



DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Received May 25, 1970

To Bishop Paul V. Galloway and the Members and Friends of the 135th session of the North Arkansas Annual Conference:

Dear Brethren:

Traditionally, this has been called "The District Superintendent's Report" and, while this is still true in some measure, it is not a full report of all the work of the churches during the year. We are accustomed to regular, comprehensive reports from the various Boards and Agencies of the Conference, and we have the statistical summary which appears in the Pre-Conference Brochure, all of which reflect facts and figures in the broad scope of our conference life and activity. However, this statement does provide the seven District Superintendents an opportunity to express appreciation to the ministers and members of this conference for their commitment, their cooperation, and their deep sense of spiritual integrity, which have made possible not only the continued promotion of the regular and stated Program of the Church, but which have also made possible certain significant achievements.

The vitality of the witness and the work of our congregations has been reflected in the vigorous promotion of all the areas of responsibility in our church life. Under the leadership of our Board of Evangelism we had a special emphasis on outreach and enrichment. This endeavor and the regular ministry of the churches brought in 1920 new members, 1366 on profession of faith, and 554 from other denominations. There were 2,180 received from other United Methodist Churches. The total membership at the end of 1969 was 98,917. Attendance at the principal service of worship was 32,879, which represents a slight increase over the preceding year. Church School membership was at the level of 52,194 with an average attendance of 27,775. A practical indication of the sense of stewardship of our people is in the fact that the total giving for all purposes in Calendar Year 1969

was \$5,939,794.00.

We are becoming adjusted to the new structure of the local church and the possibilities of more effective planning and promotion which the structure affords. Numerous workshops, seminars, institutes, etc. have been held, with our Program Council giving us direction and leadership at this point, and we know that this will be a continuing process to acquaint our church leaders with responsibilities and opportunities for involvement in the church program. We have seen during this year a development in the organization and strategy of the Program Council in our Conference, and we are coming to a sense of greater appreciation for the potential which is here in giving direction to our whole purpose and program. We want to commend the Program Director and the Associate Director for the fine way they have related to the boards and agencies of the conference and for the leadership they have given in these vital areas.

There are many evidences of material progress and achievement and, believing that such congregations are worthy of recognition, we want to mention them briefly. New buildings that have been completed this year include the lovely and very adequate Fellowship Center here at First Church, Conway, which you have seen; significant additions to First Church, Blytheville in a \$400,000 program; a Fellowship Hall at Wiseman, a new educational building at Yellville at a cost of 25,000, a new sanctuary at Springfield; and a complete new plant under construction at Cherokee Village and a new educational building and other improvements at Griffith

Memorial.

New buildings which are planned and will get under construction right away are: sanctuary and educational facilities at Mountain View, educational buildings at Cabot and Gardner Memorial, a new sanctuary at Sylvan Hills and at Keiser, and a complete new plant at a new location at First Church, Harrison. Churches where there has been extensive remodeling

and the addition of new furniture and equipment include: Havana, Oppelo, Lanty, Rhea, Cincinnati, Lincoln, Gravette, Cherry Valley, West Helena, Holly Grove, Augusta, Marvell, New Hope, Cole Hill, Hays Chapel, Booneville, Leachville, and complete remodeling and redecoration of the sanctuary at First Church, Newport. Fires have been especially disastrous for us this year with major damage at Central Church, Fayetteville, and also at Valley View and Highfill. In addition, the parsonage at First Church, Morrilton, was destroyed by fire this year. We thank God there was no loss of life and the properties are being restored or rebuilt.

Some congregations have either built or bought new parsonages this year and these include: Newark, Cabot, Mountain Home, Dover, First Church, Jacksonville, Marvell, Hughes, St. Paul in Ft. Smith, and also, Hendricks Hills in the same city. New parsonages are planned or are under construction at Quitman, First Church, Morrilton, and at Lakewood in

North Little Rock.

Churches and parsonages which have been cleared of debt this year and some of which have been dedicated include: St. James in the Batesville District, Gardner Memorial and Salem, First Church, Helena, Colt, the District

Parsonage in Fort Smith, and Midland Heights and Cole Chapel.

We note with great encouragement that there have been two new churches organized this year—Fairfield Bay in the Batesville District and McArthur Drive, Jacksonville, in the Conway District. It is also a source of much encouragement to note that 18 persons were recommended for License

to Preach at their Charge Conferences.

There are two items which represent special achievement, we believe. One of these has been the project under the direction of the Board of Education and the Conference Camp Committee, to purchase the Myers Ranch as a Conference Camp Site. This purchase has been consummated in recent weeks with approximately one-half the money raised on a goal of \$65,000. Our people have responded to this special appeal and this seems to be an adequate provision for the camping needs of the conference for the fore-

seeable future.

The other special achievement has been in the successful conclusion of the Pension Endowment Campaign. Under the direction of the Board of Pensions of our Conference and with professional assistance provided by the General Board of Missions, the program was launched at the beginning of this year to raise \$1,200,000 for the Pension Endowment Fund. Pastors and Laymen accepted this challenge with a high sense of commitment. Our people responded with generous support with the result that the goal has been exceeded with a total of \$1,234,714 pledged. There are 48 churches which have over-subscribed their Fair Share Goals and at least five churches have paid the full amount for the three years. These are: Birdsview in the Fort Smith District, Pleasant Grove and St. Mark in the Paragould District, and Salem and Perryville in the Conway District. A total of \$113,491 in cash has been received for this Fund. We are grateful for this generous response and support, but more than that, we are grateful for the spirit of our people which makes this kind of an achievement possible.

We close this statement not only with a deep sense of appreciation for

We close this statement not only with a deep sense of appreciation for the parsonage families and the lay families across this conference, but also with a deep sense of appreciation for our episcopal family, to Bishop and Mrs. Galloway. This is not only their Episcopal Area; this is their native state with family ties that go back across the years. No leaders relate themselves more closely to the people they serve than do they, and no leaders are held in higher esteem and affection than are they by the people called

Methodists in this state.

REPORT OF THE PROGRAM COUNCIL Adopted May 28, 1970

I. Purpose and Work

The Program Council of the North Arkansas Conference has sought throughout this church year to assist the various Conference

Boards, Commissions, and Committees. The Program Council Staff has tried to serve effectively as connecting link between the Conference Agencies and the Pastors and Laymen throughout the upper half of the State. During the year, the Staff has had the wise counsel of Bishop Paul V. Galloway, the sincere encouragement of the District Superintendents, and the helpful cooperation of Pastors and Laymen. Staff assistance has been offered to the leaders of all Agencies, and much work has been done in planning and promoting meetings sponsored by the various Groups of the Conference.

Early in the church year the Program Council Staff aided the Board of Pensions in setting up its campaign office and in preparing the various pieces of literature to be used in the campaign. Since that time the facilities and equipment have been open to, and used rather extensively by, the Pension Endowment Campaign Committee.

In October, two workshops were held, one in the East and one in the West, for the training of District Staff personnel. These workshops had as their purpose the aiding of leaders of the District Staffs to comprehend more fully their opportunities for leadership and to equip

them for greater service in the name of Christ.

Through "The Hot Line" attention has been called to plans and programs of the various Agencies of the Conference. Pertinent information concerning new concepts and resources has been shared. "The Hot Line" continues to go to each Pastor and Church Lay Leader. The latter is asked to share information with other leaders in the local church.

II. Committees

The Program Council has three mandatory committees: (1) Interpretation, (2) Television, Radio and Film Communication, and (3) Publishing Interests.

1. The Committee on Interpretation

The Executive Committee of the Program Council serves in this capacity and also as a coordinating committee. This past year the Executive Committee has met on an average of every other month and has given good oversight to every phase of the total ministry of our church.

This Committee planned and coordinated the mid-year meetings. For the first time, in keeping with the new policy as set forth in the 1968 Discipline, Page 219—I, the Executive Committee helped study and coordinate budget askings for the Conference Agencies and recommended these to the Commissions on World Service and Finance.

All the Agencies were urged to submit to the Program Council and the World Service and Finance Commission a budget and a summary of the planned program for the ensuing year. Because of the splendid cooperation received, the Program Council was able to present the budget of each Agency to the World Service and Finance Commission, along with a coordinated and composite budget regarding Conference Benevolences.

The authority for receiving, reviewing, altering, or granting each request rests with the World Service and Finance Commission. This Commission in turn makes its recommendations to the Annual Conference. In turn the Annual Conference, with or without revisions, gives approval to the program budgets submitted by the World Service and Finance Commission. Each Agency had an opportunity to appear before the Program Council Executive Committee, and also before the World Service and Finance Commission concerning budget requests.

This year a special effort was made to ascertain the needs of the Local Churches, the Districts, and the Conference. These were carefully studied and passed on to the Chairmen of the various Conference Agencies with the request that the Agencies, in planning for 1971, do

so in light of these needs.

Efforts are being made to enable the Program Council members to function even more as a Conference Team in planning the future program thrusts. To this end, a Program Council Retreat has been planned for October 13-14-15, 1970. Long before this is held, committees will be securing input in terms of past records, present needs, and future trends. These will be shared in the retreat, and it is hoped that out of this experience will come suggested *goals* for the Conference, guidelines for the Agencies, and vision for all to see the need

for a greater outreach in the Spirit of Christ.

The Chairmen of the various Agencies, along with the members, will then plan carefully as to how their Agency can use its resources in "zeroing" in on program thrusts for 1972, needful and relevant to Local Churches, Districts and the Conferences. Out of such prayerful and disciplined planning shall come that which will meet many of the basic needs of our people. Through this method, every Agency will have a glorious opportunity to become a more effective member of the North Arkansas Conference Team of The United Methodist Church.

The Committee on Interpretation plans throughout the coming year to give greater assistance in promoting the program of World Service and Conference Benevolences. It shall work to become a more effective channel of communication between the Annual Conference Agencies and Local Churches. The materials produced, the various media used, and the meetings held, will be designed to assist the local church to organize and to coordinate its resources for a greater ministry.

2. The Committee on Television, Radio and Film Communication

The following persons are members of this Committee: Chairman, the Reverend Larry Powell; Vice-chairman, Mr. James Gibson; Secretary, the Reverend Joe F. Wilkerson; Representative to the Program Council, the Reverend Arvill C. Brannon; the Reverend Archie N. Boyd; the Reverend Bob Edwards; and Mr. Kaneaster Hodges. Ex-Officio members are Dr. Harold Eggensperger and the Reverend Earl B.

Carter.

In cooperation with the program Boards and other Agencies in the Conference, this Committee shall serve the Conference in the field of Communication. This past year the Committee purchased a new Super 8 Projector along with ten new cartridge-type films. This projector and one film is made available for \$4.00 and return postage per showing to any Church or District of the Conference. A new audiovisual catalogue is being planned. One-third of this Committee's budget has been designated for new films to aid workers in the Local Churches.

One of the responsibilities of this Committee is to help with the studying and the analyzing of the communications problems, needs, and opportunities of the Annual Conference, its Agencies, and its Local Churches. To this end a survey questionnaire is to be worked out and

used within the Conference.

Workshops for training District and Local Church leaders in reference to audio-visual equipment and resources are to be established. About one-fourth of the Committee's budget has been set aside for these training enterprises in which General TRAFCO Personnel will be assisting.

3. The Committee on Publishing Interests

This committee has the following members: Chairman: the Reverend Rufus Sorrells; Vice-chairman, the Reverend J. D. Lawrence; Secretary, the Reverend John S. Workman; Representative to the Program Council, the Reverend James T. Randle; the Reverend Fern Cook; the Reverend Von Dell Mooney; Dr. Ethan Dodgen; Dr. Alfred Know; Mr. Charles R. Teeter; and the Reverend Ben F. Jordan.

One of the major responsibilities of your Committee on Publishing Interests is to interpret the work of the three Divisions of The Methodist Publishing House. These three Divisions (Manufacturing, Publishing, Distributing) employing over 2,700 persons and are at work around the clock to provide the local church with the published and manufactured materials necessary to fulfilling our mission.

We want to share with you, in this report, some of the highlights

of the Publishing House's work in the past year and then to make some recommendations to you.

Some highlights of the year 1970 have been:

-For the second consecutive year, the General Board of Publication authorized an appropriation of one million dollars from Publishing House proceeds for distribution to Annual Conference retired ministers and their dependents.

-During the year Abingdon Press produced 393 new items; these included 106 new book titles and 39 church music publications. An average of 1,779,637 church bulletins were distributed each Sunday. Abingdon published its first novel in many years, "Hushed Were the Hills," which sold over 18,000 copies in just over three months.

Circulation of church school curriculum audio-visuals—filmstrips,

filmslips and records—increased 11 percent during the year.

Abingdon Press received new recognition during the year. The John Barnes "Publisher of the Year" Award was presented to them by the American Booksellers' Association in recognition of efficient service to the bookseller. This was a first for a denominational publisher to the deliberation of the service to the bookseller. This was a first for a denominational publisher. lisher. In addition, nine Abingdon books were selected by Book Clubs for distribution to their members during the year.

In regard to reminders and recommendations we submit the following: TOGETHER magazine continues to need our increased support. Circulation in February, 1969, was 646,000, a peak high since merger with the former EUB publication, CHURCH AND HOME. There is a great need within our Conference to promote the use of this excellent family magazine. We call upon each local church to do its

very best in this matter.

We strongly urge the use of United Methodist literature throughout our Church Schools, and that both teacher and pupil be supplied with sufficient literature to permit the class to have its maximum efficiency. If there be any problem concerning the proper selection and use of the Church School literature, we recommend that the questions be referred to the Conference Program Council for their assistance.

We would remind our people that our Cokesbury Stores supply so much more than just books. We would recommend that they be given an opportunity to supply our needs of equipment, teaching aids, furniture, audio-visual equipment, etc. There is very little that these Cokesbury Stores cannot supply, and the profit returns back to our

church.

We recommend that wherever practical each of our churches establish and maintain a Church Library. The Methodist Publishing House has a plan that will assist you in providing books at an attractive

We recommend that groups within the local church, such as Church School classes, Circles, United Methodist Men's groups, study groups, and that groups of ministers in neighboring areas examine the possibilities of establishing "Reading Fellowships." Our Committee is preparing to assist such groups and will be providing you, through the Program Council office, with suggestions and ideas that will be helpful in establishing such Fellowships.

We are working toward innovations in the Cokesbury Store and Material Display at the coming Annual Conference, and invite your

visits to this Display.

We have had a most helpful visit with the Publishing House Representative to our Jurisdiction, Dr. W. T. Handy, Jr., and convey to you his desire to be of assistance in helping with any matters relating

to the Publishing Interests of The United Methodist Church.

With the many difficulties involved in recent mergers and reorganization, our Publishing House has continued to do its very best to supply worthwhile materials for every church and United Methodist home. We ask for your prayers and your support. Wherever possible, we would appreciate a good word being spoken in our behalf; and if

there be a constructive criticism that you have to offer that would enable us to serve you more effectively, we would welcome it.

REPORT OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS BOARD OF TRUSTEES, INCORPORATED

Adopted May 27, 1970

I. Articles of Incorporation:

1. The Board of Trustees of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church is organized and incorporated according to the provisions of Section V—Paragraph 1519 of The Discipline of The United

Methodist Church for 1969.

2. The Articles of Incorporation were issued on July 25, 1959 and the Charter of Incorporation is recorded in the office of the Circuit Clerk of Sebastian County in Fort Smith, Arkansas, in Book E, Page 69.

II. Execution of Legal Documents:

1. The Chairman and Secretary of the Board of Trustees are authorized to sign legal documents for the Board where there has been "A Directive Action" of the Annual Conference or The Board of Trustees.

III. Abandoned and/or Discontinued Church Property:

1. The Board of Trustees respectfully request that the District Superintendents, Pastors, and District Boards of Mission be informed as to the various provisions of Section V—Paragraph 1519 as to Annual Conference Property and join with the Conference Board of Trustees in their effort to have a record of all properties, within the bounds of the Conference, in which the United Methodist Church has an interest.

2. That each District Superintendent provide the Secretary of the Board of Trustees with a description of all property within his district that is not being used by the United Methodist Church; and as to whether or not Annual Conference action has been taken to (1) discontinue use of,

(2) abandoned.

3. On April 15, 1970 a letter was mailed by the Chairman requesting a list of abandoned or discontinued property for 1969-70. We submit the following Resolutions to be adopted specifically in the general adoption of this report:

RESOLUTION

Be it Resolved that the North Arkansas Conference declare abandoned the Rondo United Methodist Church in Lee County, Forrest City District, and that the Trustees of the North Arkansas Conference be authorized and empowered to dispose of said property. Be it further resolved that proceeds from sale of said abandoned church property be placed in the hands of the Forrest City District Board of Church Location and Building for disposition.

RESOLUTION

Be it Resolved that the North Arkansas Conference declare abandoned the Oark United Methodist Church in Johnson County, Fort Smith District, and that the Trustees of the North Arkansas Conference be authorized and empowered to dispose of said property. Be it further resolved that proceeds from sale of said abandoned church property be placed in the hands of the Fort Smith District Board of Missions.

RESOLUTION

Be it Resolved that the North Arkansas Conference declare abandoned the Steep Hill United Methodist Church in Sebastian County, Fort Smith District, and that the Trustees of the North Arkansas Conference be authorized and empowered to dispose of said property. Be it further resolved that proceeds from sale of said abandoned church property be placed in the hands of the Fort Smith District Board of Missions.

IV. Properties Acquired or Sold:

1. Haynes Methodist Church, Forrest City District was sold for \$5,000.00. The proceeds go to the Forrest City District Church Location and

Building for distribution as directed by the Annual Conference.

2. Lafe Methodist Church, Paragould District, was sold for \$500.00.

Proceeds go to the Paragould District Board of Church Location and Build-

ing for distribution as directed by the Annual Conference.

3. Purchased the Myers Ranch property (approximately 1,000 acres); a total price of \$65,000.00; \$21,000.00 was paid down, \$6,000.00 was paid in advance on the June 1, 1971 payment, \$6,000.00 was paid in advance on the June 1, 1972 payment and \$2,000.00 was made as a partial payment on the June 1, 1973 payment. A note was executed in the amount of \$44,000.00, dated April 27, 1970, being payable as follows:

Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) on June 1, 1971; Six Thousand Dollars \$6,000.00) on June 1, 1972; Six Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$6,400.00) on June 1, 1973; Six Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$6,400.00) on June 1, 1973; Six Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$6,400.00) on June 1, 1974; Six Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$6,400.00) on June 1, 1975; Six Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$6,400.00) on June 1, 1976; and Six Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$6,400.00) on April 5, 1077 (\$6,400.00) on April 5, 1977,

interest being payable annually at the rate of seven percent (7%) per annum. A mortgage was given on the approximately 1,000 acres to secure payment of the note.

The Commission is planning to work with local church members at Harrisburg to obtain a marker to be placed at the grave of Reverend Steele.

The First United Methodist Church of Batesville has contacted the

Commission about placing a marker in honor of the old Soulesbury Institute which flourished at Batesville over 100 years ago, named in honor of Joshua Soule and Francis Asbury, and the Commission has agreed to furnish one-

half of the cost, not to exceed \$250.00 in total.

The Commission also has contacted Hendrix College about possible display space for historical items of Arkansas Methodism, and has been assured that such space will be available on a temporary basis. The next step will be to acquire items for display, and this will be worked on in this year to come.

It is urged that each church write its own history, and when this is

complete, send a copy to our Chairman for file.

The Commission has a project underway now to tape conversations with retired ministers concerning impressions and stories of earlier days in Arkansas Methodism, and to place these tapes on file at Hendrix College.

Each District is urged to take a District photograph of all ministers at one of the District meetings during the year, and send three copies of this

to the Historical Commission Chairman.

JOINT COMMISSION ON THE ARKANSAS/LOUISIANA METHODIST Adopted May 26, 1970

Recommendations

The following recommendations are submitted to the Annual Conference from the Arkansas/Louisiana Methodist Commission for action:

1. That the 1971 Circulation Campaign be held during the period January 17-24.

2. That the quota for each charge be one subscriber for each seven members reported to the 1970 Annual Conference.

3. That the subscription price be \$2.50 per year, with the provisions that subscriptions be available at \$2.00 per year when the list from a church equals one-third of the members reported to the 1970 Annual Conference.

4. That churches be asked to encourage laymen to assume the responsibility of the solicitation during the circulation campaign. It is also recommended that district superintendents give serious consideration to enlisting laymen for promotional assistance at the district level.

5. That local churches be encouraged to give serious consideration to the use of specially prepared pledge cards with which they would seek pledges

for subscriptions during their regular Every Member Visitation.

6. That the editor and president (or secretary) of the commission be impowered to borrow money needed for operations from Union National

Bank, Little Rock.

7. We wish to express our appreciation to Bishop Aubrey G. Walton and to Bishop Paul V. Galloway for their whole-hearted support of the papers. We also are indebted to the district superintendents and the pastors and to many laymen—who have given of their time to secure subscriptions and to promote the papers in other ways.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS Adopted May 27, 1970

The Board of Social Concerns would like to urge every church and every member to do everything within their power, individually and collectively to see that the rights of mankind, human dignity and a purposeful life style be offered to every person; realizing that we, being created of God, should so work together to raise the rights, dignity, and character of man that we shall be able to live in a world of peace and justice fulfilling the purpose for which God has created us.

1. We would like to recommend to the members of the Conference that in general the work of the Board of Christian Social Concerns be carried out within each local church according to the discipline requirements found in paragraphs 997, 998 and 999.

2. We further recommend that attention be given within each local church

to the following special days:

Labor Sunday (Sunday preceding Labor Day) UN and World Order Sunday (Sunday preceding UN Day) Drug and Alcohol Concern Sunday (Second Sunday in November) Church and Economic Life Week (Third full week in January)

Race Relations Sunday (Second Sunday in February)
Rural Life Sunday (Second Sunday in May)
3. We request the support of the District Superintendents, the local ministers and Social Concerns leaders in the local church to support a seems and social Concerns leaders in the local church to support a seminar to be held in each district to inspire, instruct and motivate studies and actions in each local church on the following subjects: drug addiction, people power, race, Viet Nam and South East Asia, rehabilitation and prison reform, abortion, jail ministry and pornography. These Seminars will be preceded by a meeting of all District Co-Ordinators of Social Concerns and the distribution to and completing of questions in the contraction of the contr Social Concerns and the distribution to and completion of questionnaires by local church leaders.

4. We recommend the preparation and distribution of an information sheet giving pastors and laymen answers to some practical questions that arise in the performance of the church's pastoral ministry. This will be distributed through the "Hot Line" of the Program Council.

We wish to express our thanks to the Executive Secretary and staff of the Program Council for their assistance in distributing vital information to the churches during the conference year.

DISTRICT CONFERENCE JOURNALS

THE COMMISSION ON ECUMENICAL AFFAIRS

May 27, 1970

The Purpose of this Commission is outlined in Paragraph 1391, 1968, Discipline. We urge that all local church Ecumenical work area chairmen study the Discipline explanation of the work of this Commission. The Interpreter gives additional guidance to the local church in the Ecumenical program each month.

We recommend that the following programs and goals for the Conference Year 1970-71 be considered by the Local Church Commission on Ecumenical Affairs and that each local commission take a positive approach

to this work.

1. Each local church elect an Ecumenical work area chairman or Commission

on Ecumenical affairs.

2. Each local church purchase a manual, "The Ecumenical Way" or "Guidelines for Ecumenical Affairs." Listed in The Resource section.

3. Each Local Church plan a pulpit exchange during the year with other churches in the community. Some churches do this on the fifth Sunday. 4. Where it could be done with advantage to the total ministry, local churches should plan an Ecumenical Vacation Church School.

5. The local commission on Ecumenical Affairs cooperate with Ecumenical

a) World Wide Communion Sunday in October of each year. A local church group could discuss the Communion service with other churches in the community. Local Churches could have a Maundy Thursday

service together.
b) Living Room Dialogues. This is composed of 10-20 people in Ecumenical groups from some of the churches in a local community, meet-

ing for prayer and study.

c) Community Christmas Confirmation Class gatherings. This could be a large Rally or visitation of classes.

d) Cooperative Christmas activities. For example, a small community in Florida did a Christmas pageant together.

Ecumenical Christmas services of Worship. Christmas Eve and Watch Night provide opportunities here.

f) Youth Christmas Caroling tours.

g) City Youth functions, possibly with a film.
h) Sharing projects at Christmas time with the needy.

i) Local Area Men's Club, some of these meet monthly for breakfast.

j) Form Community study groups in a local church. This study could be done with two documents found in the list of materials. 1. A Preliminary Outline of a Plan of Union: Consultation on Church Union. 2. Guidelines For Local Interchurch Action.

Union Thanksgiving Services.

1) Understanding Dinner. This could be a time to develop lines of communication through informal discussion sponsored by the Ecumenical Commission in the local church.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Adopted May 27, 1970

Report # 1

We recommend the following programs and goals for the Conference

Year 1970-71:

1. The Board of Education promote an accelerated program of leadership training to vitalize and upgrade the quality of Christian Education on the local church level, within the bounds of the North Arkansas Conference. To accomplish this goal the Board of Education will strive to involve 70% of all old and new leaders in a training session of five nights. Those included will be such persons as teachers and leaders of nights. Those included will be such persons as teachers and leaders of the Church School, educational assistants, age level and family life coordinators, work area chairmen of education, superintendents of study, and district and conference coordinators. Special areas of need may include methods of teaching, how to use the church school material, and resources, job analysis, goal setting and evaluation.

The training opportunities will be held at various strategic points in each District in the fall of 1970 and again in the spring of 1971. The training enterprise will involve all age levels and will include the first

training enterprise will involve all age levels and will include the first two nights where everyone will be together to consider such things as the nature and mission of the church, the philosophy of Christian Education, and the objectives of the Educational Ministry. The last three nights will be spent in specific groups considering such things as using

materials, methods of teaching, etc.

The personnel for the school will come from those who are already certified leaders and those who will be certified at the time of the

enterprise.

That a committee composed of the Board Chairman, the Conference Program Council Secretaries, the Conference Age Group Directors, and a minimum of three other persons who teach in the children, youth and adult fields, appointed by the Chairman, be organized with the specific responsibility of reviewing the Christian Worker's Schools for leaders of children, youth and adult, and offering suggestions and recommendations for increasing attendance and interest. We encourage this committee to meet early in the Conference Year.

3. That the Jurisdictional Program for leadership training at Mt. Sequovah be implemented whenever possible, especially as it relates to the following

Designing a Strategy for Leadership Development, June 21-26

Laboratory and Seminar Week, June 28-July 3 Workshop on Campus Ministries, July 6-10

Workshop for Enrichment and Skills, July 6-10 Conference on Christian Educational Concerns, July 10-12

District Age Level and Family Life Coordinators Enterprise, July 13-17 4. That the Conference Program Council Secretaries continue to take

advantage of Jurisdictional and other training opportunities as need

necessitates and as time and schedule permit.

5. That the Program Council Secretaries continue to meet with local or area Board of Managers to provide counsel in the planning of Christian Worker's Schools, Laboratory Schools, Curriculum Workshop and other training events, calling attention to new courses as they become available and seeking to interpret the new broad base of the Christian Worker's School as it moves in the direction of becoming a School of Churchmanship.

6. That we cooperate with the Committee on Interpretation of the Program Council in promoting Christian Education Sunday throughout the churches of our Conference on September 27 and in reaching a goal of

\$10,000 in offerings for the Christian Education Fund.
7. That the Board of Education in cooperation with the Board of Evangelism develop an orientation program for pastors and lay workers in Confirmation Training or Church Membership. To accomplish this three Area Workshops will be held using the new Confirmation materials. Hopefully, this will involve 75% of all pastors. These workshops will be the later than 10. North Little Book November 11. held in Jonesboro, November 10; North Little Rock, November 11; and Ozark, November 12; and one possibly in the Springdale area. A Confirmation Laboratory School will be held during the last week of March, 1971 at Lakewood, North Little Rock, Jonesboro, Fort Smith and Convey. The chiefing of the worldstore and Laboratory schools will be seen to be a supplementation. 1971 at Lakewood, North Little Rock, Jonesburg, Fort Shifth and Conway. The objectives of the workshops and Laboratory schools will be to explore the meaning of Confirmation, Relationship of Confirmation to Baptism, understanding and learning of the age groups, methods of teaching, how to use the new Confirmation material, and the relationship of Confirmation training to the total program of Christian Education.

That serious consideration be given to new forms of structures of leadership training and development. We presently operate upon a narrow base of Christian Worker's Schools and Labs. Why not consider: a. Laymen's School of Religion—where laymen have an opportunity to explore the meaning of the Christian faith as it is related to the besetting problems of our day.

b. Conference-wide lab schools in residence.

c. Week-end labs and training schools.
 d. Lay School of Theology—providing opportunities for in-depth study and investigation in the life concerns of Christian community.
 e. Schools for Council on Ministries and Administrative Boards—Deal-

ing with topics such as, Biblical Understanding of the Church, Historical Expressions of the Church, Form Follows Function, Organize for Ministry, The Council on Ministries, The Administrative Board and Its Committees.

f. Workshops on Resources for Teaching Ministry—the previewing of actual teaching materials that will be used in a given quarter for

teachers and workers of the church school.

g. A "Dialogue in Medicine and Theology" for ministers and doctors to explore ways in which men involved in the disciplines of medicine and theology may work together in accomplishing the maximum in the treatment of the whole person.

h. A Seminar on "Counseling the Alcoholic."

i. Coaching Conference on Using Local Resources in Teaching.

Report #2

Higher Education

I. Campus Ministry

An Area Special Study Committee called for by our Arkansas Area Committee on Higher Education was appointed in January 1970. This Special Study Committee was given the specific task of taking "a look" at all the Wesley Foundation situations in the state of Arkansas; (1) prepare a statement on the philosophy of the Wesley Foundation ministry; (2) write a job analysis for a campus ministry; (3) and make other recommendations that wisht be called for from this study which will strengthen the Wesley that might be called for from this study which will strengthen the Wesley Foundation ministry in our State. The Committee members are:

The Reverend Mr. Wayne C. Jarvis, Secretary The Area Special Study Committee has met on two occasions: January 5, 1970, and February 17, 1970. Much of the time of the meetings has been devoted to some preliminary ground work of the Study. Since each Annual Conference, "Little Rock and North Arkansas," did separate studies last year these two studies were mimeographed and given to each committee member to read, and become familiar with their content. Much of the "separate" studies has been helpful to this Area Study Committee. There will be other meetings of the Area Special Study Committee prior to the sessions of the Annual Conferences. In order to get before each Annual Conference Board of Education, the Area Special Study Committee is asking that this material be included in the Pre-Conference Digest of each Annual Conference (Board of Education Report). The Committee fully realizes that the Study is not complete and we are not asking for approval of material at this time. We are asking that what has come out of the Area Special Study Committee, thus far, be included in the Digest so that at a later time specific material may be brought, properly, before the Board of Education of each Conference for suggestions and approval. This statement and the following is a part of the preliminary report that we would like to be included in the "Pre-Conference" Digest.

1. We recognize the complexity of the roles that a campus minister must

fill in order to fulfill his responsibility. His role is defined by the fact that "on our campuses many students are found who have left the sheltering roofs of home and church for the first time. During these decisive years they face unforeseen perplexities, difficulties and pressures. They need mature counselors—counselors who are at home in the atmosphere of the modern college. They need the support of a friendly Christian community. So the Wesley Foundation is on campus involving itself in the hopes and commitments and the troubles and joys of students." (Little Rock Study Committee Report.) In addition it is time to look at the foundation as an agent of reconciliation. This does not mean that the foundation is to abandon a position, but, in reality, to assert that as the church on the campus and, therefore, a witness to the gospel, it does have a place to stand and a word to speak to a college or university which is seeking its own meaning and life. This word must be spoken in Christian love in all of the actions and words of the foundation and its Director. It is not our task to bring wrath to the campus but a Love which allows men to come together without threats or the need to be defensive, and to provide a ministry in which healing can take place. (North Arkansas Conference Study Committee Report.)

The key to the success of our campus ministry, generally, always, has been and will be found in the kind of person appointed to fill this position. It is hoped that local boards of directors may be so responsible that they may enter in a more constructive way into the selection of campus ministers and the guiding of the ministry of each foundation. The selection and appointment of any campus minister is, certainly, to be left to the Bishop

and to the Cabinets of the Conferences.

3. We emphasize the necessity of the annual conferences of the Arkansas Area working together in an area program as regards to the campus ministry. The nature of higher education in the State and its transcending conference lines makes it imperative that one program be coordinated for

the entire area. 4. We urge that whatever philosophy of campus ministry is adopted or whatever means of financing is used that the two conferences come to agreement on general principles, means, and ends. This consensus must, at the same time, take into consideration the uniqueness of each campus and must make allowances for their individual differences.

5. Having read the reports of the two previous study committees of both annual conferences in the area and having considered what we believe to be the most important issues facing us at this time we, also, conclude the

following:

A. That a state coordinator of Campus Ministry be selected.

His role will be similar to that of the conference age-level coordinators. His purpose will be:

a. To represent the interests of the campus ministry to the necessary agencies of the annual conferences (Board of Education, Commissions on World Service and Finance, Program Council).

b. To coordinate the total campus ministry program in the area by: (1) sharing ideas for programming and ministry from the various centers in the State.

(2) promoting to the churches of the annual conferences the work of the campus ministry.

c. To serve as a "troubleshooter" when problems arise so that one

person can be fully and objectively informed.
d. To work with the area committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry and perform whatever duties it deems appropriate and necessary.

2. His term of service will be —year(s)—(to be worked out by the Bishop and his Cabinets)—with the position to be filled alternately by a member of the two annual conferences.

3. He is to be a local church pastor, selected by the Bishop, and will perform these responsibilities, in addition to his normal pastoral

responsibilities.

4. We recommend that the state coordinator be provided a budget of to carry out this work—that is, travel compensation, etc. It is our purpose to work with the Bishop and other interested persons to come to a better presentation of the specific terms of this recommendation.

Report No. 2

Higher Education

II. Hendrix College

Hendrix College respectfully requests:

That the North Arkansas Conference apportion the amount of \$107,000 to be raised for Hendrix College for 1971. This is the same amount that was requested in 1970.

That this amount be apportioned to the districts in the same manner as World Service and that the District Superintendents and District Stewards make apportionments to the churches according to their best judgment.

III. Philander Smith College

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS: We recognize the vital importance of Philander Smith College, we accept in principle the support of Philander Smith College in its budgetary and capital fund drives.

And Whereas: We recognize the great and immediate needs existing at Philander Smith College for capital funds:

It Is Therefore Resolved: That the North Arkansas Conference in session at Conway on the 27th day of May, 1970 go on record as approving a goal of \$121,138 as our share of a drive for \$2,000,000. This goal shall apply for the period January 1, 1971—December 31, 1972.

Be It Further Resolved: That the World Service and Finance Commission be requested to apportion the amount of \$121,138 to the districts of the Conference.

Report No. 3

Camping

Report on Myers Ranch

The committee has worked hard in trying to raise money for the Myers Ranch project, and at the date (March 9) of this report, \$35,288.01

had been received. In January, the Board of Education worked out an agreement with the PCA that the land would be deeded to the North Arkansas Conference, and the Trustees would be the Conference Camping Committee, and those appointed to sign the papers would be Charles Casteel, Chairman of the Board of Education; Gene Adkins, Secretary; William M. Wilder, Chairman of the Camp Committee; and Jim Beal, Chairman of the Study Committee of the Camp Committee. The amount of \$32,000 would be paid—which would represent \$21,000 down, and two advance payments of \$5,500 each, which would mean that the next payment would not be until June 1, 1973—at which time the first of 5 equal payments with interest would become due, and the last payment in 1977.

It is hoped that additional money will accrue from voluntary donations between now and 1973, and that this money will be applied, and principal

and interest thereby decreased.

The Committee wishes to thank the Conference for its vote of confidence in allowing this purchase to be made, and for the many many persons and churches that have worked to make it possible. Without your encouragement and warm support, the land for this Conference Camp could not have been obtained.

COMMISSION ON ENLISTMENT FOR CHURCH RELATED OCCUPATIONS

Adopted May 27, 1970

This Commission on Enlistment, while continuing its work in the broad area of vocational guidance from a Christian perspective, sees as its major

responsibility a continuing emphasis on the pastoral ministry.

Our work in the past year has centered around this emphasis on the ministry. In line with our goal of enlisting persons for the ministry, we have held two Saturday Dialogues on the Ministry, one on November 15 in Ft. Smith and one on March 7, in Searcy. The Ft. Smith "Dialogue" was attended by approximately 60 persons, of whom half were youth. The theme message was a stirring address by Bishop Paul V. Galloway on "The Challenge of the Ministry." This Ft. Smith "Dialogue" served as a pilot project, and the Commission spent the majority of its time in the December 9 Planning Session revising the schedule and agenda for the future "Dialogues." The Searcy "Dialogue," although lacking in advance publicity and attendance, proved the revised program very workable. We feel that this has set a practical pattern for a minimum of two more "Dialogues" to be held Our work in the past year has centered around this emphasis on the set a practical pattern for a minimum of two more "Dialogues" to be held in the coming Conference Year.

Also, the Fayetteville District, with the capable leadership of District Also, the Fayettevine District, with the capable leadership of District Secretary of Enlistment Victor Nixon, Campus Minister Lewis V. Chesser, Jr., and District Superintendent Myers Curtis, has planned a "District Dialogue on the Ministry" for mid-April, 1970. This project will be aimed for both college youth and high school youth, while the other "Dialogues" have been planned primarily for senior high youth.

The Commission has tried to keep open the lines of communication with the ministers of this Conference and the school guidance counselors. We have done so through the purchase and mailing by the Program Council office of the following materials: (1) "A List of Resources for Enlistment," (2) "The Christian Ministry: A Challenge," and (3) The 1970 Edition of "Church Occupations and Voluntary Service" in The United Methodist Church.

Since we agree with the Program Council statement that a major need and thus one of our primary objectives is "to aid in enlisting youth for the ministry and in helping ministers work with youth," we propose the follow-

ing projects for the 1970-71 Conference Year:

A Day Apart on the Pastoral Ministry to be held in each District. Feeling that the morale of the minister and his family is a vital factor in his effectiveness as an enlister of persons for church occupations and particularly for the Ministry, we propose the holding, in the Fall of 1970, of a series of Days Apart on the Pastoral Ministry for ministers and their families. This Day Apart should include the opportunity for sharing from some resource persons the challenge and questions faced by the ministry today, the reactions of the group, and an open discussion of the attitudes, morale, needs of spiritual and personal enrichment of the minister and his family today. There should also be opportunities for fellowship, and the day might close with a Service of Holy Communion.

The Commission pledges its support and cooperation in securing leadership and planning, with the District Secretaries of Enlistment and the District Superintendents, a schedule and program for the district Day Apart.

II. A minimum of one Summer Internship Program in 1971. This provides the possibility of high school students (who have finished the 11th grade) or college students of working in the live pastoral ministry situations in our conference for eight to twelve weeks of the summer under the guidance of the pastor and leaders of the local church which is participating in the S. I. P. It would provide actual experiences which would assist the student to better understand the pastoral ministry and would help him in personal decisions regarding his commitment to this ministry. The student would also be expected to give helpful service in the local church where he participates. There would be opportunity for careful interviewing, assignments, and evaluations by all persons concerned in this program. As further details of this proposed program become available, the Commission may need to request additional funds from the World

Service and Finance Commission to implement this program.

- III. Provision of current materials concerning church occupation opportunities to Campus Ministers, Placement Offices, etc. The Commission on Enlistment would like to place a copy of the Job Data Book of The United Methodist Church where it would be available to students on the campus of each college within the bounds of the North Arkansas Conference.
- IV. A Revised Budget for the Conference Commission on Enlistment as suggested below is within the suggested reduced allotment from the Commission on World Service and Finance.

TOTAL\$1,100.00 V. We are willing to cooperate with all Conference agencies in the vital work of Enlistment and we seek your comment, constructive criticism,

and encouragement.

Your Commission on Enlistment knows that it has a continuing responsibility in enlisting persons for Church-Related Occupations, rather than an assignment which can be completed within a set time. We do confess, however, that we have not accomplished even those intermediate goals

which we set for ourselves during the past conference year.

We are particularly concerned and pledge ourselves to work even harder in the effort to communicate a more adequate image of the parish ministry and other church occupations in a true dialogue with youth. We have learned from our personal contacts with youth and from the Saturday Dialogues on the Ministry that the majority of young persons today have been "innoculated" with a view of the parish ministry which stresses only its human faults and complaints, and practically ignores the divine possi-

bilities, responsibilities, and joys of the task.

We believe that "Some Factors Affecting Enlistment" (p. 86, 1969 Conwe believe that "Some Factors Affecting Enlistment" (p. 86, 1969 Conference Journal) are still valid. The image problems of the church and the minister are still crucial, and we offer to cooperate in any way possible with the Committee on Public Relations and Methodist Information to improve the public relations of the church and particularly the parish ministry. In light of the factors affecting enlistment for church occupations now, we propose a re-alignment of our priorities which includes

the postponement of one project and the stressing of two others.

We propose that we postpone any further "Saturday Dialogues on the Ministry" until the next Conference Year, and concentrate our efforts on the "Day Apart for Parish Ministers" and the "Summer Internship Program."

We urge that each District Superintendent, in cooperation with Representatives of this Commission who are in his area, plan for a Day Apart for the Ministers and possibly their families in his district. We would hope that this retreat would be held in the Fall of 1970 or Spring of 1971, drawing on resource persons from within the district or outside of it as may seem best, with the aim that local church ministers (and their families) might be strengthened in their persons and enabled to function more effectively as ministers. In providing resources for ministers and families to deal more effectively with the problems and realities of their life in a local church and community, we would hope to strengthen their ministry and

increase their effectiveness as enlisters of persons for church occupations.

We propose for the Summer of 1971 to set up in cooperation with (a) local church (es) and other boards and agencies of the conference a minimum of two internships. One would be an internship in the parish ministry where a high-school graduate or college-age youth would work directly with a minister. The other type of internship would be in a church related occupation other than the ministry, i.e. as a day-camp worker or short term person in Methodist Voluntary Service. These internships would give a college-age young person the experience of "trying out" a church occupation under the supervision of a qualified person now working in that vocation. (See above Report for details.)

(The Reverend David Moose spoke to the Annual Conference Report with a commentary) (which recognized two important facts: 1. The significan influence which occurs) (in the personal contact between a dedicated person in a church occupation and a young) (person who is seeking to make a Christian vocational choice, and 2. the value of) (an experience which leaves to the young person the genuine freedom of choice in) (his or her vocation without the pressure of home and community and church to fulfill) (a promise of a lifetime commitment.)

BOARD OF EVANGELISM Adopted May 26, 1970

The Board of Evangelism of the North Arkansas Conference proposes the following as the program of evangelism in the North Arkansas Conference for the year 1970-71.

I. We recommend that the fulfillment of the following needs, as pointed out by the executive committee of the program council, be a part of

our program of evangelism.

A. Each district secretary of evangelism, in session with his district superintendent, plan a workshop in his district which will: (1) give guidance and motivation to pastors and key laymen in the art of visiting prospective members; (2) include the sharing of ideas and ways to build enthusiasm and attendance in the local church; (3) give aid to the pastors in evangelistic preaching and how to give

an altar call; (4) discuss and determine the needs in the local church

in the area of evangelism.

B. The Board of Evangelism, in cooperation with the Conference Board of Education, will conduct sub-district clinics for ministers to give training in ways to plan, enlist, publicize, and conduct classes for youth and adults in church membership.

C. It is further suggested that each district work out a program of evangelistic visitation with emphasis on religious surveys for membership prospects and needs of the people of the community.

- D. We further recommend that the Board of Evangelism, in cooperation with the Cabinet and Program Council, set up a series of spiritual retreats for ministers on a regional basis.
- II. We propose a program of evangelism with YOUTH EMPHASIS.
 - A. FOR THE LOCAL CHURCH, A RELIGIOUS EMPHASIS PERIOD.
 - (1) A three day period when youth are actively sought in a program specifically built for youth, with opportunity for discussion and enrichment.
 - (2) This would be a minister-team effort with team size to be determined by the size of the community. Any outstanding leadership other than ministers should be solicited.

(3) This program should be co-centered between the school campus

and the local church where possible.

(4) Encourage any singing or instrumental groups (or other outstanding talent) to be used where such groups can give helpful witness to our Lord.

(5) There should be an evangelistic preaching program at the church during these three days specifically geared for youth,

but not exclusive to any age group.

- B. FOR COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY CAMPUS, A RELIGIOUS EMPHASIS PERIOD.
 - (1) A three day period when on each college and university campus in the conference (times and places to be determined by the district superintendents, district secretaries of evangelism, conference secretary of evangelism, and the director of Wesley Foundation where involved, and they receiving permission from the college heads involved) there will be a ministry of evangelism to college students.

(2) Daily preaching service (either one or two services daily) to be followed by a discussion period in small groups in the dormi-

tories with visiting ministers as coordinators.

(3) Encourage the minister or ministers of the local churches to give aid and support in this program.
(4) The visiting team of ministers for each campus shall be invited from a list of ministers supplied by a committee made up of the district superintendent, district secretary of evangelism, and the conference secretary of evangelism.

(5) Seek out any singing or instrumental groups from the college who can give musical leadership and personal Christian witness.

(6) The expense of travel and other needs of these teams should be paid by the Conference Board of Evangelism. Travel to be paid in the amount of 7ϕ per mile.

III. The Conference Board of Evangelism further recommends and requests the appointment of The Reverend W. Leonard Byers as Conference Secretary of Evangelism for the year 1970-71.

Adopted May 26, 1970

Group Life Insurance

We make the following recommendations:

- I. All members of the North Arkansas Conference (except students serving appointments in, or those employed in Conferences which have compulsory insurance programs, or members under special appointment), and every full time approved supply pastor receiving an appointment shall participate in the North Arkansas Conference Life Insurance Plan subject to its laws and regulations.
- II. Beginning February 1, 1971 the General Board of Pensions Death Benefit Program Plan D be our Conference Group Life Insurance, providing increased coverage based on the Average Salary of \$6,414. (Plan C will be the coverage to February 1, 1971.)

B. Educational Benefits:

For each child of a deceased member, an educational benefit for each of the first four academic years of study beyond high school spent, after the death of the member, in full attendance at a standard school, college, university or institution of higher learning shall be paid \$1,080 per year if member dies before February 1, 1971; if after February 1, 1971 then \$1,440 per year educational benefits.

C. Contribution per member enrolled—\$128.28
1. The premium of \$128.28 (2% of the average salary in the Conference) shall be paid as follows: Pastor, \$51.31; Charge, \$76.97.

2. The annual premiums shall be paid by participants and charges through the district insurance treasurer by January 20, 1971.

III. We further recommend that an additional group policy shall continue

to be carried providing \$1,000 coverage for seminary students (including those who serve in conferences with no compulsory insurance program). The Board of Ministries is to pay the total premium for this coverage.

Report No. 2

Adopted May 26, 1970

Group Hospitalization Insurance (HMEP)

We make the following recommendations:

1. All members of the North Arkansas Conference (except students serving appointments in or those employed in conferences or agencies which have compulsory insurance programs or members under special appointment), every lay pastor receiving a full-time appointment, and every full-time lay employee of the North Arkansas Conference, shall participate in the Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program of the General Board of Pensions subject to its laws and regulations as adopted at the Annual Conference session May 26-29, 1969 and reported on pages 103-5 of the 1969 Journal with the improved coverage starting July 1, 1970 for all under 65 of unlimited semi-private hospital coverage to the maximum of \$25,000 with the automatic \$1,000 yearly restoration; and 80% of reasonable charges after calendar year deductible of \$50 for all other medical expenses for accidents and sickness. The premium for this is the following:

The local church is to provide at least one half of the premium for either individual or family coverage which ever is applicable.

2. That hospitalization premiums be continued on a quarterly basis, with due dates of June 10, September 10, December 10, and March 10. All insured persons shall send premiums to their district insurance treasurer.

3. All enrollment shall be handled through the office of the Chairman of the Committee on Group Insurance. Local churches not in the Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program for their Lay Employees may enroll in June following the guidelines on page 104 of the 1969 Journal. Those Local Churches enrolled have 90 days from employment to enroll new employees.

4. All Active members of the Conference and lay pastors 65 years of age and over are encouraged to participate in Medicare, the government medical insurance program. We recommend that the churches involved assume an amount equal to at least 50% of the total premiums for the appropriate

premium in the conference policy and Medicare premium.

5. All retired personnel of the conference 65 years of age or over (conference members, lay pastors, the wives or widows of either group who are 65 or over) are encouraged to participate in Medicare. We recommend that the Conference Board of Pensions provide not less than one half of the total combined premium cost of Medicare Part B and HMEP for each Conference Claimant 65 or over, except those who continue to serve as supplies earning \$1,000 or more and their premiums shall be paid as in 4 above.

6. All retired personnel under 65 (members of the conference, lay pastors, wives, widows and dependents of the same) shall have the conference hospitalization policy carried on them with the premiums paid by the

North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions.

That, since we are challenged by the need for apartments or low-rent homes for retired ministers, three persons be appointed to work with a study committee composed of persons appointed by the Little Rock Conference Board of Health and Welfare Ministries and a committee appointed by the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Children's Home, to do an in-depth study into the needs and feasibility of such a project, and to prepare a report for the true Appeal Conference in 1071. and to prepare a report for the two Annual Conferences in 1971. We further recommend that the three persons from our Conference be named as follows: Harold H. Spence, S. B. Wilford, and Joe Pierce.

That, since there is no resident chaplain to minister to the needs of the tremendous volume of patients at the University Medical Center each year, we authorize the Executive Committee of the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries to work with the Executive Committee of the same board in the Little Rock Conference in conducting an in-depth study of the need for a staff-level chaplain who would be supported by both

conferences.

That we take special note of the fine ministry being performed by the Methodist Nursing Home in Fort Smith under the able leadership of Mr. E. L. Smith, and to the Board of Trustees of the home for their dedication to this wonderful cause. We urge each pastor to lift up this relatively new ministry before his congregation for admiration and support.

6. That December 13 through 20 be observed as Children's Home Emphasis period for the receiving of the Annual Christmas Children's Home offering. Again we note with special pride the ministry of the Home under

the dedicated leadership of the Reverend J. Edwin Keith.
7. That we continue our support of the Methodist Hospital in Memphis, and give emphasis through our conference to the fact that the hospital is doing more than a million dollars per year in charity work, thus stressing the need for increased giving on Health and Welfare Ministry Sunday. We also wish to express our deep gratitude to the Reverend George Stewart who, as Chaplain, is performing a much needed ministry there. We are proud that, as a member of our own conference, he represents us in a very special way.

That, with deep sense of loss, we pay tribute to the memory of the Reverend Bates Sturdy. Those of us who knew him personally remember his tremendous dedication to his work. During his ministry at the State his tremendous dedication to his work. During his ministry at the State Sanitorium he touched the lives of hundreds of patients, influencing an unbelievable number to the point of conversion on a profession of faith in Christ, the Great Physician, and Savior of the World. His regular reports to the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries were meticulously prepared and highly inspirational. He will be deeply missed.

As we are moving to a calendar year in reporting this report will cover

We recognize the many good reports that we have received of Lay Witness Missions being held around the Conference. We know of many situations where there has been a marked improvement in church attendance, as well as a more evangelistic approach to church activities. We hope those churches participating in these Missions will keep up the spirit that was generated during the weeks of preparation and during the Mission itself.

At our Mid-Year Meeting held February 19, 1970 in North Little Rock, the following nominations were made for the coming Conference year, subject to the actions of Annual Conference:

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARY

Adopted May 27, 1970

The Commission on Minimum Salary shall be composed of seven ministers of the North Arkansas Annual Conference and one layman from each District of the Conference, and including representatives from urban, village and rural churches. The Commission shall elect quadrennially a chairman, vice-chairman and secretary to perform the usual duties of such offices. These officers shall compose the Executive Committee of the Commission. Whenever a vacancy occurs on the Commission between sessions of the Annual Conference, the vacancy shall be filled by the District Superintendent of the District involved.

Charges may become eligible to receive salary aid for the pastor from the minimum salary fund by meeting the following requirements:

1. Conduct an Every Member Program on Stewardship following the

procedure outlined by the Town and Country Commission.

2. File with the District Superintendent and the Secretary of the Minimum Salary Commission:

a. A report of the Every Member Stewardship Program
b. A budget of each church approved by the Administrative Board

c. An application for minimum salary assistance

3. Each Charge or Parish shall be asked to increase the salary or travel \$100 each year. There will be no decrease in Minimum Salary Aid in the first \$100 increase; and only fifty per cent (50%) reduction of all increase over \$100. No Charge shall be eligible to receive Minimum Salary Aid if there is a reduction.

4. That we adopt the Town and Country Commission program for Larger

Parishes and Group Ministries.

5. Plans for a Larger Parish Program shall be presented to the Commission for approval and for funds to be received. Each Parish shall have a Training Course on the Larger Parish.
6. All pro-rated connectional claims shall be paid by the Charge in accordance with the latest *Discipline*.

7. Minimum Salary Charges shall be grouped as follows: Type A—At least four churches with a membership of 300. Pastors preach three times on Sunday. Salary, travel expenses, mission aid and minimum salary not to exceed \$5,000. Where there are four churches on a charge and they merge to form three churches, they shall qualify for the same amount as a charge with four churches.

Type B-At least three churches with salary, travel expenses, mission

and minimum salary aid not to exceed \$4,200.

Type C—Student pastors married, at least three churches, salary, travel expenses, mission and minimum salary aid not to exceed \$3,500. Student pastors, single, at least three churches, salary, travel expenses, mission and minimum salary aid not to exceed \$2,900.

Minimum Salary Charges must be composed of at least three churches with salary and travel expense as much as \$1,800.

Maximum Schedule of Allowances:

 Student, Single
 \$ 700.00

 Student, Married
 800.00
 Fulltime 1,000.00

Ministers with dependent children may draw \$100.00 for each child without reference to the above schedule of allowance and salary levels.

^{*} The Commission urgently insists that the specifications noted above be met on applications for Minimum Salary Aid. Charges not meeting these must be considered as special cases.

8. Payments from this fund are made without regard to the amount the pastor receives from pension or educational funds. No part-time pastor is eligible to receive minimum salary aid.

9. In event the income of the fund becomes insufficient to meet the claims upon it each claimant shall benefit in his proportionate share of the

available funds.

10. An amount not to exceed a total of \$550 shall be allowed from this fund on the expenses of men serving minimum salary charges to attend the Rural Seminar.

11. This Commission will be willing to listen to any District Superintendent

desiring to submit a special case for minimum salary aid.

12. A Charge may become qualified as a Minimum Salary Charge within the first three months of the conference year provided it meets the requirements of this Commission as stated in its report to Annual Conference and that:

a. An application be submitted to the Secretary of this Commission on,

or before, September 1st.

b. Any special case must meet the approval of the Area Secretary of Town and Country Work and the Executive Committee of this Commission.

c. Any Charge thus approved becomes retroactive to the beginning of the Annual Conference year.

13. All churches shall be asked to pay into the Minimum Salary Aid Fund according to the following schedule:

14. The Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission shall serve in an advisory capacity to the Commission on Minimum Salary.

15. All requests for Minimum Salary assistance shall be filed in duplicate; one copy each to the Secretary of this Commission and to the District Superintendent. These requests must be filed no later than two weeks preceding the Annual Conference session.

16. Hospital and Group Life Insurance premiums of pastors serving Minimum Salary charges who draw less than \$4,500 from all sources shall

be paid their share from this fund.

THE BOARD OF MINISTRY

Adopted May 27, 1970

In recognition of the need to provide scholarship support for ministerial students and to strengthen our seminaries, we recommend the following:

1. That we insure the continuance of our present program by reserving each year an amount sufficient to cover operation of the Board and to care

for scholarship commitments, estimating this year's needs to be \$15,000.

2. That the Conference continue its support of the scholarship loan program through a contribution of \$5,000 from the Commission on World

Service and Finance.
3. That special emphasis be placed on the General Conference program for churchwide support for the education of ministers. This program, known as the Ministerial Education Fund, became effective on January 1, 1970. The amount of money needed for this fund has been apportioned to the Annual Conferences by the Council on World Service and Finance and then reapportioned to the Districts by our own Conference World Service and Finance Commission. Of the total money received, 25% is to be retained by the Annual Conference, and 75% is to be used by the Department of Ministry for distribution as explained in the pamphlet "The Ministerial Education Fund of The United Methodist Church." This is not designed to reduce the present conference program but to strengthen our ministerial education. We hope that every Church will accept and

pay their share so that we may strengthen our support of ministerial

4. That those who desire to enter the ministry secure the proper application forms from their District Superintendent or from the Registrar of the Board of Ministry, the Reverend Samuel B. Teague, 6701 John F. Kennedy Blvd., North Little Rock, Arkansas 72116.

5. That each District Superintendent have available to give to interested persons materials on the ministry and application forms for the various

relationships to the Annual Conference.

6. That all men in the courses of study comply with the requirement that they take their work through the Courses of Study in Perkins or St. Paul schools of theology.

II. Policy and Program

1. The Board will conduct its work in harmony with the Discipline of The United Methodist Church.

 The funds of the Board will be expended in the following ways:
 A. For the normal work of the Board and its Registrars in the operation of the Board, and in the guidance of the men related to the Board

in their training.

For financial assistance to college and seminary students enrolled in colleges, universities or seminaries approved by the University Senate or accepted by our Conference who meet the following requirements in accordance with the following provisions:

1. Provisions for Financial Aid:

a. The Board may allow basic fees and tuition.

b. In cases of exceptional need, as determined by the Executive Committee of the Board and upon recommendation of the District Superintendent of the student's home district, the student may receive up to \$250 in aid per semester.
c. If a student has earned credit for 12 hours in a regular semester

and wishes to attend summer school for the purpose of accelerating his return to the Conference, he may apply for aid for

fees and tuition for summer school.

d. By the end of his undergraduate sophomore year, the student must have and maintain a grade point sufficient to ensure graduation from the institution in which he is enrolled.

e. Aid may be granted for not more than five undergraduate academic years and for not more than four seminary academic

vears.

2. Requirements to be met by the students:

a. To be eligible for a loan the individual must be Licensed to Preach or in the process of becoming Licensed to Preach or Enrolled.

b. The student shall establish need for such aid by completing the forms required by the Board.

c. The student shall sign a promissory note made payable to this

Board and carrying the following statement:
"I understand that this note represents a loan from the Board of Ministry of the North Arkansas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church. It may be repaid in one of two ways:

(1) In service as an ordained minister of The United Methodist Church, with each year of service rendered being accepted as payment for one year's loan.

(2) In case it should be decided that I do not continue in the Ministry of The United Methodist Church, this note will bear interest from the date of issue at the rate of 7% annually. Payments will begin within six months of the decision that I not enter the ministry or six months after finishing my current degree work, and are to be made at the minimum rate of \$500 per year plus interest." (The loan officer of the Board is given responsibility of the supervision of collection of these payments.)

d. The Board will carry \$1,000 in life insurance for each student on Probationary relationship in the Conference. Students on

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Probation who desire this insurance shall inform the Board Treasurer, the Reverend Harold Wilson, of their desires.

3. Students are expected to provide information concerning their standards and changes of relationship to the North Arkanas Configuration of the ference to the officers of the Board. The names of these officers will be included in the Annual Conference Journal.

4. The Course of Study Schools

a. The Board will pay \$250 to support the St. Paul Course of Study School and \$250 to support the Perkins Course of Study School.

b. Lay Pastors who attend either of these Course of Study Schools will receive room and board scholarships from the institution

which they attend.

- c. The Board will give \$25 for the purchase of books to each man who attends either of these schools. The books must be paid for by the men themselves who in turn will send a list of the books purchased to the treasurer, the Reverend Harold Wilson, who will authorize checks for reimbursement. Books are not to be charged to the Treasurer nor to the Board.
- 5. Correspondence Work a. The Board will purchase the books for the candidates enrolled in the studies for License to Preach. The candidate will be responsible for paying the enrollment fee.

The Board will pay fees for men in the course of study including The Introductory Studies and the Course of Study.

c. The expense of grading papers re-submitted for grading will be paid by the student. 6. Part-Time Lay Pastors

a. The Board urges all Part-time Lay Pastors to attend the Arkansas Pastor's School.

7. Arkansas Pastor's School

a. We will support the Arkansas Pastor's School by giving \$500 per year to its budget.

III. Requirements for the Ministerial Office

The following is a brief summary of Disciplinary statements regarding some new structures and requirements regarding the ministry. They are included here for information, and persons desiring further details are referred to Paragraphs 301 through 399 of the 1968 Discipline of The United Methodist Church.

General

Par. 308.5 The provisions of Chapter II, The Ministry, shall be administered in such a way that until July 1, 1971 any candidate shall be granted the right to proceed to complete the requirements for qualifications under the provisions applying at the time of union. The Department of Ministry shall be authorized to adjudicate any conflicts which may arise.

Par. 318—License to Preach

1. Member of good standing of The United Methodist Church for one year.

2. Graduate from high school.

 Recommendation from the Charge Conference.
 Application in writing to the District Superintendent. 5. Appeared before the District Committee on the Ministry or Conference

Board of Ministry where no district committee exists.

6. One-fourth of B. D. or License to Preach Course by correspondence.

7. Agrees to the principles of The United Methodist Church.

Pars. 322 and 323—Associate Member of the Annual Conference 1. Served four years as a full-time lay pastor.

2. Completed four-year ministerial course of study in addition to license

to preach and introductory studies.
3. Completed a minimum of 60 semester hours in college. This requirement may be waived by an Annual Conference until July 1, 1971.

4. Recommended by the District Committee on the Ministry and the Board of Ministry

5. Declare willingness to accept full-time appointment.

6. Certificate of good health.

Par. 333-Member of Annual Conference in Full Connection (Associate Member Route)

Must have been a probationary member of the annual conference and served two full years under full-time appointment.

2. Must have reached 35 years of age.

3. Completed the bachelor of arts degree or equivalent.4. Completed two years of advanced studies in the course of study.

5. Recommended by three-fourths majority vote of the Cabinet, Board of Ministry and majority vote of the Conference.

Probationary member two years.
 Been ordained Deacon.

3. Completed B. A. degree or equivalent.

4. Completed two years of advanced studies in Course of Study beyond the requirements for Probationary Member (Introductory Studies and four years Course of Study).

Certificate of good health.

6. Satisfactory answers to the questions related to theology, polity and self-discipline.

BOARD OF MISSIONS Adopted May 27, 1970

Your Conference Board of Missions continues to try to make "love"

an action word.

In its efforts to do this, it has continued to work through its established committees, which are as follows: The Executive Committee, which is also The Budget Committee; The Salary Aid Committee; The Church Extension Committee; The Building Shares Committee; and The Research and Survey Committee. In accordance with the provision of Paragraph 1369 of the Book of Discipline, we are proposing the addition of the Committee on Town and Country Ministries.

I. Promotion and Policy

A. Advance Specials

1. We recommend that we continue the progressive Conference program of missionary education and giving, and that each district and each charge within the Conference develop a program of missions that will not only increase giving, but will also bring to all a new understanding of and a new dedication to the total mission of the church,

2. We recommend that the North Arkansas Conference accept the following Advance Special goals for 1970: a. National Division and Annual Conference Projects

(3) Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief—Voluntary Amount (For listing of specific Advance Specials for MCOR, see PARTNERSHIP IN MISSIONS, 1969-70, pages 254-265)
(4) As an additional project in the World Division, we recommend

a goal of \$12,500 to be raised during 1970, 71 and 72 for a pediatrics wing for the American Clinic in LaPaz, Bolivia.

3. We recommend the continuation of the "Bishop's Special Advance

We recommend the continuation of the Bishop's Special Fund," to which churches, organizations within the local church, or Fund, "to which churches, organizations within the local church, or Fundamental for Advance Special credit. The private individuals may contribute for Advance Special credit. The fund is administered by Bishop Paul V. Galloway and is used for such World Division Advance Special needs as he deems advisable in his missionary travels. The Bishop will notify such churches or persons as to the project for which their gifts have been used. Contributions to this fund may be sent to Mr. Grafton Thomas, Treasurer, or directly to Bishop Galloway and should be designated for "Bishop's Special Advance Fund."

4. We would call attention to the fact that there is an urgent need for increased salaries for the Spanish speaking ministers of the Rio Grande Conference. Our conference can meet its responsibilities in this area by providing in full the \$7,000 goal accepted for the Spanish speaking work in this conference. We strongly recommend renewed

effort to reach this goal.

We call attention to the fact that Reverend Arvest Lawson has recently participated in an Oklahoma Indian Missions Seminar Tour and is prepared and available for presentations of this work in churches that will request this service.

We also call attention to the fact that Reverend A. W. Martin, Jr., Missionary to Mexico, is on furlough this year and available for presentations of missions in Mexico in churches that will request his

Miss Helen Wilson of Hot Springs, a missionary from the Little Rock Conference to Bolivia, is also on furlough this year and makes an excellent presentation of the work of our church at LaPaz. She will be glad to appear in churches of our Conference when her schedule permits.

B. Missionary Support

1. The cost of maintaining a single missionary overseas is now \$7,500 per year, and the cost for a missionary couple is \$15,000 per year. Of this amount, however, The Women's Division will assume \$1,500 of the support for a single missionary and \$3,000 of the support for a missionary couple. We, therefore, still seek pledges on the basis of \$6,000 and \$12,000. Churches supporting missionaries should keep these figures in mind. Churches not presently supporting a missionary and interested in helping to do so should consider shares of not less than \$750 toward such support. Some of the missionaries related to our conference and the amounts of additional support needed for them are:

Miss Pearl McCain—Japan\$3,000 Mr. W. Ronald Schooler—Southern Congo 3,250

In addition to these who are related to our conference, Reverend A. W. Martin, Jr., who is a member of our conference, and Mrs. Martin are serving in Mexico. We note with appreciation that several churches in our conference are providing basic salary support for missionaries. A list of these missionaries may be found in the book, PARTNERSHIP IN MISSIONS 1969-70, page 280. This type of Advance Special support gives the local church a personal tie with a missionary and his work overseas.

2. We trust that churches in the North Arkansas Conference will be in earnest prayer for the missionaries over the world. Churches are encouraged to have copies of "The Prayer Calendar" available for

their members. These may be secured from the Service Center, 7820 Reading Road, Cincinnati, Ohio.

3. Churches interested in Advance Specials in addition to those listed above may find a comprehensive listing of all approved Advance Specials in the book, PARTNERSHIP IN MISSIONS, 1969-70. Pastors may order these books free of charge from the Board of Missions, 475 Riverside Drive, New York, N. Y. 10027.

C. Other Aides to Missions

1. We urge every charge to conduct a church-wide School of Missions this year, following the church-wide study theme for 1971. We recommend that January and February be designated "Church-wide School of Missions Months" and that this study be conducted during this time.

2. We hope that missionaries available in our area in 1971 will be invited to speak in our churches and in district programs for the purpose of missionary cultivation. We suggest that a church desiring a missionary speaker submit its request to the District Missionary Secretary. (Two returned missionaries of our conference, Miss Edith Martin of Harrison and Reverend Jon Guthrie, both of whom served in the Congo, may be invited to speak to church groups.)

3. We urge each charge to send one representative from the local Commission on Missions or Missions Work Area to the Missionary Weekend Workshop, July 31-August 2, 1970, at Mt. Sequoyah and that financial assistance be given by the Conference Board of Missions for one lay person from each church in the amount of \$5 for persons from the Fayetteville District and \$10 for persons from all other district. tricts of our conference. Persons planning to attend are asked to send their name and address to the District Missionary Secretary, who will then compile a list for his district and forward it to the Conference

Treasurer, who will make the proper payments.

4. All District Missionary Secretaries are strongly urged to attend the Inter-Conference School of Missions to be held at Hendrix College, Conway, July 13-19, 1970. This school is proposing to give special guidance to District Missionary Secretaries in planning and promotion Missionary Institutes within their respective districts. The District Secretary in each district working in cooperation with the District Superintendent and a representative of the District WSCS should plan to conduct a District or Sub-district Missionary Institute. Attending the above mentioned school will aid the District Missionary Secretary in his preparation for this responsibility.

5. We also call attention to the Missions Conference to be held at Mt. Sequoyah, July 27-31. We recommend this longer training enterprise for pastors and other leaders in this field who can attend the full week.

6. We are glad to report that our conference is well represented on the General Board of Missions by Mr. Nels Barnett of First Church, Batesville. We also take pride in the fact that one of our number, Reverend William Cheyne, is Director of the Advance for the South Central Jurisdiction.

7. We commend the Inter-Conference Committee on Missions for the fine

work being done. The membership of this committee is composed of representatives from the Conference WSCS, the Conference Board of Education, and the Conference Board of Missions.

D. Church Building Shares

1. Our cities in Arkansas continue to grow, and as they do so, we are challenged to expand our ministry by encouraging the organization of new Methodist congregations and by making a definite financial contribution to their building programs. These new groups need the encouragement of our older congregations, as they are not able to meet their financial budgets and carry on a building program. Therefore, we recommend that we continue our Church Building Shares Program by raising \$20,000 per year for use in the North Arkansas Conference for giving aid to our new churches. The amount shall be apportioned among the districts by the World Service and Finance Commission, and each district shall be encouraged to develop its own program of Church Extension. The District Stewards shall set the apportionment for each local church. The distribution of the shares shall be handled through the Conference Board of Missions and the promotion of the program shall be correlated through the Interboard Council of the North Arkansas Conference.

2. A Building Shares Committee has been appointed within the Board of Missions and has been assigned the following responsibilities:

a. It shall assist the Executive Secretary of the Interboard Council, the District Superintendents, and the District Missionary Societies in the planning and promotion of the following: (1) Establishment of outpost Sunday Schools

(2) Purchasing new building sites(3) Building new churches (4) Merging of churches (5) Setting up Mobile Units

b. It shall authorize the disbursing of the Church Building Shares

funds advising the Area Treasurer when payments are to be made.
c. The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the priority of the churches to receive help from the Church Building Shares funds and the amount to be given to each. They are asked to report their recommendations to the Board of Missions before the Mid-year Meeting if possible.

d. The maximum grant from the Church Building Shares fund to any designated church shall be \$15,000.

We recommend that \$5,000 be transferred from incoming money for the Conference Church Extension Fund during the remainder of the year 1970 and that \$15,000 be transferred from the Conference Church Extension Fund to the Extension Fund of the Board of Missions during the year 1971 to be used in cases of unusual need.

We recommend that a committee composed of four members of the Board of Missions, two representatives of the Commission of World Service and Finance to be appointed by that commission, and two representatives of the Cabinet to be appointed by the Cabinet, with the Executive Director of the Program Council as an Ex Officio Member, and with the Chairman of the Board of Missions serving as Chairman of the Committee, study the whole matter of Building Shares and Church Extension and that the report of this committee be included in the Pre-Conference Reports for 1971.

We recommend that when the Bishop and his cabinet determine that an emergency exists in church extension the Executive Committee of the Board of Missions shall be authorized to act in behalf of the Annual Conference.

E. Church Extension

1. There are always those churches that for various reasons may be designated as mission churches. It may be an older church in a community that is struggling for existence or it may be a newer church

that is discouraged and in need of financial help. In order that these churches may plan and carry out needed building and improvement programs, the Commission on World Service and Finance allots a percentage of its Conference Benevolence Fund to church extension.

2. In planning this part of its work, the Board of Missions has set up a

Church Extension Committee and assigned to it the following re-

sponsibilities:

a. It shall examine all applications for building aid and in submitting such applications to the Board of Missions for the Board's consideration, the committee may recommend acceptance, adjustment or rejection of such applications.

b. It shall seek to supply as much information as possible to the Board of Missions concerning each application and, if possible, visit the churches requesting building aid.

c. It shall work with the Committee on Town and Country Ministries and with the Interboard Council in setting up guide-lines for programs where loans or grants are requested from the Board of

d. The committee shall see to the disbursement of all allocated funds when the pastor and district superintendent involved have indicated that the church is nearing the completion of its building

program

3. Policy for Making Church Extension Loans or Grants

a. All applications for Church Extension Loans or grants shall be made on the designated froms and shall be completed before action is taken with reference to them by the Board of Missions.

b. Loans and/or grants from the Church Extension Funds shall be made only for churches completing a project.

c. The completed application, whether to the General Board or to the Conference shall be in the board of the Church Finds. Conference shall be in the hands of the Church Extension Secretary by February 1, 1971. This enables the committee to present the application to the Conference Board at the Mid-year Meeting.

d. All churches receiving a loan or grant from either the Conference Board or the General Board will be required to have an Every Member Visitation. The report of the Every Member Visitation will be certified in writing by the District Superintendent to the Board of Missions before it takes action on the application.

or Missions before it takes action on the application.

e. There shall be a bonded contractor on any project in which a church secures a loan or grant from the Board of Missions where such project exceeds more than 15% of the total value of the property.

f. All churches making application for loans or grants from the Board of Missions for building projects shall follow the requirement as set forth in the BOOK OF DISCIPLINE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH, Paragraphs 1538 through 1545. The Conference Board of Missions strongly recommends that an archi-Conference Board of Missions strongly recommends that an architect be employed for building and re-modeling projects.

F. Research and Survey

The Research and Survey Committee continues to support all efforts to determine and decide when and where the resources of the Board of Missions can best be used in particular situations. This holds true for both urban and town and country work. There is mounting evidence that new church situations are developing in the rural areas as well as in the urban areas as a number of industries are now locating in small towns. The committee suggests that the District Superintendents keep a close watch on this new phenomenon in socio-economic developments, and that they call upon the Research and Survey Chairman when they think a particular situation merits attention.

G. Committee on Town and Country Ministries Paragraph 1369 of *The Book of Discipline* delegates to the Conference Board of Missions the responsibility of administering the Town and Country work of the conference. As pertains to field of our responsibility, we recommend:

1. That, in compliance with the recommendation of the Inter-Conference

Committee asked to study Town and Country Ministries for the Arkansas Area, we operate in accordance with Paragraph 1369.2 of The Book of Discipline, which provides for a Committee on Town and

Country Ministries within the Board of Missions.

That the Cabinet appoint for each District a District Director of Town and Country Ministries; and that these District Directors be members of the Committee on Town and Country Ministries but not members of the Conference Board of Missions.

3. That the Committee on Town and Country Ministries include: The President of the Conference Board of Missions; The Conference Missionary Secretary; The District Directors of Town and Country Ministries; Church and Community Workers within the Conference; the Secretary or Associate Secretary of the Program Council, which ever has special responsibility in the area of Missions, and who will also be responsible for supervising the Town and Country Ministries; and Members at Large to be determined by the Board of Missions with Reverend Clyde Crozier, Chairman of Town and Country Commission,

to be one of these Members at Large.
4. That the Area Secretary of Stewardship work with the Committee on Town and Country Ministries to formulate a program of steward-

ship designed to meet the needs of the Town and Country situation.

5. That the Cabinet appoint Reverend Clyde Crozier, Chairman of the Town and Country Commission, to the Board of Missions and that other members of the Town and Country Commission be appointed to

other Conference Boards, Commissions or Committees.
6. That the Committee on Town and Country Ministries work with the Conference and its agencies, including the Program Council and the District Superintendents in program areas of Town and Country responsibility and that this committee call upon the Committee on Research and Survey of the Board of Missions for any help that it may give in establishing and maintaining Larger Parishes and The Group Ministry.

H. Salary Supplement

1. In order to do its work more effectively, the Board of Missions has appointed a Salary Aid Committee. This committee has been given the responsibility of receiving, evaluating and passing on to the Board of Missions applications for salary aid.

2. It should be kept in mind that salary aid from our Conference Board of Missions is from a mission board. Requests, therefore, should be made only for projects that justify the use of the church's mission money. The primary purpose of our salary supplement program is: a. to help new churches get established and become self-supporting

b. to aid in a continuing ministry to smaller churches and circuits (mostly rural), which are unable to pay a living wage to their

pastor.

3. With these purposes in mind, the following points are established governing grants for salary aid from either the Conference Board of

Missions or the General Board of Missions:

a. Aid to new churches will be on a year to year basis; however, it will be understood that when a new church receives aid it will be on a decreasing basis each year and all aid will cease completely at the end of the fourth year. Exceptions to this rule will be by 2/3 of the entire Board. We strongly recommend that all churches terminate their request within four years and not expect any help beyond eight years.

b. Salary Aid will not be given to any church or charge which does not conduct an Every Member Visitation yearly and give evidence of such to the Board. It is extremely important for both Pastor and District Superintendent to use all of their powers of persuasion to influence and educate the local churches or charges to move in the direction of an annual Every Member Visitation program.

Salary Aid requests from District Superintendents will be given consideration ONLY if the request has been made in writing in the proper form to the Chairman of the Committee on Salary Aid.

Such requests are to be submitted by September 9, 1970. This will give those entrusted with this responsibility time to process them and present them to the Executive Committee and/or Board for action.

d. In established churches or charges where continuing salary aid is necessary the District Superintendent is requested to use every means at his disposal to merge or combine churches or circuits, to create interdenominational work and to promote inter-racial work in order to decrease Salary Aid.

e. Priority will be given to newly established churches from available funds of the Salary Aid, with churches eight years old being re-

classified as established, continuing, situations.

f. The maximum amount of salary aid given to any situation for any one year shall be \$1,200. Exceptions to this rule be by 2/3 vote of the entire Board.

g. The Board of Missions will work in co-operation with the Commission on Minimum Salary when requests are made to both groups

for Salary Aid.
h. In case of an emergency request for salary aid, between meetings of the entire Board, the Executive Committee is empowered to act

on such request in accordance with these rules.

i. These rules may be rescinded, amended or changed in any way at any meeting of the entire Board by a 2/3 vote of the entire Board.

j. No request will be considered that is not in the hands of the proper secretary by the date designated in the annual report or at least two weeks in advance of the meeting at which the request is to be considered.

A. Distribution

Fulfilling our responsibility as the Conference Board of Pensions, we have authorized the payment of claims as follows:

To 66 Widows of members retired by the North Arkansas Conference with a total of 1,555½ service years.

To 75 widows of members retired by other conferences with a total of

563 service years.

To 9 dependent children of deceased ministers retired by the North Arkansas Conference and other conferences, whose pensions are based on 113¾ service years.

To 19 approved supply pastors of the North Arkansas Conference with

345 4 service years.

To 4 approved supply pastors retired by other conferences with a total of 21% service years.
 To 12 widows of approved supply pastors of the North Arkansas Con-

ference with 150% service years.

To 4 widows of approved supply pastors retired by other conferences

with a total of 21% service years.

To 2 dependent children of an approved supply pastor whose pension is based on a total of 23 service years.

The North Arkansas Conference in 1969 had the responsibility for a total of 311 claimants with a total of 4,984% service years.

B. Responsibilities

2. Refund for Medicare in the amount of \$7,488.00 for 158 claimants. Premiums in the amount of \$7,193.40 for 76 claimants eligible for

Death Benefit Program Coverage.

Three Love Offerings at retirement. Total \$900.00.

These benefits are equivalent to an additional \$4.95 per service year.

C. Recommendations

1. We recommend that the Conference Board of Pensions be authorized to increase the annuity rate for January 1, 1971 to December 31, 1971 not to exceed \$59.00 per service year for retired members dependent upon available income from the Pension Endowment Fund. Should the income not reach the expected amount the Board of Pensions shall be authorized to set the annuity rate in the range of \$56.00 to \$59.00 per service year dependent upon actuarial realities. The rate for the period January 1, 1971 to December 31, 1971 for special conference claimants shall be 90%

of the regular rate. 2. We recommend that there be apportioned to charges for conference claimants an amount equal to 23% of the pastors salary with 3% going to the endowment and 20% going to current distribution as provided on page 67 of the 1963 Conference Journal. We further recommend that each minister event notified minister are recommend. that each minister, except retired ministers, part-time lay ministers, and part-time student pastors, appointed with an annuity claim on the conference shall pay an assessment annually to the Conference Claimants fund in an amount equal to 2% of his total cash salary which shall include minimum salary and mission appropriations and this shall go to the Unrestricted Endowment Fund. Any man not having paid his Claimants Fund, pastor's part, will be charged 5% interest per year

on the unpaid total balance in accord with paragraph 1380.6 of the 1968 Discipline.

3. We recommend there be continued the work of the Board of Pensions Committee on Proportional Payment of Ministerial Support in accord with provisions of Paragraph 1380.6 of the 1968 Discipline.

4. That the Secretary of the Annual Conference be requested to print in the Conference Journal individual amounts due and amounts paid by

pastors during the year to the Conference Claimants Fund.

5. That necessitous allowance grants, retirement love offering and local expenses of the Board be paid by the Treasurer, subject to the approval by the Executive Committee of the Conference Board of Pensions and 1968 Discipline (Paragraph 1380.3).

6. That the regular annuity payments be made monthly in advance to the Conference Claimants from the office of the General Board of Pensions,

Evanston, Illinois, on the first day of each month.

7. That the institution, board or organization paying the salary of minister on special appointment without annuity claim on the conference shall make provisions for the pension of such person. Attention is called to the 1968 Discipline (Paragraph 1379.3a) with reference to eligibility to participate in Ministers Reserve Pension Fund (MRPF) with the

approval of the General Board of Pensions.

8. That there be apportioned to each agency and institution served by a ministerial member under special appointment with annuity claim on the conference, the sum of \$360.00 for the Conference year 1970-71 in accord with the 1968 Discipline (Paragraph 1379.3a); and that said apportionment be paid to the Treasurer of the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions no later than 7 days prior to the opening of Annual Conference.

12. That the Board will not make any retroactive settlements of claims prior to the year in which a claim is approved, excepting in the case of those who have been serving in the capacity of Chaplain.

13. That in determining years of service the Board shall carefully examine and consider those years listed in the Conference Journal prior to accepting them as valid years; and that any years in question shall be subject to validation by the applicant and by approval of the Board of Pensions.

14. That all approved supply pastors continue to provide all information necessary relative to their service record.
15. That the Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Pensions of the

North Arkansas Conference be paid \$400.00 each for administrative work during the 1970-71. 16. That the Executive Committee elected by the Board be designated in

the Journal with the roster of the members of the Board of Pensions. 17. We recommend that the investments in the Unrestricted Reserve Fund of the Pension Program adopted by the 1963-64 Conference be continued.

18. Eligible claimants who have been retired by the North Arkansas Conference will have their Conference Death Benefit Program carried for them with the contributions paid by the Conference Board of Pensions in accord with the program of the Conference Committee on Group Insurance. We recommend that all retired ministers, widows and dependent children, who are our responsibility be covered under the HMEP policy. The cost to be 100% paid by the Board. Retired individuals, eligible for Medicare, shall personally pay the Medicare monthly payment. Retired ministers who serve appointments under the District Superintendent and receive less than a total of \$1,000,00 in expenses and Superintendent and receive less than a total of \$1,000.00 in expenses and salary (including minimum salary and mission appropriations) from the charge will have the above payments paid by the Conference Board of Pensions provided they notify the Conference Board of Pensions Treasurer their total income from the charge; otherwise they and their charge will be considered paying the total amounts.

19. We recommend that each minister at the time of retirement be given a Love Offering of \$300.00.

20. We recommend that the first \$1,500.00 of the pension of retired ministers and widows be designated for housing and utilities.

21. We recommend that a Task Force of informed individuals be appointed by Bishop Galloway to study the existent investment program of the Conference Board of Pensions and the General Board of Pensions. This Task Force shall make recommendations to the Conference Board of

Pensions prior to the time of Annual Conference meeting in 1971 as to the advisability of continuing the present investment program or instituting a new investment program for the Pension Endowment Fund.

COMMISSION ON PUBLIC RELATIONS AND METHODIST INFORMATION

Adopted May 26, 1970

I. PURPOSE

We understand the basic function of this Commission to be to assist the local churches of our Conference in establishing a more effective relationship with the communications media, both religious and secular. Our aim is also to make the church more widely known and understood, and if possible more favorably known, to seek to know, evaluate and influence public opinion; to broaden the witness of the church.

II. PRINCIPLES

Relationships must be our main concern, and must be on a two-way basis—church to public, public to church.

Our relationships with the various communications media, both religious and secular, grow as our efforts demonstrate ability and effectiveness.

III. OBJECTIVES

1. To keep the public informed about world-wide, local and Conference developments.

2. To creatively communicate Christian faith and practice through the use of print and electronic media.

3. To be responsible for creating a climate where exchange can take place between the church and communication media.

IV. PROGRAM

1. We propose to assist Dr. Alfred A. Knox, Area Director of Methodist Information, in whatever way he suggests. We appreciate his outstanding leadership in religious journalism.

2. We recommend the distribution of two basic resource materials among the churches of the Conference. They are—

Handbook on Church Public Relations for local congregations, produced by professionals of the Religious Public Relations Council, and Handbook of Church Public Relations-written by Dr. Arthur

West, Executive Secretary, United Methodist Information, Dayton, Ohio.

3. We also propose a Conference Workshop on Training in Communications to be held April 13, 1971, in Conway.

COMMISSION ON WORSHIP Adopted May 26, 1970

A religious person does not always enter into the spirit and experience of worship simply because he attends a stated meeting in his Church. No matter how correctly the service may be carried forward, if it does not minister to his living awareness of communication with the Most High, it does not constitute for him a true service of worship. The Commission on Worship is challenged with the responsibility of helping worshipers to achieve or experience moments of spiritual certainty, blessing and uplift.

The local Commissions on Worship, working through the structural setup afforded by the Disciplina will attitude to continue the disciplina will be attituded to the disciplina will be attit

set-up afforded by the *Discipline*, will strive to convince that the use of forms in public worship is inevitable, but that the spirit may be either formal or informal for the sake of preserving substance. The motive for worship should progressively rise to planes of love, reverence, devotion and gratitude. To this end, our Book of Worship gives direction in the way of ordering worship, but the local Church will determine the best forms for their particular congregational needs. This freedom of worship should not be allowed to advance forms that will be repugnant to the greater numbers. The congregation, as a whole, should become less passive and more active in the worship service. A Worship Survey may be taken in each Church to better guide the Pastor and Commission members in allowing the members to state what they feel about the worship services.

The Christian year has much to offer Methodists. Proper observance of the seasons will bring out the deep significance and richness of the Church's calendar. This must be done without making it a mark of denominational identity. The several Commissions will be advancing their respective causes during the year and the "task forces" will note the presence of the Worship Chairman or other Commission members. For instance, the value of properly planned music helps in a Revival or Spiritual Life

program has long been taken for granted.

Weddings and funerals are important examples of occasional services. The present trend is the witnessing of a return of the funeral service to the Church. These services should be planned to best meet the needs of each particular occasion and the principals involved. Standards of conduct and costs should be brought to the attention of members and interested persons. Part of the agenda of specified Pastors' meetings on a District level should feature clinical discussions of these two services, at least. Further, a Worship Workshop should be held at an early date to plan the over-all approach to the many problems confronting the Church today in the field of Worship. The forms of Worship reveal constant changes or, at least, a clamor for change in certain areas of the membership. We must be alert in our observance of what is being lost what may possibly be gained in the matters of change. Some type of services allow for constant change while others should experience only highly warranted change.

The Commission on Worship, being new, has engaged in the gathering of information from the experiences of other Conferences. It will now strive to give guidance to this Conference in the development of worship as an activity in which both God and man participate.

Stage II: the development of a plan of possible union. In the 1970-71 Conference Year all Boards, Agencies, Commissions and Organizations of the two Conferences will be requested to make available information and lend assistance in formulating a plan of union. We will fulfill the obligations of Stage II by submitting this plan to the Annual Conference Sessions of 1971.

Stage III: we remind you, as stated in the original Resolution, calls for this plan of union to be before the Church for one year (May '71 to May '72) for consideration, and the vote on the plan will be at the Annual

Conference Sessions of 1972.

At the death of these donors, this income will be used in the

VII. MEMOIRS

REVEREND MANFORD LEE EDGINGTON

1900-1969

Reverend Manford Lee Edgington, the son of Ora and Julia Edgington, was born February 10, 1900, at Blue Ridge, Collins County, Texas, and died January 16, 1969, in Sparks Memorial Hospital in Fort Smith, Arkansas. In 1903, he and his parents came to Arkansas, and settled at

He preached his last correct a Christmes massage Sunday marring December 29 1968 his last sermon; a Christmas message, Sunday morning, December 22, 1968. He was very active in Boy Scouting movement, and over the years his

efforts were recognized, and he received many awards, his last being named as one of the Commissioners for the Beaver Lake District. His hobby was

growing flowers, and he enjoyed raising them.

Survivors include: His widow, Mrs. Lydia Adeline Edgington, of Garland, Texas. Three sons: Manford Lee Edgington, and Montford Ora Edgington, both of Garland, Texas, and Leslie Stewart Edgington, of Fayetteville, Arkansas. Two sisters: Mrs. Violet Muse, of Bradford, Arkansas, and Mrs. Minnie Howard, of Sulphur, Oklahoma, and fourteen grandchildren.

Service was held on Saturday, January 10, 1969, at ten o'clock in The United Methodist Church in Eureka Springs, by the Reverend Myers Curtis, District Superintendent of the Fayetteville District. The United Methodist Choir sang "O For A Thousand Tongues To Sing My Great Redeemer's Praise." which was one of his favorite hymns. IX. HISTORICAL

SESSIONS OF THE CONFERENCE

The "Arkansas Conference" and the "White River Conference" were united in 1914 to form the present "North Arkansas Conference."

The Conference determined that its annual notation should date from the time of the organization of the Arkansas Conference in 1836, instead of following the date fixed by the consolidation of the Arkansas and White River Conferences, when the name was changed to North Arkansas Conference in 1914.

The Conference session of 1939 voted to maintain the numerical notation of the Conference in The Methodist Church.

X. MISCELLANEOUS

STANDING RULES OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

- (1) That each undergraduate, each approved supply pastor, and each candidate for conference membership be required to meet with the Board of Ministerial Training before or during the session of the annual conference unless hindered by circumstances beyond his control.
- (2) That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one member from each church in each Pastoral Charge; provided further, that each station charge shall have three elected members.
- (3) That the figures answering the question the pastor's report to Annual Conference: "Members reported last year" shall in every case be the number of members printed in the statistical tables of the Journal of the last Annual Conference.
- (4) That the District Superintendent's figures of all apportionments be accepted as the official figures.
- (5) That the apportionment for Conference and General Work be combined in the statistical report: and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.
- (6) All statistical reports, after being checked for correctness by the District Super-intendent and District auditors, shall be delivered by one of them to the Conference Statistician, within 45 days after the end of the Conference fiscal year.
- (7) Subject to the provisions of The Discipline, a District Superintendent shall be eligible for membership on not more than one major Annual Conference Board or Commission, and not more than one additional Commission or Committee, but not to hold office therein. District Superintendents shall be eligible for Annual Conference nomination to Jurisdictional Boards and Commissions, provided that they may not compose more than half of the ministerial nominees.
- (8) That the Secretary of the Bishop's cabinet be instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or District Superintendent's District for insertion in the Conference Journal.
- (9) The Annual Conference shall elect upon nomination by the Bishop a Conference Entertainment Committee to serve during the quadrennium. This Committee shall make arrangements for the facilities needed for the session of the Annual Conference and administer the funds for its entertainment, including the honorarium for the conference preacher.
- (10) All members attending the Annual Conference Session shall pay two dollars registration; except 1) those from Minimum Salary Charges, who shall pay one dollar; 2) retired ministers not serving charges and supernumeraries, who shall pay no registration. The offerings in the public worship services shall be used for conference entertainment expense. The Conference Entertainment Committee shall provide, during the session of the Annual Conference, full entertainment for retired ministers not serving a charge, their wives or widows; and room for all pastors of charges whose pastoral support from all sources is \$3,600.00 or less.
- (11) Every board, commission, and committee receiving any money from conference funds shall present to the Commission on World Service and Finance annually by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference a detailed financial report including all receipts and expenditures.
- (12) A list of lay members elected to Annual Conference shall be compiled by the district superintendents and sent to the conference secretary prior to the opening of the session.
- (13) The district stewards shall apportion all annual conference askings to the several charges in each district on an equitable basis.
- (14) The Conference Treasurer shall hold his books open for 15 days following the close of the fiscal year. At the end of the fiscal year he shall allocate to the several Boards and Commissions the monies to which they are entitled; and the Boards and agencies receiving monies from Conference funds shall make their requests on the basis of the calendar year, and close their books at the end of the calendar year.
- (15) No one shall be nominated for re-election to a board or commission on which he has served more than a quadrennium immediately preceding his election.
- (16) The Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Pensions shall be members of the secretarial staff of the Conference, and these persons shall be charged with the responsibility of seeing that all records pertaining to service years be made identical.
- $^{\prime}(17)$ Any proposal to change the Standing Rules shall lie on the table overnight, and then its passage shall require a 34 vote of those present and voting.
- (18) That part of the report of all boards, commissions, committees and other agencies of the conference which provides for changes in policy or makes recommendations shall be mimeographed, printed, or otherwise duplicated and distributed to the membership of the conference prior to the time scheduled for action on said report.
- (19) All churches employing more than one member of an annual conference shall pay all percentages based on pastor's salary on the salaries of all ministers so employed.
- (20) Each Annual Conference session shall designate a moving date. Any exceptions to the designated date shall be agreed upon by the pastors involved.
