# III. Daily Proceedings

Joint Special Session of the North Arkansas And Little Rock Annual Conferences Staples Auditorium, Hendrix College Conway, Arkansas October 22, 1977

# **Morning Session**

INFORMAL SINGING: Soloman Balenton led in an informal time of hymn singing. Pianist was Elise Shoemaker.

OPENING WORSHIP SERVICE: An organ prelude was played by Robert McGill after which the hymn, "All Creatures of Our God and King," was sung. Bishop Kenneth W. Hicks called on Roy Shilling, President of Hendrix College, to welcome the conference, comment on the new organ, and to present the Hendrix College Choir. The Choir under the direction of Mr. McGill sang an anthem.

The sermon by Bishop Hicks, "The Theological Perspective of the Missional Priorities," emphasized that the church must be involved in the human predicament and that it must be interested in ministry, not programs.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: Dr. Roy Shilling presented Mrs. Kenneth Hicks to the conference and made announcements pertinent to the conference session.

ROLL CALL: James E. Major, Secretary of the Little Rock Conference, announced that the roll would be taken on cards furnished by the Pages and moved that the bar of the conference be the entire auditorium. So ordered.

INSTRUCTIONS TO THE CONFERENCE: Bishop Hicks gave instructions regarding voting rights. He stated that the purpose of the Joint Session is to deal with the missional priorities as the task forces present them. He suggested that any additions be directed to the task force, not dealt with in this Session.

ETHNIC MINORITY LOCAL CHURCH: Robert Felder, Chairperson of the North Arkansas Conference Ethnic Minority Local Church Task Force, presented the report, beginning with an audio-visual presentation of the condition of the black church in Arkansas Methodism. He then presented the written report, made corrections to secretarial errors, and spoke at length on it. Harold Flowers, Chairperson of the Little Rock Conference Ethnic Minority Local Church Task Force, assisted by William Robinson and Wendell Strong emphasized the concerns of the report. C. Ray Hozendorf moved that the conference receive the report and refer it to the proper boards and agencies of each annual conference for consideration and implementation. It was seconded.

John T. Adkinson, Jr. asked questions for clarification. Norman Carter moved the following amendment to the motion: That we accept and refer the report to the respective committees and task forces to report back to their respective annual conferences for action. Seconded by Wayne Jarvis. Bishop Hicks objected to any further delay. Wayne Jarvis explained his support of the amendment in that the whole task force of which he was a part had only seen the completed report that day and were not in total agreement with all of it. A lengthy discussion ensued. It was agreed to table the amendment until after the lunch hour.

#### Afternoon Session

INFORMAL SINGING: Soloman Balenton led the conference in informal hymn singing with Elise Shoemaker accompanying on the piano.

BUSINESS RESUMED: Bishop Hicks recognized Harold Flowers for a report on a joint meeting of the two conference task forces of the Ethnic Minority Local Church which had

been held during the lunch hour. Harold Flowers moved to amend the report under consideration by deleting Item No. 1 under the Priortizing of Funds. It was seconded and

Norman Carter withdrew his motion to amend the previous motion. C. Ray Hozendorf remade his motion to read "that the Conference receive the report as amended and refer it to the proper boards and agencies of each annual conference for consideration and

implementation." The amendment was accepted and the motion carried.

EVANGELISM: Fred Arnold, Chairperson of the Little Rock Conference Task Force on Evangelism, presented the report, opening with a portion of the movie, "Go Tell." Fred Arnold, assisted by Don Eubanks, presented the first part of the written report, "Purposes and Goals." Buddy Arnold, Chairperson of the North Arkansas Conference Task Force on Evangelism, presented the second part, "Conference Objectives and Local Church Objectives." It was moved and seconded that the report be adopted.

John Jump moved an amendment to delete Items D, G and K under Conference Objectives and Items B and C under Local Church Objectives. It was seconded. John Miles spoke in opposition to the motion. Don Riggin called for the question and the amendment

failed. The entire report was then adopted.

Buddy Arnold presented the suggested local church calendar of evangelism for the next three years. Bishop Hicks urged that the conference respond with growth in church membership as the population of the state grows, increase in numbers being actually a

measure of our evangelistic concern.

WORLD HUNGER: Donald Ebright, Chairperson of the North Arkansas Conference Task Force on World Hunger, presented the report, assisted by Loyd Perry who presented the Pastor's Kit on World Hunger. Donald Ebright called attention to the Consciousness Raising Event on World Hunger to be held at Hendrix College on November 12 and 13, 1977, and urged a good attendance. Clarence Mannasmith spoke to the report and urged a good attendance and response to the Ingathering to be at Barton Coliseum in Little Rock on November 18, 1978.

Donald Ebright called attention to a possible Interfaith Ingathering in 1979, and Loyd Perry called attention to the Arkansas Hunger Hike on November 20, 1977, being planned in

several areas of the state.

Edward Matthews, Chairperson of the Little Rock Conference Task Force on World Hunger, spoke on the Lent to Thanksgiving emphasis. Victor Nixon spoke on the Missional Priority Fund and the Advance for World Hunger. He asked for \$1,500 from the North Arkansas Conference for that Conference's part of the rental of Barton Coliseum for the Ingathering Event in 1978. Joel Cooper announced that the North Arkansas Conference Council on Finance and Administration had approved this amount. It was moved and seconded that this amount be accepted. With only the North Arkansas Conference members voting, it was approved.

Don Riggin moved the adoption of the report. The motion was seconded and passed.

APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES: Charles Richards moved that the Committee on Minutes of the Little Rock Conference read and approve the minutes of today's business. The motion was seconded and passed.

Charles Casteel moved that the minutes also be read and approved by the designated committee of the North Arkansas Conference. It was seconded and passed.

INTERMISSION: During the intermission between the business session and the closing worship service, Don Armstrong moved that a letter be sent to Robert M. McGill expressing regret and apology for inattentiveness displayed during the opening voluntary and expressing appreciation for his contribution to the opening service through the playing of the organ and to the excellent Hendrix College Choir. Seconded and passed. Bishop Hicks indicated that he would take care of the matter.

CLOSING WORSHIP: Robert Felder was leader of the worship service and was assisted by Harold Flowers, Kathy Fadick and Jeannette Felder. The hymn, "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing," was sung. Special music was by the Philander Smith College Choir under the direction of Don West. The Conference Preacher, Negail Riley, was introduced by Bishop Hicks. A solo was sung by Reginald Moore preceding the sermon by Dr. Riley on "Who Are We?" Bishop Hicks then challenged the Conference to march forward. The benediction was pronounced, and the service was concluded with a postlude by Elise Shoemaker.

# **Ethnic Minority Local Church Report**

The history of the United Methodist Church is replete with the names of men and women who, individually, gave their time, money, knowledge, skills, and lives to developing opportunities for self-expression for fellow human beings. They took literally the injunctions that "they were their brother's keeper," that you would do no less for others than you would want done for yourself, and that what they did or accomplished for the "least of these" you have also done for me. In the process of "reaching out" they gave up position, physical ease, and future economic benefits. They shared the problems of hunger, poverty, prejudice, and rejection common to a people who had been deprived and depressed by social conventions and systems. They even flew in the face of designated church and ecclesiastic authority in order to carry out a mission that was inspired by and infused with the basic example of Christ and His teaching.

It is interesting to note that in the realm of societal development, be it political, social, or religious, the individual—not the collective group—has been the agent for change, development, and improvement. It is through the compassion, understanding, and sensitivity of individuals that collective action is attained. It is the individual whose cognitive and sensate faculties aroused by blatant injustice is stirred to redress errors of judgment and decisions of the past. Just as clearly it is also the individual who turns deaf ears and blind eyes to conditions that negatively affect those whose needs and desires parallel his/her own. It is the individual who chooses to protect selfish or self-seeking conditions to the exclusion of those to whom some extension of that effort would have more than token meaning and effect.

It is within the framework of this dichotemy—the will of the individual to effectively help or the will of the individual to effectively withhold help—that the decisions of this conference will be made. There is no collective choice! There is individual responsibility! There is not nor can there ever be solace in rationale that cedes to the collective group, the actions or decisions which only individuals can take or make.

The conditions and circumstances of the ethnic minority local church in United Methodism is like an open wound which through constant and consistent neglect is becoming gangrenous. The festering pus of inadequate financial support to train and sustain new leadership, develop and support congregations in their efforts to maintain adequate church buildings and build relationships that foster peer equality and participation is threatening to the whole communicant body of the United Methodist Church in all of its parts. Studies, surveys and documentation pertaining to the problems have been made and presented to general and annual conferences. Announcements and pronouncements have been made as to the gravity of the situation. Discussions, debates and arguments have ensued. Action has been designated and approved aimed at alleviating the most critical aspects of this problem. But with all of this and in some instances in spite of it, there has been only token effort to eradicate the cause of the wound and apply those methods, techniques or actions that would heal the wound and restore that part of the church policy to a sound condition.

For example the updating of a study conducted in 1967 on the "Churches and Pastors of the Southwest Conference of the Methodist Church" reveals the following:

- A. Out migration of the black population in Arkansas continues to be the highest of any state in the country.
- B. The constant loss of black population continues the slow but steady demise of formerly thriving black churches, programmatically and financially.
- C. The greatest loss through out migration still occurs among the young blacks of the population.

- D. The loss of potential and better education black young persons from the population has continued the already critical problem of black leadership in church and community.
- E. The remaining non-church affiliated black population has not been recruited or affected by the United Methodist Church since merger in 1968.
- F. Black churches in rural areas of the Arkansas area are still the hardest hit by loss of population and resultant loss of financial support.
- G. Industrial development has brought some new people to rural communities but lack of adequate church programming and facilities has not attracted them to the United Methodist Church.
- H. In twenty-three cities with population ranging from 1,000-8,000, there are still no United Methodist Churches for black people.
- I. In more urbanized areas of Arkansas the number of Arkansas area churches still is inadequate for the population to be served.
- J. Most of the churches in the Arkansas area are categorized as small as this term relates to numbers of congregants, physical assets and servicing by pastors with other full-time occupational responsibilities.
- K. In the light of the 1968 merger and its concept of the "inclusive" church, little has been done in the area of planned program or development to give life to the concept or to make it viable within the precincts of the Arkansas area.
- L. The educational gap, especially in terms of Seminary trained pastors, is still as wide as it was 10 years ago.
- M. Salaries continue to be low and unattractive to even marginally qualified potential pastoral aspirants.

Faced with these examples most reasonable individuals would admit that the condition of black churches in the Arkansas area is one of steady deterioration. To continue the analogy of the open wound, not only have there been ineffective attempts made to deal with it but it has been deepened to a point where the only therapy available would demand its being cut off altogether! A question can be raised as to whether this was the underlying intent of merger to some individuals?

In any problem there are certain terms or concepts which should be understood and agreed upon by all individuals so that resolution can be achieved with alacrity and a sense of common purpose. One of the obstacles to resolution of the problems of the ethnic minority local church is the term and concept "inclusive church." Positively construed the term implies the eradication or elimination of those factors, conditions or circumstances that induce divisiveness and contention among individuals or members of a group. For example, if individuals and churches professing the same doctrine or principles are kept apart by factors of racial origin or color, these factors would be considered obstacles to the development of a common purpose or goal in the strengthening of the whole church community. Effective inclusive action, therefore, would seek to eliminate from value judgments negative racial stereotypes and the development of criteria, agreed upon by all, in affecting a positive climate, function and practice of all church members. The term, inclusive church, connotes a change in negative circumstance or condition from inequality to common equality or peer status in any arena that affects the whole church. Of more direct relevance to the Arkansas area is another example using the small church as illustration.

If, all other things being equal, small churches are valuable assets to certain rural communities, the decision to strengthen and maintain them should be arrived at from the same criteria. Long term and short term needs of the community, economic viability in growth terms, accessibility to population, availability of qualified pastors to service them and the extent to which the resources and efforts of the Arkansas area could be marshalled to attain this goal. Whether the church is black or white is of secondary importance to the criteria and decision. If the factor of black or white takes priority over the established criteria there is reason to question the goal and intent of "inclusiveness" as seen by the individuals in the Arkansas area. This would hold true of any other conference in United Methodism.

It follows, therefore, that any sincere desire to attain the goal of an inclusive church should, from the outset, involve the complete spectrum of ethnic minority thought, understanding, emphasis and practice on a continuing basis. The concept of inclusive church is directly related to the reality of a pluralistic church. Real pluralism assumes that all members of a society are able to substantively contribute to the development of the society. No program or plan of action is complete without the indepth involvement and participation of all persons who are affected by the actions or decisions that are made.

The apparent problem for the Arkansas area raises at least two questions:

A. Does United Methodism in the Arkansas area mean the development of strong congregations of over 300 members in mostly white urban-suburban settings?

B. Are potentially strong black congregations subject to benign neglect on the assumption that rather than be without a church in urban-rural settings they will join white congregations?

Comprehension and understanding of the above is critical to the criteria that is developed since it throws into clearer perspective the nuances of the need factors in the Arkansas ethnic church arena.

If the response to both of these questions borders on the affirmative there is reason to believe that there is a real gap in the communication process as to the goals and aspirations of ethnic churches in the Arkansas area.

A recent survey of 47 small ethnic churches lifted up the following 6 major critical needs as they see them.

- 1. Congregational Development
- 2. New Church Development
- 3. Restructuring of Salary Supplements
- 4. Leadership Development
- 5. Recruitment and Training of New Clergy and Lay Persons
- 6. Outreach Ministry

It is apparent that no church is thinking of itself as going out of business! Rather the desire is to become more effective in the mission of service to the community and to United Methodism.

- a. There is no real equation between being bigger and being effective. A small church with adequate facilities consonant with the needs of the community and a well directed, clearly focused congregation can be effective in its ministry. The need is for assistance in securing the resources that will enable this development to take place.
- b. New Church Development is a real desire to establish the church in areas of new population growth. This entails a clear demographic understanding of population movement and growth. It can lay the groundwork for intelligent grouping of present congregations, the dissolution of others where the possibility of effective service is negligible and the setting up of new church facilities in appropriate areas of Arkansas.
- c. Restructuring of salary supplements to meet new conditions is an essential aspect of church personnel stabilization. Former salary scales were set in conformance with expectations of economic support from a stable population. Variations in economic status and population loss have eroded the basis of the salary supplement. Few aspirants to the ministry expect to get rich but neither do they expect to subsist on a poverty level. A reality related salary supplement would enable incumbent and new ministerial personnel to more fully involve themselves in their chosen profession and add dignity to the church that has selected them for this special mission.
- d. It is obvious that strengthening congregations and developing new churches is impossible without good leadership. In the United Methodist Church stress is placed on the careful, sequential development of persons whose service to the mission of the church can become more effective. The need for this same process in small ethnic churches is critical to its survival. It should not be forced to depend on outsiders or some chance contact for its leadership. It should be able to offer to its constituents the

same prospects for growth through careful programming suited to its concerns as a

church of a larger size.

e. Natural attrition through death, retirement or other physical removal makes recruitment a prime concern of the ethnic church. Many seminarians are unaware of the openings that exist outside of their own immediate area. In addition, they have little if any knowledge about the conditions and needs of areas similar to those they come from.

Effective recruitment entails among other things, personal visits to potential applicants, invitations to visit the church community, some advertising and public relations expenditures. In the case of Arkansas, a planned program that would utilize persons familiar with small church needs would give substance and order to an ongoing recruitment process. In addition, opportunities for practical experience in the church community should be made available through a supervised internship

program.

f. Use of the word small to describe the church or community is related to simple in the thinking of many people. Yet we do not think of the "digital watch" as simple although its mass is small. Outreach ministry in a small church community is as necessary, as energy consuming and as complex as it may be in a larger community. Indeed, it may entail better articulation of its staff and program because of the paucity of surrounding external resources. As in many other situations help is of no use if you don't know how to obtain it or where it is. An effective ethnic church outreach ministry adds to the breadth of Christian service to humanity which its existence implies.

In order to deal with these critical areas of need for the ethnic church in an efficient and responsible manner, we make these recommendations to the Arkansas Area Conference.

We affirm the Arkansas Area Ethnic Minority Task Forces as requested by Bishop Hicks and ordered by the 1977 Sessions of the Conference of Arkansas United Methodism. We further affirm the need to strengthen the ethnic church in Arkansas, as a result of our studies through listening teams and sampling surveys of the area. We therefore submit the following proposals in keeping with the spirit and actions recommended by the General Conference of the United Methodist Church, 1976, and Arkansas Area Conferences in 1977.

Leadership Development

- 1. We go on record toward the implementation of strengthening the small membership black local church and request that one leadership team from each Annual Conference be sent to the Jurisdictional Workshop on the Small Membership Black Churches in Marshall, Texas April 7-8. The team should include at least six (6) persons: one (1) District Superintendent, one (1) Conference staff person, four (4) others. This team is to return, designing a program for strengthening the small membership local black church
- 2. We affirm the action of the Annual Conferences to recruit at least four trained ministers by 1980; we urge District Councils on Ministries to recruit minorities in their districts, to attend leadership training events on the District, Conference, and Jurisdictional levels; these should include youth assemblies, lab schools and the Arkansas Area School of Missions. Time—Annual.
- 3. We encourage each Conference to make available funds for at least four persons to attend the annual meeting of the Black Methodist for Church Renewal meeting for training to implementation and goals of United Methodists in March, 1978.

Congregational Development

- 4. We encourage Conference Committees on Evangelism and Education to provide a workshop on Evangelism for the black church.
  - (a) We call on ethnic clergy to maintain confirmation with assistance provided by District Councils on Ministries.
  - (b) The Area Task Forces should plan and institute an Area Convocation on the Black

Church no later than December 2nd or 3rd, 1977; there is a need to further discern areas of need and development in the ethnic church as well as inform these Methodist resources. The Conference Council should assist in the planning and the follow-up of convocation.

(c) We recommend that the Committees on Mission of the Conference Boards of Global Ministries select at least (3), three small ethnic churches in each Conference to be targeted for improved physical facilities to enable them to more efficiently carry out their ministry and mission.

Salary Supplement

5. We call on Conference and District Boards and Agencies to make requests for the supplementing of salaries of ethnic clergy such as might be available through Temporary General Aid, district missions boards, boards supplementary aids, and equitable salaries to aid ethnic ministers. We further recommend that a committee from each of the Conferences be established, composed of two persons from the Board of Global Ministries, two persons from Equitable Salary, and four from Ethnic Minority Local Church Task Force, to define ways in which parity can be reached by ministers in small-church communities so as to enhance and appropriately reward them for services rendered.

#### **Training and Recruitment**

6. We affirm the action taken in recruiting the Church and Community Workers and Community Developers. We call on the Conference Council on Ministries, Board of Equitable Salary, Board of Ordained Ministry to help strengthen leadership in the churches and communities as well as to be diligent to secure trained ministers in the total development of ethnic churches. We recommend that a special committee be set up with ethnic involvement in developing appropriate recruitment and internship programs for small churches.

## Church Nurture

- 7. We would encourage black members on District Councils on Ministries in areas where black churches exist or where black people live.
  - (a) We ask the office of Pastoral Care to move with all deliberate speed with District Councils on Ministries in setting up "Awareness Events" involving whites and ethnic minorities for the purpose of sensitizing and making all people aware of our common humanity, April 1978.

#### Church Extension

8. We call upon the ethnic task forces, Boards of Global Ministries to explore with District Councils on Ministries needs for ethnic church extension throughout the Area.

#### **Special Notices**

We call attention to the small response to the fund for "Ethnic Minority Local Church" and encourage strongly, that all churches contribute to this "Missional Priority" as established by the General Conference and accepted by the Arkansas Area Conferences of the United Methodist Church 1976-1980.

We ask the Arkansas Area Annual Conferences to support Human Relations Sunday and to help implement mission programs in the Arkansas Area. February 12, 1978.

# A Comprehensive Plan Of Evangelism

#### Purpose:

To bring all persons into living, active fellowship with God through Jesus Christ as divine Savior and Lord, and through the regenerating power of the Holy Spirit to gather them into the fellowship of the Church and lead them to express their Christian discipleship in every

area of human life that the Kingdom of God may be realized.

To call every Christian to commitment, to service, and motivated by the Holy Spirit, to minister as the Body of Christ in the world. The experience of salvation places a claim on every Christian and on each local congregation to be responsible for the neighbor who has not acknowledged Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord. Every Christian is called to share the faith and bear witness to the gospel.

We believe that this area wide program will sharpen our understanding of evangelism, ministry and mission. It will provide an opportunity for our ministers and lay persons to unite in the study and practice of the basics of evangelism. It will provide an opportunity for our ministers and lay persons to become acquainted with new, exciting and effective methods of proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Resources to accomplish this will be made available as part of this program. Further, the purpose is to challenge local churches to establish a comprehensive evangelistic plan which includes proclamation, nurture and Christian social responsibility.

#### Goals:

That every local church become a functioning center for evangelistic ministry by the end of 1980. This is rooted in a biblical understanding of the nature and purpose of God revealed in Jesus Christ. Three Life Streams bear this out: 1. Outreach ministries which focus on conversion and the new life in Christ. 2. Growth in Discipleship where the content of the faith is experienced and expressed in the life of the individual. 3. Supportive Community emphasizes the fellowship of believers where the creative, redemptive community of faithful persons bound together by caring concern becomes a life support system.

A. That every local church develop and expand a program aimed at winning new converts, restoring and renewing disenchanted members and deepening the spiritual life of the entire congregation.

B. That every local church set membership goals, making special efforts to evangelize children, youth and young adults.

C. That every local church inaugurate and/or improve the opportunities for newly committed Christians, as well as present members, to be involved in the fellowship of the church, and to participate in specific acts of Christian discipleship and social concern.

D. That every local church join in this area wide effort and incorporate in their planning the basic elements of this three year evangelistic emphasis. It is critical that every local church make evangelism a permanent and ongoing concern and effort in its planning for the future.

#### Conference Objectives:

- A. That each District have a rally to explain and interpret the Comprehensive Plan in the Spring of 1978.
- B. That a program of visitation evangelism be presented in every District and local church by the end of 1978.
- C. That increased emphasis be placed on Baptism Vows and Confirmation Training during 1978 and 1979.
- D. That simultaneous evangelistic endeavors (i.e. preaching mission, revival, new life mission or other program) take place over the entire state during 1980.
- E. That our summer youth camps be planned in the summers of 1978 through 1980 to correspond to the emphasis of the entire Conference in the area of evangelism during this time.
- F. That Pastor's School be planned to motivate pastors to doing the work of Evangelism in the local church in a comprehensive way.
- G. That the area set a goal for increase in persons received on profession of faith by 3,600 persons each year from 1978-1980.
- H. That we urge UMCOR and other Methodist agencies dealing with the world hunger problem to make, wherever possible, an intentional witness to Christ as Lord and Savior. To let the hungry and starving peoples of the world know who Christ is, is essential if we are going to feed their bodies and spirits alike.

- I. That increased funding in both conferences be authorized in 1978 through 1980 to make evangelism truly a priority during these years.
- J. That we utilize the mass media to promote this evangelism program, to educate and motivate our people as to the urgency of our plan.
- K. That the Cabinets devise a report form on which each local pastor will report quarterly the number added or subtracted from his/her church and church school rolls. (This would be sent to District Superintendent.)

#### Local Church Objectives:

- A. That each local church be urged to develop and implement their own overall plan aimed at winning new converts, restoring and renewing disenchanted members, and deepening the spiritual life of the entire congregation. By the end of 1978, every local church should have conducted the training program in Visitation Evangelism—A Relational Ministry for their congregation.
- B. That every local church set a goal of not less than two persons to be reached by profession of faith each year, 1978 through 1980; in every case each church have an increase over the number of persons received by profession of faith in 1977 during each of these years.
- C. That each local church report on a quarterly basis the number of members added or subtracted from its church and church school rolls. This report will be forwarded to the District Superintendent.
- D. Each local church activate its Committee or Task Force on Evangelism, set goals for a new increase in membership; plan a major event such as New Life Mission, Minister's We Care Mission or some other evangelistic endeavor each year that would suit the needs of that church.
- E. Each local church have a specific Prayer Emphasis in the Spring of 1978 to undergird these efforts. There are excellent follow-up programs to our Prayer Emphasis now available.
- F. That Pastors each preach a series of sermons on the vows for Baptism and Confirmation.
- G. That each local church set the first Sunday after Epiphany as Covenant Sunday to urge members of the congregation to make and renew covenants with God and with each other. The week beginning with Ash Wednesday be designated Evangelism Week and the Sunday following Ash Wednesday be designated Evangelism Sunday. (On Evangelism Sunday the total plan for the local church should be presented to the congregation including financial support needed to carry out the overall evangelism program).
- H. Each local church get the Local Church Planning Guide for a Comprehensive plan for Evangelism and other materials available from the Board of Discipleship; and follow this plan—set their own goals and objectives, using the local Council on Ministries and taking the plan to the Administrative Board for adoption and presentation to the total church. There should be a continuing emphasis on evangelism through the year.
- I. That the Committee on Evangelism and the Committee on Education meet jointly once each quarter to coordinate and evaluate their programs—the Comprehensive Plan and Decision Point.

## World Hunger

#### 1. The Hunger Consciousness Raising Event

The Task Force on World Hunger of the Arkansas Area of the United Methodist Church has planned a "Consciousness Raising Event on Hunger" to be held November 12-13, 1977, at Hendrix College, Conway, Arkansas. Registration will be in the Mills Center Lobby commencing at 10:00 a.m. on November 12. While there is no space for overnight lodging on the Hendrix Campus, participants should make their own arrangements in Conway motels. The First United Methodist Church has offered "Sleeping bag accommodations" for free.

The Program for the Hunger Event is planned to offer delegates first-hand information on the causes of World Hunger and present effective means of responding to the problem. The two-day program will also feature presentations on hunger in Arkansas, the future of the family farm, the policy and programs of the United States Government, changing life styles, the Biblical basis for a response to Hunger, congregational and community action

and influencing public policy.

Featured speakers will include Bishop Hicks, Arkansas Area; Bishop James Armstrong, the Dakotas Area; Dr. Dean Freudenberger, International Developmental Studies, School of Theology at Claremont, California; Ms. Mia Adjali, Executive Secretary U.N./International Affairs, Board of Global Ministries, New York; Professor Charles Baughman, St. Paul School of Theology, Kansas City; Bill Clinton, Attorney General, Little Rock; Mr. Clay R. Moore, Extension Economist, Cooperative Extension Service, Little Rock; Dr. Lew Brinkley, Arkansas State University, Jonesboro, Arkansas; the Honorable Richard E. Bell, Vice President for Economic Affairs for Riceland Foods and former Assistant U. S. Secretary of Agriculture; and Mr. Walter Rowden, Winrock International Livestock Research and Training Center.

The state-wide Task Force on World Hunger is a group of thirty people representing the Boards of Global Ministries and Church and Society of the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conferences of the United Methodist Church. This is part of a four-year program to promote understanding of the causes of World Hunger and share practical methods to strike at the root causes of hunger. The Reverend Dr. Donald F. Ebright, Task Force Chairperson, served as a missionary in India for 22 years, was the first Church World Service Representative in India for five years and for fourteen years was Director of the Overseas Programs for Meals for Millions Foundation with feeding programs in forty countries. The Task Force Co-Chairman is Reverend Ed Matthews, Pastor in Pine Bluff, Arkansas, who served as a missionary in Africa and has had long experience with hunger problems.

The Hunger Event will begin at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, November 12, with registration. The first session will begin at 12:50 p.m. with Bishop Kenneth W. Hicks presiding, and introducing one of America's leading authorities on World Hunger, Dr. Dean Freudenberger, of Claremont, California, who will give the keynote address: "Global Context and Issues." The registration fee will include the Sunday, November 13th luncheon, planned by Mrs. Marie Jordan of Paragould. Mrs. Mary Lou Gall is in charge of the literature and book display. Dr. C. Mannasmith of Winrock Training Center is in charge of the Hunger Theater (presenting both films and filmstrips). The Hunger Event will conclude with a worship service planned by Dr. Donald F. Ebright and a commitment service on Sunday, November 13, at 4:00 p.m.

#### 2. Area-Wide Ingathering, November 18, 1978

The Inter-Conference Task Force proposes and seeks approval to organize a state-wide "Ingathering" on Saturday, November 18, 1978, in Barton Coliseum, Little Rock, Arkansas. Mr. I. N. Lawhon has agreed to be chairman of the Ingathering Committee of the Hunger Task Force. In some detail: (A) clothing, blankets, bandages, and specialized kits (all secured in accordance with Church World Service-CROP specifications) will be collected at the Ingathering by CWS trucks; (B) animals (secured after consultation with Heifer Project) will be received and trucked away by Heifer Project personnel; and (C) monies (with a goal of \$200,000) will be received by the Area Treasurer and designated to specified Advance Specials.

#### 3. Ingathering Budget

In order to designate all monies received at the Ingathering for the specified Advance Specials, we seek approval of a budgeted item of \$3000 (\$1500 from each Annual Conference) for the November 18, 1978 "Ingathering." This will be for the rental of Barton Coliseum, publicity, materials required for the "Ingathering," basic administrative and promotional expenses by Mr. Lawhon and meetings of the Hunger Task Force. The Little Rock Conference will make use of funds appropriated at the last Annual Conference for World Hunger. The North Arkansas Conference requests an additional \$1500 for 1978.

#### 4. Inter-Faith Ingathering

We authorize Reverend Loyd A. Perry and Dr. Donald F. Ebright to propose to the Inter-Faith Hunger Task Force that there be a state-wide Inter-Faith Ingathering in November 1979, and to assure the Inter-Faith Hunger Task Force of the fullest cooperation by Arkansas United Methodists.

#### 5. Arkansas Hunger Hike

We propose that Arkansas Methodists participate in the Inter-Faith Hunger Task Force Hunger Hike, November 20, 1977, (Hunger Sunday). Participants should return money raised to the local church which can decide how it shall be spent or designated. Information on how to organize a Hunger Hike for your church or area can be obtained from Madge Brown (Mrs. Frank), #7 Broadview, Little Rock, Arkansas 72207.

#### 6. Lent-To-Thanksgiving

We propose and seek authority to designate Lent-to-Thanksgiving as a special emphasis in our Conferences. Projects started in Lent, 1978, will be "harvested" in the Fall. This will tie into Evangelism during the Lenten emphasis on renewal. This would be a season that projects might be to share in strengthening local black churches in Arkansas.

## The World Hunger Dollar The United Methodist Church 1977-80

The United Methodist Church commitment to the problem of world hunger for the present quadrennium is \$5,000,000. The monies for this commitment are provided from two sources: The Missional Priorities Fund (an apportionment) and The Missional Priorities Advance Special (a program of "extra mile" giving).

1. The Missional Priorities Fund is apportioned to the Annual Conferences according to the following ratio:

The Missional Priorities apportionment for the Arkansas Area is as follows: Little Rock Conference - \$33,271; North Arkansas Conference - \$36,545. Both apportionments were accepted by the regular sessions.

2. The Missional Priority Advance Special Fund is composed of two goals:

Ethnic Minority Local Church Program.	\$3,500,000
World Hunger Program	3,000,000
Total Cool	44 700 000

Both conferences have approved the World Hunger Advance and recommended it to the churches. The North Arkansas Conference has set a goal of \$10,000 for the World Hunger Advance.

#### **Distribution of Funds**

The money that is given for world hunger through both the Missional Priority Fund apportionment and the advance will be distributed as follows:

— 58 percent to the General Board of Global Ministries for services and resources leading

to the alleviation of world hunger and the basic causes of hunger.

— 18 percent to the General Board of Discipleship for programs designed to cultivate

more Christian lifestyles.

— 18 percent to the General Board of Church and Society for programs to cultivate constituencies in the American public, organized to affect public policies toward a more adequate system for food production and distribution.

- 6 per cent to the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry for training and

research opportunities within United Methodist institutions.

#### The Area Hunger Task Force

The Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences have accepted the commitment to eradicate World Hunger through the creation of an Area Task Force on World Hunger. The work of the task force has been funded in 1977 through special gifts from various boards in the two conferences.

Both conferences approved program funds for world hunger at the 1977 regular sessions. Additional funds are needed for promotion, publicity, and rental of facilities for the Ingathering Event, November 18, 1978, in Little Rock. The additional amount requested is \$3,000, to be divided equally between the two conferences. We recommend that the portion from the Little Rock Conference be taken from funds previously approved at the last regular session. We recommend that the North Arkansas Conference grant \$1500 additional to the Area Hunger Task Force for the 1978 In-gathering Event.

Charles McDonald presented the report of the Committee. He placed on the table to lay overnight a revised standing rule #8 and #9.

He made the motion that the North Arkansas Annual Conference direct the Conference Council on Ministries to elect a Personnel Committee for the Council Staff, both clergy and lay; that the Personnel Committee be empowered to make recommendations concerning the staff personnel and salaries; and that they function like a local Pastor-Parish Committee using guidelines of the 1976 Discipline. The committee shall be composed of five lay persons and three clergy. Raymond Franks suggested that this Personnel Committee serve on a rotating basis. The committee accepted this as part of their recommendation.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN: Marie Jordan, president of the Conference United Methodist Women, presented the Conference officers and the District presidents that were present. They were:

METHODIST FOUNDATION OF ARKANSAS: Dr. Milton D. Deneke, Chairperson, explained the plan for revitalizing the work of the Foundation. He announced that retired Bishop Paul Galloway would be working with the foundation at this time. He expressed hope of being able to hire a full time director by 1981.

WORD OF GREETING: Greetings were read from the Rocky Mountain Annual Conference.

The Bishop suggested and it was moved that we direct the Secretary of the Conference to reply to all letters of greeting from other Annual Conferences.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: Earl Carter made a number of announcements pertaining to the Annual Conference.

LEGISLATIVE FORUMS: Earl Carter explained the procedure to be followed in the legislative forums and gave instructions as to the meeting places. Delegates were directed to go immediately there for organization.

# Second Day—Morning Session June 6, 1978

DEVOTIONS: The leader was Lloyd V. Stone; the speaker was Dr. Walter Underwood. OPENING: Bishop Hicks called the Conference to order and declared the Conference in session.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: The Bishop presented the Rev. O. R. Findley. He mentioned two books by Rev. Findley, "Reflections of a Country Parson" and "City Which Has Foundations." He also presented Dr. and Mrs. John Bayliss to the Conference.

UNITED METHODIST CHILDREN'S HOME: Charles Ramsey presented the amended articles of incorporation of the United Methodist Children's Home and moved its adoption. It was seconded. He then introduced John Gill, attorney for the Home, and asked him to speak to the report. Wayne Jarvis asked a question about the legal liability of the Conference. Mr. Gill explained it would be minimal at this point. Ben Jordan asked, "Does the Conference own the property?" Mr. Gill replied, "No, it's owned by the Board of Trustees." A lengthy discussion ensued with several persons speaking to the various sections of the proposal. Freddie Nixon brought a recommendation from the Health and Welfare section of the Board of Global Ministries endorsing the Articles of Incorporation. Questions called for; it was adopted.

Charles Ramsey moved that we authorize the Conference trustees to meet with the trustees of the Little Rock Annual Conference and the trustees of the Home to work out details. So ordered. There was an expression of appreciation for the outstanding leadership at the Children's Home. Wayne Jarvis moved the entire report be printed. So ordered.

COKESBURY: Sam Albright, representing Cokesbury, was presented to the Conference. He made a statement about displays of books and materials available. He presented a check for \$6,501.47 to go into the Conference Pensions fund. This represents our share of the profits of Cokesbury for this year.

BALLOT: The ballots were distributed for the election of members to serve on the Nominating Committee.

POLICY AND REVIEW: Report #2

Charles McDonald called from the table the amended Standing Rules #8 and #9 (see report of Policy and Review). Emily Cockrill offered an amendment to the proposed standing rule #8. The amendment failed. The proposed amended standing rules #8 and #9 were approved.

COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES COORDINATED REPORT: Sam Teague, Chairperson, presented an overview of the report and lifted up the priorities. Freddie Nixon presented a group from Wyatt Memorial United Methodist Church, Fort Smith, who made a presentation on deaf ministry. Carl Strayhorn, their pastor, introduced the group who presented a devotion and hymn in sign language. Others speaking to the report were Jim to the report were Jim Beal and Emily Cockrill.

BOARD OF MINISTRY: Report #2

Leonard Byers presented the retirees to the Annual Conference. They were:

INSTITUTIONAL REPRESENTATIVES:

Perkins School of Theology: Brooks Jones spoke for the seminary and explained that they were attempting to keep in touch with the Church through the Intern Program.

Scarritt College: George Shepherd and Bob Gentry shared in the report from the college. They expressed appreciation for the support given by this Conference.

Methodist Hospital: John Lafferty spoke of new things happening at the hospital. A slide presentation was presented showing the caring side of the hospital.

Memphis Theological Seminary: W. E. Knickbocker, Dean-elect of the seminary who is a United Methodist minister, spoke for the seminary.

Methodist Nursing Home and Village: Sue Shap, Activities Director at the Home and Village, and Mildred Croft, Director of Nursing, spoke of the work being done.

Candler School of Theology: Dr. Brooks Holifield, a member of the North Arkansas Annual Conference and professor of Church history, spoke of the work at Candler. He told of the recent acquisition of the Hartford Theological library which gives Candler the third largest theological library in the U.S.

St. Paul School of Theology: Dr. William McElvaney told of the seminary receiving the largest endowment in its twenty-year history, which will be used to establish a Chair for training persons in ministries to the aging.

Lydia Patterson Institute: Dr. Noe Gonzales brought greetings and expressed appreciation for our continued support.

Philander Smith College: Dr. Crawford Mims presented a report for the 12 Black Colleges across the nation. He spoke of the needs of Philander Smith and encouraged our support.

Arkansas Council of Churches: Lester Brickford listed three dates of an ecumenical nature—June 15, the dedication of the Ecumenical Retirement Center; June 26-28, Conference on the future of the small church in Arkansas; and July 23-27, Ecumenical School of Missions at Mt. Sequoyah.

Aldersgate: Ray Tribble talked of the program and ministries of the camp.

United Methodist Children's Home: Joe Phillips stated that the Home is now fully licensed by the state and is in the process of becoming accredited by the General Board of Health and Welfare Ministries.

Mt. Sequoyah: N. Lee Cate stated that the program was growing. He announced that a new home for the director was soon to be built. He presented the Bishop a "jogging shirt" to go with "jogging shorts" given him at the Little Rock Conference.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Bob Miller for the Hendricks Hills United Methodist Church, Fort Smith, presented a check for \$4,125.00 to the Conference. This check from the Hendricks Hills Church was given in response to a commitment made by him during the 1977 Session of the Conference to pay half of the funding of the Missional Priorities.

REPORT OF BALLOT: The Conference Secretary reported that there had been two elections to the Nominating Committee: Laity 1979, Lynn Barbaree; Clergy 1979, Victor Green. There had been no majority election in the four other vacancies. Wayne Jarvis moved that we suspend the rules of the Conference and allow those receiving the largest number of votes to be elected. It was done. Those elected were Clergy 1982, Robert Felder and Bob Orr; Laity 1982, Kathleen Sharp and Bill Lindsey. Clint Burleson spoke as to the possibility of changing the structure to allow the person receiving the largest number of votes be declared the winner. Vernon Paysinger stated to do so would be in keeping with the original intention of the Structure Committee.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Jim Lane called the attention of the Conference to the latest issue of the Arkansas Methodist which is available in the foyer.

LEGISLATIVE FORUM: Earl Carter presented further instructions for the Legislative Forums. Bishop Hicks stated that the first order of business of the Conference on Wednesday would be the Board of Ministry report.

Pat Freemyer asked if the Conference was requesting the Structure Committee to explore the possibility of amending the structure to allow the election of person(s) receiving a simple majority. So ordered.

OPENING: Bishop Kenneth Hicks called the Conference to order. He then presented Jim and Mauzel Beal to the Annual Conference. Jim is the new District Superintendent of the Forrest City District.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Bishop James Henley was introduced to the Conference by Bishop Hicks and was asked to speak about the "Educational Opportunities for Ministers and Laity."

ARKANSAS CHRISTIAN CIVIC FOUNDATION: Ed Harris, Executive Director, spoke at length about alcohol, narcotics, gambling, and pornography.

BOARD OF MINISTRY: Report #2

Max Whitfield presented those to be elected to Deacon's orders. He then recommended that the following persons be discontinued from Probationary Membership: E. Doyle Blanton, Joseph Bourgeois, and John Brown (LP). Seconded,

Approved.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGES: Mrs. Kenneth Hicks, wife of the Bishop, presented to each of the District Superintendents' wives present a corsage and expressed gratitude and appreciation for their fine spirit. Mrs. Ralph Hillis responded for the District Superintendents' wives with a statement of appreciation. Mrs. Hicks asked that we remember Mrs. Bill Watson, the wife of the District Superintendent of the Forrest City District, who because of illness could not attend. It was moved that the Conference Secretary convey a word of greeting from the Conference to Mrs. Watson. Bishop Hicks then asked all the wives of ministers to stand and be recognized. Joe Taylor brought word to the Conference of the illness of Verlin Eugene Mikesell and asked that we remember Verlin in this difficult time. The Conference ordered the Secretary to send a word of greeting to Brother Mikesell.

HENDRIX COLLEGE: Dr. Roy B. Shilling, President, brought greetings to the Conference. He described the college as not only a learning community, but also a faith community that cares for the "whole" person.

ARKANSAS METHODIST: Jim Lane presented the report from the Pre-Conference Journal and described some of the problems facing the paper. John Workman, editor, spoke to the report and moved its adoption. So ordered.

MOTION: Wayne Jarvis moved that the Conference Secretary convey to the Arkansas Congressional delegation our deep concern over the increased cost of second class mailing. This continued increased cost of mailing threatens the very existence of our church publication, The Arkansas Methodist. So ordered.

MALLALIEU CENTER: Robert Felder spoke of the work of the three Centers and of our support of this work. He called attention to the display of the Board of Church and Society.

COMMITTEE ON STRUCTURE: Report #2 - Pat Freemyer presented the following recommendations:

- 1. In the procedure for election of the Committee of Nominations that "Election will be by majority" be deleted from the procedure, and "Election will be declared for the nominee receiving the most votes for the position" be inserted.
- 2. Aldersgate, Inc. will be related to the North Arkansas Conference through the Committee of Health and Welfare of the Conference Board of Global Ministries.

COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS: Report #2 — Ann Jackson presented the following nominations which have occurred on the Board of Discipleship. Each was elected separately.

COMMISSION ON CHAPLAINS: Paul Dean Davis, representing the Commission, spoke

PENSIONS REPORT: Henry Rainwater, Chairperson, asked Joe Linam, the secretary, to present the report with changes. He also presented requests for special grants for approval by the Annual Conference. They are:

Several others raised various questions after which David Driver moved the question. Passed. The amendment by Charles McDonald failed. Willie L. Walker moved the adoption of the report. Seconded. Approved.

ORDER OF THE DAY: Ben Jordan moved that the Conference Council on Ministries report be the order of the day on reconvening at 2:00 P.M. So Ordered.

## Third Day—Afternoon Session

COURTESY: Charles Casteel presented the several visitors to the Conference.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES: Sam Teague outlined the procedure for dealing with the report.

EVANGELISM: Buddy Arnold presented the report lifting up the three-year program. He emphasized the workshop for disenchanted and inactive church members to be held June 7-8 at Clarksville and July 21-22 at Jonesboro. Adopted.

DISCIPLESHIP: Charles Casteel introduced the report and Gerald Rainwater, the secretary of the Board, presented the various area representatives. Enlistment: Jim McKay outlined three responsibilities (1) intern program, (2) training of summer youth workers, (3) placing of material on church related vocations. Worship: A skit was presented after which Dick Haltom urged attendance at the workshop "Worship Alive" July 13-15 at Hendrix. Education: Ben Hines introduced the age level coordinators and called attention to the report. Gary Barbaree presented the young adult ministries program assisted by Sharon Spurlin and Kurt Wulfekuhler. Laura Casteel presented the cause of youth ministry. She called attention to several youth events. Higher Education: Dr. Olin Cook, in making the report, urged our support of Philander Smith College and called for increased support of Scarritt College. Wesley Foundation: Wendell Dorman presented the special study of Wesley Foundations; he explained in detail the various sections. Dr. Olin Cook presented the report's recommendations to the Conference. Pat Freemyer offered an amendment: (1) Page 1, lines 31 and 32: two representatives from each district, one of which shall be the District Coordinator of Young Adults; one student from each Wesley Foundation. (2) Page 3, lines 37-44: In order that the mission of campus ministry may become a part of district programming, we recommend that the District Coordinator of Young Adults, who is a member of the District Council on Ministry, be responsible for interpreting the cause of campus ministry and the student opportunities at the Wesley Foundations. Adopted.

David Moose moved that the word recommend be removed from Line 1, page 5, to read

"qualifications for campus ministers." Discussion followed. Question. Called amendment failed. Robert Paul Sessions moved an amendment that the word "King" be removed from Page 1, line 55, of the report. The amendment failed. The total report was moved and adopted. Conference Camping Committee: Wayne Clark called attention to a change in dates for the Wilderness Camp. The new date is June 26-30. Allan Hilliard presented a proposal to buy three lots adjoining Camp Nawake using monies already in hand. The cost will be \$4,000.00. It was approved. Ethnic Minority Church: Jim Lane urged that the Batesville and Jonesboro Districts explore the possibility of establishing Black United Methodist Churches. Robert English made the following motion: that a special offering be taken during this Annual Conference and designated to be forwarded to the Treasurer of Taylor Chapel United Methodist Church, Cotton Plant, Arkansas, for the specific purpose of a building program at that Church. Sam Teague moved the adoption of the Ethnic Minority report. It was done.

CHURCH AND SOCIETY: Dr. Francis Christie spoke of the difficulties confronting this board, stressing our need for more of a "doing" of theology. He moved the adoption. Seconded. Bill Lindsey moved that Line 46, Page 13 be stricken from the report. Seconded. Discussion followed with attempts to clarify for both sides the issues involved. The motion failed. A motion was made by Olgie Moore that Paragraph 3, Page 12, lines 41-47 be stricken from the report. Following discussion the question was called. It failed. Sam Teague moved the adoption of the report of Church and Society. It was done.

RECESS.

# Fourth Day—Morning Session June 8, 1978

DEVOTIONS: Elise Shoemaker, organist and song leader, led in a medley of three hymns. Mrs. Willie Washington led the morning prayer. Bishop Hick's message was entitled "A Sent Ministry."

CONFERENCE CALLED TO ORDER: The business session was called to order.

ORDER OF THE DAY: Wayne Jarvis moved the delay of the Order of the Day to allow the Conference Council on Ministries to complete its report. So ordered.

WHERE SHALL ANNUAL CONFERENCE BE HELD NEXT YEAR? George Ivey, pastor of First United Methodist Church, Ft. Smith, introduced Dr. Wayne Lanier, a layman from First Church. Dr. Lanier invited the Annual Conference to meet at Ft. Smith for its next session. It was moved and seconded to accept the invitation. Motion carried.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES (continued report): Sam Teague presented the following motion in behalf of the Commission on Religion and Race: that the Bishop of the Arkansas Area use his personal presence and influence with the Trustees of Philander Smith College in the selection of women and ethnic minorities to that Board from the North Arkansas Conference. So ordered.

STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN: Carol Lascaro made the report. She stated that there had been a growth in the number of women in the ministry. She expressed appreciation for the Conference's inclusiveness and requested that as a further expression of this, that a

woman preacher be selected as the preacher for the next session of the Annual Conference. Jeanne Audrey Powers was recommended as a possible selection.

RELIGION AND RACE: Jon Guthrie called attention to line 23 of the report which deals with equipping of minority leadership. He related this to the training of summer youth workers and explained that there ought to be serious consideration to the use of qualified persons regardless of race. The report was moved, seconded and adopted.

COMMUNICATIONS: Herschel McClurkin presented the report, lifting up the radio program, "Connexion," as a new approach to ministry. Eight stations in the state are carrying the program at this time. He moved the adoption of the report found in the Pre-

Conference Journal. Seconded and adopted.

LAY LIFE AND WORK: Emily Cockrill presented the report. She called for a battle to bring about a sense of peace in the Conference by informing the people on all levels. She asked for there to be a special Laity Session at the 1979 Annual Conference which would promote understanding of issues and inform the delegates. The report was adopted.

WORLD HUNGER: Avis Moore reported that in the Legislative sessions many questions were raised and that the leadership had done an excellent job of handling the questions. She

called attention to the report and moved its adoption. Adopted.

GLOBAL MINISTRIES: Ron Clark presented the report. Mrs. Ralph Hillis told about the Ministers' Wives Luncheon program which was a "County Fair." The proceeds from their program will go to buy a heifer for Heifer International. ECUMENICAL AND INTERRELIGIOUS CONCERNS - Ron Clark presented the names of the following 27 persons to be elected as our representatives to the Arkansas Council of Churches: Rex Darling, Raymond Hawkins, Ben Jordan, Walter Davidson, Lewis Chesser, John Workman, Harold Eggensperger, Earl Carter, Mildred Osment, Bob Edwards, Wayne Jarvis, Arvill Brannon, Gladys Womack, Rhonda Crow, Lowell Eaton, Ron Clark, Leland Smith, Everett Burns, Ken Stewart, June Spotts, Kathy Fadick, Mary Ellen Jesson, Marj Kelly, Jerry Nichols, Philip Hathcock, Kathleen Sharp, Freddie Nixon. They were elected. MISSIONS-Joe Wilkerson in presenting the report, reminded that Advance Specials provide the church with a way of getting 100% of the money sent to its destination. TOWN AND COUNTRY—Joe Jerry Nichols lifted up the brochure on "Church and Community Seminar" to be held June 26-28 at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff. HEALTH AND WELFARE—Ron Clark called attention to the work in this area and expressed special appreciation to Brenda Cooper for her work in planning the Deaf Ministry program. Report adopted.

PARISH DEVELOPMENT: Ben Jordan stated that their report should be called "Operation Understanding." The filmstrip, "Together We Can," was shown. Kathy Fadick spoke to the report indicating that there will be a survey made of the Annual Conference to see where this group can best be of assistance. Muriel Peters spoke from the Legislative session stating that those present did not like to see size or number equated with the effectiveness of the church. He moved an amendment to the report be added as the introduction of the closing paragraph of the report. (See Report.) It was adopted. The total report was adopted.

RECONSIDERATION: Bennie Harmon moved for reconsideration on the Board of Discipleship report. The Conference voted to allow reconsideration. He offered the following amendment to be added on page 16, line 31, of the report: "and to have workshops on marriage, family and single living, parenthood, 'home' building, human sexuality, and divorce." The Area of Education accepted this and made it part of their report. The

amendment was adopted.

COUNCIL ON PROFESSIONAL MINISTRY: Jim Beal, chairperson, presented several items pertaining to the death of clergy for ministers to pick up and carry home, urging them to read carefully. He made the following motion: that the Annual Conference direct the Council on Professional Ministry to make a study of the standardization of clergy salaries and report to the 1979 Session of the Annual Conference. Motion seconded and adopted.

BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY: Jon Guthrie recommended two changes in the report:

1) under Section II, item 2j, the addition of two sources for counseling (See Report);

2) under Section III add: "G. The Board recommends that clergy be encouraged to participate in the Academy of Parish Clergy, a continuing education program involving 50 academic hours per year, and that the Board provide one-half (\$25.00) the cost of one year's membership. H. The Board recommends that the Conference establish an 18-month period under appointment for seminarians following graduation to fulfill the requirements for full connection." The report was adopted.

BOARD OF DIACONAL MINISTRIES: Arvill Brannon presented a new report and asked that it be substituted for the one found in the Pre-Conference Journal. (See Report.) He explained that diaconal ministers are consecrated, while others under this Board are certified. Two persons were presented for certification: Avis Moore and Loretta Jane Helms. Leonard D. Bobo, who had been consecrated a diaconal minister the evening before,

was presented a parchment.

GROUP INSURANCE: Gail Anderson made some changes in the terminology used in the report. These were approved. Charles Ramsay moved that Item 3 be changed to read "50% paid by the minister and 50% by the charge." Motion failed. A recommendation for an increase in psychiatric coverage which would provide care up to 80% of \$50.00 per visit for 50 visits per year was presented. The additional coverage would cost \$1.08 for a minister, plus \$2.10 for the spouse with or without children, per quarter. Motion was made to accept this change. Adopted. Joe Kennedy moved that the committee be directed to make a study of dental insurance and report back to the 1979 Session. Passed. Total report adopted.

COMMITTEE ON EQUITABLE SALARIES: Frank Clemmons presented the report and

moved its adoption. Adopted.

POINT OF PRIVILEGE: Frank Clemmons moved that the Bishop's Morning Devotional, "A Sent Ministry," be printed in the Arkansas Methodist or mailed through the Council on Ministries office. So ordered.

POINT OF PRIVILEGE: Bishop and Mrs. Hicks presented Ralph and Era Lee Hillis with gifts and the Bishop presented a plaque to Ralph expressing appreciation for his good work.

STANDING INVITATION: Bishop Hicks stated that he had inadvertantly failed to tell the Conference at the time of the selection of the place for the next Annual Conference Session, that Hendrix College has given a standing invitation to the Conference. Dr. Christie reaffirmed this by stating that this invitation will always be in effect.

MEMOIRS: James Barton made the report. It was adopted.

JOINT COMMITTEE ON DISABILITY: The policy statement pertaining to those admitted and continuing on Disability Leave was presented by Hillman Byram. It was adopted.

ARCHIVES AND HISTORY: Bob English presented to the Conference and it was accepted by Bishop Hicks, a gavel made from wood taken from the cabin of Eli Lindsey, the first Methodist preacher in Arkansas. This is to be placed in the Arkansas Room at Hendrix

College. He recognized Mrs. Virginia Upton for her fine work. Report adopted.

RECONSIDERATION: George Shephard asked the Conference to reconsider the report of Diaconal Ministries. Wayne Jarvis moved the reconsideration. So ordered. The following motion was made to be added as an additional recommendation: "We encourage each local church which employs lay professional staff to provide in its budget a Continuing Education Fund of at least \$50.00 per professional staff member. We request that each District Superintendent make this an item of inquiry at the charge conference of such local churches." Adopted.

MOTION TO CONTINUE: Noting the time, Charles Ramsay moved that we stay in session until all the business was completed. Motion failed.

 $COUNCIL\ ON\ MINISTRIES:\ The\ total\ Council\ on\ Ministries\ report\ was\ then\ adopted.$ 

RECESS: A motion was made to recess until 1:30 P.M. So ordered.

## Fourth Day—Afternoon Session

COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION: Joe Cooper called on Mr. Brawner to give the Treasurer's Report to the Conference. Mr. Brawner announced that the General Conference Insurance Fund had returned \$2000 to the Conference as its share of earnings accrued by participating churches allowing their dividends to remain in the Fund. This can be used by the Conference to help upgrade properties in dire need. Joe Wilkerson moved that this \$2000 be credited to the account of Church Extension for Taylor Chapel Church in Cotton Plant. So ordered. Mr. Brawner expressed appreciation to the Conference for its support and stated that this would be the last Annual Conference he would serve in his present capacity. The Conference gave him a standing ovation. Joel Cooper moved the adoption of this report. So ordered. YOUTH SERVICE FUND—David Moose announced that all Youth Service Fund monies will now be sent to the Area Treasurer—but through the local church treasurer. He announced a gift of \$50.00 from Youth Service Fund to go to the Forrest City District Camp for Handicapped Children.

CFA REPORT #2: Wayne Jarvis presented the corrections and additions to the list of apportionments in the Pre-Conference Journal. Joel Cooper moved the adoption of Section I, A and B. Adopted. Section C and D were adopted. Charles Casteel moved an amendment to Section E, 2, that a line item for \$4500 take the place of the request of \$10.00 per charge. The amendment failed. Section E was adopted. In Section II, A and B were adopted. The remainder of the report was adopted. Joel Cooper moved the adoption of the report as a

whole, Adopted,

MOTION: Lowell Eaton moved that CFA and Policy & Review make a study of travel costs and report to the 1979 Conference Session. It was approved.

MOTION: Warren Blanchard moved that CFA study the policy of sending print-out sheets

to treasurers only. Passed.

MOTION TO RECONSIDER: Chris Cooper moved that the Conference reconsider the motion to study the travel costs. Motion to reconsider was approved. He moved that the responsibility for the study be assigned to the Committee on Policy & Review. The motion carried. Wayne Jarvis suggested that cost of administering districts be added to the study.

DISTRICT CONFERENCE JOURNALS: The Conference Secretary announced that the report from the Committee on District Conference Journals had been filed. All districts except the Jonesboro District had presented their Journals and they were approved.

CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES: Four resolutions were offered concerning abandoned properties. Each was individually adopted. (See Report.) Muriel Peters moved the adoption of the total report. Adopted.

MOVING DAY: Harold Spence moved that Wednesday, June 14, 1978, be Moving Day. So ordered.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS: Charles Casteel presented a Resolution of Appreciation. (See Report.) Adopted.

PRIVILEGE: Waymon Hollis reminded the Conference of the forthcoming Ashram, June 29-July 1, at Mt. Sequoyah and urged the Conference members to participate.

THE SENDING FORTH: Emily Cockrill was Worship Leader for the Closing Celebration. READING OF APPOINTMENTS: The appointments were read by Bishop Kenneth W. Hicks.

ADJOURNMENT: The Conference was adjourned at 3:45 P.M.

RECESSIONAL OFFERING: An offering of \$257.08 was received for the Taylor Chapel Church as the Conference members were leaving.

## VI. Reports Of Councils, Boards, Committees

### Coordinated Report Conference Council On Ministries

#### Statement Of Purpose

The Council on Ministries of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church is a servant of the Church at the Conference level. It is directly answerable to the Annual Conference, and works closely with the Bishop and Cabinet, District Council on Ministries and Boards and Agencies of the Conference.

The purpose of the Council on Ministries is six-fold:

- TO LISTEN to be sensitive to the leadership of God's Holy Spirit and to be aware of
  missional needs of the Church as expressed from local churches, District Councils on
  Ministries, Annual Conference Agencies, and Jurisdictional and General Agencies of the
  Church.
- 2. TO PLAN to receive, to initiate, and to research program suggestions that are consistent with the goals and policies of the Annual Conference.
- 3. TO COORDINATE to develop program suggestions from the various Conference Agencies, General Church Agencies, District, and local church agencies into a coordinated program for recommendation to the Annual Conference.
- 4. TO SUBMIT the coordinated Conference program, with recommended program priorities to the Annual Conference for consideration, amendment and adoption.
- 5. TO IMPLEMENT AND ADMINISTER to implement and administer the adopted program of the Annual Conference and to assign the "program" to the various Boards and Agencies of the Conference and Districts. (It is understood that special committees and task forces will be used from time to time to carry out special program tasks.)
- 6. TO EVALUATE to have an ongoing evaluation of programs and procedures to test effectiveness in carrying out the Conference program. (The evaluation content and process shall reflect our primary concern for the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ at a personal and congregational level.)

#### Missional Priorities - 1979

#### I. Ethnic Minority Local Church

GOAL: To strengthen the Ethnic Church for Christian Mission and Ministry, and to sensitize the white majority about ethnic concerns.

#### **OBJECTIVES:**

- A. Leadership Development
  - a. For further strengthening of the small membership black church using leadership teams trained specifically for this purpose.
  - b. To continue efforts to recruit at least four black ministers by 1980.
  - c. Continued participation in the annual meeting of Black Methodists for Church Renewal meeting for training and implementation of goals of United Methodists.
- B. Congregational Development
  - a. Ethnic clergy to maintain confirmation with assistance provided by District Councils on Ministries, and the Conference Committees on Education and Evangelism to continue workshops on evangelism for the black churches.
  - b. We recommend that the Committees on Mission of the Conference Boards of Global Ministries select at least (3) three small ethnic churches in each

Conference to be targeted for improved physical facilities to enable them to more efficiently carry out their ministry and mission.

C. Salary Supplement

We call on Conference and District Boards and Agencies to make requests for the supplementing of salaries of ethnic clergy such as might be available through General Board of Global Ministries, Temporary General Aid, District Missions Boards, boards supplementary aids, and equitable salaries to aid ethnic ministers. We further recommend that a committee from each of the Conferences be established, composed of two persons from the Board of Global Ministries, two persons from Equitable Salary, and four from Ethnic Minority Local Church Task Force, to define ways in which parity can be reached by ministers in small-church communities so as to enhance and appropriately reward them for service rendered.

D. Training and Recruitment

We affirm the action taken in recruiting the Church and Community Workers and Community Developers. We call on the Conference Council on Ministries, Board of Equitable Salary, Board of Ordained Ministry, to help strengthen leadership in the churches and communities as well as to be diligent to secure trained ministers in the total development of ethnic churches. We recommend that a special committee be set up with ethnic involvement in developing appropriate recruitment and internship programs for small churches.

E. Church Nurture

We would encourage black members on District Councils on Ministries in areas where black churches exist or where black people live.

F. Church Extension

We call upon the ethnic task forces, Boards of Global Ministries to explore with District Councils on Ministries needs for ethnic church extension throughout the Area.

#### Special Notices

We call attention to the small response to the fund for Ethnic Minority Local Church and encourage strongly, that all churches contribute to this "Missional Priority" as established by the General Conference and accepted by the Arkansas Area Conferences of the United Methodist Church 1976-1980.

We ask the Arkansas Area Annual Conferences to support Human Relations Sunday and to help mission programs in the Arkansas Area. February 11, 1979.

#### II. Evangelism

GOAL: To help United Methodists live out a "whole gospel" approach to their evangelistic ministry.

#### **OBJECTIVES:**

- A. Every local church develop and/or expand a comprehensive plan of evangelism in their church.
- B. Every local church start/or expand their Visitation Program and where necessary, obtain "Visitation Evangelism" training. Consideration should be given to black churches or clusters of black churches for this program.
- C. Conduct District refresher courses and review new materials available on baptismal vows and confirmation.
- D. Make final preparations for area-wide evangelistic rally in 1980 to include organizing local church task groups.
- E. Make Arkansas more aware of the Christian witness of United Methodists through the use of radio and TV spots.

F. To have a 40-hour lab on reaching inactive members, and to plan a workshop for training leaders.

Program Cost .......\*\$1,000.00 \*(To be supplemented with \$2,950.00 by the Board of Discipleship) (Assigned to the Committee on Evangelism)

#### III. World Hunger

GOAL: During this quadrennium, to sensitize persons in the North Arkansas Conference to the causes, effects, and scope of World Hunger; and to lead each local church to identify and utilize the appropriate channels of response.

#### **OBJECTIVES:**

- A. To continue the emphasis to eradicate the root causes of hunger through the Area Hunger Task Force.
- B. To continue support for the six approved projects described in the "Ingathering Projects 1978":
  - (1) Soya Production and Research Association, Bareilly U.P. India
  - (2) World Christian Relief Fund, Inc.
  - (3) Heifer Project International
  - (4) Delta-Pace Project
  - (5) Church World Service Supplies
  - (6) Arkansas Nutrition Program for the Elderly
- C. Through continuance of Lent-Thanksgiving emphasis, to develop a concern for consumption patterns and life styles in each local church through communication media, trained "hunger interpreters," and opportunities for commitment to simpler lifestyles.
- D. To maintain the network of District and local church hunger coordinators as an effective channel of communication, planning and implementation of hunger concerns.
- E. To promote annually a World Hunger Sunday.
- F. To continue plans for "Ecumenical Ingathering," November 24, 1979, State Fair Grounds, Little Rock, in cooperation with the Inter-Faith Hunger Task Force. Methodist portion of Goal: \$350,000.

#### IV. Church Extension/New Congregation Development

GOAL: To establish one new church (congregation) each year for ten years, beginning January 1, 1980 to 1990 in the North Arkansas Conference.

#### **OBJECTIVES:**

- A. Establish a Church Development Task Force to design a comprehensive plan of church extension and new congregation development including research, financing, and potential sites to be recommended to the Annual Conference in June. 1979.
- B. Direct the Committee on Missions, Board of Global Ministries, to appoint by September, 1978, the Church Development Task Force consisting of 10-15 persons including representatives from the following groups: Cabinet, Council on Finance and Administration, ethnic minorities, clergy, laity, men, women, urban, rural, and Committee on Missions.

\*Program Cost: 1978 . . . \$2,000.00 - 1979 . . . \$5,000.00

(\*From Conference Building Fund) (Assigned to Church Development Task Force)

#### V. Communications

LONG RANGE GOAL: By January 1, 1980, establish an area office of communications/resource center to handle among other duties, news releases and AV Library.

SHORT RANGE GOAL: By January 1, 1979, establish Area "Task Force" on Communications to work on this long range goal. Suggested Task Force: Composed of COM Director, Associate Director, Administrative Assistant, Chairperson of Conference Committee on Communications, one other person from this Committee designated by the Committee, Chairperson of Board of Managers of Arkansas Methodist, Editor of Arkansas Methodist, Area Treasurer. Suggest this task force composition be the same for the two Conferences of the Arkansas Area.

Development of Conference Resource Center to support local church and District

work through the Library, etc.

More effective use of news media in public relations and publicity for Conference, District and Local Churches.

Work for coordinated efforts on an Arkansas Area basis with the Resource Center (AV Library, etc.), news releases and other possible Communications aspects.

District Workshops for training Local Church Coordinators of Communications.

Emphasis to the responsibility of "Interpretation" for World Service and Benevolent programs that Coordinators of Communications at the Local Church and District levels need to undertake.

VI. Developing Human Potential

GOAL: To affirm the dignity and worth of all persons and utilize the full human potential within our Church.

**OBJECTIVES:** 

A. To identify, coordinate, and implement with other Conference groups (Church and Society, Religion and Race, Ethnic Minority Local Church, Status and Role of Women, Conference Young Adult Council) common concerns so as to avoid duplication of programs, and to pool efforts in common causes.

B. Two areas of greatest need are in aging and human sexuality. Two subcommittees have been set up to do some preliminary planning and make

recommendations for action.

Program Cost ......\$1,500.00 (Assigned to the Task Force on Developing Human Potential.)

VII. Parish Development

The 1977 sessions of both the Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conferences designated three priorities in addition to the three general church Missional Priorities. Among these was Parish Development. (Cf. Journal, Little Rock Conference, 1977, p. 73; Journal, North Arkansas Conference, 1977, p. 77.)

Kenneth Hicks, Bishop of the Arkansas Area, prepared and presented to concerned persons a position paper, "Parish Development," in which he described some hopes for parish development in the area, including that of "providing every United Methodist Church and every United Methodist person access to full ministry for Christian nurture, discipleship enablement, and the opportunity to be in mission as Christian persons and as congregations." This paper and the concepts it embodied provided the needed stimulus for an intentional program in parish development which encompassed both annual conferences.

Toward implementation of the parish development goals adopted by the

conferences, several subsequent events have occurred:

(1) An Area Parish Development Workshop, August 18-19, 1977, at Methodist Headquarters, Little Rock, which included clergy and lay representatives from both conferences, the Bishop and respective Cabinets, and members of the following boards, committees or agencies: Ordained Ministry, Global Ministries, Church and Society, Equitable Salaries, Town and Country, Missions, and Ethnic Minority local churches. The workshop was led by Gladys Campbell, Jerry Chapman, and Harold McSwain of the Office of Town and Country Ministries,

Board of Global Ministries.

(2) From the persons attending the above workshop, an Area Task Force on Parish Development was called together September 16, 1977, to discuss and plan the future of parish development. "The Bishop's Committee on Parish Development," which included rural and urban district superintendents, rural lay persons, representatives from the Board of Ordained Ministry, Town and Country or Board of Global Ministries, Ethnic Minority Local Churches (clergy and lay), Equitable Salaries, and Council on Ministry staff persons.

In addition, the task force outlined eight components of parish development: (1) cabinet policy, (2) conference policy, (3) staff development, (4) training for staff, cabinets and leaders, (5) parish superintendent or developer, (6) equitable salary and funding, (7) biblical and theological guidelines, (8) identification of local settings for parish development. These components became the agenda for the committee.

(3) On November 28, 1977, the first meeting of the Bishop's Committee on Parish

Development was held. The Committee is composed of the following:

Organization was effected at this meeting: Chairperson, Ben Jordan; Vice-Chairperson, Harold Davis; Secretary, Kathy Fadick. Task groups were formed to work on cabinet and conference policy and the components of each were designated.

The Little Rock and North Arkansas Conference cabinets adopted the following area policy on parish development:

### An Arkansas Area Cabinet Policy On Parish Development January, 1978

#### WHEREAS,

The goal of Christian mission in the Arkansas Area should include that of providing every United Methodist Church and every United Methodist person access to full ministry for Christian nurture, discipleship, enablement, and the opportunity to be in mission as Christian persons and as congregations, and, WHEREAS.

Seventy-five (75) percent of the churches in the Arkansas Area are limited in the realization of this goal because of a membership of 200 or less and, fifty percent of the churches are even more limited with a membership of 100 or less. AND WHEREAS,

It is extremely difficult for churches of this size membership to individually have a full-time ordained (or unordained) ministerial leadership.

NOW THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY MUTUALLY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

The members of the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conference Cabinets do hereby commit ourselves in sacred covenant to "shoulder the burdens, share the risks, and celebrate the joys' of all these churches within the broader scope of "full ministry" for all persons, and further, this commitment shall find expression through a genuine exercise of a policy of Parish Development.

We believe that through a long-range program of Parish Development we can help all local churches that relate to such a program to be more effective, individually and together.

We believe that the unique nature of each congregation, large and small, will enable all to potentially benefit the other in the commonness of our calling and mission.

And, we believe that through a long-range program of Parish Development every church

in the Conference and in the Area can be related to a full-time ordained minister.

We encourage all pastors and all churches of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences to prayerfully consider their opportunities through present and potential parish arrangement; and, we pledge to support as the Cabinets, a continuity in appointments to Parish arrangements that will undergird both the churches and the pastors who assume responsibility for this vital area of ministry.

Our thanks to the Division of Town and Country, Board of Global Ministries, for a \$6,000 grant that made possible two programs critical to the initiation of parish development in Arkansas: (1) Consultations on Parish Development under the leadership of Dr. Harold McSwain, Rural Ministries Training Program, Columbus, Ohio, and (2) a Parish Itineration Project that enabled members of the committee to visit parish development models in Florida, Ohio, and Kansas.

Our main objective in 1979 is the implementation of a survey of the Arkansas Area that will assist the United Methodist people of Arkansas in deciding where and how various patterns of parish development might be carried out at a projected cost of \$3,600.00.

We hope to have in every district a survey of every church to be carried out through cooperation and consultation with the District Superintendents and the District Councils on Ministries. We plan a follow-up to pinpoint potential sites in each district.

We respectfully request that this Annual Conference consider and approve an Arkansas Area policy on Parish Development. We submit the following statement for your consideration in this regard:

Arkansas Area Policy On Parish Development

Recognizing that 75% of the United Methodist churches in Arkansas have less than 200 members, and that 50% have memberships of 100 or less; and that historically those small membership churches were the major strength of Methodism in our state, we acknowledge that many of these same churches are at times experiencing the following hurts: hopelessness, powerlessness, lack of continuity of effective professional leadership, lack of vision as well as unrealized dreams, lack of meaningful involvement, and all too often, an absence of a vital sense of belonging.

BECAUSE WE BELIEVE MINISTRY IS:

(1) a lifestyle of servanthood, which is a way of relating to persons, to which all

Christians are called:

and

(2) dependent upon a nurturing community of prayer and celebration, learning and action for its faithfulness to the gospel, and so for its "vitality and impact on an unbelieving world" (See DISCIPLINE, par. 106);

Our concerns in parish development are to enable:

- (1) "small congregations to become ministry oriented rather than survival oriented;
- (2) clergy, diaconal ministers, and lay professionals to understand themselves as "enablers of ministry" rather than "doers of program";

and

- (3) an openness to the variety of structures the relationship between churches may take (See DISCIPLINE, par. 206.)
- 206.1 Local churches ("large and small"), with the guidance of the Holy Spirit, may enhance their witness to each other and to the world by showing forth the love of Jesus Christ through forms of mutual cooperation.

We of the Arkansas Area, through parish development, covenant to accomplish the following:

- (1) Enable small churches to be in mission in the community and the world.
- (2) Enable small churches to have access to full-time pastoral coverage.
- (3) Enable small churches to have access to support structures that will enable the members of every church to engage in opportunities for nurture, training, and outreach.
- (4) Enable pastors and others serving persons to be members of a support team that will maximize the productiveness and morale of each pastor or serving person.
- (5) Attention to the special needs represented in ethnic minority local churches, and, any other group or cluster of small churches shall be given due consideration.
- (6) The Parish Development program shall be planned and administered by the two Annual Conferences through an Area Parish Development Committee appointed by the Bishop. At such time the Area Committee has completed its assigned tasks, the responsibilities of Parish Development shall be reverted to the responsible committees of the Boards of Global Ministries of the two Annual Conferences.
- (7) The task of the Bishop's Committee on Parish Development is to plan and recommend to the CCOMs objectives related to (1), (2), (3), and (4). The Committee shall be closely related to the Town and Country Ministries of the General Board of Global Ministries for consultation, resourcing and leadership.
  - The Committee shall provide the opportunity for direct involvement with members of the two Cabinets and related District Council on Ministries in Parish Development.
- (8) The Committee shall be cognizant of the variety forms the relationship between churches may take as described in the Discipline in Paragraph 206, and, the awareness of a two-way sense of mission that can exist among large and small churches so that through a working relationship there may emerge some things that each have to offer the other.

The sole intent of parish development is to assist each congregation to attain its full potential of ministry through voluntary involvement and cooperation of the members of the congregation always being sensitive to the preservation of the identity of the local church. We hasten to further affirm that the small church often has such to offer to the whole church; thus, to strengthen the linkage is to mutually strengthen the entire Body of Christ.

### VIII. Wesley Foundation

(This priority was added with the adoption of the study report on Campus Ministry.)

## **Other Conference Programs**

**Church And Society** 

The United Methodist Church stands in crisis. One manifestation of the crisis is the question as to whether it can reaffirm and revitalize its historic social concerns. This report is a call to such a reaffirmation. In 1952, commenting on the state of affairs in our nation, Reinhold Niebuhr noted, "Our nation . . . is less potent to do what it wants in the hour of its greatest strength that it was in the days of its infancy." It is just possible that this sort of irony applies to us as United Methodists in the area of social concerns.

The Doctrinal Standards of our church identify the "living core" of our theological heritage as: revealed in Scripture, illumined by tradition, vivified in experience, and

confirmed by reason.

The prophetic figures of the Old Testament provide a part of the scriptural background. Amos, the first of the literary prophets, expressed concern over those who were "at ease in Zion." His catalog of social concerns ends with the lament that the deeper problem is that "they are not grieved over the ruin of Joseph."

Our Lord utilized and shared the concern of the prophets for social righteousness. Luke pictures Jesus in Nazareth reading from the Book of Isaiah, proclaiming "release to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed."

The roots of our social gospel are as ancient as the roots of our faith. This needs no

apology.

United Methodists should not be surprised to discover the social concerns of their church. Indeed, we should be distressed when these dimensions are not both apparent and articulate. John Wesley wrote, in 1739, "The Gospel of Christ knows no religion but social; no holiness but social holiness." Those who claim that the scope of Wesley's social thought was limited to reform and philanthropy, important though these are, simply have not realized the whole of Wesley's thought. A Methodism without an activating and actualizing social gospel is a feeble imitation at worst and a caricature at best. Such affirmation is basic to the humane theology of our tradition.

The decade of the 60's witnessed world-shaking movements — civil rights advances, a new awareness of the discriminatory patterns related to sexual stereotyping, a vivid protest against war and its accompanying impact on the human spirit, a people fed up with cynical abuses of the political system, a new awareness of environmental problems. We are deeply thankful for the advances that have been made. Some of them were in part because of actions of churches; but some were in spite of church constituencies.

There are thrilling opportunities for the church in mission; but to be faithful to its calling its actions have to go beyond cosmetic "reforms." We must also do battle with the temptation to equate social responsibilities with social respectability. We call this conference to a socially sensitive theological commitment rooted in the kind of moral courage that has at times characterized the tradition which has nourished us.

Your Board of Church and Society again reaffirms and urges the constituency of this annual conference to join in enthusiastic acceptance of the mandate given to this Board by action of the General Conference: "... to relate the gospel of Jesus Christ to the members of the church and to the persons and structure of the communities and world in which they live. It shall seek to bring the whole life of man and woman, their activities, possessions, and community and world relationships, into conformity with the will of God. It shall show the members of the Church and the society that the reconciliation which God effected through Christ involves personal, social, and civic righteousness. Prime responsibility of the board is to seek the implementation of the Social Principles and other policy statements of the General Conference on Christian Social Concerns." (paragraph 1202 of The Book of Discipline, 1976)

This has been an interesting year for this board. Several changes have come about, some of them unexpectedly. A part of the year has been spent in reorganization of personnel within the membership of the board. We should like to begin the details of our report with an expression of appreciation to Tom Barnett, who found it necessary in the course of the year to relinquish the chairmanship. We cherish his deep concerns, his unique sensitivity and his sense of courage. Already we have missed him, and the feeling does not diminish. Also we want to note with appreciation the encouragement given to our efforts by Bishop Hicks and his staff associates.

Our intention is to strive to reach, or at least to get as near as possible to, several goals in the next year.

- We shall continue to engage in research, study, and action in our advocacy of the position
  that local churches and districts should be actively engaged in a social action ministry
  focused on those points where civil and theological concerns coalesce "liberty and
  justice for all."
- 2. We urge each pastor and each congregation to wrestle with the theological base (the undergirding beliefs) for the active involvement of Christians in social and political action, reminding ourselves that this is an integral part of our Methodist heritage and witness.
- 3. We urge churches and agencies to continue to work for the elimination of discriminatory practices based on sex, ethnic background, and economic position. As an expression of this we shall continue to work for the ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment; and we urge all United Methodists to become informed on the issues and to work with those who are engaged in this crucial struggle for the legal recognition of an equality affirmed in our faith. We propose that this annual conference again go on record as supporting the ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment.
- 4. We shall continue to advocate and support the general programs of our church aimed at social awareness. A special concern is that of the ethnic composition of congregations coupled with a sensitivity to churches with historical minority identities.
- 5. We shall continue our plans, as outlined briefly last year, to work for the promotion of the Social Principles of our Church. We note with a degree of sadness, however, that organized efforts in this direction are, themselves, indictments upon all of us; for, when we joined this Church we all vowed to support it and its programs. We commend the Board of Ordained Ministry for its continued and enlightened sensitivity to the social dimension of our calling as Christians.
- 6. We shall continue a task force to explore within the Board our relationship to the Christian Civic Foundation. We are not in a position to make a report or recommendations at this time. If there are questions, we shall be pleased to attempt to respond.
- 7. We hope, through the good offices of The Arkansas Methodist and other means to provide information on meetings and resources available to and issues confronting United Methodists in Arkansas. We have begun to work on information gathering and dissemination systems. There are many resources available to us, but we have not put sufficient efforts into identifying them.
- 8. We note with appreciation the enlightened concern and effective candor of the members of our delegation to the United States Senate as they deal with social questions. We are proud that Senators Dale Bumpers and Kanaester Hodges are United Methodists.
- 9. More important, however, we celebrate those persons, not as visible as public leaders, who have with courage, insight, and devotion, made their witness as heroic Christians in community and civic affairs.

In conclusion we remind and inform this annual conference that there are four committees of the board, willing and ready to be of service. They are: General Welfare, Human Relations, Emerging Social Issues, and World Peace. As a board we reaffirm Wesley's statement, and we invite the conference to join in the affirmation, "The Gospel of Christ knows no religion but social; no holiness but social holiness."

- 1. Promote a sense of fellowship and camaraderie among United Methodist musicians and worship personnel within the conference.
- 2. To approach the theological understanding that comes out of the way we worship with particular regard to the sacraments.
- 3. Encourage United Methodist musicians to create and experiment with new hymns
- 4. To promote music, worship and the arts among children.
- 5. To promote music in the church school.

#### Higher Education:

- 1. That a total of one hundred forty-nine thousand, eight hundred dollars (\$149,800) be apportioned for the operation of Hendrix College for the 1979 year.
- 2. We reaffirm the purpose and mission of Philander Smith College, and further recognize the bright future of the institution. We recommend that \$53,152 be apportioned for the 1979 Black College Fund, and urge the Churches of the Conference to work diligently to have 100 percent funding in order to assure our support of the college.
- 3. We recommend that the total support for the 1979 year for Scarritt College be \$4,500. Further, that this amount be apportioned to the Districts as recommended by the Conference Council on Finance and Administration.
- 4. The Committee requests the amount of eight hundred dollars (\$800.) to be used in the operation of the Committee for the 1979 year.

### **Proposal On Campus Ministry**

The North Arkansas Conference Council on Ministries directed its Committee on Planning and Research to make a study of campus ministry in the conference in 1977-78 and to bring recommendations to the Council in published form. That study was completed and presented to the Council on May 16, 1978, entitled "A Study Proposal on Campus Ministry, 1978."

After slight amendation the Council approved the study proposal and voted to recommend it to the Annual Conference for adoption to be implemented by January 1, 1979.

Although Campus ministry as such is much broader in scope, the efforts of the Committee were largely concentrated on the four Wesley Foundations in the North Arkansas Conference. The four Foundations studied are located at Arkansas Technological University, Russellville; at Arkansas State University, Jonesboro; at the University of Central Arkansas, Conway; and, at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville. The campus ministries of Hendrix College and Philander Smith College are not included in this report.

The membership of the Committee on Planning and Research varied throughout the study due to resignations or illness of members. Those persons who participated in the study were Wendell Dorman, Chairperson; Kenneth Walker, Secretary; Olin Cook, Philip Hathcock, Ferris Baker, Kenneth Renfroe, Dick Haltom, Earl Carter and Victor Nixon. The committee wished to thank Dr. Joe Gibson, Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry, Nashville, Tenn., for his experience and insight.

This study proposal could not have been done without the cooperation of the Wesley Foundation Directors, the students and faculty of the four universities, the interested lay people, and the board members of the Foundation. Because of their interest and commitment to campus ministry these persons spent long hours sharing important information, and filling out questionnaires.

The information of the four campus ministries was derived from three sources: (1) Student and board member questionnaires; (2) Foundation Directors' responses; and (3) on-site visits to the Foundations.

From the date-gathering instruments and procedures noted the Committee came to the following conclusions: (1) Lack of adequate funding and program; (2) Three of the four campus ministers serve local churches in addition to Wesley Foundation which reduces the time available for campus ministry; (3) Lack of support and understanding; (4) Connectional break-down; (5) Local Board Weakness; (6) System of accountability;

(7) Lack of clarity and commitment; (8) General problems of morale;

In addition to the weaknesses discovered above, the Committee also found areas of strength in campus ministry. Among these were: (1) A demonstration of endurance by campus ministers in the face of great difficulty; (2) Knowledgeable and experienced personnel in campus ministry; (3) Adequate facilities that are available for student activities; (4) and a small solid core of students, faculty, and interested laity involved in and committed to the cause of Christ on campus.

On the basis of these findings, the committee on Planning and Research respectfully submits the following recommendations for campus ministry in North Arkansas.

#### A. Conference Level

1. We recommend that the Annual Conference through the Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry restructure campus ministries in accordance with the **Discipline** (Para. 730) and the following procedures:

a. Each Wesley Foundation be provided a full-time campus minister who will be a Conference staff person directly responsible to the Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry and the Council on Ministries staff person related to the

Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry.

b. The Board of Discipleship enlarge the Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry to include the following: two representatives from each district, one of whom shall be the District Coordinator of Young Adult Ministries, 1 student from each Wesley Foundation, Hendrix College and Philander Smith College; the campus minister from each Wesley Foundation (ex officio); the presidents (or appointed representatives) of Hendrix College and Philander Smith College; the cabinet representative for the Board of Discipleship; and a CCOM staff person.

c. That the Committee on Higher Education and Campus Minister function according to the guidelines established by the DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION

HANDBOOK and that the Committee establish the following sub-committees:

(1) Personnel. The responsibility of the personnel sub-committee shall be to hold the Wesley Foundation Board of Directors responsible for the direction and administration of the Wesley Foundation, Para. 730.4(b), and to review annually the performance of the campus minister according to the following criteria:

- Witnessing to faith in Christ Jesus both explicitly and implicitly in the

communities of learning;

1

— Expressing the wholeness of ministry through the several modes of ministry understood by the Church as caring for individuals and their needs (pastor); celebrating God's saving work in history (priest); speaking out for justice in the human social order (prophet); and calling institutions to responsibility for a human administration (king);

- Equipping the faithful for the whole work of ministry within the academic community;

— Developing global perspectives in order to extend the life of faith beyond cultural and national limitations as well as to help focus the expertise of the university on the needs of all the peoples of the world;

— Making available to the churches intellectual resources of higher education and

apprising them of relevant developments in higher education;

 Establishing and maintaining clear lines of communication with the Church at every level;

 Bringing distinctive insights and resources of The United Methodist Church to appropriate ecumenical enterprises and learning from them;

— And expressing in the Church the significance and importance of universities in the quest for the intellectual love of God.

In addition, the Personnel Subcommittee shall perform the following:

- (a) Design and receive an annual report from the campus minister based on the above criteria;
- (b) Upon review and evaluation of the campus minister and in consultation with the Bishop and cabinet make recommendations to local personnel committees regarding campus ministry appointments;

(c) Shall receive and screen applicants for campus ministry;

(d) Shall make salary, travel, and utility recommendations commensurate with ministers of equal tenure to the Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry;

(e) In consultation with the local Wesley Foundation Board Personnel Committee, shall design a job description for each director which will include the following general areas: Evangelism, Education, Worship and Sacraments, Missional outreach, Social Concerns, Administration (ability to assess needs, design and implement program), Promotion of church vocations, pastoral care and counseling, and Ecumenical involvement;

(f) and, Make provisions for time and money annually for continuing education

of campus ministers.

The Personnel Subcommittee shall include the following: the Bishop (ex officio), Chairperson of the Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry, a representative designated by the Cabinet, two laity members of the Committee selected by the Chairperson, and one Wesley Foundation student representative from each foundation chosen by the students.

The Personnel Subcommittee will organize and elect its own officers.

(2) **Policy**. The Policy Subcommittee shall be appointed by the Chairperson, Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry, and will organize and elect its own officers.

The responsibilities of the Policy Subcommittee include design and development of program strategy for campus ministry in the conference; annual review of the constitution and by-laws of local boards to insure that local structure is in accordance with the Discipline and the guidelines outlined for district and local levels as given below; and any other duties assigned by the Committee.

(3) Budget. The Budget Subcommittee shall be appointed by the Chairperson, Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry, and will organize and elect

its own officers.

The responsibilities of the subcommittee include: Assess the financial needs of the Wesley Foundations and Methodist-related colleges in the Annual Conference or area; recommend to the Committee the support levels for each Wesley Foundation and institution in accordance with Para. 1613.3, Discipline; review the budgets of the Wesley Foundations and institutions; recommend a budget for the Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry; and any other duties assigned by the Committee.

(4) Interpretation. The Interpretation Subcommittee shall be appointed by the Chairperson, Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry, and will organize and elect its own officers.

The responsibilities of this subcommittee are perhaps the most important of all and include the following: Interpret the concerns and promote the cause of Higher Education and Campus Ministry to all persons within the conference; develop promotional aids for distribution throughout the conference; utilize campus ministers and students in local churches, districts, camps, etc., to tell the story of campus ministry and the role higher education plays in the church; to promote special days and special funds such as Black College Fund, Ministry Sunday, United Methodist Student Day, Student Recognition Day, World Communion Sunday, Human Relations Sunday, etc., and any other duties assigned by the Committee.

#### B. District Level

In order that the mission of campus ministry may become a part of district programming, we recommend that the district coordinator of Young Adult Ministries, who is a member of the DCOM, be responsible for interpreting the cause of campus ministry and the student opportunities at the Wesley Foundations.

C. Local Level: Campus

We recommend that the following structural changes and procedures be instituted at the local Wesley Foundation level:

1. Composition of the Board of Directors:

- a. That the Board of Directors be composed of twenty-one elected members, nine of whom shall be students and nine other laity from the locale, and three clergy from the Conference. Representation should be given to various age levels, minorities, sexes, and geographical areas.
- b. Ex-officio members of the Board include the campus minister and staff, local pastors, two cabinet representatives (one of whom shall be the local District Superintendent), one representative from the Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry, and one representative from the Conference Council on Ministries Staff.
- 2. That elected members of the Board be selected by a Nominating Committee elected by the Wesley Foundation Board. The Nominating Committee shall be composed of two students, two laity, and two clergy. The campus minister will serve as chairperson.

3. Elected members serve for three-year terms, one-third elected each year. Members may serve no more than two consecutive terms.

- 4. The Wesley Foundation Board members shall be elected by the Annual Conference upon recommendation by the Nominating Committee in consultation with the Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry, with the exception of student members, who shall be elected in the Fall school term by the Board upon nomination by the Nominating Committee.
- 5. Responsibilities of the Board:
  - a. Formulation of constitution and by-laws.
  - b. Annual election of officers, composed of chairperson, vice-chairperson, secretary, and treasurer.
  - c. These officers along with the chairperson of the standing committees shall constitute the executive committee of the Board.
  - d. The executive committee shall meet monthly during the academic year and the total board shall meet at least quarterly.
  - e. Standing committees shall include the following: (1) Program; (2) Finance; (3) Personnel; (4) Property; and (5) Interpretation. Other committees may be established as needed for effective ministry and program administration.
  - f. General oversight of the campus ministry, including long and short-range goals.
  - g. Formulation annually of goals, strategies, and necessary funding to be submitted

to the Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry.

h. Implementation of approved goals.

#### D. Local Level: Church

We recommend that the Work Area on Education or the Council on Ministries of each church designate a young adult coordinator whose responsibilities shall include the promotion of campus ministry in the local church, especially the senior high youth.

#### Recommended Qualifications For Campus Ministers

- A. Ordained elder in good standing in the Annual Conference.
- B. Minimum of two years experience in parish ministry.
- C. Basic understanding of and commitment to the purpose of campus ministry in the United Methodist Church as outlined in "United Methodist Statements on Campus Ministry," adopted by the National Commission on United Methodist Higher Education on November 29, 1976, and recommended to the 1980 General Conference for adoption as a policy statement.
- D. A commitment to professional and intellectual growth and continuing education.

#### Funding Resources For Campus Ministry

The Council recommends that the apportionment for Wesley Foundation continue and that the Annual Conference be made aware that current inflation rates, due to fixed costs in colleges and campus ministries, range from eight to twelve percent annually.

The Council also recommends that, with the consent of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration and the Conference Council on Ministries, local Wesley Foundation boards be given authority to develop additional sources of support from churches, students, alumni, individuals, foundations, and general boards and agencies. One example of such additional funds might be obtained by designating the Wesley Foundation as a district or conference Advance Special. Special gifts to Wesley Foundations will be over and above regular apportionments for Wesley Foundations.

The Council recommends that the Wesley Foundation Fund be administered by the Arkansas Area Treasurer according to the formula established by the Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry. The salary and support items of the Wesley Foundation Fund would be disbursed directly by the Area Treasurer to the campus minister in the event that the campus minister becomes a conference staff person according to the provision above. The remainder of the fund will be disbursed to the local Wesley Foundation for distribution by the local treasurer for program, operation, etc.

#### Conclusion

Ministry in the United Methodist Church is the general ministry as enabled by lay and ordained ministers (para. 101 and 445.1). Both are "summoned and sent by Christ to live and work together in mutual interdependence and to be guided by the Spirit into the truth that frees and the love that reconciles" (para. 110).

The distinctiveness of campus ministry is that it is Christ's ministry present in a university community. It is a ministry marked by concern for the community of faith, for persons, for freedom of inquiry, for values, and for global perspectives. It must be faithful and accountable to the whole church if it is to embody the grace of God which was in Christ.

But the Council believes that the whole church should be faithful to the cause of Christ among the young adults, faculty, and others who inhabit our university communities and who deserve a high priority level of concern on the part of churches throughout the conference. During a period in our history when young adults have tended to drift away from both the local church and the Wesley Foundations we believe that it is imperative that the Annual Conference meet the challenge of campus ministry.

Toward this end we recommend that campus ministry be made a missional priority of the Annual Conference.

#### Education

#### Goal:

The goal of Christian Education is to enable persons to understand, accept and be nurtured in the Christian faith by:

- A basic understanding of the Biblical message, its source, content and relevancies to life:
- 2. Achieve a sustaining faith in God, committing one's total life to Christ;
- 3. Become increasingly mature Christians in all our relationships;
- 4. Understand what the Church is and what it is called to be and do;
- 5. Participate in the life and ministry of the Church;
- 6. Dedicate themselves to the stewardship of all of life; and,
- 7. Abide in the Christian hope understanding of death and the Resurrected life.

#### Objectives:

- 1. As research data (The Hartman Report) indicates that "as goes the Church School, so goes the Church," we encourage an emphasis in all local churches on the four-year program for strengthening Church Schools adopted by the General Conference under the theme: "Decision Point: Church School." The emphasis for 1979 is entitled, "Church School: A Community That Learns."
- 2. To provide opportunities for the training, enrichment and growth of persons in local churches who are involved in educational ministries on all age levels.
- 3. To continue to send leaders and potential leaders to Conference, Area and Jurisdictional Training events to improve their skills and develop expertise in Christian education.
- 4. In light of the fact that in 1976, 45% of our Churches had no one received on profession of faith, 56% had no Confirmation Class, and 36% had no preparatory roll, we recommend that in 1979:
  - 4.1 Continue our emphasis in Confirmation training by encouraging pastors to attend Confirmation Lab at Mt. Sequoyah.
  - 4.2 To emphasize the role of pastor as educator and a trainer of teachers.
  - 4.3 Consider the needs of small membership churches and black churches in planning training events.
  - 4.4 To emphasize the importance of Methodist curriculum resources as Biblically based, Christ-centered, and life-related, and, an essential tool in the educational efforts of each local church.
- 5. As the ratio of young adults in our population continues to increase, we recommend that an intentional effort be made through our Young Adult Task Force to set objectives for 1979 and to plan for implementation. The purpose of the Young Adult Ministry shall be to gather information for guidelines, increase visibility and awareness by young adults of our connectional system, to provide personal growth opportunities, to share models of young adult ministries, and to have workshops on marriage, family and single living, parenthood, "home" building, human sexuality and divorce.
- 6. That nine thousand dollars (9,000.) be apportioned to the several Districts as a goal for DCOM Leadership Training, with 50% to be shared equally with the Districts and 50% to be retained in the Conference Committee on Education budget for its
- 7. In Children's Ministries to:
  - 7.1 Continue to emphasize Leadership Development of District Teams. Type of Conference Workshops will be determined by the evaluations of training events in 1978 and from the input of the District Coordinators at our semi-annual meetings of the Children's Council.
  - 7.2 Send a delegate to the "National Conference on Ministries With Children," date and place to be designated later this year. 1979 is the International Year of the Child. Plan emphasis on a new children's curriculum to be ready in 1980.

- 7.3 Urge DCOM and local churches to send persons to Lab-School Seminar at Mt. Sequoyah.
- 8. In Family Ministries to:
  - 8.1 Continue quarterly "Newsletter" to District Coordinators (If this proves to be of value.)
  - 8.2 Encourage .the training of additional persons for leadership in "Marriage communications" and "Family Life Conferences" and advanced training for persons who have begun training in these areas.
  - 8.3 Encourage local churches to plan short term Intergenerational Studies to promote family study and togetherness.

#### **Global Ministries**

Program Cost — Board of Discipleship ...... \$22,780.00

- I. The Board of Global Ministries taking seriously its purpose as found on page 100, 1976 Journal has provided a channel of communication and interpretation from the General Board of Global Ministries to our conference and local churches. One of the ways this has been done is to provide leadership, resources and support for the two task forces dealing with two of the General Church missional priorities directly related to our board — Hunger and Ethnic Minority Local Church.
  - A. Hunger.
    - 1. We are urging participation of all districts and local congregations to become involved in the Lent to Ingathering programs as planned by the Area Task Force. The culmination of this program will be the Ingathering November 25, 1978.
    - 2. We urge support of the Heifer Project, Int. Our conference advance goal for 1979 is \$10,000.

- 3. We also urge support of the Soya Production & Research Association, Bareilly, U.P., India. Our conference advance goal for this is \$20,000.
- B. Ethnic Minority Local Church.

We continue to give leadership in this field in several ways.

- 1. We recommend Conference Advance Specials with the following goals.
  - a. Rio Grande Conference: 1979-\$7,000.00; 1980-\$7,500.00.
  - b. Indian Missionary Conference: 1979-\$6,500.00; 1980-\$7,000.00.
  - c. Mallalieu Community Centers: 1979-\$10,000.00; 1980-\$10,000.00.
- 2. We support Lydia Patterson Institute by asking the Conference Council on Ministries to request Council on Finance and Administration to make it a line item in the amount of \$11,775.00 for 1979.
- 3. We have designated a portion of our board's budget for 1979 for ethnic minority ministries through the following programs.
  - a. Salary Aid
  - b. Mallalieu Community Centers (Vietnamese H.O.P.E. Center)
  - c. Black Community Development Program
  - d. Interfaith Community Center
  - e. Church Extension
- II. Another way the board has tried to fulfill its purpose is constantly to re-evaluate the programs and plans and to bring to the attention of the conference areas in which we feel we should be concerned. In this light we bring the following recommendations:
  - A. The United Methodist Church has a tradition of ecumenical and interreligious cooperation in ministries to people. In light of that tradition we recommend that the North Arkansas Conference policy of parish and new church development include cooperative/interdenominational ministries as well as United Methodist churches, even when that means financial support of program and building projects not wholly under North Arkansas Conference United Methodist Church polity.
  - B. We recommend that the 1976 Journal entry on p.114, 2 (d) be changed to read as follows: Purchasing when needed and insuring mobile units. Item #4 becomes #5. The new #4 will read: The final approval of grants shall come from the Committee on Missions of the B.O.G.M. Item #5 will read: The Chairperson of the Board of Global Ministries or the Chairperson of the Committee on Missions shall advise the Area Treasurer when payments are to be made.
  - C. That the payee on the insurance on loans show the North Arkansas Conference as payee instead of the Board of Global Ministries.
  - D. That the Committee on Missions of the Board of Global Ministries secure proper insurance (fire, theft, and liability) on all mobile units. The recipient of the units will pay the moving costs. If the recipient does not have funds to pay this, they can apply to the committee for a grant for this purpose, especially in a new church situation.
- III. In fulfilling our purpose the Ecumenical and Interreligious Concerns Committee reports the following goals for 1979.
  - A. Affirm continued promotion of ecumenical activities and projects by the District Councils on Ministries.
  - B. Recommend continued support of the Arkansas Council of Churches:
    - 1. By electing twenty-seven active delegates for the North Arkansas Conference to the Arkansas Council of Churches.
    - 2. Through giving \$5,000.00 from the North Arkansas Conference to help carry out the work of the A.C.C.
    - By promotion of the Mt. Sequoyah Ecumenical Missions Study, the Church in Community Seminar, the Ecumenical Clergy and Laity Conference.
  - C. Recommend sending a conference delegate to the National Workshop on Christian Unity.
  - D. Help the North Arkansas Youth Council establish an ongoing program of ecumenical dimension through an interchurch retreat at Mt. Sequoyah, summer

- E. Recommend broadening the Ecumenical and Interreligious Concerns Committee membership to include a member of the Conference Youth Council and other denomination representation.
- F. We support re-establishing of a Criminal Justice Committee at the state level on an Ecumenical basis.
- G. Enthusiastically recommend our Conference participation in the 1979 Ecumenical Lent to Ingathering World Hunger Event.

QUADRENNIAL GOALS:

Continue dialogue with other denominations about establishing a regular TV/Radio exposure in our area.

IV. In fulfilling our purpose the Missions Committee makes the following report.

A. We urge the promotion of Advance Specials.

- We recommend the continuation of the "Bishops' Special Advance Fund" to which Churches, organizations or groups within the local church or individuals may contribute for Advance Special credit. The fund is administered by the Resident Bishop and is used for such World Division Advance Specials as he deems advisable in his travels for the church.
- 2. We recommend the support of the other advance specials as listed elsewhere in this report.
- B. In the past the BOGM and the Committee on Missions has helped to improve the buildings of the Ethnic Minority Churches. We will continue to do this and ask the District Superintendents to help us in locating churches that need our help in this area.
- C. In order to better enable the Committee on Missions to do its job we are recommending a new statement on Policy for the Conference Building Fund:
  - a. We recommend that \$30,000.00 be provided for the Conference Building Fund by the churches of the conference for the year 1979 with the amount being apportioned among the districts by the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, with the District Stewards setting the apportionment for each local church.
  - b. We recommend that the Conference Building Fund be used for:
    - 1. Purchasing new building sites for present and future developing.
    - 2. \$5,000.00 to be used in 1979 for the research and development of new programs for Church Extension and Congregational Development.
    - 3. Assisting merging churches, and
    - 4. Purchasing and insurance on Mobile Units. The BOGM will secure proper insurance fire, theft and liability on all mobile units. The recipients of the Unit will pay moving and setting up expenses.
  - c. We recommend that the Bishop and Cabinet can recommend to the Committee on Missions churches that need help for the Conference Building Fund.
  - d. The final approval of grants shall come from the Committee on Missions of The Board of Global Ministries.
  - e. The Chairperson of the BOGM and/or the Chairperson of the Committee on Missions shall advise the Area Treasurer when payments are to be made.
  - f. The payments will be sent to the District Superintendent, who then will be responsible for getting the payment to the proper church.

REDEFINITION OF NEW CONGREGATION FROM THE GENERAL BOARD OF GLOBAL MINISTRIES:

The term "new" implies something that has not existed or was not known previously. A "new congregation" is a body of Christians who, as individuals, intentionally join together in Christian Fellowship, worship and service as an expression of the Church of Jesus Christ in a given locality or neighborhood. The "newness" is the "joining together," not in the place or structure in which they meet. Thus they may be a "New Congregation" meeting in an old church structure

formerly occupied by another congregation. Whether the "New Congregation" chooses to continue the old "name" identified with the structure makes no difference. Under God and Jesus Christ the congregation is a new creation given for the purpose of revealing its own expression of what it means to be the Church of Jesus Christ and the United Methodist Church in particular in the place.

- V. In fulfilling our purpose the Town & Country Committee reports the following goals:
  - A. Assemble and Publish Creative Ideas for the work of Town & Country Churches.
    - 1. Publish a workbook of ideas under the title, "IT Worked in our Church."
      - 2. Investigate what our Committee counterparts in other conferences are doing (as a source for some of the material for the above booklet.)
      - 3. Establish and maintain effective two-way communication links connecting the Conference Committee and Board with the District Councils and local churches, utilizing District Coordinators of Town & Country Ministries and the channels provided by the Education and Cultivation Task Force.
  - B. Parish Development:
    - 1. Task Force to share in plans for Bishop's Consultation on the Parish.
    - 2. Chairman to serve as a member of the Area Bishop's Committee on Parish Development for input, coordination, and Communication.
    - Interpret to pastors and churches in the conference potentials and values in cooperative ministries.
      - a. Produce interpretive material for Education and Cultivation Task Force Distribution. (Ongoing.)
      - b. Include ideas in the workbook, "It Worked in our Church."
      - c. Develop resource teams for interpretation and training.
  - C. Leadership Recruitment and Involvement:

Promote involvement of leadership representing the Town & Country churches in annual conference sessions, and in conference boards and agencies.

 Establish a cooperative project with the Conference Nominating Committee and the Commission on Religion and Race to identify and recruit lay leadership and lay pastors from Town & Country Churches for potential service on boards and agencies.

- 2. Develop ideas for increasing attendance and meaningful participation by Lay Members of Annual Conference in the sessions of the conference on the part of Local Pastors as it relates to the issue of representation for the Town & Country Churches in the annual conference sessions. Devise appropriate recommendations and actions.
- D. Leadership Training:
  - 1. Identify resource teams who can be assembled to contribute to a variety of leadership training events in Town & Country local churches or clusters of churches.
  - 2. Evaluate the 1978 Town & Country Pastor's Retreat for possible further use of this form of training event.
  - 3. Utilize Listening Teams to learn needs experienced by Town & Country churches and to aid them in planning.
- E. Church of the Year Awards: See page 109 of 1976 NAC Journal.
- F. Promotion of Church and Community Worker Ministries:
  - 1. Interpretation of the program by letters, articles, filmstrip, resource teams, brochures, and Education and Cultivation Channels.
  - 2. Serve as Contact for superintendents, Conference or District Councils or local charges wishing to apply for the services of a Church and Community Worker.
- G. The Church in Community Seminar:
  - 1. Recruit persons for attendance from the North Arkansas Conference,
  - 2. Provide financial aid to persons attending.
  - 3. Input to the planning committee for the event.

- 2. The Town & Country Committee proposes that the Salary Aid Program now administered by the Board of Global Ministries through the Town and Country Committee, be consolidated under the one conference agency: the Commission on Equitable Salaries.
  - a. We recommend that the Ex-officio relationships between the Equitable Salary Commission and the Town & Country Committee be continued.
  - b. That the funding responsibility for this merged program be taken up by the Commission on Equitable Salaries as of January 1, 1979.
  - c. That a joint meeting of the Commission on Equitable Salaries and the Town & Country Committee be held for the purpose of drawing up necessary guidelines and that the meeting be held early enough in 1978 for its report to be included in the pre-conference reports.
  - d. That these guidelines be established and evaluated in light of how they provide for ministry to newly organized churches, significant newopportunity situations, black church special needs and parish development projects.
- I. The Town & Country Committee is considering the possibilities and values of establishing a UNITED METHODIST RURAL FELLOWSHIP CHAPTER in the conference.
- J. We are exploring the idea of holding a Conference Town & Country Convention or Festival in 1979 or 1980.
- K. 1978 Church in Community Seminar Pine Bluff (UAPB) June 26-28. We offer six (6) \$50.00 Participants' Expense Grants for persons from the North Arkansas Conference who attend. If fewer than six applications are received, the larger grants for fees, housing, and travel will be available for those attending.

- VI. In fulfilling our purpose the Health & Welfare Committee makes the following recommendations:
  - A. Methodist Hospital Sunday Observe Methodist Hospital Sunday the last Sunday in February. Emphasis to be on the total ministry of healing of our institution with special emphasis on the School of Nursing and Methodist North. Promotional materials will be provided by the hospital foundation.
  - B. Golden Cross Sunday Observe Golden Cross Sunday first Sunday in May. Promotional materials will be provided by the Methodist Hospital and Methodist Nursing Home Village and will highlight how Golden Cross monies are used. \$2.00 memberships will be encouraged on the same basis as 1978 one-half of all monies collected to be kept by the local church for health and welfare use in the community and one-half to be sent to the area treasurer to be divided between Methodist Hospital (85%) and Methodist Nursing Home (15%).
  - C. Methodist Nursing Home and Village Provide budget support of \$4,000.00.
  - D. United Methodist Children's Home Designate the second and third Sundays in December as United Methodist Children's Home Sundays and through the Council on Ministries office and the Arkansas Methodist, encourage support of this agency by the annual offering. Promotional materials will be provided by the Children's Home.
  - E. Methodist School of Nursing In recognition of the shortage of nursing personnel in most counties in the North Arkansas Conference area, the need to strengthen our relationship with our ministry of healing at Methodist Hospital and as an opportunity to provide an educational ministry for many of the young people of the conference, we propose a student nurse scholarship program as follows: a scholarship in the amount of \$6,000.00 to be subscribed in each district of the conference each year for the remainder of the quadrennium. A committee composed of two co-chairpersons and a leader from each district will work with the District Superintendents to design a program for each district.

    We also recommend budget support in the amount of \$3,000,00.
  - F. Ministry with the Aging We have requested that a course on Ministry with the aging be taught at Pastor's School in 1979. It is anticipated that the Ecumenical Retirement Center will be open in the Spring of 1979. Through the Center's representative to the B.O.G.M. we will explore ways to interpret this new ministry to our conference and involve our conference in support of it.

G. We make the following recommendations for board of trustee nominations to the Conference Committee on Nominations:

VII. The Education and Cultivation Task Force is assigned the task of promoting all programs of the board and of education of the board members in regards to the work of the General Board of Global Ministries and of the work being done by the conference board. In fulfilling this reponsibility the task force makes the following report:

A. Support the Arkansas School for Christian Mission by providing leadership on the planning committee and by a budget amount of \$1,250.00. The chairpersons of the board and the Education and Cultivation Task Force will be on the Planning Committee.

- B. Assist each district to hold a district mission event by providing guidelines for such. These will be distributed to the District Superintendents, DCOM chairpersons and other interested persons.
- C. To involve local churches in the understanding of changing concepts of mission and missionaries through discussion with persons involved in mission today. Plans are underway to bring in a "Persons-in-Mission" team to visit with clusters of churches in the conference.
- D. To arrange in 1980 for greater understanding of how money is spent in mission by sponsoring an Education and Cultivation Division/Women's Division Financial Interpretation Workshop in our conference.
- E. To present some aspect of the work and goals of the General Board of Global Ministries at each board meeting of the conference Board of Global Ministries.
- VIII. Last year we began with a grant from National Division a task force to design a program with the deaf. This Task Force has been appointed and working. Their report is as follows:

LONG-RANGE GOAL: (3-5 years)

To establish a ministry to the deaf of Arkansas through the United Methodist Churches where the deaf are located, at least one ministry, in one church per district. Definition of "ministry": Sunday School Classes (specifically for the deaf), Interpretation of Worship Services, Social Activities specifically for the deaf (possibly even participation in United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, United Methodist Youth).

**OBJECTIVE ONE: Locate the Deaf in Arkansas** (17,299 deaf in Arkansas according to 1971 census)

A. A layperson in each district will be selected by the Task Force to be responsible for organizing a search for the deaf in that particular district. This position will be entitled, "District Deaf Coordinator." This "District Deaf Coordinator" hopefully will be appointed to membership on the District C.O.M. The names and addresses of all identified deaf will be sent to this person, who will in turn, send this information on to the Task Force membership. The local newspaper, radio stations and even our own "Arkansas Methodist" are excellent tools with which to inform the hearing world of our search. This will be organized all over the state of Arkansas and completed by December, 1979. The Task Force and the District Deaf Coordinators will implement this objective.

**OBJECTIVE TWO: Involving the Deaf** 

A. Home visits with the deaf by persons selected by the Task Force and the District Deaf Coordinator. Visits will bring about communication between the deaf and hearing, and inform the deaf of the programs for them. The visits will also determine whether the deaf are in need of transportation, and secure a commitment from the deaf to attend our church regardless of their religious affiliation. We plan to do this in each district throughout the state. By December 1982 all identified deaf will be visited. Implementors will be the Task Force and appointed District Deaf Coordinators. (The Deaf Coordinators are to be chosen annually by the Task Force Membership.)

**OBJECTIVE THREE:** Locate Interpreters

A. The Task Force will contact state and federal agencies — Arkansas School for the Deaf, Arkansas Association of the Deaf and others. A list of interpreters will be compiled by the Task Force and distributed to local churches and to all districts, and to deaf participants. This will be done throughout the state and completed by December 1979. The Task Force will be responsible for this objective.

**OBJECTIVE FOUR: Provide Sign Language Classes** 

A. The Task Force will assist the church in locating a teacher, who will teach deaf communications (sign language, finger spelling) to the hearing congregation. The primary purpose of these classes will be to train lay-persons for teaching in

the Sunday School Classes specifically for the deaf. We hope to have at least one church per district, throughout the state, where the deaf are identified and a ministry is being established by December, 1983. Implementors will be the task force.

#### **OBJECTIVE FIVE: "Orientation to Deafness"**

A. A seminar providing insight into the deaf world, to aid the hearing congregations in preparing for this specialized ministry. These to be in at least four churches having a ministry to deaf (each being in different districts). We hope by December 1979 that these seminars will have been held. The Task Force will author the seminar and provide for its scheduling, and organization, with assistance from other resources, if necessary.

#### **OBJECTIVE SIX: Sunday School Classes for the Deaf**

A. The students of the sign language classes will be responsible for teaching the class for the deaf each Sunday. There will be at least two hearing laypersons teaching the class every Sunday. We plan for these classes to be in at least one local church in each district where the need is determined. The Sunday School Class may be held at an hour convenient to the particular church schedule. The classes will be organized in the respective churches by December, 1979. The sign language students will be chiefly responsible, with supervision from the Task Force, if necessary.

#### **OBJECTIVE SEVEN: A Social Event for the Deaf**

A. Events will be planned by laypersons, on a local church level. Deaf ministries will be a part of the Social Concerns Committee, in the local churches. These events may be any of the following: pot luck dinners; picnics with other deaf ministries' groups; guest speakers (with interpreters furnished); cook-outs; pingpong tournaments; "games" nights; Information Seminars to give information applicable to the deaf, such as legislation, tax reductions for the deaf and others. These activities and others are to be chosen and agreed upon by the deaf and the hearing laypersons in leadership. In the local churches where a deaf ministry is being established, plus additional facilities necessary. To be completed by December 1979 in at least three districts, at least one ministry to the deaf being in each district. The Sign Language Class will sponsor the social events with assistance from the Social Concerns Committee of the particular local church.

#### **OBJECTIVE EIGHT: Task Force Meetings (quarterly)**

A. Each member will furnish their own transportation, to be paid mileage by the Board of Global Ministries. The location of these meetings will be set by the Task Force Chairperson in agreement with the membership of the Task Force.

## OBJECTIVE NINE: A Task Force Member to Represent Arkansas at the Third United Methodist Congress for the Deaf

A. The Task Force shall elect one person to attend the Congress. The election shall be held no later than April 1979. The elected person will attend the U.M.C.D. at the appointed time and place.

#### **OBJECTIVE TEN:** A Summer Camp for the Deaf (children and adults)

A. The camp should not exceed one week, nor be less than three days per year. The camp program will be planned and directed by the Task Force itself, or someone appointed by the Task Force. The camp leadership will be determined by the Task Force. The camp for the deaf will be modeled after the camp program in the Oklahoma Conference of the United Methodist Church. This camp will be held on a conference camp site chosen by the Task Force and the Camp Directors. We hope to have completed this by December 1982. The implementors will be the Task Force in coordination with the Camp Directors and the cost will be borne by the individuals.

## **OBJECTIVE ELEVEN: Deaf Choirs**

A. The choir shall be composed of deaf children and/or adults as well as hearing persons with the knowledge of sign language. The choir members may be members from several churches in the area of the ministry to the deaf. (Deaf will sign to music as a soloist sings.) We hope to have these in local churches where a ministry to the deaf and hearing impaired is located. By December 1981 a deaf choir should be established in the churches where there is a ministry to them. Sign language classes will supply leadership, with the church pianist or organist to provide the music. Laypersons involved in leadership of the choir should use sign language fluently.

Task Force for Deaf Ministries are Brenda Cooper, Searcy, chairperson; Andy Hall, Earle, Ar; Nadine Hardin, Ft. Smith, AR; Bill Gentry, Little Rock, Ar; and Brenda

## Camping

Plans And Strategies For 1979

1. To continue to develop new programs for out-of-doors experiences for all age groups in the conference

2. To continue to develop "use" areas at Nawake.

3. To provide leadership training for all persons planning to work in camping experiences throughout the conference.

To aid District Camp Committees in planning and carrying on the District camping

programs.

To provide better promotional material for camping to the local church and to urge local churches to make people aware of camping opportunities.

6. We recommend that some person in each local church be elected to serve as Camping Coordinator. The names of these persons will be turned over to the Conference Committee on Camps and Conferences and publicity for events will be handled through this person.

7. We recommend that each local church report to the Charge Conference the number of persons attending camping events during the year and also how many events were

planned and carried out through the local church.

- 8. We recommend that \$2.00 per camper be sent to the CCOM office and that such amount be used for publicity and for insurance for campers. Insurance for camps shall be carried on a Conference Wide basis. Camp directors shall provide camp managers (when involved in district camps) with a list of all campers and the \$2.00 per camper for insurance and publicity. The camp manager shall send this to the Conference Council office each week. (For events on the conference level, the director shall handle these duties.)
- 9. To completely remove all fences and trash from the Nawake property by June 1979.

10. To remove all unusable buildings from the Nawake property by June 1979.

- 11. A financial plan for developing additional "use" areas of Nawake shall be presented for the 1979 annual conference.
- 12. We recommend that a resident manager/director be secured and placed on the Nawake property as soon as possible in order for proper development of the property.

13. We plan to continue to provide a well-balanced camping program for all age groups.

14. To encourage participation in camping experiences from minority groups in the conference. And to make available funds for Scholarships where necessary to accomplish this.

15. To provide experiences in camping and out-of-doors ministry which will allow campers to get involved in the Conference priorities of World Hunger, Ethnic Minorities and Evangelism.

16. We recommend we receive permission to purchase the three lots (total 11 acres — more or less) in the northwest corner of Nawake Conference and Retreat Center at a cost of \$4,000.00.

### **District Journals**

The District Journals have been examined with the exception of the Jonesboro District. Those presented were in good order.

Lay Life And Work

The Council on Lay Life and Work, representing All the Laity of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church, will continue to seek opportunities to foster the awareness of the vital role of Laity should and do perform in the life of the Church.

Since the establishment of this Council in 1976 under the very capable leadership of Bob Cheyne, Conference Lay Leader, much of our emphasis has been at the conference level. The involvement of Laity on Conference Boards, Agencies, Councils, and Commissions has increased significantly.

GOALS FOR 1979:

1. Continued support of a strong Laity Program at the Conference Level.

- 2. Continued support of United Methodist Youth, United Methodist Women, and United Methodist Men's organizations, to be available with help to strengthen these groups when needed.
- 3. Creation of a "TALENT BANK" of laity who can be nominated for Conference positions — to be made available to Nominating Committee.

4. Have Lay Speaking Training in each of the 7 Districts.

5. There shall be a Laity Session at Annual Conference beginning in 1979.

6. To provide training Seminars to promote better understanding and improve working relationships between both Laity and Clergy

7. To organize DISTRICT LAITY ORGANIZATIONS:

a. To plan training events for District and Local Lay Leadership.

- b. To promote Fellowship among Laity on the District Level with Rallies, Seminars, Training Events, etc.
- c. To provide an "Interpretative Link" from Local Churches through the District to the Conference level and vice versa so that Local Lay Leadership will have a means of "feeding in" their thoughts and concerns, and can in turn have the Conference level concerns and programs interpreted.
- 8. To be available to assist the Bishop, Cabinet, and Local Pastor in hearing and understanding the ideas, desires, and concerns of the Laity at the "grass roots"

### United Methodist Men

The North Arkansas Conference of United Methodist Men, now in their second year are beginning to show considerable progress.

Current officers are: Gene Brand, Walnut Ridge President, Neil Jones, Huntington Vice President, Charles Mabrey, Batesville Secretary and George R. Williams, Blytheville Treasurer.

Again a high point of 1978 will be the assembly at Mount Sequoyah August 5th and 6th. The

men of the Conway District will be presenting Bibles to Mount Sequoyah for each room and these will be dedicated by them at that time.

The National Association of Conference Presidents of United Methodist Men is hopeful that our conference men will become active and support the Upper Room nationwide emphasis on prayer by contributing \$300.00 toward a WATS line for people to call toll free direct to the Upper Room when someone is in need of a special prayer.

United Methodist Men are being asked to undertake a four-fold emphasis in the Church on prayer through United Methodist Men's Fellowship. The four-fold emphasis is as follows:

- 1. Join the Upper Room in an intentional nationwide partnership emphasis on prayer and the devotional life.
- 2. Through our connection we are asked to contribute toward an incoming WATS line.
- 3. United Methodist Men's Fellowships become partners with the Upper Room in promoting Upper Room Covenant Prayer Groups in local churches through the annual conference.
- 4. United Methodist Men's Fellowships take initiative to consistently publicize the telephone number of the Living Prayer Center through each church and community.

Mr. Loyd Stone of Conway will represent the Conference on prayer and will be going to Nashville to join the Upper Room nationwide emphasis on prayer for a three day training session so that we can promote the use of this service.

Palmer Foley has been appointed to serve as representative of the UMM for the ingathering for World Hunger on November 25th in Little Rock.

It is important that every local group of UMM charter each year by sending in the charter or re-chartering information along with your contribution to the General Board of Discipleship, Division of Lay Life and Work, P.O. Box 840, Nashville, Tennessee 37202.

It is the goal of the Conference UMM to have an organized men's group in every local church. If you need assistance in your organization you should contact any of the Conference officers. United Methodist Men is an organization authorized by the General Conference, and centered in the local church. Specific information regarding the organization's objectives, purposes and programs are carried in the **Discipline**.

### **Religion And Race**

The Ethnic Minority Local Church Missional Priority of the United Methodist Church and its relationships to the Annual Conferences is being stressed again.

To involve ethnic minorities in the ministerial education and recruitment processes.

Strengthen the programs of leadership development to adequately equip minority leaders to serve more effectively in local churches and communities.

Annual Conferences acceptance of the traditions, lifestyles, cultures of minority constituencies to influence Conference programming.

Reclaim the lost ethnic minority congregations in the North Arkansas Conference and strengthen those in existence.

We call on the total communication committee to be very intentional in its promotion of the Ethnic Minority Local Church priorities as other programs.

We ask each board and agency to reorder its priority in making resources and programming relative to Ethnic Minority Missional Priority.

Less than \$4,000.00 was contributed from the Arkansas Area to the Human Relations Day offering the year ending 1976; therefore we cannot express enough the importance of support needed for the services rendered through this offering.

Evangelist thrusts through social services is a mission of the United Methodist Church mandated through Christ for his flock.

The Church must continue to be the Church, not for a precious few but for all persons under its umbrella and the nation at large.

### Status And Role Of Women

The Commission continues to work toward fulfilling its purpose.

- To develop an awareness of the issue of the involvement of women in the life of the church, the factors contributing to the present situation and the changes which are needed.
- 2. To study the extent to which women are involved in program and policy-making decisions at all levels of the Church within the conference.
- To formulate recommendations to the North Arkansas Conference and its constituent parts to enable and facilitate the involvement of women in the life and work of the church.

The CSRW works toward making all United Methodists in the conference more sensitive to the issues involved in the rights of women.

Priorities for 1979 are:

- 1. To promote Bi-Polar Workshops in districts which have not yet had this opportunity for leadership development.
- 2. To facilitate an openness and receptivity for women in the professional ministry of the United Methodist Church in the North Arkansas Conference.
- 3. To promote consciousness raising events throughout the Conference by use of media presentations in each district.
- 4. To join with other boards, commissions, and committees in active support of ERA.
- 5. To create and enlarge existing media resources pertaining to the work of women in church and society.

### **United Methodist Women**

"The organized unit of UNITED METHODIST WOMEN shall be a community of women whose PURPOSE is to know God and to experience freedom as whole persons through Jesus Christ; to develop a creative, supportive fellowship; and to expand concepts of mission through participation in the global ministries of the Church."

To implement the above stated PURPOSE of our organization, a three year program from 1977 through 1979 has been adopted by the Conference Mission Team with special emphasis being given each year to a specific part of the PURPOSE as follows:

- 1977 ". . . to know God and to experience freedom as whole persons through Jesus Christ"; With a large turnover in Conference and District leadership, we sought to identify anew who we are as United Methodist Women and our relationship as whole persons to God, and to establish an understanding of a theological base for what we do as an organization. This was done through a series of events:
- 1) Annual Meeting with Peggy Billings, Women's Division Staff, and Bishop Kenneth W. Hicks as inspirational speakers.
- New Officers' Training under the leadership of Women's Division at Cincinnati, Ohio, attended by all of the conference officers.
- 3) Elected leadership training for all District Officers conducted by Conference Team.
- 4) Itineration of the seven districts by a national team of leaders with workshops on financial interpretation, resulting in a record pledge to missions of \$120,600.00 by the districts and conference for 1978.
- 5) Regional and Conference Schools of Christian Mission with the studies of "Women AND the Bible," "Africa," and "The Local Church in God's Mission."
- 6) Attendance at a Human Rights Seminar in New York by two conference officers, and an Equal Rights Amendment Workshop in Nashville by another conference officer.
- 7) Participation of local, district, and conference leaders on Church Boards and Agencies.
- 8) A spiritual, enrichment/study event in September led by Joan Clark, Regional Staff from Dallas, and Joann Wilshusen of Corpus Christi, explored concepts of full personhood (whole persons through Jesus Christ) and translated the meaning of those concepts into possibilities for action through the mission emphasis of our organization.

This event was the first of its kind in the nation and will be the basis for an article in the July/August, 1978, issue of response magazine.

- 1978—"...to develop a creative, supportive fellowship"; This is the year of membership development; building support groups on conference, district, local levels; and working toward an inclusive fellowship. Programs that focus on meeting the needs of and building support groups particularly for women clergy, ethnic minorities, women with differing life styles, women with special concerns, and young/middle-age/older women, include:
- A Learning Fair held in March with an attendance of more than 275 gave participants the option of choosing workshops directed to their specific interests. Topics for workshops, all led by persons from within the conference, included Aging, Media, Criminal Justice, Dealing with Grief, Legislative Issues and Action, Speaking for Children and Youth, and Women in Crisis.
- 2) A Consultation on Ethnic Minority Participation in United Methodist Women held in April for the Conference Mission Team and Ethnic Minority Representatives was led by Thelma Stevens of Nashville, Tennessee, and Willie Lee Washington of Fort Smith as resource persons. This was a significant "first step" in working toward an inclusive organization.
- 3) In April, the national Assembly held in Louisville, Kentucky, with the theme, "A New People for a New Age," offered the 106 women attending from our conference inspiration, enrichment, and information on issues and concerns of women.
- District and local programs aimed at developing a climate of acceptance and support of women clergy.
- 5) Cluster meetings within districts on membership and new leadership development.
- 6) Shepherdess and Helping Hands programs with District Officers relating in a special way to designated local units.
- 7) Ongoing study at Regional and Conference Schools of Christian Mission of the studies "Revelation," "Covenant Living," and "Contemporary China."
- 8) Continued leadership on local, district, and conference Church Boards and Agencies.
- 9) Annual Meeting, October 14, 1978, with Mai Gray, Women's Division President, as inspirational speaker.
- 1979 "... to expand concepts of mission through participation in the global ministries of the Church." Expanding concepts of mission will include:
- 1) Impacting power structures to work toward the elimination of injustice and oppression. An IMPACT network is to be developed across the Conference to facilitate legislative action on national and state issues, particularly those affecting women and children.
- 2) Itineration of districts by Conference leadership with Inclusiveness Workshops focusing on young-old, ethnic minorities, married-widowed-divorced-single, employed-nonemployed relationships.
- 3) Cooperation with the Commission on Status and Role of Women in the promotion of participation of women in decision making roles of the Church.
- 4) Ongoing study of mission at Regional and Conference Schools of Christian Mission with the studies of "The Parables," "Human Rights and the International Order," and "Middle East Mosaic."
- 5) Seminar on national and international affairs at Washington, D.C. and/or United Nations. The Seminar will be open to all United Methodist Women in the Conference who choose to participate and will include tours of selected mission projects.
- 6) Continued participation in the global ministries of the Church through emphasis on undesignated giving to missions. Approximately 60% of our Conference pledge to missions goes to the World and National Divisions of the General Board of Global Ministries for the Church's mission projects.

## **Council On Youth Ministries**

The Conference Council on Youth Ministries has seven task forces for the 1977-1978 tenure which are listed as follows: North Arkansas Conference Youth Rally, Junior High Youth

Assembly, Senior High Youth Assembly, Youth Service Fund, Family, Empowerment of Ethnic Minorities, and Youth Evangelism. In addition, the CCYM sponsors the Conference Youth Tour. Up until this year, there have only been the first four task forces listed above; however, the current CCYM members have decided that it is important to support the National Youth Ministries Organization priorities and to encourage personal growth in other ways besides the annual youth activities. Thus, the specific topics, Family, Empowerment of Ethnic Minorities, and Youth Evangelism, have been chosen as areas of special emphasis through task force work. The CCYM members continue to need the encouragement and guidance of pastors and other youth leaders in all of our local churches. especially in support of the Youth Service Fund.

The dates for the annual events that occur(red) in 1978 are:

Conference Youth Rally Junior High Youth Assembly

Senior High Youth Assembly

Youth Tour

April 1 July 27-29

July 31 - August 4 November 19-27

The tentative dates for the same events in 1979 are:

Conference Youth Rally Junior High Youth Assembly

Senior High Youth Assembly Youth Tour

March 31 July 12-14 July 30-August 3

June 9-17 and Nov. 17-25\*

\*Since the Youth Tour has not been able to accommodate all of its many applicants, it has been decided that there be two tours held in 1979.

## **Example Of Timeline For Conference Planning**

- 1. By October 15, District Councils, having received and compiled data from local churches input for Conference attention, plus District suggestions for Conference partnership enterprises, forwards to Conference Council recommendations for development of 1980 Annual Conference Programs.
- 2. By December 20, Conference Boards and Commissions prepare and prioritize first draft of 1980 Objectives and Courses of Action; review and plan for 1979 assignments.
- 3. January 17, 18, Conference Council review, evaluate and prioritize proposed 1980 program, review assignment of 1979 Courses of Action, review and adjust 1979 budget.
- 4. By February 15, Boards and Commissions revise 1980 Objectives as necessary, prepare final budget requests for 1980, continue responsibility for 1979 assignments.
- 5. By March 2, Budget Committee meet to evaluate requests for financial support of program, to conduct hearings on program budget request, and prepare recommendations.
- 6. March 27, 28, Conference Council meet to consider, amend and adopt recommendations regarding 1980 program, with related budget, personnel plans, and support service plans.
- 7. By April 7, Council on Finance and Administration meet to consider program budget and all other budget requests of church agencies, conduct necessary hearings, and prepare a total budget to present to the Annual Conference session.
- By May 1, the Report on proposed conference program and financial and staff resources needed to implement the program sent to lay and clergy members of the conference, and to key leaders of the local church.
- Proposed program received by Annual Conference; discussed and evaluated in legislative committees; amended and adopted by Annual Conference session . . . June.
- 10. A step not developed here is a process of evaluation of the previous year's content and procedure. This would presumably occur soon after January 1.

The above Timeline presupposes participation in the Annual Conference program ministries development by the following components: Local Church, District Council, Boards and Commissions, Cabinet, Council Staff and Council.

Program Cost — Conference Council on Ministries . . . . . . . . . . . \$91,014.00

By action of CCOM, travel and meeting expense items of boards, agencies, etc., be reduced 40% and that these items be listed in each budget as non-add items.

The CCOM approved a "Conference Expense Travel Fund" of \$15,000 from which the above agencies and Administrative Boards and Agencies, with the exception of the Board of Pensions, the Conference Camp Committee and the Conference Council on Youth Ministries, will draw.

Council On Professional Ministry

The Council on Professional Ministry is the coordinating body for all Conference agencies relating to clergy and lay professionals. Under the CPM umbrella are the Board of Ordained Ministry, Diaconal Ministry, and Pensions; the Commission on Equitable Salaries; and the Committees on Group Insurance and Memoirs. The Committee on Joint Disability is composed of representatives of the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Board of Pensions.

The basic document of the Council on Professional Ministry is found on Pages 113-115 in the 1977 Journal. This inclusive statement will continue to guide us in 1978 and in 1979. However, we will be implementing certain aspects of the goals/objectives in 1978-1979. By the end of Annual Conference, in 1978, we will have the "Role Expectation" Sheets checked. (Members of A.C. will be asked to fill these out.) We will tabulate the sheets, so that members of local church pastor/staff relations committees can use the results as a norm for their local use of the same document. The "Role Expectation" Sheets were prepared at Scarritt College to help identify clergy roles and the relative importance of these roles.

Also, by the 1978 Session of Annual Conference, the CPM will have ready for distribution a "checklist of things to be done" in the event of death of a clergy person or spouse. This will be finalized at the next meeting of the Council on Professional Ministry on February 14, 1978, at 1:00 p.m. at the Headquarters building.

In 1979 we hope to implement the goal of an emergency fund for and by clergy families.

Most of the agencies of the Council simply carry out the job assignments assigned by the Discipline of the Church. The agencies are organized properly and are functioning well. The newest agency, the Board of Diaconal Ministry, will, in 1978, be perfecting the organization and carrying out the Disciplinary requirements. This Board now has a complete slate of officers, including a registrar.

The Board of Ordained Ministry is trying to carry out its great program with a much-curtailed budget. Pages 117, and following, in the 1977 Journal detail the BOM's program. The Board will be studying the scholarship needs/program of our Conference this year, as well as continuing the tremendous chores of shepherding students, handling all changes-in-category of Conference members, etc. The B.O.M. continues to supervise the Office of Pastoral Care and Counseling.

The Commission on Equitable Salaries has really worked to come up with an excellent program. The Commission anticipates on minimal changes than the program outlined on Journal, 1977, page 128 and following.

The Committee on Group Insurance (See pages 131 and following of the 1977 Journal) leads us well in participation in the Plan "D" Death Benefit Program. The Hospital and Medical Expense, with Travelers, now has a "Stop-loss" Clause in our coverage. This means that "out-of-pocket" expenses cannot exceed \$500.00 per person per year. We are also happy to report that our HMEP also covers psychiatric services, etc.

Our Pension Program continues to expand under the skilled leadership of the Board of Pensions. The Board's report, (on page 123 of the 1977 Journal) indicates that we are in the Minister's Reserve Pension Fund of the General Board of Pensions. Our Conference needs to continue to support the Pension special apportionment as well as the apportioned amount to the Conference Pension and Benefit Fund. Because of the good work of our Board of Pensions, our Conference retirees will be paid an Annual Annuity Rate of \$78.00 for service year in 1978.

The Conference Committee on Memoirs continue to do a good job in helping us meaningfully remember our brothers and sisters among the clergy families who die during the preceding year. This committee is also responsible for the "Memorial" pages in The

Journal each year. The program of the committee will continue throughout the

quadrennium as it presently operates.

For 1979, the Council will need to continue to receive funding from the Conference Benevolence budget for the work of the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Board of Diaconal Ministry, the Council on Professional Ministry, the Committee on Memoirs, and the Committee on Group Insurance. The Board of Pensions and the Commission on Equitable Salary receive no benevolence monies. In addition the Office of Pastoral Care and Counseling will continue to need funding from the special budget item.

**Board Of Diaconal Ministry** 

Persons called of God and consecrated to the specialized diaconal ministries of love, justice and service are Diaconal Ministers. Consecration to the office of Diaconal Minister is the church's recognition of God's call, the individual's response to that call, and the authorization of such persons for designated service and ministry. The office has its origin in the biblical and historical Christian heritage, in the theological understandings of ministry, and in the outreach of the church beyond the local congregation. The office of Diaconal Minister is an integral part of the total ministry of the church with a recognized relationship to the Annual Conference, and receives the appropriate benefits such a relationship makes possible.

As the board begins to fulfill its responsibilities to the persons seeking certification and consecration, we reaffirmed Joe Sparks and Jim Lane as chairperson and vice-chairperson, respectively. Elected Arvill Brannon as registrar, Pat Halwes as secretary, and authorized

Vic Nixon to voucher all expenses for the board.

The board will take steps to attract persons to the opportunities of the Diaconal Ministry. A committee was appointed to promote certification and consecration. Al Berthouex, chairperson, Len Bobo, Pat Halwes and Jane Steinegger, members.

The board will encourage local churches in North Arkansas Conference to keep the Diaconal Minister's salary, benefits, health care, pensions, etc., on a par with similar professions. After some research, we will prepare a policy statement relating to vacation, sick leave, retirement and benefits.

The board will present the following resolution to Annual Conference:

The Board of Diaconal Ministry recommends that the Annual Conference encourage as a goal for all local churches that employ certified and consecrated lay persons; that the local church include said lay persons in the benefit programs of the conference the same as the clergy appointed to that local church.

We encourage each local church which employs lay professional staff to provide in its budget Continuing Education Funds of at least \$50.00 per year per professional staff member. We request that each District Superintendent make this an item of inquiry at the Charge Conference of such churches.

## **Board Of Ordained Ministry**

In order to perform our responsibilities as a Conference Board of Ordained Ministry, we declare that we will faithfully adhere to the Disciplinary requirements in all matters relating to the Ministry, and we recommend the following:

### I. General Provisions

- A. That we ensure the continuance of our present program by reserving each year an amount sufficient for the Scholarship commitments.
- B. That the Conference Council on Finance and Administration appropriate for the working budget of this Board the necessary funds in order for the Board to accomplish its goals.
- C. That we continue our emphasis on the Ministerial Education Program and the United Methodist Seminaries. We urgently request that each local church pay its fair share of the \$103,583.00 asking of the North Arkansas Conference.
- D. That those who desire to begin training for the Ministry secure the proper application forms for candidacy from their District Superintendent or from the Registrar of the Board of Ordained Ministry.

### II. Policy And Program

A. The funds of the board will be expended in the following ways:

1. For the normal work of the board and its Registrars in the operation of the Board and in the guidance of persons related to the Board in training.

- 2. For financial assistance to college and seminary students enrolled in colleges and seminaries approved by the University Senate, or accepted by our Annual Conference, who meet the following requirements: (Priority shall be given) 1) to persons attending United Methodist Seminaries, 2) to persons attending other accredited seminaries, 3) to college students who have completed one-half their requirements for graduation.
  - a. Provisions for Financial Aid:
    - (1) The Board may allow basic fees and tuition.
    - (2) In cases of exceptional needs as determined by the Executive Committee of the Board and upon recommendation of the District Superintendent of the student's home district, the student may receive up to \$800.00 in aid per academic year.
    - (3) If a student has earned credit for an equivalent of 12 semester hours in regular semester and wishes to attend summer school for the purpose of accelerating return to the Conference, the student may apply for aid for fees and tuition for summer school, the amount not to exceed 1/2 of that allowed for a full academic year.
    - (4) Aid may be granted for not more than three undergraduate academic years and for not more than four seminary years.
  - b. We note the existence of the "Charles W. Tadlock Scholarship Fund" to assist persons in studying for the ministry in the United Methodist Church. The Fund will be administered through the Section of Loans and Scholarships, Board of Higher Education and Ministry, Guidelines and application blanks will be available from the Board of Ordained Ministry.
  - c. Requirements to be met by the full-time student:
    - (1) To be eligible for a grant the individual must have received both a certificate of candidacy and have completed 1/2 of the requirements to graduate from college or be attending an approved seminary.
    - (2) The student shall establish need for such aid by completing the forms required by the Board of Ordained Ministry.
    - (3) Students are expected to provide information concerning their standings and changes of relationship to the North Arkansas Conference, to the Registrar of the Board of Ordained Ministry.
  - d. The Course of Study Schools:
    - (1) Local Pastors who attend the Course of Study School at St. Paul or Perkins will receive registration fees and room and board scholarships from the Annual Conference.
    - (2) The Board will pay the entire cost of required books for each person who

attends either of these schools. The books must be paid for by the persons themselves who in turn will send a cash receipt for books purchased to the Board Treasurer who will authorize checks for reimbursements. Books are not to be charged to the Treasurer of the Board.

- e. Part-time Local Pastors: The Board urges all Part-time Local Pastors to attend the Course of Study School.
- f. Arkansas Pastor's School: We will support the Arkansas Pastor's School by providing financial assistance in the amount of \$750.
- g. Ecumenical Clergy Conferences: The Board will provide 12 scholarships of \$25 each for pastors of the North Arkansas Annual Conference to attend the Ecumenical Clergy Conference. Scholarships may be applied for through the Chairperson of the Continuing Education Committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry.
- h. Continuing Education
  - (1) The Board will provide scholarships for pastors to participate in continuing education. Maximum for each scholarship will be \$200. These funds will be administered by the Continuing Education Committee of the Board. Scholarships may be applied for through Chairperson of the Continuing Education Committee prior to the event and payment will be made upon completion of the event.
  - (2) The Board will provide \$100 per District for "Guided Reading Programs" for ministers of each District. The "Guided Reading Program" will be coordinated by the District Superintendent through an approved seminary and the money used only to bring a resource person to the District at the close of the "Guided Reading Program."
  - (3) We recommend that each local church or charge allow the pastor leave time to participate in Continuing Education Programs. This time to be in addition to the pastor's vacation time. And we encourage each local church or charge to provide in its budget a Continuing Education Fund of at least \$50 for the pastor. We request that each District Superintendent make this an item of inquiry at each Charge Conference.
- j. We recommend the continuation of pastoral care and counseling services to pastors and their families.

The Advisory Committee on Pastoral Care recommends both the Counseling Center of Little Rock and the Office of William R. Barling of North Little Rock as sources for counseling of both clergy and their families in the Conference.

- B. In consideration of Paragraphs 414.4 and 421 of the 1976 Discipline of The United Methodist Church, the Board will require psychological testing of persons seeking membership in the Annual Conference.
- C. Candidacy: Each individual entering the ordained ministry must go through the Candidacy Program. It is suggested that each pastor become acquainted with the steps of Candidacy in order to properly counsel persons in the local church desiring this information.

A certificate of candidacy may be issued by the District Committee on Ordained Ministry after the candidate has met the following conditions:

- 1. Been a member of the local recommending United Methodist congregation for one year immediately preceding application for candidacy;
- 2. Been graduated from an accredited high school or its equivalent;
- 3. Met with Pastor-Parish Relations Committee and the pastor for consultation after submitting a written request and statement;

- 4. Secured the recommendation of the P.P.R. Committee;
- 5. Secured the recommendation of the Charge Conference;
- 6. Applied to the District Superintendent in writing for a Certificate of Candidacy;

7. Assigned a supervising pastor;

- 8. Appeared before the District Committee on Ordained Ministry;
- 9. Recommended by an individual written ballot, with a 3/4 majority of the District Committee on Ordained Ministry required;
- 10. Agreed to make a complete commitment of himself/herself to the highest ideals of the Christian life as set forth in Para. 67-76 of the Discipline.

### III. Recommendations

- A. We recommend that local churches give special attention to the actions of General Conference that relate to ministry. Local churches now have a much greater role in the whole process of "candidacy" for ministry.
- B. We urge attendance at the Arkansas Pastor's School. This year's School will be held at Hendrix August 28-31.
- C. We recommend that the study on the role of the associate pastor be continued and that the results of that study be presented to the Annual Conference of 1979.
- D. We recommend that instruments be developed to evaluate the effectiveness of the ordained ministry in the North Arkansas Annual Conference.
- E. The Board encourages churches of the North Arkansas Annual Conference to participate in the Seminary intern program.
- F. The Board of Ordained Ministry moves that the North Arkansas Conference request a declaratory decision from the Judicial Council as to whether the provisions of paragraph 433 (leave of absence) may be applied to probationary members of the Annual Conference.
- G. The Board recommends that clergy be encouraged to participate in the Academy of Parish Clergy, a continuing education program involving 50 academic hours per year, and that the Board provide one-half (\$25.00) the cost of one year's membership (\$50.00).
- H. The Board recommends that the Conference establish an 18-month period under appointment for seminarians following graduation to fulfill the requirements for full connection.

### **Board Of Pensions**

- 1. We recommend that the Annuity Rate for fiscal 1979 be set at \$88.00 per service year.
- 2. We recommend that the North Arkansas Conference continue participation in the Methodist Reserve Pension Fund of the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church in Evanston, Illinois, subject to the provisions thereof, as begun on January 1, 1975. In order to adequately provide for this program we recommend that:
  - a. The Pension Special of \$150,000 per year and the Conference Pension and Benefit Fund be merged and apportioned to the Districts as the Conference Pension and Benefit Fund.
  - b. Each church shall pay into the Conference Pension and Benefit Fund an apportioned amount totaling, for the Conference, \$604,000. (This figure includes the \$150,000 which has been designated Pension Special and \$50,000 additional, which is required to support the \$10 increase in the annuity rate.)
  - c. Continue to solicit money from interested persons who have already exhibited an

unusual concern for the pension program.

d. Cooperate with other agencies to place increased emphasis on wills and legacies.

3. We recommend there be continued the work of the Board of Pensions on Proportional Payment of Ministerial Support in accord with provisions of Paragraph 734.4 of the 1976 Discipline, using the following guideline:

**Guidelines For Placing Liens On Ministers' Pensions** 

- a. The Conference Treasurer will inform the Conference Board of Pensions at its meeting next succeeding the close of the year for which an arrearage exists in the Pension and Benefit apportionment: the name of the local church, the name(s) of the pastor(s) appointed during the calendar year, and shall supply the names of the church treasurer, the chairpersons of the Administrative Board and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, as well as the name of the chairperson of the Committee on Finance of the local church.
- b. The Conference Board of Pensions will take action declaring the necessity for filing a lien, specifying the amount of the arrearage and the period for which the arrearage is due.
- c. A letter informing the local church of the intention of the Conference Board of Pensions to file a lien, specifying the amount will be sent to the local church treasurer. A copy of the letter will be sent to the chairpersons of the Administrative Board, the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations, the Committee on Finance, the District Superintendent, the affected pastor(s), the Conference Treasurer and the General Board of Pensions.
- d. If a remittance is received by the Conference Treasurer from the local church covering the amount of the arrearage before the meeting of the Conference Board of Pensions at the Annual Conference session, the fact will be noted in the Conference Board of Pensions minutes and the filing of a lien avoided.
- e. If the local church is still in arrears at the meeting of the Conference Board of Pensions at the Annual Conference session, the Conference Board of Pensions will by specific motion order filing of the lien, calculating the amount of the lien. This action will be communicated to the General Board of Pensions.
- f. Arrearages will bear interest at the rate credited to the "Deposit Account" by the General Board of Pensions and, if not paid, the interest will be added annually to the amount of the arrearage.
- g. The Conference Treasurer will report to each meeting of the Conference Board of Pensions the receipt of monies intended as payments on arrearage from the local church and the reduction of the lien resulting will be noted in the minutes of that meeting of the Conference Board of Pensions.
- h. Every effort will be made to secure payment from the local church so as to avoid penalizing the individual minister. This shall be the responsibility of the District Superintendent, the Conference Board of Pensions and the Pastor.
- i. Upon payment of arrearage (including interest) the secretary of the Conference Board of Pensions shall inform the General Board of Pensions and authorize the release of the lien. A copy of the letter will be mailed to the minister, the local church treasurer, the chairperson of the Administrative Board, the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations, the Committee on Finance, the Superintendent of the District and the Conference Treasurer.
- j. A statement of the amount of cumulative arrearage, plus accrued interest, will be mailed to the local church, the minister(s), the District Superintendent and the Conference Treasurer by the Treasurer of the Conference Board of Pensions each year.
- k. The local church and/or minister(s) shall have the right of appeal to the Conference Board of Pensions at any regularly scheduled meeting of the Conference Board of Pensions, but shall not have a second hearing bearing on the same item.

- 1. Liens will be placed on arrearages in the Pension and Benefit apportionment only.
- m. Any compromise agreement involving reduction of apportionments made by the District Superintendent or other Conference officer and the local church regarding pension and benefit apportionments shall be concurred in by the Conference Board of Pensions, if the result of such an agreement would be the cancelling or avoidance of a lien arising from an arrearage in payments for pension and benefit purposes.
  - n. If service has been rendered during the apportionment period by more than one minister, the arrearage will be prorated between the ministers on the basis of proportionate service. Payments received from the local church to apply on arrearages will also be prorated between/among ministers on the basis of proportionate service and applied on the liens.

PLEASE SEE PARAGRAPH 734.4 of the 1976 Discipline.

- 4. We recommend that necessitous allowance grants, retirement love offerings and local expenses of the Board be paid by the Treasurer, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee of the Conference Board of Pensions and the 1976 Discipline, Paragraph 1706.13 and Paragraph 1707.
- 5. We recommend that the institution, board or organization paying the salary of a minister on special appointment without annuity claim on the conference shall make provisions for the pension of such person. Attention is called to the 1976 Discipline, Paragraph 1706.3a(3); with reference to eligibility to participate in Ministers Reserve Pension Fund (MRPF) with the approval of the General Board of Pensions.
- 6. That there be apportioned to each agency and institution served by a ministerial member under special appointment with annuity claim on the conference, the sum of \$1056.00 for the Financial Year 1979 in accord with the 1976 Discipline, Paragraph 1706.3a(3); and that said apportionment be paid to the Treasurer of the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions no later than 7 days prior to the end of the fiscal year.
- 7. We recommend that the special appointments be listed in the Conference Journal as follows:
  - a. With Annuity Claim upon the Conference subject to the 1976 Discipline, Paragraph 1706,3a(3):

- 8. We recommend that notices for any claims for years of service shall be to the Board in
- 9. The Board will not make any retroactive settlements of claims prior to the year in which a claim is approved. Excepting in the case of those who have been serving as chaplains.
- 10. In determining years of service, the Board shall carefully examine and consider those

years listed in the Conference Journal prior to accepting them as valid years; and any years in question shall be subject to validation by the applicant and by approval to the Board of Pensions.

- 11. We recommend that all approved local pastors continue to provide all information necessary relative to their service record.
- 12. We recommend that the Executive Committee elected by the Board be designated in the Journal with the roster of the members of the Board of Pensions.
- 13. Eligible claimants who have been retired by the North Arkansas Conference will have their conference Death Benefit Program Premium paid by the Conference Board of Pensions. We recommend that all retired ministers, widows and dependent children, who are our responsibility, be covered under the HMEP policy. The cost will be paid 100% by the Board. Retired individuals, eligible for Medicare, shall personally pay the Medicare monthly payments.
- 14. We recommend that each minister at the time of full retirement and drawing annuity from the General Board of Pensions be given a love offering of \$400.00.
- 15. We recommend the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the policy of The United Methodist Church is to provide a parsonage or an amount of rental allowances as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained ministers; and WHEREAS, pensions paid to retired ministers of The United Methodist Church are considered as extensions of compensation and paid to retired ministers as compensation for previous active service; and WHEREAS, the determination of the amount of rental/housing allowance paid to an active minister is made by the local Church as the employer; a retired minister ceases to be an employee of a local Church; the Annual Conference or Conferences of which a retired minister is or was a member during active service represents the local Churches in pension matters, subject to rules and procedures of the General Board of Pensions of The United Methodist Church as authorized by The General Conference;

### NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

- a. There is designated by this Conference as a rental/housing allowance, the lesser amount of \$3000 of the pension payments or an amount equal to 60% of the total pension payment of each retired minister of The United Methodist Church who is or was a member of this Conference at the time of his or her retirement.
- b. The pension payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension payment resulting from all service of such retired minister from all employment by any local Church, Annual Conference, or institution of The United Methodist Church, or of any former denomination that is now a part of The United Methodist Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform service related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension funds of The United Methodist Church for such retired minister's pension.

#### ADDENDA:

IRS has ruled that an ordained minister who purchases his/her own home may exclude from his/her gross income as Rental/Housing Allowance only an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home plus cost of utilities (Rev. Ruling 71-280, 1971 C.B. 92.) The exclusion is further limited by the rule that allows a minister to exclude the allowance only to the extent actually expended to provide a home, furnishings, real estate taxes, etc. (to the extent that these do not exceed fair rental value), and utilities. The law sets no maximum for rental/housing allowance exclusion, except that the allowance be a reasonable percentage of the individual's gross pension.

- 16. In accordance with Paragraph 1706.12e of the 1976 Discipline, we recommend that the North Arkansas Conference observe Retired Minister's Sunday on the first Sunday in November of each year. Said observance is to honor the retired ministers, their wives and the widows of ministers.
- 17. We recommend that the ministers participate in the TAX-DEFERRED program of the General Board of Pensions. For further information and/or enrollment forms, write Dr. Eugene Moore, Assistant General Secretary, General Board of Pensions, 1200 Davis Street, Evanston, Illinois 60201.

## Joint Committee On Disability

Recommendations to the North Arkansas Annual Conference on the policy to follow in admitting and continuing persons on Disability Leave.

- That our Conference policy be more in line with the General Board of Pensions policy of thorough medical screening.
- 2. That we establish a continuing caring ministry in cooperation with the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry to help meet the needs of the disabled; and the inclusion of these persons in District and Conference activities.
- 3. We recommend that the Medical Report of each applicant made by their personal doctors on the degree of impairment, be sent to the General Board of Pensions by each applicant.
- 4. We recommend that the Joint Committee on Disability prescribe a program of rehabilitation for each individual on disability leave if such is feasible. The Purpose being to return the disabled minister to active ministry as soon as possible.

5. In accordance with paragraph 132b, rules and regulations for the Annual Conferences in MRPF, disability benefits may be reduced or terminated by the Board of Pensions when the person on disability recovers sufficiently to engage in a remunerative occupation. Therefore, each person on disability will report earned income to the Conference Board of Pensions each year.

6. The General Board of Pensions requires that all persons on disability be renewed each year with a current medical report. This report is to be sent to the Conference

Board of Pensions secretary.

## Committee On Group Insurance Report Number 1: Group Life Insurance [DBP]

We make the following recommendations:

- 1. That the General Board of Pensions Death Benefit Program, Plan D, be continued as the group life insurance program of the Conference.
- 2. The benefits of this plan are based on the Average Annual Conference Salary of \$10,275.00 for 1978 and \$11,188.00 for 1979. The Average Annual Conference Salary has increased by 8.9% for 1979, resulting in a corresponding increase in benefits and premium rates.
- 3. The premium to be paid by members of the Death Benefit Program is based on 1.82% of the Average Annual Conference Salary, or \$203.62 for 1979. At least 70% (\$142.52) is to be paid by the charge and no more than 30% (\$61.10) is to be paid by the minister. This total contribution must be in the hands of the Insurance Secretary/Treasurer, Faye Douglas, P.O. Box 89, Marion, Arkansas 72364, no later than November 10, 1978.
- 4. Before retirement, or while on Disability Leave, up to age 65, the following benefits will be paid, according to the age attained on the birthday in the fiscal year of death:

- 5. If the spouse of a minister dies, the minister will receive an amount equal to 20% of the Average Annual Conference Salary, or \$2,055.00, if death occurs in 1978 and \$2,237.60, if death occurs in 1979.
- 6. That all members of the North Arkansas Conference (except students serving in, or those employed in conferences which have compulsory insurance programs, or members under special appointment outside the conference, or retired Chaplains serving in), and every full-time local pastor serving an appointment, shall participate in the North Arkansas Conference Death Benefit Program, subject to its laws and regulations.
- 7. An open enrollment period shall be held each year during the month of December for those persons rendering full-time service to, or those employed by the Conference. The effective enrollment date shall be January 1 of the succeeding year.
- 8. A limited enrollment period shall be held each year for 90 days following the session of the Annual Conference, for those newly eligible by Annual Conference action.
- 9. Individual enrollment may be requested at any time within 90 days after becoming newly eligible.
- 10. We recommend that the Insurance Secretary/Treasurer check the eligibility of persons applying for enrollment for the first time, by contacting the District Superintendent concerned, in the case of pastors, and the pastor concerned in the case of full-time lay employees.
- 11. We recommend that the first premium payment accompany the application for enrollment, otherwise the application will not be processed.
- 12. We recommend that the District Superintendent notify the Treasurer, North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions as soon as possible after the death of a minister, active or retired, or a spouse or surviving spouse, who has resided within the bounds of his district.
- 13. We recommend that the District Superintendent notify, as soon as possible, the Insurance Secretary/Treasurer when a person should be dropped from the insurance program because of the loss of eligibility. This will save the Conference money.
- 14. That the Board of Pensions pay the premiums for retired persons drawing annuity from the General Board of Pensions, their spouses, as well as the premiums for those on Disability Leave and those who are surviving spouses.

## Report Number 2 Group Hospitalization Insurance (HMEP)

We make the following recommendations:

1. That the General Board of Pensions request, as negotiated with the Travelers Insurance Company, for a premium increase of 19.9% for all persons under the age 65, and 7.5% for persons ages 65 and over be approved. This increase is to become effective July 1, 1978.

We recommend that the charge pay at least 60% of the HMEP premium, and the

participant pay no more than 40%.

- 2. We recommend that the psychiatric coverage be raised so that 80% of \$50.00 per visit for 50 visits per year be paid. This coverage affects persons under 65 only. The rate increase per quarter will be \$1.08 for the participant; \$2.10 for the spouse, with or without children.
- 3. The total quarterly premium rates for HMEP for the period 1 July 1978 to 1 July 1979 are as follows:

no later than three months before reaching 65.	

- c. The Board of Pensions pays the HMEP premiums for all retired persons drawing an annuity from the General Board of Pensions, all surviving spouses and children, as well as for those persons on Disability Leave. However, it is the claimant's responsibility to pay the portion required by MEDICARE.
- d. HMEP does not duplicate MEDICARE, but it does supplement MEDICARE by paying that portion of the hospital expense not covered by MEDICARE.
- 5. The HMEP premiums are due quarterly, on June 20; September 10; December 10; March 10. All insured persons are responsible to see that the total premium is sent to Faye Douglas, Box 89, Marion, Arkansas 72364, no later than the due date.
- 6. All members of the North Arkansas Conference (except students serving appointments in, or those employed by other conferences or agencies which have compulsory insurance programs, or members under special appointment outside the conference, or retired Chaplains serving in), and every full-time employee of the conference, shall participate in the HMEP of the North Arkansas Conference.
  - a. No evidence of insurability will be required if a minister enrolls himself and his dependents within 90 days after the date he is eligible to enroll.
  - b. Local churches may enroll Lay employees between June 1 and July 15, by following these guidelines contained in the 1969 Journal, page 104, par. 1b:

"To enroll the eligible lay employees of a particular church, the following number of employees must elect to participate:"

c. The Insurance Secretary/Treasurer will check with the District Superintendent concerned in the case of a pastor applying for the enrollment for the first time. The eligibility of any full-time employee will be checked with the pastor concerned. In either case, the first premium payment must accompany the application for enrollment before the application can be processed.

7. NOTE! TO FILE A CLAIM send the FIRST NOTICE OF CLAIM form to the Claim Dept., Travelers Insurance Company, P.O. Box 51, Little Rock, Arkansas 72203. Follow the

instructions on the back of the First Notice of Claim form.

a. The First Notice of Claim form is submitted once a year only.

- b. First Notice of Claim forms are available from the District Superintendent, Faye Douglas, Gail Anderson & Travelers Insurance Comp.
- c. Prescriptions must have the Doctor's diagnosis for the first perscription only, but not for refills.
- d. Full and complete itemized details of all tests and medical services must be included with the claims.

e. Claims for calendar year 1978 must be submitted by April 1, 1979.

- 8. THE STOP/LOSS clause in our policy means that your total "out of pocket" expenses for hospitalization cannot exceed \$500.00 per individual or \$1,500.00 per family per year.
- 9. The collection of late premiums will be in accordance with the guidelines set up in the 1977 Journal, page 133, par. 5.

## Report Number 3: Optional Programs

1. Multi-peril insurance for churches and parsonages.

We strongly recommend that all churches of the Conference investivate the multi-peril insurance program of the United Methodist Church, offered by the General Council on Finance & Administration. COMPARE! Your church may experience great savings on fire insurance and comprehensive coverage for all church property! Contact the United Methodist Church Insurance Department, 5th floor, 88 Pine Street, New York, NY 10005. Your local independent agent can broker this insurance and collect the commission.

2. Workers' Compensation

- a. We recommend that all churches provide a workers' compensation plan for all paid church staff, including the minister. See your local insurance agent for details.
- b. The District Superintendents and the Conference Council on Ministries Staff will be covered, with the premiums for the Workers' Compensation coming from the District Fund and the Conference Council on Ministries respectively.

**Report Number 4: Administrative Matters** 

- a. The Insurance Committee, on behalf of the members of our Group Insurance Program, wish to commend Faye Douglas for the outstanding job she has done during the time that she has been the Insurance Secretary/Treasurer.
- b. We recommend that we raise Faye Douglas's salary to \$2,100.00 per year, effective January 1, 1979.

c. The Budget request for 1979 is as follows:

### Report Of The Committee On Memoirs

The Committee on Memoirs is dedicated to the following labors:

- 1. The keeping of up to date records including the In Memoriam for the Conference Journal.
- 2. To assist the Committee on Worship in preparing a suitable service of "remembering" for the Annual Conference.
- 3. To act as a supportive group whenever and in whatever ways possible to ministers' families when they experience the trauma of death. In this regard, we recommend the Society of Joseph of Arimathea to the ministers and families of our Conference.

We suggest to our District Superintendents and Conference Council on Ministries that widows of ministers be included in as many mailings and activities as possible.

4. In order to carry on this work we request of the CFA an amount of \$400.00. We express our appreciation for the excellent way our requests for information have been responded to. This is a great help to your Memoir Committee. All information should be sent to our secretary, The Reverend Roy Moyers.

## The Arkansas Methodist Recommendations

- 1. The Board of Managers continues to recommend that the costs for publication of The Arkansas Methodist be apportioned to the local churches, as determined by the Cabinets and Councils on Finance and Administration.
- 2. The Board recommends for 1979 a total of \$118,200.00 be apportioned to the two Annual Conferences (to be divided equally between the two Conferences or as determined by the Cabinets and Councils on Finance and Administration).
- 3. The "Plan-of-Circulation" proposal is as follows:
  - a. Any clergy member of the Annual Conference AND any member of a local United Methodist Church who requests it. (We suggest that these requests be made in writing or by phone to the local church to which the person is related.) NOTE: Postal regulations require the following from each church whose members receive the paper:
    - (1) The completion of a form, furnished to the church by the paper, certifying that "subscription" costs for the papers received by members of that church are paid by a portion of its members' contributions to their church. That form must be filed in the paper's office to meet Second Class Mail requirements.
    - (2) Some payment, within the first six months of the year, of the Arkansas Methodist apportionment item. Postal authorities inform us that if no such payment is received in that time we must remove that church's members from our mailing list.

PLEASE NOTE: The Board and editorial staff are totally dependent upon local church pastors and leaders to see that these guidelines are followed. We urge these leaders to help avoid waste by not sending names and addresses of those who do not request the paper, yet at the same time encouraging all who will to take the paper and read it. (The amount which a local church is apportioned by its district for the Arkansas Methodist is NOT determined by the number of papers sent to its members.)

- b. Conference-connected persons (when submitted by the appropriate authorities, along with their correct address):
  - (1) Retired ministers or their surviving spouse.
  - (2) Seminary students.
  - (3) Ministers in connectional appointments.
- c. Any subscriptions **not qualifying** in any of the above categories (Para 3a and 3b) will be \$5.00 per year.

4. Every-Family Plan:

Churches which wish the paper sent to every member family without the necessity of those families requesting it may choose the Every-Family Plan by paying a fee of \$1.00 per family IN ADDITION TO to their regular apportionment. (Example: A church having 75 families would pay \$75.00 in addition to the amount apportioned by the Annual Conference.)

5. Local Church Special Edition Plan:

Local Churches are invited to consider this plan whereby a local congregation can have the back page for news of their own local church:

a. \$2.78 per family (for churches of 500 or more families);

PLUS -

b. The amount apportioned to our local church by the Annual Conference.

**Commission On Archives And History** 

The year of 1978 has been most interesting for our Commission. We are still carrying out many of our proposals and strengthening others.

We have been informed that there are still about 90 copies of the new Methodist History of Arkansas, by Dr. Walter N. Vernon. We wish to thank all those who have made this a success and encourage any who still do not have a copy of the book to contact us.

The Commission wishes to report that several individuals and groups have purchased and given the new plaque denoting the graves of Methodist Ministers.

The Commission is pleased to report that since last Annual Conference several more churches in our Conference have been placed in the National Registry of Historic Places.

The Commissions part-time Archivist, Mrs. Virginia Upton has done an excellent job in letting us know exactly what was in our Archives Collection. If you desire particular information, please direct your inquiries to her at 1212 Winfield Street, Conway, 72032. We ask that you send her copies of local church histories and founding dates of churches so these lists may be completed.

A workshop led by Dr. John H. Ness Jr. from the Commission on Archives and History at Lake Junaluska, N.C., is being planned for Oct. 12-13, 1978.

To help promote our history as United Methodist we ask each District Superintendent to appoint a District Historian to help the Commission carry out the Conference Program.

- 1. To encourage churches to write a history of their church or to update histories already written. These materials to be placed in the Hendrix Library.
- 2. To gather and arrange in each district a collection, as complete as possible, of North Arkansas Conference Journals to be located at an accessible place in each district, not to be circulated since they may be irreplaceable.
- 3. To help expand our program of placing grave markers on all graves of ministers of the Conference. The markers cost twenty dollars (\$20.00) each. These may be purchased through Rev. Robert English. We ask for the cooperation of families and local churches in this project.
- 4. To collect pictures of all Ministers of the Conference and their dates of service.
- 5. Encourage each District to create a Biographical file and History on each minister with their Conference Record and send it to Mrs. Upton.
- 6. To send two representatives of our Commission to the Jurisdictional Workshop in 1979.
- 7. To encourage District Historians and Pastors to send items of present interest to be put in a Daily Journal that Mrs. Upton has started for the Commission.
- 8. That District Superintendents and Pastors encourage people in their district and churches who might find old church records lying around in Churches or stored in private homes be sent to Hendrix for safekeeping before they are lost or destroyed.

We are asking the cooperation of the Conference in carrying out this program.

## **Committee On Policy And Review**

#### STANDING RULE 8:

There shall be an Annual Conference Planning Committee made up of the Bishop (who shall be chairperson), Council Directors, host institution representative, District Superintendent, and the Conference Secretary. The responsibility of this committee shall be to plan the agenda and entertainment of the Annual Conference and to administer the funds for the entertainment of the Annual Conference. I suggest that Dr. Brawner (Area Treasurer) and Dick Haltom (Worship Chairperson) be made ex officio members. STANDING RULE 9:

The expenses of the Annual Conference shall be paid by funds received from 1. registration fees, which shall be set by the Annual Conference Planning Committee, 2. offerings received at the Annual Conference, and 3. if necessary, the Conference Administration Fund.

All members attending the Annual Conference shall pay registration fees except retired ministers not serving charges and supernumeraries. All registration fees and offerings, except any special offerings authorized by the Annual Conference in session or designated in advance by the Annual Conference Planning Committee, shall be remitted to the Area

Treasurer and shall be disbursed on voucher authorized by the Director of the Conference Council on Ministries. The Annual Conference Planning Committee shall provide, during the session of the Annual Conference, full entertainment for retired ministers not serving a charge, their wives or widows; and room for all pastors of charges whose pastoral support from all sources is minimum salary or less.

## Committee On Structure

At the meetings of the Committee on Structure during the Conference year, we reviewed and discussed quite extensively the various phases of the structure. In reviewing past minutes, we wish to note the action taken by the Special Session of the Annual Conference at Lakewood United Methodist Church, on November 1, 1975. Action was taken at that Special Session which permits persons who were nominated in the New Structure to serve on Boards and Agencies to serve a five year term: one year in the old quadrennium and four years in the new quadrennium ending December 31, 1980.

Recommendation to the Annual Conference:

We recommend that the name of Aldersgate Retirement Center be changed to Ecumenical Retirement Center.

We recommend that in the procedure for election of the Committee on Nominations that "Election will be by majority" be deleted from the procedure, and "Election will be declared for the nominee receiving the most votes for the position" be inserted.

The District Superintendents when traveling at the request of a board, agency, or district other than his own, shall have the room and board expense paid by that board, agency, or district.

E. We recommend the following schedule of support for the Conference Council personnel for 1979:

The directors shall each receive a housing allowance of \$3600 per year, effective January 1, 1979.

The directors when traveling at the request of a board, agency, or district, shall have the room and board expense borne by that board, agency, or district.

- F. We recommend that the Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry set the formula for the distribution of funds to the several Wesley Foundations.
- G. We recommend that the Pastor's Moving Expense Fund continue to be distributed at the same rate and to those persons listed as eligible in 1976 Journal.

#### III. Other Recommendations:

- A. That the North Arkansas and Little Rock Annual Conferences provide funds for the stabilization of the monthly income for the Arkansas Methodist and guarantee 90% of the monthly income from the apportionment and that the fund be adjusted quarterly.
- B. That the North Arkansas Conference acknowledge the need for maintaining monies to be used as needed for the stabilization of the accounts of Wesley Foundation, Arkansas Methodist, Church Extension, District Superintendents Fund, Council on Ministries, etc. (Approximately \$50,000).
- D. That the North Arkansas Conference grant permission to Mt. Sequoyah to seek out individual donors, not to encroach upon any policies in the annual conference.

#### IV. Administrative Concerns

A. In determining the program budget of the Annual Conference, we remind the conference of the following procedure: (1) The CCOM determines the cost of projected programs and ministries; (2) The CFA determines the total amount of funds available for the conference benevolence budget; and (3) the CCOM recommends to the CFA an itemized program budget totalling no more than the amount the CFA recommends. The responsibility for determining budget priorities rests with the CCOM.

B. All requests from institutions for funding shall be presented to the appropriate board or agency of the Annual Conference for recommendation before presentation to the CFA.

C. All persons authorized to vouch for funds shall be identified by agencies and approved

by the CCOM prior to the dispensing of funds.

D. All apportionments in this report shall be for the calendar year 1979 and are to be paid

not later than January 10, 1980.

- E. Each Charge conference shall declare all ministerial support. The report shall include remuneration for salary, travel, utility expense, insurance, social security, and all additional compensation paid to the pastor or on behalf of the pastor.
- F. All benevolent and connectional funds are to be sent to the Office of the Stewardship and Finance, P.O. Box 3364, Little Rock, Arkansas 72203 except for the following which should be sent as designated:
- 1. Arkansas Methodist Children's Home, Christmas Offering and special offerings to the Office of the Superintendent, 2002 Fillmore, Little Rock, Arkansas 72204.
- 2. All insurance premiums be sent according to the instructions from the Committee on Group Insurance.
- G. We express our deep appreciation to Dr. R. Bryan Brawner and his staff for the excellent service they perform for the annual conference.

### **Board Of Trustees**

### I. Articles of Incorporation

- A. The Board of Trustees of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church is organized and incorporated according to the provisions of Section V-Paragraph 2410 of The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church, 1976.
- B. The Articles of Incorporation were issued on July 25, 1959, and the Charter of Incorporation is recorded in the office of the Circuit Clerk of Sebastian County in Fort Smith, Arkansas, in Book E, page 69.
- II. Execution of Legal Documents
  - The President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees are authorized to sign legal documents for the Board.
  - B. Legal documents executed must be "A Directive Action" of the Annual Conference to the Board of Trustees,
- III. Abandoned and/or Discontinued Church Property
  - A. The Board of Trustees respectively request that the District Superintendents, pastors, and District Boards of Missions be informed as to the various provisions of Section V-Paragraph 2410 et. seq. as to Annual Conference property and join with the Conference Board of Trustees in their effort to have a record of all properties within the bounds of the Conference, in which the United Methodist Church has an interest.
  - B. That each District Superintendent provide the Secretary of the Board of Trustees with a description of all property within his/her district that is not being used by the United Methodist Church; and as to whether or not Annual Conference action has been taken to (1) discontinue use of, or (2) abandon.
  - C. Sales and Transfers: There has been no transfer of real property.

#### IV. Resolutions

- A. Be it resolved that the property of the Bailey Chapel United Methodist Church in Faulkner County be declared abandoned by the North Arkansas Annual Conference and that the Conference Board of Trustees be empowered to sell the said property and the proceeds be turned over to the Conway District Board of Missions for use in Church extension projects to be approved by the said District Board of Missions.
- B. Be it resolved that the property of Hill Creek United Methodist Church in Conway County, Arkansas, be declared abandoned by the North Arkansas Annual Conference and that the Conference Board of Trustees be empowered to sell the property and the proceeds be turned over to the Board of Missions of the Conway District to be used in church projects approved by said Board of Missions.
- C. Be it resolved that the property of the Watalula United Methodist Church in Franklin County, Arkansas, be declared abandoned and that the Conference Board of Trustees be empowered to convey the property to the Board of Trustees of the First United Methodist Church of Ozark, Arkansas, for use by said church with provisions that said property shall be returned to the North Arkansas Annual Conference Board of Trustees in the event the property is no longer used by the said First United Methodist in the ministry of the church.
- D. Be it resolved that the property, 1 Lot Highway 287, of the United Methodist located in Conway County, Arkansas, be declared abandoned by the North Arkansas Annual Conference and that the Conference Board of Trustees be empowered to sell the property and the proceeds be turned over to the Board of Mission of the Conway District to be used in church projects approved by said Board of Missions.

### The Reverend J. Albert Gatlin

## 1905-1977



The Reverend J. Albert Gatlin, 71, died Sunday morning, June 19, 1977 at the Community Methodist Hospital in Paragould.

A native of Paragould, Brother Gatlin was born December 12, 1905, the son of Stephen Monroe and Fannie R. Gatlin. Brother Gatlin's father was a Methodist preacher.

Admitted On Trial in the North Arkansas Conference in 1925, Brother Gatlin was in the Methodist ministry for 52 years. He was a graduate of Southern Methodist University.

Included in his appointments were the Superintendency of the Paragould District and the Superintendency of the Jonesboro District. He was pastor at Lorado, Hardy, Marmaduke, Central Avenue, Batesville, Morrilton, First Church, Searcy, Gardner Memorial, North Little Rock, First Church, Batesville, Huntington Avenue, Jonesboro, and Griffin Memorial,

Paragould. After his retirement, he preached at Pruetts Chapel Church in Paragould and led the congregation in a major building program.

Brother Gatlin was director of Town and Country Work in the North Arkansas Conference from 1950 to 1953. He was an outstanding Scout leader and was the recipient of the Silver Beaver Award for his work throughout the State.

He is survived by his widow, Ethel Hairell Gatlin of Paragould; two sons, David M. Gatlin of North Little Rock and Stephen E. Gatlin of West Memphis; a sister, Mrs. C. E. LeMay of Flint, Michigan; seven grandchildren and one great grandson.

Funeral services were conducted on Tuesday, June 22 at the First United Methodist Church in Paragould with the Reverend Jim Gatlin, nephew of the deceased, the Reverend Bill Connell, and the Reverend Ben Jordan officiating. Burial was in the Linwood Cemetery at Paragould.

Brother Gatlin's 52 years of ministry were characterized by deep faith and courageous witness to his Lord and Savior in small communities, in large pulpits, in encouragement of pastors and people in Town and Country Ministries, and in leading a large number of persons who were Called to Preach into the Ministry of The Methodist Church. He was a great evangelist, an able administrator, and a dedicated pastor.

# Mrs. Myrtle Ivy Greer





# IX. Miscellaneous

#### STANDING RULES OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

(1) That each undergraduate, each Lay Pastor, and each candidate for conference membership be required to meet with the Board of Ministry before or during the session of the Annual Conference unless hindered by circumstances beyond his control.

(2) That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one member from each church in each

Pastoral Charge.

(3) That the figures answering the question in the pastor's report to Annual Conference "Members reported last year" shall in every case be the number of members printed in the statistical tables of the Journal of the last Annual Conference.

(4) That the District Superintendent's figures of all apportionments be accepted as the

official figures.

- (5) That the apportionment for World Service and Conferences Benevolences be combined in the statistical report; and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.
- (6) All statistical reports, after being checked for correctness by the District Superintendent and District auditors, shall be delivered by one of them to the Conference Statistician, within 31 days after the closing of the Conference Treasurer's books.
- (7) That the District Superintendents be instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or District

Superintendent's District for insertion in the Conference Journal.

- (8) There shall be an Annual Conference Planning Committee made up of the Bishop (who shall be chairperson), Council Directors, host institution representative, District Superintendents, the Conference Secretary and four persons from the Council on Lay Life and Work, two of whom shall be women. The responsibility of this committee shall be to plan the agenda and entertainment of the Annual Conference.
- (9) The expenses of the Annual Conference shall be paid by funds received from: 1. registration fees, which shall be set by the Annual Conference Planning Committee; 2. offerings received at the Annual Conference; and 3. if necessary, the Conference

Administration Fund.

(10) Every council, board, commission and committee receiving any money from conference funds shall present to the Council on Finance and Administration annually by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference a detailed financial report including all receipts and expenditures.

(11) A list of lay members elected to Annual Conference shall be compiled by the district superintendents and sent to the conference secretary prior to the opening of the session.

- (12) The district stewards shall apportion all annual conference askings to the several charges on each district on an equitable basis.
- (13) The Conference Treasurer shall hold his books open for 15 days following the close of the fiscal year.
- (14) No one shall be nominated for re-election to a board or commission on which he has served more than a quadrennium immediately preceding his election.
- (15) The Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Pensions shall be members of the secretarial staff of the Conference, and these persons shall be charged with the responsibility of seeing that all records pertaining to service years be made identical.
- (16) Any proposal to change the Standing Rules shall lie on the table overnight, and then its passage shall require a ¾ vote of those present and voting.
- (17) That part of the report of all councils, boards, commissions, committees and other agencies of the conference which provides for changes in policy or makes recommendations shall be mimeographed, printed, or otherwise duplicated and distributed to the membership of the conference prior to the time scheduled for action on said report.

- (18) All churches employing more than one appointed member of an annual conference shall pay all percentages based on pastor's salary on the salaries of all ministers so employed.
- (19) Each Annual Conference session shall designate a moving date. Any exceptions to the designated date shall be agreed upon by the pastors involved.
- (20) That no person shall be elected by the Annual Conference to serve on more than one (1) major Board, Committee, Commission, Agency, etc., at one time. This does not affect ex-officio positions or the Conference Committee on Episcopacy.
- (21) That all councils, boards, committees, and commissions be made more representative. Special consideration should be given to the use of women and youth.
- (22) No persons shall serve as an elected trustee of more than one United Methodist related institution of the Arkansas Area at a time.
- (23) No one who by virtue of their office would be an ex-officio trustee, shall serve as an elected trustee of the same agency.
- (24) Each year the Conference Council on Ministries will determine the number of additional lay persons, if any, to be named and will notify each District Council on Ministries of the number of persons to be named by it, according to the following formula with top priority to be given to Number 1, etc.:
  - 1. Officers of the Conference Council on Lay Life and Work.
  - 2. Conference United Methodist Women officers within the bounds of a district.
  - 3. Elected chairpersons for conference boards and agencies.
  - 4. Elected lay persons to general and jurisdictional boards and agencies.
  - 5. Lay delegates to general and jurisdictional conferences.
  - 6. District Lay Leaders, District Presidents of United Methodist Women, and District Presidents of United Methodist Men.
  - 7. Lay members of conference boards and agencies.
  - 8. One additional youth from each district.
  - 9. Inclusiveness of ethnic minorities.
  - 10. At-large district representatives.

# Certificate Of Amendment Of Articles Of Incorporation Of The United Methodist Children's Home, Incorporated

We, Charles T. Meyer, Jr., President and Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and S. Rowe Hill, acting Secretary, of The United Methodist Children's Home, Incorporated, an Arkansas nonprofit corporation, do hereby certify that on the 16th day of May, 1978 at the annual meeting of the board of directors of the corporation known as the Board of Trustees, duly called with notice of the proposed action on the following resolution and held at the office of the corporation, 2002 South Fillmore Street in the City of Little Rock, Arkansas, at which meeting a majority of the trustees were present, the following resolution was adopted by the majority vote of all of the trustees:

#### Resolution

BE IT RESOLVED that the Articles of Incorporation of The United Methodist Children's Home, Incorporated be, and they are, hereby amended in their entirety and restated to read as follows:

# Amended Articles of Incorporation Of

#### The United Methodist Children's Home, Incorporated

ARTICLE 1. The name of this corporation shall be The United Methodist Children's Home, Incorporated.

ARTICLE 2. The principal office of the corporation shall be located in Pulaski County, Arkansas, at 2002 South Fillmore Street in the City of Little Rock.

ARTICLE 3. The objects and purposes of the corporation shall be:

(a) To provide necessary care and training for orphaned, dependent, or neglected children, and to locate or relocate, establish, maintain, and manage a home or homes for such children within or without the State of Arkansas, or place them in foster homes or for adoption as the best interest of the child may require, under such rules and regulations as may be fixed by the Board of Trustees and the laws of the State of Arkansas.

(b) To advance charitable, religious, educational, scientific, and literary activities consistent with and in conformity to the principles generally recognized as charitable, religious, educational, scientific, or literary and distribute charitable benefits to children and other persons, firms or institutions selected and considered capable of furthering and

assisting the purposes of this corporation.

(c) To act for and under its general corporate authority; to acquire by gift, devise, bequest or in any other manner real and personal property, including money, or any right or title therein or improvements thereon, and to sell, lease, mortgage, pledge, assign, transfer or otherwise dispose of said property for any purpose or use necessary, convenient, useful or incidental to the accomplishment of the purposes of this corporation; to convert any and all properties to cash and to re-invest same in such properties or securities as shall be deemed appropriate by the trustees, including, but not restricted to, United States Government, State or Municipal bonds; to borrow or raise money necessary or convenient to the accomplishment of the purposes of this corporation and from time to time, without limitation upon amount, to draw, make, accept, endorse, execute and issue promissory notes, drafts, bills of exchange, warrants, bonds, debentures and other negotiable and nonnegotiable instruments and evidences of indebtedness and to secure the payment of any thereof and the interest thereon by mortgage, pledge, conveyance or assignment in trust of

the whole or any part of the property of the association or corporation, whether at the time owned or thereafter acquired; to cooperate with any governmental agency or agencies, whether national, state or municipal, or with any business or private agency whatsoever in carrying out the purposes herein contemplated. Notwithstanding the above enumerated powers, the corporation shall not engage, other than as an insubstantial part, in activities which in themselves are not in furtherance of the purposes as stated herein.

- (d) To do all and everything necessary, suitable or proper for the accomplishment of any of the purposes, the attainment of any of the objects or the furtherance of any of the powers in these Articles of Incorporation, or any amendment thereto, as necessary or incidental to the protection and benefit of the corporation; and in general to carry on any lawful activity necessary or incidental to the attainment of the objects of the corporation whether or not such activity is similar in nature to the objects set forth in these Articles of Incorporation, or any amendment thereto.
- (e) The above powers are in addition to those granted by statute and they do not limit the powers so granted in any manner.

ARTICLE 4. The management of this corporation shall be by and through its duly acting and legally constituted board of directors which shall be called "Board of Trustees". The Board of Trustees shall be responsible for the care of the children committed to the corporation's care and keeping and shall employ an Administrator to supervise and care for children and otherwise discharge and carry out the purposes of this corporation.

The Board of Trustees shall have the power to make all rules, regulations and Bylaws as the Board may deem necessary and expedient for the control and management of the corporation, prescribe the duties to be performed by the officers of the corporation, and to amend such rules, regulations and Bylaws. The private property of the trustees, officers and Administrator shall not be liable for losses except in the event of malfeasance.

ARTICLE 5. The Board of Trustees shall consist of sixty-four (64) directors, who shall be known as trustees. Ex officio members of the Board of Trustees shall be the resident Bishop of the Arkansas area of the United Methodist Church; the District Superintendent of the Little Rock District of the Little Rock Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church; the District Superintendent of the Conway District of the North Arkansas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church; such other officials whom the Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church shall now or hereafter require to act as ex officio trustees of institutions similar to this corporation; and the trustees elected for life on the date of the amendment of these Articles of Incorporation.

(a) Election of Trustees. Of the membership of the Board of Trustees, thirty-two (32) trustees shall be designated as trustees-at-large and thirty-two (32) shall be designated as conference trustees. All trustees shall serve four-year terms, beginning on January 1 of the year following their election.

The trustees-at-large shall be elected and nominated by the Board of Trustees to serve terms of four years; no such trustee shall serve more than three consecutive terms. At the time of the most recent election, twenty-one (21) of the trustees-at-large shall be members of The United Methodist Church or its successor.

Sixteen conference trustees shall be elected by the Little Rock Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church at its annual meeting to serve for terms of four years; no such trustee shall serve for more than two consecutive terms. At the time of their election, one-half of such conference trustees shall be ministers and one-half shall be lay persons.

Sixteen conference trustees shall be elected by the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church at its annual meeting to serve for terms of four years; no such trustee shall serve for more than two consecutive terms. At the time of their election, one-half of such conference trustees shall be ministers and one-half shall be lay persons.

(b) Initial Election. The Board of Trustees elected during the year 1978 in the manner provided for in the Articles of Incorporation in effect on the date of their election shall continue to hold office until January 1, 1980, at which time the Board of Trustees, as described above, shall take office. At the first meeting of the Board of Trustees, held after January 1, 1980, one-fourth (1/4) of the trustees-at-large and one-fourth (1/4) of the

ministers elected as conference trustees and one-fourth (1/4) of the lay persons elected as conference trustees shall, by lot, be designated as holding one-year terms, one-fourth (1/4) thereof shall, by lot, be designated as holding two-year terms; one-fourth (1/4) thereof shall, by lot, be designated as holding three-year terms; and one-fourth (1/4) thereof shall,

by designated lot, be designated as holding four-year terms.

ARTICLE 6. The annual meeting of the Board of Trustees shall be on the third Tuesday in May of each year at the principal office of the corporation or at such other place as the Board may, from time to time, select. Special meetings of the Board may be called by the Chairman, the Administrator, or the presiding Bishop of the Arkansas area of the United Methodist Church. Twenty members of the Board shall constitute a quorum at a special meeting; ten members shall constitute a quorum at an annual meeting. At all meetings, the act of the majority of the trustees present at a meeting at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the Board of Directors. The Board of Trustees shall elect a Nominations Committee and a Finance Committee and may elect an Executive Committee and such other committees as it may determine necessary; all such committees shall have the powers designated by the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE 7. The officers of the corporation shall consist of a President, who shall be the chief executive officer of the corporation, and who shall be called "Chairman of the Board", Vice-Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer, and such other officers as may be designated by the Board of Trustees, all of whose officers' authority shall be as prescribed by the Bylaws

of the corporation.

ARTICLE 8. The corporation shall have no members.

ARTICLE 9. No compensation or payment shall ever be paid or made to any officer or trustee of this corporation, or substantial contributor to it, except as a reasonable allowance for actual expenditures or services actually made or rendered to or for this corporation, and neither the whole nor any part or portion of the assets or net earnings, current or accumulated, of this corporation shall ever be distributed to or among any such person; provided, further, that neither the whole nor any part or portion of such assets or net earnings shall ever be used for, accrue to, or inure to the benefit of any individual within the meaning of Internal Revenue Code section 501(c) (3).

ARTICLE 10. The corporation shall distribute its income for each taxable year at such time and in such manner as not to become subject to the tax on undistributed income imposed by Section 4942 of the Internal Revenue Code or corresponding provisions of any

subsequent federal tax laws.

The corporation shall not: (a) engage in any act of self-dealing, as defined in Section 4941(d) of the Internal Revenue Code or corresponding provisions of any subsequent federal tax laws; (b) retain any excess business holdings, as defined in Section 4943(c) of the Internal Revenue Code or corresponding provisions of any subsequent federal tax laws; (c) make any investment in such manner as to subject it to tax under Section 4944 of the Internal Revenue Code or corresponding provisions of any subsequent federal tax laws; (d) make any taxable expenditures, as defined in Section 4945 (d) of the Internal Revenue Code or corresponding provisions of any subsequent federal tax laws.

ARTICLE 11. The registered agent of the corporation is Joe R. Phillips, Jr., whose

address is 2002 South Fillmore Street, Little Rock, Arkansas.

ARTICLE 12. The period of existence of this corporation shall be perpetual. Upon the dissolution of this corporation, by resolution of its Board of Trustees or otherwise, the Board of Trustees shall, upon the dissolution of the corporation, after paying or making provision for the payment of all liabilities of this corporation, dispose of all of the assets of this corporation exclusively for the purposes of this corporation in such manner, or to such charitable, educational, religious, literary or scientific purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations described in Section (501)(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 [26 U.S.C. §501(c) (3)], or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law, as the Board of Trustees shall determine. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the Circuit Court of Pulaski County, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations, as said court shall

determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

ARTICLE 13. These Articles of Incorporation may be amended by a majority vote of the Board of Trustees.
