

At least one-third of the members shall be lay persons in lay ministry careers." Moved, seconded and adopted.

COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES: Sam Teague, chairperson, presented the priorities as listed in the Pre-Conference Journal and called for Arvill Brannon, Associate Director, who presented the person who spoke to each priority. WORLD HUNGER—Nadine Hardin presented Lloyd Perry from the Little Rock Conference, a member of the Area Task Force on Hunger, who spoke of the Grain Belt Consultation and made a moving statement regarding world hunger. Nadine Hardin emphasized the need for participation in a November event which is to sensitize the Conference to the complexities of world hunger. ETHNIC MINORITY CHURCHES—John Thompson lifted up the need to develop steward-

ship within the ethnic minority churches and to help in reaffirming their cultural heritage. Arvill Brannon called attention to the remaining priorities: EVANGE-LISM, PARISH DEVELOPMENT, COMMUNICATIONS, and TO AFFIRM THE DIGNITY AND WORTH OF ALL PERSONS AND UTILIZE THE FULL HUMAN POTENTIAL WITHIN OUR CHURCHES. Sam Teague spoke about the Council on Ministries' work and asked for Bishop Hicks to lift up his ideas for planning within the Council. The Bishop made reference to pages 4 and 5 of the Pre-Conference Journal, the Timeline for Conference Planning and the Policy for Operating Structure.

COMMITTEE ON COMMUNICATIONS: Herschel McClurkin presented the report. Vina Calhoun spoke on the Audio-Visual Library in the Council on Ministries office. Tom Barnett spoke of the practicality of radio/television ministry and gave an example of how Jack Hill, a Jonesboro television commentator, had made a film dealing with housing which represented his response in faith to the need. Mauzell Beal spoke of the parish newsletter as an effective tool for reaching people. She urged the training of persons in this responsibility. Herschel McClurkin presented a tape, "Connexion," a new approach to radio ministry. Dr. Curtis Chambers, the General Secretary of United Methodist Communications, in the closing statement in this section, spoke of the great task of this Committee,

BOARD OF MINISTRY REPORT NO. 1: Max Whitfield presented those to be elected as probationary members. They are: David Bruce Bentley, Marcia Gail Swain Crossman, Bonda Sue Deere, Alfred Wiley Eckles III, Kathy Rhnea Fadick, Joan Carolyn Frost, Charles Edmund Liddle, William Earl Maxwell, Jr., Dana Andrew Thomason, and Barbara Ann Wulfekuhler. These were elected. He requested that those to be received in full connection be received by Tuesday morning. So ordered.

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEES: Bishop Hicks in his presentation of the Legislative Committee concept, stated the two-fold purpose: 1) to get the work of the Annual Conference into a setting where delegates can have input; 2) to establish a base from which persons, Boards, or Committees who would be carrying out the responsibilities assigned them, could pick up the issues and determine workable plans for implementing before they are finalized. Each of the nine legislative committees are to elect a chairperson and a scribe.

COMMUNION OFFERING: Ben Jordan moved that the Communion Offering received this evening go to World Hunger. It was so ordered.

RECESSED: Following announcements the session was recessed for legislative committees to convene.

## First Day—Evening Service

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was observed at 7:30 P. M. in the Sanctuary. The Celebrants were Bishop Kenneth Hicks and Dr. W. Joe Washington, Conference Preacher; Liturgists were Ben Hines and Dick Haltom. Deacons were Worth Gibson and Rhonda Crow; Worship Leaders were Mrs Sandra Barnett and John Thompson. The Chancel Choir of First United Methodist Church, Jonesboro, was directed by Mrs. Patty Skoog, organist. A Mime was performed by Chuck Jones of the University of Arkansas. The Communion Steward was Mrs. Malcolm Peeler of First United Methodist Church, Jonesboro; the Ushers were from First Methodist, Jonesboro; Head Usher: Bruce Choate. The Conference Banner was designed by Mrs. Ann Jackson.

Second Day—Morning Session June 7, 1977

DEVOTIONS: The Leader was Marvin Gaither; the Speaker was Bishop

Kenneth Hicks, subject was "You Are Sent,"

OPENING: Bishop Hicks opened the session for business and called on the

Conference Secretary for announcements.

STRUCTURE: Proposal No. 1, the proposed change in Standing Rule 22, placed on the table yesterday, was presented by Pat Freemyer: "No person shall serve as an elected trustee of more than one United Methodist agency of the North Arkansas Annual Conference at a time." Moved and seconded. Dewey Dark moved that the words "North Arkansas Annual Conference" be changed to read "Arkansas Area." Charles Ramsay moved that the word "agency" be deleted and the phrase read "United Methodist related institutions." The body acted to adopt the amended motion: "No person shall serve as an elected trustee of more than one United Methodist related institution of the Arkansas Area at a time." Pat Freemyer moved that the chairperson of the Communications and Publishing Interests Committee be made ex-officio member of the Arkansas Methodist Board of Managers (with vote). Seconded and passed.

NOMINATIONS: Victor Nixon called for the election and affirmation of those nominated yesterday. Ben Horn nominated Joe Dugan as a trustee of the Methodist Hospital, term to expire 1980. A ballot will be prepared for later election. Jim Beal questioned Arvill Brannon serving on both the Board of Discipleship and the Board of Diaconal Ministries, The Committee on Nominations removed his name from the Board of Diaconal Ministries. Wayne Jarvis stated that we had no authority to elect trustees for the Methodist Nursing Home and Methodist Village in Ft. Smith. Nadine Hardin, Nell Barling, and Archie Boyd spoke to this situation. Bishop Hicks clarified the question by stating that in this case it is affirming, not electing. The question was raised about Vernon Paysinger's dual membership on boards. Ben Jordan moved that the Nominating Committee resolve this and any other conflicts and that we delay voting on the nominations in question until tomorrow. So ordered. The election was held for the remaining nominations. Victor Nixon called for nominations of persons for the Committee on Nominations. Byron McSpadden was nominated to fill the unexpired term of Bill Douglas, term to expire 1979. The following were nominated for terms to expire 1981: Clergy: Bob Felder, Max Whitfield, James Linam, Floyd Villines, Keith Goza, Rhonda Crow, Jim Keith, Marvest Lawson. Laity: Ann Jackson, Joe Thomas, Mrs. Joel Cooper, Jim Lane, Stanley Reed, Winfred Polk, Betty Turner, Matt Ellis, There will be an election of two in each category. A ballot will be prepared. Byron McSpadden was elected, term to expire 1979.

ARKANSAS METHODIST: Jim Lane recognized Erwin McDonald, religion editor of the Arkansas Democrat. He then presented John Workman to give the report. He lifted up the missional task of all areas of communication and expressed appreciation for the support given for the Arkansas Methodist. Over 98% was paid. Jim Lane referred to the report in the Pre-Conference Journal. The apportionment of \$51,000 is the same as last year. Report adopted.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION, REPORT NO. 1: Joel Cooper presented the report. The CF&A proposed moving away from financing on the basis of percentages of the pastor's salary and adopting a dollar apportionment as in other items. This would allow for a more equal distribution to the various districts. Wayne Jarvis presented changes in the Pre-Conference Journal: page 35, line 30, the amount for the Rio Grande Conference is \$6500; Oklahoma Indian Missionary Conference is \$6500. On line 31, Black Ministries is \$20,000 (first \$10,000 shall go to Mallelieu Community Center). On line 32, Heifer Project International is \$10,000. On lines 31 and 32, Aldersgate, Inc. was eliminated as an Advance Special. On page 36, line 7, Global Ministries should read \$52,690. On page 37, under No. III. F., line 31, add "That the North

Arkansas Annual Conference preserve an operating balance not below \$60,000 for 1977, and after January 1, 1978, the balance not be below \$50,000." Joel Cooper presented Dr. Ewing T. Wayland, General Secretary of the Council on Finance and Administration. He expressed joy in being present and appreciation for the good work of the Conference. He stated that this Conference led all other Conferences in percentage of payment of World Service with 108%. Only one other Conference has equaled this Conference's support for the basic fundings.

DIACONAL MINISTRIES: Arvill Brannon presented five persons who have met the requirements for consecration as diaconal ministers. They are: Monty Ray Bell, Certified Director of Music; Albert Keith Berthouex, Certified Director of Music; Len D. Bobo, Certified Director of Music; Sheila G. Combs, Certified Director of Music and Education; and Sally Jo Foster Gibson, Certified Director of Music. These are lay persons who are set aside for special ministries within the

church. This relationship was granted and the report was adopted.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN: Marie Jordan, president, stated that a person has to intentionally want to be a member of the UMW. She presented goals, stating that approximately 11,000 women in this Conference are members, re resenting 20% of the women in the church. A total of \$14,000,000 was spent by United Methodist Women in missional work with 33,9% of the budget of the Board of Global Ministries coming from the UMW.

UNITED METHODIST YOUTH: David Moose presented Susan Brown, president of the Conference Council on Youth Ministries, who spoke of the projects and program, She announced the Senior High Youth Assembly and the

new and successful Junior High Youth Assembly.

BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY: Leonard Byers presented the following to be granted superannuate status, full connection: Robert E. L. Bearden, Charles W. Lewis, Thurston Masters, Gaither A. McKelvey, Charles P. Reed, B. W. Stallcup, and Harvey Hazelwood. The Board of Pensions joined with the Board of Ordained Ministry in recognizing the service of these retirees. The Conference voted to grant them supernumerary status.

ORDER FOR RECESS: Announcements were made and the session was

recessed for the preparation for the Memorial Service.

THE SERVICE OF CELEBRATION AND COMMEMORATION: The Liturgist was Ellsworth Watson; the Worship Leader was James Barton; the Soloist was Ronda Haltom; the Trombone Soloist was Carlos Summers; the Organist was Mrs. Patty Skoog. The Preacher was Maurice Lanier. Those memorialized were: Elmus C. Brown, Charles A. Crossno, Williard (Bill) L. Douglas, Clyde Thomas Parsons, Earnest E. Stevenson, General Grant Troupe, James Southerland Upton, Edward T. Wayland, Walter J. Williams, Corinne C. Covington Connell (wife of R. E. Connell), Mayme P. Johnson (widow of Grover C. # Third Day—Morning Session June 8, 1977

DEVOTIONS: The Liturgist was Mona Travis, The Speaker was Bishop Hicks, The opening hymn was "O For A Thousand Tongues to Sing,"

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Mouzon Mann requested that the Arkansas Methodist print Bishop Hicks' devotionals.

ANNOUNCEMENTS were made by the Conference Secretary.

COKESBURY: Sam Allbright, representative from Cokesbury, presented the Conference with a Study Kit, "How to Enrich your Worship," and a check for \$4,317.74 to go into the conference Pension Fund. This is our conference share of the profits earned by Cokesbury.

ORDER OF THE DAY: Joel Cooper moved that the report of C. F. A. be heard at 3 P. M. It was so ordered.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE: Victor Nixon explained procedure to be followed on the ballot.

TELLERS ELECTED: Andy Hall nominated as tellers: Leonard Byers, chairperson, James Linam, Kenneth Renfroe, Phil Hathcock, Fern Cook, Gene Brand, Buddy Arnold, Laura Casteel, Marvin Gaither, Sam Lehr. Elected.

BALLOTS: All candidates were introduced and the ballots were taken.

STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN: Mary Ellen Jesson reminded us that though we have made strides in women's rights, we still have a long way to go. A budget change was presented. Report adopted.

LAY LIFE AND WORK: Bob Cheyne presented report and called attention to items in Pre-Conference report. He designated October 8 and 9 as a special time for laity. On October 8 there will be a Lay Rally somewhere in central Arkansas. A task force will be appointed to plan this event. October 9 is Laity Day. Every United Methodist Church will have a lay speaker. The Council on Lay Life & Work will sponsor an "awareness session" for the Council on Ministries and Cabinet. Report adopted.

UNITED METHODIST MEN: Bob Cheyne made the report for Dr. Mannasmith. The two speakers for the Laymen's Retreat at Mt. Sequoyah on August 6 and 7 are Bill Kirby and John Lundy. He encouraged participation in the "Purdue '77" Rally. Reported adopted.

INSTITUTIONAL RÉPRESENTATIVES:

Perkins School of Theology: Dr. Quillian represented the school and expressed appreciation for the Conference's support. He stated that we have moved to the "our seminary" concept, not the pastor's school. Laity are becoming aware of the needs for theological education.

Aldersgate: Mabel Harris brought greetings from Aldersgate, and described it as an arm of the church that cuts across racial and denominational lines.

Methodist Hospital: Nell Barling presented Henry Hottum, Administrator of the hospital. She presented to him a plaque in behalf of this conference as an expression of our appreciation for his many years of service to this institution. Jim Brown, who will be the administrator of the new Methodist Hospital North, spoke of the ongoing programs of the hospital.

Methodist Nursing Home & Village: E. L. Smith, Administrator, expressed appreciation to the Conference for its continued support. He reported that the recent financial campaign had been reached and oversubscribed \$2,000.

Methodist Children's Home: Joe R. Phillips, Jr., Administrator, stated that

the immediate priorities for the Methodist Children's Home are:

1) The securing of a regular license from Arkansas Social Services for the operation of a residential child care facility in the State of Arkansas.

2) The securing of accreditation from the Association of Health and Welfare Ministries of the United Methodist Church.

3) To qualify the United Methodist Children's Home for full membership in the Child Welfare League of America.

Scarritt College: Bob Gentry spoke for the college, sharing with us their exciting success financially. They have reached their challenge grant. Contributions from this conference were \$11,250 this year, which more than doubled last year's gifts. Of the 109 graduates this year, 3 were from Arkansas and another chose to work in Arkansas.

Community Methodist Hospital, Paragould: Mack Harbour, Administrator, explained that this hospital is owned by the City of Paragould but is under a long-time lease to the Community Methodist Hospital Corporation. It is accredited by the Association of Health and Welfare Ministries of the United Methodist Church.

**Lydia Patterson Institute:** Dr. Noe Gonzales expressed appreciation to the conference for its support.

Arkansas Council of Churches: Frances Wood spoke of the three ecumenical conferences sponsored by the Council at Mt. Sequoyah, St. John's Seminary, and Little Rock.

Hendrix College: Jim Major brought greetings. This was the year that the Hendrix Story was told in district convocations throughout the State. Hendrix is a strong school because of the continued support of the Alumni and the church. They expect to have a balanced budget this year.

Mt. Sequoyah: Lee Cate, superintendent, presented his wife, Sally. He stated that Mt. Sequoyah must count on the support of the church. There is a

growing program with this year's participation the largest in 8 years.

Philander Smith College: Dr. Tom Slinkard, professor of history at the college, spoke of new programs and the promise of a new building. He stated that the "Sunday College" program is going well. 98% of the student body is black.

Arkansas Christian Civic Foundation: Ed Harris, executive director, spoke of the expanding purpose: alcohol, narcotics, gambling, pornography. He presented Henry Goodloe as a past executive director.

Memphis Theological Seminary: W. E. Knickbocker, a United Methodist minister and a professor of Methodist history and polity, represented the seminary. He announced that the Candler School of Theology will begin this fall conducting its doctor of ministry program on this campus.

Commission on Chaplains: James P. Richards from the Division of Chaplains and Related Ministries of the Board of Higher Education and Ministry, was presented to the conference. He spoke of the work of the chaplains present.

Greetings: Chaplain Bob Howerton, unable to attend conference, sent greetings in a letter which was read. The Conference Secretary was instructed to reciprocests to this and other greetings received.

reciprocate to this and other greetings received.

REPORT OF BALLOT: Election, trustee of Methodist Hospital, trustees, terms to expire 1980: Joe Dugan and Ezra Coe. No election on either clergy or laity ballot for Committee on Nominations. The bishop asked the conference to vote to set aside the majority rule and to accept the two persons receiving the highest number votes. Joe Wilkerson moved that this be done for the clergy vote. Seconded. So ordered. Mary Ellen Jesson moved that the same rule apply to the laity. Seconded and passed. Clergy, 1981: Max Whitfield and James Keith; Laity, 1981: Ann Jackson and Matt Ellis. The election for the Methodist Hospital

trustee was questioned. Nell Barling stated it was her understanding that the Methodist Hospital rules required that a woman be elected to replace a woman. Bishop Hicks deferred action until contact can be made with the hospital.

CAMPS AND CONFERENCES: Wayne Clark presented the cause of Nawake Camp. Dr. Charles Stott, Camp planner and Consultant, presented the long range proposed plan of development and spoke of this camp in light of man's growing need for fulfilling his leisure time. Jim McKay proposed that we leave the 1,000 acres alone as unspoiled wilderness. Bob Edwards spoke in favor of the development plan. J. D. Lawrence asked that we leave it alone, that we can rent motels across the world. Wayne Clark moved the adoption of the plan and it was seconded. Wayne Jarvis stated that he suspected that the adoption of this plan would eventually lead to our spending \$10,000,000 for its development. Bill Wilder suggested that this plan would give the committee guidance. The plan was adopted. The entire report was adopted.

PROPOSED STANDING RULE CHANGE: Sam Teague presented a proposed Standing Rule No. 24 which must lay on the table overnight for consideration.

"Each year the Conference Council on Ministries will determine the number of additional lay persons, if any, to be named and will notify each District Council on Ministries of the number of persons to be named by it, according to the following formula with top priority to be given to Number 1, etc.:

1. Officers of the Conference Council on Lay Life and Work.

- Conference United Methodist Women officers within the bounds of a district.
- 3. Elected Chairpersons for conference boards and agencies.
- 4. Elected lay persons to general and jurisdictional boards and agencies.

5. Lay delegates to general and jurisdictional conferences.

- 6. District Lay Leaders and District Presidents of United Methodist Women.
- 7. Lay members of conference boards and agencies.
- 8. One additional youth from each district.
- 9. Inclusiveness of Ethnic Minorities.
- 10. At-large district representatives."

## Third Day-Afternoon Session

ST. PAUL SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY—Dr. William McElvaney, spoke in behalf of the seminary, expressing appreciation for the continued support given by this conference.

BOARD OF PENSIONS: Tom Weir announced that the annuity rate for this year will be \$78. He stated that pensions is a missional priority in the thinking of the Board of Pensions. We are in the business of mission to those who are retired. Report was adopted.

COMMITTEE ON NOMINATION: Victor Nixon explained that the rules of the Methodist Hospital requires a woman to be elected to the position of trustee. He moved that the election of the trustees for the Methodist Hospital in Memphis held this morning be declared invalid. Seconded and passed. The floor was opened for nominations for two trustees—one man, one woman. Henry Ezra Coe and June Spotts were nominated and elected by acclamation. He further moved that the list of trustees submitted by agencies who elect their own trustees, be affirmed. So ordered.

Nomination for Board of Church and Society, Human Relation Chairperson—Robert Felder.

# Report

Jon Guthrie presented the remainder of the report and moved its adoption. Seconded. (See Board of Ordained Ministry Report.) Jim West proposed two amendments to the Board of Ministry report:

Under No. 1, page 45, general provisions add letter 'E'

That a special offering be taken on Ministry Sunday each year and that this offering be used for the sole purpose of aid to ministerial students.

No. II, page 45, Policy and Program, under section A-2

That No. 2 be deleted entirely and be replaced with-

"For financial assistance to college and seminary students enrolled in colleges and seminaries approved by the University Senate, or accepted by our Annual Conference, who meet the following requirements. (Priority shall be given (1) to persons attending United Methodist Seminaries (2) persons attending other accredited seminaries (3) college students who have completed ½ their requirements for graduation."

Jim West requested that No, II not be acted upon unless No, I is adopted.

Joel Cooper moved that this be referred back to the Board of Ordained Ministry. Approved. With the deletion of the two items in question the remainder of the report was adopted.

ORDER OF THE DAY: C. F. & A. REPORT NO. 2—Joel Cooper stated that the C. F. & A. wants to help the conference fund its programs but that we have to pay for what we get. They feel the responsibility of helping the conference face its financial situation. Wayne Jarvis moved the adoption of Item I, page 34 of the Pre-Conference Journal, as amended; Item II; Item III, Sections A, B, and C; and Item IV. Seconded, Joe Wilkerson recommended that the Lydia Patterson Institute not be an Advance Special but that it be a line item for \$11,775. Discussion followed. The question was called for and the amendment was defeated. Sam Teague moved that line 14, page 36, be changed from \$1000 to \$4000. Seconded. Jim Beal spoke for the motion, explaining that the Office of Pastoral Care in the past has been funded by the Board of Ministry. At this point the depletion of funds makes it essential to change the method of funding, Charles McDonald asked about the Edwards estate providing the funding. Charles Ramsay explained that this estate money was not to be used for on-going, long range programs. The amendment carried. Sam Teague moved that we add on page 36, line 22, a new item, "Conference Priorities-\$8250." Bob Cheyne explained that \$5000 would be used for Ethnic Minorities, \$2500 for World Hunger, \$750 for Evangelism. Discussion followed. Dr. Deneke stated that for the amendment to be properly before the conference, an equal increase would need to be shown on page 34, line 45, in Conference Benevolences. Sam

Teague agreed to accept this notation as part of the report. Bob Miller, layman from Hendrix Hills United Methodist Church, Ft. Smith, stated that his church would agree to pay half the total amount if this were passed. The amendment carried. The original motion was called for and carried. The following additions were submitted and adopted:

III. F. Page 37, Line 41

That the North Arkansas Conference acknowledge the need for maintaining monies to be used as needed for the stabilization of the accounts of Wesley Foundation, Arkansas Methodist, Church Extension, District Superintendents Fund, Council on Ministries, etc. (Approximately \$50,000.)

Joe Wilkerson asked where CFA proposed to get the money. Joel Cooper responded that it would be a conference decision. Wayne Jarvis offered 3 options: 1) reserves in savings; 2) unrestricted benevolences; Or 3) borrow from bank. Charles McDonald move to take the money from reserves. It was seconded and approved. Section III. G. was voted on and carried.

Add to Section IV.

B. All requests from institutions of the Annual Conference for funding shall be presented to the appropriate board or agency of the Annual Conference for recommendation before presentation to the Council on Finance and Administration.

IV. F. We call your attention to the action of the 1976 Annual Conference establishing the Area Office of Stewardship and Finance and the election of

a Director of Stewardship and Finance. In concert with the Little Rock Annual Conference guidelines were established and in November Dr. R. Bryan Brawner was elected to serve from January 1 until Annual Conference. We nominate Dr. R. Bryan Brawner for election by the Annual Conference as Director of Stewardship and Finance of the Area Office.

# Fourth Day—Morning Session June 9, 1977

DEVOTIONS: The hymn, "A Balm in Gilead," was sung. Mildred Osment led the Morning Prayer and introduced the Bishop. His message: "To Be Sent." CONFERENCE CALLED TO ORDER: The Business Session was called to

order.

PHILANDER SMITH: Dr. Walter Hazzard, president, spoke in behalf of the twelve black colleges and indicated that support for last year was the best ever. He brought special greetings and words of appreciation from Philander Smith.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION: Joel Cooper moved reconsideration of the ratio of World Service to the Conference Benevolence on the basis of 48,76% for World Service and 51.24% for Conference Benevolences. Motion carried, Wayne Jarvis made the motion that all increases in the Conference Benevolence budget be accompanied by equal increases in the apportion-

ments, Adopted.

BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY: Tom Barnett, chairperson, spoke of the history of the United Methodist Church's involvement in social action and spoke of the tension between United Methodists as independent thinkers vs. our connectionalism. The General Conference spoke for us in a clear voice concerning social issues, with which we must be concerned. If any individual is not in agreement with the Social Principles, then that person must work within the system for change. A correction in the Pre-Conference Journal, page 8, para. 3: change date from 1838 to 1848. He called attention to the World Hunger Area Event, the work to support ratification of ERA, the sponsoring of a Women's Rights Convention, July, 1978, and the petition to Governor Pryor to grant clemency to persons in Arkansas facing capital punishment. The Youth Tour was a success, with 120 youth and 9 adults involved. It is recommended that this tour be sponsored by the Council on Youth Ministry in the future. There will be a Workshop on Ministers' Work with Alcoholics held in November at Pulaski Heights Church in Little Rock, with funding provided by the Arkansas State Commission on Alcohol and Drug Problems. The report was adopted.

RELIGION AND RACE: Euba Winton referred to the 1968 Discipline, para. 107, reminding us of the inclusiveness of the United Methodist Church. On page

28 of the Pre-Conference Journal, line 27, she asked that Item No. 1 be carried out. On line 40, change "with" to "within." Robert Felder presented the Ethnic Church Legislative Committee Report naming a new Task Force and asking for \$5000. An intense discussion followed concerning duplication of interests and it was pointed out that the monies requested in the amount of \$3500 had already been approved. Ben Jordan moved that we stay within the \$3500 amount already allocated. So ordered. The amendment passed. Robert Felder spoke of the Mallalieu Community Center and recommended continued support of this work, Report adopted.

WHERE SHALL ANNUAL CONFERENCE BE HELD NEXT YEAR? Jim Major invited the Conference to come to Hendrix College, David Conyers

moved acceptance of offer; unanimously adopted.

PRIVILEGE: Bill Lindsey, a layman from Forrest City, raised an issue concerning the report of the Board of Church and Society. As a point of parliamentary procedure Charles Ramsay who had voted for the original report, moved reconsideration of the report. It failed. Mr. Lindsey was given permission

to state a position against too much emphasis on ERA.

BOARD OF DISCIPLESHIP: Bill Wilder referred to the Board's report and presented Gerald Rainwater who presented individuals who made reports on the various sections. EDUCATION-Charles Casteel spoke of changing methods and techniques with Christian Education. He asked for new approaches and urged us to look at new possibilities. Sharon Spurlin reported the need for more attention to Young Adult Work in the Church School. WORSHIP-Dick Haltom presented a report to replace the report in the Pre-Conference Journal, He emphasized a workshop on "WORSHIP: The People of God at Work" to be held September 8-9, 1977 at Hendrix College. In July of 1978, a Convocation on Worship will be held at Hendrix College with Dr. Bill McElvaney as the main lecturer. ENLISTMENT-Jim McKay reported on the intern program and introduced Tom Conner who will serve 3 months as a summer intern in Hoxie, EVANGE-LISM-Buddy Arnold spoke to the report and moved to consider a report from the Legislative Committee on Evangelism to amend the report in the Pre-Conference Journal: on page 2, line 49, adding "Giving emphasis to prayer, Scripture verbalization of faith, crystalizing the importance of Jesus Christ as an individual's personal Savior, yielding to the Holy Spirit," and reordering the listed priorities: No. 3 to be No. 1; No. 6 to be No. 2; No. 1 to be No. 3; No. 4 as is; No. 7 to be No. 5; No. 5 to be No. 6; No. 2 to be No. 7. The amendment failed. HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRIES: Lewis Chesser presented the plight of the Wesley Foundations in the area of finances and he urged the adoption of the budget presented, not as adjusted by CFA. Bill Wilder moved that \$5000 be appropriated for emergency needs of Wesley Foundations in 1977 and that an additional \$10,000 be apportioned to local churches for each remaining year of the quadrennium. Seconded, After extended debate on the relative merits of Wesley Foundation, the motion passed. The total report was adopted.

BOARD OF GLOBAL MINISTRIES: Nadine Hardin called attention to changes in the Pre-Conference Journal: page 14, line 47, insert Ethnic Minority Local Church. On page 15, add above line 1: "We support Lydia Patterson Institute by making it an Advance Special through 1977 and requesting CFA make LPI a line item in the amount of \$11,775.00 for 1978-80." On page 17, line 22, add: "We recommend a quarterly report of Advance Specials receipts sent from the treasurer's office to the Arkansas Methodist for publication." Rhonda Crow was presented as liaison person to missionary personnel. The toll-free phone number of the Board of Global Ministries is 1-800-251-8140. TOWN AND COUNTRY—Jerry Nichols presented the report found in the Pre-Conference Journal with a change on page 23, line 44, section 6, which should read: "To encourage church and community worker for ministries in appropriate areas of the conference." HEALTH AND WELFARE—Nell Barling called attention to the work in this area. The entire report was adopted. POLICY AND REVIEW: Charles McDonald moved the adoption of the report, calling attention to violations of Standing Rule 22 and corrections made. Report adopted.

RECESS: Conference recessed at 12:50 for 10 minutes.

JOURNAL: A motion was made that all reports be fully corrected by the Board, agency, or committee before being printed in the 1977 Journal in order to reflect accurately the action of the Annual Conference. Adopted.

STANDING RULE: Proposed Standing Rule 24, placed on the table yesterday, was called for and the motion was made and seconded to adopt. Buddy Arnold moved that we amend it to include District Presidents of United Methodist Men on No. 6. Accepted. Standing Rule 24 adopted.

COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES: Sam Teague moved the adoption of the 6 priorities on pages 1, 2, 3 of the Pre-Conference Journal as priorities of the Conference. Adopted. It was moved to call a joint session of the two Arkansas Annual Conferences this fall to consider missional priorities. It was done.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION: Wayne Jarvis pointed out that the Board of Global Ministries through budget adjustments, had reduced their budget by \$2000. Nadine Hardin disputed this. Ben Jordan moved that the CFA and the Council on Ministries meet and resolve this question. Motion carried.

BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY: Jon Guthrie presented the report and spoke against the amendments offered yesterday by Jim West. After extended discussion, the question on the first amendment was called for; it failed. Disability leave was granted to: Elbert Bruner, James Brazeale, Raymond Fisher, Aubra Hayes, Theodore Luter, Rayburn Jackson, Kern Johnson, T. B. Parmenter, Lindsey Rolland, William Watts, Frank Weatherford, and Harold Womack.

BOARD OF DIACONAL MINISTRIES: Arvill Brannon asked that the name of Sheila G. Combs be removed from the list of diaconal ministers. It was done. He moved recertification of William Davis Mauck. It was done. Other corrections were: add the name of Aaron F. Barling as Minister of Christian Education; add new caption on line 28, page 44 to read Associate in Christian Education. Mrs.

Pat Halwes approved as an Associate in Christian Education. It was done, He

moved the adoption of the report. Adopted.

COUNCIL ON PROFESSIONAL MINISTRIES: Jim Beal presented the report and recommended we continue the book exchange at the Conference session and emphasized various aspects of the report. It was adopted.

GROUP INSURANCE: Gail Anderson moved the adoption of report, It

was done with corrections.

TREASURER: R. Bryan Brawner expressed his appreciation for the warm reception since returning to Arkansas. He stated responsibilities of the new office of Director of Stewardship and Finance. The audit has been received and will be printed in the Journal. He encouraged attention to wills and special gifts.

# VI. REPORTS OF COUNCILS, BOARDS, COMMITTEES

## COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES-NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

#### STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The Council on Ministries of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church is a servant of the Church at the Conference level. It is directly answerable to the Annual Conference, and works closely with the Bishop and Cabinet, District Council on Ministries and Boards and Agencies of the Conference.

The purpose of the Council on Ministries is six-fold:

- 1. TO LISTEN—to be sensitive to the leadership of God's Holy Spirit and to be aware of missional needs of the Church as expressed from local churches, District Councils on Ministries, Annual Conference Agencies, and Jurisdictional and General Agencies of the Church.
- TO PLAN-to receive, to initiate, and to research program suggestions that are consistent with the goals and policies of the Annual Conference.
- 3. TO COORDINATE—to develop program suggestions—from the various Conference Agencies, General Church Agencies, District, and local church agencies—into a coordinated program for recommendation to the Annual Conference.
- 4. TO SUBMIT—the coordinated Conference program, with recommended program priorities to the Annual Conference for consideration, amendment and adoption.
- 5. TO IMPLEMENT AND ADMINISTER—to implement and administer the adopted program of the Annual Conference and to assign the "program" to the various Boards and Agencies of the Conference and Districts. (It is understood that special committees and task forces will be used from time to time to carry out special program tasks.)
- 6. TO EVALUATE—to have an ongoing evaluation of programs and procedures to test effectiveness in carrying out the Conference program. (The evaluation content and process shall reflect our primary concern for the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ at a personal and congregational level.)

## PRIORITIES-1978

#### I. WORLD HUNGER

During this quadrennium, to sensitize persons in the North Arkansas Conference to the causes, effects, and scope of World Hunger; and to lead each local church to identify and utilize the appropriate channels of response.

# **OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Establish a quadrennial TASK FORCE on World Hunger to be done by CCOM Executive Committee.
- Support the Missional Priorities asking in full, and strongly promote giving, including General and Conference Advance Specials.
- 3. World Hunger Task Force\*
  - ... To personalize World Hunger.
  - ... Itinerate the Conference.

- ... Challenging and enabling responsible changes in personal and corporate life styles, W. H. E. A. T. Covenant outlines.
- 4. Involve every local church in some specific action related to this goal (to be verified via one or more questions in new Charge Conference Form).
- 5. Promote annually a World Hunger Sunday and a high-visibility "ingathering" event (to benefit a specific need).
- 6. Increase by at least 20% annually through 1980 our Conference's involvement in Heifer Project International.

To empower ethnic minorities for Christian Mission/Ministry, and to sensitize the white majority about ethnic concerns.

  - B. Increase Professions of Faith in the Conference to 2,100, (8,400; 1977-80)

7. Develop a ministry to the elderly.

## IV. PARISH DEVELOPMENT

To strengthen the small-membership churches through Parish Development.

#### OBJECTIVES

- 1. Specific implementation of Paragraph 206 of 1976 Discipline.
- 2. Area Consultation on Parish Development by November, 1978.

## V. COMMUNICATIONS

To develop a program of Communications that will effectively convey to the local church and the general public the concerns of United Methodism.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

Empower the Committee on Communications to:

- 1. Enlarge A/V resources and their use.
- 2. Conduct seminars in each district in 1978.
- 3. Produce effective public media resources (i. e., radio and T. V. spots, etc.).

# VI. TO AFFIRM THE DIGNITY AND WORTH OF ALL PERSONS AND UTILIZE THE FULL HUMAN POTENTIAL WITHIN OUR CHURCHES.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

Workshops to eliminate racism, sexism, agism, and classism:

- 1. Bipolar Workshop for DCOM's.
- 2. Personal Growth Workshop for Young Adults.
- 3. Self-Affirmation for Pastors and Spouses.
- 4. Workshop on Aging.
- 5. Racism Workshop.

## EXAMPLE OF TIMELINE FOR CONFERENCE PLANNING

 By October 15, District Councils, having received and compiled data from local churches input for Conference attention, plus District suggestions for Conference partnership enterprises, forwards to Conference Council recommendations for development of 1979 Annual Conference Programs.

2. By December 20, Conference Boards and Commissions prepare and prioritize first draft of 1979 Objectives and Courses of Action; review and plan for

1978 assignments.

3. January 20, 21, Conference Council review, evaluate and prioritize proposed

1979 program, review assignment of 1978 Courses of Action, review and adjust 1978 budget.

- 4. By February 15, Boards and Commissions revise 1979 Objectives as necessary; prepare final budget requests for 1979, continue responsibility for 1978 assignments.
- By March 2, Budget Committee meet to evaluate requests for financial support of program, to conduct hearings on program budget request, and prepare recommendations.

 March 24, 25, Conference Council meet to consider, amend and adopt recommendations regarding 1979 program, with related budget, personnel

plans, and support service plans.

- 7. By April 10, Council on Finance and Administration meet to consider program budget and all other budget requests of church agencies, conduct necessary hearings, and prepare a total budget to present to the Annual Conference session.
- 8. By May 1, the Report on proposed conference program and financial and staff resources needed to implement the program sent to lay and clergy members of the conference, and to key leaders of the local church.
- Proposed program received by Annual Conference; discussed and evaluated in legislative committees; amended and adopted by Annual Conference session... June.
- 10. A step not developed here is a process of evaluation of the previous year's content and procedure. This would presumably occur soon after January 1.

The above Timeline presupposes participation in the Annual Conference program ministries development by the following components: Local Church, District Council, Boards and Commissions, Cabinet, Council Staff and Council.

The above Timeline presupposes a program team philosophy which understands that Conference program leadership is provided by a horizontally designed staff consisting of:

District Superintendents, Council Staff, and Board Chairpersons. These persons are responsible for various segments of INPUT and IMPLEMENTATION.

Two other philosophical assumptions in this design include:

1. A program role for Cabinet.

2. The Council Director is accountable and responsible for the total Conference program,

# SUGGESTED POLICY FOR OPERATING STRUCTURE BY EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF CCOM:

## I. PURPOSE OF CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

The purpose of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries shall be

- (a) to receive program recommendations from the local Churches, the district agencies, the Annual Conference Agencies, and the Jurisdictional and General Councils on Ministries;
- (b) to develop these recommendations into a coordinated program to be recommended to the Annual Conference for consideration, amendment, and adoption as the Annual Conference program; and

(c) to provide implementation for and administration of the coordinated

program as adopted by the conference.

II. A WAY TO FUNCTION AS A CCOM—FROM LOCAL CHURCH, DISTRICT, CONFERENCE—PROGRAMMING FUNDING AND IMPLEMENTATION

# A. LOCAL CHURCH-DISTRICT COUNCILS ON MINISTRIES

1. The local church, through input into the District Councils, will develop

programming and funding recommendations.

2. The District representatives, both Clergy and Laity, are responsible to present local and district programs to the Conference Boards, Committees and Agencies.

B, CONFERENCE BOARDS, COMMITTEES, AND AGENCIES

- The Conference Boards and agencies will feel free to develop their own internal policies of operation so as to initiate and develop programs and policies to be considered by the CCOM.
- The program policies and expenses that the various Boards, Committees and Agencies develop will be presented to the CCOM for review, evaluation, coordination and implementation.
- C. THE CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES IS CHALLENGED TO BE INNOVATIVE AND INITIATORY IN PROGRAMS AS WELL AS A COORDINATING AGENCY

### COMMUNICATION AND PUBLISHING INTERESTS COMMITTEE

The Communications Committee will be working towards:

- 1. New Audiovisual Catalog published following Annual Conference as soon as Mrs. Vina Calhoun and office help can arrange their work load.
- 2. Conduct District Workshops in fall and winter as District CCOM's desire on "Parish Newsletter Development and Local Church Bulletins."
- 3. "Film Festivals" in Districts to let local churches preview audiovisuals available from Conference Library and rentals from United Methodist Film Service in Nashville.
- 4. Workshops in Districts concerning Public Relations; News Releases to newspapers, radio, TV; Benevolent Interpretation in Local Churches; use of TV cassettes; tape cassettes available and ministries, A-V equipment and use for all size churches, etc.
- 5. Promotion with District COM of "United Methodist Connection," a new (to be released in October '77) weekly ½ hour tape for local radio stations to help communicate the faith and work of the United Methodist Church.
- 6. Work with emphasis for United Methodist Communications (para, 1101 and 726 Book of Discipline). Encourage each District COM to designate a person to be responsible for Communications emphasis and through the Districts lift up those sections relating to the local church "Coordinator of Communications" (para, 265).
- 7. Accomplish objective in communications in 1978 as designated by Conference Council on Ministries Priority Number V.
- 8. Cooperate with Joint Area Committee on Communications. A report on this Area Committee follows:

An Area Committee on Communications was established by a Joint Meeting of the Cabinets of the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conferences. Rev. Elmo Thomason was appointed Chairperson. Members are: Ben Jordan, Bryan Brawner, Jim Lane, Herschel McClurkin, John Workman, Bishop Hicks, Larry Powell, Ed Matthews, and Virgil Keeley.

Two meetings have been held: January 28, and March 29.

It was noted during the first meeting that much of the existing communication is aimed at informing the rest of the Church about program of a given board or agency and that it is uncoordinated and fragmented in that several agencies do their own public relations, interpretation and distribution, with little or no coordination through the offices of the Councils on Ministries of the Conferences,

Bishop Hicks urged that any program of developing improved communi-

cations be thought of as an Area concern; that this Committee help agencies, boards, and councils to center in on "what do we want to communicate?" and "with whom do we want and need to communicate?" and "how do we best do that?" He indicated his belief that the development of a strong Council office in each Conference is the solution, insofar that boards and agencies would be extension of that Council. He felt that the Council has to coordinate this interpretation and distribution.

Bishop Hicks further stated that this might develop to where there would be the need of an Area executive who would carry the portfolio for coordinating and directing such a program of communication. He stressed his belief that such a program should be developed in such a way that The Arkansas Methodist would not of necessity lose its distinctiveness, its independence, but rather see itself, and be understood, as a part of the whole.

During the March meeting a stress was given that the Headquarters Building needs to be developed as a "Media-Center." That there is need for a centralized source for public media releases for the two Conferences and that work on coordination needs to be stressed between all offices in the Headquarters Building. A weekly staff meeting of Conference Executive personnel in the two Council on Ministries Offices, Editor of Arkansas Methodist, and Area Treasurer convened each Monday morning by our Area Bishop was a suggestion. News releases could be discussed, and responsibility designated at such staff meetings.

Needs for consolidation of a phone system in the Headquarters Building was discussed with a group phone speaker and the possibility of a WATS line. Carr Dee Racop, Little Rock Conference Associate Director, was asked to contact the phone company to request of them a feasibility study and recommendation as to the phone arrangements and possibilities along with cost.

The Committee will meet on call to continue to look at needs and ways to facilitate an effective communications program in our two Conferences.

Divisions of concern with the Committee on Communications are Public Media (Newspaper, Radio, TV, including Public Relations), Program and Benevolence Interpretation, Production and Distribution of materials (including A-V library), Communication Education and Field Service.

#### BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

The mandate of the Board of Church and Society is "to relate the gospel of Jesus Christ to the members of the church and to the persons and structure of the communities and world in which they live. It shall seek to bring the whole life of man and woman, their activities, possessions, and community and world relationships, into conformity with the will of God. It shall show the members of the Church and the society that the reconciliation which God effected through Christ involves personal, social, and civic righteousness. Prime responsibility of the board is to seek the implementation of the Social Principles and other policy statements of the General Conference on Christian Social Concerns." (paragraph 1202, Book of Discipline, 1976)

Our program of research, study, and action on Christian social concerns involves the Board of Church and Society in the role of an advocate to local churches and Districts to become actively engaged in social action ministry, and to the systems and institutions of society to conform more closely to Christian principles of "liberty and justice for all."

We intend to continue to work toward the ratification of the Equal Rights

Amendment to the U. S Constitution. We urge all United Methodists to become informed on the merits of the Amendment and to work through the appropriate structures and channels toward ratification by the Arkansas State Legislature in 1979. The Board will sponsor a "Women's Rights Convention" to be held July 19, 1978. Initial plans for the Convention include a dramatic presentation of the history of the crusade for women's rights in the United States, a worship service that celebrates the contributions of women in Christian history, and speakers and discussion groups on the present status of women's rights and responsibilities. The date of the Convention has been selected to correspond with the date of the first such convention held in the U. S. at the Wesleyan Chapel in Seneca Falls, New York, on July 19, 1848. The event will launch our formal campaign to have the Equal Rights Amendment ratified in Arkansas in 1979.

Along with other agencies of the Church, we plan to continue emphasis on the problem of world hunger and the food crisis. Local churches in our Conference have responded to this problem with creativity and enthusiasm, and both the General Church and the Conference Council on Ministries have made world hunger a major priority of ministry in 1978. Our Board is cooperating with the Board of Global Ministries to sponsor a Conference workshop in 1977, and we are planning to promote a "World Hunger Sunday" on Thanksgiving this year and next. We want to remind United Methodists who have become sensitized to problems of world hunger that people are hungry in the United States, too. Close to twenty-six million people in our country fall below the government's established "poverty line." While the crisis in hunger around the world is immensely complex, the main problem at home is an economic one, and the Church needs to address the hunger problem at home as well as around the world.

We plan to devote much of our time and energy to the promotion of the Social Principles of our Church. We remind local churches and leaders that the Discipline recommends that the Social Principles "be constantly available to United Methodist Christians" and "emphasized regularly in every congregation." and that "our Social Creed be frequently used in Sunday worship." We plan to promote the Social Principles through District workshops sponsored by the Board and by the dissemination of literature produced by the General Board. We will produce a collection of sermons from ministers in the Conference addressing social issues, to be available at Annual Conference in 1978 and to be distributed to ministers and leaders in social concerns in local churches.

We will continue to conduct a program of research, education and action and to provide forthright witness on the wide range of issues confronting the Church and the society as set forth in the Social Principles.

In addition to these areas of ministry, we are interested in two matters of policy and structure within our Church. (1) At the urging of our Board, the Council on Ministries has authorized a task force to review and revise the questions asked of local congregations in the Charge Conference. Since the Charge Conference is the basic unit in the connectional system of our Church and provides the only point of accountability for the mission and ministry of the local church with respect to the United Methodist Church in general, we seek to have the Charge Conference report on the program of the charge in the past year relating to social concerns and involvement and establish goals for the ensuing year in social action ministry. (2) We have formed a task force within the Board to study our relationship to the Christian Civic Foundation and to seek to broaden our involvement in Christian civic affairs through alternative programs. The task force will report to the 1978 Annual Conference.

Finally, we are trying to organize a network connecting local churches and the Board of Church and Society in an effort to better organize our Church for response to emerging social issues within our state, nation and world, and to keep our local churches better informed on the issues of Christian social concern that confront the Church and society and require a response from United Methodist Christians.

#### BOARD OF DISCIPLESHIP

The purpose of this report is to give the North Arkansas Conference a brief understanding of what the Board of Discipleship is doing in 1977, and hopes to accomplish in 1978. The report may be changed and summarized, or used in its

entirety for the pre-conference Digest.

The Board of Discipleship is made up of six basic committees: Evangelism, Education, Enlistment, Worship, Higher Education and Campus Ministry and Stewardship. Though most of its work is done by the various committees, the Board seeks to be more than the summation of its parts. The Board has adopted as its quadrennial theme: MAKE OF ALL DISCIPLES from Matt. 28:19, and hopes to utilize the theme in carrying out the work of its six areas of responsibility.

The BOARD is suggesting five basic priorities in its work for 1978:

1. A Conference-wide effort to work the Comprehensive Plan of Evangelism.

2. A strong emphasis on Decision Point, Church School.

- A Conference involvement of pastors and laymen in the proposed WORK-SHOP ON WORSHIP.
- 4. Supporting and improving the INTERN PROGRAM.

5. ESTABLISH Campus Ministries on a sound basis.

IN EVANGELISM, the Workshops on Methodist Beliefs have proved helpful, and a follow-up Lab program on Confirmation is in the making. At present we are cooperating with the Little Rock Conference in the Statewide emphasis on Prayer and the Devotional Life.

In 1978, we will begin to study intently The Comprehensive Plan of Evangelism, and hope to implement this in its entirety by 1980. Meanwhile, we will emphasize Visitation Evangelism. The Committee has set a goal of an increase of members received on profession of faith to 2100 for the year

and 8400 for the Quadrennium.

The Committee hopes to develop a better communication and cooperation between blacks and whites in the whole area of evangelism.

The Committee will ask the Arkansas Pastors School to consider an indepth study on the Trinity with special concern about the Holy Spirit to be held at Pastors School.

EDUCATION is carrying on numerous projects which are a part of the on-going program of training and development in the Church School and its leader-

ship.

YOUNT ADULT WORK—a special personal growth conference for young adults—its content to be Self Awareness amidst a theology of grace, and the development of a constructive openness to others. It was strongly suggested that Kenneth Mitchell be asked to lead this—and that we work out some arrangement that while he is in Arkansas we might get him to lead a workshop for pastors and leading laymen on "How to Turn on Your Local Church." The Board asked CFA set aside \$900 for this Personal Growth Seminar.

Each of the Coordinators (which are lightly attached to our Board) made report of activities in their fields of work. Of special interest is the Innovative Ministries Priority of a program for youth entitled "Preparing for Life-long Relationships"—aimed primarily at older youth with a focus on Getting Ready for Marriage. In 1978, it is hoped to have 1-2-3

workshops in various areas of the Conference—involving local youth and counselors in training and leadership—not only developing present leaders, but hopefully guiding present youth toward future leadership.

We hope to have several workshops for the Small Church which will help train and develop leaders. The number of events already planned or in the process of planning for children, youth, and adults are too numerous to mention.

ENLISTMENT: This Committee has the job of training youth for the job of summer youth worker, and of helping churches and schools know about

Christian vocations possible for youth.

Its major job at present is the developing of a Summer Intern program in which a young person works under the direction of a pastor to discover his aptitude, or lack of it, for the ministry. This person is not to be confused with the regular summer youth worker. The Committee pays \$200 a month during the summer months, and the local church pays \$200. It must be noted that the intern is primarily a "learner" rather than a "doer," and will perhaps be a burden to the pastor. But the program has real possibilities—and the Committee hopes to place three interns this summer.

WORSHIP: The goal of the Committee on Worship is to increase awareness of the meaning of Christian worship and practices within the Methodist

tradition.

Like the calendar of the local church, the Conference Committee on Worship has many tasks to perform routinely, including planning the worship experiences of the Annual Conference, Pastor's School and other

meetings where worship experiences are appropriate.

One activity helpful in meeting the goals of the Worship Committee and an expressed need of both clergy and laity in the conference will be offered this fall. The Committee on Worship has completed plans for a '77 Workshop entitled "Worship: The People of God at Work," to be conducted at Hendrix College, September 8-9. The Workshop will feature Dr. Roger Deschner, Perkins School of Theology, S. M. U., Dallas, Texas. Dr. Deschner is an ordained minister and a musician. He is very interested in communication between laity and clergy. The September Workshop is designed to aid ministers, church musicians, chairpersons of the work area on worship, lay speakers, and lay leaders. A leaflet with information concerning the workshop is available at this conference.

The Committee on Worship is gathering data and will make available to persons of the conference suggested policy statements for weddings, funerals, memorial and flower committees, etc. The committee has a paper on Methodist theology and tradition concerning the Sacrament of Baptism, Additional statements of this nature are being produced.

The committee is in the process of creating a bibliography on Worship resources and aids, prayers, confessions, calls to worship, words of assurance, benedictions, pastoral prayers, etc. and we invite persons in the conference to submit material to the committee for inclusion in the

publication.

Two persons from the Conference Committee on Worship will attend a National Convocation on Worship, Music and other arts in July. Not only is the National Convocation a learning experience for the participants but it is also a time when selection will be made for leadership for the '78 Convocation on Worship in the North Arkansas Conference which will be held July 13-15, 1978, at Hendrix College.

This '78 Convocation on Worship will feature many helpful suggestions in

four major areas:

Dr. Bill McElvaney, President of St. Paul School of Theology, Kansas City, Mo., has accepted the invitation of the committee to be the featured lecturer and will unify the areas and make the various experiences cohesive. Convocation '78 will involve other national United Methodist worship leaders.

We also urge United Methodist ministers to familiarize themselves with the new Ecumenical Lectionary Preaching series and the Proclamation Commentaries. These materials are available in the Cokesbury display at

this conference.

#### HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY:

1. Recommends the continuation of support of Hendrix College, and the goal of \$149,800 per year for the quadrennium.

2. Support of Philander Smith and the Black College Fund.

a. The Chairman has been asked to name 3 persons to serve on the Advisory Committee of the Sunday College at Philander Smith.

b. To make the Conference better aware of the yearly scholarship of \$750 to a person in the North Arkansas Conference to attend Philander Smith.

3. To urge the Churches to support the work of Scarritt College in Nash-

ville, Tennessee, by a gift of \$10 annually.

4. Move that the Annual Conference allocate \$5000.00 for the emergency needs of the Wesley Foundations during 1977, with these funds to be distributed: \$2000.00 to UCA, \$1750.00 to ATU and \$1250.00 to ASU. An additional \$10,000.00 shall be apportioned to the local churches for each remaining year of this quadrennium to be distributed: \$4000.00 to UCA, \$3500.00 to ATU, and \$2500.00 to ASU each year of the quadrennium.

#### UNITED METHODIST WOMEN 1976

The Theme for 1976 "The Past Speaks—The Future Beckons" has been indicative of this year for United Methodist Women as we have worked to implement the seven goals set forth at the 1976 Annual Meeting where six new officers joined the executive team.

The first major activity following Annual Meeting was the West Gulf Regional School of Christian Mission held on Mt. Sequoyah, June 14-18. Focus for the school was based on the work of the National, World and Women's Division of the Board of Global Ministries. Studies were: "The Gospel of Mark," "The Nations of Southern Africa: Dilemma for Christians" and "People and Systems."

Attendance was down slightly for the Arkansas School of Christian Missions, Hendrix College, Conway, Arkansas July 28 through August 1 but enthusiasm made up for the lack of numbers. Conference officers led an Officers Training Event during this school. The studies were the same as those at the Regional School.

Conference President, Mrs. Harold Womack, attended the World Federation of Methodist Women at the World Methodist Conference, Dublin, Ireland, August, 1976.

One of the highlights of the year was the Legislative Training Event held in Jacksonville, Arkansas, September 10-11, with each District sponsoring at least five participants.

The Conference sponsored a Spiritual Growth Retreat, September 25-26 at Aldersgate Camp. It was open to all local members and District and Conference officers and was under the directorship of Mrs. D. C. Neal, Mission Coordinator of Christian Personhood, Mrs. Faye Matthews from Texas Northwest Conference was the retreat leader using the book "Living Thru Loving" a periphrase on several of the books of the New Testament, Approximately sixty-five women participated in this event.

The Conference Executive, Program Planning and Finance Committees met October 8 and 9 in Paragould with Joan Clark, Regional Director of UMW, Dallas, Texas. Ms. Clark led the committees in an indepth study of the goals for 1976. The Committees then planned ways and events to implement the goals.

January's severe weather caused cancellation of most of the Officers Training Event planned for the District and Conference Elected Leaders in Little Rock. Nevertheless, we did meet for a few hours before the snow started falling. This meeting has been rescheduled for April 23, 1977.

We are happy to report financial giving is up on all levels with the Conference pledge going over the top for a total of \$115,712.20. In addition supplemental gifts amounted to \$14,941.89.

The Conference President and Vice President along with others of the districts have participated in Church Women United.

A number of District and Conference Officers are serving on various Conference Boards and Agencies of the Church. Three Conference and District Officers attended the Convocation on the Black Church in Dallas, February 24-26, 1977.

This Bicentennial year has given us an opportunity to reflect on the UMW work of the past but more important to look to the future to more effective ways of implementing our Christian faith through sharing of God's love to us with others on the local, district and conference level and ever expanding out to reach around the world with His gifts and call to all mankind.

#### COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRY

Significant growth in program is occurring via 1) initiation in 1976 of a Conference Assembly for Junior Highs (90 youth, three days, at Hendrix), 2) CCYM sponsorship of the Conference Youth Tour to New York and Washington, D. C. beginning in the Fall of 1977, /the 1976 Tour of 120 youth was led by the Conference Youth Coordinator but sponsored by the Board of Church and Society/and 3) involvement in the bi-annual Convocations of the new National Youth Ministry Organization of United Methodism. Continued programming includes the Conference Youth Rallies and Senior High Youth Assemblies, plus distribution of 70% of Youth service Fund monies.

Last year's Y. S. F. projects, from North Arkansas youth, were 1) support of Mallalieu Community Center in Fort Smith (\$300); 2) assistance with a work project in Helena (\$200); and 3) college tuition for a Mexican student dedicated to a bi-lingual educational ministry with her people (\$450). U. S. F. total for 1976 was \$3017. Thirty percent supports nationally-funded programs and projects; 46% will be funded on the basis of project applications (received by Rev. Keith Goza, Box 95, Salem, Ar 72576). The remaining 22% enables the activities of our Youth Council.

At least \$5000 should be given to Y. S. F. in 1977. Will YOUR church be involved?

The past year was a testing time for our CCYM design and its members. Calendar year 1976 saw four separate coordinators! I think we passed the test. Related to this, the consistent and consciencious assistance to the Council for the last five years of Arvill Brannon has been very important . . . and appreciated. Also, Susan Brown as Youth President has served well under difficult conditions.

What should be the overall goal of the Conference Youth program? My answer is "Christian growth and empowerment." I'll not preach my sermon on that, but just say that to me it means a lot of positive—but certainly not assured—changes within and to and from the youth. I beg and challenge the leaders of each local church, district, and conference body to see that youth are included in membership, where appropriate, and that meetings are held when the teenagers can attend. And I place it on those youth to attend and to participate in discussion and actions.

### BOARD OF GLOBAL MINISTRIES

The Conference Board of Global Ministries is organized to provide for the relationship between the General Board of Global Ministries and the conference, district and local church, and shall provide for global ministries functions related to the objectives and work of the General Board of Global Ministries as set forth in paragraph 1502 of the 1976 Book of Discipline.

The purpose of the North Arkansas Conference Board of Global Ministries adopted by the 1976 session of the Annual Conference as printed on page 100 of the journal states "The Conference Board of Global Ministries shall cooperate with the General Board of Global Ministries in carrying out the policies of promoting all phases of the work of missions, church extension, health and welfare, ecumenical and inter-religious concerns and town and country ministries. It shall also cooperate with the Division of Education and Cultivation in developing an effective program of education and cultivation within the conference."

- I. In fulfilling this purpose, the board cooperates with the General Board of Global Ministries. This is done by relating to the General Board through programs in the Annual Conference and through programs of that board worldwide. Thus, we affirm the strengths of the connectional system of the United Methodist Church. For example, General Conference assigned major responsibility for program and funding of two quadrennial mission priorities, HUNGER and strengthening the ETHNIC MINORITY LOCAL CHURCH, to the General Board. We, in turn, are helping them to fulfill their responsibility in our Annual Conference, using resources which they provide.
  - A. HUNGER. Both the General Board and our Board have long been concerned with the issue of hunger—physical, social and spiritual. Presently, we are involved as follows:
    - 1. We support Heifer Project, Int. Our Conference advance goal for this project is \$10,000.00 annually through 1980.
    - 2. We are giving leadership in planning an Inter-Board/Inter-Conference Consciousness Raising Event on Hunger to be held at Hendrix College, November 12-13, 1977. Dr. Donald Ebright, our Board Resource Person on Hunger, chairs the task force for the event. We also have long-range plans for studying the root causes of hunger to culminate in a 1978 event which will challenge us to action in 1979 and beyond.
    - 3. At the urging of our Board, the Annual Conference session of 1976 challenged our local churches to get involved in W. H. E. A. T. We have encouraged Arkansas area involvement. Our Board secured enough W. H. E. A. T. brochures to supply all on the conference mailing list in February 1977.
  - B. ETHNIC MINORITY LOCAL CHURCH. We join the General Board in a commitment to help ethnic minority local churches to strengthen their ministry.
    - 1. We recommend Conference Advance Specials with the following goals:

- We support Lydia Patterson Institute by making it an Advance Special through 1977 and requesting CFA make LPI a line item in the amount of \$11,775.00 for 1978-80.
- 3. We are laying plans for the Forrest City District Larger Black Parish to have a Church and Community Worker beginning in 1978.
- We support the jurisdictional and conference Convocation on the Black Church.
- 5. We supported and partially funded the 1975-77 Native American Partnership in Mission Program for the Paragould and Northeast Oklahoma Districts.
- 6. We sought support for the Vietnamese Hope Center for Action Ministry from the general board in the amount of \$1,100, while allocating \$3,000 from our own budget. We have applied for \$1,600 from the General Board for that work in 1978.
- We cooperate with the Commissions on Religion and Race. The 1978 budget of our Board is designated for ethnic minority ministries in various programs; i. e.
  - a. Salary Aid
  - b. Mallalieu Community Centers (of which Vietnamese Hope

Center is a part)

- c. Black Community Development
- d. Inter-faith Community Center
- e. Church Extension
- II. Also, in fulfilling the purposes of our Board, we cooperate with the Conference Council on Ministries. In November of 1976 the Executive Committee of the Council assigned to our Board the responsibility for program in the following annual conference priorities which were adopted at the 1976 session. They are listed in the journal beginning on page 84, to-wit:
  - a. Innovative ministries
  - b. Ministry to the aging.
  - c. Small membership churches and new church development.
  - d. Ecumenical activities.

We were asked by the Council to give special attention to the following areas within those adopted priorities, to-wit:

- a. Deaf ministries.
- b. Cooperative ministries.
- c. Parish ministries.
- d. Jail ministries.
- e. Ministry to singles.
- f. Ministry to mentally retarded.
- g. Ministry to the aging.
- h. Ecumenical programs such as COCU.

In response we developed proposed programs with the assistance of the General Board and other knowledgeable persons in these fields. The proposals were presented in typewritten form to those in attendance at the Executive Meeting of the conference council in February 1977. Additional suggestions appear in our program reports and those of the conference council.

- A. We suggest a model for ecumenical workshops for use by conference and/ or districts and led by staff of the General Division of Ecumenical and Interreligious Concerns. We will finalize plans for this for 1978 and beyond. In-conference expense of the leadership persons will be paid from our budget.
- B. Our conference Adult Coordinator, the Rev. Jerry Canada, in consultation with others, developed models for program in the areas of ministry with singles, aging, senior citizens, couples and ecumenical concerns. These models may be obtained by any district, local church, ecumenical group or other interested persons. The models are:

1. Cultural events for singles.

- Workshops in self-affirmation and behavior modification for pastors and pastor's spouses.
- 3. Divorce counseling workshops.

4. Ecumenical study groups.

5. Listening posts (ecumenical or denominational).

6. Our chairperson for Health and Welfare accepted responsibility for presenting a program for the aging entitled, "Center of Aliveness."

C. The Director of Bost School for Limited Children, who is also a church school teacher for the mentally retarded, is in the process of preparing church school literature to be offered for use in teaching the handicapped.

D. The requested program for jail ministry was presented by the Board of Church and Society who had previously been making plans for such a

program.

- E. In the area of ecumenical concerns the following were suggested:
  - 1. A conference-wide "Walk for Hunger" on June 4, 1977 has been placed on the calendar of the conference.
  - On October 30, 1977 there will be a conference-wide interdenominational pulpit exchange.
  - 3. The conference Youth Council has been challenged to formulate an ecumenical and/or interreligious event.
  - 4. We hope to increase giving to the Arkansas Council of Churches to \$4,000 annually.
- F. We recommend a Bishop's Consultation on the Parish be held. The purpose will be to enlarge our vision of the potential in cooperative parish ministries, team ministries and of the use of Church and Community workers.
- G. In planning for new churches, a general board consultant was invited to our conference to help review plans for possible new church sites and their advisability. One such visit resulted in what is now the Bella Vista United Methodist Church. Reports of the May, 1977 visits to two more church sites may be obtained from the board or committee chairperson.
- H. In the field of ministry to the deaf we recommend:
  - The list of goals for ministry with the handicapped which appears later in this report under the Health and Welfare Committee report.
  - 2. A proposal submitted to the Council for a 1977 Deaf Ministry Program:
    - a. To hire a team or a person with training in such ministry and who speaks in sign language.
    - b. Contact deaf persons and get involved in their activities to find out how and where the church should be in ministry.
    - c. Contact persons throughout the church in Arkansas to form a talent bank of volunteers with training in working with the deaf.
    - d. Form a task group to coordinate data, evaluate and plan for deaf ministry.
- III. In fulfilling our purpose through the work of the Missions Committee, the following goals have been developed:
  - A. Provide opportunities for continuing education about world hunger with suggested programs and actions which might alleviate it.
  - B. Continue support of and encourage new forms of innovative ministries.
  - C. Encourage the development of Partnerships in Mission, expanding the concept to include partnerships of districts or churches with institutions, missionary personnel and projects supported by the United Methodist Church.
  - D. Promote Advance Specials.
    - 1. We recommend the continuation of the "Bishops Special Advance Fund" to which churches, organizations or groups within the local church or individuals may contribute for Advance Special credit. The fund is administered by the resident Bishop. The Bishop will advise contributors as to the projects for which their gifts have been used. Contributions to this fund are to be sent to Dr. R. Bryan Brawner, Area Treasurer, or directly to Bishop Kenneth Hicks designated for "Bishop's Special Advance Fund."
    - We recommend that the District Council on Ministries select and relate in a special way to one or more of the five conference Advance Specials.

- 3. We recommend publicity on the status of our Advance Specials in the Arkansas Methodist, We recommend a quarterly report of Advance Specials receipts sent from the treasurer's office to the Arkansas Methodist for publication.
- E. We desire to conduct a survey of the conference for new church sites utilizing the services provided through the General Board of Global Ministries.
- F. Education and Recruitment:
  - 1. We propose the use of a display and/or pamphlets at the Arkansas School of Christian Mission.
  - 2. We recommend that each District Council on Ministries have a District Missions Event by September or mid-October using the guidelines provided by the Education and Cultivation Task Force of our Board.
  - 3. When the Committee on Missions chairperson is informed that a missionary or persons in mission are available to itinerate in the conference, the district representative on the conference board shall be advised. It is then the responsibility of district representatives to inform the churches of the district of such itineration. A local church desiring to have the person or persons in mission for dialogue with a group may submit such request to the district representative who will then refer the request to the Committee on Missions chairperson.
- G. The following editorial changes are needed in the policies of our Board previously noted in the 1976 conference journal:
  - 1. In Church Extension Fund, page 112:
    - a. Add the word "Policies" after Fund.
    - b. Under "2.", add:

- V. In fulfilling our purpose, the Health and Welfare Committee of the board presents the following report of recommendations and goals for 1978 and beyond:
  - A. Help promote the programs of Health and Welfare as outlined by General Conference and the Annual Conference through the Education and Cultivation Task Group and the Conference Council staff. Promotion will be done for every inajor emphasis coming up during the year, for special events, legislation or other concerns in the Health and Welfare field.

- B. Observe Methodist Hospital Sunday, February 26, 1978. This will be the Sunday where you lift up our hospital and the ministry of healing in which we are involved. This will be done primarily by the hospital foundation, in consultation with the Health and Welfare Committee and Bishop Hicks.
- C. Promote the second Sunday in May as Golden Cross Sunday and encourage membership in Golden Cross of \$2.00 per person. One-half of all monies collected to be kept by the local church or district for Health and Welfare use in their community. One-half to be sent to the conference to be used at Methodist Hospital and Methodist Nursing Home. Promotion of this program will be through the Health and Welfare Committee and the Conference Council office.
- D. Designate December as Methodist Children's Home month and encourage support of this agency by the annual offering through the council office and the Arkansas Methodist.
- E. A portion of our 1978 budget goes to the School of Nursing-Methodist Hospitals, Memphis, and the Methodist Nursing Home, Fort Smith, Arkansas.
- F. Methodist School of Nursing. In recognition of the shortage of nursing personnel in most counties in the North Arkansas Conference area, the need to strengthen our relationship with our ministry of healing at Methodist Hospital and as an opportunity to provide an educational ministry for many of the young people of the conference, we propose a student nurse scholarship program as follows:
  - 1. Objective: To subscribe a scholarship in a church in each district of the conference each year for the remainder of the quadrennium.
  - 2. The Committee, in conjunction with the hospital, will contact local churches to cultivate a scholarship gift and to prepare a program to recruit a qualified student from the area. This effort will involve no conference askings or promotional expenses on the part of the committee.
- G. We urge each local church to take a survey of its building and make the necessary additions and/or changes to make the building accessible to all persons. If steps have to be climbed to get into the building, then an alternate way should be provided; i. e., a ramp or elevator to accommodate persons with physical handicaps.
- H. We suggest that each local church survey its sanctuary to determine what changes or additions need to take place to accommodate persons with hearing disabilities, and make the necessary changes or additions. This could mean a check of the public address system or perhaps installation of special equipment.
- I. We recommend that the District Council on Ministries contact at least one church, in each town in the district where there is a radio or television station, about that church carrying at least one program per week for the benefit of the home-bound or hospital-bound persons in that community. The preceding three recommendations will be promoted by the Education and Cultivation Task Group of the board.
- J. We strongly support the ministry to the deaf that is now being done in Fort Smith. We feel there is a need for this in other parts of our conference. Therefore, we propose the following program:
  - That a research task group be appointed for the North Little Rock and Jonesboro areas to determine if their program could be expanded to these parts of our conference. If there appears to be a need for this program, we propose a workshop in both areas to help persons in a

key church learn what and how this ministry could be started. Then we propose that we provide seed money for these two programs.

- 2. We see research task groups being appointed and working during this year, 1977. We suggest the names of Gladys Womack and Bill Barling for the North Little Rock area and Freddie Nixon and Mildred Osment for the Jonesboro area. By February 1978, we would have their findings and could determine the need for the two workshops. These workshops would be planned by the research groups in consultation with the church that is going to house the program, the pastor and District Superintendent. They would use persons with expertise in this field, possibly Wyatt Memorial in Fort Smith could provide some technical advise. Cost \$200.00.
- 3. We would recommend that if the research shows definite need we plan in the board budget for 1979 to allow \$1,200.00 for each area as seed money for these programs to begin, looking toward self-sustaining programs by 1980.

K. Dr. Rosalie Lawson, 1130 E. Shadowridge Drive, Fayetteville, Arkansas 72701, is an addition to our committee. She has served on the North California and Nevada Conference Board of Hospitals and Home.

- L. We recommended names of persons to be considered for election by the Conference to serve as Trustees of the Methodist Nursing Home & Village, Fort Smith, Arkansas, the Methodist Hospital, Memphis, and the Children's Home, Little Rock, Arkansas.
- VI. In fulfilling our purpose, the Ecumenical and Interreligious Concerns Committee reports the following goals for 1978:
  - A. As a continued emphasis in the conference of its ecumenical commitment we hope to involve members of other denominations (laity and clergy) in our Annual Conference and "Pastor's" School.
  - B. We recommend continued promotion of ecumenism by the District Councils on Ministries through ecumenical activities and projects.
  - C. We recommend continued support of the Arkansas Council of Churches:
    - To elect twenty-seven active delegates from the North Arkansas Conference to the Arkansas Council on Churches: Charles McDonald, Raymond Hawkins, Ben F. Jordan, Walter Davidson, Lewis Chesser, John S. Workman, Harold Eggensperger, Earl Carter, Mildred Osment, Bob Edwards, Wayne Jarvis, Arvill Brannon, Gladys Womack, Sam Teague, Tom Barnett, Ron Clark, Leland Smith, Everett Burns, Ken Stewart, June Spotts, Kathy Fadick, Myra Rogers, Mary Lou Gall, Jerry Nichols, Philip Hathcock, Kathleen Sharp, Mary Lawrence.
    - 2. That \$4,000.00 from the North Arkansas Conference be given to help carry out the work of the A. C. C.
    - 3. Promote the Mt. Sequoyah Ecumenical Mission Study, the Church in Community Seminar, the Ecumenical Clergy and Laity Conference and the Lakes Ministry.
  - D. Send a conference delegate to the National Workshop in Christian Unity.
  - E. Design and implement a World Hunger Program to be conducted at the local church level across denominational lines.
  - F. Challenge the youth of the conference to formulate ecumenical and interreligious events.
  - G. Re-open conference and local church level dialogue with the C. O. C. U. participating churches.
  - H. Establish a conference-wide ministry to parolees.
  - I. Recommend conference-wide support of Alcoholics Anonymous and its

related programs.

- J. Continue a conference-wide interdenominational pulpit exchange day. Ouadrennial Goals:
- A. Establish an ongoing ecumenical program through the Youth Council.
- B. Dialogue with other denominations about establishing a regular TV-Radio exposure in our area—possibly through the Arkansas Council of Churches.
- VII. The Town and Country Committee reaffirms goals, objectives, policies and procedures as adopted by the 1976 Annual Conference session as printed on pages 108-9 in the 1976 journal. In fulfilling our purpose the Town and Country Committee proposes:
  - A. Support for the Church and Community Seminar at Mt. Sequoyah by encouraging attendance and offering financial assistance for scholarships—\$300.00.
  - B. A plan to publish creative ideas for ministry in small churches.
  - C. To give church of the year awards—\$250.00.
  - D. To assess data received from questionnaires sent to each district superintendent regarding needs for parish development, church and community worker needs, and/or cooperative parish ministries.
  - E. Task force to plan for a Consultation on the parish.
  - F. To encourage church and community worker for ministries in appropriate areas of the conference, using General Board's package of \$12,000.00—of which the General Board grants \$7,000.00 yearly.
  - G. In October 1978, Town and Country plans a pastor's retreat to look at practical methods of ministry in small churches out of which a model may be developed for sub-districts. Ministry for singles is one focus of the retreat.

- I. A task force to study the Salary Aid Programs in our conference was established in May 1977, and held its first meeting at Jonesboro on June 8, 1977.
- VIII. In fulfilling our purpose, the conference board cooperates with the General Board by:
  - A. Appointing conference liaison persons with the General Board.
  - B. By forming an Education and Cultivation Task Force to work with the Division of Education and Cultivation of the General Board. The persons elected to the conference board by their respective District Councils on Ministries and by the election of United Methodist Women of their coordinator for Christian Global Concerns form the task force. With each district represented, the task force members are divided among different conference board committees. They, in turn, represent those committees when coming together as a task force to plan for education and cultivation of the total work of the board. The task force chairperson, Mary Lou Gall, is also liaison to the division of the General Board.
  - C. Immediate task force goals for 1978 are:
    - 1. Sponsor a "Hi-level Dialogue" involving clergy and laity for a day with four General Board members and staff early in 1978—\$800.00.
      - a. The purpose; To bring key "information" on the global ministries

of the church, to stimulate interest in the global outreach of the denomination, to get answers to questions of concern on the part of those involved from our conference, to help personalize relationships between General Board persons and conference persons, and to stimulate desires of all to participate in the outreach concerns of The United Methodist Church.

- 2. Hold a mission anniversary program at the Annual Conference by providing a display of information concerning Advance Specials, Missional Priorities, and the total work of the conference board.
- 3. Assist each district to hold a district mission event by providing guidelines for such to be distributed to the District Superintendents, DCOM chairpersons, conference board members, task force members, the Conference Council Director and the Bishop.
- Educate the conference board concerning the work and goals of the General Board through short presentations at each meeting of the conference board.
- 5. Support the Arkansas School for Christian Mission—\$1250.00.
- Print a brochure for use in local churches, district and the conference on the work of the conference board, such as Missional Priorities, innovative ministries, Advance Specials, etc.

D. Long-range task force goals include:

- 1. To involve in 1979 local churches in the understanding of changing concepts of mission and missionaries through discussion with persons involved in mission today. Plans are underway to bring in a "Personsin Mission" team to visit with clusters of churches in the conference. In-conference expenses—\$850.00.
- To arrange in 1980 for greater understanding of how money is spent in mission by sponsoring an Education and Cultivation Division/ Women's Division Financial Interpretation Workshop in our conference—\$850.00.

The Board has been allocated a budget of \$52,690.00 to carry out its 1978 program,

The Conference Board of Global Ministries reaffirms our purpose as we move toward the future. However, each year an evaluation is done. In November 1976, the board evaluation sessions were led by the national staff in region, Ms. Joan Clark and Dr. Kenneth McIntosh. An evaluation of reexamining the statement of purpose, with the intent of making any changes needed will be held November 3-5, 1977, under the leadership of Dr. Virgil W. Sexton, Planning, Consultant and Pastor. At that time, the board will prepare and prioritize a first draft of 1979 objectives and courses of action and review plans for 1978.

The year of 1977 has been a learning year for most of the present commission among some joys and the sorrow of Dr. Upton's passing. We have some very good news to report.

The new Methodist History of Arkansas, by Dr. Walter N. Vernon, is now virtually sold out and we wish to thank all of those who made it possible.

The Commission wishes to report that several individuals and groups have purchased and given the new plaque denoting the graves of Methodist Ministers to families and that these are now in place on grave markers.

The Commission knows of one of our Extension Churches which has been

placed on the National Registry of Historic Places due to the Church Trustees. This is the Cato United Methodist Church on the Cato Road in Pulaski County. The Church is on the back part of Camp Robinson in North Pulaski County.

The Commission has now a part-time Archivist in Mrs. Virginia Upton and we request that you direct your inquiries to her at 1212 Winfield Street, Conway 72032. She will be glad to do research for you. We ask that you also send her copies of local church histories and founding dates so these lists may be completed.

To help promote the celebration of our history as United Methodists we ask each District Superintendent to appoint a District Historian to help the Com-

mission carry on the Conference Program.

1. To encourage churches to write a history of their church or to update histories already written. These materials to be placed in the Hendrix College Library in the Arkansas Room.

2. To gather and arrange in the district a collection, as complete as possible, of North Arkansas Conference Journals. These are to be placed in an accessible place for all in the district to use. These should not be circulated since they may be irreplaceable.

- 3. To expand our program of placing grave markers on all graves of ministers of the Conference. The markers cost twenty dollars (\$20.00) each. We ask for the cooperation of families and local churches to help in this project.
- To collect pictures of all Ministers of the Conference and their dates of service.
- 5. Encourage each District to create a Biographical file and History on each minister with their Conference record and send it to Mrs. Upton.
- To send two representatives to our Jurisdictional Workshop, for members of the commission, in 1978.
- 7. To hold a Conference-Wide Workshop in 1978, for local church historians and interested persons, under the direction of Dr. John H. Ness, Jr., Executive Secretary, Commission on Archives and History, The United Methodist Church, Lake Junaluska, N. C.
- 8. To encourage District Historians and Pastors to send items of present interest to be put in a Daily Journal that Mrs. Upton has started for the Commission.

We are asking the cooperation of the Conference in carrying out this program.

#### COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

The UNITED METHODIST CHURCH is a part of The Church Universal which is one body in Christ. Therefore, all persons, without regard to race, color, national origin, economic conditions, or sex, shall be eligible to attend its worship services, to participate in its programs, and when they take the appropriate vows, to be admitted into its membership in any local church in the connection (in accordance with The Discipline). In The United Methodist Church no church or conference or any other organizational unit of The Church shall be structured so as to exclude any constituent body of the church because of race, color, national origin or sex. (Paragraph 107, THE BOOK OF DISCIPLINE, 1968)

ALL institutions (i. e. Offices, colleges, hospitals, homes, camps, etc.) supported by and related to the newly merged conferences shall be structured so as to include black persons for membership on boards of directors, professional and non-professional staff, constituencies served and/or services. (THE BOOK OF DISCIPLINE, 1968).

#### 1976-77

The Commission meetings have met with mixed successes and with the help from representatives from other boards and agencies of the North Arkansas Annual Conference, place these items and issues before you.

- The Commission recommended the merger plan of 1968 of the joint Southwest, North Arkansas, Little Rock Conferences be continuously studied, evaluated and upheld as a Christian commitment from all bodies concerned.
- The Commission recommends and seeks objective leadership training sessions for minority persons to prepare them for leadership roles in the inclusive church.
- 3. The Commission recommends that a "talent bank" of potential minority leadership be placed in all districts of the North Arkansas Conference, and that persons of authority encourage active participation of minorities in the local, district and conference levels.
- 4. The Commission recognizes the fallacy of an inclusive church within the larger constituency, when we are small in numbers and are separated from our brothers and sisters in Christ by a conference dividing line, thus recommends that when fostering inclusiveness where the minority constituents are concerned, all are included in the deliberations.

The Commission is deeply concerned about the lack of support given the Ethnic Minority priorities programmed by the General Conference of The United Methodist Church and shall seek ways in which to address these priorities (with the help of other boards and agencies and personnel) during the next quadrennium,

The Commission will encourage the Bishop to appoint Blacks and Women from the North Arkansas Conference of The United Methodist Church to the Board of Philander Smith College, encourage more active recruitment from all potential students to the college, and a more stable policy regarding apportionments from the annual conference.

The Commission shall seek in conjunction with the Commission on Status and Role of Women to sponsor, with other appropriate agencies of the conference, sensitivity workshops to acquaint the North Arkansas conference of its joint mission.

The Commission supports the recommendations of the Task Force on the Black Church and encourage the conference Council on Ministries and Council on Finance and Administration to become a catalyst for such a mission. These recommendations were and are:

- a. Set, "listening teams" on area basis, for the purpose of finding the lost Christians of the church and finding out what the basic needs are.
- b. Follow-up listening team report with an Arkansas Area caucus.
- c. Convocation on Arkansas Area Black Church by October, 1977.
- d. Re-prioritize budget for Ethnic Minority Ministries.
- e. Recruit four ministers by the end of the Quadrennium.
- f. Employment of Black Secretarial staff in Program Council office as soon as vacancy occurs.
- g. Consultation on the Black Parish by 1978.

h. Arkansas area Leadership Training by 1979.

i. Evaluation consultation of the Black Ministries by March 1980.

The Commission in its March meeting delved into the scriptural passages of Micah, Chap. 2:1-5, 3:6-8, 4:11-13, 5:6-8, 6:8. This is what the Black Church is all about. We are still pieces of a whole, remnants of a glorious heritage, struggling to reclaim what is rightly ours. Not in man's eyesight, but God's.

We can become a part of the whole cloth with Christ at the head of the

table.

### COMMISSION ON THE STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN

The Commission continues to work toward fulfilling its purpose.

- To develop an awareness of the issue of the involvement of women in the life of the church, the factors contributing to the present situation and the changes which are needed.
- 2. To study the extent to which women are involved in program and policy-

making decisions at all levels of the Church within the conference.

3. To formulate recommendations to the North Arkansas Conference and its constituent parts to enable and facilitate the involvement of women in the life and work of the church.

The CSRW works toward making all United Methodists in the conference more sensitive to the issues involved in the rights of women, CSRW sponsored a Symposium on the Role of Women in October 1976 at Hendrix College with funds provided by a grant from the Arkansas Humanities Program. More than 125 women and men attended this educational event.

In an effort to help all persons more fully utilize their potential, the CSRW had a workshop in February of 1977 entitled "Behavioral Change Today for Tomorrow." Efforts continue to assist with the development of women's support groups where the interest is indicated.

### Priorities for 1978 are:

- To create an openness and receptivity for women in the professional ministry of the United Methodist Church in the North Arkansas Conference.
  - a. Increased support for clergy women in cooperation with other groups such as Board of Ministry.
  - b. To work for the equal right and responsibility (for the clergy women) to serve churches as ministers in effective relationship.
  - c. To study policies pertaining to clergy couples (e. g. the right and responsibility to serve separate appointments without being penalized because they are married.)
- 2. To promote interpersonal growth events in cooperation with other boards and agencies.
  - a. Bi-Polar Workshops
  - b. Interaction Workshops
  - c. Human sexuality studies
  - d. Support groups (e. g. displaced housewives)
- 3. Initiate consultation with conference worship committee regarding the language of the ordination service.
- 4. Since 54% of the church is women, continue to encourage churches (at all levels) to move toward equal representation of women and men on administrative boards, trustees, finance, pastor-parish, etc.

# COMMITTEE ON POLICY AND REVIEW

The Committee on Policy and Review, on request of the Nominating Committee, reviewed Standing Rule No. 22 for possible violations. This rule states that no member of the North Arkansas Conference shall serve as an elected trustee of more than one agency at a time. The Committee found three such violations, and those persons were asked to resign from those positions that were in question.

The Conference Council on Ministries requested that we study the travel and expense policies of all the conference boards, commissions, and committees and bring back our recommendation for consideration of the Council and the

Annual Conference.

The Committee, after investigation and careful study of the matters, makes the following recommendations:

I. In the interest of maintaining the most exemplary sense of stewardship possible at the level of the Annual Conference, the following policy is adopted:

1. Twelve cents (\$0.12) per mile limit for travel.

2. Two dollars (\$2.00) per meal limit involved in a meeting or in transit to or from.

3. Eighteen dollars (\$18,00) per diem limit (includes lodging and meals). It is further recommended that:

All Boards and Agencies encourage (1) car-pooling; (2) block rental of motel facilities where overnight meetings are involved; (3) use of Conference or church facilities where possible; (4) consideration of assigning meal refunds to UMCOR as an expression of missional priorities.

The Conference Council on Ministries asked us to review the Conference Council on Ministries and to determine the needs and personnel for the most

effective ministry to our Conference.

- II. In the interest of more efficiency and better ministry, it is recommended that:
  - The Conference Council on Ministries Office consist of two persons as Director and Associate Director, and one person to serve as Administrative Assistant in charge of the office.
  - 2. That detailed job descriptions be written for these positions, clearly defining areas of responsibility, lines of authority, communications responsibilities, job benefits, sick leave, vacation time, etc.

If there is a resignation, death, move outside the bounds of the Annual Conference, then the Committee on Nominations makes the interim appointment until the nomination can be submitted to the Annual Conference for election, except for filling vacancies on the Committee on Nominations itself.

- 4. Because of new Disciplinary regulations it is proposed that page 225 Section A Paragraph 1 of the 1976 Conference Journal be changed to read:
  - 1. Twelve (12) members, at least one from each district, nominated by the Bishop and elected by the Annual Conference. One-third of the members shall be laypersons in lay ministry careers.
- 5. The Structure Committee of the North Arkansas Annual Conference recommends that the Chairperson of the Communications and Publishing Interests Committee (Page 220 of the 1976 Conference Journal) be made an ex-officio member of the Arkansas Methodist Board of Managers (with vote.)

- G. That the North Arkansas Conference (1) grant permission to the Ecumenical Retirement Center, Inc., to secure individual gifts through their own efforts for matching funds in the Central Arkansas Area; and (2) lend the Ecumenical Retirement Center, Inc., \$37500.00 without interest for up to 18 months from conference balances.
- H. That the North Arkansas Conference grant permission to Mt. Sequoyah to seek out individual donors, not to encroach upon any policies in the annual conference.

#### IV. Administrative Concerns

- A. In determining the program budget of the Annual Conference we remind the conference of the following procedure: (1) The CCOM determines the cost of projected programs and ministries; (2) The CFA determines the total amount of funds available for the conference benevolence budget; and (3) the CCOM recommends to the CFA an itemized budget totalling no more than the amount CFA recommends. The responsibility for determining budget priorities rests with the CCOM.
- B. All requests from institutions of the Annual Conference for funding shall be presented to the appropriate board or agency of the Annual Conference for recommendation before presentation to the Council on Finance and Administration.
- C. All persons authorized to vouch for funds shall be identified by agencies and approved by the CFA prior to the dispensing of funds.

D. All apportionments in this report shall be for the calendar year 1978 and are to be paid not later than December 31, 1978.

- E. Each Charge Conference shall declare all ministerial support. The report shall include remuneration for salary, travel, utility expense, insurance, social security, and all additional compensation paid to the pastor or on behalf of the pastor.
- F. All benevolent and connectional funds are to be sent to the Office of the Area Treasurer, PO Box 3364, Little Rock, Arkansas 72203 except the following which should be sent as designated:
- 1. Arkansas Methodist Children's Home, Christmas Offering and special offerings to the Office of the Superintendent, 2002 Fillmore, Little Rock, Arkansas 72204.
- 2. All insurance premiums be sent according to the instructions from the Committee on Group Insurance.
- G. We call your attention to the action of the 1976 Annual Conference establishing the Area Office of Stewardship and Finance and the election of a Director of Stewardship and Finance. In concert with the Little Rock Annual Conference guidelines were established and in November Dr. R. Bryan Brawner was elected to serve from January 1 until Annual Conference. We nominate Dr. R. Bryan Brawner for election by the Annual Conference as Director of Stewardship and Finance of the Area Office.

# COUNCIL ON LAY LIFE AND WORK

Mindful of the specific areas of responsibility assigned to each of the councils, boards and agencies of our Conference, the Council on Lay Life and Work has nevertheless sought to seek out the means for a better communication and participation by all segments of the laity in the mission of the United Meth-

odist Church. We feel a keen responsibility to listen to and present the needs and aspirations of the laity in every area of work and at every level of involvement. We want to encourage a greater participation among the laity who are not part of an organized group (UMW, UMM, UMY). And finally, we hope to serve as resource persons in all areas of lay work to our Bishop, the District Superintendents, Council on Ministries Chairpersons and the local pastor.

We see these areas of major concern to our Council, and have worked to

improve lay participation this past year:

1. To strengthen lay leadership on the local level. A special emphasis was put on LAITY DAY in 1976, and this will be continued in the coming year. We fell short of our goal to have a genuine Laity Day in every charge last year at the assigned time, in spite of our efforts to publish the names of speakers and participants in the Arkansas Methodist. We must have the cooperation of our local pastors to reach this goal. It is important that all segments of the laity take part, and that the concerns and hopes of the laity be a part of this expression.

2. We are anxious to develop more lay speakers and leaders through District Lay Speaking Schools, coordinated by Jim Lane of this Council. Five such Schools were conducted this past year with nearly 130 lay-persons certified. Renewal of this certification is required every three years. The assistance of our District Superintendents, working with the District Lay

Leaders, is vital to this program.

3. We desperately need to improve the lines of communication with the local church, and strongly urge pastors to influence the nomination of ACTIVE lay persons for the office of Charge Lay Leader. Too often this has become an honorary position at the local level, making our communication impossible.

4. We are actively soliciting a "talent bank" of lay persons who would accept nomination to Conference and District boards, councils and

agencies-adding expertise to their personal commitment.

5. We feel the need for a greater laity involvement in the planning and programming of our Annual Conference each year. Legislative workshops will provide one means of accomplishing this goal; but the Council has also requested that a Laity Worship Service and/or Laity Dinner become an integral part of the Annual Conference at a preferred time during the

sessions (not on opening day).

6. The Council has been asked to promote a greater involvement and awareness of the role of women in the life of the Church (by the Conference COM). An Awareness Training Session for the COM and the Cabinet was approved at its March meeting, scheduled to be conducted this coming year. The CLLW is pleased to report that its membership includes excellent balance: 12 men and 11 women (including the first woman to be elected District Lay Leader).

7. The CLLW is extremely anxious to increase the coverage given to lay activities and lay persons of our Conference in the Arkansas Methodist. District Lay Leaders and other members of the CLLW will act as correspondents whenever possible to improve this coverage, but District Super-

intendents and local pastors are urged to cooperate.

8. The CCLW is extremely pleased to report that it played an effective role in the establishment of our new Conference United Methodist Men during this past year. The Conference Lay Leader chaired the program committee for the 1976 Retreat, and the CLLW budgeted \$300 to assist the UMM in their organization.

9. A conference-wide Laity Rally is planned for October 9, 1977, a one-day

session near the center of the Conference-with an emphasis on inspira-

tional programs and laity fellowship.

- 10. Finally, the CLLW recognizes the need to more fully explain and promote the values of our connectional Church to other lay members; to promote the needs of our small churches; and to provide input wherever possible toward a better pastor-parish relationship on the district and conference level.
- 11. The Council recommended the following budget be approved for the 1977-78 fiscal year:

#### BUDGET FOR 1977-78-\$2,500.00

ADDENDUM: Since the 1976 Annual Conference, your Conference Lay Leader has attended the Jurisdictional Conference as a Delegate; meetings of the Executive Committee and full Committee of the Conference COM; the National Association of Conference Lay Leaders; the Perkins School of Theology as a Lay Advisory Member; a Futuristics Conference of the United Methodist Church; three meetings of the Executive Committee or full Committee of United Methodist Communications; two Lay Speaking Workshops as an instructor; meetings of the Arkansas Methodist Board of Managers; the first Retreat of Conference United Methodist Men; and numerous lay speaking assignments throughout the Conference.

#### COUNCIL ON PROFESSIONAL MINISTRY

Within the total community of the Church, where every Christian is seen as a minister, God calls, and the Church sets apart, persons for specialized ministries of service in the Church's life and mission, and persons for the specialized ministry of Word, Sacrament, and Order. The former become consecrated diaconal ministers; the latter are part of the ordained ministry of the Church.

Our Conference Council on Professional Ministry proposes to show how these persons, the local churches, the Districts, the Annual Conference, and its boards and agencies work together in the whole process. Six distinct steps are identified: pre-entry; entrance; training; support and maintenance; retirement; and death. We suggest a goal for each step and some objectives.

#### 1. PRE-ENTRY

GOAL: To help create an atmosphere in our Churches where God's call to "set-apart ministry" can come to sensitive and responsive ears.

-Use the program of the Conference Committee on Career Planning and Counseling and individual counterparts in local churches.

-Ask pastors to preach sermons of the theme of ministry.

-Have training sessions for members of the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations.

-Sponsor area and district programs on ministry.

-Train church school teachers to be sensitive to their role in this process.

-Ask every church to have a supply of the book, "The Christian as Minister."

#### 2. ENTRANCE

GOAL: To shepherd the candidate for ministry in an orderly, clear, dignified

manner into professional ministry.

- -Help the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations, and the members of the Charge Conference, understand their roles in the entrance process.
- —Have training programs for members of the District Committee on Ordained Ministry (very important that good records-keeping begin here).
- -Get the candidates for Diaconal Ministry in contact with the Board of Diaconal Ministry.
- —Develop an order of worship for a local church, or a District Conference, to use in "setting-apart" a person for specialized ministry.

#### 3. TRAINING

GOAL: To provide adequate training for the candidates for ordained and diaconal ministry; financial support for those opportunities; and shepherding of the persons through the training period.

- —Develop close working relationships between the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Board of Diaconal Ministry, as they fulfill their disciplinary roles in the training process.
- -Work to strengthen the seminaries of the Church, the Course of Study Schools, and the Foundational Studies For Diaconal Ministers through enthusiastic support of the Ministerial Education Funds.
- --Encourage local churches to give financial support to the minister-in-training they have helped "set-apart."
- -Maintain close ties with the minister-in-training through seminary visits, mailings from district, local church, and conference.
- -Encourage conference participation in the Perkins School of Theology Intern program.
- —Help the minister-in-training know about, and use, the Office of Pastoral Care.
- -Consider some plan to provide emergency funds, when needed, to the minister-in-training.

#### 4. SUPPORT AND MAINTENANCE

GOAL: To provide a support system for ordained and diaconal ministers so that their work, their relationships, and their personal lives can be increasingly meaningful and effective.

- —Provide continuing education opportunities—such as Ministers' Week, Arkansas Pastors' School—as well as opportunities for individual continuing education experiences. Included would be clergy/spouse conferences, seminars for new ministers, etc.
- Make special efforts to stay in close contact with ministers in special appointments beyond the bounds of the Annual Conference. (e. g. Chaplains)
- -Strive to make the sabbatical leave a real possibility for persons in ministry.
- -Continue to help care for the health needs of ministers/families through a strong hospitalization program administered by the Committee on Group Insurance.
- -Continue to strengthen the salary level of pastors through the program of the Committee of Equitable Salary.
- -Shepherd the ministers through "changes in conference relationships" (e. g.—disability) through close working of the Committee on Conference Relations of the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Joint Committee on Disability, Board of Diaconal Ministry, etc.
- -Establish an "emergency" fund; by, and for, ministers and their families.
- -Set up a book exchange, at Annual Conference, for ministers.

- -Use the Conference Telephone Network to communicate matters of mutual concern.
- Continue to provide an Office of Pastoral Care, and urge ministers and families to make use of it.

-Provide tools for ministers and P. P. R. Committees to use in being supportive and helpful in ministry. (e. g. Scarritt College's Roll Expectation)

-Work for open itineracy. Support the bishop and cabinet in maintaining high morale in appointment-making. Be particularly sensitive to needs relating to minorities, women in ministry, couples in ministry, etc.

-Continue to improve housing for ministers/families.

 Continue to improve Pensions for all ministers under the excellent program of the Board of Pensions.

#### 5. RETIREMENT

GOAL: To help make this period, in a minister's life, significant, through adequate pension provisions and close, supportive fellowship.

- -Strengthen the work of the Board of Pensions so that financial support for retirees can be adequate.
- -Support the work of the Conference Fellowship of Retired Persons.

-Make the Office of Pastoral Care available to retirees.

- -Continue to extend the program of the Committee on Group Insurance to retirees.
- -Maintain close contact with the retiree through mailings from Conference, and District, as well as personal visits.
- -Encourage retiree to maintain active relationship with local church. (Meaningful service as worshipper/participant, or as part-time pastor.)
- -Help retirees know about program of the American Association of Retired Persons.
- —Encourage active participation of retired ministers on Conference boards and agencies and encourage the Conference Nominating Committee to make use of the services of retired ministers on Conference boards and agencies.

#### 6. DEATH

GOAL: To help ministers/families in matters of death-education and grief work as the minister's family, as well as the family of the Church, experiences the death of a minister, minister's spouse, or minister's dependent.

-Provide continued pension support for the surviving spouse and dependent children.

- Provide suitable "remembering" through the work of the Committee on Memoirs.
- -Use the Conference Telephone Network to alert the conference about the death of a minister/spouse/dependent.
- -Maintain a close relationship with the surviving members of the deceased's family.
- -Make the Office of Pastoral Care available to members of the deceased's family.
- -See that provisions of the Death Benefit Program, supervised by the Board of Pensions, are made available to the family.
- -Make the ministers' families aware of such support groups as the Society of Joseph of Arimathea.
- -Encourage the use of the bronze marker, "United Methodist Minister," on the gravestone of the deceased United Methodist minister.

#### BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY

In order to perform our responsibilities as a Conference Board of Ordained Ministry we declare that we will faithfully adhere to the Disciplinary requirements in all matters relating to the Ministry, and we recommend the following:

#### 1. General Provisions

- A. That we ensure the continuance of our present program by reserving each
- year an amount sufficient for the Scholarship commitments.

  B. That the Conference Council on Finance and Administration appropriate for the working budget of this Board the necessary funds in order for the Board to accomplish its goals.
- C. That we continue our emphasis on the Ministerial Education Program and the United Methodist seminaries. We urgently request that each local church pay its fair share of the \$103,583.00 asking of the North Arkansas Conference.
- D. That those who desire to begin training for the Ministry secure the proper application forms for candidacy from their District Superintendent or from the Registrar of the Board of Ordained Ministry.

#### II. Policy and Program

- A. The funds of the board will be expended in the following ways:
  - 1. For the normal work of the board and its Registrars in the operation of the Board and in the guidance of persons related to the Board in training, Board in training.
  - 2. For financial assistance to college and seminary students enrolled in colleges and seminaries approved by the University Senate, or accepted by our Annual Conference, who meet the following requirements: (Priority shall be given) 1) to persons attending United Methodist Seminaries, 2) to persons attending other accredited seminaries, 3) to college students who have completed one-half their requirements for graduation.
    - a. Provisions for Financial Aid:
      - (1) The Board may allow basic fees and tuition.
      - (2) In cases of exceptional needs, as determined by the Executive Committee of the Board and upon recommendation of the District Superintendent of the student's home district, the student may receive up to \$800.00 in aid per academic year.
      - (3) If a student has earned credit for an equivalent of 12 semester hours in regular semester and wishes to attend summer school for the purpose of accelerating his return to the Conference, he may apply for aid for fees and tuition for summer school, the amount not to exceed ½ of that allowed for a full academic year.
      - (4) Aid may be granted for not more than three undergraduate academic years and for not more than four seminary years.
    - b. We note with great pleasure the existence of the "Charles W. Tadlock Scholarship Fund" to assist persons in studying for the ministry in the United Methodist Church. The Fund will be administered through the Section of Loans and Scholarships, Board of Higher Education and Ministry. Guidelines and application blanks will be available from the Board of Ordained Ministry.
    - c. Requirements to be met by the full time student:
      - (1) To be eligible for a loan the individual must have received both a

certificate of candidacy and have completed ½ the requirements to graduate from college or be attending an approved seminary.

(2) The student shall establish need for such aid by completing the

forms required by the Board of Ordained Ministry.

- (3) The student shall sign a promissory note made payable to the Board of Ordained Ministry carrying the following statement: "I understand that this note represents a loan from the Board of Ordained Ministry of the North Arkansas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, It may be repaid in one of two ways:
  - (a) In service as an ordained minister of The Methodist Church; each year of service being accepted as payment for one year's loan.
  - (b) I understand that, if I discontinue my plans for the ministry or discontinue the ministry before the loan is repaid in service to the church, that the loan is to bear interest at the rate of 7% per annum from the date of issue. I further agree that, if I should fail to pay the annual installment when due, the entire unpaid balance shall be payable on demand, and that I shall pay all the expenses of collection."

(4) The Board will carry \$1,000.00 in life insurance for each student of Probationary relationship in the Annual Conference. Students on Probation who desire this insurance will inform the Board

Treasurer of their desire.

d. Students are expected to provide information concerning their standings and changes of relationship to the North Arkansas Conference, to the Registrar of the Board of Ordained Ministry.

e. The Course of Study Schools:

- Local Pastors who attend the Course of Study School at St. Paul or Perkins will receive registration fees and room and board scholarships from the Annual Conference.
- (2) The Board will pay the entire cost of required books for each person who attends either of these schools. The books must be paid for by the persons themselves who in turn will send a cash receipt for books purchased to the Board Treasurer who will authorize checks for reimbursements. Books are not to be charged to the Treasurer of the Board.
- f. Part-Time Local Pastors: The Board urges all Part-Time Local Pastors to attend the Course of Study School.
- g. Arkansas Pastor's School: We will support the Arkansas Pastor's School by providing financial assistance.
- h. Ecumenical Clergy Conferences: The Board will provide 12 scholarships of \$25,00 each for pastors of the North Arkansas Annual Conference to attend the Ecumenical Clergy Conference, Scholarships may be applied for through the Chairperson of the Continuing Education Committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry.

i. Continuing Education:

(1) The Board will provide scholarships for pastors to participate in continuing education. Maximum for each scholarship will be \$200.00. These funds will be administered by the Continuing Education Committee of the Board.

Scholarships may be applied for through Chairperson of the Continuing Education Committee prior to the event and payment will be made upon completion of the event.

- (2) The Board will provide \$100.00 per District for "Guided Reading Programs" for ministers of each District. The "Guided Reading Program: will be coordinated by the District Superintendent through an approved seminary and the money used only to bring a resource person to the District at the close of the "Guided Reading Program."
- (3) We recommend that each local church or charge allow its pastor leave time to participate in Continuing Education Programs. This time to be in addition to the pastor's vacation time. And we encourage each local church or charge to provide in its budget a Continuing Education Fund of at least \$50.00 for the pastor. We request that each District Superintendent make this an item of inquiry at each Charge Conference.
- j. We recommend the continuation of the Office of Pastoral Care, on a part-time basis to be administered by the Board of Ordained Ministry. The services provided by the Office of Pastoral Care include:
  - (1) Developing a "support system" for ministers and their families in the North Arkansas Conference.
  - (2) Directing and administering two workshops, seminars, or retreats annually for the ministers, ministerial couples or ministerial families. One will be directed toward professional growth and the other toward personal growth.
  - (3) Make available to pastors of the Conference the names of qualified persons in each section of the state who can provide counseling and psychotherapy services for members of their congregations when needed.
  - (4) Providing psychological testing and personal interviews with ministers seeking admission to the Annual Conference.
  - (5) Being available to advise and consult with pastors about counseling in their own congregation.
  - (6) Providing pastoral counseling to ministers and members of the parsonage family at the office of The Counseling Center in Little Rock and at Hendrix College. The first four visits will be made without charge to the counselee, after which a regular fee basis will be established. All appointments may be made through The Counseling Center, Little Rock.
  - (7) The Director will be available for up to five days per conference year for District or Sub-District workshops on invitation by the Districts.
  - (8) Exploring with ministers out of seminary 5 years or less the desirability of a support group and possibly establish and give guidance to such a group.
- B. In consideration of Paragraphs 414.4 and 421 of the 1976 Discipline of The United Methodist Church the Board will require psychological testing of persons seeking membership in the Annual Conference.
- C. Candidacy: Each individual entering the ordained ministry must go through the Candidacy Program. It is suggested that each pastor become acquainted with the steps of Candidacy in order to properly counsel persons in the local church desiring this information.
  - A Certificate of candidacy may be issued by the District Committee on Ordained Ministry after the candidate has met the following conditions.
  - 1. Been a member of the local recommending United Methodist congregation for one year immediately preceding application for candidacy;
  - 2. Been graduated from an accredited high school or its equivalent;

- 3. Met with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee and the pastor for consultation after submitting a written request and statement;
- 4. Secured the recommendation of the P. P. R. Committee;
- 5. Secured the recommendation of the Charge Conference;
- Applied to the District Superintendent in writing for a Certificate of Candidacy;
- 7. Assigned a supervising pastor;
- 8. Appeared before the District Committee on Ordained Ministry;
- Recommended by an individual written ballot, with a ¾ majority of the District Committee on Ordained Ministry required;
- 10. Agreed to make a complete dedication of himself/herself to the highest ideals of the Christian life as set forth in Para. 67-76 of the Discipline.

#### III. Recommendations

A. We recommend that local churches give special attention to the actions of General Conference that relate to ministry. Local churches now have a much greater role in the whole process of "candidacy" for ministry.

B. We recommend that a study be made, coordinated through the Council on Professional Ministry, of the ministerial needs of this Annual Conference for

the next 20 years.

C. We urge attendance at the Arkansas Pastor's School. This year's School will be held at Hendrix College. The dates are August 29-September 1.

- D. We recommend that the study on the role of the associate pastor be continued and that the results of that study be presented to the Annual Conference of 1978.
- E. We recommend that the Bishop and Cabinet regard all graduating seminarians in the same category of appointments.
- F. We recommend that instruments be developed to evaluate the effectiveness of the ordained ministry in the North Arkansas Conference.
- G. The Board of Ordained Ministry continues to be enthusiastic about the Perkins Intern Program as a means of preparation for ministry and we encourage churches in The North Arkansas Conference to participate in it.
- H. We recommend that the Council on Finance and Administration provide funds for a 12-month seminary intern for a cooperative ministry in small membership churches of the Conference for 1977-78.

#### BOARD OF PENSIONS

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

 We recommend that the Annuity Rate for Fiscal 1978 be set at \$78.00 per service year.

2. We recommend that the North Arkansas Conference continue participation in the Methodist Reserve Pension Fund of the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church in Evanston, Illinois; subject to the provisions thereof, as begun on January 1, 1975. In order to adequately provide for this program we recommend that the following be continued:

a. Each church shall pay into the Conference Pension and Benefit Fund an apportioned amount totaling, for the Conference, \$404,000. The apportionment to the local church is to be made by the District.

b. Pay an additional \$150,000 per year, as a Pension Special, to be apportioned to the Districts on the World Service decimal.

c. Continue to solicit money from interested persons who have already exhibited an unusual concern for the pension program.

d. Cooperate with other agencies to place increased emphasis on wills and legacies.

3. We recommend there be continued the work of the Board of Pensions on Proportional Payment of Ministerial Support in accord with provisions of Paragraph 734.4 of the 1976 Discipline.

4. We recommend that necessitous allowance grants, retirement love offerings and local expenses of the Board be paid by the Treasurer, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee of the Conference Board of Pensions and the 1976 Discipline, Paragraphs 1706,13 & 1707.

5. We recommend that the regular annuity payments be made monthly in advance to the Conference Claimants from the office of the General Board of Pensions, Evanston, Illinois, on the first day of each month.

6. We recommend that the institution, board or organization paying the salary of a minister on special appointment without annuity claim on the conference shall make provisions for the pension of such person. Attention is

called to the 1976 Discipline, Paragraph 1706.3a (3); with reference to eligibility to participate in Ministers Reserve Pension Fund (MRPF) with the

approval of the General Board of Pensions.

7. That there be apportioned to each agency and institution served by a ministerial member under special appointment with annuity claim on the conference the sum of \$936.00 for the Financial Year 1978 in accord with the 1976 Discipline, Paragraph 1706.3a (3); and that said apportionment be paid to the Treasurer of the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions no later than 7 days prior to the end of the fiscal year.

8. We recommend that the special appointments be listed in the Conference

Journal as follows:

9. We recommend that notices for any claims for years of service shall be to the Board in writing.

10. The Board will not make any retroactive settlements of claims prior to the year in which a claim is approved. Excepting in the case of those who have been serving as Chaplains.

11. In determining years of service, the Board shall carefully examine and consider those years listed in the Conference Journal prior to accepting them as valid years; and any years in question shall be subject to validation by the applicant and by approval to the Board of Pensions.

12. We recommend that all approved local pastors continue to provide all

information necessary relative to their service record.

13. We recommend that the Executive Committee elected by the Board be designated in the Journal with the roster of the members of the Board of Pensions.

14. Eligible Claimants who have been retired by the North Arkansas Conference will have their conference Death Benefit Program Premium paid by the Conference Board of Pensions. We recommend that all retired ministers, widows and dependent children, who are our responsibility be covered under the HMEP policy. The cost will be paid 100% by the Board. Retired individuals, eligible for Medicare, shall personally pay the Medicare monthly payments.

15. We recommend that each minister at the time of retirement be given a Love

Offering of \$300.00.

16. We recommend that an amount up to \$1800.00 or an amount equal to 60% of the total pension payment, whichever is less, of the pension of retired

ministers and widows be designated for housing and utilities.

17. In accordance with Paragraph 1706.12e of the 1976 Discipline, we recommend that the North Arkansas Conference observe Retired Minister's Sunday on the first Sunday in November of each year. Said observance is to honor the retired ministers, their wives and the widows of ministers. Said emphasis is to lift up the importance of continued giving to the Conference Pension Program.

18. We recommend that the ministers participate in the Tax-Deferred program of the General Board of Pensions. For further information and/or enrollment forms, write Dr. Eugene Moore, Assistant General Secretary, General

Board of Pensions, 1200 Davis Street, Evanston, Illinois 60201.

19. The Conference Board of Pensions acknowledges receipt of Bond No. 12, Industrial Development Corporation of the Ozarks, along with the interest bearing coupons attached thereto, due and payable on 1 June 1986, given by Dr. E. M. Gray. This bond is in the possession of the Conference Board of Pensions Treasurer. The Conference Board of Pensions is also in receipt of a Will of a person who wishes no publicity. This Will stipulates that on the death of the person, certain portions of the estate will be left to the Board of Pensions. Both of these instruments are kept in the personal safe deposit box of W. L. Walker, Treasurer, Conference Board of Pensions, Box No. 803, Citizens Bank, Jonesboro, Arkansas.

# JOINT COMMITTEE ON DISABILITY

Recommendations to the North Arkansas Annual Conference on the policy to follow in admitting and continuing persons on Disability Leave.

- That our Conference policy be more in line with the General Board of Pensions policy of thorough medical screening.
- That we establish a continuing caring ministry in cooperation with the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry to help meet the needs of the disabled; and the inclusion of these persons in District and Conference activities.
- 3. We recommend that the Joint Committee appoint a doctor or doctors,

approved by the General Board of Pensions, to screen applicants for Disability leave after applicants have submitted a statement from their personal doctors concerning their medical condition.

4. We recommend that the Joint Committee on Disability prescribe a program of rehabilitation for each individual on disability leave if such is feasible. The Purpose being to return the disabled minister to active

ministry as soon as possible.

5. In accordance with paragraph 132b, disability benefits may be reduced or terminated by the Board of Pensions when the person on disability recovers sufficiently to engage in a remunerative occupation. Therefore, we recommend that each person on disability report earned income to the Conference Board of Pensions each year.

6. The General Board of Pensions requires that all persons on disability be reviewed each year. This report is to be sent to the Conference Board of Pensions secretary and the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry

secretary.

# THE COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES

The Commission on Equitable Salaries shall be composed of seven ministers of the Conference and one lay person from each District in the Conference, including one minister and one lay person from churches of fewer than 200 members (1976 Discipline paragraph 934.1). The Annual Conference shall elect quadrennially a chairperson. The Commission shall elect quadrennially a vice chairperson and a secretary. These officers shall compose the Executive Committee. The Secretary of Salary Aid of the Conference Board of Global Ministries shall serve as a non-voting ex-officio member of the Commission.

#### I. PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of the Commission on Equitable Salaries to evaluate the need for additional ministerial support within the Conference and to administer such funds as approved by the Conference and apportioned by the Council of Finance and Administration. (1976 Discipline para. 934.2)

#### II. GOALS

A. The Commission, through the District Superintendents, recommends that every charge receiving equitable salary aid have a period of stewardship cultivation each year.

B. It is the goal of the Commission to greatly encourage each charge receiving equitable salary support to seek annually to increase the salary toward full self-support by the charge. In established churches or charges where continuing salary aid is necessary, the District Superintendent is requested to use every wise and practical means to merge or combine churches or circuits in order to strengthen the ministerial support of that charge.

C. The Commission further encourages the establishment of larger parish programs. Where this involves equitable salary funds, such programs shall be submitted to the Commission for its approval. Where this is done, our requirements are set aside in respect to the suggestion that we are encouraging larger

parish programs.

D. The Commission shall report annually in the Conference Journal, by Districts, the amount paid during the year to each charge.

#### III. GUIDELINES

- A. To be eligible to receive equitable salary aid a charge shall meet the following guidelines:
  - File with the District Superintendent and the Secretary of the Commission by December 10 of each year:
    - a. A report of the stewardship cultivation period or a report of the efforts toward a stewardship cultivation period.
    - b. A copy of the budget for each church on the charge, adopted by the Administrative Board.
    - c. A written application for equitable salary aid. NO APPLICATION WILL BE CONSIDERED UNLESS IT IS SUBMITTED IN WRITING.
  - 2. Each church shall annually pay in full all Conference and District apportionments. The Commission may reduce the salary grant by any percentage of apportionments unpaid the previous year.
  - percentage of apportionments unpaid the previous year.

    3. The maximum salary grant will not exceed the total salary paid by the charge (1976 Discipline para. 934.8). This rule becomes effective immediately for all new applications. All existing grants (those in effect before June 1, 1977), shall conform to this guideline by January 1, 1981. All existing grants greater than the total salary paid by the charge shall be reduced by one-third of that excess each year until the guideline is met.
  - 4. A charge may qualify for equitable salary aid within the first three months of the Conference Year provided that it meets the above requirements. If approved for equitable salary aid, the aid may become retroactive to the beginning of the Conference Year.
  - 5. It is the responsibility of the District Superintendent to report to the Secretary of the Commission any changes in salary or ministerial status of persons receiving equitable salary aid.
- B. The Commission shall operate by the following additional guidelines:
  - 1. With the exception of students, part-time pastors are not eligible to receive equitable salary funds.
  - Retired ministers are not eligible to receive equitable salary funds. (1976 Discipline para, 434.7)
  - Between meetings of the Commission all applications must meet the approval of the Executive Committee.
  - 4. While establishing churches in unique situations may not come under a strict definition of eligibility for equitable salary aid, in light of paragraph 934.9 in the 1976 Discipline we feel the necessity of responding to these situations and needs in as far as funds will allow and where these needs are not met by other Conferences or District agencies or funds.
  - 5. The Equitable Salary Schedule for 1978 shall be as follows:

    - c. Resident College Student Pastor. . . . . . . . . . . . . 6,800.00
    - d. Non-resident Student Pastor . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . 4,400.00
  - 6. Salary Aid shall be paid on a calendar year basis.
  - 7. In the event of insufficient funds to meet all approved requests, each charge shall share proportionately from the funds available.

#### GROUP LIFE INSURANCE

#### REPORT NO. 1 GROUP LIFE INSURANCE:

We make the following recommendations:

- 1. That all members of the North Arkansas Conference (except students serving appointments in, or those employed in Conferences which have no compulsory insurance programs, or members under special appointment, or retired Chaplains serving in), and every full-time local preacher receiving an appointment, shall participate in the North Arkansas Conference life insurance plan, subject to its laws and regulations.
- 2. The General Board of Pensions Death Benefit Program, Plan D, is the life insurance program for the Conference.
- 3. The benefits of this plan are based on the Average Annual Conference Salary of \$9,731.00 for 1976 and \$10,275.00 for 1977.
- 4. Before retirement, or while on Disability Leave up to age 65, the following benefits will be paid according to the age attained on the birthday in the fiscal year of death:

5. After retirement, the benefit is \$3,892.00 for 1977 and \$4,110.00 for 1978.

6. The Educational Benefit for dependent children has been raised from \$1,440.00 per year for the first four years beyond High School, to \$1,680.00 per year, with no increase in premium rates.

7. If the spouse of a minister dies, the minister will receive an amount equal to 20% of the Average Annual Conference Salary, or \$1,946.00 if death occurs

in 1977 and \$2,055.00 if death occurs in 1978.

- 8. Contributions by the members of the Death Benefit Plan are based on 1.82% of the Average Annual Conference Salary, or \$187.00 for 1978. At least 60% (\$112.20) is to be paid by the charge and 40% (\$74.80) is to be paid by the minister. This total contribution must be in the hands of the Insurance Secretary, Faye Douglas, P. O. Box 89, Marion, Arkansas, 72364, by November 10, 1977.
- 9. An open enrollment period shall be held each year during the month of December, to become effective 1 January. A limited enrollment period shall be held each year for 90 days following the session of the Annual Conference, for those newly eligible by Annual Conference action. Individual enrollment may be requested any time within 90 days after becoming newly eligible.

10. We recommend that the Board of the Ordained Ministry continue to

carry the \$1,000.00 policy on seminary students.

11. We recommend that the District Superintendents be responsible for notifying the Treasurer, North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions, as soon as possible after the death of a minister, active or retired, or spouse who has resided within the bounds of his district.

# REPORT NUMBER 2 GROUP HOSPITALIZATION INSURANCE (HMEP)

We make the following recommendations:

- 1. That all members of the North Arkansas Conference, except students serving appointments in, or those employed by other conferences or agencies which have compulsory insurance programs, or members under special appointment, and every full-time employee of the North Arkansas Conference, shall participate in the Hospital and Medical Expense Program (HMEP), of the General Board of Pensions, subject to its laws and regulations, as adopted by the Annual Conference session, May 26-29, 1969, and reported on pages 103-5 of the 1969 Journal.

The HMEP premiums are due QUARTERLY on June 20; September 10, December 10 and March 10, All insured persons are responsible to see that the total premium is sent to, Faye Douglas, Box 89, Marion, Arkansas 72364, no later than the due dates. The first premium due notice will be sent well ahead of the due date.
- 5. We recommend the following procedure when payment is not received by the due date:
  - a. A second notice will be sent to the minister twenty days after the due date. If the church is delinquent, this will also be noted. A copy of the second notice will be sent to the District Superintendent concerned.
  - b. A third notice will be sent to the Cabinet Representative of the Insurance Committee fifteen days after the second notice, in order that the cabinet may make final disposition of the matter.
- 6. A premium increase of 16% for ages under 65 and 8% for ages 65 and over will become effective 1 July 1977. The factors which determine the HMEP premiums for all Annual Conferences in Methodism are:

a. The total HMEP group experience in Methodism.

b. The North Arkansas Annual Conference average utilization rate over the last three years (106,06% under 65).

c. The ages of persons enrolled.

d. The medical costs in the local area.

- 7. The General Board of Pensions retains 3% of the premiums remitted to them and Travelers Insurance Company retains 6% of the premiums remitted to them by the General Board, to cover administrative costs.
- 8. That the Conference Board of Pensions pay the HMEP and DBP premiums for retired members, wives, widows and dependent children of retired Local Pastors.
  - 9. Some outstanding features of our HMEP program include the following: FOR PERSONS UNDER 65

a. Hospitalization: After a \$50 deductible per person per calendar year, HMEP pays the next \$500, then 80% with a semi-private room.

- b. Medical: After a \$50 deductible per person per calendar year, HMEP pays 80% of the reasonable charges for medical expenses, including selfadministered prescription drugs.
- c. PLEASE NOTE: Our policy contains a STOP/LOSS clause, which means that your total "out of pocket" expense cannot exceed \$500. per individual or \$1,500, per family per year.
- d. Also, our policy now has expanded psychiatric services, so that members may not only utilize the facilities of a Psychiatrist, but also the facilities of Family Counselling Centers and psychologists as well.

# FOR ALL PERSONS 65 AND OVER:

e. Should be enrolled in MEDICARE, It is the claimant's responsibility to enroll by completing the application forms at the Social Security Office not later than three months before reaching age 65. HMEP does not duplicate medicare benefits, but it does supplement them.

f. HMEP will pay what MEDICARE does not pay for HOSPITALIZATION up to the \$250,000 lifetime maximum. However, YOU CANNOT COLLECT MORE THAN 100% of your hospital bill from Medicare and

HMEP. Also, this is for semi-private room.

g. HMEP will pay \$15.50 per day from the 21st day through the 100th day in a skilled-nursing facility. Medicare pays for a semi-private room for the first 21 days.

h. For physicians and surgeons and other medical services, you must pay a \$60 deductible per calendar year, then Medicare and HMEP pay the rest

of the reasonable charges.

 Prescription Drugs are not covered by Medicare, but HMEP will pay 80% of reasonable charges, after a calendar year \$50 deductible. Lifetime limit \$250,000.

9. For ministers, no evidence of insurability will be required if you enroll yourself and your eligible dependents within 90 days after the date you are

eligible to enroll.

10. Local churches may enroll lay employees in HMEP between June 1 and July 15, by following the guidelines on pages 103-5 of the 1969 Journal. The church must agree to pay at least one-half of the premium. The church must be responsible for the premium until the Conference Insurance Secretary is notified of the termination of employment. Individual lay employees may be enrolled any time within 90 days after employment.

#### REPORT NUMBER 3 WORKER'S COMPENSATION:

We recommend that all churches provide a worker's compensation plan for all paid church staff members, including the minister. The District Superintendents and the Council on Ministeries Staff should continue to be covered, with the coverage paid for by the District Superintendent's Fund and the Conference Council on Ministries, respectively. Worker's Compensation plans are regulated by law and include such benefits as coverage for loss of salary, medical payments, doctor's bills, medications, disability and death benefits to minor children and widows.

# REPORT NUMBER 4 CONFERENCE INSURANCE SECRETARY/TREASURER

We wish to commend Mrs. Imogene Knox for the outstanding job that she did as the Conference Insurance Secretary from June 1974 through August 1976. At the meeting of the Group Insurance Committee on February 22, 1977, Faye Douglas, Box 89, Marion, Ark. 72364 was elected to replace Mrs. Knox. The following information is needed: Full Name, date of death, date of birth, date of marriage, dependent children surviving and next of kin's name and address.

b. HOSPITAL AND MEDICAL: Send FIRST NOTICE OF CLAIM form to

the Claim Dept., Travelers Insurance Co. P. O. Box 51, Little Rock, Ark., 72203. Please follow instructions on the back of the First Notice of Claim form. Travelers will provide you with forms for the Doctor to complete. Note: Do not give the First Notice of Claim form to the Doctor. First Notice of Claim Form is filed once a year only. Drug bills/prescriptions must have the Doctor's diagnosis the first time only—not on refills. Psychiatric prescriptions are paid on the basis of 50%. First Notice of Claim Forms are available from the District Superintendent, Faye Douglas and Travelers Insurance Co.

c. Claims for calendar year 1977 must be made by 1 April 1978.

#### THE ARKANSAS METHODIST

# I-Report

It is a pleasure to report that The Arkansas Methodist has completed its most successful year in terms of management of resources. While continually battling with inflation, we have finished the year with a balance in the bank. This is the first year in over 12 that we have not been forced to borrow money to "pay out" at the end of the year.

We have received a tremendous vote of confidence from the United Methodists of our two Annual Conferences. In 1975 we received 96.36% of our apportionment. In 1976 we received 97.93%. In 1976 United Methodists paid a total of \$88,187.53 of the \$90,000 which was apportioned to the two Conferences (\$45,000 to each). The response of the Church has been almost overwhelming. And we of the staff and Board of Managers have attempted to give leadership and management to match that kind of support.

We are continually looking for better procedures and management tools to give the Church the most service for their apportionment dollar. Some of our

recent changes and innovations have been:

1. The reduction of our staff from five to four persons, with realignment of certain responsibilities.

2. Reduced size of paper from 12 to 8 pages, saving approximately \$225.00

per issue.

3. A small reduction in rent by relinquishing some of our office space for

use by the Area Stewardship Office.

4. As a result of a study by a general-church-level Study Team, we are in the process of making format changes to improve appearance of the paper and are currently receiving bids on publishing the paper and have under consideration some equipment changes designed to effect economies.

The Board has sought expert advice and counsel and will continually do so. The nominating committees of the two Conferences have added members to the Board who have expertise in journalism, advertising and public relations. Our aim is to utilize all responsible economies in an effort to publish the quality

newspaper to which Arkansas Methodism is accustomed.

One of our first goals is to return to 50 issues a year (we plan to publish 47 issues in 1977) and the resumption of 12-page issues for those weeks requiring such volume (such as Annual Conference weeks, major events, etc.). We feel that with sound fiscal management and other procedural improvements this will become a reality in the near future; without an increase in budget.

# II-Recommendations

1. The Board of Managers continues to recommend that the cost for publication of The Arkansas Methodist be apportioned to the local churches, as determined by the Cabinets and Councils on Finance and Administration.

2. The Board recommends for 1978 a total of \$102,000.00 be apportioned to the two Annual Conferences (to be divided equally between the two Conferences or as determined by the Cabinets and Councils on Finance and Administration). The figure of \$102,000.00 represents about 95% of the paper's budget for 1978, projected to be around \$111,000.00. (That represents a decrease of almost \$9,000 from the amount expended in 1976).

3. The "Plan-of-Circulation" proposal is as follows:

- a. Any clergy member of the Annual Conference and any member of a local United Methodist Church who requests it. (We suggest that these requests be made in writing or by phone to the local church to which the person is related.) NOTE: Postal regulations require the following from each church whose members receive the paper:
- (1) The completion of a form, furnished to the church by the paper, certifying that "subscription" cost for the papers received by members of that church are paid by a portion of its members' contributions to their church. That form must be filed in the paper's office to meet Second Class mail requirements.
- (2) Some payment, within the first six months of the year, for the paper. Postal authorities inform us that if no such payment is received in that time we

must remove that church's name from our mailing list.

PLEASE NOTE: The Board and editorial staff are totally dependent upon local church pastors and leaders to see that these guidelines are followed. We urge these leaders to help avoid waste by not sending names encouraging all who will to take the paper and read it. (The amount which a local church is apportioned by its district for the Arkansas Methodist is not determined by the numbers of papers sent to its members.)

b. Conference-connected persons (when submitted by the appropriate

authorities, along with their correct address):

(1) Retired ministers or their surviving spouse.

(2) Seminary students.

(3) Ministers in connectional appointments.

c. Any subscriptions not qualifying in any of the above categories (para 3a and 3b) will be \$5.00 per year.

4. Every-Family Plan:

Churches which wish the paper sent to every member family without the necessity of those families requesting it may choose the Every-Family plan by paying a fee of \$1.00 per family IN ADDITION TO their regular apportionment. (Example: A church having 75 families would pay \$75.00 in addition to the amount apportioned by the Annual Conference.)

5. Local Church Special Edition Plan:

Local Churches are invited to consider this plan whereby a local congregation may have the back page for news of their own local church:

a. \$1,468.75 annually (or \$31.25 an issue for 47 issues);

PLUS-

b. \$1.00 per family (the "Every Family Plan"),

PLUS

The amount apportioned to your local church by the Annual Conference.

### CHRISTIAN CIVIC FOUNDATION

The work of the Christian Civic Foundation is conducted by a small staff of three full-time workers: An Executive Director, Rev. Edward W. Harris; an Educational Assistant, Mr. Ronnie P. Sparks; an Office Secretary, Mrs. Beverly Williams. Our Part-time Attorney, Mr. James Gannaway, gives legal counsel equal to that of a full-time attorney. In the planning and projection of the program, they are assisted and supported by the Executive Committee, acting as Cabinet; and three hundred Board members; pastors and church members throughout the state; a substantial and dedicated group of State Legislators. Together, we promote the cause of civic righteousness in the areas of Alcohol, Narcotics, Gambling and Obscene Literature.

#### The Alcohol-Narcotics Education Program

Mr. Ronnie P. Sparks began his work with our staff on February, 1976. A full month was spent in training. Appointments in the Public Schools began March 1st. Through March 3, 1977, he has appeared in 64 schools. 27 more dates are confirmed for the school year, making a total of 91. A few were cancelled because of the severe weather, but, in each instance, future dates were offered. Other activities included Civic Clubs, WCTU State meeting, State

Teacher's Meeting, Arkansas Baptist State Convention, Pastors' Conference on Alcoholism, Immanuel Baptist Church, Little Rock, speaking dates inceleven separate churches, four Local Option Youth meetings. In addition, he attended night classes two nights a week at UALR.

Mr. Sparks has left evaluation forms with school officials, and, without exception, they were returned to the office with expressions of the highest appreciation for the quality of work and the dedication of our new worker. He has worked untiringly, and has helped our small professional staff to become a closely-knit unit. Because of the growing problems of inflation, we have used a "Voucher" system to defray the actual expenses of our Educational Assistant. He furnishes his own car, and we pay \$.15 per mile for travel. We pay actual cost for meals and lodgings, when needed. We advance funds, as each week's voucher report indicates the need. In spite of increasing costs, we still hope to continue our program in the public schools without charging for our services. Mr. and Mrs. Sparks attended a two-weeks Narcotics Education Course, sponsored by the W.C.T.U., at Chautauqua, New York, in the month of August. A portion of his expense was provided by a \$250 Scholarship given by the State W.C.T.U. During the summer, he also spoke at 12 Church Camps for youth.

# The Arkansas State Economic Development Study Commission

The Arkansas State Economic Development Study Commission, in their proposed report to the Governor and Legislative Council, announced May 17 that their report in October would recommend that: "State Laws should be changed so that alcohol can be served at public and private overnight recreation facilities located in Dry counties." Resolutions opposing this recommendation were passed unanimously by the Executive Committee of the Christian Civic Foundation, the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, the North Arkansas and the Little Rock Conferences of The United Methodist Church, and forwarded to Governor David Pryor and members of the Legislative Council. They were published in the Summer Edition of The Christian Citizen and mailed to each Legislator. The 71st General Assembly did not pass any specific legislation that would implement the Committee's Recommendation, but the proposed Private Club Bill for Dry Counties, Senate Bill 566, would offer an opportunity for small groups in a county, at precinct, ward, or township level, to authorize such permits in Dry Counties. This Bill was defeated in two votes taken. We strongly opposed this Bill.

## **Local Option Elections**

November Local Option Elections confirmed that Strong Dry Sentiment still exists in our State. Local Option Elections were instituted by Wet forces in seven Dry Counties. On November 2nd, all seven voted to remain Dry. This sustained the record established by the voters of 44 counties in Arkansas, of voting their counties dry and never failing to vote to remain dry. Counties, and the final vote are as follows: Cleburne, 4,710 to 2,821; Faulkner, 8439 to 5313; Montgomery, 2,138 to 1,041; Pike, 2,540 to 1,196; Scott, 2,772 to 1,237; Van Buren, 3,143 to 2,240; Yell, 4,878 to 2,877. Attempts by Wets to initiate elections in Bradley and Hempstead Counties were not successful. Two new Dry areas resulted from elections in Washburn Township, Logan County, 135 to 80, and Precinct 180 in Pulaski County, 50 to 21. One township, Tyrnoza, in Crittenden County, voted to remain dry 581 to 447. Two townships voted to remain wet, Menifee, in Conway County, 70 to 51, and Greenfield, in Poinsett County, 233 to 183. A Mixed Drink Election was held in Jefferson County,

initiated by the Wet forces, and the voters rejected mixed drinks by a vote of 11,255 to 9,513. These elections leave a total of 44 counties dry, 12 all wet, and 19 wet with dry areas.

#### The Christian Citizen

The Christian Citizen, our Quarterly Newsletter, has completed a full twelve-month cycle of publication since the Annual Meeting in 1976. The Autumn, or fourth issue for 1976, was Number 7, Volume 2, in the consecutive numbering of issues since publication began. Two of the 1976 issues, Summer and Autumn, carried names, addresses, phone numbers, and religious preferences of members of the Seventy-first General Assembly of Arkansas. These issues were also mailed to each member of the Arkansas Senate and each member of the House of Representatives. We have had many expressions of appreciation from lawmakers during the current session. It is our intention to continue mailing future issues to them. Additional copies of the Summer Issue were printed and distributed, on request, for use in Local Option Campaigns.

#### **Finances**

Attached are copies of the Financial Statement for December 31, 1976, which reflect income and disbursements for the fiscal year. Substantial gifts by anonymous donors in the closing days of 1976 made it possible to end the year with a very strong cash balance. \$5,000 was transferred to a savings account, available on a day's notice, if needed for current disbursements. Attached, also, is a copy of the proposed budget for 1977. It was recommended by the Finance Committee and was endorsed by the Executive Committee in the meeting on February 15, 1977, and by the Board of Directors at their Annual Meeting on March 21, 1977.

The projection of new income for 1977 is as follows:

- 1. Arkansas Baptist State Convention, increase of \$2,250, from \$15,000 to \$17,250.
- 2. Little Rock Annual Conference, The United Methodist Church, increase of \$2,000 during quadrennium, 1977, 78, 79, 80. In 1977, a \$1,000 increase, none in 1978, \$1,000 in 1979, none in 1980. This would be a total increase of \$2,000 during the four years. The actual apportionment for each of the four years will be \$12,500 per year. The total amount increased (\$2,000) will bring the contribution of the Conference from \$11,000 to \$13,000 total giving per year by 1979.
- 3. The North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church has projected the same increases for the quadrennium, and a similar plan of apportionment and payment.

Financial reports of Boards and Agencies would be distributed on the Conference floor but not carried in the Journal. The total CFA report would be included in the Journal.

 All audits would be distributed in complete form on the Conference floor. Only a statement of acceptance or rejection by CFA would be carried in the Journal.

7. A list of Pension Payments would be distributed on the Conference floor but only the total would be reported in the Journal.

8. Once each quadrennium pictures of the clergy would be included in the Journal.

# **CAMPS AND CONFERENCES**

I. REVIEW AND EVALUATION OF CAMPING PROGRAM FOR 1976-77: A total of 20 camping events planned or sponsored by the Conference Committee on Camps and Conferences were held in our conference this past summer. We had a total of 951 campers and staff present in the experiences. We do not include in this report those churches who carry on camps and retreats through the local church and use the facilities available for camping in the conference. In 1977 there are 30 camping experiences and activities planned and outlined in the camping brochure. This includes those experiences out-of-doors which take place both on and off camp sites.

Several different kinds of experiences in camping are planned for this coming summer. Included are: Family Camps, Frontier Camps, Canoe Float trips, the North Arkansas Conference choir camp for children, several assembly-type camps, a few small group camps, and the Ozark Folk Camp. The Ozark Folk Camp is the newest camping experience planned for the summer. The Camp will be held at the Ozark Folk Center, Mt. View, and will give campers opportunities to learn craft skills and music skills. Staff of the Ozark Folk Center will provide leadership for planned morning sessions.

We find many groups using the Nawake property for camping and outings for the local churches, Local churches and groups are encouraged to use the property and get better acquainted with the beauty of the property.

The Conference Committee plans only those events and activities which take place on a Conference-wide basis. All District Camps are planning their own camping experiences and securing the leadership for their camps.

LEADERSHIP TRAINING: We are fortunate to have in our Conference many persons who have received training in National, Jurisdictional, Regional, and Area workshops outside our Conference. These persons serve as a nucleus in training other leaders for camping. We are constantly trying to find new people to work in camping. We are making a leadership inventory catalog to use throughout the Conference. This will help others know who is available and what their talents are in training other camp leaders. We will also list those who have worked in camps for the past several years.

This past April, a joint Workshop with the Little Rock Conference was held in Little Rock for all camp directors and staff. It was a first in this kind of experience and some good things have come out of it. One of the main ideas was for us to have a "fall" event for training camp directors and staff for the next summer. It was felt that we should meet over a two-day period, and that we should plan the event in the out-of-doors (at a camp site).

Many feel that we need to be bringing in new people to work in camping experiences. This being the case, we will be expanding the training experiences in order to meet the needs of new workers in camping.

DEVELOPMENT OF THE MASTER PLAN FOR NAWAKE: One of our goals for 1977 was to hire a Professional Camp Planner for designing a Master Plan for the Development of the Nawake property. On June 29, 1977, the Conference Committee on Camps and Conferences secured the services of Charles C. Stott, Conference Center Planner-Consultant, from Raleigh, North Carolina. On June 29, the Committee met with Mr. Stott and strategy plans were initiated. Planning procedures were reviewed and tentative target dates established. It was decided that the Master Plan could be ready for presentation at the Annual Conference in 1977. An indepth study of program and facility needs was carried out, taking into consideration the varied types of programs already available in the Conference in other sites.

Preliminary Site development plans and recommendations were presented by the Planner and presented to the Committee and the Bishop in a walk-through explanation on the property. Following this the Committee made the necessary additions and adjustments and refinements and then the narrative was sent to Mr. Stott to be finalized for presentation at the Annual Conference. The Master Plan has been presented to the CCOM at their spring meeting. It will be presented for final approval at Annual Conference. The Committee and Mr. Stott will be available at the conference to answer questions and materials will be available for the Conference members to study.

The North Arkansas Conference Committee on Camps and Conferences gives its unanimous approval to the Master Plan and urges the Annual Con-

ference to adopt the Master Plan for the Development of Nawake.

The Master Plan for Nawake Conference Center is a guide for us in the development of the facility. We anticipate this being one of the finest facilities for camping and Christian outdoor education anywhere in the South Central Jurisdiction. The Plan provides for a number of "use areas", such as a main lodge and several mini-lodges, a family camping area, rustic camp sites, a day retreat area, acclimatization areas, equestrian area, open play area, recreation center, as well as future resident sites. It is so flexible in design that we can develop any one part and permit other parts to wait until funds can be made available. Some use is already being made of the property with tent camping and rustic camping, and day use. Electricity and water are available for use in one area.

4. Continue to develop new programs for new camping and out-of-doors

experiences in our conference.

- Continue to cover all camps with an insurance policy carried by the Conference with Mutual Security Life Insurance Company. Each director will be responsible for reporting the number of campers and workers in each camp.
- 6. Each camp director shall set aside \$2.00 per camper to be used in training and for insurance coverage. The money will be sent to the Conference

office.

 To encourage participation in camping experiences from minority groups in the conference. And to make available funds or scholarships where necessary to accomplish this.

8. Secure a resident manager/director for Nawake as soon as possible.

To promote better publicity in the local churches and throughout the conference so that people may know what is available for them in out-ofdoors ministries.

The Board of Trustees respectfully request that the District Super-intendents, Pastors, and District Boards of Missions be informed as to the various provisions of Section V—Paragraph 1517 as to Annual Conference property and join with the Conference Board of Trustees in their effort to have a record of all properties within the bounds of the Conference in which the United Methodist Church has an interest.
  - 2. That each District Superintendent provide the Secretary of the Board of Trustees with a description of all property within his/her district that is not being used by the United Methodist Church; and as to whether or not Annual Conference action has been taken to (1) discontinue use of or (2) abandon.
  - 3. Sales of Transfers: There has been no transfer of real property. The sale of the conference owned automobiles was executed as authorized by action of the 1976 Annual Conference.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

There must be a scripture that says those who remain to the end shall be saved.

We are grateful to the institutional representatives and their challenging reports.

We are grateful to Reverend Dewey Dark and his staff for all their help and assistance to get the Conference through the intrinsic complexities of the daily proceedings. Our thanks to John Workman for the special Conference Edition of the Arkansas Methodist. Our gratitude to Reverend Maurice Lanier and to all of those who participated in the Memorial Service. Certainly one of the highlights of the Conference was the retirement speeches of those who have given so much for so long. Long will we remember their words of wisdom and inspiration.

Our thanks to Ann Jackson and others for uplifting our lives with the banners and their deep symbolism of the great Christian Heritage. The choirs from First Church Jonesboro, from Bay, and from Huntington Avenue have inspired our hearts with great music. We are grateful to Patty Skogg who serves so well as our organist this week.

Our sincere thanks to Dr. Joseph Washington for his having come our way. His sermons caused us to do some deep soul searching in reference to the Christian ministry today. Conversations in the halls after his sermons went like this: "He said tonight that Christian ministers should be far out above and beyond the average person in Christian living and in setting a Christian example." Dr. Joseph Washington's spirit will long be felt in the hearts and souls of youth and adults in our Conference. We are grateful to God that he was our Conference speaker this year.

Bishop Kenneth W. Hicks shared with us his humor, his refreshing spirit, his wisdom, his manner of conducting the Conference in such a way that we felt free to express ourselves openly and honestly. His spirit of patience and restraint helped us through trying and nerve-racking times. We were impressed with his skill, ability, coolness, dispatch, and dignity. It scares the living daylights out of us, but this year we were willing to try something different in our legislative committees, where laypersons and clergy could share ideas and ideals in a learning process that was mind stretching, informative, and thrilling to our souls.

As we are about to return home, with God's cool breezes blowing upon us, we are going to emphasize the Conference Council on Ministries priorities of World Hunger, Ethnic Minorities, Evangelism, Parish Development, Communications, and the priority to affirm the dignity and worth of all persons and utilize the full human potential within our Church. These priorities must have the ultimate of our minds, hearts, bodies, and souls.

In Charles Dickens' book, *The Christmas Carol*, a voice says, "You were a good businessman." Then another voice says, "The business of mankind was my

business."

# ELMUS CLYDE BROWN 1902–1976



The Reverend Elmus Clyde Brown was born November 20, 1092 at Summers, Arkansas and died June 10, 1976. He is survived by his wife Ernestine Brown, one son Taylor P. Brown, one daughter Beverly Madron and one granddaughter Margaret Brown.

He received his B.A. Degree from Southern Methodist University and his B.D. from Perkins School of Theology in 1931. He was received on trial the same year and admitted into full connection in 1933. He served, Lavaca, East Van Buren (St. John), Mansfield, Harrisburg, Elaine, Berryville, Dardanell, Huntington Avenue, Hughes, Lepanto, Corning and Greenwood. He returned in 1968 and served as

Minister of Visitation at the First United Methodist Church in Fort Smith for

seven years following his retirement.

The funeral service was conducted in the Roebuck Chapel at First United Methodist Church in Fort Smith by Dr. Charles P. McDonald and Dr. Paul M. Bumpers.

In the service Dr. McDonald said, "For seven years Rev. Elmus Brown served as Minister of Visitation at First United Methodist Church in Fort Smith. He visited the sick, the home bound and any person in need. He reached out to all people with a helping hand. Then rather suddenly he became ill and found he needed to be helped. It is always easier to help than it is to accept help. But with Elmus he freely gave and gratefully received. Visiting with him in the hospital and at home I discovered that he ministered to me and all those who visited and helped him. His faith, hope and love rubbed off on everyone he met. We are grateful that Elmus Brown was a part of our lives as he ministered to us."

# WILLARD L. (BILL) DOUGLAS 1924–1976



The Reverend Williard L. (Bill) Douglas, pastor of First United Methodist Church in Marianna, died July 15, 1976. In his third year as pastor at Marianna, Mr. Douglas had been active in many facets of North Arkansas Conference activities during his 27 years of ministry. He was widely known as an effective and faithful pastor, minister and church administor and was currently serving as treasurer of the Conference Board of Pensions.

Previous appointments served by Mr. Douglas were St. Paul Church in Fort Smith, Marion, Leachville, Tuckerman, Bald Knob, associate at First Church in North Little Rock, Caraway, Savoy-Marvin, Mt. Carmel Circuit, Bono Circuit and Dyess-Whitton.

A native of Trumann, Arkansas, he was born January 27, 1924. He was a graduate of Arkansas State University in Jonesboro and Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University, where he earned the B.D. degree. He was admitted on trial in 1954 and was ordained deacon in June of 1956 and elder in 1957, the year he was admitted to the North Arkansas Conference in Full Connection.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. H. Faye Wiygul Douglas; three sons, Stephen Kent Douglas and Gifford Wiygul Douglas, both of Marianna, and Williard Lee Douglas, Jr., of West Helena; three brothers, Weldon Douglas of Jonesboro, David Douglas of Memphis and Robert Douglas of Long Beach, Mississippi; a sister, Mrs. Flora Belle Bishop of Wilson, and a grandchild.

A family graveside service was held Saturday at Crittendon Memorial Park Cemetery near Marion, with Dr. Clint Burleson, a pastor of Lakewood United Methodist Church, North Little Rock, officiating. A memorial service was held Monday, July 19, at First United Methodist Church, Marianna, with the Reverend J. William Watson, superintendent of the Forrest City District, the Reverend Elmo Thomason, director of the Little Rock Conference Council on Ministries, and Dr. Charles P. McDonald, pastor of First United Methodist Church, Searcy, officiating.

### CLYDE T. PARSONS 1919-1976



The Reverend Clyde Thomas Parsons, pastor of Levy United Methodist Church in North Little Rock, died August 7, 1976. He had been ill for approximately four weeks. He was 57. He was in his second year as pastor of the Levy church, having been appointed there in June, 1975, after serving for four years as pastor of First Church, Morrilton. He had served pastorates in both the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conferences for 37 years and was widely known as an effective, faithful and beloved pastor.

Mr. Parsons had recently completed a term as vice chairman of the North Arkansas Conference Commission on Equitable Salaries and as a member of the conference's Board of Church and Society, He

was a member of the Area Episcopal Residence Committee and was Coordinator of Adult Ministries for the Conway District. He had previously given eight years of devoted service as secretary of the Conference's Board of Pensions.

Among other pastoral appointments served by Mr. Parsons were Marianna, Jacksonville, Dumas-Gould, Oaklawn in Hot Springs, Askdown, Twenty-eighth Street in Little Rock, Geyer Springs, Caddo Mills-Salem, College Hill in Texarkana, Keith Memorial in Malvern, Hot Springs Circuit and Columbus Circuit.

Born February 24, 1919 in Murfreesboro, Mr. Parsons attended public schools in Delight. He earned the B.A. degree from Henderson State Teachers College (now Henderson State University) in 1944 and the B.D. degree from Perkins School of Theology, SMU, in 1948. He was admitted to the Little Rock Conference On Trial in 1944, ordained deacon in 1947, and admitted in Full Connection and ordained elder in 1949.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Mary Cathryn Duncan Parsons; two sons, Clyde T. Parsons, Jr., of San Antonio, Texas, and Kenneth C. Parsons of Kingston, N.Y.; a daughter, Miss Cathy Parsons of North Little Rock; a sister, Mrs. Helen Segraves of West Memphis, and two grandchildren.

The funeral service was held August 11, at Levy United Methodist Church with Dr. Robert E. L. Bearden, superintendent of the Conway District, Dr. Clint D. Burleson, pastor of Lakewood Church, North Little Rock, and the Reverend Arvill C. Brannon of North Little Rock, associate director of the North Arkansas Conference Council on Ministries, officiating. Burial was at North Hills Memorial Garden.

## LYDIA SIMMONS 1891–1976



Mrs. Lydia Burkhead Simmons was born in Illinois August 26, 1891 to John and Mary Ellen McBride Burkhead. She died August 7, 1976 at Paragould Community Methodist Hospital. She lived at Boydsville and was the widow of the Reverend John Simmons.

## DR. JAMES S. UPTON 1911–1976



Dr. James Southerland Upton of Conway, who retired in May of 1976 after serving for 34 years as head of the Department of Religion at Hendrix College, died August 12 following an extended illness resulting from a stroke. He was 65.

A ministerial member of the North Arkansas Conference for 40½ years, he had served as pastor at South Church in Fort Smith, Eureka Springs, Osceola and First Church in Conway.

Born May 17, 1911 at Plainview, he attended Fordyce High School, John Brown University, and earned the B.A. degree from Hendrix College in 1931, the B.D. degree from Perkins School of Theology in 1934. He did graduate work at Garrett Biblical

Institute and Boston University. He was awarded the honorary D.D. degree by Hendrix College in 1954.

Long active in youth and young adult interests, he was youth director of the North Arkansas Conference for 13 years and director for the Arkansas Methodist Student Movement for 15 years. He served as secretary of the North Arkansas Conference for 15 years. He served as secretary of the North Arkansas Conference for five years. At a dinner given in May of 1976 at Hendrix College, upon the occasion of his retirement, he was honored as having made a major and lasting contribution to several generations of youth within the state, many of whose members later became Methodist ministers and lay leaders within the church.

Active in numerous community affairs, Dr. Upton was a former president of the Conway Kiwanis Club, Faulkner County Red Cross and Faulkner County Tuberculosis Association. He was a former vice president of the board of

Conway Memorial Hospital and was active in Boy Scout work in Conway for

many years.

He served as president of the Arkansas Genealogical Society in 1968 and authored "The Upton Family Genealogy of Upton, Kentucky." He was a member of the Arkansas Historical Society, the Kentucky Historical Society, Sons of the American Revolution, American Academy of Religion and Religious Education Association.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Virginia Townsend Upton; two sons, Jack T. and James S. Upton Jr., both of Greeley, Col.; a daughter, Mrs. Virginia Conover of Charlottesville, Va.; a brother, Bruce E. Upton of Arkadelphia; a sister, Mrs. Joe P. Voorhies of Benton, and five grandchildren.

The funeral service was August 16 at Greene Chapel on the Hendrix campus with Dr. Harold O. Eggensperger, pastor of First Church, Conway, and Dr. Joel A. Cooper, pastor of Central Church, Fayetteville, officiating. Burial was at Oakland Cemetery in Fordyce, with the Reverend Arnold Simpson, pastor of First Church, Fordyce, officiating at the graveside service.

#### EDWARD T. WAYLAND



Dr. Edward T. Wayland, pastor, district superintendent, and editor, was born Powhattan, Arkansas, February 14, 1885. Grandson of Jonathan Wayland, one of Arkansas Methodism's first pastors, Dr. Wayland had a long and distinguished ministry in Arkansas Methodism. He was admitted on trial in the former Arkansas Conference in 1912 and retired at the 1957 session of the North Arkansas Conference.

Dr. Wayland married Susie May Koontz, November 10, 1913. Children include Dr. Ewing T. Wayland, General Secretary, General Council on Finance and Administration of the United Methodist Church; Dr. Sloan R. Wayland, Dean, Teachers College, Columbia University, and Douglas L. Wayland, teacher, de-

ceased. At the time of his death, January 4, 1977, Dr. and Mrs. Wayland were residing with their son, Ewing, in Mt. Prospect, Illinois.

Dr. Wayland was a graduate of the Hendrix Academy and Hendrix College,

with Hendrix awarding him an Honorary Degree in 1946.
Dr. Wayland served as pastor of Gravelly Ct., Waldron, Heber Springs, Marked Tree, Siloam Springs, Wynne, and First Church, North Little Rock. He also served one year as Conference Evangelist, and three times as a district superintendent, serving the Paragould, Fayetteville, and Conway Districts. In 1941, he was named editor of the Arkansas Methodist. From 1946 until his retirement in 1957, he shared editorial duties with his son, Ewing. During his editorship, the circulation of the Arkansas Methodist increased from 6,000 to 25,000 subscriptions, and the church periodical became a strong force in Arkansas Methodism. In 1952, the Louisiana Methodist joined the publishing program.

Dr. Wayland also served as Secretary of the North Arkansas Conference for four years, and as a delegate to the 1938 and 1939 General Conferences and the Seventh Ecumenical Conference in 1947.

Funeral Services were held at the First Methodist Church, North Little Rock, January 7, where Dr. Wayland held the title of Pastor Emeritus. The services were conducted by Rev. James M. Meadors, Jr., pastor, Dr. James W. Workman, and Dr. Robert E. L. Bearden. Dr. Wayland is survived by his wife and sons, six grandchildren, and two great grandchildren.

#### GENERAL GRANT TROUPE



General Grant Troupe was born on February 3, 1889. His early education was received in the public schools of Danville, Arkansas. Additional education was obtained at Philander Smith College in Little Rock, Arkansas, and Gammon Theological Seminary. He was given a license to preach in 1910 and was accepted into full membership of the Conference in 1912.

In 1913, he married Miss Pauline Davis, a daughter of one of his church members. To this beautiful God-fearing union, eleven jewels were born, six boys and five girls. Four sons and one daughter preceded him in death. This close union was severed after 61 years of cooperative fellowship in 1974 with

Reverend Troupe was a man of distinction who stood tall and manly regardless of the circumstances. He deeply warmed the hearts of all of those who were blessed to have known him. His sharp wit and humor endeared his congregations to him.

He departed this life on Sunday, January 9, 1977, and leaves to mourn his loss two sons, Benjamin Troupe of Chicago and Dale Troupe of Detroit, Michigan; four daughters, Mrs. Pearl Raines, Mrs. Ruth Houser and Mrs. Dorothy Brothers of Chicago; and Mrs. Naomi Cash of Detroit, Michigan; a brother, Eugene Troupe of Berkley, California; 32 grandchildren; 30 great-grandchildren, and many nieces and nephews and other relatives and friends.

The funeral service was conducted at St. James United Methodist Church, Pine Bluff, with Dr. W. Harold Flowers, pastor, officiating. Assisting were the Reverend Lloyd Smith, pastor of St. Mark Church, and the Reverend John H. Oliver of Haven United Methodist Church, Hot Springs. Burial was at Pine

Bluff.

#### IX. MISCELLANEOUS

#### STANDING RULES OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

- (1) That each undergraduate, each Lay Pastor, and each candidate for conference membership be required to meet with the Board of Ministry before or during the session of the Annual Conference unless hindered by circumstances beyond his control.
- (2) That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one member from each church in each Pastoral Charge.
- (3) That the figures answering the question in the pastor's report to Annual Conference "Members reported last year" shall in every case be the number of members printed in the statistical tables of the Journal of the last Annual Conference.
- (4) That the District Superintendent's figures of all apportionments be accepted as the official figures.
- (5) That the apportionment for World Service and Conferences Benevolences be combined in the statistical report; and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.
- (6) All statistical reports, after being checked for correctness by the District Superintendent and District auditors, shall be delivered by one of them to the Conference Statistician, within 31 days after the closing of the Conference Treasurer's books.
- (7) That the District Superintendents be instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or District Superintendent's District for insertion in the Conference Journal.
- (8) The Annual Conference shall elect upon nomination by the Bishop a Conference Entertainment Committee to serve during the quadrennium. This Committee shall make arrangements for the facilities needed for the session of the Annual Conference and administer the funds for its entertainment, including the honorarium for the conference preacher.
- (9) All members attending the Annual Conference Session shall pay registration to be determined by the Bishop, Cabinet and Chairman of CFA; except Retired ministers not serving charges and supernumeraries who shall pay no registration. The offerings in the public worship services shall be used for conference entertainment expense. The Conference Entertainment Committee shall provide, during the session of the Annual Conference, full entertainment for retired ministers not serving a charge, their wives or widows; and room for all pastors of charges whose pastoral support from all sources is \$4,800.00 or less.
- (10) Every council, board, commission and committee receiving any money from conference funds shall present to the Council on Finance and Administration annually by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference a detailed financial report including all receipts and expenditures.
- (11) A list of lay members elected to Annual Conference shall be compiled by the district superintendents and sent to the conference secretary prior to the opening of the session.
- (12) The district stewards shall apportion all annual conference askings to the several charges on each district on an equitable basis.
- (13) The Conference Treasurer shall hold his books open for 15 days following the close of the fiscal year.
  - (14) No one shall be nominated for re-election to a board or commission on

which he has served more than a quadrennium immediately preceding his election.

(15) The Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Pensions shall be members of the secretarial staff of the Conference, and these persons shall be charged with the responsibility of seeing that all records pertaining to service years be made identical.

(16) Any proposal to change the Standing Rules shall lie on the table overnight, and then its passage shall require a 3/4 vote of those present and voting.

(17) That part of the report of all councils, boards, commissions, committees and other agencies of the conference which provides for changes in policy or makes recommendations shall be mimeographed, printed, or otherwise duplicated and distributed to the membership of the conference prior to the time scheduled for action on said report.

(18) All churches employing more than one appointed member of an annual conference shall pay all percentages based on pastor's salary on the salaries of all

ministers so employed.

(19) Each Annual Conference session shall designate a moving date. Any exceptions to the designated date shall be agreed upon by the pastors involved.

(20) That no person shall be elected by the Annual Conference to serve on more than one (1) major Board, Committee, Commission, Agency, etc., at one time. This does not affect ex-officio positions or the Conference Committee on Episcopacy.

(21) That all councils, boards, committees, and commissions be made more representative. Special consideration should be given to the use of women and

youth.

(22) No persons shall serve as an elected trustee of more than one United Methodist related institution of the Arkansas Area at a time.

(23) No one who by virtue of their office would be an ex-officio trustee,

shall serve as an elected trustee of the same agency.

(24) Each year the Conference Council on Ministries will determine the number of additional lay persons, if any, to be named and will notify each District Council on Ministries of the number of persons to be named by it, according to the following formula with top priority to be given to Number 1, etc.:

1. Officers of the Conference Council on Lay Life and Work.

2. Conference United Methodist Women officers within the bounds of a district.

3. Elected chairpersons for conference boards and agencies.

4. Elected lay persons to general and jurisdictional boards and agencies.

5. Lay delegates to general and jurisdictional conferences.

6. District Lay Leaders, District Presidents of United Methodist Women, and District Presidents of United Methodist Men.

7. Lay members of conference boards and agencies.

- 8. One additional youth from each district.
- 9. Inclusiveness of ethnic minorities.
- At-large district representatives.
