

III. DAILY PROCEEDINGS

First Day—Afternoon Session May 27, 1968

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper: The one hundred thirty-third session of the North Arkansas Conference convened in Central United Methodist Church, Fayetteville, Arkansas, May 27, 1968 at 4:00 p.m. for the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper with Bishop Paul V. Galloway officiating, and being assisted by Dr. Myers B. Curtis, host District Superintendent, and Dr. Joel A. Cooper, host pastor. The opening hymn was "And are we yet alive." Bishop Galloway led the conference in prayer. The anthem was sung by the Chapel Choir of Central United Methodist Church, directed by Mr. George Frey. Bishop Galloway spoke on the background of the Lord's Supper and its contemporary meaning for us. Assisting the Bishop in the distribution of the elements were the District Superintendents: Marshall Bridwell, Archie N. Boyd, Myers B. Curtis, Ethan W. Dodgen, Elmer J. Holifield, Ben F. Jordan and S. B. Wilford.

First Day-Evening Session

Worship and District Superintendent's Report: The evening session was held at 7:30 in the Sara Clapp Memorial Auditorium at the Western Methodist Assembly on Mt. Sequoyah with Bishop Paul V. Galloway presiding. The hymn "Ask ye what great thing I know" was sung and Dr. Ethan Dodgen led the conference in prayer. An anthem was sung by the Chapelaires, a senior high singing group from Central United Methodist Church. The offering was taken by ushers from Trinity United Methodist Church. Dr. George Fallon from the General Board of Evangelism and Dr. Virgil Sexton from the General Board of Missions were presented to the conference. Dr. Marshall Bridwell, Secretary of the Cabinet, read the report of the District Superintendents. The hymn "How gentle God's commands" was sung. Bishop Arthur J. Moore, the conference preacher, preached the evening sermon, led the conference in singing the hymn "Praise to the Lord" and in the benediction closing the evening session.

Second Day—Morning Session May 28, 1968

Devotions: A hymn, "Majestic sweetness" was sung. Bishop Galloway read parts of the Sermon on the Mount and commented that this section of the Scriptures will be a matter of special study this quadrennium. Devotions closed with prayer.

Organization: Bishop Galloway called the conference to order. The Secretary, the Reverend James M. Meadors, Jr., was recognized for organizational matters. The Reverend Jim Beal and the Reverend John W. Workman were named associates on the secretarial staff. Announcements concerning registration and roll call were made by the secretary.

Gifts: Attention was called by the Bishop to two new musical instruments on the stage. The Hammond Organ is a memorial to Mrs. Virgie Ann Hallabaugh by Miss Audia V. (Millie) Millsaps. Miss Millsaps was presented to the conference. The Baldwin piano has been given by the Reverend and Mrs. E. G. Kaetzell. Brother Kaetzell was presented to the conference.

Welcome: Bishop Galloway spoke of the men responsible for maintaining this Assembly and its development—Bishop Paul E. Martin and Bishop W. Kenneth Pope, the Reverend Sam Wiggins, the Reverend Elmer Hook, and the Reverend E. G. Kaetzell. Brother Kaetzell, Assembly Superintendent, made announcements and presented Mr. Nels Barnett, a Trustee of the Assembly, who formally welcomed the conference to the Western Methodist Assembly.

Appreciation: Appreciation was expressed by the Bishop to those who have given cottages or other facilities to the Assembly. The Reverend

Field Service for the General Board of Evangelism spoke to the conference. The Reverend Victor Nixon proposed an addition to the report calling for an exploration of new evangelistic methods for a new day. The Board accepted the addition. The report was adopted.

Recognitions: Bishop Galloway recognized Dr. Will Mock, a long time Methodist layman from Prairie Grove; Mr. and Mrs. Horace Jones of the Mt. View Church in the Fort Smith District who are celebrating their 60th wedding anniversary this week; and the Reverend George Stewart, Chaplain at the Methodist Hospital in Memphis.

The Reverend Benny Ross Harmon, a member On Trial in the former EUB Church was presented and received into this conference. The former EUB Church at Wye, in the Conway District, was received into the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church and the Conway District. Mr. Harmon's father, wife and son were presented to the conference.

Communication: The Secretary was instructed by the conference to convey the preceding action to Bishop Paul W. Milhouse, who is in the session of his Annual Conference in Missouri now. The greetings of our conference were also to be sent.

Nomination: The Reverend Marshall Bridwell, secretary of the Cabinet, nominated the Reverend Luther K. Wilson as Conference Statistician for another quadrennium. He was elected.

Committee on Courtesies: Bishop Galloway named Dr. Charles Casteel, Dr. Joel Cooper and the Reverend Howard Williams as a Committee on Courtesies.

Interboard Council: Dr. Joel A. Cooper presented the report of the Council as found in the Pre-Conference Digest. The report was adopted. Dr. Cooper moved an additional Resolution. Discussion of the proposed Resolution ensued. The Resolution related to the providing of common quarters for the Interboard Councils of the two Arkansas Conferences. Dr. A. W. Martin, Sr. moved the postponement of action on the Resolution until later in the conference. By common consent this was agreed. Question was asked if the Little Rock Conference had adopted a similar Resolution. The answer was yes. Question was asked whether the former Headquarters Building Committee is still in existence. The answer is yes.

Standing Rule: Dr. John Bayliss introduced a proposed change in Standing Rule 7 of the Annual Conference. The proposed new rule must lie on the Table over night and will be considered for appropriate action tomorrow morning.

District Conference Journals: The Reverend M. L. Kaylor presented the report of the Committee on District Conference Journals. Four of the Journals have been examined and are in order.

Arkansas Methodist: Dr. Alfred Knox expressed appreciation for the support the paper has received in its circulation campaigns. The report for the Arkansas Methodist printed in the Pre-Conference Digest was moved and adopted.

Lay Activities: Mr. E. Clay Bumpers, Conference Lay Leader, moved the adoption of the report for the Board of Lay Activities as it appears in the Pre-Conference Digest and it was adopted. Mr. Bumpers announced the National Conference of United Methodist Men at Purdue in July, 1969. He nominated the Conference, Associate Conference, District and Associate District Lay Leaders and the Conference Director of Lay Speaking. The nominations were accepted.

Ministerial Training: The Reverend David P. Conyers was recognized for the reports of the Board of Ministerial Training. The report in the Pre-Conference Digest was adopted. The Reverend William P. Connell read

Fiscal Year: The Reverend Howard Williams and the Reverend Jim Beal presented the report of the Fiscal Year Study Committee. Question was raised as to when this change in fiscal year would take effect. Dr. A. W. Martin, Sr. read parts of the General Conferences action dealing with the change in fiscal year. The report was adopted.

Standing Rules: The Reverend Howard Williams proposed changes in Standing Rules 6 and 14 of the Conference. This must lie on the Table overnight and will be considered tomorrow morning.

Education: The remaining reports of the Board of Education were presented by the Reverend Arvill Brannon and the Reverend William Wilder. The Reverend S. B. Wilford questioned the wisdom of item 11 in Report 1 having to do with camps. The Reverend John Hays moved that in Report 4 Wesley Foundation Directors be given right of vote in their own boards. The motion passed, Question raised as to why no Conference Secretary of Student Work was named. Mr. Brannon gave an explanation. The total report was adopted. The Reverend Earl Carter spoke to the report.

Methodist Hospital: The Reverend George Stewart, Chaplain at Methodist Hospital in Memphis, reported on the work of our hospital.

Minimum Salary: The report of the Commission on Minimum Salary was given by the Reverend W. L. Douglas and was adopted.

Conference Claimants Fund: The Reverend Allan Hilliard distributed to the conference the report of the minister's payments to the Conference Claimants Fund this year.

Recognition: Bishop Galloway presented Dr. William Brown of the Little Rock Conference to the conference.

Board of Trustees: It was announced that the Board of Trustees would be organized tomorrow morning at 8:15 by the Reverend S. B. Wilford in the rooms to the right of the stage in the auditorium.

Closing: Dr. William Brown gave the benediction.

Fourth Day—Morning Session May 30, 1968

Devotions: The hymn "God of grace and God of glory" was sung. Bishop Galloway's devotion dealt with the text "Seek ye first the kingdom of God. . . ." The conference was led in prayer by the Bishop.

Meeting Place: There being no invitation to the conference for next year the conference authorized the Bishop, the Cabinet and the interboard Staff to set the meeting place.

Minutes: Dr. Charles Casteel reported that proceedings of the previous day's session have been read and found in order. The committee was empowered to read and approve the minutes of today.

Properties Abandoned: Dr. Marshall Bridwell presented the following Resolutions for the abandonment or sale of abandoned properties:

"Be it resolved that the Trustees of the North Arkansas Conference be and are hereby authorized and empowered to execute and deliver to D. L. Loomis and Estelle T. Loomis, husband and wife, Lots numbered 142 and 143, Town of Poplar Grove, Phillips County, Arkansas, being the property of the abandoned Methodist Church in Poplar Grove, Arkansas. Be it further resolved that proceeds from sale of said property be placed in the hands of the Forrest City District Board of Church Location and Building for disposition."

"Be it resolved that the North Arkansas Conference declare abandoned White Church in Monroe County, Arkansas, and that the Trustees of the North Arkansas Conference be authorized and empowered to sell said property. Be it further resolved that proceeds from sale of said abandoned property be turned over to the Forrest City District Board of Church Location and Building for disposition."

Both these resolutions were passed.

At the request of the Reverend E. J. Holifield the Mountain Springs Church in the Batesville District was declared abandoned.

Area Treasurer: Mr. Grafton Thomas presented the report of the Treasurer which was approved.

Christian Vocations: The Reverend Aaron Barling moved the adoption of the report of the Commission on Christian Vocations as it appears in the Pre-Conference Digest. It was adopted. Mr. Barling talked about the new name of the Commission—Commission for the Enlistment for Church Occupations, and about new plans for its work.

Personal Privilege: The Reverend Charles Richards moved that the conference recommend Nels Barnett and the Reverend Archie N. Boyd as nominees to the General Board of Missions.

Dr. Ernest Dixon: The President of Philander Smith College, Dr. Ernest Dixon, was presented to the conference and spoke.

Education: The Reverend Arvill C. Brannon moved that the report of the Roard of Education be amended to rename the Race Relations Day offering in February as "Philander Smith Scholarship Fund Day." The motion passed.

Standing Rule 7: Dr. John Bayliss presented the proposed new Standing Rule 7. The Reverend Bob Edwards moved an amendment to the Rule as proposed. The amendment was discussed and approved. The proposed Standing Rule 7 as amended was adopted. It is as follows: "Subject to the provisions of the Discipline, a District Superintendent shall be eligible for membership on not more than one major Annual Conference Board or Commission, and not more than one additional Commission or Committee, but not to hold office therein. District Superintendents shall be eligible for Annual Conference nomination to Jurisdictional Boards and Commissions, provided that they may not compose more than half of the ministerial nominees."

Standing Rule 6: The Reverend Howard Williams moved the proposed new Standing Rule 6. The Rule as follows was approved: "All statistical reports shall be delivered by the District Superintendents to the conference statistician seven days before the opening session of the Annual Conference, except that the financial reports shall be in the hands of the conference statistician within 45 days after the end of the conference fiscal year."

Standing Rule 14: Mr. Williams also presented proposed Standing Rule 14. This Rule was adopted as follows: "The Conference Treasurer shall close his books at the end of the calendar year, and shall allocate to the several boards and commissions the monies to which they are entitled, and the boards and agencies receiving monies from conference funds shall close their books at the end of the calendar year."

Fiscal Year Change Committees: Mr. Williams recommended, in behalf of the Fiscal Year Study Committee, that the Bishop appoint the requested committee to effect the change in the Fiscal Year and report their recommendations to the called session of the Annual Conference, if there should be one before January 1, 1969.

World Service and Finance: Bishop Galloway commended this commission for its long hours of conscientious effort. Dr. M. D. Deneke, a West Memphis physician, was particularly commended for the amount of time he has given as Chairman of the commission and the other work of the church. Dr. Deneke presented the Reverend Worth W. Gibson for the presentation of the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance. The report was adopted.

Personal Privilege: Dr. John Bayliss further praised the Commission on World Service and Finance for its dilligent work.

Moving Date: The Reverend David P. Conyers moved that Thursday of next week be designated as moving date for our conference.

Resolutions: The Reverend H. L. Robison presented the report of the Committee on Resolutions. It was approved.

Appointments: The Bishop read the appointments.

Ministerial Status: The Reverend Myers B. Curtis moved that the Sabbatical Relationship be granted to the Reverend Paul Lanier if needed to attend school.

Closing: Bishop Galloway led the closing prayer.

VI. REPORTS OF BOARDS, COMMITTEES, COMMISSIONS

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Adopted May 27, 1968

Bishop Galloway and members of the 133rd session of the North Arkansas Annual Conference...

With grateful recognition of the abiding loyalty of the Methodist people within the bound of the North Arkansas Annual Conference, we report to you concerning the work of the church during the year now closing. In a very real sense this is not the report of the District Superintendents, but a statement of achievement that reflects the work of every pastor and congregation in the conference. The churches of our conference have added to our rolls 1,762 persons on profession of faith; 2,771 persons by transfer from other Methodist Churches and 602 persons from other denominations. Our present membership is 100,157.

The work of Christian Education in the conference is being carried out in an excellent manner. For the most part and in most churches the materials of the new curriculum have been received with commendation by the church school workers. Teachers, counselors and other workers with youth across the conference are eagerly looking forward to the literature for our young people. Thorough preparation is being made in all the Districts to acquaint responsible persons with the new materials and to properly train them in their use.

The vitality of the lay witness in our conference is demonstrated in the work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Methodist Men's Clubs.

A look at the temporal concerns of the church shows that we have church properties at around \$35,000,000. Parsonage properties valued at \$3,500,000 and other assets valued at \$9,000,000. A brief look at the work in each of the seven Districts of the conference gives an indication of the militant faith and fruitful service of the Methodist people—both laymen and pastors.

Batesville District

Extensive remodeling, expansions and renovations have been carried out on an effective scale in many of the churches.

New church buildings have been completed at Calico Rock and Bethesda. A new educational building has been erected at Onetman, building plans are now in progress for a new parsonage at Newark and new churches at Southside and Mountain View. Financial conditions in the District are considerably improved.

Conway District

Twenty-five churches in this District have been involved in building programs during this conference year. Ten other quarterly conferences have named building committees. Notable among these are the proposed \$200,000 educational building at Conway First Church; parsonage at Jacksonville and addition to the educational building at Indian Hills and an entire new facility for worship and church school at Oppelo.

Seven young men have been recommended for licenses to preach by the Conway District Quarterly Conferences.

Several parsonages have been remodeled and repaired this year and several have added conveniences of central heat and air conditioning. The most notable accomplishment in this area is the construction of a new \$30,000 edifice to house the Wesley Foundation Director at Arkansas Tech College.

Fayetteville District

During the year 793 new members have been received into the churches of this District, resulting in a net gain of 100. The 57 church schools in the District, staffed by 759 officers and teachers, enrolled 8,140 persons with an average attendance of 3,885 per Sunday. This is an increase of 298 over last year. The District reports an overpayment of nearly \$1,000 on World Service.

During the year Siloam Springs has built a new parsonage. The Berryville Church has completed its new sanctuary and a portion of their educational plant. Central Church, Rogers has begun a \$160,000 educational building and the first unit of the Sequoyah Church was opened May 26 at a cost of \$60,000. A number of churches have been involved in remodeling church plants and parsonages.

Forrest City District

There has been considerable building during the year. New educational buildings have been erected at Parkin and Forrest Hills. The latter for the first unit of a new church plant. Rosewood Church in West Memphis has a new sanctuary under construction and it will be completed soon after conference. Colt has relocated its church and has a new building under construction date set for June 15. New parsonages have been constructed at Helena, Elaine and McCrory. A new parsonage has been purchased for Forrest Hills Church in Forrest City. With leadership from the secretaries of the Interboard Council and various conference boards, area training schools have been conducted within reach of every church in the District.

Fort Smith District

In this District 869 new members were received, making a total membership of 18,218 and a net gain of 71. Three young men were licensed to preach. The District Board of Missions has a very active program and provides valuable assistance to four churches in the District. It is also making regular payments on a seven acre tract of land to be used for future construction. The Woman's Society of Christian Service has rendered great service.

The Fort Smith District has been very active in building this year. A new parsonage has been completed and occupied at Massard, and new parsonages are almost completed at Alma and Clarksville. A fire destroyed the City Heights sanctuary a few years ago and this has been replaced this year, in addition to a new sanctuary at Mulberry. During this effort, the educational needs of the churches have not been overlooked—new facilities to care for this need have been built at Wesley in Fort Smith, Cavanaugh in Fort Smith, Coles Chapel, and Dyer, in addition to extensive redecorating at First Church, Fort Smith, Ozark and Greenwood. The sanctuary at Alix was completely remodeled and redecorated with the addition of new pulpit furniture and aisle carpet.

Jonesboro District

Even though the District has a depressed economy, nearly all financial obligations have been paid in full. A new \$45,000 parsonage has been constructed at Harrisburg and will be ready for occupancy at the beginning of the new conference year. First Church Blytheville is making final preparation for an effective building program which will cost in excess of \$300,000. During the year \$159,000 has been paid on indebtedness and \$50,000 has been expended on building improvements.

Paragould District

There has been a great deal of building activity. A new church building has been completed at Corning at a cost of \$90,000. The sanctuary at Walnut Ridge has been competely remodeled. Hoxie is in the process of building a new

parsonage. Major improvements have been made at First Church in Pigott and at Wright's Chapel. Building debts have been paid at Clover Bend, New Home and Tuckerman. All indebtedness has been paid on the Paragould District Parsonage.

We desire to express our deep appreciation to Dr. Alfred Knox for the splendid job he is doing as editor of the Arkansas Methodist; and to the thousands of Methodists throughout the state who helped make possible the

very successful subscription campaign last January.

We wish to commend the Interboard Council leadership, Dr. Eggensperger and the Reverend Earl Carter for the fine way in which they have assumed the responsibilities of that office during the first year. Both clergy and laity appreciate their leadership in every phase of the conference program. All of us have relied heavily on the Council. Their devotion, loyalty, dedication and understanding have been a source of help, inspiration and encouragement throughout the conference.

We are grateful for the privilege of working with Bishop Paul V. Galloway. We appreciate his warm friendly spirit, his aggressive leadership and his genuine love for persons—both ministers and laymen. It has been a great joy to every member of the Cabinet to work with him this year. We want to express to both Bishop and Mrs. Galloway our gratitude for the contribution they have made to our fellowship and for their unfailing thoughtfulness and understanding spirit which has touched all our lives and every aspect of the life and work of this conference.

We call your special attention to the Hendrix College Capital Funds Campaign. It is imperative that each church meet its responsibility in full if we are to reach our goals. Response and support have been excellent and we urge that our efforts not be relaxed during this final year of the campaign.

Recommendations

1. We respectfully suggest and recommend to the conference that the next major financial program—excepting the quadrennial program—conducted for the North Arkansas Conference be in the area of pension improvement. There is great need here. We feel that we must turn our attention to this problem and develop plans which will provide an adequate solution.

2. We recommend that this conference make definite plans to achieve full and complete merger with the Southwest Conference no later than 1970.

3. We recommend that this conference appoint a committee to work with the Executive Committee of the Interboard Council and the Headquarters Building Committee for the purpose of developing a plan to house the Interboard Council of the two Arkansas Conferences at the same location, and that a suitable location be selected at the earliest possible date.

4. We recommend that this conference appoint a committee to cooperate with similar committees from other supporting conferences to explore the best way in which we can support Philander Smith College capital funds

program.

Conclusion

To say that we have attained, that we have fulfilled God's purpose for us in any marked degree, would be presumptuous indeed; but we are obtaining, needs are being met, facilities for worship, education, fellowship and housing are being supplied; and programs designed to confront modern man with himself and his God are being carried out. We commend our conference and our work to your continued prayers and financial support.

With every ounce of strength at our disposal, we pray the people of the North Arkansas Conference to make the real the line chiseled in marble on the Archives Building in Washington, D. C., "The past is prologue."

REPORT OF INTERBOARD COUNCIL Adopted May 29, 1968

The organization of the Interboard Council took place shortly after June 1, 1967. Bishop Paul V. Galloway is the Chairman; Dr. Joel Cooper, Vice Chairman; and the Reverend Floyd G. Villines, Jr., Secretary. There has been three meetings of the Council during the year; while the Executive Committee has met more frequently to give careful oversight and guidance to the work of this new venture in our Conference.

Shortly after organization, our Executive Secretaries, Dr. Harold O. Eggensperger and the Reverend Earl Carter determined they would try to do

three things:

1. Learn all they can about their new responsibilities through attending special conferences and seminars designed by The Methodist Church to aid those assigned to Interboard responsibilities.

2. Seek to maintain the high level of leadership in the field of education

as exemplified by previous leaders; and

As quickly as feasible, lift up and emphasize the interests of all other boards and agencies of the Conference.

The task of moving the records and furniture from Conway to North Little Rock, the purchasing of good office equipment for meeting the enlarged responsibilities of this new venture, the securing of competent secretarial help, and the attending of conferences in the interest of learning more about effective ways of meeting the new task, has taken much effort, time and patience on the part of our secretaries.

The purpose of the boards and commissions of our Conference is to plan effectively that the interests represented by our agencies might be brought to the attention of Methodists throughout the Conference. The purpose of the Interboard Council is to coordinate the work of the boards and assist in promoting and bringing to fruition the creative plans the Boards have

developed.

The Interboard Council staff has therefore sought diligently:

1. To keep the lines of communication open between the agencies, the pastors and the laymen of the various churches of the Conference. The secretaries have endeavored to stand ready to come and discuss with District Superintendents and District Officers, as well as local church leaders, how the interests of Methodism can best be promoted within the Conference, District and local church. The staff is grateful for the wonderful cooperation given by the Bishop, District Superintendents, Area Director of Stewardship, pastors and laymen. Without such cooperation the Conference workshops, seminars, leadership schools and informal gatherings could not have been success-

2. To call attention to the plans of the agencies through the use of a special piece of promotional material known as the "Hot Line." With some exceptions this mailing has been monthly. It has always gone out with the hope that it would assist preachers and laymen in sensing the important mission of the church with reference to all phases of Methodism's great ministry on various levels, local, district,

Conference, national and world.

The work of the secretaries and the effectiveness of their assistance can and will be reflected in the reports of the various Conference agencies. While the new year should bring an increased sense of mission on the part of the members of every board and commission, as well as more effective service, we are grateful for the work accomplished during the year which is drawing to a close. Under the leadership of God's Holy Spirit; and with the full cooperation of each Methodist, greater things can and will transpire within our Conference in the future to aid the coming of God's kingdom.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES Adopted May 28, 1968

I. Articles of Incorporation-

A. Our Board of Trustees fulfills the requirements of Paragraph 711 of *The Discipline*, having been duly incorporated as the Board of Trustees of the North Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Church on July 25, 1959.

B. The Articles of Incorporation are recorded in the office of the Circuit Clerk of Sebastian County in Ft. Smith, Arkansas, in Book E, page

II. Execution of Legal Documents-

A. The Chairman and Secretary of the Board have been authorized to sign legal documents for the Board.

B. We urge pastors and district superintendents to read Paragraphs 188, 189 and 190 of *The Discipline* concerning the disposal of church property, and in the case of such legal transactions, to have an attorney prepare the proper papers and send same to the Chairman and Secretary of the Board of Trustees for the necessary signatures.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS Adopted May 28, 1968

Christian Social Concerns is the inevitable result of personal commitment and grateful response to the gospel of Jesus Christ. It is the expression of Christian love from the fixed point of our faith to the changing circumstances of the world. Seldom does it achieve all that it desires, but it continues to try. Seldom is it completely free from sinful elements. It is always handicapped by the limited vision of men. In spite of these limitations, we the members of this Board, seek with you to express our personal faith in the world which God loves and for the benefit of our neighbor, for whom Christ

Attention is called to these dates and the causes represented by them:

World Order Sunday, October 20. The need for peace and the place of the United Nations in maintaining world peace is the purpose of this Sunday.

Commitment Day, November 10, Congregations should be called to commit themselves to abstinence from alcoholic beverages.

Race Relations Day, February 9. The kinship of all men is the emphasis. An offering for Philander Smith College should also be taken.

Our nation, and indeed the world, continues to stagger under the increasing load of problems of human relations. Walls continue to divide men from each other—walls of nation, race, economy, church and culture. But we are still one in Christ. Where Christ has united us there is neither Jew nor Greek . . . slave nor free . . . male nor female. We call on the churches to make this description of God's Kingdom a reality in our communities.

A. We encourage full participation in the ecumenical movement and the

efforts of churches to work closer together.

B. We rejoice in the progress being made to merge the Southwest Conference with the geographical conferences in Arkansas and Oklahoma.

C. We encourage the continuation of "know your neighbor" programs that acquaint pastors and laymen of white and Negro churches in

our communities.

D. We desire the expansion of the idea of the North Arkansas Conference Boards, Commissions, agencies, institutions and groups working with their sister groups in the Southwest Conference in joint projects. We hope wherever possible they may meet jointly and plan

one ministry for the churches of our area.

We join the Conference Board of Education in asking the Annual Conference to give increased financial support to Philander Smith College. This Methodist college continues to serve a great need in higher education in our state and deserves a larger support than Methodists have been giving. We encourage every Methodist Church in our Conference to increase its giving through Race Relations Day offerings for the operational budget of Philander Smith. We also encourage the Conference to adopt the capital funds campaign which will be recommended to the Annual Conference. Through this campaign, the College will be able to take advantage of land now made available through Urban Renewal and will be able to move in the direction of an expanded campus. Without these funds, the college will find its future in serious jeopardy. We further encourage churches to become better acquainted with Philander Smith by visits to the campus, invitations to its faculty and staff to visit the churches, and by invitations to its organizaions to present

programs in the local churches.

We propose an expanding program of Citizenship Seminars during the quadrennium. We propose that the U. N.—Washington Citizenship Seminars which have been jointly sponsored by the Woman's Society and the Board of Christian Social Concern be expanded from two to four per quadrennium. To make this possible, we invite other agencies to join in sponsoring these Seminars. We propose Youth Seminars in 1968 and 1970 and Adult Seminars in 1969 and 1971.

The Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns plans continuing efforts to have a Conference-wide Southeast Asia Seminar in which the issues of world peace in this area can be considered. We propose that such a confer-

world peace in this area can be considered. We propose that such a comer-ence be held as soon as the leadership can be obtained.

We recommend the District Directors' work with the District Super-intendent in setting up training sessions for local church workers in "The Work of the Local Church in the United Methodist Church. That Dis-trict Directors consider district or sub-district workshops on "The Cigarette Habit" in cooperation with the American Cancer Society. We encourage the local commissions to sponsor the organization of "Great Decisions" groups in those communities that do not presently have them. We further recommend that local churches share in the expenses of their Christian Social Concerns Chairman or other commission member to attend the Briefing Conference at Mt. Sequoyah, July 5-7.

We express our continuing concern for those persons who violated the law and call on the churches of our state to take advantage of the present climate of interest in penal reform. We encourage every Commission on Christian Social Concerns to explore the ways it can bring the Christian gospel to bear upon the lives of these persons. We suggest the following

possibilities.

A. The establishment of jail ministries in the city or county jails.

The financial support of the Arkansas Release Guidance Foundation. This Foundation, which was established at the initiative of Methodist people and directed by a Methodist staff, is presently operating two "New Life Houses" for men just released from state prisons. It plans further rehabilitation and prevention programs. We encourage every local church to make an annual contribution to this foundation. Contributions can be sent to Reverend Eugene Efird, 2115 South Arch, Little Rock, Arkansas. C. Include the New Life Houses at 121 Arch Street, Little Rock in tours

of Methodist Institutions.

D. The establishment of "Project Misdemeanant" in connection with juvenile courts to bring the resources of a local community to the assistance of the courts and of persons convicted of minor crimes. Further information can be supplied by the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns.

2. That a Leadership Development Planning Committee be named consisting of the Chairman, Board of Education, the Age Group Directors, one person appointed by the board chairman, and the Interboard Council Secretaries, for the purpose of reviewing leadership needs in our Conference, becoming aware of leadership training opportunities, and finding persons who have the ability to fill leadership positions.

That persons be encouraged to attend the Leadership School at Mt. Sequoyah and that the Conference Board of Education provide full scholarships for five persons to attend the Seminar and Lab for Leaders of Children and for five persons to attend the Section for Leaders of Youth, July 8-19. The scholarships shall provide for travel expense at 7¢ a mile, registration fees, and \$7.00 per diem.

4. That a committee composed of the Board Chairman, the Interboard Coun-

cil secretaries, the Conference Age Group Directors, and a minimum of three other persons who teach in the children and/or youth fields, appointed by the chairman, be organized with the specific responsibility of reviewing the Christian Workers' Schools for leaders of children and youth and offering suggestions and recommendations for increasing attendance and interest. We encourage this committee to meet early in the Conference Year.

5. That the Jurisdictional Program for the training of leadership for the Local Church Program Planning Council be given serious consideration

and be implemented wherever possible.

6. That three Training Centers be held in June-August to train Local Church leaders of youth in the use of the new youth ministry literature that relates to informal settings; and that a Christian Workers' School be held in each subdistrict using the unit, USING RESOURCES IN THE CHURCH'S EDUCATION MINISTRY WITH YOUTH.

7. That the Interboard Council Secretaries continue to take advantage of Jurisdictional and other training opportunities as need necessitates and

as time and schedule permits.

8. That the Interboard Council Secretaries continue to meet with local or area Board of Managers to provide counsel in the planning of Christian Workers' Schools, calling attention to new courses as they become available, and seeking to interpret the new broad base of the Christian Workers' School as it moves in the direction of becoming a School of Churchmanship.

9. That a goal of \$10,000.00 be accepted for Christian Education Sunday Offering to be received on September 1, 1968.

10. That coaching conference and laboratory training opportunities be held as follows:

Local Church Leaders Laboratory School, January, 1969 in Conway Two coaching conferences, The Sermon on the Mount, sponsored jointly with the WSCS

Two coaching conferences, THE MINISTRY TO THE LAITY
Two coaching conferences, THE PERSONS WE LEAD
Seven coaching conferences, UNITED METHODIST BELIEFS, spon-

sored jointly with the Board of Evangelism

11. That the following program of Camps and Conferences be accepted:

(a) The unified Conference Camping Program as planned and announced in the "Camp Brochures" for "Camps," "Conferences,"

"Assemblies," become the official camping program of the Annual Conference.

The Committee on Camps and Conferences meet early in the Fall of 1968 to evaluate the summer program, select next year's staff and

curriculum and make schedule for the summer of 1969.

(c) The Committee on Camps and Conferences choose and send selected leaders to national and regional training centers and then use them as Resource Persons in our Camping Program.

(d) A study be made of our camp sites by a committee within the conference chosen by the Committee on Camps and Conferences and by a committee experienced in camping from outside the conference.

(e) The Committee on Camps and Conferences to receive, through the office of the Conference (Area) Treasurer, \$1.00 of the Camp Registrtaion Fee to be used by the committee for leadership training and materials.

Report No. 2

Policy statement regarding Wesley Foundation Campus Ministers:

The appointment of a clerical member of an Annual Conference as a Wesley Foundation Campus Minister is the responsibility of the Bishop and his Cabinet in keeping with "principles inherent in the Methodist appointive system." (Judicial Decision 175(1)) The Personnel Committee of a local Wesley Foundation Board of Directors acts in the same capacity

as a Pastoral Relations Committee of a Local Church.

A clerical member of an Annual Conference serving as a Campus Minister of a Wesley Foundation, under the appointment of the Bishop and his Cabinet, shall bear the same relationship to the District Super-intendent, in whose District he serves, as any other pastor in the District. The Board of Directors of a Wesley Foundation with respect to the Wesley Foundation Campus Minister, shall function in the same capacity as an Official Board of a Local Church.

3. A clerical member of an Annual Conference serving as a Wesley Founda-

tion Campus Minister, under appointment of the Bishop and his Cabinet, may teach in a related college or university, only at the discretion, and with the written consent of the District Superintendent, who shall have conferred with the Board of Directors of the Wesley Foundation, or its Personnel Committee; the President and/or the Dean of the institution; and with the Wesley Foundation Campus Minister. The District Superintendent, who shall have conferred with the Wesley Foundation Campus Minister. The District Superintendent of the Messey Foundation Campus Minister. intendent's written consent is given preferably to meet an emergency and as a special favor to the institution. It is understood that any income the Wesley Foundation Campus Minister may derive from such teaching will in no way affect his income as a Wesley Foundation Campus Minister.

In no way affect his income as a Wesley Foundation Campus Minister.

4. The District Superintendent, after conferring with the Wesley Foundation Campus Minister, the Board of Directors of the Wesley Foundation, or its Personnel Committee, and with the knowledge and consent of the Bishop, may appoint that Wesley Foundation Campus Minister as a part time pastor or a church or churches; or to do occasional interim or emergency preaching. It is understood that any income the Wesley Foundation Campus Minister may derive from such appointment will in no way affect his income as a Wesley Foundation Campus Minister.

5. The above may be amended from time to time to keep these procedures in

5. The above may be amended from time to time to keep these procedures in harmony with the policies of the General Church.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Adopted May 29, 1968

TWO-STEP EVANGELISM TO WIN PERSONS TO CHRIST

WHEREAS statistics reveal that the Methodist Church has shown a decline in membership over the past few years, and

Whereas statistics show that a large number of the members of the Methodist Church are not actively related to the church, and

Whereas large numbers of the people who call themselves Methodist know very little about what the Methodist Church believes, and

Whereas the Methodist Church is failing to reach many of the unchurched by its present program, and

Whereas God has loved all men in Christ Jesus our Lord, and

Whereas it is imperative that all members of the Methodist Church be actively related to the Church and know what the Methodist Church believes, and

Whereas the Church has been called to reach the unchurched

Be It Therefore Resolved that we, the people who call ourselves Methodist in the North Arkansas Conference, adopt a program of evangelism for concerned laymen and equally concerned ministers for winning persons to Christ and His Church.

We feel that such a program as TWO-STEP EVANGELISM, outlined below, carried out in Christian love will produce the desired results.

Two-Step Evangelism

I. (ONE-STEP) MISSION TO MEMBERS

- A. A deepening of the spiritual life of the members of the Methodist
 - (1) A coaching conference to be held in each district to certify each pastor in the district to teach the course "Major Methodist Be-liefs." This course should be taught by the pastor to his local congregation. It is recommended that this program of study be carried out in cooperation with the Board of Education.

(2) A recommended reading program to be promoted in each local

Church.

- (a) Set up small reading groups within the membership of the local church. Groups to have regular scheduled meetings.
 (b) The pastor to be responsible for making up his list of
- recommended reading which can and should be both educational and inspirational
- (3) A four week program during Lent called "Labor of Love" in which the members are urged to show interest and concern for other members by:
 - (a) 1st. week . . . writing letters or notes of appreciation to people who mean much to you and your life.
 - (b) 2nd. week . . . calling people to express a personal concern in their lives for absence from church, illness, death, joys.
 - (c) 3rd. week . . . small gifts on such occasions as birthdays, anniversaries, etc. to strengthen relations between people.

(d) 4th. week . . . persons to make prayer list and let those on their list know they are praying for them.

(4) Involve every member of the church, as nearly as possible, in a responsible way in some activity in the church.

B. Emphasis on activating the inactive.

(1) Introduce a revolving visitation program in each charge aimed toward the active.

Pass the name of the inactive member from one visitation team to another so it will be obvious that the total church

is interested in him.

(2) The pastor to set up quest groups to answer questions and resolve problems that prevent members from being active, with the hope that this might reveal a deeper concern from the total church rather than from just a few.

Neighborhood discussion groups in the homes to be shared in by the active, inactive and non-members. These should be conducted with the assistance of the pastor or some re-

sponsible layman.

C. We recommend an examination of new methods of proclamation and witness to meet the needs of a changing church in a changing world.

II. (TWO-STEP) MISSION-TO NON-MEMBERS

A. A program of planned visitation to the non-members.

 Appoint a committee on prospects to seek out and list the names of non-members well in advance of the time for the planned visitation.

Find them through surveys, attendance registration, on family rolls, church related organizations and groups, and the many other ways we have used in the past to discover these people.

(2) Enlist and train your visitors.

(a) Secure visitors by personal contact. Avoid the temptation to to rely on pulpit announcements, letters or telephone calls.

(b) Do your best to have enough visitors so as not to have to ask one team to be responsible for too many prospects.

(c) Be sure you give your visitors training so they will not feel lost in their efforts.

(d) Make the visitation an organized effort so the visitors will feel like a part of a team and not like a straggler.

B. Plan Pastor's Membership Training classes for children, youth and

adults in each church.

C. Plan and have effective assimilation for every person who is received into membership.

D. Preaching Missions.

(1) Have District Workshops in each district to instruct ministers . and chairmen of local Commissions on Membership and Evangelism in techniques and procedures for planning and carrying out a successful revival meeting.

(2) Have district sharing sessions for ministers on how to . .

(a) . . . make an appealing invitation for people to acccept Christ and church membership.

(b) . . . deal with difficult situations or hard to reach persons. (3) A preaching mission or revival to be conducted in each local church.

(4) Set a goal for an increase of not less than 500 new members for

our conference in the year 1968-69. Quotas toward this goal to be set up in each district by the district superintendent and these goals to be handed to the district directors of evangelism to be carried out.

III. We recommend that the Reverend W. Leonard Byers be appointed Secretary of Evangelism for the Conference year 1968-69.

We commend the work of Harvey Hazelwood as Golden Cross Director

and recommend his reappointment to this office for the coming year.

3. That the North Arkansas Conference continue the authorization which allows the Board of Trustees of The Methodist Nursing Home at Fort Smith and pastors to solicit funds for the Nursing Home Development Program within the churches of the Conference. We further recommend that churches and individuals over the Conference visit the Nursing Home at Fort Smith or make other contact to become familiar with the outstanding and distinctive service this institution is rendering under the able leadership of Superintendent E. L. Smith. We note that there are 88 beds in use at the Home, with approximately 125 individuals on the waiting list, and that the present indebtedness of \$30,000 is being retired at the rate of \$1,000 per month.

4. That December 15 through December 22 be observed as Children's Home Emphasis period for the receiving of the Annual Christmas Children's Home Offering. We further urge that the District cultivation program for the Christmas offering be continued and that in each church a local Support Chairman be named to cooperate with the pastor in the District and Area program for the Home. We note with pride the many significant advances made by the Home, under the direction of the Superintendent, Reverend Edwin Keith, in caring for the children who become our responsibility. Again, we urge that members of our church visit the Home to encourage a more meaningful participation in the great work done by the

Church through this institution.

5. We again recommend the desirability for the designation of a Special Committee or Commission within the Conference to study the future of child care by The Methodist Church in Arkansas, this group to work with similar personnel from the Little Rock Conference, should our Bishop see fit to designate such a Commission.

6. In accordance with the financial outline in Number 1 above, we recommend that the Chaplaincy at the State Sanatorium in Boonville be continued as during the previous years of this Quadrennium and recommend that Reverend Bates Sturdy be reappointed to this important ministry.

7. We reaffirm our approval of the current expansion program at the Memphis Methodist Hospital, including the construction of the new Nursing School at a cost of approximately \$3,000,000 to be completed by September,

1969. We congratulate the Hospital Administration on their vision and definite plans for the construction of an Out-Patient Clinic and Emergency Room at an estimated cost of \$7,500,000 and give our support to the project after the completion of the Hendrix College Campaign and the proposed Endowment Fund Program for retired ministers pensions. We recommend that the Hospital be advised that the earliest date for a Capital Funds drive for the Hospital in the North Arkansas Conference will be 1972.

8. We nominate to the Conference for election as Trustees for the designated

institutions, with terms to expire in 1971, the following:

(a) Memphis Methodist Hospital: Mrs. Tom Tucker, Hughes; Frank Fogleman, Marion.
(b) Methodist Children's Home of Arkansas: Homes H. Fulbright,

Searcy; James R. Chandler; Earl Hughes; Wiley Robbins, Heber Springs.

(c) The Methodist Nursing Home, Inc., Fort Smith: Jack Ragan, Fort Smith; Owen C. Pearce, Fort Smith; Dale Bumpers, Charleston. (See Conference Journal for 1967, page 10, for additional Trustees for the above institutions.)

BOARD OF LAY LAY ACTIVITIES Adopted May 29, 1968

Reports made at our Mid-Year Meeting by the District Lay Leaders and the District Superintendents indicate that there is some good progress in our program throughout the Conference. For this we give credit to the excellent leadership we have in each district and to the cooperation we have received from the ministers of the Conference. It is a pleasure to see the men assume the role of leadership and in cooperation with the ministers, really develop an inspired program in the local churches.

Our Annual Luncheon, held each year during Conference, was held at the Hendricks Hills Methodist Church in Fort Smith, Wednesday, May 31,

1967 and was attended by 104 laymen and guests.

Attendance at our Annual Assembly, held this year August 19 and 20, was good. Although registrations totaled only 170, there were 189 present for the afternoon session and there were 220 for the Saturday evening meal—so many did not register. There were upward of 150 who attended at least one of the services. The program was excellent—Dr. Thomas did a swell job; our panel Saturday afternoon was an enjoyable surprise to everyone; Coach Frank Broyles had a good message Sunday morning; Bishop Galloway, as always contributed much to the program. New last year was our early morning Communion Service. We will be returning to Mt. Sequoyah again this year—the date August 3 and 4. Bob Lay, one of this country's leading laymen, will be with us; Bill Kennedy of England, Arkansas, will lead the singing.

The Jurisdictional Lay Activities Workshop for District and Associate District Lay Leaders and other members of our Conference Board was held July 1 through July 3 with more than 30 attending from our Conference. Dr. Alsie Carleton delivered three lectures which have really inspired all who heard them and the challenge is still being discussed in various groups of Methodist Men. Bishop Paul Martin was excellent and R. H. "Red" Bond

did the best he has ever done.

Laymen's Day, October 8, from all reports, was the best with an increase in percentage of pulpits filled by the laymen, working toward our goal of total participation. Suggestions have been made that we take on a Conference project for our Laymen's Day topic this year and this will be discussed at our Mid-Year Meeting.

As always, we are pleased with the excellent work that is being done in the various districts under the leadership of the District and Associate District Lay Leaders. There continues to be a steady growth and for this we are grateful.

Replying to a request from our General Board of Lay Activities, we have selected George Riley, a member of the Lakewood Methodist Church, North Little Rock to be the Registrar and be in charge of promotion for the National Conference of United Methodist Men meeting at Purdue University, July 11-13, 1969.

At our Mid-Year Meeting, the Board unanimously approved the following nominations to be presented to the Annual Conference at its next session:

A budget of \$2,100.00 was unanimously adopted by the Board and a request for \$2,000.00 of this amount was to be presented to the Commission on World Service and Finance.

We are happy with the excellent cooperation we have received from Bishop Galloway and the Cabinet as well as the other ministers of the Conference. We solicit a continuation of this assistance to assure us an improved program of Lay Activities.

BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS Adopted May 29, 1968

Recommendations and Requests

In recognition of the need to provide scholarship support for ministerial students and to strengthen our seminaries, we recommend the following:

- That we insure the continuance of our present program by reserving each
 year an amount sufficient to cover operation of the Board and to care for
 scholarship commitments, estimating this years needs to be \$15,600.00.
- 2. That any amount received annually above the needs of our Conference be directed to the jurisdictional program and that we continue to move toward the goal suggested by the jurisdiction in this field.
- 3. That the conference continue its basic support of this program through World Service and Conference Benevolences, contributing \$7,000.00 each year to the Board of Ministerial Training from World Service and Conference Benevolences, and continue to promote the program also through increased emphasis on the November Special.
- 4. The observance of the November Special, an offering for Ministerial Training, to be received during the month of November each year, with each pastor preaching one sermon during the month of November designed to inform his congregation as to the needs, requirements and rewards of the ministry.
- 5. That with the increasing cost of education and with higher standards for admission into the ministry, responsibility of the Church to help provide for the training of her ministers be stressed, so that the November Special offering will be more in keeping with our needs of a bare minimum of \$12,500.00 through this channel this year.

6. We request that District Superintendents, Pastors and local churches help young men to understand the great need for ministers and challenge them to hear and answer the call to the ministry.

- 7. We request those who enter the ministry under Paragraph 306 to enroll in the Studies for License to Preach with the Ministerial Courses of Study, Department of Ministerial Education, Board of Education of the Methodist Church, P. O. Box 871, Nashville, Tennessee 37202.
- 8. We request each pastor to have available to give to interested persons material on the ministry, especially copies of the folder, "Courses of Study for License to Preach."
- 9. We urge compliance with the requirement that all men in the courses of study take their work through the Courses of Study in Perkins or St. Paul.

Policy and Program

1. The Board will conduct its work in harmony with the Discipline of the Methodist Church.

The funds of the Board will be expended in the following ways:

A. For the normal work of the Board and its registrars in the operation of the Board and in the guidance of the men related to the Board in

their training.

B. For financial assistance to college and seminary students enrolled in colleges, universities or seminaries approved by the University Senate or accepted by our Conference who meet the following requirements and in accordance with the following provisions:

1. Provisions for Financial Aid:

a. The Board may allow basic fees and tuition.

b. In cases of exceptional need, as determined by the executive committee of the Board and upon recommendation of the District Superintendent of the student's home district, the student may receive up to \$200 in aid per semester.

c. If a student has earned credit for 12 semester hours in a regular semester and wishes to attend summer school for the purpose of accelerating his return to the Conferences, he may apply for

- aid for fees and tuition for summer school.
 d. By the end of his undergraduate sophomore year, the student must have and maintain a grade point sufficient to ensure graduation from the institution in which he is enrolled.
- e. Aid may be granted for not more than five undergraduate academic years and for not more than four seminary academic years.

Requirements to be met by the students:
 a. The students shall establish need for such aid by completing the

forms required by the Board.

b. The student shall sign a promissory note made payable to this Board and carrying the following statement: "I understand that this note represents a loan from the Board of Ministerial Training of the North Arkansas Annual Conference of the Methodist Church. It may be repaid in one of two ways: (1) In service as a minister of the Methodist Church in the

State of Arkansas, with the total loan being credited with an amount equal to the maximum annual loan amount allowed

by the Board for each full conference year of service.

(2) In case I should decide not to enter the minister of the Methodist Church or in case I do not serve as a minister of the Methodist Church in the State of Arkansas, this note will bear interest from the date of issue at the rate of 4% annually. Payments will begin within six months of my decision not to enter the ministry or within six months after I begin serving in a conference outside the State of Arkansas and are to be made at the minimum rate of \$400 per year plus interest." (The loan officer of the Board is given the responsibility of the supervision of collection of these payments.)

c. The Board will carry \$1,000 in life insurance for each Student on Trial. Students on Trial who desire this insurance shall inform Reverend Wayne Clark, Treasurer, of their desire.

3. Students are expected to provide information concerning their standings and changes of relationship to the North Arkansas Conference to the officers of the Board. The names of these officers will be included in the Annual Conference Journal.

4. The Course of Study Schools

A. The Board will pay \$250 to support the St. Paul Course of Study School

and \$250 to support the Perkins Course of Study School.

B. Approved Supply men who attend either of these Course of Study Schools will receive room and board scholarships from the institution which they attend.

C. The Board will give \$25 for the purchase of books to each man who

attends either of these schools. The books must be paid for by the men

themselves who, in turn, will send a list of purchased books to the treasurer, Reverend Wayne Clark, who will authorize check for reimbursement. Books are not to be charged to the treasurer nor the Board.

5. Correspondence Work

A. The Board will play fees for men in the course of study including:

License to preach
 Introductory Studies
 The Course of Study

B. The expense of grading papers re-submitted for grading will be paid by the student.

Part-Time Approved Supplies
 The Board urges all part-time Approved Supplies to attend the Arkansas Pastors' School.

7. Recruiting Ministers

The Board will cooperate with the Wesley Foundation Directors in recruitment. Books used in License to Preach Studies and in Introductory Studies will be placed in Wesley Foundation Libraries which do not now have them.

8. Arkansas Pastors' School

We will support the Arkansas Pastors' School by giving \$500 per year to its budget.

BOARD OF MISSIONS Adopted May 29, 1968

This makes the last report that the present conference Board of Missions will make to the North Arkansas Conference and to the Methodist Church. From the coming year on it will be the United Methodist Church and a new board for the most part in a new quadrennium. Many have been the hours spent in study and planning during these four years. Many have been the accomplishments. The Board of Missions is the clearing house and companion in effort to the Cabinet, the Minister and the laity of the Conference. All of us have tried to give encouragement and cooperation to all who have come our way. We trust that this our final report of approval and recommendation will be acceptable to God and approved by the Conference itself. It has been a joy to serve our Lord in this great area of Christian service.

I. Promotion

A. Advance Specials

 That we continue the progressive program of missionary education and giving with the Conference. That each district and each charge within the Conference develop a program of missions that will not only increase giving, but will bring to all a new understanding and a rededication to the total mission of the Church.

That the North Arkansas Conference accept the following Advance

Special Goals for 1968-69:

National Rural Life Center, in the Philippines \$8,000 (This is an interdenominational effort to improve agricultural methods and will involve theological students of the Union Theological Seminary in that country.)
Scholarships in secondary schools in Southern Congo—these schol-

arships are \$150 each per year.

Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief—Voluntary Amount (For listing of specific Advance Speicals for MCOR, see PARTNERSHIP IN MISSIONS, 1966-67, pages 421-426, and in the 1967-68 Supple-

ment, pages 7 to 10.)

3. We recommend the continuation of the "Bishop's Special Advance Fund" to which churches, organizations within the local church, or private individuals may contribute for Advance Special credit. The fund is administered by Bishop Paul V. Galloway and is used for such World Division Advance Special needs as he deems advisable in his missionary travels. The Bishop will notify such churches as to the project for which their Advance Special gifts have been used. This fund may be sent to Grafton Thomas, Treasurer, or directly to Bishop Galloway, and should be designated for "Bishop's Special Advance Fund."

B. Missionary Support

1. The cost of maintaining a single missionary overseas is now \$6,000 per year and \$12,000 per couple. Churches supporting missionaries should endeavor to raise their support proportionately. Churches not presently supporting a missionary overseas should consider accepting shares of not less than \$750 toward the support of one. Some of the missionaries related to our conference, and the amounts of additional support needed for them are:

2. We trust that churches in the North Arkansas Conference will be in earnest prayer for all our missionaries over the world. Churches are encouraged to have copies of "The Prayer Calendar" available for their members. These may be secured from the Service Center, 7820 Reading Road, Cincinnati, Ohio.

3. Churches desiring to select Advance Specials in addition to those listed above will find a comprehensive listing of all approved Advance Specials in the book, PARTNERSHIP IN MISSIONS 1966-67, and in the Supplement, 1967-68. Pastors may order these books free of charge from the Methodist Board of Missions, 475 Riverside Drive, New York, New York 10027.

C. Other Aids to Missions

1. We urge every charge to conduct a church-wide School of Missions this this year following the church-wide study theme for 1968-69. We recommend that January and February be designated "Church-wide School of Missions Months" and that special emphasis be given to the study during this period.

2. We hope that missionaries available in our area for 1968-69 will be invited to speak in our Conference and Districts for the purpose of missionary cultivation. We suggest that churches desiring a missionary speaker contact the District Missionary Secretary and/or the Conference Missionary Secretary and/or Miss Virginia S. Henry, Director, Department of Field Interpretation, 475 Riverside Drive, Room 1305, New York, New York 10027. (Two returned missionaries of our Conference, Miss Edith Martin of Harrison and Reverend Jon Guthrie, both of whom served in the Congo, may be invited to speak to church groups.)

groups.)

3. We urge each charge to send one representative from the local Commission on Missions to the Missionary Weekend Workshop, June 21-23, 1968, at Mt. Sequoyah and that financial assistance be given by the

Conference Board of Missions for one lay person from each church as follows:

Fayetteville District \$ 5.00

upon to attend the meeting of the South Central Jurisdiction summer Missionary Conference at Mt. Sequoyah June 24-27, 1968.

4. We are glad to report that our Conference is well represented on the

General Board of Missions by Nels Barnett of First Church, Batesville. We also rejoice that one of our own number, Reverend William Cheyne is Director of the Advance for the South Central Jurisdiction.

5. Inasmuch as the Sub-Committee on Mission Studies for the Conference

has met with such success during the past two years, your Board of Missions recommends its continuance. This Sub-Committee will be responsible for the Promotion and Preparation of the Mission Studies for the Conference, District and local churches. We sincerely urge the Conference Board of Education to join with us in this promotion, and feel that much of the success of the program during the past two Conference years was due to its cooperation.

D. Church Building Shares

1. We recognize that our Lord was concerned about the ever widening spread of the Gospel, and that this should be the concern of His Church in every generation. As our cities grow, there is a growing need for the establishment of new congregations. These new groups need the encouragement of our older congregations. These new gloups need the encouragement of our older congregations by means of financial help in building. This prompts us to recommend that we continue our program of Church Extension by raising the \$20,000 in Special Extension Shares each year for the use of our North Arkansas Conference in assisting these congregations. We suggest that the amount be approximately portioned among the districts by the World Service and Finance Commission, and that each district be urged to develop its own program of Church Extension. We further suggest that the District Stewards of each district apportion to the local churches the amount apportioned to the district by the Commission on World Service and Finance. We ask that the Special Church Extension Shares raised in the Conference program, be handled through the Conference Board of Missions and that the promoting of the program be correlated through the Interboard Council of our Conference.

2. There shall be a Committee on Special Church Extension within the Board of Missions, and it shall have the following duties:

To assist the Executive Secretary of the Interboard Council, the District Superintendents and the District Missionary Societies in the planning and promotion of the following:
(1) Establishment of outpost Sunday Schools

(2) Purchasing new building sites

(3) Building new churches Merging of churches (5) Setting up Mobile Units

b. The disbursing of Building Shares and other Conference funds allocated to Special Church Extension purposes. The disbursing of regular extension funds, and the handling of all Exploratory information sheets going to the National Division requesting loans or grants for building. Money shall be disbursed on the following basis:
(1) A properly completed application form must be submitted to the

Committees before any funds can be granted. The application forms will be available from the Church Extension Secretary. Funds requested shall be approved by the District Missionary Society and the District Superintendent.

(2) The Committee has authority to suggest the adjustment, acceptance, or rejection of the application and to make recommendations to the Board of Missions.

(3) The Executive Secretary of the Interboard Council shall be responsible for the Investigating of the requests and making recommendations to the Committees as to the merits of the requests.

(4) The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the priority of Extension Share Funds distribution, and they are asked to report their recommendations to the Board of Missions before the Mid-

Year Meeting if possible.

(5) The following churches shall have priority on Special Extension Share Funds provided they are recommended by the Bishop's Cabinet and approved by the Conference Board of Missions on the basis of urgency of need, recognized potential growth, and resources in the community where the project is located:
a. Cherokee Village, Paragould District

b. South Side, Batesville District
3. Two Mobile Chapel Units in recent years were purchased by Special Extension Share Funds These are being used effectively in our Conference—one at the Forrest Hills Church in Forrest City—and the other by the South Side congregation, Batesville. The Board of Missions shall determine the future placement of the two trailers after consultation with the Bishop and the Cabinet. A third Mobile Unit has been acquired from the Board of Evangelism and is in use in the Fort Smith District.

E. Larger Parish and Group Ministry Programs

That the Board of Missions and the Town and Country Commission cooperate in the policy of seeking to assist District Superintenrents, Pastors and church members in establishing and maintaining the Larger Parishes and the Group Ministry. To this end, the Committee on Research and Survey of the Board of Missions is continuing a study to find the natural areas in which larger parish or group ministry needs to be established in those places where closer cooperation between pastors and churches will strengthen the ministry of the churches. Many open country churches cannot survive without this cooperative effort. The Research and Survey Chairman and his Committee are prepared to work with District Superintendents and Pastors in this important ministry.

F. Church Extension

We concur with the Town and Country Commission that a special committee within the Board of Missions be designated to work with the Town and Country Commission in setting up Guide-Lines for building programs where Loans and Gifts are requested.

G. At the Suggestion of the Bishop and the Cabinet

We recommend that the maximum donation from the Church Extension Fund be increased from \$5,000 to \$7,500. Those churches whose applications have been approved but have not received their donations are to receive the new amount—\$7,500.

III. Policy for Mission Salary Aid

It should be kept in mind that Mission Salary Aid from our Conference Board of Missions is from a Mission Board. The primary purpose of our salary aid is (1) to help new church situations get established and self-supporting. (2) to aid in a continuing ministry to smaller churches and circuits (mostly rural), which are unable to pay a living wage to their pastor. With this purpose in mind the following points are established as qualifications governing the use of Mission Salary Aid.

A. Aid to new churches will be on a year to year basis; however, it will be understood that when a new church receives aid it will be on a decreasing hasis each year and all aid will cease completely at the end of the fourth

basis each year and all aid will cease completely at the end of the fourth year. Exceptions to this rule will be by 2/3 vote of the entire Board. We strongly recommend that all churches terminate their request within four years and not to expect any help beyond eight years.

B. Salary Aid will not be given in any situation in which the pastor's total income exceeds \$7,200.00 or above.

C. Salary Aid will not be given to any church or charge which does not conduct an Every Member Visitation yearly and give evidence of such to the Board. It is extremely important for both pastor and District Superintendent to use all of their powers of persuasion to influence and educate the local churches or charges to move in the direction of an annual Every Member Visitation program.

D. Salary Aid request from District Superintendents will be given consideration ONLY if the request has been made in writing on the proper form to the Chairman of the Committee on Salary Aid. Such requests are to be submitted by February 1 for Conference and by November 1 for General

Board.

E. In established churches or charges where continuing salary aid is necessary, the District Superintendent is requested to use every means at his disposal to merge or combine churches or circuits, to create interdenominational work and to promote inter-racial work in order to decrease Salary Aid.

F. Priority will be given to newly established churches from available funds of the Salary Aid, with churches eight years old being re-classified as established, continuing, situations.

G. The maximum amount of salary aid given in any situation for any one year shall be \$1,200.00. Exceptions to this rule be by 2/3 vote of the entire Board.

H. The Board of Missions will work in co-operation with the Commission on Minimum Salary when requests are made to both groups for Salary

I. In case of an emergency request for salary aid, between meetings of the entire Board, the Executive Committee is impowered to act on such request in accordance with these rules.

J. These rules may be rescinded, amended or changed in any way at any meeting of the entire Board by a 2/3 vote of the entire Board.

IV. Policy for Regular Church Extension Loans or Donations

A. That all applications for Church Extension Loans and Donations be made on designated forms and be completed in detail, before action is taken with reference to them by the Board of Missions.

B. That regular Extension Funds be approved by the Conference Board of Missions only for churches completing a project, whether the application be for a grant or loan. That such application forms, whether the request is to the Conference Board or to the General Board, be in the hands of the respective Section Leaders by February 1, 1969. This enables our leaders in these areas to effectively present the requests to the Conference Board at the Mid-Year Meeting.

C. That all charges receiving Mission Aid be required to have an Every Member Canvass, and that the report of that canvass be certified by the District Superintendent in writing to the Board of Missions before any action is taken on the application.

D. That there be a bonded contractor on any project in which a church requires assistance from the Board of Missions, where such project exceeds 15% of the total value of the church property.

E. That all churches follow the requirements as set forth in the Methodist Discipline paragraph 723, sections 1 and 2. The Conference Board of Missions strongly recommends that an architect be employed for building and remodeling projects.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE OF NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE MAY 27-30, 1968

The past three years as Conference President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service have been an enriching experience for me, and one of the most interesting parts has been representing the women of the church at Annual Conference. I have learned much and enjoyed every hour spent with you. You have made me feel at home among you. I have felt a real part of the Board of Missions, the Deaconess Board, TRAFCO, Town and Country Commission, and the Commission on Christian Vocations, having attended, with our Conference Secretary of Missionary Personnel, two of its retreats at Shoal Creek and its Guidance Consultation at Wesley Foundation, at the University of Arkansas where we learned how high-school counselors and ministers can work together so the counselors will not forget the church vocations and the ministers the other types, all of which may be Christian. I know Mrs. E. L. Hunt and Mrs. David Block have felt the same about the Board of Social Concerns and the Board of Evangelism of which they have been a part. We have been very glad to share in the expense of the youth and adult United Nations-Washington Tours with the Board of Social Concerns. Last fall I attended a meeting of the Interboard Council at Hendrix College and I have visited their offices and appreciated how the Woman's Society has always been included in their calendar and they have given us the publicity about our schools and one or the other of the directors get to our annual executive meetings. We've been happy to help financially with the film library.

There has been more cooperation between the Conferences in Arkansas. I've been pleased to be a part of the Area Council. This year our third Inter-conference School of Christian Mission will be at Hendrix College July 15-19. For two years we've had our mid-year executive committee meetings at the same time as those of Little Rock Conference at Aldersgate Camp so the school steering committee could meet and the fellowship and meals together have proved invaluable. And speaking of Aldersgate Camp, we have given \$1,000 to it each year and individual camperships and we

do appreciate all that is being done there. I've attended two of their annual dinners of the camp board and breakfasts for the speakers, Mrs. Laskey

and Mary Lou Barnwell.

More cooperation has been evident between the Woman's Society and the Wesleyan Service Guild with week-end annual meetings the past two years so we could have a joint session on Saturday afternoon with joint pledge and communion services. An innovation both times has been interpretations in rhythm of the Guild Hymn and How Great Thou Art. The Theme of our annual meeting this year was "Modern Woman and Her Faith" with Mrs. Cecil Matthews, Jurisdiction Secretary of Spiritual Life Cultivation, one of our main speakers. Mrs. Hazel Dabney, Jurisdiction Secretary of the Wesleyan Service Guild, alerted us to changes in structure, one of which will be a joint membership committee on the local level, so new women will be informed about both organizations and be able to choose, and mutual benefit rather than rivalry will result. There will be more incentive for initiative on the local scene, with task groups planning tasks using the leaders of the whole community to meet needs. Our magazine, The Methodist Woman, may have a new name. And, as you have heard, we will be the Women's Society of Christian Service.

Two new Societies have been organized in the Conference this year, one in Christ United Church in Paragould and one in Sequoyah Church in Fayetteville. Also, there are two new Guilds, in Cavanaugh in Fort Smith and

in Siloam Springs.

Our pledge to the Woman's Division this past year was \$87,625, and it has been paid in full. World Banks keep bringing in more each year—this one \$4,692.62 for the Woman's Society and the Guild. Special Memberships amounted to \$6,005.00. We itinerated Pearle McCain in all the Districts and Corsages for Missions for her came to \$1,713.00. We put out a newssheet to publicize the itinerary as well as to give a fall boost to Societies and

Guilds after summer slumps or vacations.

Since supply askings will be no more but all included in the pledge now, we must give more undesignated and trust our leaders to use our money where it is needed most. This requires education, for people still like to know just where their money goes. We used to have the "Do You Know" booklets, but now we have a new one called Project Handbook of Home Fields, and soon one will be out for other parts of the world. Through these and our Prayer Calendar we can become acquainted with our workers and work.

Speaking of workers, we have one in our own Conference, Bernice Rogers, a rural church and community worker, who's changing districts from Fayetteville to Batesville, but she'll be a blessing wherever she goes. My husband and I visited her work camp last summer when youth from Helena were with her camping on an abandoned bridge on the edge of the Buffalo River. We got there in time to eat a delicious supper with them and then went to a youth rally. Next morning we went to a small church in a lovely little valley. The boys worked on the grounds while the girls taught vacation church school. We talked to them of their future plans. This summer one of the boys is coming back to work with Bernice. It is such experiences as these that recruit youth for church vocations.

We have moved ahead in race relations. Our interconference schools have been integrated with Southwest Conference with us. Their president has been in all three of the annual meetings when I have presided. Mrs. Edgar Dixon, President of Little Rock Conference, and I went to Southwest Conference annual meeting in Hot Springs last year and were a real part

of it.

In ecumenicity we are not lagging, for we have cooperated with the Arkansas Council of Churches and the Arkansas Church Women United. When I could not go to the meetings we were represented by Mrs. John Workman. I led a city-wide and church-wide study of Japan in Fayetteville last October, meeting in a different church four Sunday nights beginning with supper serving Japanese food. Children's workers were trained two evenings, one by Bernice Rogers. Pearle McCain was here to open the study. It was lifted up at the state meeting of Church Women United

as an example of what can be done when the churches of a city will work together. I have attended and urged our women to go to Southwest Confer-

together. I have attended and urged our women to go to Southwest Conference on the Christian World Mission. It will be on the Mountain June 8-14. I have been in every district at least twice and Fort Smith District six times. It was a joy to go with Edith Martin and Pearle McCain. I can still see the little churches bulging with people eager to hear of some of our work in far-away places first hand. We have had two World Understanding Workshops, and Edith Martin helped in the one in Fort Smith. The focus was on Africa, and Mrs. E. L. Hunt, Secretary of Christian Social Relations, planned these after going to one in Baton Rouge. Last summer we had several college students lined up to attend the Jurisdictional Missionary Conference here on the Mountain, but at the

Jurisdictional Missionary Conference here on the Mountain, but at the list minute they got jobs till we only had one who was ready to enter college. It has been suggested that churches who hire students during the summer might release them to come. Please think of this if you have one

in your church.

Mrs. Howard Johnson of Clinton is the new Conference President. She has been a very able Vice-President—always at my right hand to help. She will lead the women of North Arkansas to greater service. There are to be many changes—fewer officers. Let me close with a poem—"Change" by Mildred Hoyer:

How we rebel against it! Give us what we know: Familiar faces, Familiar tunes, Accented routine. Let us be comfortable.

But life is change. Change is the new Change is the catalyst, Change is growth, Change is more: It is letting go Of the past; It is grasping the future With firm hands of faith.

THE BOARD OF PENSIONS

A. Distribution

Fulfilling our responsibility as the Conference Board of Pensions, we have authorized the payment of claims as follows:

To 58 members retired by the North Arkansas Conference, with a total of 1585½ service years, and 82½ supply years.

To 71 members retired by other conferences with a total of 451 service

years, and 27½ supply years.

To 71 widows of members retired by the North Arkansas Conference with a total of 1609¾ service years, and 107¾ supply years.

To 77 widows of members retired by other conferences with a total of 580½ service years, and 21½ supply years.

To 10 dependent children of deceased ministers retired by the North

Arkansas Conference and other conferences, whose pensions are based on a total of 1134 service years, and 234 supply years.

To 23 approved supply pastors of the North Arkansas Conference with 336½ service years.

To 14 widows of approved supply pastors of the North Arkansas Conference with 172¼ service years.
 To 2 dependent children of an approved supply pastor whose pension

is based on a total of 23 service years.

The North Arkansas Conference in 1967-1968 had the responsibility for a total of 326 claimants with a total of 5134¼ years of service.

The annuity claims have been paid on the basis of the following rates

established by the annual conference: Conference Members (100% of Annuity Rate) ... \$48.0 Widows of Conference Members (70% of Annuity Rate)\$48.00 per service year

B. Responsibilities

Other service authorized by the Board of Pensions:

 One necessitous allowance grants. Total \$80.
 Premiums in the amount of \$3,556 for 36 claimants eligible for Group Hospitalization Insurance coverage.

3. Refund for Medicare in the amount of \$6,435 for 165 claimants.

4. Premiums in the amount of \$4,457 for 65 claimants eligible for Death Benefit Program Coverage.

5. Premiums in the amount of \$6,193 for 162 claimants on Medicare.

6. Seven Love Offerings at retirement. Total \$2,100.

These benefits are equivalent to an additional \$3.81 per service year,

C. Recommendations

1. We recommend that annuity rate for 1968-69 be \$49.00 per service year for retired members and that the rate for 1968-69 for special conference claimants be 85% thereby setting said rate at \$41.65.

2. We recommend that there be apportioned to charges for conference claimants an amount equal to 20% of the pastor's salary; and that each minister, except retired ministers, part-time supplies and part-time student supplies, appointed with an annuity claim on the conference shall pay an assessment annually to the conference claimants fund in an amount equal to 2% of his total cash salary which shall include minimum salary and mission appropriations. Any man not having paid his Conference Claimants Fund, pastor's part, will be charged 5% interest per year on the unpaid total balance, in accord with Paragraph 1624 and 1634 of the 1964 Discipline.

3. We recommend there be continued the work of the Board of Pensions Committee on Proportional Payment of Ministerial Support in accord with provisions of Paragraphs 1624 and 1634 of the 1964 Discipline.

4. That the Secretary of the Annual Conference be requested to print in the Conference Journal individual amounts due and amounts paid by pastors during the year to the Conference Claimants Fund.

5. That necessitous allowance grants, retirement love offering, and local expenses of the Board be paid by the Treasurer, subject to the approval by the Executive Committee of the Conference Board of Pensions and 1964 Discipline (Paragraph 1611.10 and 1652.2).

6. That the regular annuity payments be made monthly in advance to the Conference Claimants from the office of the General Board of Pensions, Evanston, Illinois, on the first day of each month.

7. That the institution, board or organization paying the salary of a minister on special appointment without annuity claim on the conference shall make provisions for the pension of such person. Attention is called to the 1964 Discipline (Paragraph 1644.1) with reference to eligibility to participate in Ministers Reserve Pension Fund (MRPF) with the approval of the General Board of Pensions.

8. That there be apportioned to each agency and institution served by a ministerial member under special appointment with annuity claim on the conference, the sum of \$360.00 for the Conference year 1968-69 in accord with the 1964 Discipline (Paragraphs 1623.2 and 1623.7); and that said apportionment be paid to the Treasurer of the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions no later than 7 days prior to the opening of Annual Conference.

9. That the special appointment be listed in the Conference Journal as follows: With Annuity Claim upon the Conference subject to the 1964 Discipline (Paragraph 1623, section 7a):

That in determining years of service the Board shall carefully examine and consider those years listed in the Conference Journal prior to accepting them as valid years; and that any years in question shall be subject to validation by the applicant and by approval of the Board of ${f Pensions.}$

14. That all approved supply pastors continue to provide all information necessary relative to their service record.
15. That the Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Pensions of the North Arkansas Conference be paid \$400.00 each for administrative work during the 1968-69 year.

16. That the Executive Committee elected by the Board be designated in the Journal with the roster of the members of the Board of Pensions.

17. We recommend that the investments in the Unrestricted Reserve Fund of the Pension Program adopted by the 1963-64 Conference be continued.

18. Eligible claimants who have been retired by the North Arkansas Conference will have their Conference Death Benefit Program carried for them with the contributions paid by the Conference Board of Pensions in accord with the program of the Conference Committee on Group Insurance. The Conference Hospitalization insurance premium for the claimants under 65 years of age will be paid and those over 65 will be reimbursed \$48.00 per person, per year for their Medicare payment. Retired ministers who serve appointments under the District Superintendent and receive less than a total of \$1,000.00 in expenses and salary (including minimum salary and mission appropriations) from the charge will have the above payments paid by the Conference Board of Pensions provided they notify the Conference Board of Pensions Treasurer their total income from the charge; otherwise they and their charge will be considered paying the total amounts.

19. We recommend the continuation of the Death Benefit Program of the

19. We recommend the continuation of the Death Benefit Program of the General Board of Pensions as recommended by Committee on Group

Insurance.

20. We recommend that each minister at the time of retirement be given a Love Offering of \$300.00.

21. Guide lines for determining supply years:

A. No part-time supply shall receive credit either as a student or non-student.

B. Must be on Student Approved Supply list, or Approved Supply List or equivalent.

C. He is or was the pastor in charge or assistant or associate under appointment with scheduled every Sunday preaching or in his appointive duties giving full time (not attending school) for the summer or equivalent, and student for no more than 9 months per year when serving a charge, or takes 12 hours per each semester or less while serving.

D. Major income from the charge (not considering scholarships or GI Bills)

and meet the minimum salary requirements.

E. He paid or will pay the percentages where applicable.

F. The charge paid the percentage items.

G. When the student was or is assigned as an associate or assistant and meets the above requirements then the charge must have paid or will pay percentage items on his income, too, since June 1955 when this became a standing rule. Conference Journal. (19)

H. Each student pastor or pastor who has student years of service must submit in writing his request for the years he was a student pastor and prove that he met the above requirements.

I. The above guidelines will become effective with the beginning of the

1968-69 Conference Year, and are not retroactive.

22. We feel that supply years have been denied some men by the action of the Annual Conference of 1967 in item 21 above. Therefore, we request the Conference to grant the year 1968-69 as a period in which men denied full time years may apply to the secretary of the Board for a study of those years in accord with item 21, A through H.

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ARKANSAS/LOUISIANA METHODIST COMMISSION Adopted May 29, 1968

Recommendations

The Arkansas/Louisiana Methodist Commission makes the following recommendations to the 1968 Annual Conference:

1. That the dates for the 1969 Circulation Campaign be January 5-12.

2. That the quotas for each local church be set as one subscriber for every seven members reported by that church to the 1968 Annual Conference.

3. That the subscription price be \$2.50 per year. Churches can become eligible for a \$2.00 subscription price when they send in a list of subscribers equal to one for every three members reported to the 1968 Annual Conference.

4. That we again challenge district superintendents and district directors to find one additional church that will include the paper in their budget and send it to every family on their mailing list. That each district be asked to face its quota for 1969 as one of its major emphases during

the first year of the new quadrennium.

5. That the commission on World Service and Finance of the Louisiana, Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conferences be asked to continue their annual apportionment of \$4,600 each for the support of the

papers.

6. That the editor and either the chairman or secretary of the commission be authorized to sign notes at the Union National Bank, Little Rock, for money which might need to be borrowed for current operations.

7. That the executive committee be empowered to act for the commission in matters that require attention between meetings of the commission.

8. That we express appreciation to Bishop Paul V. Galloway and Bishop Aubrey G. Walton for the undergirding support which they give the commission and the papers.

9. That we express appreciation to the district superintendents, the district directors, the pastors and the laymen who worked so diligently to

promote the publications.

10. We express gratitude to the hundreds of people who channel the news to us and furnish us with their reactions concerning the directions being followed by the papers and their staff.

HISTORICAL COMMISSION REPORT Adopted May 29, 1968

The Historical Commission recommends that its project for the coming year be the obtaining of photographs of each member of the Annual Conference. With the cooperation of the Cabinet, it is hoped that these can be obtained at District Meetings; one copy to be sent to the Arkansas Methodist; one copy retained in the Commission's files; and one copy given to the Minister.

It is further hoped that in cooperation with the Historical Commission of the Little Rock Conference that a map can be designed which will show the Methodist historical sites and institutions of our State, and that this can be made available through the churches to laymen who may desire to

visit these institutions while traveling in our State.

We urge every Charge to have a Historical Commission, and to write a local history of that particular church, obtain photographs of buildings that may become valuable as time goes by, and perhaps institute an effort to obtain photographs of all pastors who have served that particular charge throughout its history.

THE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS Adopted May 30, 1968

To live life under commitment to God in Jesus Christ includes consideration of the occupation of life. We fulfill our Christian commitment through the occupation we choose and live in from day to day. To answer the call of God that comes to every person is to make personal applications through areas, or roles, or responsibilities of life as is included in the life work. We as people in the church must assist our youth in consideration of choosing his life work in terms of a basic commitment as a Christian.

The needs for personnel in the occupational services of the church

are great. Let us as churchmen keep the many opportunities before youth

and adults that offer good choices for some youth and will share services in the mission of the church that are relevant.

I. Reports of 1967-1968

Special Quarterly Conference Report Forms. The commission has provided a copy for each local church to share full information about program and persons who have an interest in church related occupations now. This is the first time for such comprehensive reporting from the local church level.

1968 Methodist Related Occupations booklet was mailed by the commission to every local pastor and guidance counselor in each of the public schools in the bounds of the North Arkansas Conference.

Guidance Consultations. On May 3 the Guidance Consultation for church leaders and school guidance counselors was held at Jonesboro, Arkansas with the Rev. Mr. Arthur Hopkinson of the Interboard Committee, Nashville and Mr. Leroy Pennington, Director of the State Guidance Service Department of the Board of Education of Arkansas as leaders. We are projecting the possibility of having four of these consultations in four centers of the conference during the next conference year with one being sponsored jointly with the Little Rock Conference Commission on Christian Vocations in the greater Little Rock Area.

Two Workshops for District Committees. In Clarksville the three western districts of the conference and at Newport the four eastern districts of the conference met in one day workshops on the District Committee on Christian Vocations. In the districts there have been many area workshops on the Local Committee on Christian Vocations as a follow up program. There was full participation by members of the committees in each district.

Planning Session of the Conference Commission. In September a two day planning session was held at Shoal Creek Camp for the commission from which came many of the plans for this year and suggestions for the future.

Lab School-Coaching Conference, March 10-14, 1968, First Methodist Church, Conway. "You and Your Life Work: A Choice for Youth" was the course of study with Dr. Richard Bauer of the Interboard Committee, Nashville, Tennessee, as leader. This was a family unit approach in the lab school in five night sessions for three hours each with 22 10th and 11th graders, 39 parents (17 couples and 5 singles) and 11 Leaders in Training participating. Families and leaders in training both believe this approach to be most beneficial to all involved. The Coaching Conference on the same course was held in the days of the week and we expect eleven persons to be certified for this course which will only be used in family unit situations in schools of the future. The Interboard Council and the Board of Education cooperated in sharing the expense of this school and conference, which was a first timer for Arkansas Methodism.

Job Data Book-Occupations in the Methodist Church. This new compilation in further detail about occupations currently open in the Methodist Church with personnel listings added every two months is being provided to each Wesley Foundation Director and possibly each placement office on the college campuses within our conference.

II. Recommendations for Future

1. Internship-observation experiences. Pastor can give interested Senior High youth opportunities in local churches during the summer months to see the church in action in terms of daily program, activities, pastor, Christian Education workers, leaders in music, teaching, etc., through personal experiences and observation and evaluations through conversations with said pastors.

2. Pastor's Conversation Groups. We encourage conversations of pastors with fellow pastors about current ministry in the church (implications, needs, etc.); conversations with youth who are interested in the ministry; with youth who do not know what they are interested in; with youth who are in college and seminary study who have decided for the

ministry. These could be informal small group conversations or even one to

3. Continue and enlarge relationships with church leaders and public school guidance counselors with the purpose of working together in mutual service to the same youth in the given town, as they move through the process of occupational decision.

4. Keep parents alert to the significant role they have in assisting helpfully their youth in all aspects of occupational choice. Local Churches should have families enroll in the "You and Your Life Work" course.

5. Provide real opportunity for children, youth, adults in membership training classes or otherwise to seriously think through the meaning and implications of Christian Vocation or God's call to every man. Theological,

Biblical backgrounds of understanding are needed and practical applications in the world of today are encouraged.

6. Confront every youth in 10, 11, 12 grades in local churches with opportunities in occupations related to the Methodist church in mission across the world with the wide variety of interest and deep challenge to

service, that is based on current information.

7. Provide orientation workshops for conference and district members with responsibilities for the work of education and enlistment in Christian

vocations soon after June 1, 1968.

8. Plan for Senior High to participate in a tour of the Methodist Hospital in Memphis, for observation, study, interpretation of opportunities through the Methodist Church in the healing ministry. Contact George

Stewart, Chaplain.

9. Schedule for interested youth a team of courses from the Methodist Hospital in Memphis, for a visit to local high school and churches to discuss with students and parents careers in nursing available in the Methodist Church. Contact George Stewart, Chaplain.

10. Creative planning for observance of Ministry Sunday in May in

every local Church.

11. Have a Local Committee on Christian Vocations organized and functioning with real service to youth in the process of life work choice; to parents and leaders who want to be helpful in assistance.

12. Inform adults who may be interested in second careers about the vast opportunities in church related careers.

May we as churchmen—leaders, parents—desire to be helpful counselors with youth as they make vital choices regarding their life work. May we improve our effectiveness through preparations of study, experiences, observations, evaluations and conversations with youth today so that we are relevant in language, aspects of challenge, sense of values. May we love youth enough to so prepare for service that counts.

We as a commission in this year are grateful for every evidence of cooperation, suggestions that you of the conference have shared with us as we have tried to fulfill the tasks given to this commission in the con-

Let us never waiver in our concern to challenge youth and adults to be Christian in life and to consider church related occupations as live options of life work.

COMMISSION ON MIMIMUM SALARY Adopted May 29, 1968

The Commission on Minimum Salary shall be composed of seven ministers of the North Arkansas Annual Conference and one layman from each District of the Conference, and including representatives from urban, village and rural churches. The Commission shall elect quadrennially a chairman, vice-chairman and secretary to perform the usual duties of such offices. These officers shall also compose the Executive Committee of

the Commission. Whenever a vacancy occurs on the Commission between sessions of the Annual Conference, the vacancy shall be filled by the District Superintendent of the District involved.

Charges may become eligible to receive salary aid for the pastor from

minimum salary fund by meeting the following requirements.

1. Conduct an Every Member Program on Stewardship following the procedure outlined by the Town and Country Commission.

2. File with the District Superintendent and the Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission: a. A report of the Every Member Stewardship Program.

b. A budget of each church approved by the Official Board.

c. An application for minimum salary assistance.

3. Each Charge or Parish shall be asked to increase the salary or travel \$100 each year. There will be no decrease in Minimum Salary aid in the first \$100 increase; and only fifty per cent (50%) reduction of all increase over \$100. No Charge shall be eligible to receive Minimum Salary aid if there is a reduction.

4. That we adopt the Town and Country Commission program for Larger

Parishes and Group Ministries.

5. Plans for a Larger Parish Program shall be presented to the Commission for approval and for funds to be received. Each Parish shall have a Training Course on the Larger Parish.

6. All pro-rated connectional claims shall be paid by the charge in accordance with Paragraph 823 of the 1960 Discipline.

7. Minimum Salary Charges shall be grouped as follows:

Type A—At least four churches with a membership of 300. Pastors preach three times on Sunday. Salary, travel expenses, mission aid and minimum salary not to exceed \$4,500.00. Where there are four churches on a charge and they merge to form three churches, they shall qualify for the same amount as a charge with four churches. Type B—At least three churches with salary, travel expenses, mission aid and minimum salary aid not to exceed \$3,900.00.

Type C—Student pastors married, at least three churches, salary, travel expenses, mission and minimum salary aid not to exceed \$3,800.00. Student pastors single, at least three churches, salary, travel expenses, mission and minimum salary aid not to exceed \$2,700.00. Minimum Sal-

ary Charges must be composed of at least three churches with salary and travel expense as much as \$1,800.00. Maximum Schedule Allowances:

Student, Single\$650.00 Student, Married 750.00 Fulltime 850.00

Ministers with dependent children may draw \$100.00 for each child without reference to the above schedule of allowance and salary levels.

8. Payments from this fund are made without regard to the amount the pastor receives from pension or educational funds. No part-time pastor is eligible to receive minimum salary aid.

9. In event the income of the fund becomes insufficient to meet the claims upon it each claimant shall benefit in his proportionate share of the

available fund.

10. An amount not to exceed a total of \$550 shall be allowed from this fund on the expenses of men serving minimum salary charges to attend the Rural Seminar.

11. This Commission will be willing to listen to any District Superintendent

desiring to submit a special case for minimum salary aid.

12. A Charge may become qualified as a Minimum Salary Charge within the first three months of the conference year provided it meets the requirements of this Commission as stated in its report to Annual Conference and That:
(a) An application be submitted to the Area Secretary of the Town

and Country Work and to the Secretary of this Commission on,

or before, September 1st.

Any special case must meet the approval of the Area Secretary of Town and Country Work and the Executive Committee of this Com(c) Any Charge thus approved becomes retroactive to the beginning of the Annual Conference year.

13. All churches shall be asked to pay into the Minimum Salary Aid Fund according to the following schedule:

14. The Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission shall serve in an advisory capacity to the Commission on Minimum Salary.

15. All requests for Minimum Salary assistance shall be filed in triplicate; one copy each to the Secretary of this Commission, to the District Superintendent and to the Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission. These reports must be filed no later than May 15 preceding the Annual Conference session.

16. Hospital and Group Life Insurance premiums of pastors serving Minimum Salary charges who draw less than \$4,500.00 from all sources

shall be paid their share from this fund.

TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION Adopted May 29, 1968

The Television, Radio and Film Commission proposes as its program for the Conference Year 1968-69 the following:

I. Training in the use of Audiovisuals:

- —We recommend that workshops dealing with the use of audiovisuals in the local church be conducted in each district during the quadrennium.
- ---We recommend that workshops be conducted this year in the Fayetteville, Jonesboro and Paragould Districts.

II. Television-Radio Ministry Fund:

- --We recommend that the World Service and Finance Commission continue to allocate funds from the World Service Dollar during the quadrennium to General TRAFCO.
- —We recommend that \$2,500 be allocated to General TRAFCO this year for its general national programming.

III. Audio-visuals:

- —We recommend that Conference TRAFCO provide the local church with information about outstanding secular films suitable for use in the Church ministry.
- —We recommend that information regarding up-coming network television programs of interest and concern to the Christian community be provided to the local church.
- —We recommend that this information be supplied to the local church through the Hot-Line that goes out from the Interboard Office.
- —We recommend that Conference TRAFCO subscribe to "Mass Media Ministries."

IV. Film Library:

- —We recommend that the name of the Central Film Library be changed to "Methodist Film Library."
- —We recommend that a new film catalogue be printed which lists the films and filmstrips topically, and includes an alphabetical index of each item in the library.

-We recommend that films and filmstrips which are loaned from the Methodist Film Library to other denominations be loaned on a rental basis comparable to what the same film or filmstrip rents for from Cokesbury.

We recommend the following policy of the Methodist Film Library:

1. When a church, pastor or representative of a church returns a film, filmstrip or audio-visual resource that is damaged, the Library will notify the user that the film or filmstrip was returned in a damaged condition; and when a church, pastor or representative of the church returns a film or filmstrip to the Library damaged a second time, then the user will be sent the bill to cover the repair cost.

2. If the user refuses to assume obligation for the repair costs, then he will no longer be entitled to the services of the Film

Library until such account is settled.

- 3. If a user keeps a film or filmstrip beyond the date indicated on the confirmation label for return to the Film Library, and this delay necessitates long distance communication with a church or person who has scheduled the resource for future use, the user shall be accountable for the cost of the long distance telephone call and shall be sent the same upon receipt at the Interboard Office.
- 4. As in the case of repairs so in the case of delays, any user refusing to pay such bills shall no longer enjoy the services of the Film Library until such account is settled.
- -We recommend that the districts that have film libraries transfer all films and filmstrips to the Methodist Film Library.

ARKANSAS AREA TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION 1968-1969

Adopted May 30, 1968

I. Special emphasis will be given during the coming Conference Year in providing assistance to Town and Country Churches who are

considering a building program.

The Area Director will be available for guidance and counsel, during the earlier stages of planning, to any church, pastor, or District Superintendent. The purpose of his services in this area of work will be to help improve the looks, quality and functionality of the church building that is to be built.

He will provide information concerning the guidelines required by the General and Conference Boards of Missions to churches that expect to ask for grants or loans to assist them in building. He will present to proper local church boards, committees and congregations many architect plans for sanctuaries and educational build-ings. These plans will reflect the outside appearances and floor space arrangements. They will vary in size, appearance, and arrangement of rooms, quality of construction. Construction costs will rangement of rooms, quanty of construction. Construction costs will vary from \$10,000 to \$100,000. These are only preliminary plans, and are not for use in the actual construction. Rather, they are to give the congregation ideas of basic design, appearance and arrangement of floor space. Once a plan is chosen, it can be laid before a certified architect or qualified draftsman or engineer for complete drawing of plans.

The Area Director will attempt to create a consciousness on the part of the local church regarding the Stewardship of Building. This emphasis will include programs of sound finance in building and paying for church construction. He will point out many economy measures in construction which will enable a church to obtain a

- better quality building, or more building for the money. In addition, he will point out tax saving incentives offered by the Federal Government which enable some donors to make larger gifts at a smaller "out of the pocket" cost.
- II. We recommend to the incoming Town and Country Commission that they adopt the above-mentioned Building Program for its "special emphasis" during the new quadrennium.
- III. We recommend that the Conference Board of Missions set up a special committee to work with the Area Director of Town and Country work in establishing some guidelines and procedures regarding building programs by local churches who plan to ask for grants or loans to assist them in their building.
- IV. The Area Town and Country Workshop will be held on Monday of the same week designated for the Annual Mid-Year Meetings of the two Conferences in 1969.
- V. The Area Town and Country Workshop will feature "The Objectives and Ideas in Church Construction" as its program next year.
- VI. We recommend the holding of divine worship services in each church every week, wherever practical or possible.
- VII. We recommend that every Methodist Church in Arkansas have an appropriate sign designating it as a Methodist Church. We also recommend churches putting up new signs to designate the building as "The United Methodist Church."
- VIII. We shall continue to promote interest in holding worship services in the recreational areas of our State.
 - IX. When requested by the District Superintendent, the Commission will be willing to assist him in a study regarding the Larger Parish Programs, new church locations and the abandonment of church properties.
 - X. We shall cooperate with the University of Arkansas and the Council of Churches in the Town and Country Church Seminar, which is held annually on the campus of the University. The Seminar program this year will deal with cooperative ideas and procedures between churches of all denominations in the small towns and rural areas which may strengthen the influence and activity of such church communities.
 - XI. The Executive Director, in cooperation with the Executive Committee, select one rural minister in each Conference to attend the Seminar on Church and Community Life, which is held at Emory University in the summer. We will pay up to \$100.00 on the expenses of those attending this Seminar.
- XII. We request the Commission on Minimum Salary to allow up to \$500 for expenses of pastors on minimum salary to attend the Town and Country Church Seminar.
- XIII. The Commission shall be responsible for promoting stewardship through the Every Member Visit, Tithing, Wills, Legacies, The Methodist Foundation of Arkansas and the Lord's Acre-Lord's Hour Plan.
- XIV. We will also inform all Methodist Churches in Arkansas of the "Financial Crusades," a service made available by the General Board of Missions through the Department of Finance and Field Services. Their Directors are ordained Methodist ministers who have been highly successful in church fund-raising and offer their services at a fraction of the cost of secular professional stewardship directors.
- XV. We will request and try to make use of the Lay Speaking Program of the Conference Board of Lay Activities. To further develop

- the goal, we will prepare and recommend to those conducting worship services a uniform Methodist Order of Worship. We urge that everyone conducting such services give an invitation to Christian Discipleship at the close of the service.
- XVI. The Enlarge Charge Program shall be continued with a goal of at least 300-400 members for every full-time pastor.
- XVII. We shall work with TRAFCO in offering to make available films and filmstrips to be used by the Districts and local churches.
- XVIII. A District Director of Town and Country Work may be elected for each district by the Conference Commission on Town and Country Work on nomination by the District Superintendent after consultation with the executive committee of the commission. He shall work in close cooperation with the Executive Director of the Commission in all phases of the town and country program. His chief functions shall be to expedite all program aspects in his district, to assist the district superintendent in implementing the program, and to serve as liaison between the district and conference programs.
 - XIX. The Rural Church of the Year Awards shall be promoted according to the guidelines developed by the special committee on the Rural Church of the Year.
 - XX. We shall seek to develop cooperative procedures between the church and governmental agencies, the Arkansas Council of Churches and other denominations.
 - XXI. We shall cooperate with the Cabinet, the Boards of Missions, Evangelism, and Education in establishing new congregations and outpost Sunday Schools.
- XXII. The Town and Country Commission is of the conviction that there is a direct relationship between the general interest in a local church and the financial strength of a local church as compared with the existence and systematic activity of the following church groups: The Methodist Men, the Women's Society of Christian Service, The Methodist Youth Fellowship and the Official Board. Therefore, our program this year will include the working out of a plan that will encourage the organization and activity of a Methodist Youth Fellowship, a Women's Society of Christian Service, a Methodist Men's Club and an Official Board in every local church. When this plan has been conceived the Area Director will be available to assist any pastor and local church requesting his services to organize and set in motion any one of these, or all of these, important local church organizations.
- XXIII. All of the ministers belonging to the Southwest Conference and serving in the Arkansas Area will be informed as to the abovementioned program of the Area Town and Country Commission. They will be offered the services of its Area Director and invited to participate in its program.
- XXIV. We ask that \$9,000.00 be granted by the Commission on World Service and Finance for the Town and Country Work and Stewardship Promotion for this next Conference Year.
- XXV. We recommend Reverend W. O. Scroggin, Jr., for the work he has done the past three years as the Area Director of Town and Country Work and Stewardship, and request the Bishop and the Cabinet to reappoint him as the Area Director of Town and Country Work and Stewardship, representing the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conferences for the coming year.

Report No. 2

The Annual Town and Country Area Workshop was held January 15, 1968 at Aldersgate Methodist Camp, with fifty-four in attendance. Its purpose was providing information that would improve the look, quality, and function of church construction throughout the State.

The Area Town and Country office has supplied large amounts of printed material to churches throughout the Area, some without charge, such as "What Tithing Means To Me" by Coach Frank Broyles. We have printed and sold about ten thousand pledge cards and placed about twenty metal church signs. We also keep a large supply of catalogs listing the EMV material and costs.

The Commission sponsored an "Area Stewardship Workshop" last fall,

attended by one hundred fifty-four persons.

The Area Director attended six District Conferences. The Town and Country work and stewardship programs were presented at each, and he spoke at five of these conferences. He assisted in three district stewardship workshops, and conducted eight sub-district stewardship workshops in which thirty-six churches participated. He preached in seventy-one different churches, often as many as two or three times a Sunday, has been preacher in two revival meetings, one in a small-town church, the other in an opencountry church, has spoken at two district preachers' meetings, two Fifth Sunday rallies, one civic club, and two "Methodist Men" meetings.

The Area Director was among twenty-two ministers, office, and church

and community workers attending the quadrennial meeting of Town and Country Work in Columbus, Ohio, in November.

The past year the Area Director served on the Program Committee of the Town and Country Seminar, and presided over one section. This Committee met four times this Conference Year, all meetings attended by the Director of the Town and Country Seminar, and presided over one section. tor. The annual meeting of the Town and Country Seminar was attended by fifty-eight ministers and their wives, thirty-three of whom were Methodist.

Five other denominations were represented.

We call your attention to the large film library available in the Area Town and Country office, available to every church without cost, except return postage. Our working arrangement with Little Rock Conference TRAFCO has been most satisfactory. They have been sharing in cost of rent, use of office equipment, and office secretary's salary. Our office secretary mails out films daily. She has prepared a new listing and worked out a practical system of scheduling and mailing films. Our major problem has been that often films are not returned promptly after showing, and we ask for cooperation on the part of those who may have been negligent in this matter.

The most significant, worthwhile service we have rendered this year has been the giving of guidance in building programs. Coming to the sudden realization that something definite was needed in this area, the Area Director has equipped himself to offer practical guidance in this field, securing much technical information and numerous architectural plans for church facilities. To date he has met with fourteen local church building committees, some as often as three times, encouraging them to build better-quality buildings more in accord with their needs, and more attractive. He has presented plans for fund raising, and has estimated costs with some degree of accuracy. He has been, and will be of invaluable service to any local church considering a building program. It is important that he be called in during the earliest possible stage of planning. He will go anywhere in the State, sharing materials and information, upon request of the local church, at no cost to the local church whatsoever.

The Cmmission announces that the winners in the Church of the Year Program are: The Small Town Church of the Year Award, The Calico Rock United Methodist Church, Reverend Burl Long, pastor; The Open Country Church of The Year Award, The Holiday Hills United Methodist Church, Reverend Tom Cowan, pastor. Both of these churches are in the Batesville District. Certificates of Recognition were given to: Graham Chapel and Perry churches, Conway District; and Brightwater and Gentry Churches, Fayetteville District; and Cole's Chapel and Mulberry churches, Fort Smith District; The Lexa United Methodist Church, Forrest City District; and The Mt. Carmel and Hickory Ridge churches, Jonesboro District.

Group Life Insurance

We make the following recommendations:

- I. All members of the North Arkansas Conference, except students serving appointments in, or those employed in Conferences which have compulsory insurance programs, and every full time approved supply pastor receiving an appointment shall participate in the North Arkansas Conference Life Insurance Plan subject to its laws and regulations.
- II. That the General Board of Pensions Death Benefit Program Plan C be our Conference Group Life Insurance, providing increased coverage based on the 1968 Average salary of \$6,076.

B. Educational Benefit:

For each child of a deceased member, an educational benefit for each of the first four academic years of study beyond high school spent, after the death of the member, in full attendance at a standard school, college, university or institution of higher learning shall be paid \$900.00 per year.

C. Contribution per member enrolled—\$91.14 yearly.
1. The premium of \$91.14 (1½% of the average salary in the Conference) shall be paid as follows: Pastor, \$36.47; Charge, \$54.67.
2. The annual premiums shall be paid by participants and charges and collected through district organizations and received by the Area Treasurer no later than January 20, 1969.

III. We further recommend that an additional group policy shall continue to be carried providing \$1,000.00 coverage for seminary students, serving in conferences with no compulsory insurance program. The Board of Ministerial Training is to pay the total premium for this coverage.

Report No. 2

Group Hospitalization Insurance

I. We make the following recommendations:

 All members of the North Arkansas Conference except those eligible for "Medicare," except students serving appointments in or those employed in conferences which have compulsory insurance programs, every approved supply pastor receiving a full-time appointment, and every full-time lay employee of the North Arkansas Conference, except those eligible for Medicare, shall participate in the North Arkansas Conference Group Hospitalization Insurance Plan subject

to its laws and regulations.

2. All active members of the Conference and approved supplies 65 years of age and over shall be encouraged to participate in Medicare, the government medical insurance program. (When the Medicare plan went into effect July 1, 1966, all major insurance companies adjusted their programs to comply with it. This is true of Blue Cross-Blue Shield with whom we have our hospitalization insurance. They offer coverage above and beyond that offered by Medicare but will not pay for coverage that is available through Medicare.) If this supplementary coverage is chosen we recommend that the churches involved assume an amount equal to no more than 50% of the appropriate premium listed in the conference policy.

3. All retired personnel of the conference 65 years of age or older (conference members, approved supplies, the wives or widows of either group who are 65 or older) shall be encouraged to participate in Medicare, the government medical insurance program. Those retiring from the North Arkansas Conference shall have the monthly premium for part B of Medicare paid for them by the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions, except those who continue to serve as supplies earning \$1,000.00 or more and these shall pay their own premium. The supplementary coverage mentioned in 2 above is highly recommended in all instances. When a retired man continues to serve and chooses the supplementary coverage, we recommend that the church he serves participate on the

same basis as recommended in 2 above.
4. All retired personnel under 65 (members of the conference, approved supplies, wives, widows, or dependents of the same) who retired at the 1958 session of the North Arkansas Annual Conference or thereafter shall have the conference hospitalization policy carried for them with the premium paid by the North Arkansas

Conference Board of Pensions.

5. We further recommend that Blue Cross-Blue Shield be continued as the Group Hospitalization Insurance carrier for our Conference. 6. That the room rent allowance be continued at \$18.00 per day and

that we continue the \$300 surgical schedule.

7. The premium will remain the same as last year. Individual \$24.21 per quarter. Family \$52.44 per quarter. C. I. E. coverage is optional. Its cost per quarter is: Individual 60 cents; Family \$1.50. The premiums are to be shared equally by the ministers and the churches.

8. That hospitalization premiums be continued on a quarterly basis, with due dates of June 10, September 10, and March 10. All insured persons shall send the premiums to the District Treasurer

of Group Insurance.

9. All enrollment shall be handled through the office of the Chairman

of the Committee on Group Insurance.

10. Some employees now hold a Blue Cross-Blue Shield policy with other groups. Since they have an option to continue under their present coverage, we recommend that the churches involved assume an amount equal to no more than 50% of the appropriate premium listed in the conference policy.

Through this Church Plan, any person can subscribe to this fine magazine for the price of \$3.00 per year. There are no requirements placed on the number of subscribers in this plan. It is suggested that a gift subscription has given each new member coming into the global and the price of the tion be given each new member coming into the church. The publication fur-

tion be given each new member coming into the church. The publication furnishes a very attractive Gift certificate to be used for this.

We cannot urge too strongly that Methodist Literature be used in each class of our Church School, and that both teacher and pupil be supplied with sufficient literature for carrying on a successful class. Surely, we have been keeping abreast of the changes that have been coming in our Church school literature, and those changes which are just ahead for us for the Youth Division. Let us keep abreast of the times with this new literature. Surely, every church will make an effort to establish and maintain a Church Library for the good of our people. The Publishing House has a very attractive plan to help you stock such a library at an advantage in price

of the books.

We commend our churches for the way in which so many have provided their pews with copies of the Methodist Hymnal in its new form, and with the matching Books of Worship in many churches.

In such changing time it is not always possible to meet every need at just the time it arises, yet the Publishing Interests of the Methodist Church pledges to make every effort and exert its every energy in the supplying of worthwhile materials to every member and friend of the Methodist Church. We ask for your prayers and your support, and we welcome every suggestion or constructive criticism as to the way in which we may better serve you.

We have examined the attached statement of fund balances of the North Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Church as of May 31, 1967, and May 31, 1968, and the statement of fund transactions for the period June 1, 1967 to May 31, 1968, the funds of which are in the custody of Mr. Grafton Thomas, treasurer. Our examination also included the statement of cash receipts and disbursements of the Board of Pensions of the North Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Church for the period June 1, 1967 to May 31, 1968, the funds of which are in the custody of Rev. Allan E. Hilliard, treasurer.

Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

During the current and prior years funds invested by the Board of Pensions of the North Arkansas Conference in the Stabilization Fund of the Board of Pensions at Evanston, Illinois have been classified as disbursements rather than as an investment. Accordingly, any funds which may be held to the credit of the North Arkansas Conference by the Board of Pensions at Evanston, Illinois are not reflected in these financial statements.

In our opinion the attached statement of fund balances at June 1, 1967, and May 31, 1968, and the statement of fund transactions and cash receipts and disbursements of the Board of Pensions for the period June 1, 1967 to May 31, 1968 (except for funds held to the credit of the North Arkansas Conference by the Board of Pensions at Evanston, Illinois) present fairly the financial position of the North Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Church at May 31, 1968, and a proper accounting of fund transactions for the period June 1, 1967 through May 31, 1968.

VII. MEMOIRS

REVEREND JAMES O. DAVIS 1874-1967

Reverend James O. Davis, a retired Methodist minister, was born near Louden, Tennessee, May 14, 1874, and died of a heart attack August 3, 1967, at Lawman Home in White Rock, South Carolina, after spending more than ninety-two years in the vineyard of the Lord. "Well done, thou good and faithful servant. . . . Enter into the joy of thy Lord."

Brother Davis completed the public schools near his home, and graduated from Hiwasse College in Madisonville, Tennessee, and was licensed to preach in 1896 by the Holston Conference in east Tennessee. Later, he moved to Gainsville, Texas, where he met Miss Annie Lenora Rousseau, and they were married September 20, 1896.

The record shows that Brother Davis began his active ministry in the bounds of the West Oklahoma Conference, and served the following charges: LaKamp and Goodwell Station. He did full time evangelistic work for several years, and served as Registrar of the Panhandle Agriculture Institute, later called the Panhandle A.M. College at Goodwell, Oklahoma. In 1938, he was appointed to West Plains Circuit in Missouri, where he served six years in the bounds of the Saint Louis Conference. He came to the North Arkansas Conference in 1945 and served the following charges: Alix-Altus; Branch Circuit; Evening Shade; Gosnell, and Haynes-LaGrange.

Brother Davis was a licensed minister for more than sixty-eight years. He was forced to retire in 1952 because of blindness and served two years after this. Even though blind for seventeen years, he continued his search for knowledge, making full use of the library service for the blind.

Besides his widow of Route 2, Chapel Hill, North Carolina, Brother Davis is survived by two sons: Dr. H. M. Davis, with whom Mrs. Davis is living, and Ivan Davis. Albuquerque. New Mexico.

Funeral services were conducted by the Reverend J. Kenneth Webb, pastor and Superintendent of the Lawman Home, White Rock, North Carolina. His body was cremated.

February 8, 1899, she was married to the Reverend Carlos H. Bumpers, and to this union three children were born. They are: E. Clay Bumpers, Conference Lay Leader of the North Arkansas Conference, Wabash, Arkansas; Mrs. H. H. Boynton and William L. Bumpers, both of Pampa,

Sister Bumpers Gage gave more than thirty-two years of her life serving in the ministry with her husband. She and her husband retired from active ministry in 1941, and after retirement, they lived in Russellville, Fort Smith, Wabash, and Pampa, Texas.

The writer has known Sister Bumpers Gage for more than fifty years, and found her to be a good Christian woman. She was devoted to her family, friends and her church. The writer and his wife made her a visit three years

ago while she was living in Hereford, Texas, and her heart seemed to be running over with the love of God, and we felt that we were in the very presence of one of God's saints here on earth.

Funeral services were held February 20, 1968, in Carmichael-Whatley Colonial Chapel, the Reverend DeWitt Seago, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Pampa, Texas, officiating. She was buried beside her husband in the Fairview Cemetery, Pampa, Texas.

REVEREND JAMES MONROE HUGHEY 1869-1967

Reverend James Monroe Hughey was born April 20, 1869, near Russellville, Arkansas. His parents were John Hughey and Mary Ann (Bradley) Hughey. He died August 4, 1967, in the Cage Nursing Home at Memphis, Tennessee. Funeral services were held in the Gregg Funeral Home, Jonesboro, Arkansas, on August 6, 1967, by Dr. J. Ralph Clayton, pastor of First Methodist Church, Jonesboro, assisted by Reverend J. Albert Gatlin, pastor of Huntington Avenue Methodist Church, Jonesboro. Burial was in Oaklawn Cemetery, Jonesboro.

Brother Hughey received his A.B. degree from Hendrix College in 1895 and his M.A. degree from Vanderbilt University in 1898. He received a

D.D. degree from College of the Ozarks in 1915.

He was married to Miss Hattie May Stanley on August 25, 1897. They had three daughters, Dr. Ruth Hughey, Professor of English at Ohio State University; Mrs. Thomas M. Laney of Memphis, Tennessee, and Mrs. W. J. Britton of Wichita, Kansas; and a son, James Stanley Hughey, who died in childhood.

He is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. Nola Henry of Russellville and Mrs. Frances Wilson of Portland, Oregon. Other survivors include Dr. Thomas T. Laney, who followed his grandfather into the Methodist ministry and now holds the Methodist Chair at Vanderbilt Divinity School; a granddaughter, Mrs. Robert Moats of Overland Park, Kansas, and eight greatgrandchildren.

Brother Hughey was admitted On Trial into the former Arkansas Conference at its meeting at Morrilton in 1898. That year, he was appointed to teach in the Hendrix Academy near the present town of Gentry. In 1899, he was admitted into the Class of the Second Year and appointed to Hendrix Academy as Principal. When the Conference met at Harrison in 1900, he was admitted into Full Connection and was appointed to First Methodist Church, Fort Smith.

After being received into Full Connection, he held the following appointments: Fort Smith 1900-1903; Conway 1904; Presiding Elder Dardanelle District 1905; Morrilton 1906-1907; Presiding Elder, Fayetteville District 1908-1909; Presiding Elder, Fort Smith District 1910-1913; Central Church, Fort Smith, 1914-1915; Presiding Elder, Paragould District 1916-1919; First Church, Jonesboro, 1920-1923; Blytheville 1924; Presiding Elder, Conway District, 1925-1928; Marianna 1929-1932; Wynne 1933-1936; Earle 1937-1940.

He retired in 1941 when the Annual Conference met at Harrison, the same church where he had been admitted into Full Connection.

In addition to his pastoral appointments, Brother Hughey held a number of Conference positions, among them being Trustee of Hendrix College, 1902-1913; member of Conference Committee on Church Extension, 1902-1918; delegate to General Conference 1912; and Trustee of Henderson-Brown 1920-1925.

It was my privilege to have Brother Hughey as pastor for the four years that he served First Church, Jonesboro. In those years, the church was wrestling with the challenge of beginning construction on the present building. He gave it wise and strong leadership.

He was respected and loved as a kindly pastor, a dear friend, an excellent preacher and a superior administrator. But one does not need to eulogize him. His long, fruitful record attests eloquently to his love and dedication to his church and to our Lord.

REVEREND RICHARD ALEXANDER BEVIS 1886-1967

Reverend Richard Alexander Bevis, the son of John Owen and Margrette Taylor Bevis, was born August 13, 1886, at Waterloo (Lauderdale County), Alabama, and died at the Baptist Hospital, Memphis, Tennessee, September 25, 1967, after several weeks of illness.

In the fall of 1914, Brother Bevis was admitted On Trial into the North Arkansas Conference at Batesville. He was admitted into Full Connection and ordained Deacon in 1916, and was ordained Elder in 1918. In 1935, he retired after giving more than twenty-one years of active service to the Church he loved so much. After retirement, he did supply work for several years.

During his ministerial life, he served the following charges: Salado-Oil Trough; Floral Circuit; Bellefonte; Cato; Wyeville-Revels; Kanyon; Minture; Waldron Circuit; Branch; Hunter-Hickory Ridge; Jelks; Mc-Crory Circuit; and Hunter Circuit. It was said of him that he did more preaching in Woodruff County than any other minister in the history of the County.

He wrote a large number of poems, some entitled: "Dream Land," "The Mountain Maid," "The Way of Love," "I Did My Best," and others.

Brother Bevis was very orthodox in his Methodist Theology. He wrote many tracts and booklets, such as, "Infant Baptism," "Methodism of the Bible," "Relation of Infants to the Church," "The Possibility of Apostacy," "The Mode of Water Baptism," and others. He was indeed a Biblical Scholar.

Brother Bevis was married twice. His first marriage was to Miss Ethel Darrett, who died in the Methodist Hospital, August 3, 1958. His second marriage was to Mrs. Ladia Holland who died at her home in Patterson, Arkansas, June 14, 1966.

He was a member of the Masonic Lodge and a Royal Arch Mason for

fifty years. He was active in both lodges, and they gave him a life member-ship for which he was very grateful.

Survivors include two brothers: John E. E. Bevis, Shreveport, Louisi-

ana, and T. W. Bexis, Alexandria, Virginia.

The writer met Brother Bevis in 1914 and our friendship began to grow, with ties more binding as the years went by. We shared our experiences and held revivals together, all of which enriched our hearts and lives. He was a man after God's own heart. In his poem "I Did My Best," he expresses his humility and his great faith in the love of God. The last verse reads:

"When the saints of all the ages, Go marching home to rest, In a feeble, trembling voice I will plead my last request. 'Shall mercy be extended, Lord, For one that did his best?'"

Funeral services were held September 27, in the Thompson-Wilson Funeral Chapel in McCrory, with the Reverend Harold Wilson, H. Lynn Wade, and H. J. Couchman officiating. Burial was in the Woodman Cemetery, south of McCrory.

REVEREND JOSEPH HOWELL SMITH 1889-1967

The young couple taught school together briefly, served a short pastorate in Oklahoma at Adair, and returned to Arkansas to join the Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in 1900. Mrs. Martin's unfailing good humor, gallant spirit and friendly smile were expressions of a wonderful philosophy of life and a deep Christian faith tested and developed through ninety-five years of meeting, knowing and loving people and helping them to meet the vicissitudes of life with something

of her own courage and patience.

Four children were born of this union. He later married Mary Wynn Miller,

who survives him.

Brother Wade was admitted On Trial in the Arkansas Annual Conference in 1911, at which time he was ordained Deacon. He came into Full Connection in 1913, and was ordained Elder in 1915. Pastorates he served included: Gentry-Gravette, Bigelow, Clarksville, Fayetteville, Jonesboro, Blytheville, Batesville, Augusta, Charleston, Lavaca and Wilson, as well as serving as Presiding Elder of the Batesville District and Fort Smith District, and Superintendent of the Paragould District. He was a member of the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in 1922, 1926 and 1930.

Two unique ministries mark Brother Wades' traveling experience. While at Fayetteville, he was the first pastor to inaugurate the Wesley Foundation by that name in the Southern Methodist Church. A second abiding fruit of his ministry was the personal contact with men in his association in school, in state and in church. Dr. E. T. Wayland and Reverend R. H. "Bob" Cannon were fellow students at Hendrix College who felt his influence to become extraordinarily dedicated spiritual adventurers. The writer also was among the hundreds whose ministries were influence by Brother Wade. At Fayetteville at one time, he had a life service group of more than thirty volunteers.

One of the high points in his life and that of his family came on August 4, 1963, when he preached on the 60th Anniversary of his ministry in the Cedar Grove Church in Marion County, in the same church where both he and his father, Reverend George Henry Wade, preached their first sermons, and which was organized by his grandfather, Reverend J. H. Wade.

Another highlight in his later years was the celebration of his fifthieth

Preceded by her husband in death in June, 1965, Mrs. Cravens continued to live in the home in Paris until just prior to her death on January 11, 1968, at Fayetteville, Arkansas. Funeral services were conducted in the Paris Church by Dr. Joel Cooper, Pastor of Central Methodist Church in Fayetteville. Her remains laid to rest beside her husband in the Prairie View Cemetery, less than one mile from where both were born. She is survived by one son, Byron Cravens of Fort Smith, one daughter,

IX. HISTORICAL

SESSIONS OF THE CONFERENCE

The "Arkansas Conference" and the "White River Conference" were united in 1914 to form the present "North Arkansas Conference."

The Conference determined that its annual notation should date from the time of the organization of the Arkansas Conference in 1836, instead of following the date fixed by the consolidation of the Arkansas and White River Conferences, when the name was changed to North Arkansas Conference in 1914.

The Conference session of 1939 voted to maintain the numerical notation of the Conference in The Methodist Church.

X. MISCELLANEOUS

STANDING RULES OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

- (1) That each undergraduate, each approved supply pastor, and each candidate for conference membership be required to meet with the Board of Ministerial Training before or during the session of the annual conference unless hindered by circumstances beyond his control.
- (2) That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one member from each church in each Pastoral Charge; provided further, that each station charge shall have three elected members.
- (3) That the figures answering the question the pastor's report to Annual Conference: "Members reported last year" shall in every case be the number of members printed in the statistical tables of the Journal of the last Annual Conference.
- (4) That the District Superintendent's figures of all apportionments be accepted as the official figures.
- (5) That the apportionment for Conference and General Work be combined in the statistical report; and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.
- (6) All statistical reports shall be delivered by the District Superintendents to the conference statistician seven days before the opening session of the Annual Conference, except that the financial reports shall be in the hands of the conference statistician within 45 days after the end of the conference fiscal year.
- (7) Subject to the provisions of The Discipline, a District Superintendent shall be eligible for membership on not more than one major Annual Conference Board or Commission, and not more than one additional Commission or Committee, but not to hold office therein. District Superintendents shall be eligible for Annual Conference nomination to Jurisdictional Boards and Commissions, provided that they may not compose more than half of the ministerial nominees.
- (8) That the Secretary of the Bishop's cabinet be instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or District Superintendent's District for insertion in the Conference Journal.
- (9) The Annual Conference shall elect upon nomination by the Bishop a Conference Entertainment Committee to serve during the quadrennium. This Committee shall make arrangements for the facilities needed for the session of the Annual Conference and administer the funds for its entertainment, including the honorarium for the conference preacher.
- (10) All members attending the Annual Conference session shall pay two dollars registration; except 1) those from minimum salary chargees, who shall pay one dollar; 2) retired
 ministers not serving charges and supernumeraries, who shall pay no registration. The
 offerings in the public worship service shall be used for conference entertainment expense.
 The Conference Entertainment Committee shall provide during the session of the Annual
 Conference full entertainment for retired ministers not serving a charge, and room for all
 pastors of charges whose pastoral support from all sources is \$3,600.00 or less.
- (11) Every board, commission, and committee receiving any money from conference funds shall present to the Commission on World Service and Finance annually by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference a detailed financial report including all receipts and expenditures.
- (12) A list of lay members elected to Annual Conference shall be compiled by the district superintendents and sent to the conference secretary prior to the opening of the session.
- (13) The district stewards shall apportion all annual conference askings to the several charges in each district on an equitable basis.
- (14) The Conference Treasurer shall close his books at the end of the calendar year, and shall allocate to the several boards and commissions the monies to which they are entitled, and the boards and agencies receiving monies from conference fund shall close their books at the end of the calendar year.
- (15) No one shall be nominated for re-election to a board or commission on which he has served more than a quadrennium immediately preceding his election.
- (16) The Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Pensions shall be members of the secretarial staff of the Conference, and these persons shall be charged with the responsibility of seeing that all records pertaining to service years be made identical.
- (17) Any proposal to change the Standing Rules shall lie on the table overnight, and then its passage shall require a % vote of those present and voting.
- (18) That part of the report of all boards, commissions, committees and other agencies of the conference which provides for changes in policy or makes recommendations shall be mimeographed, printed, or otherwise duplicated and distributed to the membership of the conference prior to the time scheduled for action on said report.
- (19) All churches employing more than one member of an annual conference shall pay all percentages based on pastor's salary on the salaries of all ministers so employed.
- (20) Each Annual Conference session shall designate a moving date. Any exceptions to the designated date shall be agreed upon by the pastors involved.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS Adopted May 30, 1968

Whereas the appearance of Bishop Moore as our Conference Preacher was not a coincidence, but a timely and studied selection on the part of our presiding Bishop Paul V. Calloway who continually leads us with his knowledge, patience and dedication and who, in turn, enjoys the companionship of a wife who is mutually concerned;

Whereas the composite report of the Cabinet read by Dr. Marshall H. Bridwell, depicted definite progress in the several fields of endeavor embodied in our church program and the commendable functioning of the member churches;

Whereas all reports dealing with activities, findings, and proposals showed devoted study, forethought and reasoning by committees, commissions and agencies;

Whereas our meeting place, the Western Methodist Assembly and its most capable superintendent, the Reverend E. G. Kaetzell, have truly reflected the Jurisdictional scope of Methodism;

Whereas the host District Superintendent, Dr. Myers B. Curtis, has shown specific concern for our coming;

Whereas Dr. Joel Cooper, pastor, Mr. George Frey, Director of Music and other members of the staff and congregation of Central Methodist Church have made available their church building and themselves for the general welfare of the conference;

Whereas the Reverend Aaron F. Barling, pastor and the members of Wiggins Memorial Church have substantially aided in the handling of extracurricular functions such as luncheons and dinners; and

Whereas we have been saddened by the deaths of our fellow workers, touched by the departure of others from active ranks and inspired and heartened by those coming into the service of the church;

Therefore, be it resolved that we give thanks to all who have contributed in any way or manner to the success of this conference.

Further, that we return to our homes determined to remind ourselves and all others, wherein it is possible, that Christ is not only passing by but is constantly with us to lift us out of a defensive attitude into positive witnessing.

A RESOLUTION

Adopted May 28, 1968

WHEREAS, the Southwest Annual Conference overlaps the Oklahoma, the North Arkansas and the Little Rock Conferences, and

Whereas the General Conference has ordered the Annual Conferences to eliminate these overlapping situations as rapidly as possible,

Therefore be it resolved that we ask Bishop Galloway and The Cabinet to appoint a Committee to work with like committees from other Annual Conferences involved to:

- 1) assemble full information about finances and other aspects of the merger of the North Arkansas Conference with that portion of the Southwest Conference which lies within our boundaries,
- 2) report such findings to the Conference not later than our regular meeting in 1969, and
- 3) suggest plans and procedures that would lead to the merger not later than our regular session in 1970.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CHARTER OF HENDRIX COLLEGE Approved May 28, 1968

Article II, as amended on September 10, 1956, of the Amended Charter of Hendrix College is hereby amended to read as follows:

ARTICLE II

Trustees

SECTION 1. The Board of Trustees of Hendrix College shall be composed of the following members:

(a) The President of Hendrix College.(b) The presiding Bishop or the presiding Bishops of the North Arkansas Conference and the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church.

(c) Five ministers elected by the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church.

(d) Five ministers elected by the North Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Church.

(e) Twenty-four persons as Trustees-at-large to be elected by the Board of Trustees of Hendrix College.

(f) The secretaries of the Inter-Board Council of the North Arkansas Conference and of the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church or such other person or persons holding sub-

stantially similar offices as may be designated by said Conferences.

(g) The persons designated "Life Trustees," who have been elected as Life Trustees by the Board of Trustees and who as of the 1968 Annual Conference of the North Arkansas Conference and the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church shall have served for not less than eighteen (18) years as Trustees of Hendrix College. No person shall be elected a Life Trustee until the expiration of his current term of office as a Trustee. No person shall be elected a Life Trustee who does not meet the requirements of eighteen (18) years previous service as a Trustee as set out herein.

SECTION 2. The Board of Trustees of Hendrix College shall at all times be composed of the following members:

(a) Not less than sixty percent of the members of the Board of Trustees shall be alumni or alumnae of Hendrix College as defined by Article II, Section 1 of the Amended Charter of the College.

(b) Not less than six members shall, at the time of their election, be ministers in full connection with the North Arkansas Con-

ference of the Methodist Church.

(c) Not less than six members shall be, at the time of their election, ministers in full connection with the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church.

SECTION 3. The term of each member of the Board of Trustees shall be six years, or until his successor is duly elected.

SECTION 4. Each person who as of the date of the adoption of this Amendment to Article II has been duly elected and qualified as a Trustee shall serve as a Trustee for the term for which he has been elected. Following the term for which he has been elected and is now serving no minister (other than a minister serving by virtue of his office of Bishop or Secretary to the Inter-Board Council or President of the College) shall serve as Trustee for longer than one term of six years and no laymen shall serve for longer than two terms of six years each; provided, after an absence of not less than three successive years from membership on the Board of Trustees a person shall be eligible to serve as a Trustee for an additional term or terms subject to the limitations set out in this Section. The provisions for this Section shall not apply to Life Trustees designated pursuant to Article II, Section (g).

SECTION 5. Nominations for the office of Trustee shall be made by the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees. In the event the electing body shall fail to elect a trustee from the names submitted by the nominating committee additional nominations shall be submitted. Nominations made by the Executive Committee shall conform to the requirements of membership on the Board of Trustees set out in Article II, Section 2, and due consideration shall be given by the Executive Committee to the geographical distribution of the Trustees-at-Large.

SECTION 6. Vacancies in the Board of Trustees occasioned by death, disability or resignation shall be filled by election by the Board of Trustees to be held at the next meeting of the Board.

SECTION 7. The Board of Trustees shall have the powers, duties and responsibilities traditionally vested in Boards of Trustees of institutions of higher education, said powers, duties and responsibilities to include but not be limited to the following:

(a) To hold, manage, invest and reinvest all of the property, endowments and assets of Hendrix College.

(b) To elect a President and such other officers of the College as the Board shall deem necessary or appropriate;

(c) To contract and to be contracted with; to sue and to be sued; to borrow money and to give security therefor; to make and use a common seal and to alter the same; to buy, sell, mortgage and otherwise deal in property, real, personal and mixed, and to take and hold property by gift, conveyance, demise or bequest; to enter into cooperative relations with other educational institutions; to lend its funds, to buy and sell stocks, bonds, debentures and other securities; to erect buildings and equip same; to receive money subject to annuity; to operate and maintain said institution or institutions of learning and to do all things necessary for efficient management;

(d) to confer customary degrees and honorary degrees;

(e) To establish, acquire and manage other schools, departments or colleges subject to the approval of the North Arkansas Conference and the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church;

(f) To exercise in a fiduciary capacity any powers now or hereafter

granted to Boards of Directors of a business corporation by the Statutes of Arkansas;

(g) To exercise in a fiduciary capacity all powers now or hereafter granted a business corporation or a nonprofit corporation by the Štatutes of Arkansas.

SECTION 8. The Board of Trustees shall be charged with the government of Hendrix College and with the appointment of its officers and instructors and with fixing their compensation, but the Board may delegate such powers as it sees fit to the President or to the faculty.

SECTION 9: The Board of Trustees shall designate an Executive Committee and such other committees as may be necessary or appropriate. When the Board of Trustees is not in session the Executive Committee shall exercise the powers granted to the Board of Trustees, subject to any specific limitations imposed by the Charter or By-Laws or by action of the full Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees shall have the power to delegate the powers, duties and responsibilities which it exercises to the President of the College or to a committee of the Board of Trustees other than the Executive Committee.

SECTION 10. The Board of Trustees shall adopt by-laws to govern the business and affairs of Hendrix College,

Article V of the Amended Charter of Hendrix College is hereby amended to read as follows:

ARTICLE V

Officers

SECTION 1. The officers of the Board of Trustees shall be a Chairman and Vice Chairman who shall be members of the Board and a Secretary-Treasurer who shall not be required to be a member of the Board and such other officers and committee chairmen as the Board may from time to time designate.

SECTION 2. The term of office for each officer of the Board shall be three years, provided, an officer shall serve until his successor is duly elected and qualified.

SECTION 3. The officers of the Board shall perform the customary duties

of such offices and such other duties as the Board may designate.

Section 3, Article VI of the Amended Charter of Hendrix College is hereby amended to read as follows:

ARTICLE VI

SECTION 3. Any change or amendment to the Charter of Hendrix College shall conform to the laws of the State of Arkansas.

FISCAL YEAR STUDY

The North Arkansas Conference Journal, 1966, has this suggestion on page 71: "We recommend the appointment of a Conference Committee to study the possibility of changing the Fiscal Year." This is recommendation No. 21 from the report of the Board of Pensions. In the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance (page 92, recommendation No. 23 of the 1966 Journal) there is this suggestion: "We join with the Board of Pensions in recommending that a committee be appointed to make a study

of changing the Fiscal Year."

We were appointed by the Bishop to make this study. It was the opinion of the committee that the 1967 session of the Annual Conference was not the appropriate time to make recommendations, but we asked the Conference to continue this committee with the understanding that the committee would make a report of its findings, and also its recommendations, to the 1968 session of the Annual Conference. Permission was granted by the Annual Conference.

We, your committee, recommend that the Fiscal Year of the North Arkansas Annual Conference be changed from June 1-May 31 to a calendar year, January 1-December 31. It should be understood that we, as your committee, are concerned only with the Fiscal Year, and not with the

Annual Conference Year.

While the actions taken by our North Arkansas Annual Conference need not be determined by what other conferences are doing, we have learned from our study that some annual conferences have already adopted the Calendar Year as their Fiscal Year, and that several others within our Jurisdiction have this in their plans for the 1969 Calendar Year. Furthermore, it is the understanding of this committee that the "United Methodist Church" will use the calendar year as its Fiscal Year.

The following are the advantages that we see in adopting the Calendar

Year (January 1-December 31) as our Fiscal Year:

It would help the Conference Board of Pensions in their relation to the General Board of Pensions' Fiscal Year, which is May 1-April 30.
 It would allow the local churches a full year (52 weeks) to meet

their financial budgets.

3. It would afford the Area Treasurer's office ample time to compile a complete financial report to the Annual Conference.

4. It would allow local churches sufficient time to incorporate, into their annual budgets, the recommendations of the Annual Conference and the decisions of the District Stewards. (This is predicated on our thinking that the financial decisions of an Annual Conference would take effect on January 1 of the following calendar year.)

5. Finances of the Annual Conference would be more stable because we would be paying into the various agencies for five months prior to the Annual Conference session. We believe that this would elimi-

nate the "lean summer months" within the total program.

6. This would help our people to have the record of their financial giving to the church to correspond with the Federal and State Tax years. We believe that it would increase giving from businesses and individuals, who are on the Calendar Year, as they would increase giving at the end of the year which would be deductible gifts.

We see no serious objections to changing the Fiscal Year and we see no great difficulty in implementing the changes should the Annual Conference

adopt this recommendation.

We recommend that the Annual Conference request the Bishop to appoint a committee to effect this change by January 1, 1969. We further recommend that these persons be included on this committee: the Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance, the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions, the Cabinet representative to the Commission on World Service and Finance, the Conference Treasurer, the Chairman of the Fiscal Year Study Committee and such other Clerical and Lay members of the Annual Conference as the Bishop may deem necessary.

THE METHODIST FOUNDATION OF ARKANSAS

Report of The Executive Director Adopted May 28, 1968

The most challenging, thrilling and satisfying years of my ministry have been the past three, in which I have had the privilege to be Executive Director of The Methodist Foundation of Arkansas. More and more people are catching the vision and responding to the challenge of this area of Stewardship. This year I have had the joy of helping people plan their estates in greater number than in the two previous years. All have included the church as beneficiary of at least part of their estates.

We suggest that each minister and layman make a study of the Stew-

ardship of Accumulated Possessions. Every sermon on stewardship must be built upon the fundamental truth that everything belongs to God, even the possessions God allows man to accumulate in a lifetime. Stewardship is more than pledging, systematic giving, tithing or proportionate giving; it is the rightful use of all a man has, even the accumulations of a lifetime. No one can make a just and Christian distribution of his accumulated possessions unless careful and wise plans are made while he is alive. This requires estate planning, then the services of a competent attorney, enabling one to clearly express that plan in a legally-drawn will. Let's make the people called Methodist aware of a basic, Christian truth: Good Christian Stewardship means the rightful use of everything, be it the goose quill and vial of ink made available to Paul, a little boy's lunch of loaves and fishes, an alabaster box of previous ointment, the purple dye works operated by Lydia, Peter's fishing boat, or the proceeds from sale of Barnabas' large farm. God has perpetuated these gifts because they were rightfully used, they were used for the Kingdom.

The Foundation does not exist to raise funds for itself. Its purposes are fourfold: First, we try to help people to a better understanding of the Stewardship of Accumulated Possessions. Second, we offer members and friends of Methodism a perpetual legal agency to serve in their behalf, carrying out their expressed desires, helping make it possible to perpetuate their stewardship. Third, we offer counsel in estate planning to those making the church a beneficiary of any or all of their estate, and fourth, we seek to provide every local church, institution, board, agency and cause of Methodism with a fund-raising agency by being sufficiently informed to work with donors choosing to give in special ways above and beyond the routine

giving of the past.

We now have two Deferred Gifts which we hold in trust, and which are invested, the donors receiving incomes from these investments during their lifetimes. The total in our Gift Fund at present is \$36,234.13. In the past twelve months we have paid one donor \$1,381.60. The other, a recent annuitant, is to receive her payments quarterly, rather than monthly, and

has received to date one payment of \$80.65.

A Memorials Altar is being set up in the Headquarters Building, the altar itself given by Mr. Bob Rosamond, President of the R&W Construction Company of North Little Rock, and having a fair market value of at least \$400.00. Mr. Carl E. Hall, owner of Standard Furniture Company in Little Rock, has given the Foundation the beautiful hand-tooled leather Book of Remembrance to be placed on the Altar, costing \$154.00. Mr. Richard C. Butler, President of The Commercial National Bank, Little Rock, has given for the altar two satin-finish brass vases, at a cost of \$110.00. James Brothers Office Supply, North Little Rock, has given the beautiful wooden cross for the background of the altar. Memorial gifts of \$5.00 will go into a permanent investment fund, the annual income of which is to be given to a worthy cause of the church. At present we are seeking the cause to feature as the specific beneficiary of this Memorial Fund.

The Federal Government encourages giving to causes such as ours by offering tax savings for such donors. Proper understanding of these incentives removes our program of the taint of tax-dodging schemes, placing such gifts in the realm of the sacred and the patriotic.

I covet from every preacher an invitation to present the Foundation program in his local church. Your people are looking for something like we offer, and only need the information, the challenge, and the opportunity. Once these are presented, after a little time and some thought and prayer, they will respond.

At this time we are setting up our state-wide organization, and will present our recommendations to the Board of Directors for your approval.
