas Conference stands on the threshold of a great breakthrough in church membership. We are less than 200 members away from a total of 100,000 members in our churches. As pastors and laymen work together to witness for our Lord Jesus Christ, let us move far beyond this goal in the year ahead.

As we scan the statistics of the past year, we lift out other significant figures: We had a church school enrollment of 62,974, with an average attendance of 32,420. World Service giving reached \$297,134. The total amount raised for all purposes was \$5,308,117.

This has been a year of building for our conference. Sixteen new sanctuaries and education buildings were erected. Ten of our preachers' families are enjoying new parsonages. Many others joined in completing various remodeling programs. These physical improvements always symbolize the love of our people for their Lord and His Church, reflecting a spirit of sacrifice and dedication.

Two new congregations were organized early in the year—Sequoyah Methodist Church in Fayetteville and Forrest Hills Methodist Church in Forrest City. Both churches, generously supported by our Mission giving, are growing, and are already assuming some benevolence responsibilities of their own. May their tribe increase!

Several districts report significant work being done in newly organized Larger Parish programs. We heartly endorse this phase of our Town and Country work, solidifying the witness and work of Methodism in rural areas.

As we look to another year of our Church's life, we see some directions in which we would like to move. We support, as strong as before, the spirit of co-operation and good will which undergirds the work of the Area Council. Concurring in the suggestion that an Executive Secretary not be appointed at this time, we nevertheless urge that the Council's budget remain intact. A new concept in leadership—bringing to our state persons of special training to guide us in various emphases for short periods of time—shows great promise and should be given careful consideration. We would want funds available for such endeavors, when the occasion arises. Your cabinet pledges itself to co-operate in providing leadership in and thru the Area Program.

We are hearing considerable discussion in both the Conferences of Arkansas of the need of some plan whereby men transferring from one conference to another might keep their insurance program intact. We recognize the hardships that often result among our transfers at this point, and respectfully request that a study committee be formed from the Insurance Committees and Boards of Pensions of both Conferences, to examine possible solutions, with special reference to working out a plan of reciprocation.

As we look ahead to the work of other years, we feel the need of continually examining our organizational structure, and the use of our executive personnel. We acknowledge the need of a person, or persons, to give executive leadership to many of the Boards and agencies of the Conference, or Area. It may be that careful study will lead us away from an executive secretary for one Board, to a secretary whose responsibilities reach into many areas of concern. It may be that we will feel drawn to co-operative work on an Area Basis. Right now we are "looking," "studying," "talking"—and we call upon the Conference to consider a study that might produce the answers we seek.

It is a glorious privilege to serve in the North Arkansas Conference at this time. Bishop Galloway is proving again and again to be a capable and inspiring leader among us. We thank God for him! May God lead us all into more fruitful and enduring efforts in the years to come.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Adopted June 2, 1966

I. Articles of Incorporation:

A. Our Board of Trustees fulfills the requirements of Paragraph 711 of *The Discipline*, having been duly incorporated as the Board of Trustees of the North Arkansas Conference of The Methodist Church on July 24, 1959.

B. The Articles of Incorporation are recorded in the office of the Circuit Clerk of Sebastian County in Ft. Smith, Arkansas, in Book E, Page 69.

II. Execution of Legal Documents

A. The Chairman and Secretary of the Board have been authorized

to sign legal documents for the Board.

We urge pastors and district superintendents to read Paragraphs 188, 189 and 190 in The *Discipline* concerning the disposal of church property, and, in the case of the disposal of church property, to have an attorney prepare the necessary papers and send same to the Chairman of the Board of Trustees for the necessary signatures.

III. In compliance with Paragraph 188 of The Discipline the property including both the church and the parsonage of Fourth Street Methodist Church in Rector has been sold, and the property at

Gravel Hill in Clay County has also been sold.

We recommend that each District superintendent provide the Conference Board of Trustees with a description and information concerning the record of deeds of all church property within the bounds of his district. This information will in most instances be found in the report of the Local Board of Trustees to the Fourth Quarterly Conference. The Conference Board of Trustees will provide the forms for making this report. It will then be duplicated and a copy filed with the Secretary of the Conference Board of Trustees, with the Conference Secretary and with the District Superintendents.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

Adopted June 2, 1966

During the Conference year 1966-67, the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns will seek to speak to the relevant issues of the day, conduct projects which will seek to express our concern in and for God's world, and to train leadership for a more effective social witness. The greatest efforts will be directed to the local church and community. Toward this end, we will develop our Conference and District program. Resource people and training programs will have as a chief objective the strengthening of the witness and work of the local church.

We intend to train laymen for a jail ministry in the local communities. We hope through this the Methodist church may be a servant church to these almost-forgotten people within our communities. We do this also with the hope that such a ministry will serve to reawaken within us an interest in the social witness of the general

in the social witness of the gospel.

We propose to work through the duly constituted officials within our state to bring about some greatly needed reforms within our prison system. We believe that the people of God who themselves have deserved the judgment and condemnation of God but rather have known his forgiveness and grace will respond to the efforts to make our prisons places of rehabilitation rather than punishment.

We will participate in a human relations workshop in Memphis and then will conduct a similar workshop in North Little Rock. The purpose of these workshops will be to help create a better working relationship between the races. We particularly covet a closer working relation between Negro and white Methodists within Arkansas.

Realizing the persistent problems caused by the use of beverage alcohol, we plan to give a major emphasis to commitment to abstinence. We ask the full cooperation of this Conference in the following program toward that end.

- a. That the Bishop and the District Superintendents join with us in encouraging every Methodist church to call on its people for a commitment to abstinence on Commitment Day November 13, 1966
- mitment to abstinence on Commitment Day, November 13, 1966.
 b. That the materials of the General Board of Christian Social Concerns be used in the observance of Commitment Day and that they be supplemented by our own resources where needed.
- c. That the Arkansas Methodist be used to encourage full participation by our people in this important observance.
- d. That a report, which shall serve as a guide for future planning, be assembled of the churches participating in the observance.

Further, the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns feels that the general disregard for the observance of the Sabbath has progressed so far we can no longer keep silent. We call our people to observance of this day as a day of rest and gladness. We caution against the temptation of legalism but wish to remind ourselves that the Sabbath is the gift of God to which we as free men may respond in gratitude and faith.

We urge the ministers of our Conference to help their congregations in the matter of understanding of the Sabbath and call them to serious study of this institution in the modern world. We feel our people hunger

for guidance on this matter.

We request the observance of the following dates:

For emphasizing world peace, we urge the observance of World Order Sunday, October 23, 1966.

To emphasize our efforts in commitment of abstinence, we urge the observance of Commitment Day, November 13, 1966.

For the emphasizing of better relations between the races of men, we call for the observance of Race Relations Sunday, February 12, 1967 with an offering for Philander-Smith College.

We are mindful of the importance of issues such as the war in Viet Nam, the United Nations, poverty, pornographic literature, continued organized gambling in Arkansas, juvenile delinquency, mental health, traffic safety, etc. We would urge the local churches to develop programs in these and other areas of social concerns as the opportunity arises.

We, of the Board of Christian Social Concerns, feel the Church has been called to lead in a Christian response to the reality of the world in which we live. We propose to answer this call by serving this world—the world God loves and the world for which Christ died. We propose to help world in the World Cod excepted it to be

make it the World God created it to be.

Our nation and our Conference are fast changing in social makeup and cultural outlook. The transition to integrated neighborhoods is coming soon regardless of the stance which Christian people take toward it. We hold before our people the responsibility for leadership in all areas of human relationships, with special reference at this time to equality of opportunity

for all peoples in the matter of housing.

The minimum requirement of Methodist Christians is clear: to work for an orderly, peaceful and by the grace of God, brotherly transition.

The Discipline is clear: (par. 1824 C 6) "Christians must insist that all people have the freedom to reside wherever their economic means and their personal wishes permit. The local church should prepare its members to live in integrated neighborhoods and challenge them to help in creating fully inclusive communities."

BOARD OF EDUCATION Adopted June 2, 1966

Report No. 1

We recommend the following program for the year of 1966-1967.

That we continue the major emphasis on increasing church school membership, average Sunday school attendance, and improving the quality of teaching.

That we give special attention to developing leadership in the Adult Program to prepare for the new Adult Curriculum coming in September

That a number of persons be encouraged to attend at least one of the three week programs of Mt. Sequoyah between July 3 and 22, including the members of the Conference Adult Council.

That each District Director plan sub-district meetings with Adult leaders in preparation for the new adult curriculum.

That District Preachers' meetings be held in early summer of 1966 to interpret "New Day in Christian Education."

That district workshops be held for administrative officers, workers with children, workers with youth, workers with adults during November, 1966.

That local church adult classes be encouraged to make a special study of an introductory unit to be offered in April to interpret the new Adult Curriculum.

That sub-district and local church training schools offer the course on

"Adult Learning in a Changing World."

That a number of adult laboratory schools be held during the Conference year.

That a Coaching Conference be held August 22-23, using the course on "Current Trends in Theology."

That we cooperate with the Music Workshop to be held at Hendrix College, February 17-18, 1967.

That the Children's Workers' Conference be held March 7-9, 1967.

That the Conference Youth Rally be held April 7, 1967.
That a large delegation be registered for the National Family Life Conference to be held in Chicago, October 14-16, 1966.

That the National Conference be followed by district and sub-district

workshops on family life.

That special attention be given to developing Family Life camping or Conference programs on family life.

That Promotion Day be held August 28, since the New Curriculum Year

begins on September 4.

We recommend to the Bishop and his Cabinet, the re-appointment of Ira A. Brumley as Executive Secretary of the Board of Education for the Conference Year of 1966-67; and Bob Edwards as Associate Secretary.

Report No. 2

We recommend the following camping program for the North Arkansas Conference:

1. Schedule camps by geography and not by districts.

- a. Have four Senior High Camps (one at each campsite) the same week.
- b. Have seventh grade camps the same week(s) in the summer.

c. Have eighth grade camps the same week(s) in the summer. d. Have ninth grade camps the same week(s) in the summer.

Have Elementary V-VI camps the same week(s) in the summer.

f. Have Family Conference during the summer.

- g. Encourage cooperation in the Pre-College Conference, July 31-August 5.
- h. Plan a Work Camp for Senior Highs and Older Youth during the summer.

i. And such other age groupings as the Districts may conceive.

2. Ask the World Service and Finance Commission to appropriate \$1,000.00 for the camping program, with these funds going to the Conference Treasurer, to be administered by the Conference Committee on Camps

and Conferences.

3. Have the Conference Committee on Camps and Conferences choose the Camp Directors in the fall of the year, with a two-day training session planned for these Directors in the fall. This Conference Committee shall be composed of those persons named to it by the Conference Board of Education, plus the District Superintendent and a District Director of Camping from each district. It is recommended that the District Camp Directors be nominated by the District Superintendents and elected by the Annual Conference.

4. Standardize the curriculum of all Elementary V-VI, Junior High, and

Senior High Camps. a. Have all camps four nights and five days.

b. Recommend a standard fee for all campers.

Plan and encourage Family Conference, Rustic Camping, Work Camps, Trail Hikes.

6. Ask the Conference Board of Ministerial Training to assign a ministerial student to each campsite, which request same, each summer and provide a work scholarship for such persons. The student would assume a caretaker role at the camp.

7. Request that Elementary V-VI camps be planned and staffed through the Conference and District Councils on Children's Work.

8. Have a camp staff training session each Spring.

9. Encourage the use of Overseas Students at each Camping program. 10. Join the American Camping Association, Bradford Woods, Martinville, Indiana; and have an active relationship with the Special Committee on Camps and Conferences, International Council on Religious Education, 206 South Michigan Avenue, Chicago 4, Illinois.

11. Work out and make available a standard registration form for all

camps.

A NEW DAY IN EVANGELISM

A picture taken while a camera is not in focus will be badly distorted or fuzzy. Proper focus is essential in taking good clear pictures. Likewise a Christian should bring his thinking on Evangelism into focus if he is to have a clear picture of Evangelism.

When Evangelism is "in focus" in our thinking, two things are clear:

Evangelism involves the total membership of the church.

Evangelism relates to the total witness of the church.

If the church is the People of God witnessing in the world, then every member of the church who confesses Christ as Lord has a share in this witness.

God Calls,

God Redeems, God Empowers,

God sends out His church,

Every Christian to confront the world with the unique Christ

and His Unique Church.

Jesus was talking to all of His Disciples when He said, "You are My witnesses . . . go into all the world . . .". If the Church's witness is to be effective, each member in the Church must see Evangelism as his concern

in God's world. Evangelism in its broadest focus then reveals the total life of the Church and every facet of the Church's ministry related to Christian wit-

ness. IN WORSHIP

Let every charge have a Commission on Worship.

Let every pastor endeavor to train the members of the local church in the art of public worship.

Let there be in every Area Training School a course on "Christian Wor-

Let each church make proper and full use of training with the "New Book of Worship" and "The New Methodist Hymnal."

Let there be a wide spread use of laymen in our worship services.

IN PREACHING AND TEACHING OF THE SCRIPTURES

Let there be a weekly Bible study group in every local church.

Let us encourage the use of Scripture and Scripture aids (Upper Rooms and Sanctuary, etc.) in the homes of our members.

-IN SEEKING TO RELATE OUR MOBILE MEMBERSHIP TO THE

CHURCH

Let us visit every family that moves into our community with a complete verbal picture of the program of the church, and an invitation to

become a part of that program.

Let us pay a last visit to the people leaving our community and tell them how we appreciate them and their contribution to the church and community and suggest to them that they find a church in their new community as quickly as possible and they move their membership right

Let us write the pastor and/or the District Superintendent in the place they are moving and give the names and other information that will

be helpful.

-IN THE TRAINING AND ASSIMILATION OF OLD AND NEW MEM-BERS

Let there be a New Member training course (Children and Adult) taught in every church each year.

Let the pastor of each charge teach or have someone else teach a course each year on "What Methodists Believe." (List of books suggested, "Major Methodist Beliefs" by Stokes; "The Methodist Primer" by Selectman; "When Protestants Worship" by Hedley.)

Let there be Workshops in each District during the Fall at which time

the ministers will be given guidance in How to Conduct Membership Training Classes for Children, Youth and Adults. The planning and directing of the Workshops will be under the auspices of both the Conduct Membership Conducting of the Workshops will be under the auspices of both the Conducting Co ference Board of Evangelism and the Conference Board of Education. The Workshops will be a joint endeavor of each of these Boards. The time and date of the Workshops will be at the discretion of each District Superintendent.
STATE WIDE WORKSHOP FOR PASTORS, DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS AND KEY LAYMEN

One Pastor and the District Superintendent and a key layman from each District in the State meet in a workshop to study the art and tactics of salesmanship. Then each group to go back to their own district and set up on a sub-district basis, workshops that would instruct each pastor and leading laymen the techniques of salesmanship.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES Adopted May 31, 1966

The Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes attempts to fulfill its Disciplinary tasks outlined in paragraphs 1562-1567 of the 1964 Discipline. Therefore, we recommend the following:

That the Commission on World Service and Finance designate a sum of \$13,000 for this sphere of work for 1966-67 Conference Year. These funds to be appropriated: School of Nursing at the Methodist Hospital of Memphis, \$5,000; Methodist Children's Home of Arkansas, Inc., \$2,000; The Methodist Nursing Home, Inc., of Fort Smith, \$1,000; Board expense. \$793.71: Contingencies, \$150.

2. That the Golden Cross Offering, to be taken in every Church, be divided between The Methodist Hospital (85%) and The Methodist Nursing Home (15%). Recognizing that these two institutions touch every part of our Conference, we urge greater emphasis upon the Golden Cross Offering.

That the second Sunday in May be designated as Hospitals and Homes Day for the receiving of the Golden Cross Offering and that the period of December 11th to 25th, 1966, be observed as Children's Home Emphasis Period, with the Children's Home Offering to be received at this time.

That the North Arkansas Conference continue the authorization permitting the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Nursing Home and pastors to solicit funds for the nursing home development program within the churches of the Conference.

We nominate for election as trustees for the designated institutions

with terms to expire in 1969 the following:

a. Methodist Hospital in Memphis—H. K. Barwick, Jr., and Dan Portis.

b. Methodist Children's Home of Arkansas, Inc.—E. Clay Bumpers, Byron McSpadden, Mrs. Vance Thompson and Mouzon Mann. c. Methodist Nursing Home, Inc., of Fort Smith—T. L. Hunt, Roger

Lynch and Gilbert Forsgren.

We recommend that the annual support of the Chaplain of the State Sanatorium in Booneville for the Conference Year 1965-66 be \$4,557 as follows: Salary, \$3,000; travel, \$600; rent, \$750; insurance, \$27; annuity,

We recommend the work of Chaplain Bates Sturdy at the State Sanatorium and Chaplain George Stewart at the Methodist Hospital in Memphis. We express our appreciation to Harvey Hazelwood for his work as Golden

Cross director and recommend his re-election to his office.

Cross director and recommend his re-election to his oince.

We welcome the suggestion from participating institutions that a folder be printed describing the work of the Church through its hospitals and homes and heartily approve their cooperative effort in this matter. We call upon all churches and pastors to assist in the distribution of this publication and ask that suitable space be given in The Arkansas Methodist for re-printing of the information. We believe that greater support for this work will come with better informed people. work will come with better informed people.

It is with a sense of thankfulness that we note the present effort being made to draw attention to the opportunities afforded all persons in making wills that will benefit God's work and institutions. We heartily commend this and ask that Hospitals and Homes of the Church be such beneficiaries, and that this effort be in cooperation with the Methodist Foundation of

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Adopted June 1, 1966

During the Conference Year we have tried to emphasize a well rounded program of Lay Activities and the reports made at our Mid-Winter Meeting indicated a steady growth from each of the Districts in our Conference. Our Chartered Groups of Methodist Men continue to render excellent service with an increase in Clubs each year. Each District has shown an increase in this part of our program and a consecrated effort is being made to reactivate some of the Chartered Groups that are now in arrears.

Our Annual Luncheon, held each year during Conference was in the

private dining hall at Hendrix College, and was well attended.
Our Petit Jean Assembly, held last August 14-15, 1965 was the best ever. The Theme: "Personal Witnessing" was developed to perfection. Pratt

Remmell started with his personal witness on Saturday evening which was followed on Sunday morning with two hours of personal testimonies by the laymen from over the Conference. Bishop Galloway brought the message for the 11:00 o'clock worship service. About 150 men spent the night on the Mountain and enjoyed this inspirational Annual Meeting.

Our Annual Assembly will be held on Mount Petit Jean this year August 20-21. Our Theme: "My Witness." The meeting will start at 3:00 o'clock on Saturday afternoon ending with the noon meal on Sunday. A well balanced inspirational program is being prepared by the Program Commit-

tee and we are looking forward to a capacity meeting.

Laymen's Day was well observed throughout the Conference, with more than 90% of the Churches participating. A method of complete reporting on this was provided this year and several of the Districts, through these information sheets, furnished bulletins and other information concerning the services which were held in their Districts. October 9, 1966 will be the day set aside for Laymen's Day participation this year. We appreciate the excellent cooperation we have received from the ministers with reference to this part of our program and we hope that they will continue to share this Sunday with us.

Through our Jurisdictional member of the General Board of Lay Activi-

ties, Rev. Virgil D. Keeley, Dr. Claire H. Pettitt, President of the General Board of Lay Activities, was a visitor in our conference. He, with Roy Black of Mississippi and Pratt Remmell of Little Rock put on a program for the men of the Blytheville area entitled "Echoes of Purdue."

We have had excellent results in the training of our laymen in the various Districts to become Certified Lay Speakers. Jim Wiseman, Conference Director of Lay Speaking, has done an excellent job in this part of our program and under his leadership Study Courses have been conducted in several of our Districts, resulting in more than 100 Certificates having been issued to these Certified Lay Speakers. At our Mid-winter Meeting Jim requested that he not be renominated for this Conference Director due to the advice of his doctor. We wish to thank him for the excellent job that

he has done during his two years in this office.

We are well pleased with the leadership of the District Lay Leaders in the various Districts. More and more our Program of Lay Activities is becoming a team effort supplied by the leadership of the District Lay Leader and his Associates, working in cooperation with the District Superintendent.

As in the past two years we have included in our budget an item of \$100.00 to be presented to the winner of the Rural Church of the Year Award, the winner to be selected by the Town and Country Commission.

A budget of \$2,000.00 was approved at our Mid-Winter Meeting and a propert for this amount was to be made to the West Country Commission.

BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS Adopted June 2, 1966 RECOMMENDATIONS

In recognition of the need to strengthen our Seminaries and provide scholarship support for ministerial students, we recommend the following:

- I. That we move as rapidly as possible toward the Jurisdictional goal of 1% of the total raised in the conference exclusive of debt retirement and capital investment as the sum for support of seminaries and ministerial education.
- II. That we insure the continuance of our present program of assistance by reserving each year an amount sufficient to cover operation of the board and care for scholarship commitments. For this year we estimate this amount to be \$15,600.
- III. That the conference move in this direction by continuing the basic support of this program through World Service and Conference Benevolences and the magnifying of the November Special.
- IV. We urge the observance of the November Special in every Church of the Conference. We ask that every pastor preach one Sunday in this month to inform the congregation as to the needs, opportunities, steps into, requirements, and awards of the Christian Ministry.
- V. That with increasing cost of education and higher standards for admission into the ministry that the responsibility of the church to help provide for the training of her ministers shall be stressed so that the Offering to be taken will be more in keeping with our needs. We suggest as a bare minimum the sum of \$12,500 through the November Special this Conference year.

POLICY AND PROGRAM

- I. The Board will conduct its work in harmony with 1964 Discipline.
- II. The funds of the Board will be expended in the following ways:
 - 1. The normal work of the Board and its registrars for the operation of Board and the guidance of the men related to the Board in their training.
 - 2. The assistance of students in college preparing for the ministry and students in theological schools, accredited or approved by the University Senate, who are working toward the B.D. degree or equivalent, who show need of help. The Board has tentatively set \$310 as the maximum amount to be loaned in any one year but this may be less in those schools where the total tuition and fees are less for the period of one year.
 - 3. A special committee is working on the loan program with the hope of enlarging and extending the help available. Any changes from the policy as reported in the 1964 Journal will be presented at Annual Conference for action.
 - 4. Students receiving assistance from the Board will be required to
 - sign the following statement:
 "I understand that the amount of assistance given me each year is in the form of a loan to be repaid by service to The North Arkansas Conference. I further understand that each year spent in the ministry in the Conference will repay in full any amount I received in any one year. If I discontinue my training for the ministry, or if I do not return to the Arkansas Area upon graduation from Seminary, it is agreed that the amount of this loan will become due at the rate per year of the amount received per year. The first payment will be due at the second Annual Conference following graduation or discontinuance. If I do not enter the ministry, this loan is to bear interest at the rate of 4% per annum from the date of issue."
 - 5. In order to qualify for a loan from the Board the student should apply for assistance by the week of Annual Conference and no later than August 15. Dr. James Upton has been elected loan officer for the Board and all applications should be sent to him at Hendrix College, Conway, Arkansas.

 Students applying for assistance must have a License to Preach or shall have met all requirements for License to Preach by the beginning of the second semester in which he receives help from the Board.

POLICY ON SCHOLARSHIP AID

Policy: (1) Begin with basic need of student.

(2) Pay basic fees and tuition at college or seminary attended by our students.

(3) In cases of exceptional need, the board will consider aid up to \$400.00 dollars per school year (9 months).

- (4) If a student has earned credit in 12 hours of work and wants to accelerate his preparation as a minister the Board may pay fees and tuition for a summer school.
- (5) In order to be eligible to continue on student aid a student must, by the end of his Sophomore year, have and maintain a grade point average sufficient to insure his graduation from the school he is attending.

III. The Course of Study Schools

 The Board will pay \$250.00 to support the St. Paul Course of Study School and \$250.00 to support the Perkins Course of Study.

2. The Supply men who attend either of these Course of Study Schools will receive Room and Board scholarships from the institution which they attend.

3. The Board will give \$25.00 for the purchase of books to each man who attends either of these schools.

4. The books must be paid for by the men themselves who, in turn, will send the list of books to the treasurer for reimbursement. They are not to be charged to the treasurer or the Board.

IV. Correspondence Work

. The Board will pay fees for all men in the courses of study including:

(a) License to preach(b) Introductory studies(c) The course of study

The expenses of papers re-submitted for grading will be paid by the minister himself.

V. Part-time Approved Supplies

1. The Board urges all part-time Approved Supplies to attend the Arkansas Pastor's School, October 10-12, 1966.

VI. Recruiting Ministers

- The Board will co-operate in the Conference on Discipleship to be held this summer for High School students in the western half of the Conference.
- 2. The Board will co-operate with the Wesley Foundation Directors in recruitment. Books used in License to Preach studies and in Introductory studies will be placed in the Wesley Foundation libraries which do not now have them.

VII. Arkansas Pastor's School

 We will support the Arkansas Pastor's School giving \$350 per year to its budget.

REQUESTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

- I. The District Superintendents, Pastors, and local churches to help young men to understand the great need for ministers and challenge them to hear and answer the call to preach.
- II. The young man who is to enter the Ministry, under paragraph 306, should as soon as possible enroll in the studies for License to Preach with the Department of In-Service of the General Board of Ministerial Education.

- III. We request each Pastor to have available to give to young men materials on the Ministry, especially copies of the folder "Courses of Study for License to Preach."
- IV. We urge compliance with the requirement that all men in the courses of study take their work through the Courses of Study in Perkins or

BOARD OF MISSIONS Adopted June 2, 1966

The Board of Missions views with appreciation the increasing recognition that we live in a world where men everywhere are being made aware of their dependence upon one another. Deeper than the unity provided by transportation and culture is the unity found in God our Creator. We recognize that the missionary outreach of The Methodist Church must begin with the local church. In view of these facts your Board of Missions urges each church to make a careful analysis of its own life and particularly of its part in God's mission to people in the local community as well as abroad. The conviction underlying our mission is summed up in the words that we are "a people claimed by God for his own, to proclaim the triumphs of Him who has called you out of darkness unto His marvelous light." (I Peter 2:9). We as a Board are aware of, and grateful for, the splendid support by the churches of World Service and Conference Benevolences. Noticeable increases have been made in Advance Specials. The Building Shares Program has helped in the organization and assistance of new congregations. Mission Aid for salaries has enabled many congregations to take on new life and be served more effectively. The work in resort areas becomes of greater concern to us because of the establishment of additional recreational and retirement areas in our conference, and the marked increase of time for

leisure activities. Our church is continuing to minister to migrant workers and the support of this work is being provided by local and district organizations. While we rejoice in the advances made we recognize the fields are white unto harvest and we pray that our hearts and minds will be receptive to God's call to greater achievements in the year ahead. We acknowledge God as the guide and strength for the facing and fulfilling of the Mission of the Church by individuals and congregations throughout our conference, state, and world. Your Conference Board of Missions makes the following recommendations:

I. PROMOTION

A. Advance Specials

1. That we continue the progressive program of missionary education and giving within the Conference. That each District and each charge within the Conference develop a program of missions that will not only increase giving, but will bring to all a new understanding and a rededication to the total mission of the church.

2. That the North Arkansas Conference accept as National Division Advance Special goals for 1966-67 the following:

Alaska Methodist University \$5,500
Oklahoma Indian Mission \$6,500
Spanish Speaking Work 4,000
Central Jurisdiction 2,000
Lydia Patterson Institute, Operation and Maintenance 2,000

TOTAL\$20,000

4. We recommend the establishment or continuation of a "Bishop's Special Advance Fund" to which churches, organizations within the local church or private individuals may contribute for Advance Special credit. This fund will be administered by Bishop Paul V. Galloway and will be designated for such World Division Advance Special needs as he may deem advisable in his missionary travels this quadrennium. The Bishop will notify such churches as to the project for which their Advance Special gifts have been designated. Such funds may be sent directly to the Bishop, and should be designated for "Bishop's Special Advance Fund." Upon the return of Bishop Galloway from his mission itinerary a number of rallys will be held across the Conference at which time he will speak in regard to our work in the mission field. These meetings to be held sometime in the early fall.

B. Missionary Support

- 1. The cost of maintaining a single missionary overseas is now \$4,500 per year. Churches supporting missionaries should endeavor to raise their support proportionately. Churches not presently supporting a missionary overseas should consider accepting shares of not less than \$750 towards the support of one. This type of Advance Special support gives the local church a personal tie with a missionary and his work overseas. We note with appreciation the addition of another church supporting the Robert K. Johnson family which made possible the amount of \$4,500 as requested by the General Board of Missions.
- 2. We trust that churches in the North Arkansas Conference will be in earnest prayer for all our missionaries over the world. We would especially solicit prayers and concern for Rev. Jon Guthrie and the team of fifteen missionaries he is directing in the Re-

public of Congo. We urge pastors and other church leaders to write letters and to send greeting cards to our missionaries from time to time, letting them know of our interest and concern for them and our desire to lend our support. Churches are encouraged to have copies of "The Prayer Calendar" available for their members. These may be secured from the Service Center, 7820 Reading Road, Cincinnati, Ohio.

C. Other Aids to Missions

1. We urge every charge to conduct a church-wide School of Missions this year following the church-wide study theme for 1966-67. We recommend that January and February be designated "Church-Wide School of Missions Months" and that special emphasis be given to the study during this period.

2. We hope that missionaries available in our area for 1966-67 will be invited to speak in our Conference and Districts for the purpose of missionary cultivation. We suggest that churches desiring a missionary speaker contact the District Missionary Secretary and/or the Conference Missionary Secretary, and/or the General Board Secretary of Missionary Personnel, M. O. Williams, Jr., 475 Riverside Drive, 13th Floor, New York, New York. (10027)

Fayetteville District \$5.00 All Other Districts \$10.00 Persons attending the Workshop are asked to send their name and address to the District Missionary Secretary who will then compile the list for his district and forward it to the Conference Treasurer for the financial supplement. All District Missionary Secretaries are called upon to attend the meeting of the South Central Jurisdiction summer Missionary Conference at Mount Sequoyah on August 1-4.

D. Church Building Shares

1. Christian outreach is at the very heart of the gospel of Christ, and the continuing needs of new and struggling Methodist congregations prompts us to continue our program of Church Extension by recommending that \$20,000 in Special Extension Funds be raised each year of this quadrennium for the use of the Conference in aiding these congregations. We suggest that the amount be apportioned among the districts by the World Service and Finance Commission, and that each district be encouraged to develop its own program of Church Extension and to present such a program to the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension prior to the Annual Conference Session.

We further request that the District Stewards of each district apportion to the local churches the amount apportioned to the districts by the Commission on World Service and Finance. We ask that the Special Church Extension Funds, raised in the Conference program be handled through the Conference Board of Missions, and that all promotion for this program for each Conference be correlated through the Area Council of Arkansas

Methodism.

2. That the Committee on Special Church Extension shall have the following duties:

a. To assist the Executive Secretary of the Area Council, the District Superintendents and the District Missionary Societies in the planning and promotion of the following:

- Establishment of outpost Sunday Schools
- Purchasing new sites Building of new churches
- (4) Mobile Chapel Units 5) Mergers of churches
- The disbursing of Conference funds allocated to Special Church Extension purposes. Money shall be disbursed on the following basis:
 - (1) A properly completed application form must be submitted to the committee before any funds can be granted. The application will be available from the Area Council Office. Funds requested shall be approved by the District Missionary Society and the District Superintendent.
 - (2) That the committee has the authority to suggest the adjustment, acceptance, or rejection of the application and to make recommendations to the Board.
 - (3) That the Executive Secretary of the Area Council be responsible for investigating the requests and making recommendations to the committee as to the merits of the

E. Larger Parish and Group Ministry Programs

1. That the Board of Missions and the Town and Country Commission cooperate in the policy of seeking to assist District Superintendents, Pastors, and Church Members in establishing and maintaining the Larger Parishes and the Group Ministry. To this end, the Committee on Research and Survey of the Board of Missions is continuing a study to find the natural areas in which larger parish or group ministry programs might be organized. The larger parish or group ministry needs to be established in those places where closer cooperation between pastors and churches will strengthen the ministry of the churches. Many open country churches cannot survive without this cooperative effort.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Adopted May 31, 1966

Even though the Woman's Society of Christian Service no longer has a Secretary of Youth Work, in the North Arkansas Conference we have had an accent on youth this year. In cooperation with the Board of Social Concerns we sponsored a tour to the United Nations and Washington. Thirty-seven youth—twenty-seven girls, ten boys with six adults made the trip. If you have not heard one of these young people from your area tell of his experiences you have missed something.

experiences you have missed something.

Then at our annual meeting in Searcy we had a youth night with the Hendrix College Choir singing, so that the church was filled with youth in the front and women in the back. Dr. George Baker, Jr. from Southern Methodist University spoke and knew just how to challenge young people.

Several districts have had days on campus with panels of students and questions and answers. We need to listen to our students and know what they are thinking, especially about the church. More local committees on Christian Vocations need to be activated. Boxes to Viennam have shown our Societies love and concern for our youth in service. If we don't guard against Societies love and concern for our youth in service. If we don't guard against

it, a local Society or a local church can become very local. So we have encouraged our women to go to annual meeting, district meetings, School of Christian Mission and United Church Women. We want them to catch a vision of what the Church, the Board of Missions and the Woman's Division are doing nationally and around the world. The Church is very relevant nationally and world-wide, but the local church or Society is often not aware

of the tremendous movement they are a part of.

Just so a conference officers may become provincial, so we are glad when they can go to other places and get a glimpse of their work as related to the whole Church. Our Secretary of Christian Social Relations went to the United Nations, our Secretary of Program Materials to Service Center, our Secretary of Spiritual Life Cultivation is on the Advisory Committee for the Regional School of Christian Mission, our Secretary of Missionary Education and Service attended the Workshop on Mobility, and our Secretary of Campus Ministry has been to United Nations and Washington as one of the adult leaders.

When I was invited to the meeting of the Woman's Division and then the whole Board of Missions at Buck Hill Falls, Pennsylvania in January, it was a dream of my life come true. I learned how vast a work we are doing and how aware our leaders are of the needs all over the world. They did not commission as many missionaries as they have in other years because this is being done more in home conferences as it will be done here. However, the commissioning of seven world and four national missionaries was thrilling. All but one were young couples starting out together. As they marched out with so many Methodist preachers singing "Crown Him Lord of All" to that most difficult and lovely tune, I felt a great uplifting of heart.

The Convocation of Boards in Galveston in March inspired me. The Conference presidents gave their report in scenes or tableaux with the Jurisdiction President as reader.

At Jurisdiction Meeting preceding the Seventh Assembly in Portland, Oregon we had five delegates and one alternate present (Mr. and Mrs. Nels Barnett) and as visitors five of our district presidents, a district Guild Secretary, and 3 local presidents and others.

At the Assembly we had 24 from our conference including all of our district presidents. These all come back ready to close the gap between what the Woman's Division is doing nationally and world-wide and the responsi-

bility of the local Society.

When they began flashing unusual projects on the screen that last night of Assembly, as someone told of each, I kept wishing North Arkansas could have done something different to be shown. Then, as one from Little Rock spoke, four women seated around a table flashed on the screen. There were the three conference presidents of Arkansas and the dean, Mrs. Maurice Lanier, as we planned our Inter-conference School of Christian Mission to be on Mt. Sequoyah August 8-12. This was novel enough, history-making enough to be featured at our great Assembly before 8000 women! Do urge your women and men to come. We want chairmen of the Commissions of Missions, Christian Social Concerns, Education, pastors.

Then we hope the Conference, District, and Local Study Committees will

be activated and function so that all of us—men, women, youth—the total Church—will be studying together "Affluence and Poverty: Dilemma for Christians" and James and I Peter.

Let me remind you ministers that the Women's Division is still responsible for the workers they have sent out and the institutions they have established, so that, even though we have become an integral part of the Board of Missions, we do not yet hold all things in common, so the women must still pledge to the Woman's Society. All cannot go to World Service and Advance Specials. Division of funds collected as result of study should be agreed upon before a church-wide study begins.

We plan to itinerate Edith Martin in all the districts this fall, and we

are eagerly looking forward to this.

Again I want to urge you to help us get a Woman's Society in churches where there is none, or perhaps several small churches can join together and organize a Society. We want to help women grow spiritually and make them aware of the needs of the world which they can help meet. This year we had a Self-study trying to see ourselves as others see us and as God wills us to be. This year we will have Phase II of this. We covet your suggestions concerning how we can serve the local church, the Conference, the district in a better, more Christlike way.

The combined pledge for the Woman's Society of Christian Service and

the Wesleyan Service Guild for the new year is \$81,000.

THE BOARD OF PENSIONS

Adopted May 31, 1966

A. DISTRIBUTION

Fulfilling our responsibility as the Conference Board of Pensions, we have authorized the payment of claims as follows: To 57 members retired by the North Arkansas Conference, with a total of 1867 service years. To 68 members retired by other conferences with a total of 4151/4 service years. To 12 members retired by other conferences with a total of 30 supply To 73 widows of members retired by the North Arkansas Conference with a total of 1973½ service years. To 75 widows of members retired by other conferences with a total of 558% service years. To 4 widows of members of other conferences with a total of 151/2 supply years. To 7 dependent children of deceased ministers retired by the North Arkansas Conference and other conferences, whose pensions are based on a total of 88% service years. To 21 approved supply pastors of the North Arkansas Conference with 270 service years. To 12 widows of approved supply pastors of the North Arkansas Conference with 185 1/2 service years. To 1 dependent child of an approved supply pastor whose pension is based on a total of 10 service years. The North Arkansas Conference in 1965-1966 had the responsibility for a total of claimants with a total of 5,414 4 years of service. These annuity claims have been paid on the basis of the following rates established by the annual conference: Conference Members (100% of Annuity Rate) .\$48.00 per service year Widows of Conference Members (70% of Annuity Rate) 33.60 per service year Dependent Children of Conference Members (25% Annuity Rate) 12.00 per service year Approved Supply Pastors (80% Annuity Rate) 38.40 per service year Widows of Approved Supply Pastors (70% of Supply Pastor's Rate) 26.88 per service year

B. RESPONSIBILITIES

9.60 per service year

(For the Period of June 1, 1965 to February 22, 1966) Other services rendered by the Board of Pensions:

1. Five necessitous allowance grants—Total \$983.03.

Dependent Children of Approved Supply Pastors (25% of Supply Pastor's Rate)

2. Premiums in the amount of \$4,969.83 for 68 claimants eligible for Group Hospitalization Insurance coverage.

3. Premiums in the amount of \$3,116.97 for 61 claimants eligible for Death Benefit Program coverage.

4. Nine Love Offerings at retirement—Total \$2,700.00.

These benefits are equivalent to approximately \$3.00 per service year.

C. RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. We recommend that the annuity rate for 1966-67 be \$48.00 per service year for retired members and that the rate for 1966-67 for special conference claimants be 80% thereby setting said rate at \$38.40.
- 2. We recommend that there be apportioned to charges for conference claimants an amount equal to 20% of the pastor's salary; and that each minister, except retired ministers, part time supplies and student supplies, appointed with an annuity claim on the conference shall pay an assessment annually to the conference claimants fund in an amount equal to 2% of his total cash salary which shall include minimum salary and mission appropriations. Any man not having paid his Conference Claimants Fund, pastor's part, will be charged 5% interest per year on the unpaid balance, in accord with Paragraph 1624 and 1634 of the 1964 Discipline.
- 3. We recommend there be continued the work of the Board of Pensions Committee on Proportional Payment of Ministerial Support in accord with provisions of Paragraph 1624 and 1634 of the 1964 Discipline.
- 4. That the Secretary of the Annual Conference be requested to print in the Conference Journal individual amounts due and amounts paid by pastors during the year to the Conference Claimants Fund.
- 5. That necessitous allowance grants, retirement love offering, and local expenses of the Board be paid by the Treasurer, subject to the approval by the Executive Committee of the Conference Board of Pensions and 1964 Discipline (Paragraph 1611.10 and Paragraph 1652.2).
- 6. That the regular annuity payments be made monthly in advance to the Conference Claimants from the office of the General Board of Pensions, Evanston, Illinois, on the first day of each month.
- 7. That the institution, board or organization paying the salary of a minister on special appointment without annuity claim on the conference shall make provisions for the pension of such person. Attention is called to the 1964 Discipline (Paragraph 1644.1) with reference to eligibility to participate in Ministers Reserve Pension Fund (MRPF) with the approval of the General Board of Pensions.
- . That there be apportioned to each agency and institution served by a ministerial member under special appointment with annuity claim on the conference, the sum of \$360.00 for the conference year 1966-67 in accord with the 1964 Discipline (Paragraph 1623.7); and that said apportionment be paid to the Treasurer of the North Arkansas Conference Board of Penderson sions no later than 7 days prior to the opening of annual conference.
- 9. That the special appointment be listed in the Conference Journal as follows:

JOINT COMMISSION FOR THE ARKANSAS METHODIST AND LOUISIANA METHODIST

Adopted June 1, 1966 RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the dates for the 1967 Circulation Campaign be January 8 to 15.

2. That the goal for the campaign be 41,000 with the quotas for the local churches be one subscriber for every seven members reported by that church in the 1966 conference journal.

3. That the subscription price be \$2.50 per year. Where a church sends in a subscription list equal to one for every three members it will become eligible for a rate of \$2 per year.

4. We are grateful for an increasing number of churches using the all-family plan and would like to challenge every district to secure one additional church on this plan. We feel it would be good to give appropriate recognition at the annual conference to the new churches going on this plan each year.

5. We recommend that the Commissions on World Service and Finance of the Louisiana, North Arkansas and Little Rock annual conferences be asked to continue their annual appropriation of \$4,600 each for the support

of the papers.

6. That the editor and the chairman of the commission be authorized to sign notes at the Union National Bank, Little Rock, for money that must be borrowed for current operation.

7. That the executive committee be empowered to act for the commission in matters that require attention between meetings of the commission.

8. That the appreciation of the commission be expressed to all those who have made it possible for us to have a good year in 1965. We are especially grateful to Bishop Paul V. Galloway, Bishop Aubrey G. Walton, the 21 district superintendents and the 21 district directors.

We are also indebted to the dozens of people who help us with the thousands of words and the hundreds of pictures which must flow across our desk in a steady stream. If this flow continues, we will continue to give you 50 papers a year in which you will take pride.

THE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS Adopted May 31, 1966

THE CONTINUING CHALLENGE

When we consider the full meaning of our commitment to the God we know in Jesus Christ we realize eventually the need for witnessing of this commitment in our occupational choice and experiences as in every day in every area or it is not really influential in our existence at all.

Along with this basic premise we recognize the continuing fact that we are in a crisis period in terms of recruitment of persons who choose a church related occupation as their own. The Commission on Vocations at the conference level takes its task seriously and will endeavor to share in the total effort to share information, to train leaders, to equip local and district leaders, to challenge pastors, teachers, parents, high school counselors of our mutual responsibilities and opportunities in service to the youth of our communities.

Objectives and Report for 1965—1966

Our Commission sponsored a section in the Area Interboard Workshop at Hendrix in June, 1965 for district secretaries and members of our commission with the Rev. Arthur Hopkinson of the Interboard Committee on Christian Vocation Office in Nashville, Tennessee as our resource person.

The Commission has sought to cooperate in any way possible with dis-

trict and local programs; vocational clinics, workshops, institutes.

The Commission shared with other Boards and Agencies of the conference in sponsoring the Discipleship Conference for Senior High Youth at Shoal Creek Camp.

Copies of the current issue of the 'Methodist Church Related Occupations and Service Projects' have been distributed to each local pastor of the Conference.

Four copies of a new filmstrip, 'A Kettle of Fish' have been placed in the Central Film Library, Hendrix Station, Conway, Arkansas. This 13 minute colored sound filmstrip, is designed for showing to the members of the Official Board, Commissions, Committee on Vocations, Youth Workers. The filmstrip not only challenges as to responsibilities, but gives nine definite steps that can be taken to recruit youth for the mission of the Methodist Church.

All Boards and agencies with representatives who are members of the Commission on Vocations of the Conference are asked to be sure that their representatives are appointed and function. Steps are being taken that the Commission will meet at a time that all of its members can participate fully in its planning sessions.

Objectives For 1966—1967

1. To strengthen the organization and to enlarge the work of the Conference Commission on Vocations through study of the work it should be doing, and to prepare and facilitate its program for greater effectiveness.

2. To share in bringing together the counselors of youth (pastors, teachers, lay officers) and counselors in the schools (guidance counselors) for discussion of their mutual ministry with youth, to learn of the respective purposes, procedures, and to consider how each can cooperate for more effective counseling of our youth in terms of their occupational choice.

3. To suggest some program possibilities for confronting youth on the College campus with the possibilities of service through some church

related occupation.

- To provide a Coaching Conference-Laboratory School enterprise for leaders from seven districts of our conference to learn how to use the unit 'You and Your Life Work—A Christian Choice For Youth.' This unit is designed for youth, their parents, their adult workers, to share mutually. Leaders from the districts would then teach similarly in local areas throughout the conference wherever and as soon as possible.
- 5. To challenge parents in local churches to see the many aspects of youth making his occupational choice and of how he as parent can share helpful assistance as counselor.

6. To strengthen the present Local Committees of Christian Vocations, and to organize and activate others.

To cooperate with the District Secretaries and Committees in strengthening the phases of the program that are being continued and in launching new phases in the future.

8. To emphasize the observance of Ministry Sunday in May 1967 in every local church.

9. To provide materials, filmstrips, information to the district and local church levels.

Phases of Program For 1966—1967

1. Planning Retreat for Commission. Soon after the conference session in June of 1966, the commission will join in an overnight planning retreat to study the work given to it by the Discipline of the Church and to organize sufficiently to fulfill the areas therein. The role and function of the District Secretary of Vocations will be discussed with suggestions being shared as guidelines for the future. The work of the commission will be planned for the future and the plans then will be implemented as soon as at all feasible.

implemented as soon as at all feasible.

2. Guidance Consultations. The Commission will sponsor a Guidance Consultation for Church and high school counselors in possibly two areas of our conference this year. In October of 1966, the first consultation will be in Fayetteville for that area. High School guidance counselors, will be in Fayetteville for that area. High School guidance confiscions, local pastors will be invited from that immediate area for the two day program. The Rev. Arthur Hopkinson of the Interboard Committee on Vocations, Nashville, Tennessee will be the resource person for these programs. A number of persons will share: pastors, teachers, counselors. Resource persons from the University, High School and churches will be enlisted. In the consultation the two groups of counselors (from church and school) will learn of the respective purposes, procedures, in counseling youth in the occupational choice. Respective terms, approaches will be surveyed. The group of counselors will consider how they can assist one another in a mutual service of counseling youth in their common community. If our experience in this program proves as satisfying as that of others in other conferences we shall proceed with a second Guidance Consultation this year, probably in December either in the Jonesboro or Forrest City Area. Other consultations could follow in other areas in the future.

Conference Level-Coaching Conference—Senior High Laboratory School. As soon as it can feasibly be done, maybe in the Spring of 1967, our Commission with the full cooperation of the Board of Educa-3. Conference tion would like to sponsor a Coaching Conference-Laboratory School, to train teachers to work with youth and parents and counselors in

local churches using the unit "You and Your Life Work—A Christian Choice for Youth." This conference-school could be held in First Methodist Church in Conway. Potential teachers would be enlisted to participate from every district of the conference, with the commitment to follow through by using the unit with Senior High youth, their parents, their counselors in the future. A leader for the conferencelaboratory school with previous experience in this approach and study would be secured. It appears that both the nature of this study (its subject) and the approach (parents, youth, counselors studying together) merits special training that this coaching conference-laboratory can give.

4. Challenge Students on College and University Campus. Our commission will be working closely with our ministers at the student centers seeking to find a workable approach to confront students on the campus concerning the many possible occupations related to the mission of the church in our world. We will attempt some programs and evaluate them. Any that seem usable will be suggested to others in our confer-

ence.

Challenge Parents in Local Churches. Our commission takes seriously the parental role in the occupational choice in the lives of our youth. We will be seeking to assist parents in local churches to notice the aspects of the experience of youth in making his choice of occupation. Also we shall try to give guidance to parents for their responsibilities in counseling their youth in this important process and decision of life.

6. The commission will ever be seeking to assist the District Secretaries and Committees in strengthening the local church committees on Vocations and to congruing other local church conditions.

tions and to organize others leading into real activities that accomplish

the basic purposes on the local levels.

7. The commission will be assisting the District Committees in continuing some of the regular program of Christian Vocations that have proved vital. We shall also be ready to assist in launching new programs, emphases, projects, that enable a fuller recruitment for the mission of the church.

8. The commission has begun to look at the problems related to the fact of many ex-officio members who are members of boards and agencies of the conference. We shall endeavor to have every representative duly appointed and involved in the regular work of our commission. We will consider plans for meetings that will enable every member to attend

consider plans for meetings that will enable every member to attend and fully participate in the planning of the work of our commission.

9. The commission encourages the observance of "Ministry Sunday" in May, 1967 in every local church with the pastor and lay people using this day fully and helpfully as a means of sharing information, inspiration, in reaching youth for church related vocations.

10. The commission has four copies and will add three more soon, of the new film strip, "A Kettle of Fish" to the Central Film Library at Hendrix Station, Conway, Arkansas. This will be helpful in confronting local church leaders with both their responsible ties and how to fulfill them in recruiting youth for church related vocations. The kit of filmstrips dealing with youth and vocations is still available also from the film library for return postage.

film library for return postage.

Any materials, leaflets, information that seems vital will be shared to the local churches in the conference for their regular work in Christian

Vocations.

Facing The Future

We believe that God still calls people to his mission among men. We therefore pray that we may become channels whereby this call may be shared and heard by youth as they decide on their occupation. We want to understand about the opportunities available in church related occupations. We want to learn how to articulate this information to the youth cognizant of their needs, their dreams, and the many other calls upon them in the world in which they live. Counseling youth in these decisions are worthy of our finest preparations, and fervent prayers. The members of the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations seek to share in this ministry to youth in the churches of our conference as we assist district and local leaders in our common task. We want to learn more; to be more deligent in service; to be more challenging of the youth with whom we speak and witness.

that this Conference join with the Little Rock Conference in the establishment of a library and museum project at Hendrix College, with the support of the College;

that we continue to designate, with appropriate markers, those places

that are of historic and sacred interest to Arkansas Methodism;

that we continue our efforts to obtain the history of every church in the Conference, and that these histories be filed with the Historical Committee according to Districts;

that every pastor be urged to preserve his Quarterly Conference Records in his church study (this is the most fruitful source of local Methodist

history);

that we invite the Little Rock Conference to join the North Arkansas Conference in the preparation of an up-to-date history of Arkansas Methodism, and that the necessary fund be appropriated for the carrying out of such a project.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARY Adopted June 2, 1966

The Commission on Minimum Salary shall be composed of seven ministers of the North Arkansas Annual Conference and one layman from each District of the Conference, and including representatives from urban, village, and rural churches. The Commission shall elect quadrennially a chairman, vice-chairman, and secretary to perform the usual duties of such offices. These officers shall also compose the Executive Committee of the Commission. Whenever a vacancy occurs on the Commission between sessions of the Annual Conference, the vacancy shall be filled by the District Superintendent of the District involved.

Charges may become eligible to receive salary aid for the pastor from minimum salary fund by meeting the following requirements:

Conduct an Every Member Program on Stewardship following the procedure outlined by the Town and Country Commission.

File with the District Superintendent and the Executive Secretary

of the Town and Country Commission:

a. A report of the Every Member Stewardship Program.

b. A budget of each church approved by the Official Board.

c. An application for minimum salary assistance.

3. Each Charge or Parish shall be asked to increase the salary or travel \$100.00 each year. There will be no decrease in Minimum Salary aid in the first \$100.00 increase; and only fifty per cent (50%) reduction of all increase over \$100.00. No charge shall be eligible to receive Minimum Salary aid if there is a reduction.

4. That we adopt the Town and Country Commission program for Larger Parishes and Group Ministries.

5. Plans for a Larger Parish Program shall be presented to the Commission for approval and for funds to be received. Each Parish shall have a Training Course on the Larger Parish.

6. All pro-rated connectional claims shall be paid by the charge in

accordance with Paragraph 823 of the 1960 Discipline.

7. Minimum Salary Charges shall be grouped as follows: Type A—At least four churches with a membership of 300. Pastors preach three times on Sunday. Salary, travel expenses, mission aid and minimum salary not to exceed \$4,500.00. Where there are four churches on a charge and they merge to form three churches, they shall qualify for the same amount as a charge with four churches.

Type B-At least three churches with salary, travel expense, mis-

sion aid and Minimum Salary aid not to exceed \$3,900.00.

Type C—Student pastors married, at least three churches, salary, travel expense, mission and minimum salary aid not to exceed \$3,300.00. Student pastors single, at least three churches, salary, travel expense, mission and minimum salary aid not to exceed \$2,700.00. Minimum Salary Charges must be composed of at least three churches with salary and travel expense as much as \$1,800.00.

Maximum Schedule Allowances:

8. Payments from this fund are made without regard to the amount the pastor receives from pension or educational funds. No part-time pastor is eligible to receive minimum salary aid.

9. In event the income of the fund becomes insufficient to meet the claims upon it each claimant shall benefit in his proportionate share of the available fund.

- 10. An amount not to exceed a total of \$500 shall be allowed from this fund on the expenses of men serving minimum salary charges to attend the Rural Seminar.
- 11. This Commission will be willing to listen to any District Superintendent desiring to submit a special case for minimum salary aid.
- 12. A Charge may become qualified as a Minimum Salary Charge within the first three months of the conference year provided it meets the requirements of this Commission as stated in its report to Annual Conference and that:

(a) An application be submitted to the Area Secretary of the Town and Country Work and to the Secretary of this Com-

mission on, or before, September 1st.

(b) Any special case must meet the approval Area Secretary of Town and Country Work and the Executive Committee of this Commission.

(c) Any Charge thus approved becomes retroactive to the beginning of the Annual Conference year.

13. All churches shall be asked to pay into the Minimum Salary Aid Fund according to the following schedule: Pastor's Salary:

14. The Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission shall serve in an advisory capacity to the Commission on Minimum Salary.

- 15. All requests for Minimum Salary assistance shall be filed in triplicate; one copy each to the Secretary of this Commission, to the District Superintendent and to the Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission. These reports must be filed no later than May 15 preceding the Annual Conference Session.
- 16. Hospital and Group Life Insurance premiums of pastors serving Minimum Salary charges shall be paid their share from this fund.
- 17. We request of the World Service and Finance Commission \$1000 to carry the first Quarter of the Insurance program with the understanding that the Commission on Minimum Salary continue the program for the last three quarters of the Conference Year 1966-67.

The Television, Radio and Film Commission proposes the following program for this Conference year:

I. In the area of training we will:

-Provide a workshop during Pastors' School on THE WORD-AND MUSIC.

Provide scholarship aid for persons attending the Audiovisual-Communications Seminar at Mt. Sequoyah this summer.

Provide training in each district in the Conference, on a sub-

—Provide training in each district in the Conference, on a subdistrict level, on the use of audio-visuals by persons trained in this field.

II. In the area of TV-Radio Ministry Fund we:

Recommend that the World Service and Finance Commission continue to allocate \$2,500 to General TRAFCO for its general national programming.

Recommend that a special offering be taken in the local churches through Vacation Church School this summer and that it be designated for the Children's TV Series, BREAKTHRU.

III. In the area of Audio-visuals we will:

—Continue to purchase new films and filmstrips for the Central Film Library.

Print a new Film Catalogue and distribute to each pastor and

church in the Conference.

-Make the Film Library more efficient and effective.

IV. In the area of Television and Radio we will:

—Promote the new radio program, MAN WITH THE MIKE, with the specific purpose of placing this five-minute program on more stations in the Conference. Two stations, KNEW—Jonesboro and KAMS-FM—Mammoth Spring, are now carrying this program

program.

—Promote THE WORD-AND MUSIC, so as to get more ministers broadcasting this thirty-minute program over the local radio

stations.

—Promote the placing of the children's TV series, BREAKTHRU, on the air in areas of the Conference where it has not been scheduled.

REPORT OF THE AREA TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION 1965-1966

Adopted June 1, 1966

The Town and Country Commission is happy to report that a great deal has been accomplished this past year in the Town and Country work.

In spite of the fact that our Executive Director is just completing his first year in this work, the work has gone on much as it has in the past, but with a new approach in some areas. Our Executive Director says that he found a great deal of ground work already laid by his predecessor that made his work much easier, and he has also found his predecessor most willing to help him with his counsel and assistance.

The Executive Director has assisted in eighteen local, district, and subdistrict workshops on Stewardship. It will be interesting to note that several churches this year are using the Every Member Visitation Program for the first time. Two new Group Ministry Programs have been initiated in the state this past year. One in the Pine Bluff District and the other in the Fayetteville District. Both of these programs seem to be moving forward in a very fine way.

Our Executive Director attended the Workshop on Stewardship and Finance in Chicago last December. He reports that he picked up many new ideas and has been passing them on to the ministers and laymen throughout the Conferences.

Thirty-two rural ministers and their wives attended the Rural Church Seminar, which was held at the University in Fayetteville, June 28, 29, and 30 of last year. The Rural Church Seminar will be held this year on June 27, 28, and 29, and we are expecting to have a good representation from the Methodist Churches in Arkansas.

Building and remodeling assistance has been given by the Executive Director to several churches.

The Commission is grateful to the Arkansas Methodist, and it's editor for space given to its work over the past year. Many articles have been written about the things the Town and Country Commission has been doing, which has been of special interest to the Methodist of Arkansas.

A state workshop was held in January, which was attended by about seventy-five ministers and laymen. The workshop was under the direction of William D. Leavitt, Methodist Information Director, who pointed out many ways in which our smaller churches could improve their image in the local communities.

We have some ambitious plans for the Conference year 1966-67. In addition to the routine work of the Commission, we will give special emphasis to possible sites for new churches in our recreational and retirement areas. The new hymnal will be presented to the small churches by our State Director, and District Directors, who will give instructions in its use. Also, we will be working toward a uniform order of worship, which should become a strong factor in promoting a more harmonious relationship and better understanding between the small and large churches.

We will continue to offer the facilities of our film library to those churches desiring it. Our films have been used on more than one hundred oc-

casions during this past Conference year.

In addition to offering our guidance to local church, district, and subdistrict workshops on Stewardship, the State Director will offer to conduct, on a sub-district basis, a series of "Stewardship Revivals." It is his desire to hold at least two of these "Stewardship Revivals" in each Conference next year. His services in this area will be without charge and he is willing to come to any District upon invitation of the District Superintendent.

Our State Director will speak later in the Conference regarding the new phase of the Stewardship Program; Wills and Legacies emphasis of The Arkansas Methodist Foundation. Let it be said here, however, that the work accomplished in this area has exceeded all our expectations. We are pleased that the Town and Country Commission has been given such a significant

role in this great and promising work.

TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION PROGRAM 1966-1967

- The Town and Country Commission Meeting and Workshop shall be held in Little Rock sometime in January 1967. The Workshop will be on the Sacraments, Wedding Ceremonies, Funeral Services and Church Administration for new men in the Conference.
- 2. We shall continue to promote interest and provide worship services in areas having many tourists.
- 3. A study shall be made to determine where churches should be merged, and those that should be part of a Larger Parish Program, where new churches should be located, and where there are abandoned church properties. The results of this study shall be filed in the Town and Country Office.
- 4. Upon the request of the District Superintendent, the Executive Director, and the District Director will visit Rural Churches to present the New Hymnal and explain its many uses.
- 5. We shall cooperate with the University of Arkansas in the Rural Seminar. And we request the Commission on Minimum Salary to allow up to \$500.00 for expense of pastors on minimum salary to attend the Seminar.
- 6. The Executive Director and the Executive Committee may select an outstanding rural minister to attend the Seminar on Church and Community Life at Emory and if money is available the Commission will pay all or part of his expense.
- 7. The Commission shall be responsible for promoting stewardship through the Every Member Visitation Program, the Lord's Acre and the Lord's Hour Program, Tithing and Wills and Legacies Program through the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas.
- 8. We shall endeavor to secure a sign on every Methodist Church.
- 9. The Enlarged Charge Program shall be continued with a goal of at least 300-400 members for every full-time pastor.
- We shall work with TRAFCO to make available a filmstrip projector in every sub-district for the use of small membership churches.
- 11. The Executive Secretary shall inform all rural ministers of the Lending Library at Hendrix College and encourage its use by furnishing a list of appropriate books which are available through the Library.
- 12. Church Councils and Charge Commissions shall be organized where
- 13. The Executive Secretary shall continue to give guidance in building programs when requested by the Pastor and District Superintendent.
- We shall seek to get each District Director certified to teach the courses on the Larger Parish and Group Ministry and Town and Country Work.
- 15. The District Director shall be elected by the Commission at its Annual Meeting on nominations by the District Superintendent at the Annual Conference after consultation with the Executive Secretary. The Director shall be a member of the Commission representing the District which he serves, and when he is moved out of the District he shall no longer serve as a member of the Commission, unless he is appointed as District Director in the District where he moves. There shall be a training period for the Directors at the beginning of the Conference year in cooperation with other Boards and Commissions.
- 16. The Rural Church of the Year Program shall be promoted as outlined in the brochure provided for the Town and Country Workshop.
- 17. We shall seek to develop cooperative procedures between the Church and Governmental Agencies, the State Council of Churches and other Denominations.
- 18. We recommend the Neighborhood-1 Program to help in establishing new congregations, outpost Sunday Schools, and Cluster Groups in the area where there are no churches.

- 19. Our special emphasis this year will be a Worship Service in every Church, every Sunday. And we request the help of the Board of Lay Activities in its Lay Speaking Program in order to make this goal possible.
- 20. We recommend a uniform Order of Worship for all churches and that an invitation to Christian Discipleship be extended in every service.
- 21. We ask that \$9,000.00 be granted by the Commission on World Service and Finance for the Work of the Town and Country Commission for the next Conference Year. (See budget attached)
- 22. We request the appointment of William O. Scroggin, Jr., by the Bishop and the Cabinet as the Director of Town and Country Work and Stewardship for 1966-1967, representing both the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences of Arkansas Methodism.
- 23. We wish to commend Reverend William O. Scroggin, Jr., for the excelent work he has done during his first year as Associate Secretary of the Area Council in the field of Town and Country Work. And especially for the work he has done in the Wills and Legacies Program through the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas.

- 11. We recommend that the apportionment to the Charges for the District Superintendent's Fund be an amount equal to 10% of the pastor's salary, and that the salary and allowances for District Superintendents of the North Arkansas Conference for the year, 1966-67, be as follows:

(5) We recommend to the District Stewards of the 7 Districts of the Annual Conference that they give special consideration to the providing of office equipment and supplies, a business telephone, postage and stationary for the District Superintendent's office, from the District Administration Fund.

- 12. We recommend that the North Arkansas Conference continue to recognize the Disciplinary rights of the pastoral Charge to pay Pastor's expense incurred in his work in accord with Paragraph 829 of the 1964 Discipline. That the maximum total to be paid by the Pastoral Charges for the Travel and Utility Expense of the Pastor shall not exceed the sum of \$1,800.00 per year; and that no Conference percentage item is to be charged against this amount. A salary may not be lowered to initiate an expense fund or to increase an expense fund. Exceptions can be made only with the permission of the Cabinet and the Executive Committee of the Commission on World Service and Finance.
- 13. We recommend that during the month of November a special offering be taken in each church for Ministerial Training and the offering designated "the November Special for Ministerial Training." We suggest that the offering be preceded by a period of promotion and that during this time the program of the Board of Ministerial Training be explained.
- 14. We recommend that the Annual Conference support the plan of the Board of Missions for raising \$20,000.00 each year in the Quadrennium for use by the Board of Missions in Conference Church Extension. We recommend that this amount, \$20,000.00 be apportioned to the Districts as follows:

We endorse the Board of Missions recommendations that each District be encouraged to develop its own program of church extension and that such program be presented to the Conference Board of Missions prior to the next Session of the Annual Conference.

- 15. Concerning the office of the Conference Secretary, we recommend:
 - (1) That \$4,000 be allowed for the printing and mailing of the Conference Journal, and that any additional expenditures of the Conference Secretary be paid by the Conference Treasurer out of the Conference Administration Fund on receipt of statements.
 - (2) That \$600 be allowed as office expense for the Conference Secretary to be paid to the Conference Secretary at his request.
 - (3) That all other expenditures of the Conference Secretary be paid by the Conference Treasurer out of the Conference Administration Fund on receipt of statements from the Conference Secretary.
 - (4) That the Conference Secretary arrange for the printing of the Pre-Conference Digest again next year and that the expense for this be paid out of the Conference Administration Fund.

- 16. We recommend that the sum of \$300 be allotted for the expense of the Conference Statistician and that additional money not to exceed a total of \$300 for District Auditors be paid by the Conference Treasurer.
- 17. We recommend that an amount of \$1,200.00 be paid for the Episcopal Area Fund from the Conference Administration Fund or the Contingency Fund.
- 18. We recommend that the honorarium for the Conference Preacher be decided upon by the Presiding Bishop and the Commission on World Service and Finance and that this amount be paid from the Conference Administration Fund or the Contingency Fund.
- 19. We recommend that the Annual Conference support the Arkansas State Council of Churches in the amount of \$3,000.
- 20. We recommend that the Annual Conference continue to recognize the great value of having the Western Methodist Assembly (Mount Sequoyah) located within the bounds of the Annual Conference and that our appreciation for this great asset be shown by the contribution of a minimum of \$10.00 from every pastoral charge, and that additional gifts be encouraged.
- 21. We recommend that the following principle be adopted as a goal to be reached as soon as possible without working undue hardship on any agency:

"That no institution that has access to support by a special offering be given an allocation from Conference Benevolences. By the term 'agency' we mean such institutions as Hendrix College, Wesley Foundation, Methodist Children's Home, etc."

- 22. We recommend that the various Boards and Agencies of the North Arkansas Conference submit names and addresses of laymen serving on these Boards and Agencies to the Conference Secretary in order that he might mail the Conference Journal to these laymen.
- 23. We join with the Board of Pensions in recommending that a Committee be appointed to make a study of changing the fiscal year.
- 24. We respectfully request the Bishop to continue the committee to study the interboard structure for Conference Administration. Said committee to cooperate with a similar committee from the Little Rock Conference to study a joint interboard structure for Administration of Arkansas Methodism in this Area and the North Arkansas Conference.
- 25. We recommend that special offerings be taken in Vacation Church Schools this summer and that these offerings be designated to the Children's TV Series, BREAKTHRU.

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

Report No. 2

We recommend that the North Arkansas Conference raise \$98,246 annually for the work of Higher Education at Hendrix College and for the next three years that an additional \$98,246 per year be raised. These amounts are to be apportioned to the Districts, and the District Superintendents and District Stewards are to make the apportionments to the churches of the District according to their best judgement.

We recommend that Hendrix College be given permission to raise \$250,000 over the next three years from individuals within churches of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences who might give to such a

fund without affecting their giving to the local church.

COMMITTEE ON GROUP INSURANCE

Adopted June 1, 1966

Report No. 1

Group Life Insurance

We make the following recommendations:

I. All members of the North Arkansas Conference, except students serving appointments in, or those employed in conferences which have compulsory insurance programs, and every full time approved supply pastor receiving an appointment shall participate in the North Articles of the laws and requirements. kansas Conference Life Insurance Plan subject to its laws and regulations.

II. That the General Board of Pensions Death Benefit Program Plan B continue to be our Conference Group Life Insurance, providing coverage based on the 1966-67 average salary of \$5,617.

For each child of a deceased member, an educational benefit for each of the first four academic years of study beyond high school spent, after the death of the member, in full attendance at a standard school, college, university, or institution of higher learning shall be paid \$600.00 per year.

C. Contribution per member enrolled—\$56.17 yearly.
1. The premium of \$56.17 (1% of the average salary in the conference) shall be paid as follows: Pastor, \$22.47; Charge, \$33.70.

The annual premiums shall be paid by participants and charges and collected through district organizations and received by the Area Treasurer no later than January 20, 1966.

III. We further recommend that an additional group policy shall continue to be carried providing \$1,000.00 coverage for students with established conference relations serving in conferences with no compulsory insurance program, with the Board of Ministerial Training paying the total premium of \$7.50 yearly.

Report No. 2

Group Hospitalization Insurance

I. We make the following recommendations:

1. All members of the North Arkansas Conference except those eligible for "Medicare," except students serving appointments in or those employed in conferences which have compulsory insurance programs, every approved supply pastor receiving a full-time appointment, and every full-time lay employee of the North Arkansas Conference except those eligible for Medicare, shall participate in the North Arkansas Conference Group Hospitalization Insurance Plan subject to its laws and regulations.

2. All active members of the Conference and approved supplies 65 All active members of the Conference and approved supplies 65 years of age and over shall be encouraged to participate in Medicare, the government medical insurance program. (When the Medicare plan goes into effect July 1, 1966, all major insurance companies will adjust their programs to comply with it. This is true of Blue Cross-Blue Shield with whom we have our hospitalization insurance. They will offer coverage above and beyond that offered by Medicare but will not pay for coverage that is available through Medicare.) If this supplementary coverage is chosen we recommend that the If this supplementary coverage is chosen we recommend that the churches involved assume an amount equal to no more than 50% of the appropriate premium listed in the conference policy.

3. All retired personnel of the conference 65 years of age or older (conference members, approved supplies, the wives or widows of either group who are 65 or older) shall be encouraged to participate in Medicare, the government medical insurance program. Those retiring from the North Arkansas Conference shall have the \$3.00 per month premium for Part B of Medicare paid for them by the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions, except those who continue to serve as supplies earning \$1000.00 or more and these shall pay their own premium. The supplementary coverage mentioned in 2 above is highly recommended in all instances. When a retired man continues to serve and chooses the supplementary coverage we recommend that the church he serves participate on the same basis as recommended in 2 above.

- 4. All retired personnel under 65 (members of the conference, approved supplies, and wives, widows or dependents of the same) who retired at the 1958 session of the North Arkansas Annual Conference or thereafter shall have the conference hospitalization policy carried for them with the premium paid by the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions.
- 5. We further recommend that Blue Cross-Blue Shield be continued as the Group Hospitalization Insurance carrier for our conference.
- 6. The Blue Cross-Blue Shield rates issued by the Conference will be as follows:

These premiums are to be shared equally by the ministers and the

- 7. That hospitalization premiums be continued on a quarterly basis, the due dates to be June 10, September 10, December 10 and March 10. All insured persons shall send the premiums to the District Treasurer of Group Insurance.
- 8. Some employees now hold a Blue Cross-Blue Shield policy with other groups. Since they have an option to continue under their present coverage, we recommend that the churches involved assume an amount equal to no more than 50% of the appropriate premium listed in the conference policy.

COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS Adopted June 1, 1966

We, your Committee on Publishing Interests desire to make the following recommendations:

- 1. To every minister and layman we would urge you to keep the Methodist Publishing House and the Cokesbury Book Stores in mind as the source of supply for your every literary need. This great establishment is able to furnish any book that you may desire, along with visual aids such as filmstrips, films, as well as equipment for projecting them, every piece of equipment needed to properly equip your entire educational plant, as well as pulpit furniture and altar fixtures. It would be well for us to remember that the entire profit of the Publishing House is distributed proportionately to the various Annual Conferences to supplement the support of our retired ministers. A check for the amount \$7,348 was delivered to our Conference for this purpose yesterday.
- 2. Let us be sure that Methodist Literature is used in every class of the church school. Especially, with the preparation of the new curricula this material stands out above all else with which it might be compared.
- 3. We would ask every minister to investigate and take advantage of the most generous offer made by the TOGETHER magazine on its subscription rate through the Church Plan. It may seem that we have misunderstood when we learn that any person can receive this fine publication for the very low price of \$2.52 per year when the subscription is handled through the church itself. There are no limitations in the number of subscribers at this rate under this plan. From one to the entire church membership may be included.

4. Every church is encouraged to supply its pews with copies of the New Methodist Hymnal as soon as possible. The New Hymnal represents planning and skills beyond anything we might imagine. It is a great step forward in keeping the worship services of our church in step with the times without loosening the ties that bind us to our heritage. The New Book of Worship as well as Pew Bibles are also available in matching colors where desired. Even if we order our Hymnal at this late date, we may expect possible delivery by the end of the calendar year.

5. The Publishing Interests of the Methodist Church pledge every effort and energy to the supplying of worthwhile materials to every member and friend of the Methodist Church. We covet your prayers and your support, and welcome every suggestion of constructive criticism as to how we may

serve you better.

Conatser, who later moved to Altus, Arkansas, where Mrs. Adcock attended Hiram and Lydia College until she married William Monroe Adcock on June 11, 1901. To this marriage was born four children: Mrs. Prather Willingham of San Francisco, California; Mrs. J. R. Steadman of Memphis, Tennessee; Loyd Adcock of Ankora, Turkey; and Robert Adcock of Bogata, Columbia, South America. Brother Adcock had two children by a previous marriage; Mrs. Carl Shelton of Foss, Oklahoma; and Richard L. Adcock of Little Rock, Arkansas. Brother and Mrs. Adcock both dedicated their lives to the rural churches of Arkansas. Other military assignments included: Edwards Air Force Base, California; Dover, Del.; Harmon Air Force Base, Newfoundland; the Blytheville Air Force Base, and Istanbul, Turkey.

His military decorations included: World War II Victory Medal; American Campaign Medal with cluster; Korean Service Medal with one battle star; U.N. Service Medal; National Defense Medal; Republic of Korea presidential unit citation; Air Force Reserve Medal; and Presidential Unit Citation.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Katherin Echols Barger, Monticello, Ark.; six children, Lt. Lyman Echols serving with the Air Force in Oklahoma City; Sue Katherin, a school teacher in Ferguson, Mo.; Janet, Judith, Tilden Ray, and Timothy Knox of Monticello; a brother, Udean Barger of Detroit, Mich., and a sister, Mrs. Chlone Dent of Flint, Mich.

MRS. ANNIE E. BRANSON

1862-1965

Mrs. Annie E. Branson, oldest native Mississippi Countian, died Monday afternoon of June 21, 1965, at Chickasawba Hospital, Blytheville, Arkansas, at the unusual age of nearly 103 years. Funeral services were conducted by her pastor, the Reverend Virgil D. Keeley of First Methodist Church, Blytheville, and burial was in Maplegrove Cemetery at Blytheville. Mrs. Branson, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Wesley Uzzell, was born November 3, 1862, at Louise Chapel near Bassett, Arkansas, in Mississippi County, and was the widow of Reverend A. M. R. Branson, former pastor of Blytheville First Methodist Church and a Trustee of Hendrix College, who died July 2, 1933.

Attending the public school at Louise Chapel in 1878 she entered Marv Mrs. Annie E. Branson, oldest native Mississippi Countian, died Mon-

Attending the public school at Louise Chapel, in 1878 she entered Mary Sharp College in Winchester, Tennessee, which was the first college in the United States that offered the same courses to women as to men. She was graduated from this institution in 1882. This fact alone sets her apart as a

woman of unusual initiative and character.

The honored representative of a pioneer Methodist family in eastern Arkansas and Mississippi County, it was entirely fitting that the First Methodist Church of Blytheville should lead in setting aside Sunday, November 3, 1962, as Annie E. Branson Day in honor of her 100th birthday, recognizing both her strength of character and influence and her long and

serviceable life.

She was married to Reverend A. M. R. Branson December 14, 1887, having met him while he was pastor of her home church on the Osceola having met him while he was pastor of her home church on the Osceola Circuit, and they made their first parsonage home at Augusta where her husband was the newly assigned pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal Church, South, where they served in 1887-1888. An interesting sidelight to the romance and marriage, according to W. C. Davidson, a lifelong friend of Brother Branson, was the bridal tour of the couple which included a steamer trip on the Mississippi River to Memphis and a journey by rail to Augusta.

She is survived by one son, Uzzell S. Branson of Blytheville, and one daughter, Mrs. Anne B. Ewart of Huntsville, Alabama, by five grandchil-

dren, fourteen great grandchildren and two great, great grandsons.

REV. EARLE CRAVENS

February 19, 1894-June 23, 1965

Earle Cravens was the fourth of five children born to Joe and Amanda Cravens—on February 19, 1894, at Prairie View (Logan County), Arkansas. He was educated in the local school system and completed his high school education at the Academy of The College of the Ozarks—living during this latter period in the home of The Reverend and Mrs. H. Lynn Wade, Pastor of the Clarksville church.

He taught for a brief period in the rural schools of Logan County. On January 19, 1918, he was married to Delia Gladys Cummins, a member of a neighboring family. Soon after this he enlisted in the United States Army and served in the Infantry until the end of World War I.

In the fall of 1923 he entered Hendrix College, finished the work necessary for the A.B. degree in three years and was graduated in June, 1926. During his college years, he managed the campus book store and served as

He was admitted on trial to the North Arkansas Conference in 1925,

and ordained Elder in 1930.

He was appointed to the East Van Buren Church (now St. John's) upon the completion of his college work and succeeded in retiring all indebtedness upon the recently constructed building. There followed pastorates at Plainview, Greenwood, Batesville Central Avenue, Piggott, Walnut Ridge, Marianna, Osceola, Russellville, Paris, Harrison, North Little Rock, Washington Avenue and Wilson. He retired at the Annual Conference in 1959 and with his wife moved into a home they had built at Paris.

During his entire ministry he made it a policy to cultivate persons in

the rural area surrounding the town to which he was appointed and perhaps preached more sermons in rural school houses in a "non-appointed" manner

than any of his contemporaries.

For many years he taught the Course on Missions at the Annual Summer Youth Assembly, and always loved and worked with the youth within

his church and community.

He was a long time member of the Conference Board of Education and served as its chairman for a number of years. He served as Chairman of the Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes from 1952 to 1962, and it was during this period that the Nursing Home was established in Fort Smith. He also served as a member of the Board of Trustees of The Methodist Hospital in Memphis—and it was this place of service that he enjoyed most of all his "beyond-the-local-church" activities. A room in the New Hospital will be appropriately marked as a memorial to him.

He was at his best in "Minister-to-person" relationships and was particularly skilled in reaching men not formerly related to the church.

His only son, Byron, followed him into the Methodist ministry, served in the Oklahoma Conference for nineteen years and now resides in Fort Smith. His only daughter is married to Dr. Phil Deal, the present Lay Leader of Central Methodist Church, Fayetteville.

His wife continues to make her home in Paris.

His spirit passed from this earth on June 23, 1965. The memorial service was conducted from the Paris Church by the pastor, The Reverend Norris Steele, and by Dr. Harold Eggensperger. His body was laid to rest at the Community Cemetery and in the family plot less than a mile from the place of his birth.

MRS. HAROLD EGGENSPERGER

Not longevity of itself, but quality of character, is the true measure of any life. Rela Young Eggensperger laughed much, loved more, and lifted mightily in her span of 49 years, and came to life's end triumphantly. Well may it be said of her, "She hath chosen that good part which shall not be taken away from her."

She was born at Clarksville, Arkansas, on February 22, 1917, the youngest daughter of George and Minnie Young. Here she became a member of The Methodist Church, and here she received her education, graduating as valedictorian of her high school class in 1935 and from College of the Ozarks as May Day Queen in 1939. On September 10, 1939, she was married to Harold Eggensperger, who had been licensed to preach in The Methodist Church and had already finished two years of his seminary work in Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University.

Soon after marriage, the groom resumed his studies at S.M.U. to complete work for his degree, and the bride became one of the secretaries of Dean Fugene Hawk. Immediately after the husband graduated, the young Dean Eugene Hawk. Immediately after the husband graduated, the young couple returned to Arkansas to begin their happy and useful career in the active work of the pastorate. All of their appointments have been in the North Arkansas Conference, with the exception of two years in an associate pastorship at First Methodist Church in Little Rock under Dr. Warren Johnston and Dr. Connor Morehead. Dr. Eggensperger's assignments have been Beebe, Bentonville, West Memphis, Russellville, Blytheville, Conway District and Egypthaville. trict, and Fayetteville.

Having chosen as her companion for life a man who had early dedicated himself to the Methodist ministry, Rela, as she was known to her friends, found the pastorate and her husband's work as much her own as his.

She took upon herself, freely and joyously, the duties of a pastor's wife. The work of the church was to her not so much chores that had to be done as privileges which she was permitted to enjoy, and her efficient service was not only for the glory of God and the good of the congregation, but also for the enrichment of her own life. She was a life member of W.S.C.S., and a

member of P.E.O.

No characterization of her would be complete which overlooked the artistry with which she expressed herself. In everything from the wrapping of a Christmas present to the ordering of her life in the ways of holiness, she was a perfectionist, ever showing forth the beauty which is truth and the loveliness which gives an added charm to goodness. In all her relationships with people she manifested a spirit which suggest the nearness of our common humanity to divinity.

In the 22nd year of her marriage Mrs. Eggensperger realized her highest ambition and her crowning glory as a wife. On August 28, 1961, she became the mother of her first and only child, Harold Stephen, who has been, and remains to be, the light and joy of the parsonage home. REVEREND EVERETT W. FAULKNER

1879-1965

Married in 1909 to Cornelia Ann Jones, daughter of Stephen Decatur Jones of Boone County, Arkansas, and survived by four children born to this marriage: J. Paul Faulkner of Jackson, Mississippi, Winston Faulkner of Little Rock, Mrs. George Overstreet of Wichita Falls, Texas, and Mrs. H. R. Paine, Jr., of Humbolt, Tennessee, and seven grandchildren, Brother Faulkner and his wife have left a beautiful heritage of family devotion and

earnest dutifulness in all of life's most sacred relationships.

Educated at Old Carrolton Academy and Hendrix College, and licensed to preach at a youthful age by the District Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, meeting in Belfonte, he was admitted On Trial in the old Arkansas Conference at Fayetteville, November 3, 1910. He completed the required course of study on schedule and was admitted into Full Connection at Atkins, November 30, 1912, being ordained an Elder at the first session of the North Arkansas Conference meeting in Batesville, November 20, 1914. Brother Faulkner retired in 1952 after forty-four years of service as an active Methodist preacher, having served the following charges: Valley Springs, Marshall, Berryville, Springdale, Marked Tree, Paris, Morrilton, Wilson, Batesville, Dardanelle, Cotter and Alpena.

He was universally loved by his brethren in the ministry and by the people among whom he served as true pastor in the Church of God because he manifested with special grace the loving spirit of Christ, the Master

whom he served.

MRS. FRED R. (FLORENCE CLAPP) HAMILTON 1882-1965

Mrs. Fred R. Hamilton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. A. Clapp, was born at Otisville, Michigan, April 7, 1882, and died June 8, 1965, at Siloam Springs, Arkansas. Burial was at Siloam Springs in Oak Hill Cemetery.

Mrs. Hamilton was devoted to her church in all of its activities and her service was joyous and abiding. She was a notable example of wisechoosing and the investing of time, opportunity and possessions with the disciplined purpose of building the Kingdom of God. When a new sanctuary with an attached chapel was built at the Siloam Springs Methodist Church in 1958 during the pastorate of the Reverend Edwin B. Dodson, Mrs. Hamilton gave the funds necessary for the construction of the chapel as a memorial to her late husband. A plaque marking the memorial reads, "In Memory of Reverend Fred R. Hamilton."

While not able to attend the services of her church during the latter part of her life, her interest in the building of the Kingdom was still very noticeable in her gracious spirit. Needless to say, she retained her many

There are times in the life of all of us when our feelings seem to impose silence. Surely this is true when we stand and, in retrospect, view the life of Ethel Beloate Reves. From the time of her birth at Corning, Arkansas, July 29, 1881, the daughter of Charles V. and Ida Beloate, she set hearts

singing.

On September 9, 1906, Claude M. Reves, who was in charge of the public schools in Corning, took her hand in marriage, and let his heart sing with hers. Into their union was born a son, Charles Beloate. The trio enjoyed life to the fullest, believing always that each should stand for the others, and all for God and man. This has been their anthem of praise across the years, evidenced even in the life of their son, who for thirty-five years has

Brother Smith is survived by his widow, Mrs. Mary Smith; two sons, Earl and Gene Smith of Paragould; two daughters, Mrs. Harold Boyd of Memphis and Mrs. Ann Dillingham of North Little Rock; two sisters, Mrs. W. M. Johnson of Paragould and Mrs. Pearl Johnson of Mountain Home. He is also survived by seven grandchildren and three great grandchildren. Funeral services were held in Griffin Memorial Methodist Church, Satur-

MRS. RENA COKER WOODRUFF June 25, 1869-November 15, 1964

Mrs. Rena Coker Woodruff was born in New Albany, Mississippi, June 25, 1869, the daughter of the late Dr. Peyton Bibb and Sarah Elizabeth Coker. The Coker Family removed to Arkansas shortly thereafter and located at what was then the settlement of Oak Bower, now Lavaca, in Sebastian County, fourteen miles east of Fort Smith on the south side of the

Arkansas River.

There, Rena Coker grew up as one of a family of eleven children. Her days as a young girl were spent in the days of the period of Reconstruction of the Southland after the Civil War, during the "Bushwhacker Era" in Western Arkansas and there was very little constituted authority in that area. This was the time when the State was controlled by a Carpetbag Government. The only reason for making note of this situation is that, perhaps, those early trials and fears had something to do with molding a character that was able to adjust throughout all of her life to changing situations and conditions. This, without compromising a conviction or principle and with a

cheerful and optimistic attitude.

Having been raised for three generations in the Methodist tradition (her father and mother were charter members and prime movers in the (ner nather and mother were charter members and prime movers in the establishment of the first of the Methodist churches in Osceola, Ark. (she married a young Methodist preacher, J. Eugene Woodruff, and this young couple served a number of circuits and charges in the old Arkansas and, later, the North Arkansas Conference.

To this union four children were born and two sons survive her. She was a devoted wife, a loving mother and a staunch and fiercely loyal Methodist.

Her tired old body laid down its burden early Sunday morning, November 15, 1964, after 95 years, 5 months and 20 days sojourn here and her gentle soul went to live with her Master and the host of loved ones who had

gone on before.

She was laid to rest in the cemetery, in the Methodist churchyard at Lavaca, beside her husband and their two little girls and four generations of her family; there to await the sounding of the last trumpet; the hearing of which for her there is no doubt.

The Conference determined that its annual notation should date from the time of the organization of the Arkansas Conference in 1836, instead of following the date fixed by the consolidation of the Arkansas and White River Conferences, when the name was changed to North Arkansas Conference in 1914.

The Conference session of 1939 voted to maintain the numerical notation of the Conference in The Methodist Church.

STANDING RULES OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

- (1) That each undergraduate, each approved supply pastor, and each candidate for conference membership be required to meet with the Board of Ministerial Training before or during the session of the annual conference unless hindered by circumstances beyond his control.
- (2) That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one member from each church in each Pastoral Charge; provided further, that each station charge shall have three elected members.
- (3) That the figures answering the question the pastor's report to Annual Conference: "Members reported last year" shall in every case be the number of members printed in the statistical tables of the Journal of the last Annual Conference.
- (4) That the District Superintendent's figures of all apportionments be accepted as the official figures.
- (5) That the apportionment for Conference and General Work be combined in the statistical report: and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.
- (6) All statistical reports shall be delivered by the district superintendents to the conference satistician seven days before the opening session of the Annual Conference, and all settlements shall be made with the Conference Treasurer by June 1st.
- (7) When a member of this Conference becomes a member of the Bishop's cabinet he shall automatically become ineligible to serve on any quadrennial board, committee, commission, or an officer in the Conference administration, except members specifically designated by the Discipline.
- (8) That the Secretary of the Bishop's cabinet be instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or District Superintendent's District for insertion in the Conference Journal.
- (9) The Annual Conference shall elect upon nomination by the Bishop a Conference Entertainment Committee to serve during the quadrennium. This Committee shall make arrangements for the facilities needed for the session of the Annual Conference and administer the funds for its entertainment, including the honorarium for the conference preacher.
- (10) All members attending the Annual Conference session shall pay two dollars registration; except 1) those from minimum salary chargees, who shall pay one dollar; 2) retired ministers not serving charges and supernumeraries, who shall pay no registration. The offerings in the public worship service shall be used for conference entertainment expense. The Conference Entertainment Committee shall provide during the session of the Annual Conference full entertainment for retired ministers not serving a charge, and room for all pastors of charges whose pastoral support from all sources is \$3,600.00 or less.
- (11) Every board, commission, and committee receiving any money from conference funds shall present to the Commission on World Service and Finance annually by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference a detailed financial report including all receipts and expenditures.
- (12) A list of lay members elected to Annual Conference shall be compiled by the district superintendents and sent to the conference secretary prior to the opening of the session.
- (18) The district stewards shall apportion all annual conference askings to the several charges in each district on an equitable basis.
- (14) The conference treasurer shall close his books for the Conference Year seven days before the opening of the Annual Conference, and shall allocate to the several boards and commissions the moneys to which they are entitled by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference, and each board and commission receiving money from conference funds shall close its books on the opening day of annual conference.
- (15) No one shall be nominated for re-election to a board or commission on which he has served more than a quadrennium immediately preceding his election.
- (16) The Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Pensions shall be members of the secretarial staff of the Conference, and these persons shall be charged with the responsibility of seeing that all records pertaining to service years be made identical.
- (17) Any proposal to change the Standing Rules shall lie on the table overnight, and then its passage shall require a % vote of those present and voting.
- (18) That part of the report of all boards, commissions, committees and other agencies of the conference which provides for changes in policy or makes recommendations shall be mimeographed, printed, or otherwise duplicated and distributed to the membership of the conference prior to the time scheduled for action on said report.
- (19) All churches employing more than one member of an annual conference shall pay all percentages based on pastor's salary on the salaries of all ministers so employed.
- (20) Each Annual Conference session shall designate a moving date. Any exceptions to the designated date shall be agreed upon by the pastors involved.
