

> > The Opening Celebration May 22, 1979

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was observed at 7:30 P.M. with Bishop Kenneth W. Hicks and Dr. Barry Bailey, Conference Preacher, as the Ministers of the Celebration. Liturgist was W. C. Haltom. Deacons were William Wilder, Ben Jordan, Harold Spence, Fred Roebuck, Jerry Canada and George Ivey. The Chancel Choir was from First United Methodist Church, Van Buren. Organist and Director was Maetta L. Jacobs. Soloist was Melissa Matlock. The Communion Stewards were from First United Methodist Church, Fort Smith: Mrs. Marie Stone, Mrs. Robert Gregg and Mrs. Wesley Moreland. Acolytes were Mitzi Mankin and Susie Dickey of First United Methodist Church, Fort Smith. Pianist was Laura Stranathan; the Flautist was Kathy Workman; the Violinist was Robert Hippensteel.

First Day — Morning Session May 23, 1979

DEVOTIONS: The Liturgist was Joel Daugherty; the Preacher was Bishop Kenneth W. Hicks. The organist was Don Mooney. The Indian Sign Language was given by Patricia Thomas from the Oklahoma Indian Mission Conference.

OPENING OF SESSION: The One Hundred Forty-Fourth Session of the North Arkansas Annual Conference was convened at First United Methodist Church, Fort Smith, Arkansas, at 8:30 A.M., with Bishop Hicks presiding. In his opening statement to the Conference Bishop Hicks stressed the importance of the election of delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences.

COUNCIL ON PROFESSIONAL MINISTRY: Waymon Hollis, Chairperson, presented the report. He announced that after a study of Standardization of Clergy Salaries that the Council did not feel that this was feasible at the present time. Reports I and II were adopted.

BALLOT ON NOMINATIONS: The ballots were distributed and the vote taken.

COMMITTEE ON STRUCTURE: Pat Freemyer presented the report and moved that the revised structure be printed in the 1979 Journal. After discussion Harold Scott offered a substitute motion: to have the Conference Council on Ministries reproduce and mail the updated structure. The substitute motion passed.

Dr. Wayland expressed pride in the work of this his home conference and spoke of the North Arkansas Conference as being a Conference that paid all of its World Service askings.

The Choir was the Elizabeth Terry Memorial Handbell Choir from The United Methodist Children's Home of Little Rock, Dr. Edson Perry, Director.

PRESENTATION: Bishop Hicks called attention to the Conference Banner and presented Ann Jackson of Berryville who made it.

BALLOT REPORT: Emily Cockrill was elected as a lay delegate on Ballot #3.

BALLOT #4: The ballot was taken to elect 2 laity.

SCARRITT COLLEGE: Andy Hall spoke for Scarritt College. He expressed appreciation for the support of the Conference.

CANDLER SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY: Gerald Lord spoke and expressed gratitude for our support of the Ministerial Education Fund.

COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES, COORDINATED REPORT, CONTINUED: Sam Teague called for the spokesperson from the Area Staff Legislative Forum to report. Dolly Cooper reported that the group supported the proposal. Clif Christopher asked to hear the position of the Task Force on Ethnic Minority Local Church. Bob Felder responded that he knew nothing about this proposal before this time. Charles McDonald asked if consideration was given to someone part-time within the Conference, not as an area. Euba Winton called for a meeting of the Conference Ethnic Minority Task Force to bring back a report from their group. Bill Wilder reminded us that this is a broader cause than Ethnic Minority. The remainder of the report was adopted. (See report.)

Leonard Byers presented the retirees to the Annual Conference. They spoke to the Conference and were given a standing ovation.

BALLOT REPORT: Laity Ballot #6, no election. Clergy Ballot #5, no election.

BALLOT: Laity Ballot #7 taken, vote for one delegate. Clergy Ballot #6 taken, vote for one delegate.

COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES, CONTINUED: Sam Teague presented the report on Parish Development and asked Ben Jordan to explain in more detail. To do so, he called on Bill Lindsey who presented the recommendation of the Legislative Forum which supported the Parish Development report. Ben Jordan then asked Kathy Fadick and Harold Davis to assist him in clarifying the proposal. A discussion followed. Bill Walker moved an amendment to the proposal. Amendment failed. Gary Barbaree offered an amendment which the Task Force on Parish Development accepted, and it became part of the report. A. W. Martin, Jr. moved to strike the word "participant." Ben Jordan accepted the amendment and it became part of the report. Wayne Jarvis offered a substitute amendment which failed. Sam Teague moved the Parish Development report be adopted. So ordered.

HENDRIX COLLEGE: Dr. Roy Schilling presented a report from Hendrix College and expressed appreciation for the support of the Annual Conference.

BALLOT REPORT: Laity Ballot #7, no election. Clergy Ballot #6, no election.

BALLOT: Laity Ballot #8 taken, vote for one delegate. Clergy Ballot #7 taken, vote for one delegate.

YOUNG ADULT MINISTRY: Gary Barbaree introduced several young adults who made a report through a song entitled "Sit Down, You're Rocking the Boat," which sought support for Young Adult Ministries.

ALDERSGATE: Ray Tribble spoke of the program of Aldersgate and other types of ministries offered and presented the Bishop a T-shirt.

CHRISTIAN CIVIC FOUNDATION: Ed Harris expressed the Foundation's appreciation to the pastors, lay people, The Arkansas Methodist, Board of Church and Society, and the Council on Finance and Administration for their help in the work of the Foundation. He stated that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention intended to continue its financial support of the Foundation. Worth Gibson spoke of the help given the churches in Craighead County in a recent wet/dry election.

SUBSTITUTE MOTION: John Crofoot presented a substitute motion for the proposed Standing Rule change offered by the Board of Diaconal Ministries which changed the priority list. Seconded. Pat Halwes moved the substitute motion be tabled until the next day. John Crofoot spoke to the motion giving his reasons for support. The motion to table carried.

PRAYER: Bishop Hicks called on John Thompson for prayer.

RECESS.

Hicks in the Consecration were Arvill Brannon and Pat Halwes, Secretary of the Board of Diaconal Ministry. The Choir was the Chancel Choir from Goddard Memorial United Methodist Church, Fort Smith; Ed Boyd, Director. Organist was Brenda Partain. Acolytes were Marilyn Cooley and Sarah Brown of First United Methodist Church, Fort Smith.

DEVOTIONS: The Liturgist was Sarah Brown. Organist was Don Mooney; Soloist was Helen Matlock; Accompanist was Maetta L. Jacobs. The Preacher was Aaron F. Barling.

OPENING: Bishop Hicks called the Conference to order and expressed appreciation for the fine spirit of the Conference.

BALLOT REPORT: Laity Ballot #9, no election. BALLOT: Laity Ballot #10 taken, vote for one.

BALLOT REPORT: Clergy Ballot #8, Ben Jordan was elected. BALLOT: Clergy Ballot #1, for delegates to Jurisdictional Conference, to elect 4

delegates. Ballot taken. PHILANDER SMITH COLLEGE: Arvill Brannon spoke for the college.

DISTRICT CONFERENCE JOURNALS: James Southerland reported that the District Conference Journals are in good order.

BOARD OF DIACONAL MINISTRIES: The proposed changes in Standing Rule #24 placed on the table the first day and affected by a substitute motion the second day was called from the table. Pat Halwes explained the rationale in the proposed change. A motion was made and seconded to amend the substitute motion. Emily Cockrill spoke against the proposed amendment. A lengthy discussion ensued. Question was called. The amendment to the substitute motion failed. The substitute motion was read. A lengthy discussion ensued. Jim Beal moved an amendment to the substitute motion that the #1 priority in John Crofoot's motion be amended to read, "1. One young adult who is an active participant of a Wesley Foundation."

POINT OF ORDER: Wayne Jarvis stated that the Standing Rules require that this type of change be printed and distributed on the floor.

MOTION: Emily Cockrill moved that we print this and distribute it before we discuss it further. So ordered.

PERSONAL STATEMENT: Bishop Hicks spoke about the execution of John Arthur Spenkelink which had just taken place. He reminded us that we are not where we should be as Christians and as a world when we still revert to this type of action in dealing with our problems. He then led the Conference in prayer.

COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES, CONTINUED: Sam Teague called on the chairpersons of

the remaining boards to present their reports.

BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY: Kurt Wulfekuhler spoke in absence of the chairperson and presented the report. Carolyn Park spoke supportively about the budget for Wesley Foundation. Charles Casteel moved the adoption of the report. Adopted. Education: Ben Hines gave the report. He called on Sharon Spurlin from the Young Adult Task Force who moved that a Young Adult Council be formed. So ordered. (See Report.) Family Life: Clif Christopher spoke for the Family Life Committee. He moved that a petition be sent to the General Conference making Family Life a priority for the next quadrennium. So ordered. (See Report.) He moved that the year 1980 be declared the "Year of the Family" in the North Arkansas Conference. So ordered. The report was adopted.

BALLOT REPORT: Clergy Ballot #1, no election. BALLOT: Clergy Ballot #2 was taken, to elect 4.

BALLOT REPORT: Laity Ballot #1, Gene Brand and Marvin Gaither were elected.

BALLOT: Laity Ballot #2 taken, to elect 2.

BOARD OF DISCIPLESHIP, CONTINUED: Stewardship: Jim West moved the adoption of the report. It was adopted. Worship: Dick Haltom made the report. He presented some examples of different kinds of worship services. He moved that a petition be sent to the General Conference concerning the Book of Worship. (See Report.) So ordered. The report was adopted.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Mrs. Merle Wood presented Bishop Hicks with a stole made by the United Methodist Women of First United Methodist Church, Van Buren.

NEW DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS PRESENTED: Bill Connell, Ben Hines and James Meadors were presented to the Conference. Their wives were presented also.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Mrs. Elaine Hicks presented the wives of the present cabinet members. She announced that she and the Bishop were presenting a check to World Hunger in honor of these wives.

OUT-GOING DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS: Bishop Hicks presented Jim Beal, Harold Spence and Ben Jordan to the Conference.

BALLOT REPORT: Laity Ballot #2, no election.

BALLOT: Laity Ballot #3, to elect 2.

BALLOT REPORT: Clergy Ballot #2, Charles McDonald was elected.

BALLOT: Clergy Ballot #3, to elect 3.

ORDER OF THE DAY: Joel Cooper moved an order of the day for 1:45 P.M. The Council on Finance and Administration will report at that time. So ordered.

BOARD OF DISCIPLESHIP, CONTINUED: Enlistment: Jim McKay made the report.

Adopted.

The total Board of Discipleship report was adopted.

COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES, CONTINUED: Muriel Peters presented two recommended items to be held over and considered at a later time. (1) Since no requesting for funding has been received from the Fort Smith Nursing Home and Retirement Center, no funding is recommended; (2) The Christian Civic Foundation did not make a request for funding to the Board of Church and Society, therefore no funding is recommended for 1980. Sam Teague moved that these items be placed on the table. So ordered.

ORDER OF THE DAY: Joel Cooper moved to delay the Order of the Day. So ordered.

CHRISTIAN CIVIC FOUNDATION: Maurice Lanier moved that the Christian Civic Foundation be funded for 1980 at the 1979 level. Discussion ensued. Question called for. Motion failed. Discussion ensued. Jim Beal moved the following amendment: "That the Annual Conference apportion \$12,000 for Christian Social Concerns for 1980. Five-twelfths of this would be used to fund our share of the Christian Civic Foundation to June 1, 1980." Amendment adopted. The original motion as amended was adopted.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION: The report was presented by Joel Cooper. He presented an overview of the budget. Ann Onstott was presented to the Conference and was elected Treasurer. Wayne Jarvis presented changes in Report #2. (See Report.) He moved the adoption of the report. Frank Clemmons moved that the Equitable Salaries section of the CFA report be held in abeyance until the report on Equitable Salaries is considered. So ordered. The CFA report was adopted, except for Equitable Salaries.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Wayne Jarvis presented Diane Earls from the Area

Treasurer's staff.

MOTION: Lynn Barbaree presented a motion encouraging more inclusiveness in the worship services of the Annual Conference. Motion passed.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Buddy Arnold moved that the Annual Conference go on record

as endorsing Joel Cooper for the office of Bishop. So ordered.

BALLOT REPORT: Clergy Ballot #4, no election. Laity Ballot #5, no election. BALLOT: Clergy Ballot #5 taken, to elect 2. Laity Ballot #6 taken, to elect 1.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Norman Carter moved that a petition from the Annual Conference be sent to the General Conference on abortion. Motion failed.

BALLOT REPORT: Laity Ballot #6, no election. Clergy Ballot #5, no election. BALLOT: Laity Ballot #7 taken, to elect 1. Clergy Ballot #6 taken, to elect 2.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Bill Williams reminded us that all of us have a right to express ourselves on issues without our motives being brought into question. He stated that our attitudes were often expressed in simple ways and that we should be careful to understand where the person is coming from before we speak.

STANDING RULE CHANGE: Pat Halwes stated that the rule changes had been printed and distributed as ordered. Jim Beal's amendment to the substitute motion carried. Nell Barling moved to delete the word "additional" in lines 3 and 4 of the motion to Standing Rule #24. So ordered. The question was called and the substitute motion failed. Ballot be elected. So ordered.

DECLARATORY DECISION: Max Whitfield moved that a request for a declaratory decision be sent to the Judicial Council to determine if Diaconal Ministers can serve as lay members of the Annual Conference. So ordered.

MT. SEQUOYAH: Lee Cate spoke of his work on Mt. Sequoyah.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Dewey Dark presented the 20 lay persons who have served the Conference as ballot counters. They were applauded warmly.

BALLOT REPORT: Laity Ballot #8, Phyllis Johnson was elected.

UNITED METHODIST MEN: Charles Mabry made the report.

PRAYER: The closing prayer was given by Worth Gibson.

Hicks; Dr. Barry Bailey; Victor Nixon, Liturgist; Marietta Edens and Harold Vault, Lay Readers; representatives of the Board of Ordained Ministry; the District Superintendents; and one sponsoring Elder for each person to be ordained Elder. The Chancel Choir was from First United Methodist Church, Fort Smith. Director was Edna Earle Massey and Organist was Mary Jane Goss. Members of the brass ensemble were Dr. Neale Bartee, Director; Jeff Haltom and Carlos Summers. The Ordination Banner was made by Ann Jackson of The United Methodist Church, Berryville. The Pentecost stoles which were presented to each new elder and the Bishop were made by the United Methodist Women of The First United Methodist Church, Van Buren. The Acolytes were Richard Johnson and Mark Huisman.

Fourth Day — Morning Session May 26, 1979

DEVOTIONS: The Liturgist was Ellen Prewitt; the Organist was Don Mooney; the Preacher was George Ivey. Soloist was Diana Peer and Accompanist was Maetta L. Jacobs. BALLOT REPORT: Clergy Ballot, 2 elected as alternates: Robert Felder and Norman

MOTION: A motion was made to elect the 2 persons receiving the most votes for lay alternates. So ordered.

BALLOT: Laity Ballot taken, to elect 2 alternates.

INSURANCE COMMITTEE: Gail Anderson made the report and proposed several changes. Joe Kennedy offered an amendment making dental insurance a part of the program. Leon Wilson spoke against the amendment. George Shepherd spoke for it. Further discussion ensued. Amendment failed. Gail Anderson completed the report. Adopted.

BALLOT REPORT: Laity Ballot, 2 elected as alternates: Marie Jordan and June Spotts. DELEGATES EXCUSED: Bishop Hicks excused the elected delegates and alternates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences for an organizational meeting.

PENSIONS: Ralph Hillis introduced the report and called on Joe Linam to make the corrections. The report was adopted.

DECLARATORY DECISIONS: Phil Hathcock moved the following: "The North Arkansas Conference hereby requests of the Judicial Council a declaratory decision as to whether the provision of disclosure of remuneration, Paragraph 937 of The Discipline, prevails over institutional policies which prevent such disclosures." This is for clarification since institutional policies which refuse to allow disclosure of salaries place these ministers

in the position of refusing to comply with **The Discipline** and place the Conference Secretary in the position of submitting an incomplete Journal.

BOARD OF GLOBAL MINISTRIES: Nell Barling made corrections in the report. Ecumenical and Interreligious Concerns: Ron Clark presented the list of 27 persons to be elected as our representatives to the Arkansas Council of Churches. They are: Rex Darling, Ben Jordan, Walter Davidson, Lewis Chesser, Harold Eggensperger, Earl Carter, Mildred Osment, Bob Edwards, Arvill Brannon, Gladys Womack, Carole Teague, Leland Smith, Ken Stewart, June Spotts, Mary Ellen Jesson, Jerry Nichols, Pat Sims, Freddie Nixon, David Bentley, James West, Pryor Cruce, Bobby Bell, Thomas Anderson, John Wilcher, Ron Durham, Ed Davis, Frank Clemmons. Health and Welfare: Freddie Nixon made the report and called special attention to the Board of Global Ministries' recommendation which calls for the Board of Trustees of the Annual Conference to study and examine the relationship of the Annual Conference to its various institutional ministries. Town and Country: Jerry Nichols made the report. Missions: Joe Wilkerson suggested that churches seeking funding for various building projects through this agency, read carefully their report. He presented Euba Winton and announced that the program she works in has received continued funding. He announced a \$10,000 gift from Ethnic Minority Local Church for the Taylor Chapel Church in the Forrest City District. Deaf Ministries: Rhonda Crow presented the report and stated that there are over 4000 deaf people in Arkansas and only one church in the Conference that's attempting to minister to them. Nell Barling moved the adoption of the total report. It was adopted.

RELIGION AND RACE: Euba Winton made the report and noted changes.

STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN: Rhonda Crow presented the report and added the name of Dorothy Collier to their list submitted earlier.

REPORT OF ELECTION BY DELEGATES: Joel Cooper was elected chairperson and Ben Jordan, secretary, of the delegation to General Conference. The delegation nominated Joel Cooper and Buddy Arnold for the Episcopal Committee. Report adopted.

EQUITABLE SALARIES: Frank Clemmons noted several changes. He emphasized the categories of support and explained the budget requests. Jim Barton spoke for the Legislative Forum stating that they supported the full funding of the program and not at the level that CFA had recommended. Bill Watson spoke as the Cabinet Representative and urged the full funding of the program. Wayne Jarvis spoke for CFA, stating that they were not aware that their funding recommendations would put the program in jeopardy until this time. Charles Ramsay moved that the line item for Equitable Salaries be increased by \$10,000, making the total \$71,000. It was seconded. An amendment to the motion was offered by Ralph Hillis that the salaries of ministers covered in Equitable Salaries be increased by the same proportion as the average Conference salary. The amendment failed. Wayne Jarvis offered a substitute motion that the asking for Equitable Salaries be \$76,000. The substitute motion passed. COUNCIL ON LAY LIFE AND WORK: Emily Cockrill spoke to the report and also reported for the Legislative Forum. She moved that the Bishop appoint a Task Force to consider standardization of salaries of clergy and report back to the next session of the Annual Conference. This Task Force would include lay people, not just persons from the Council of Professional Ministry. Motion carried.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRIES: Amy Harris gave the report.

The total report for the Council on Lay Life and Work was adopted.

ARCHIVES AND HISTORY: Bob English gave the report. He presented a resolution to be included as part of their report. He presented Mrs. Virginia Upton, Conference Archives

Historian, to the Conference.

CHAPLAINCY COMMITTEE: Gary Barbaree presented a motion concerning the organization of the Committee on Chaplaincy. It was made part of the report of the Council of the Professional Ministry.

TRUSTEES: Muriel Peters presented the report of the Conference Board of Trustees. It was adopted.

COMMITTEE ON OUTDOOR MINISTRIES: Wayne Clark made the report, noting that the committee had been renamed more in keeping with its functions.

CONFERENCE TIME LINE: Vic Nixon presented for adoption the Time Line for Conference Planning. It was adopted.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION: Wayne Jarvis presented a job description for the Area Treasurer, noting the Office of Finance and Management changes. It was adopted.

COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS: Jim Barton presented the report and expressed appreciation for the support and caring of the Annual Conference.

COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS: Max Whitfield presented Report #3:

DISABILITY COMMITTEE: Hillman Byram moved that Kern Johnson be dropped from the list of those on disability. Adopted.

BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY: REPORT #2: Max Whitfield presented the names of 7 persons who have received the certificate of candidacy for ordained ministry, the names of 10 persons who have completed studies for the license as a local pastor but are not now appointed, 18 persons who are approved full time local pastors, 17 who are part-time local pastors, 6 persons who are student local pastors, and 4 ministers of other denominations who have been approved. He also named 14 persons who are continued as Probationary Members. (See Board of Ordained Ministry Report.) Jon Guthrie moved the adoption of the report. So ordered.

WHERE WILL THE NEXT SESSION OF ANNUAL CONFERENCE BE HELD?: Jon Guthrie extended the invitation in behalf of Hendrix College. The invitation was accepted.

RESOLUTION: Othella Peters moved the following resolution to be sent to Governor Bill Clinton:

"Whereas the execution of a human life has occurred on May 25, 1979, in the state of Florida,

Whereas the United Methodist Church Social Principles opposes the use of the death penalty as a means of justice,

We, the members of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church, urge you to use your executive power as the Governor of the State of Arkansas to prevent the use of this inhumane form of justice in the State of Arkansas."

The resolution was adopted.

MOVING DATE: Jim Beal moved that Moving Day be June 6, 1979. So ordered.

MOTION: Bennie Harmon made the following motion: "In light of our united commitment between the churches in 1968, and that 1980 will be the 12th year for complete transition of all recognition from all concerned into "The United Methodist Church", I therefore move that all correspondence, dealings, and signs of churches and other organizations be changed to the proper name of 'The United Methodist Church' written in like letters (same lettering size and style of letters); this being completed no later than May 31, 1980, in the North Arkansas Conference; and this Annual Conference requesting that all over the nation this be done in each Annual Conference." Adopted.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS: Charles Casteel read a Resolution of Appreciation to the host church, the city, and to all who made this Conference a successful and memorable one.

CLOSING STATEMENT: Bishop Hicks made a statement commending the positive actions of the Conference.

THE CELEBRATION OF THE GOSPEL-CLOSING THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE SESSION: This Celebration time was concluded with the reading of the appointments by Bishop Hicks, the Conference joining in a Benediction and the singing of the hymn, "A Charge To Keep I Have."

COORDINATED REPORT CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

Statement Of Purpose

The Council on Ministries of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church is a servant of the Church at the Conference level. It is directly answerable to the Annual Conference, and works closely with the Bishop and Cabinet, District Council on Ministries and Boards and Agencies of the Conference.

The purpose of the Council on Ministries is six-fold:

- TO LISTEN to be sensitive to the leadership of God's Holy Spirit and to be aware of missional needs of the Church as expressed from local churches, District Councils on Ministries, Annual Conference Agencies, and Jurisdictional and General Agencies of the Church.
- 2. TO PLAN to receive, to initiate, and to research program suggestions that are consistent with the goals and policies of the Annual Conference.
- 3. TO COORDINATE to develop program suggestions from the various Conference Agencies, General Church Agencies, District, and local church agencies into a coordinated program for recommendation to the Annual Conference.
- 4. TO SUBMIT the coordinated Conference program, with recommended program priorities to the Annual Conference for consideration, amendment and adoption.
- 5. TO IMPLEMENT AND ADMINISTER to implement and administer the adopted program of the Annual Conference and assign the "program" to the various Boards and Agencies of the Conference and Districts. (It is understood that special committees and task forces will be used from time to time to carry out special program tasks.)
- 6. TO EVALUATE to have an ongoing evaluation of programs and procedures to test effectiveness in carrying out the Conference program. (The evaluation content and process shall reflect our primary concern for the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ at a personal and congregational level.)


Additional Model for Staff Assignments

In the past few years, several programs have been attempted jointly by the two Conference Councils on Ministries. One notable success has been the World Hunger Emphasis. In the administration of these programs, leaders in both Conferences have seen the benefit of working together in programs of common concern.

The addition of a second setting for our current staff seems advantageous for each of the

two separate Annual Conferences and their work. This second setting would in no way relieve the staff of current assignments, except in areas where the two Annual Conferences both agree to work cooperatively.

Under this setting, staff responsibilities would be defined along functional lines and the plan would consist of the following:



- a) The Bishop shall be Chairman of the Area Staff. This does not mean that the Bishop shall be merely a "presider" or "convener." Nor does it imply that the Area Staff shall be "under the thumb" of the Bishop. Rather, the Bishop shall have a key role in the Area Staff — consulting, initiating, counseling, enabling, facilitating, making input, and providing guidance.
- b) An Area Steering Committee, composed of the Bishop, and the Chairpersons, Vice-Chairpersons, Secretaries, and Cabinet representatives of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conference Councils on Ministries, meeting jointly with the two Conference Council on Ministries' staffs, shall annually evaluate and assign the work of the Directors in their Area responsibilities.
- c) Budget for the accomplishment of Area responsibilities shall be set up on an Area basis by joint planning and contribution from the budgets of the two Conference Councils on Ministries. Each Director shall be the manager for his/her area of responsibility, working under the guidelines set by the appropriate Area group. All incurred expenses in Area programs shall be dispersed from the appropriate Area funds.
- d) In their Area of responsibility, the Directors shall assume leadership roles in both Area Conferences and shall work through the appropriate structures there.
- e) Currently, the Little Rock Conference Council on Ministries supports three professional staff persons; and the North Arkansas Conference supports two professional staff

persons. The difference in financial outlay for professional staff in the two Conferences this year amounts to \$13,665.00.

It is estimated that the work load for each staff member under the new Area alignment will be as follows:

½ time — in Conference responsibilities

½ time — in Area responsibilities (¼ time in each Conference)

Since the Little Rock Conference will be putting three persons into the Area Staff Setting and the North Arkansas Conference will be putting only two persons here there exists a basic inequality of financial input to the Area program.

In order to equalize the financial input of both Conferences into the Area Staff program, we recommend that \$4,800.00 be contributed by the North Arkansas Conference Council on Ministries to the Little Rock Conference Council on Ministries during the year of 1980.

Features of the Model

- 1) Wiser use of resources (Financial and other) through the elimination of duplication of efforts
- 2) A more competent and prepared staff since each person will be able to specialize more.
- Conservation of time and expense of sending leaders to national seminars and meetings.
- 4) A greater flexibility of administration since each year major staff responsibilities will be determined by the Annual Conference, through the Area Steering Committee and two Conference Councils on Ministries.
- 5) Staff members will be freed to devote more time to research, study and train in specific areas.
- 6) Local Churches, Districts, etc., will have better understanding of specific assistance available to them by Conference Council officers.
- Area approach enhances availability of General Church funding for Area programs and projects.

Is This a Veiled Attempt to Merge the Two Conferences?

We think not. In fact, it may well be that by cooperating in this way, merger between the two Conferences may be even less likely because this plan offers some of the best benefits of merger (economy, joint planning, etc.) without ever calling for actual physical merger.

Time-Table

- 1) January, 1979: Perfecting of working paper on model of area staff by the staffs of the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conference Council on Ministries.
- 2) February 22-23: Presentation of Model to Little Rock Conference Council on Ministries.
- 3) February 23-24: Presentation of Model to North Arkansas Conference Council on Ministries.
- 4) February 28: Staffs meet with Robert Paul to negotiate differences, modifications, or amendments arising out of February meetings of the two Councils on Ministries.
- 5) March: Staff meets with North Arkansas and Little Rock Councils on Finance and Administration for any matters related to funding (if needed or required).
- 6) May: Staff meets with District Pre-Conference meetings to explain, discuss, listen and answer questions related to Area Staff.
- 7) May 22-26: Model presented to North Arkansas Annual Conference.
- 8) May 28-31: Model presented to Little Rock Annual Conference.
- 9) June 22: Area Steering Committee, meeting jointly with the two Conference Council on Ministries staffs negotiates amendments or changes in the model made by either or both Conferences (if needed) and assign Area responsibilities.
- 10) June 25-29: Two staffs meet to implement model.
- 11) July 2: Implementation of model begins.

12) January 10, 1980: Area Steering Committee, meeting jointly with Area Staff, evaluates the model and the implementation of the model. Make recommendations and report to next meetings of the two Councils.

Authorization of Negotiation

The Area Steering Committee (Bishop and Chairpersons, Vice-Chairpersons, Secretaries, and Cabinet Representatives of the two Conference Councils on Ministries) meeting jointly with the two Conference Council on Ministries staffs, shall be authorized by the respective Annual Conferences to meet jointly following the sessions of the two Annual Conferences and negotiate amendments or changes in the model made by either or both Annual Conferences (if needed). In the event either of the two Annual Conferences makes a major change in the proposed model, the Annual Conference may direct that the model be tabled or returned to the two Conference staffs for further study and presentation at future sessions of the two Annual Conferences.

COMMITTEE ON COMMUNICATIONS AND PUBLISHING INTERESTS

The Committee on Communications and Publishing Interests recommends for 1980, participation in an Arkansas Area Communications Program in keeping with the model for an Area Staff as proposed by our Conference Council on Ministries to this Annual Conference. The Area Director of Communications would be so designated in the Area Staff. The program and funding would be as follows:

Purpose:

The purpose of the Arkansas Area Program of Communications is nothing less than the Gospel itself; to communicate in multiple ways the Good News of God's Grace in Jesus Christ, as it is proclaimed through the United Methodist Church of Arkansas.

Administration:

The Arkansas Area Communications Program shall work under the guidance and direction of the Arkansas Area Director of Communications and the two Conference Council Committees on Communication.

- I. United Methodist News Service: No cost at this time.
 - A. The Editor of the Arkansas Methodist newspaper shall serve as the United Methodist News Officer for the Arkansas Area and shall be responsible for the following areas of communication:
 - 1. Internal News:

To assist our "in house" offices and agencies — such as the Bishop's office, the Council on Ministries offices, any boards, commissions, etc. — by funneling news to our internal channels (such as the Arkansas Methodist, COM mailings, and agency publications, etc.)

- 2. External News:
 - a. To channel news to the secular press (newspapers, wire services, TV and radio) relating to the United Methodist Church in Arkansas.
 - b. To be the initial contact person in the church for the secular media in regard to news items relating to the two Conferences and the Area. (If this United Methodist News officer did not have the information requested, or if the matter needed further comment by an appropriate official, he or she would refer the caller to that person or office.)
 - c. To arrange press conferences or interviews in regard to major events or personalities.
 - d. To issue press releases to the secular media concerning major events in the two Annual Conferences and the Area.
 - e. To issue releases and otherwise be in touch with the media during the sessions of the Annual Conferences.
 - To be in touch with the media to recommend possible feature items for their development.
 - g. To contact the media for coverage on major Conference or Area events.

II. Interpretation, Promotion, and Public Relations:

A. Interpretation: To help United Methodists understand our Church and our various

programs, including our benevolent program.

1. Offer thirteen (13) district opportunities (one per district) in which the benevolent and missional program of the United Methodist Church can be explained by representatives of United Methodist Communications and Conference leadership. Theme: "Where Does All That Money Go?" Local church persons invited shall include Pastors, Chairpersons of Administrative Boards, Finance, Missions, and Communications. Cost: \$750.00 — for expenses of workshops.

2. Develop a filmstrip/slide show in conjunction with United Methodist Communications on the benevolent program of our church, with special highlight on Conference benevolences. Copies will be made available to District Superintendents and local churches for their use in the 1980 Charge

Conferences, etc. Cost: \$1,200.00

3. Provide information materials and formats for local churches to utilize "Mission Minutes" in the morning worship services once a month. Various lay persons will be asked by the local church Coordinator of Communications to speak for one minute concerning one element of our benevolent or missional program. Cost: \$350.00 — for printing and mailing.

4. Production of Area pamphlet on projects and progams supported by benevolent program of the Area. One copy to Pastors, Lay Leaders, Chairpersons of Administrative Boards, Chairpersons of Committee on Finance, and Chairpersons of Communications Work Area. Cost: \$750.00 for production.

5. Production of twelve (12) posters showing photographs and brief descriptions of various aspects of the missional program of the United Methodist Church around theme: "Because you gave . . . (this child can eat more than roots)." One poster a month to each local church. Cost: \$750.00

B. Promotion: To facilitate the successful completion of specific tasks we are involved in.

1. Provide consultation to agencies and churches of the Arkansas Area in the development of their plan to promote the programs and activities they are responsible for. This would include assisting in the development of an overall plan of promotion, assist in make-up for promotional pieces, serving as liaison with Conference and Area Communication systems, and assistance in forwarding appropriate information to external news media. Cost: none

C. Public Relations: To build an honest and positive image of the United Methodist

Church before society.

1. The development and production of two thirty-second television spots interpreting United Methodist faith and life. Each spot will be presented on prime-time at various places over the entire state for a three-month period. Cost: \$2,000.00 for production and \$6,500.00 for purchase of air time.

2. Production of two thirty-second radio spots interpreting the faith and life of the United Methodist Church. Local churches may receive these spots at no charge and purchase air time on local radio stations for their broadcasting. A "five-second tag" will be provided at the end of each spot for each church to add its own local message. Cost: \$250.00

3. Serving as channel by which religious issues of special interest to local and national publicity may be clarified and interpreted through internal and

external news channels of the Area. Cost: none

III. Area Resource Center: Collection of films, filmstrips, tapes, games, equipment, etc., and making resource people available for use by United Methodists.

A. Supervise Area Resource Center and publish catalog updates. Cost: \$150.00

- B. Coordinate purchase of new resources for Area Resource Center, thus, eliminating needless duplication of purchases and assuring a wide variety of acquisitions. Cost: none
- C. Engage in a study of ways to strengthen the administration, usage and financing of the Area Resource Center. Recommendations to be presented at the next regular sessions of the Annual Conference. Cost: none
- D. To strengthen the EMLC for Christian mission and ministry, and to sensitize the White majority about ethnic minority concerns, by communicating opportunities for more intentional acts of inclusiveness; thus, recognizing the EMLC as an inclusive part of the Church, and making the White majority more intentional regarding ethnic Christians.
- IV. Area Production Center: Facility to reproduce quality materials and resources for use in the programs and activities of the Arkansas Area.
 - A. An Arkansas Area Production Assistant shall be employed under the supervision and direction of the Arkansas Area Director of Communications. Job responsibilities of the Assistant shall include:
 - Operation, maintenance and cleaning of offset press and other equipment in Council on Ministries workroom.
 - 2. Maintenance of all printing supplies and materials.
 - 3. Organization of workroom.
 - 4. Maintenance of records on repair, usage, etc., of all reproduction equipment.
 - 5. Production of all material needed to accomplish adopted Council on Ministries programs of the Arkansas Area, and other agencies or local churches of the Annual Conferences, as time allows. Since funding for this position comes through the two COM budgets, the charge for Council on Ministries office work shall only be for materials and supplies used. Production costs of jobs done for other agencies shall be kept to a minimum in order to assist in making these costs as economical as possible.
 - 6. Other jobs assigned by the Arkansas Area Director of Communications:

Be it therefore resolved that we recommend to the Conference Council on Ministries that a new Black congregation be started in the Forrest City District (in Crittenden County and/or Phillips County, as the Forrest City District Superintendent, the District Building and Locations Committee, and the District Mission Board may determine);

That we encourage the District Superintendent to secure funding resources from: (1) Equitable Salary Fund); (2) Conference Board of Global Ministries; (3) Church Builders Fund; (4) District Mission Fund; (5) National Division, General Board of Global Ministries; (6) Other sources; and that at least \$20,000 from all sources be secured to fund the program.

Cost: \$500

2. To establish Local Church Listening teams to itinerate local Black churches, to listen to needs, concerns, problems and receive input, and to report to the Ethnic Minority Local Church Task Force.

Cost: \$500

- 3. To strengthen the Ethnic Minority Local Church through congregational development. Programs will be initiated in the following areas:
 - a. Training (laity, clergy, youth, children, and in areas to be identified after survey information is available... In addition, training events will be designed to provide a structure (organizational) for use by small membership churches...
 - b. Youth Programs
 - c. Children's Ministries
 - d. Continuing Education
 - e. Vacation Church Schools
 - f. Stewardship Development.

- 4. Providing opportunities and avenues for Black laity involvement in Connectional leadership at the District, Conference and General Church levels.
- 5. Continuing Educational opportunities for clergy and lay persons.

2. Evangelism

The Conference Council on Ministries is proposing that Evangelism be one of its principal priorities for 1980. Their purpose for accepting Evangelism as a priority is to help United Methodists live out a "Whole Gospel approach to their evangelistic ministry." The objectives to be carried out under this priority are:

- A. That every local pastor, chairperson on evangelism, chairperson of the local Council on Ministries, become thoroughly acquainted with the outline of the program objectives on evangelism, provided by the Conference Board of Evangelism.
- B. That an Area-wide evangelistic mission be held in 1980, and that every local church of the North Arkansas Conference give full support to the mission.

C. That every local pastor assume responsibility for seeing that the comprehensive plan of evangelism is introduced within the congregation through the local church Council on Ministries and each local church present to the District Superintendent their plan for evangelism.

In carrying out these objectives several special programs will be implemented during

- A. Confirmation Training: The goal is to broaden the number of Laboratory trained persons in Confirmation throughout the conference, thus enabling each district to have resource persons for local church training.
- B. Area Wide Evangelistic Endeavor: The goal is to highlight Evangelism and Methodism in Arkansas and to motivate Arkansas' Methodists for Christ's service in the 1980's.
- C. Area Wide Mass Media Emphasis: The goal is to make the state of Arkansas more aware of the Christian witness of United Methodists.
- D. Reach Inactive Members: The goal is to reactivate old members; to prevent loss of active members; and to create a sense of caring within the local church.

3. World Hunger

Goal: During this quadrennium, to sensitize persons in the North Arkansas Conference to the causes, effects and scope of World Hunger; to lead each local church to identify and utilize appropriate channels of response; and examine in depth Christian lifestyles in a hungry world.

Objectives:

- A. To continue the emphasis to eradicate the root causes of hunger through the Area Hunger Task Force.
- B. To continue support for the six approved projects described in the "Ingathering Projects 1979":
 - 1. Soya Production and Research Association, Bareilly, India U.P.
 - 2. World Christian Relief Fund, Inc., Bangladesh
 - 3. Heifer Project International
 - 4. Delta-Pace Project
 - 5. Church World Service Supplies
 - 6. Arkansas Nutrition Programs for the Elderly
- C. Through continuance of the Lent to Ingathering emphasis, to develop a concern for consumption patterns and lifestyles in each local church through communication media, trained "hunger interpreters," and opportunities for commitment to simpler lifestyles.
- D. To maintain a network of District and local church coordinators as an effective channel of communication, planning and implementation of hunger concerns.
- E. To promote annually a World Hunger Sunday which will be March 9, 1980.
- F. To continue plans for the "Ecumenical Ingathering," November 15, 1980, State Fair

Grounds, Little Rock, in cooperation with the Inter-Faith Hunger Task Force. The United Methodist portion of goal \$500,000. (assigned to World Hunger Task Force)

4. Church Extension and Congregational Development

Jesus said, "Go therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing, . . ., teaching . . .: and lo, I am with you always, to the close of the age." The Christian Faith is missionary in its nature; and the extension of the church into new areas and the development of new congregations of the People of God is a natural and native part of the life of a vital church. Of the priority on evangelism, Church Extension is an essential component.

The distinct emphasis of Methodism, historically and traditionally, has been in obedience to the Great Commission, and whereas United Methodist contributions to the life of communities has resulted in a balanced, vitally Christian approach to religious faith and life — combining evangelistic zeal and social concern, knowledge and vital piety, we believe in and endorse Church Extension/New Congregational Development as a vital expression of our concern for people.

Research data confirms that many sections of North Arkansas are growing rapidly in population, including sections in which there are few or no United Methodist Churches. There is also a tremendous need for evangelism and church development among the black population of the North Arkansas Conference. In some larger areas of black population there are presently no United Methodist Churches serving the needs of the people.

Considerable progress has been made in the five phases of the Church Extension study. However, the surveys of discricts and local communities, in order to be done methodically and well, will require additional time to complete. The Task Force therefore requests the conference to continue its mandate through the 1979-1980 Conference year, with expectance that a 10-year proposal for NAC Church Extension will be presented to the 1980 session of the Conference.

The Task Force perceives the commitment of the annual conference to Church Extension as a serious and major commitment, which calls for thorough and thoughtful planning, systematic investigation of areas where we should be establishing new congregations, effective and mutually understood means of sharing responsibility for church extension by conference and district personnel and organizations, a concerted move to marshall substantially greater financial resources to be available in organizing new congregations, and for high priority to be given to the selection of leadership, especially pastoral leadership, to enable the new church to make progress.

We are hesitant to recommend as it stands the goal of "One church per year for 10 years" as it was stated in the action of the Conference establishing this Task Force, (1978 NAC Journal, P. 88), but we anticipate proposing to the annual conference in 1980 a challenging and concrete 10-year program for establishing new congregations in appropriate selected areas and for revitalizing certain older established churches in strategic areas.

We believe that the people and churches of our conference will vigorously support a strong, well-planned Church Extension Program. The Task Force therefore asks the partnership and help of the members of our churches, our district superintendents and other connectional leadership, in preparing this major Church Extension effort.

As authorized by the 1978 session of the North Arkansas Conference, the Task Force on Church Extension/New Congregational Development was appointed and its organization initiated through the Committee on Missions of the Conference Board of Global Ministries. This Task Force is assigned the task of designing a comprehensive plan of church extension and new congregation development for the North Arkansas Conference, including research,

financing, and identification of potential sites, planned especially for the period 1980-1990, but seeking to initiate ongoing procedures and policies for a vigorous, forward-looking, continuing program of church extension in the future.

After its membership was named and confirmed following the 1978 session of the annual conference, the Task Force met and organized in September 1978. The following officers were named: Jerry Nichols, Chairman; Max Whitfield, Vice-Chairman; Jim Beal, Secretary; and Joe Wilkerson, Treasurer. The Task Force has the ongoing consultative and research services of Dr. James H. Davis of the Office of Research of the National Division, GBOGM, New York City.

Since the studies upon which the Task Force will base its proposals to the annual conference are still in process and incomplete, this report will be concerned primarily with procedures and the progress of the studies.

The Task Force proposals to the annual conference are anticipated to be made in a fivepart report. Sub-committees within the Task Force are presently at work on each of these phases. (1) Purpose and Strategy — the motivations for church extension work, and the general approach to the work recommended for the North Arkansas Conference. (2) Site Selection and Population Date - proposals of new project sites, based on population trends, studies of the make-up of communities, interviews with informed persons close to the potential site, systematic site evaluation. (3) Financing Policies, Resources, and Alternatives - to devise means for meeting the financial needs of new and developing congregations, administrative policies, identification of sources of needed funds, and proposals for raising funds not presently available. (4) Conference and District Organization and Procedures — to propose how the administrative and functional units of the Conference and Districts may effectively handle the necessary decisions, actions, and supervision of church extension projects; to propose new responsible units at some level as needed. (5) Leadership Policies and Training — to propose policies for assuring effective ministerial leadership and lay leadership for new and developing churches, including leadership characteristics and style, experience, demonstrated effectiveness, desirable duration of appointment for ministerial leadership, training needed; also to propose training to be sponsored and arranged by the annual conference to prepare pastors going into new church projects.

The Task Force has selected a number of counties in the northern part of Arkansas for extensive study, basing the selection on population trends. The counties are listed here, with the districts in which they are situated:

In each district, District Study Teams have been named and organized to do community studies, interviews of pastors and members of churches located near rapidly growing areas, on-site evaluations of potential church sites, characteristics of the area, visibility, accessibility, etc. Members of these District Teams received training for this task in a one-day event March 12 led by Mr. Jim Davis, Research Consultant.

Introduction

The small membership church is the rule, rather than the exception, of Arkansas United Methodism. Three-fourths of our local churches have memberships of two-hundred (200) or less, and half of them have one-hundred (100) members or fewer. Most of these churches have never had access to full-time pastoral care. The charges of which they are a part are frequently re-aligned. Often, clergy appointed to small membership churches do not remain in that appointment longer than two years. Our small membership churches are often isolated from the program and resources of the annual conference and the general church. This means that three-fourths of the local churches in the Arkansas Area are hindered in fulfilling their ministry and mission.

We must find some way to strengthen our small membership churches, for United Methodism in Arkansas is only as effective a witness to the gospel as its individual congregations. These words from the Book of Discipline express well why it is crucial that small membership churches in Arkansas Area be strengthened for involvement in mission and ministry in their communities and the world: "The people of God are the Church made visible in the world. It is they who must convince the world of the reality of the gospel or leave it unconvinced. There can be no evasion or delegation of this responsibility; the Church is either faithful as a witnessing and serving community, or it loses its vitality and its impact on an unbelieving world" (par. 106).

The Work of the Area Committee

The Area Committee on Parish Development was convened by Bishop Hicks in 1977, to find some means of addressing the needs of our small membership churches and so provide every United Methodist Church and every United Methodist person in the Arkansas Area access to full-time pastoral leadership and maximum opportunity for involvement in mission and ministry. In August, 1977, leaders from both Annual Conferences participated in a workshop staffed by Ms. Gladys Campbell and Rev. Jerry Chapman of the Office of Town and Country Ministries, The National Division, Board of Global Ministries and Dr.

Harold McSwain, faculty member of United and METHESCO seminaries in Ohio. The purpose of the workshop was to acquaint these leaders with current understandings and models of Cooperative Parish Development.

The committee began its work in September, 1977, and continued to explore Cooperative Parish Development in detail. Jerry Chapman and Harold McSwain have worked closely with the group, helping members clarify their understandings of concepts and training them in the development of policy and strategy for Cooperative Parish Development. As a result of these efforts, an Area Cabinet Policy has been developed by the district superintendents and an Area Parish Development Policy was approved by the annual conferences in 1978.

In April, 1978, six members of the committee made an itineration of cooperative parishes in Florida, Ohio, and Kansas. The Office of Town and Country Ministries provided funding for the itineration. Those who made the trip have been valuable resources to the committee as it has developed the strategy outlined in this report. Three major training events were part of the committee's work this spring. In March, six district superintendents and three Conference Council on Ministries staff persons from the area attended a Cooperative Parish Development training event at Hinton Rural Life Center in Hayesville, North Carolina. Bishop Hicks was part of the leadership team for this workshop. April 29-May 4, members of the committee assisted Bishop Hicks with a series of consultations on Cooperative Parish Development and to familiarize them with a proposed area parish development plan. In May, a training session was conducted for those persons who will be appointed to probe staffs this June and potential staff members. The teams learned about the areas they will serve, worked carefully on Cooperative Parish Development concepts (especially those regarding the probe stage), and gained skills in team building and in working with lay leadership.

The committee has been working to lay a foundation for Cooperative Parish Development in the Arkansas Area, and it views the proposals in this report as aspects of a plan which offers new and exciting potential for our small membership churches.

What Is Cooperative Parish Development?

Cooperative Parish Development is an intentional process which enables churches in a given geographic area to develop coordinated church programs and ministry. For example, several churches may work together to have a youth program that none could support alone.

What Happens Next?

The committee proposes that in designated areas in each annual conference probe staffs be appointed in June, 1979, to selected groups of churches. It is not the committee's intention that any church, or pastor, be required to participate in a cooperative venture against their will. Additional probe staffs will be considered by the bishop and cabinets at appropriate intervals until all those churches for which Cooperative Parish Development is feasible are involved.

A probe staff is a group of pastors who are appointed to serve charges within a defined geographic area. These pastors are intentional about finding ways to work together themselves and about helping the churches they serve explore the possibilities for cooperation in developing improved ministries. Each charge in a probe area has "its own" pastor and also relates to all the other persons on the staff, benefiting from their special skills. For example, one member of the staff might be skilled in teaching and another in music. These skills could be used in all of the churches served by the probe staff rather than only in the charges they serve.

Fundamental to the work of the probe staff is the principle that it exists to enable laity in the work and worship of the church. Probe staffs work closely with laity, and decisions about involvement in cooperative programs of ministry are finally the decisions of the churches themselves.

What Will It Take to Make Cooperative Parish Development A Reality in Arkansas?

Local churches, pastors and the annual conferences all have responsibility for the realization of the cooperative parish development effort proposed by this committee.

To fulfill their responsibilities, local churches must be:

1. Willing to be involved;

2. Open to working with other churches in their immediate area;

3. Motivated to be more in ministry to both persons within the congregation and the community than is currently the case;

4. Willing to work with pastors of near-by churches in specialized areas of ministry.

Pastors fulfill their responsibilities by:

1. Developing skills that enable them to work with other pastors;

Remaining in an appointment long enough to establish a meaningful ministry (a minimum of 3-5 years);

3. Accepting a special responsibility in a program of ministry in which several churches participate.

Annual conferences must assume the responsibility:

- 1. To identify and appoint pastors who are willing and skilled to work with cooperating groups of churches;
- 2. To train pastors for work in teams which serve cooperating groups of churches;

3. To guide churches as they plan ways of working together;

4. To help cooperating groups of churches locate and secure resources, i.e. persons, finances and materials necessary to implement the programs of ministry they plan;

5. To help cooperating groups of churches share with other cooperating groups of new found strengths, so that all can benefit from the experiences of each other;

6. To help cooperating groups of churches work with community agencies to determine the needs of people in the community and roles the churches might play in responding to those needs.

What Is the Most Adequate Administrative Approach Our Annual Conference Can Take Toward Cooperative Parish Development?

After study, thought and discussion, our committee has reached the conclusion that if the cooperative parish development effort we envision is to succeed, a person is needed to oversee, guide, motivate and resource this process. We propose to the annual conferences the establishment of the office of Area Superintendent of Parish-Development. This person would work alongside the district superintendents, pastors and laity participating in the cooperative parish development effort. And, as Bishop Hicks put it in a memo to the Councils on Finance and Administration, he or she would "relate to the Bishop and Cabinets and the local churches as a Cabinet participant and enabler in matters pertaining to the multiple Church appointment situation."

The following outline describes the kinds of activities of an Area Superintendent of Parish Development and the purposes these activities fulfill.

1. Consultation and Training Program

Purposes: To help pastors, district superintendents, and laity understand in detail Cooperative Parish Development and how its principles apply to the geographic area in which cooperating groups of churches minister.

To gain a comprehensive view of areas being served by staff teams.

To devise strategy for the forming of cooperating groups of churches that are centers for mission and ministry.

To build a "team relationship" among all persons professionally involved in the Cooperative Parish Development effort.

How? • Regular training events for staff and potential staff

• Staff participation in training events outside the Arkansas Area, e.g., events at Hinton Rural Life Center

- Regular training events for parish lay councils and other lay leaders
- Training events designed around specific concerns, e.g., Vacation Church School, Sunday School teaching, etc.
- Regular events to inform any persons in the annual conferences who want to know more about Cooperative Parish Development

2. Identification of Potential Staff

Purpose: To assist the Bishop and the cabinets in identifying the appointments to be made by the Bishop and District Superintendents as prescribed by the **Discipline**.

To identify staff persons for appointment to probe staff teams.

How? Develop a system for identifying those persons who are possible members of probe staff.

Develop a covenant with the cabinets and potential parish appointees.

Devise "feeder programs" which guide persons into staff teams (for example, seminary interns)

3. Site Identification and Selection

Purpose: To identify sites with reasonable chances for good experiences in working cooperatively and which will enhance the total cooperative parish development effort.

How? Develop with the cabinets a "time line" for the initiation of additional probe staffs

Gather and prepare the necessary data (population, growth patterns, etc.) for potential areas for the establishment of cooperating groups of churches.

To define appropriate geographic areas.

Develop procedures for working with appropriate conference structures, bodies, regarding changes in supports, e.g., equitable salaries.

Develop a process to prepare churches for the arrival of probe staff.

4. Strengthening of Ethnic Minority Local Churches

Purpose: To utilize the tool of consultation and training; parish staff identification; and site identification and selection to enable the ministries of our Ethnic Minority Local Churches.

How? In consultation with the EMLC Task Forces, develop a time line for appointing probe staffs and identifying sites inclusive of black churches and ethnic minority persons.

5. Development of Program and Ministry in Cooperating Groups of Churches

Purpose: To enable cooperating groups of churches to identify, design, resource and actualize the things they wish to do.

How? Develop a process to identify what is important to all the churches in cooperating group.

Help churches determine how they can best work together to achieve desired results.

Aid cooperating churches in gathering resources needed for the ministries they plan, e.g., financial grants, resource persons, materials, etc.

6. Communications Regarding Cooperating Groups of Churches

Purpose: To inform laity and clergy about what is happening in Cooperative Parish Development and why.

To share the discovery of new strengths with other small membership churches.

How? Use Arkansas Methodist

Train designated "communicators" in each cooperating group of churches.

Develop presentations and displays at district and annual Conferences.

Develop presentations on Cooperative Parish Development to educate persons in potential probe areas.

7. Support Network for Persons Serving in Cooperative Parishes

Purposes: Further the training of staff members.

Sharing of strategies and successes in operating parishes.

Discussion of problems, needs, and resources.

How? Retreats for new and continuing staff persons.

Training events for probe staffs and lay leadership.

Regular gatherings of those involved in cooperating groups of churches.

The establishment of the office of the Area Superintendent is crucial from the beginning of a cooperative parish development effort like ours. The effects of mistakes made in staffing or organizing cooperating groups of churches in this early stage of the effort will be felt for a long time. Likewise, visible success and progress in these first days will be helpful as the effort progresses. Therefore, the committee proposes that funding for the position begin in January, 1980.

What Advantages Does Cooperative Parish Development Offer United Methodism in Arkansas?

Advantages for local churches

- 1. Churches find it possible to plan and implement ministries together that none could do alone.
- 2. Churches are freed to move from a pre-occupation with "just surviving" to a real involvement in mission and ministry.
- 3. It becomes possible for pastors to remain in an appointment long enough to develop an effective ministry.
- 4. Ministry in each of the churches in a cooperating group is well-rounded, since each has access to pastors with various skills and abilities.

Advantages for pastors

- 1. Provides an opportunity to better use and develop skills and abilities.
- 2. Provides an opportunity for less experienced pastors to work with and learn from pastors who are more experienced.
- 3. Provides a setting in which Local Pastors may perform ministry within the boundaries of their skills and time.

Advantages for annual conferences

- 1. Relates a full time, fully trained pastor to every church in cooperating groups of churches.
 - 2. Provides a support/learning team for less experienced pastors.
- 3. Provides a setting for "on the job training" for student pastors that allows them to perform ministry effectively without having to carry the total responsibility of a charge.
- 4. Engages the small membership church in the program of the district and annual conference.
- 5. Lengthens the stay of pastors and so reduces the yearly appointment change load of the bishop and cabinet.

Conclusion

The committee is of the opinion that the Cooperative Parish Development effort outlined in this report is a response to the needs of our local churches, pastors and annual conferences. Further, it must be said that the proposal regarding the Area Superintendent of Parish Development is that pivotal part of the plan upon which any real success depends. Quoting again from Bishop Hicks' February 8, 1979, memo to the Councils on Finance and Administration: "To move with less than the complete design might result in some success here and there. Where Parish Development is attempted and fails, however, it usually means years before the heart and memory have been healed. In fact, the risks are too high to work with Parish Development with less than the best approach we can formulate. The nature of success in this enterprise, however, is a hope to be treasured."

Amendments to the Report

- 1. Term of Area Superintendent of Parish Development. No person shall be appointed to the Office of Area Superintendent of Parish Development for more than eight years consecutively.
- 2. Authorization of Negotiation. The Area Committee on Parish Development shall be authorized by the respective Annual Conference to meet following the sessions of the two Annual Conferences and negotiate amendments or changes in the Cooperative Parish Development proposal, under the direction of the Bishop.

BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

In keeping with John Wesley's observation in 1739 that, "The Gospel of Christ knows no religion but social; no holiness but social holiness," the Board of Church and Society continues to organize itself for the promotion of the Social Principles among the people called United Methodists and to work for reform where those principles are in conflict with social practice.

The board notes with appreciation the enlightened and humane leadership of Bishop Kenneth W. Hicks. We are especially encouraged by his example and by his public support of causes involving human dignity and compassion in the face of hardship and injustice.

We are particularly pleased with the response of persons to ARKANSAS ALERT, the legislative information bulletin published under the auspices of the board for the purpose of informing constituency within the conference about legislative issues before the 1979 Arkansas General Assembly, and we urge United Methodists to continue active involvement in the political process.

The defeat of the Equal Rights Amendment in the state legislature, though regrettable, furthers our determination to work for the elimination of discriminatory practices based upon sex and for the equality of all persons regardless of age, creed, or ethnic origin.

We ask that the North Arkansas Conference reaffirm its opposition to capital punishment in accordance with the following statement adopted by the board:

"Growing demands for harsher penalties for crimes confront United Methodists with a dilemma. How are we to insure that equal justice will prevail for persons of all social and economic classes without regard to race, creed or political persuasion? Also, how will those being incarcerated be assured of humanitarian rehabilitation?

"The new conference year is an appropriate time for the Board of Church and Society to emphasize the responsibility of Christians everywhere to seek correction of the social conditions that lead to crime, and to express Christ's love through better rehabilitation of the incarcerated populations of the state; to recognize that life and death lie in the hands of God; that Christians ought to set at liberty them that are bruised (Luke 4:18).

We offer to the North Arkansas Conference a challenge to take active steps to fulfill the mandate of the Social Principles of The United Methodist Church, namely:

In the love of Christ who came to save those who are lost and vulnerable, we urge the creation of genuinely new systems of rehabilitation that will restore, preserve, and

nurture the humanity of the imprisoned. For the same reason, we oppose capital punishment and urge its elimination from all criminal codes.

-Social Principles of The United Methodist Church, 1976"

As an immediate and practical step toward the removal of capital punishment codes from the Arkansas statutes, the Board of Church and Society further recommends that pastors and laity support the Arkansas Coalition Against the Death Penalty, Post Office Box 2832, Little Rock, AR 72203. Such support includes one or more of the following suggestions: 1) become directly involved in Coalition activities, 2) write or visit prisoners on death row, 3) express opinions to local, state and federal officials and to media editors, 4) inform the Coalition of pending capital murder trials in local courts, 5) distribute literature and assist financially. Organizations may sponsor discussion programs on the death penalty, designate representatives to the Coalition, and give financial assistance.

In addition, the board submits the following program goals for 1980:

- 1. To provide for the operation of the board (\$200.00).
- 2. "Focus On Capital Punishment," to involve churches in consideration of the theological-ethical-legal issues related to capital punishment, (\$350.00). Emerging Social Issues.
- 3. Church Action Inventory, Phase II, to continue gathering information for evaluation of local church involvement in social concerns, (\$150.00). Emerging Social Issues.
- 4. Social Concerns Workshops, to provide for the education of chairpersons of the Work Area on Social Concerns in the Social Principles and to assist in the development of local programs, (\$575.00). District task forces and board representatives.
- 5. Chaplaincy Study, to determine the possibilities of ministry within state institutions, including prisons, and health and welfare facilities, (\$200.00). General Welfare.
- 6. IMPACT Briefing, to provide expense for a board member to attend the briefing in Washington, D.C., for the organization of an IMPACT network, and for the training of leadership on legislative issues, (\$515.00). Emerging Social Issues.
- 7. Energy Seminar, to raise the consciousness of persons, clarify options, provide reliable information, and to examine the theological dimensions of energy use and consumption, (\$1,200.00). Human Relations.
- 8. Planning Retreat, to evaluate, review, plan, organize and implement the program of the board, (\$550.00). Executive Committee.
 - 9. Travel, Room and Meals for board personnel, (\$1,550.00, non-add).

Total Program Cost: \$3,740.00

The Legislative Forum on Church and Society voted to concur with the written report made by the Board of Church and Society in the pre-conference journal. Then the group voted to add these statements to the report:

- I. We urge the local churches and pastors to become aware of family violence in their community and discover ways of helping the victims of family violence by means of money and volunteer services as well as supporting existing centers for victims of family violence.
- II. Arkansas is #1 in the nation in the production of rice, poultry, per capita venereal disease, and teenage pregnancies. Additionally, there is a disturbing relationship between violence within families and destructive sexual behavior. 1) We call upon the members and church bodies of the North Arkansas Conference to intensify their attention to the rightful need of children, youth, adults, and families for responsible information about human sexuality. 2) We call upon ourselves (as the North Arkansas Conference) to develop more fully our commitment to the goodness of human sexuality and its responsible expression in individual and social lifestyles consistent with the best of Christian understanding; and, to this end, 3) support the conference efforts to develop more effective resources and leadership for human sexuality training events, usable in local church settings.

In addition to the Board of Church and Society report, the group voted to address two other committees. 1) We ask the Conference Committee on Worship to be continually intentional in including ethnics and women as well as men in leading worship services of the

annual conference. 2) We move that section II. 2. of the report from the Committee on Policy and Review found on p. 33, line 35 in the pre-conference journal be reconsidered for the purpose of changing the wording to read: "The Annual Conference elect some ethnics as full delegates to either the coming Jurisdictional Conference or the General Conference."

BOARD OF DISCIPLESHIP

Preface

Someone has said, "As goes the work of the Board of Discipleship so goes the work of the United Methodist Church in the North Arkansas Conference." This is not altogether true but it is a fact that if Christian Education, Evangelism, Stewardship, Worship, Enlistment and Higher Education go well about everything else in the Conference will go better. Therefore we of the Board of Discipleship dedicate and rededicate ourselves to strive to give of ourselves mentally, physically, and spiritually to the work of our Lord in this feverish world through the work of the Board of Discipleship.

Education: The objective of the church through its educational ministry is "to win persons to Jesus Christ as his disciples and to help these persons to grow in their understanding of God that they may respond in faith and love, to the end that they may know who they are and what their human situation means, increasingly identifying themselves as children of God and members of the Christian community, live in the Spirit of God in every relationship, fulfill their common discipleship in the world and abide in the Christian hope." (Par. 1301, Book of Discipline, 1976).

Objective: To involve the maximum number of Local Church School Teachers and Leaders possible in Training Sessions designed to improve competencies and skills and meet other needs as expressed by local church planning committees and/or District Council on Ministries.

- 1. Publish resource materials for use by local churches and ministers for special worship events and seasons.
- 2. Encourage local churches and musicians to join the "Fellowship of United Methodist Musicians."
- Send committee representation to national and jurisdictional events sponsored by the church.
- 4. The Committee urges local churches and districts to observe the "Great Day of United Methodist Singing." The worship committee will provide resource material for this event.
- 5. Make available information and materials concerning vestments, paraments, and aids for local church worship.
- 6. Conduct an Ecumenical Worship Workshop.
- 7. To offer a course on worship for lay pastors at Pastors' School.
- 8. The Committee on Worship presents to this Annual Conference a document submitted as part of our report for endorsement and direction to our General Conference delegates concerning the need of a New Book of Worship.
- 9. While recognizing the positive value of "smoothness in worship," the Annual Conference affirms the greater value "inclusiveness in worship." Therefore, we charge the Worship Committee with ensuring that worship experiences at the 1980 Annual Conference Session be conspicuously inclusive of persons of color, women, children, youth, young adults, and the elderly.

Objectives:

1. Promote a sense of fellowship and camaraderie among United Methodist musicians and worship personnel within the conference.

- 2. To approach the theological understanding that comes out of the way we worship with particular regard to the sacraments.
- 3. Encourage United Methodist musicians to create and experiment with new hymns and music.
- 4. To promote music, worship and the arts among children.

Petition To General Conference Concerning Worship

Whereas, evangelism has been a priority in the 1976-1980 quadrennium of the United Methodist Church with the specific goal of bringing people into our life together in Christ,

and whereas, constant attention needs to be given to evaluating and shaping the nature of our common worship to which we invite people,

and whereas, our local congregations, while observing free worship, depend heavily on the leadership and standards of worship set by the general church,

and whereas, the field of liturgical studies, under ecumenical discipline, has brought much agreement to the accepted standards of worship and the advancement in learning in the communication arts has brought significant new expectations in the standards of worship,

and whereas, all language, including the language of worship, has been subjected to demanding new criteria in many disciplines, including communication theory, theological rationale, liturgical and sociological dynamics as well as non-sexist and inter-cultural accuracy,

and whereas, the above demands make it impossible to use almost all of the approved services of worship in their present form,

and whereas, most other major denominations after careful procedures have already published books of worship appropriate to our day,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the section on worship of the Division of Evangelism, Worship and Stewardship of the Board of Discipleship be instructed and empowered to develop a Book of Worship which shall include (1) all the major services of the church in the several styles appropriate to the heritage and practice of United Methodists, as well as a revised Psalter and devotional services for use in small groups and family settings, and (2) appropriate introductions to each major division of the book of worship providing a theologically defensible rationale for planning and conducting such services, and (3) rubrics throughout the services shall draw attention to the possibilities for visual, aural and physical inter-communication, movement and involvement.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the section on worship shall (1) develop a plan which shall involve the best representative human resources available to the church in the process of developing said Book of Worship, and (2) develop a carefully defined system for field testing the services as they are being created.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the working papers which shall guide the rationale and development of the Book of Worship be published for study in the local churches prior to the publication of said book,

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT a Proposed Book of Worship preceding final publication of said Book of Worship be presented to the 1984 General Conference for analysis and approval.

GLOBAL MINISTRIES

The purpose of the North Arkansas Conference Board of Global Ministries adopted by the 1976 annual conference states:

The Conference Board of Global Ministries shall cooperate with the General Board of Global Ministries and the North Arkansas Conference Council on Ministries in carrying out the policies of promoting all phases of the work of missions, church extension, health and welfare, ecumenical and interreligious concerns and town and country ministries. It shall

also cooperate with the division of education and cultivation in developing an effective program of education and cultivation within the Conference.

In fulfilling this purpose, the Conference Board of Global Ministries shall:

- 1. Listen to the local church as it expresses its specific needs, resources, and opportunities; and to the General Conference as it expresses the same.
- 2. Secure and develop resources and support services for use by the local church as it equips itself;
- Assist in the training of persons and the development of leaders in all areas of ministry and mission;
- 4. Coordinate the planning and implementation of those programs and ministries common to the local churches:
- 5. Oversee the process by which the church at all levels defines, understands, and carries out its mission; and
- 6. Evaluate the preparation for and the performance of the persons and institutions engaged in mission within and on behalf of the Annual Conference.

In our fall evaluation meeting we kept this purpose in mind as we evaluated programs and begin to prioritize for 1980. Many hours of thought and study have gone into the report we now make:

Recent events have brought the relationship of the annual conference of the United Methodist Church to their institutional ministries into new focus. In a number of instances across the country the responsibility of the annual conference for their institutions has been forced into fresh awareness — for example, at Pacific Homes. In light of these developments we have become aware of the need for a reappraisal of the real meaning of the relationship of the church through the annual conference to its institutional ministries. Therefore we recommend that the conference Board of Trustees examine this relationship through a study of the By-Laws, Constitution, Charter and Deeds of all our institutional ministries and report their findings and recommendations to the 1980 annual conference.

We also recommend that Muriel Peters be utilized as a resource person.

We continue to be vitally interested in three of the conference priorities, and support them with leadership and resources — Hunger, Ethnic Minority Local Church and Parish Development. Their reports are found elsewhere in this journal.

IN FULFILLING OUR PURPOSE THE ECUMENICAL AND INTERRELIGIOUS CONCERNS COMMITTEE SET THE FOLLOWING GOALS FOR 1980:

- I. Continue support of the Arkansas Council of Churches:
 - A. Financial support of \$5,000 from North Arkansas Conference to help carry out their work.
 - B. Nomination of twenty-seven delegates to the A.C.C. for participatory support to be elected by the Annual Conference.
 - C. Promote current activities of the Council: the Mt. Sequoyah Ecumenical Missions Study, Church in Community Seminar, Ecumenical Clergy and Laity Conference. Responsibility to Committee Chairperson

- I. Scholarship Program for Methodist School of Nursing In recognition of the shortage of nursing personnel in most counties in the North Arkansas Conference Area, the need to strengthen our relationship with our ministry of healing at Methodist Hospital and as an opportunity to provide an educational ministry for many of the young people of the Conference, we will conduct a nurse scholarship program as follows: a scholarship in the amount of \$6,000 to be subscribed in each district of the Conference in 1980 and 1981. A committee composed of June Spotts, Warren Blaylock, a leader from each district and the District Superintendent will design the program for each district. This is a continuation of the program begun in 1979.
- II. United Methodist Children's Home In order to encourage support of this institutional ministry, we ask that the second and third Sundays in December be designated as United Methodist Children's Home Sundays. Promotional materials will be provided by the Children's Home for the annual offering to be received at this time.
- III. Golden Cross Sunday We will promote the observance of Golden Cross Sunday the first Sunday in May, remembering that Golden Cross makes it possible for individual United Methodists and local churches to help persons who cannot afford the health and welfare ministries they need. The H & W Ministries Representative and the Pastor in each local church will be responsible for securing memberships of \$2 each. One-half of all monies collected shall be kept by the local church, and one-half shall be sent to a District H & W Committee, selected by the DCOM. Local churches may ask for assistance from the District Committee when local needs exceed the monies available. The District Committee may initiate H & W ministries on a District level as funds are available. The local church H & W Chairperson and the minister shall have authority to disburse funds in the local church. The District Superintendent and the District H & W Committee shall be authorized to disburse district H & W funds. Golden Cross promotional materials are available through the Service Center of the Board of Global Ministries.

Good Shepherd Retirement Center — Recognizing the need for volunteer support of our newest institutional ministry, we will recruit volunteers to serve in 1980. Through the Center's representative to the B.O.G.M. we will continue to explore ways to interpret this new ministry to our Conference.

Methodist Hospital Interpretation — In recognition of the need for our Annual Conference to be better informed about and more closely related to our institutions, we ask that the District Councils on Ministries name a H & W Designee. This person will be expected to visit Methodist Hospital for training as an interpreter to the District. Expenses will be covered by the Hospital.

We commend Bishop Ralph T. Alton for his statement, Annual Conferences and their Institutional Ministries, and recommend that clergy and laity study this thoughtful position paper. Copies are available free, except for postage and handling, from the Service Center.

The Committee on Missions in fulfilling the purpose make the following report:

Church Extension Fund Policies

- 1. Part of the money appropriated by the Conference Council on Finance and Administration for the Committee on Missions is designated as the Church Extension Fund of the Committee of Missions. We recommend that this fund be used to:
 - a. Give financial aid to new churches in their building programs;
 - b. Give financial aid to established churches with special needs;

- Give financial aid to existing churches in securing new sites and building when located in an area with the possibility of significant growth or where there is good potential for enlarged ministries in the church;
- d. Give financial aid where two or more churches merge in order to serve a given area more adequately; and
- e. Purchase and/or set up Mobile Units as needed.
- 2. We appreciate the fact that the General Board of Global Ministries also gives some assistance to this area. We recommend the following requirements for churches receiving grants and/or loans from the General Board of Global Ministries and the Conference Board of Global Ministries.
 - a. All applications for assistance shall be made on forms provided by the Committee on Missions. Such applications shall be accompanied by a letter of approval and support from each of the following: the District Superintendent, the Chairperson of the Administrative Board, the Chairperson of the Committee on Finance, and the District Board of Church Building and Location;
 - b. The complete application for a grant whether to the Conference Board or the General Board, shall be in the hands of the Church Extension Secretary by February 1 of each year in order that the application may be properly considered by the Committee of Missions.
 - c. A church receiving either a loan or a grant from either the Conference Board or the General Board will be required to have a period of stewardship cultivation during each year aid is given.
 - d. An organized church receiving financial assistance from the Committee on Missions will be expected to show reasonable progress in carrying its fair share of the total program of the United Methodist Church.
 - e. There shall be a bonded contractor on any project for which a church secures a loan or grant from the Conference Board of Global Ministries when such projects exceed 15% of the total value of the property.
 - f. All churches making applications for loans or grants for building projects shall follow the requirements set forth in the 1972 Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church. Paragraph 1419-1436. The Conference Committee on Missions recommends that an architect be employed for building and remodeling projects. The General Board of Global Ministries provides part-time services of an architect, located in Memphis. This architect is available to give assistance, free of charge, to churches who have received a General Board or Conference Board grant or loan.
 - g. Grants from the Committee on Missions shall be made only to churches completing a project and shall be paid when the Pastor and District Superintendent indicate in writing that this grant will complete the project. Church Extension funds not claimed within three years of allocation shall require a new application.
 - h. All applications shall be secured from:

- 3. We recommend the following guidelines for the Committee on Missions and the Church Extension Secretary:
 - a. In determining whether or not a church shall participate in a loan or grant from the Board of Global Ministries, the Secretary on Church Extension and the Committee on Missions shall consider the general population changes, the pattern of economic growth, and whether other churches are adequately serving the needs of the people in the area under consideration.
 - b. This committee shall encourage District Missions Societies to secure suitable sites for new churches in advance of actual church organization or building projects.
 - The committee shall examine all applications for building grants or loans and in submitting such applications to the Board may recommend approval, adjustment,

or rejection supplying to the Board as much information as possible concerning the situation.

d. This committee shall see to the disbursement of all allocated funds. Grants will be paid when the pastor and the District Superintendent indicate in writing that this grant or loan will complete the building project. The Secretary on Church Extension will notify the Chairperson of the Committee on Mission who will then advise the Area Treasurer when payment is to be made.

Conference Building Fund Policies

- 1. In order to better enable the Committee on Missions to do its job we are recommending a new statement on Policy for the Conference Building Fund:
 - a. We recommend that \$30,000 be provided for the Conference Building Fund by the churches of the conference for year 1980 with the amount being apportioned among the districts by the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, with the District Stewards setting the apportionment for each local church.
 - b. We recommend that the Conference Building Fund be used for:
 - 1. Purchasing new building sites for present and future developing.
 - 2. \$5,000 to be used in 1980 for the research and development of new programs for Church Extension and Congregational Development.
 - 3. Assisting merging churches, and
 - 4. Purchasing and insurance on Mobile Units. The BOGM will secure proper insurance — fire, theft and liability — on all mobile units. The recipients of the Unit will pay moving and setting up expenses.
 - c. We recommend that the Bishop and Cabinet can recommend to the Committee on Missions churches that need help for the Conference Building Fund.
 - d. The final approval of grants shall come from the Committee on Missions of the Board of Global Ministries.
 - e. The Chairperson of the BOGM and/or the Chairperson of the Committee on Missions shall advise the Area Treasurer when payments are to be made.
 - f. The payments will be sent to the District Superintendent, who then will be responsible for getting the payment to the proper church.

- 6. There shall be no prepayment penalties.
- 7. The interest rate shall be the rate charged by the General Board or less.
- The time for repayment of the loan shall be one year per thousand dollars of loan not to exceed a total time of fifteen years.
- The final approval of the loans shall come from the Committee on Missions.
- The Chairperson of the Committee on Missions shall advise the Area Treasurer when payment is to be made.

The task force will assist the church in locating a teacher, who will teach deaf communications (sign language, finger spelling) to the hearing congregation. This will be done in order to help churches train laypersons for teaching Sunday School classes for the deaf. We hope to have at least one church per district throughout the state, where the deaf are identified and a ministry is being established by December 1983.

OBJECTIVE #3. Home Visits with the deaf and hearing impaired.

Home visits with the deaf by persons selected by the Task Force and the district Deaf

Coordinator. Visits will bring about communications between the deaf and hearing and inform the deaf of programs for them. The visits will also determine whether the deaf are in need of transportation and secure a commitment from the deaf to attend our church regardless of their religious affiliation.

OBJECTIVE #4. Locate the deaf in Arkansas.

A layperson in each district will be selected by the Task Force to be responsible for organizing a search for the deaf in that particular district. This person will be called the 'District Deaf Coordinator.' This District Deaf Coordinator hopefully will be asked to serve on the District Council on Ministries. The names and addresses of all identified deaf will be sent to this person, who will in turn, send this information to the task force.

The Education and Cultivation Task Force has the responsibility of designing a comprehensive plan for education and interpretation of the program of the conference Board of Global Ministries.

In our fall evaluation meeting the number one priority that was seen by the members of the Board was communications with the local churches — that is to hear from local churches — their needs, desires, concerns and how we as a conference can help them and also education for local churches on programs and projects of the Board of Global Ministries. In light of these priorities we propose the following goals:

Quarterly Mission Mailing.

During 1980 to provide interpretative mission materials, especially on the Advance Specials to each local pastor, mission coordinator, District Superintendents, and others. We hope with this information local churches will experience confidence in the mission program of the church and increase their support.

II. Annual Board of Global Ministries Handbook.

By February 1980 to provide an interpretive booklet for pastors, D.S., chairpersons of local church commission on missions and district mission coordinators. This booklet will include a description of all conference board of Global Ministries projects; "howto" helps on services provided by the conference board and the general board, e.g. — church extension grants, loans and others. We believe if each local church had this booklet they would be able to better visualize where their "mission" money goes and would be more supportive. It would also help clear the confusion that now exists on procedures, who to contact and what a certain program involves.

III. District Mission Fairs.

To provide in the fall of 1980 a mission fair, interpreting the work of the General and Conference Board of Global Ministries and the Women's Division in each district. This will provide an opportunity for the local churches to be in contact with the Mission-Interpreter-in-Residence, World and National Division Personnel and to see resources available to them. Those attending would be confronted with the opportunity for involvement in missions by the local church and to hear an interpretation of what the "mission dollar" does. We feel this is needed especially at the beginning of a quadrennium.

IV. Arkansas School of Christian Mission.

We urge all pastors, leaders of mission studies and others involved in the interpretation of missions in the local church to attend one of the two sessions of the Arkansas School of Christian Mission. This is a very helpful opportunity for learning. This school will be held on the Hendrix College campus in July.

RELIGION AND RACE

The Commission on Religion and Race, with representation of the total church of the Fourth Arkansas Conference, will continue to seek specific ways of influencing the conference in its acceptance of, responsibility to and its mission with the ethnic congregations and persons of the North Arkansas Conference and the United Methodist Church as a whole.

The membership has been in respective communities:

- A. Working through local governments and organizations, developing attitudes of openness in racial matters.
- B. Creating an interest of minority youth in the program and purpose of the church by their attendance at the Arkansas Ashram and Youth Assemblies.

C. Worked with EMLC Area Task Force in support of general issues and programs of advancement.

D. "Awareness of other ethnic persons of the conference boundaries (A.M.E. and C.M.E. Churches) the common bonds shared in its ethnicity, resourcing in any way possible and financing participation in the Ethnic Convocations, Consultations and Workshops for religious and political improvement."

The commission is aware of the need for more ethnic participation of the North Arkansas Conference; however, recommends that a more intentional effort be made by the larger church to foster religious and racial harmony throughout the communities.

The Commission recommends the election participation of ethnics on all conference boards and agencies of the church according to the profiles of the participants.

The Commission recommends that District, Council on Ministries seek ethnic persons in the respective communities for leadership training and membership.

Continued concern for the General Church Missional Priority must be implemented, in order to live out the Social Principles we are guided by and the Christian commitment we should live by.

The Commission asks the active, intentional recruitment of seminary graduates to place in the pulpits of the conference, looking toward total itineracy.

Continued support of all innovative ministries of the Conference.

The Commission supports efforts of the Bishop in the deliberation of funding for Philander Smith College, and ask that more recruitment of Methodist Students in the North Arkansas Conference, the appointment of minorities and women to the board of Philander Smith College.

The Commission will continue to support the efforts of the Commission on Status and Role of Women in requesting increased participation of, and acceptance of women in all programs, boards and agencies of the church. The commission asks that active attention be given to the recruitment of ethnic women for the pulpit ministry.

We ask that through the communications media, ethnic concerns be publicized. A catalog of films and filmstrips be purchased and used through the conference office.

We ask continued support for the Black Community Developers program through the Board of Global Ministries and seek total support from the North Arkansas Conference.

Budget for 1980 - \$625.00

STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN

The Commission on the Status and Role of Women was created at both national and annual conference levels to open up church structures to the full participation of women. It tries to accomplish this by being an advocate, a catalyst, and a monitor. The CSRW advocates for women's special needs, for example by bringing petitions before the annual conference. It monitors church agencies to determine how well women are being included. It acts as a catalyst by bringing people and resources together to enable change to occur. The scope of the CSRW includes problems of women both within the church and in society at large, since societal conditions may keep women from realizing their full potential as Christians.

COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRIES

The Conference Council on Youth Ministries reaches youth through several ways. The Youth Service Fund is the most renowned form of youth outreach. The youth council has channeled contributions to a Calico Rock Youth Center, the Mallalieu Community Center, the Appalachia Service Project, and Aldersgate Camp youth programs. The YSF helps fulfill ministry in areas that CCYM is incapable of satisfying by itself. More recently organized than the YSF is Youthful Info, the conference youth newsletter. The first issue was released in March, and the publication will grow to enhance communication between the conference youth council and local UMY groups.

Another new form of outreach will be youth-to-youth evangelism through drama. This program will begin in June of 1980 with training of four casts of youth to produce a play

sharing the Good News. A training seminar, such as that of the Covenant Players, will be held at the cost of approximately \$500. The cast will perform at district and sub-district rallies, retreats, and local church activities. The four casts will be located in different regions of the conference, but each cast member will reside close to his particular group; therefore, travel to events will be inexpensive for a group. Each host group will be expected to pay for the travel expenses for their guest cast. However \$1,000 is allocated for the expense of a cast's travel to host groups that cannot meet these expenses. Two hundred dollars has been set aside for publicity of the program.

In addition to YSF, there are several well-established programs produced by the CCYM. The conference spring rally was held on March 31 at Hendrix College. Bishop Hicks spoke, and David Meece gave a vocal and piano performance. Junior High Assembly will be held on July 26-29 with the theme "Knock, Knock, Who's there?" Senior High Assembly will proceed during the week of July 30 through August 3. Because of his ministry at the 1978 spring rally, Floyd Schaffer, clown minister, will be a part of Senior High Assembly. It is possible that a group of interested youth clowns will create a prelude program to the 1980 evangelism drama project. A newly established event, the Ingathering Youth Rally, will be conducted on November 16.

The panorama of the conference youth program contains a vision of Christian mission. Evangelism is the most general form of mission and this year's scheduled events stress living and functioning in a Christian spirit. Spring rally theme was "God's Stamp of Ownership"; Senior High Assembly will revolve around the idea of being "Branded by God," and the Ingathering rally will continue the emphasis on "Christian Living." Outreach is to be continued with the travel dramatists and YSF can become more than money; youth can appreciate the need for the Calico Rock Youth Center, and they can visit and see how Aldersgate provides summer fun for handicapped youth that are of their same generation, so YSF becomes a personal outreach.

As evangelism is the most general form of mission, it is easily understood that mission occurs best in a small setting, specifically within the local fellowship of United Methodist Youth. The local youth group has the greatest potential for outreach and it is the purpose of the CCYM to help develop this potential.

Example Of Timeline For Conference Planning

 By October 15, District Councils, having received and compiled data from local churches input for Conference attention, plus District suggestions for Conference partnership enterprises, forwards to Conference Council recommendations for development of 1981 Annual Conference Programs.

- 2. By November 15, Conference Boards and Commissions prepare and prioritize first draft of 1981 Objectives and Courses of Action; review and plan for 1980 assignments.
- 3. November 30 and December 1 Conference Council review, evaluate and prioritize proposed 1981 program, review assignment of 1980 Courses of Action, review and adjust 1980 budget.
- 4. By February 22, Conference Council revise 1981 Objectives as necessary, prepare final budget requests for 1981, continue responsibility for 1980 assignments.
- 5. By March 1, Budget Committee meet to evaluate requests for financial support of program, to consider, amend and adopt recommendations regarding 1981 program, with related budget, personnel plans, and support service plans.
- 6. By March 12, Council on Finance and Administration meet to consider program budget and all other budget requests of church agencies, conduct necessary hearings, and prepare a total budget to present to the Annual Conference session.
- 7. By May 1, the Report on proposed conference program and financial and staff resources needed to implement the program sent to lay and clergy members of the conference, and to key leaders of the local church.
- 8. Proposed program received by Annual Conference; discussed and evaluated in legislative committees; amended and adopted by Annual Conference session in June.
- 9. A step not developed here is a process of evaluation of the previous year's content and procedure. This would presumably occur soon after January 1.

The above Timeline presupposes participation in the Annual Conference program ministries development by the following components: Local Church, District Council, Boards and Commissions, Cabinet, Council Staff and Council.

COUNCIL ON PROFESSIONAL MINISTRY

The Council on Professional Ministry is the coordinating body for all conference agencies relating to clergy and lay professionals. Under the umbrella of the Council on Professional Ministry are the Board of Ordained Ministry, Diaconal Ministry, and Pensions; the Commission on Equitable Salaries; and the Committees on Group Insurance and Memoirs. The Joint Committee on Disability is composed of representatives of the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Board of Pensions.

The basic document of the Council on Professional Ministry is found on pages 113-115 of

the 1977 Conference Journal. This inclusive statement will continue to guide us in 1979-1980. Aspects of this document I would like to lift up in this report are:

1) The "Book Exchange" at the session of the Annual Conference. We encourage clergy delegates to bring books they would like to make available to other persons to the conference session and leave them in the designated "Book Exchange" room. They could also take any books left there for their own use.

The "Book Exchange" has especially been helpful to younger ministers of the conference, and we do hope all the members of the conference will continue to support this program.

2) Continuing education should always be a priority for the Professional Ministry. We encourage all the pastors of the conference to attend the "Arkansas Pastors' School" and to take advantage of other opportunities for continuing education such as Ministers' Week at the various United Methodist Seminaries, summer continuing education programs provided through the Seminaries and Scarritt College and other individual continuing education experiences.

We encourage our churches to give encouragement to their pastors to take advantage of continuing education opportunities by providing "time off" and also "financial assistance."

The Council on Professional Ministry, in compliance with the directive of the 1978 session of the North Arkansas Annual Conference, has begun a "Study of the Standardization of Clergy Salaries." See 1978 Journal pp. 65.

The Council has corresponded with the Division of Ordained Ministry, Board of Higher Education and Ministry and secured, through their help, a number of "Standardization" or "Basic" salary plans which came out of similar studies in other Annual Conferences. We have discovered that out of a number of studies done and plans formed only one Annual Conference has approved such a plan. This was the Baltimore Conference. The plan of the Baltimore Conference has not been implemented, the method of adoption and implementation having been declared unconstitutional by the Judicial Council. See Judicial Council decision #383.

We believe there are two main reasons for the consideration of a "Standardization" or "Basic" salary plan for the Annual Conference. These are:

- 1) To provide the best possible compensation for all our pastors.
- 2) To provide for the most effective use of the ministers (using the best in the places where they are most needed) without regard to the ability of the local church to pay.

A plan of "Standardization" which does not help to do this would not be in the best interest of the church.

It is now our opinion that a "Standardization" or "Basic" salary plan for the clergy of the North Arkansas Annual Conference is **not** a viable option for the immediate future. There are two main reasons for this opinion. They are:

- 1) The expense of implementing such a plan would be far greater than the benefit derived.
- 2) The enabling legislation included in the 1968 Discipline (par. 925) and the 1972 Discipline (par. 893) is no longer a part of the Discipline of the church. We must, therefore, continue to be guided by par. 243.9 which in stating the powers and duties of the Charge Conference says: "It shall in consultation with the district superintendent set the salary and other remuneration of the pastor and other staff appointed by the bishop."

The Council does recognize the need to make more equitable the salaries of all the ministers of the Conference, however, we believe we can move toward more equitable salaries in ways other than a thru-going "Standardization" or "Basic" salary plan.

For example: There are, in reports from the Board of Pensions; the Commission on Equitable Salaries; the Committee on Group Insurance; and the Area Task Force on Parish Development, recommendations now coming before the Annual Conference that we believe will help in providing more equitable and adequate support for all clergy of the Conference.

It is therefore the recommendation of the Council on Professional Ministry that the Annual Conference direct the Council on Professional Ministry, or other appropriate agency of the Annual Conference, to make further study of ways to help overcome the inequities we

have seen in the present system of support for clergy and report to the 1980 session of the Conference.

The various agencies of the Council are carrying out their responsibilities, as assigned by the Discipline of the Church, in a fine way. The newest agency, the Board of Diaconal Ministry is now completely organized and is beginning to do some creative and most helpful work.

Reports of these agencies can be found at other places in these reports.

For 1980, the Council will need to continue to receive funding from the Conference Benevolence budget for the work of the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Board of Diaconal Ministry, the Committee on Memoirs and the Council on Professional Ministry. These budget requests have been presented to the Council on Finance and Administration.

The Board of Pensions and the Commission on Equitable Salary receive no benevolence monies. The Committee on Group Insurance will be presenting a program to the Conference, which if approved, will make funding from the Conference Benevolence Budget unnecessary.

BOARD OF DIACONAL MINISTRY

Within the total church community there are persons called of God and set apart through consecration for specialized ministries of service in the church's life and mission. These are consecrated Diaconal Ministers.

We are also charged with the responsibility of interpreting, recruiting and counseling other lay professions in the process of certification and consecration.

The following are recommendations from the Board of Diaconal Ministry for the forthcoming conference year:

- 1. We recommend the registration of all lay people employed full and part time in churches to get information regarding certification to these people.
- 2. We recommend a program of the Diaconal Ministry be presented to every district in the conference through either the District Council on Ministries, or minister's meetings. The purpose is to clarify the role of the diaconal minister to the ordained ministry and also to all personnel in churches. The presentation will include slides of diaconals at work within our conference. It will provide information about the purpose of the diaconal ministry in relation to the purpose of the ordained.
- 3. We recommend that the Council on Professional Ministry work with both boards (ordained and diaconal) to develop a recruitment program for all ministries.
 - A. We recommend that the Conference Council on Youth Ministries include in its plans for the Youth Assembly each year an emphasis on ministry careers.
 - B. We request that the Committee on Enlistment schedule a careers day working together with Boards or Ordained and Diaconal.
- 4. We recommend that the Ordained and Diaconal Boards meet jointly once a year in order to further our common goal of the ministries of the church, at the direction of the chairman of the Council on Professional Ministry.
- 5. Board of Diaconal Ministry has planned and will conduct a 1-day conference-wide workshop for all lay-professional persons (persons salaried full or part-time in local church). This will be in the spring of 1980.
- 6. The Board of Diaconal Ministries moved that Standing Rule #24 of the Annual Conference, Page 164, 1978 Journal, be amended to make Diaconal Ministers Number 1 in the list of additional lay delegates to Annual Conference, named by the District Council on Ministries, (See Standing Rules.)

BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY

In order to perform our responsibilities as a Conference Board of Ordained Ministry, we declare that we will faithfully adhere to the Disciplinary requirements in all matters relating to the Ministry, and we recommend the following:

I. General Provisions

- A. That we ensure the continuance of our present program by reserving each year an amount sufficient for the Scholarship commitments.
- B. That the Conference Council on Finance and Administration appropriate for the working budget of this Board the necessary funds in order for the Board to accomplish its goals.
- C. That we continue our emphasis on the Ministerial Education Program and the United Methodist Seminaries. We urgently request that each local church pay its fair share of the \$103,583.00 asking of the North Arkansas Conference.
- D. That those who desire to begin training for the Ministry secure the proper application forms for candidacy from their District Superintendent or from the Registrar of the Board of Ordained Ministry.

II. Policy And Program

- A. The funds of the board will be expended in the following ways:
 - 1. For the normal work of the board and its Registrars in the operation of the Board and in the guidance of persons related to the Board in training.
 - 2. For financial assistance to college and seminary students enrolled in colleges and seminaries approved by the University Senate, or accepted by our Annual Conference, who meet the following requirements: (Priority shall be given) 1. to persons attending United Methodist Seminaries, 2. to persons attending other accredited seminaries, 3. to college students who have completed one-half their requirements for graduation.
 - a. Provisions for Financial Aid:
 - (1) The Board may allow basic fees and tuition.
 - (2) In cases of exceptional needs as determined by the Executive Committee of the Board and upon recommendation of the District Superintendent of the student's home district, the student may receive up to \$800.00 in aid per academic year.
 - (3) If a student has earned credit for an equivalent of 12 semester hours in regular semester and wishes to attend summer school for the purpose of accelerating return to the Conference, the student may apply for aid for fees and tuition for summer school, the amount not to exceed 1/2 of that allowed for a full academic year.
 - (4) Aid may be granted for not more than three undergraduate academic years and for not more than four seminary years.
 - b. We note the existence of the "Charles W. Tadlock Scholarship Fund" to assist persons in studying for the ministry in the United Methodist Church. The Fund will be administered through the Section of Loans and Scholarships, Board of Higher

Education and Ministry. Guidelines and application blanks will be available from the Board of Ordained Ministry.

- c. Requirements to be met by the full-time student:
 - (1) To be eligible for a grant the individual must have received both a certificate of candidacy and have completed 1/2 of the requirements to graduate from college or be attending an approved seminary.
 - (2) The student shall establish need for such aid by completing the forms required by the Board of Ordained Ministry.
 - (3) Students are expected to provide information concerning their standings and changes of relationship to the North Arkansas Conference, to the Registrar of the Board of Ordained Ministry.
- d. The Course of Study Schools:
 - (1) Local Pastors who attend the Course of Study School at St. Paul or Perkins will receive registration fees and room and board scholarships from the Annual Conference.
 - (2) The Board will pay the entire cost of required books for each person who attends either of these schools. The books must be paid for by the persons themselves who in turn will send a cash receipt for books purchased to the Board Treasurer who will authorize checks for reimbursements. Books are not to be charged to the Treasurer of the Board.
- e. Part-time Local Pastors: The Board urges all part-time Local Pastors to attend the Course of Study School.
- f. Arkansas Pastors' School: We will support the Arkansas Pastors' School by providing financial assistance in the amount of \$750.
- g. Ecumenical Clergy Conferences: The Board will provide 12 scholarships of \$25 each for pastors of the North Arkansas Annual Conference to attend the Ecumenical Clergy Conference. Scholarships may be applied for through the Chairperson of the Continuing Education Committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry.
- h. Continuing Education:
 - (1) The Board will provide scholarships for pastors to participate in continuing education. Maximum for each scholarship will be \$200. These funds will be administered by the Continuing Education Committee of the Board. Scholarships may be applied for through Chairperson of the Continuing Education Committee prior to the event and payment will be made upon completion of the event.
 - (2) The Board will provide \$100 per district for "Guided Reading Programs" for ministers of each district. The "Guided Reading Program" will be coordinated by the district superintendent through an approved seminary and the money used only to bring a resource person to the district at the close of the "Guided Reading Program."
 - (3) We recommend that each local church or charge allow the pastor leave time to participate in Continuing Education Programs. This time to be in addition to the pastor's vacation time. And we encourage each local church or charge to provide in its budget a Continuing Education Fund of at least \$50 for the pastor. We request that each district superintendent make this an item of inquiry at each Charge Conference.
- j. We recommend the continuation of pastoral care and counseling services to pastors and their families.

The Advisory Committee on Pastoral Care approves the office of Wm. R. Barling as the office which does testing and evaluation for the Board of Ordained Ministry and as a source of counseling of both clergy and their families in the Conference.

- B. In consideration of Paragraphs 414.4 and 421 of the 1976 Discipline of The United Methodist Church, the Board will require psychological testing of persons seeking membership in the Annual Conference.
- C. Candidacy: Each individual entering the ordained ministry must go through the Candidacy Program. It is suggested that each pastor become acquainted with the steps of candidacy in order to properly counsel persons in the local church desiring this information.

III. Recommendations

- A. We recommend that local churches give special attention to the actions of General Conference that relate to ministry. Local churches now have a much greater role in the whole process of "candidacy" for ministry.
- B. We urge attendance at the Arkansas Pastors' School. This year's School will be held at Hendrix, August 27-30.
- C. The Board encourages churches of the North Arkansas Annual Conference to participate in the seminary intern program.
- D. The Board recommends that clergy be encouraged to participate in the Academy of Parish Clergy, a continuing education program involving 50 academic hours per year, and that the Board provide one-half (\$25.00) the cost of one year's membership (\$50.00).
- E. The Board recommends that the Conference establish an 18-month period under appointment for seminarians following graduation to fulfill the requirements for full connection.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

- 1. We recommend that the Annuity Rate for fiscal 1980 be set at \$103,00 per service year.
- 2. We recommend that the North Arkansas Conference continue participation in the Methodist Reserve Pension Fund of the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church in Evanston, Illinois, subject to the provisions thereof, as begun on January 1, 1975. In order to adequately provide for this program we recommend that:
 - a. Each church shall pay into the Conference Pension and Benefit Fund an apportioned amount totaling, for the Conference, \$654,000.00
 - b. Continue to solicit money from interested persons who have already exhibited an unusual concern for the pension program.
 - c. Cooperate with other agencies to place increased emphasis on wills and legacies.
- 3. We recommend there be continued the work of the Board of Pensions on Proportional Payment of Ministerial Support in accord with provisions of Paragraph 734.4 of the 1976 Discipline, using the guidelines listed on page 121 of the 1978 Journal.
- 4. We recommend that necessitous allowance grants, retirement love offerings and local expenses of the Board be paid by the Treasurer, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee of the Conference Board of Pensions and the 1976 Discipline, Paragraph 1706.13 and Paragraph 1707.
- 5. We recommend that the institution, board or organization paying the salary of a minister on special appointment without annuity claim on the conference shall make provisions for the pension of such person. Attention is called to the 1976 Discipline, Paragraph 1706.3a(3); with reference to eligibility to participate in Ministers Reserve Pension Fund (MRPF) with the approval of the General Board of Pensions.
- 6. That there be apportioned to each agency and institution served by a ministerial member under special appointment with annuity claim on the conference, the sum of \$1,236.00 for the Financial Year 1980 in accord with the 1976 Discipline, Paragraph 1706.3a(3); and that said apportionment be paid to the Treasurer of the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions no later than 7 days prior to the end of the fiscal year.

- The Board will not make any retroactive settlements of claims prior to the year in which a claim is approved, excepting in the case of those who have been serving as
- In determining years of service, the Board shall carefully examine and consider those years listed in the Conference Journal prior to accepting them as valid years; and any years in question shall be subject to validation by the applicant and by approval to the Board of Pensions.
- 11. We recommend that all approved local pastors continue to provide all information necessary relative to their service record.
- 12. We recommend that the Executive Committee elected by the Board be designated in the Journal with the roster of the members of the Board of Pensions.
- 13. Eligible claimants who have been retired by the North Arkansas Conference will have their conference Death Benefit Program Premium paid by the Conference Board of Pensions. We recommend that all retired ministers, widows and dependent children, who are our responsibility, be covered under the HMEP policy. The cost will be paid 100% by the Board. Retired individuals, eligible for Medicare, shall personally pay the Medicare monthly payments.
- We recommend that each minister at the time of full retirement and drawing annuity from the General Board of Pensions be given a love offering of \$500.00.
- We recommend that we continue to designate a rental housing allowance for retired ministers as listed on page 123 of the 1978 Journal.

- We recommend that the Conference set a minimum income level for members of the 16. Annual Conference, Associate members and their surviving spouses. The retired member must be drawing an Annuity from the Board of Pensions. Such members shall be entitled to a level of income no less than 70% of the current equitable salary for a full time resident member of the Conference. This figure will include 20% for housing. The surviving spouse shall be entitled to an income level no less than 70% of that received by the retired member. All sources of income will be used to determine need, including Pension, Social Security, Investments, Earnings, etc. Those persons with less than the minimum income must apply for a grant in writing to the Treasurer, Conference Board of Pensions. The Treasurer will supply the retiree or surviving spouse with an application. The application, when completed and returned, will be acted upon by the Executive Board of the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions. These grants will be funded by a special offering taken in the churches on Retired Ministers' Sunday, the first Sunday in November each year. These monies will be sent to the Conference Treasurer so designated. He in turn will remit to the General Board of Pensions.
- 17. In accordance with Paragraph 1706.12e of the 1976 Discipline, we recommend that the North Arkansas Conference observe Retired Ministers' Sunday on the first Sunday in November of each year. Said observance is to honor the retired ministers, their wives and the widows of ministers.
- 18. We recommend that the ministers participate in the TAX-DEFERRED program of the General Board of Pensions. For further information and/or enrollment forms, write Dr. Eugene Moore, Assistant General Secretary, General Board of Pensions, 1200 Davis Street, Evanston, Illinois 60201.

We recommend that as of January 1, 1980, Paragraph 1706, Section 4B of the 1976 Discipline be enforced.

JOINT COMMITTEE ON DISABILITY

Recommendations to the North Arkansas Annual Conference on the policy to follow in admitting and continuing persons on Disability Leave.

- 1. That we establish a continuing caring ministry in cooperation with the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry to help meet the needs of the disabled; and the inclusion of these persons in District and Conference activities.
- 2. We recommend that the Medical Report of each applicant made by their personal doctors on the degree of impairment, be sent to the General Board of Pensions by each applicant.
- 3. We recommend that the Joint Committee on Disability prescribe a program of rehabilitation for each individual on disability leave if such is feasible. The purpose being to return the disabled minister to active ministry as soon as possible.
- 4. In accordance with paragraph 132b, rules and regulations for the Annual Conferences in MRPF, disability benefits may be reduced or terminated by the Board of Pensions when the person on disability recovers sufficiently to engage in a remunerative occupation. Therefore, each person on disability will report earned income to the Conference Board of Pensions each year.

5. The General Board of Pensions requires that all persons be renewed each year with a current medical report. This report is to be sent to the Conference Board of Pensions secretary.

THE COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES

The Commission on Equitable Salaries shall be composed of seven ministers of the Conference and one lay person from each District in the Conference, including one minister and one lay person from churches of fewer than 200 members (1976 Discipline paragraph 934.1). The annual conference shall elect quadrennially a chairperson. The Commission shall elect quadrenially a vice chairperson and a secretary. These officers shall compose the Executive Committee. The Secretary of Salary Aid of the Conference Board of Global Ministries and the Chairperson of the Council on Professional Ministries shall serve as nonvoting ex-officio members of the Commission.

It shall be the purpose of the Commission on Equitable Salaries to evaluate the need for additional ministerial support within the Conference and to administer such funds as approved by the Conference and apportioned by the Council on Finance and Administration (1976 Discipline para. 934.2).

II. Goals

- A. The Commission, through the District Superintendents, recommends that every charge receiving equitable salary aid have a period of stewardship cultivation each year.
- B. It is the goal of the Commission to greatly encourage each charge receiving equitable salary support to seek annually to increase the salary toward full self-support by the charge. When a charge sets a support level which will cause the combined salary from the church, Equitable Salary Commission and other sources to exceed \$8,200.00 the Equitable Salary Commission will reduce its contribution for that year by no more than twenty-five percent. In established churches or charges where continuing salary aid is necessary, the District Superintendent is requested to use every wise and practical means to merge or combine churches or circuits in order to strengthen the ministerial support of that charge.
- C. The commission further encourages the establishment of larger parish programs. Where this involves equitable salary funds, such programs shall be submitted to the commission for its approval.
- D. The Commission shall report annually in the Conference Journal, by Districts, the amount paid during the year to each charge.

III. Categories Of Support

A. SUPPORTIVE CHARGES: This category is designed to enable the Conference to assist persons serving appointments while preparing for fulltime ministry. It further includes assistance for local pastors who are serving charges where no professional minister is available. Each charge in this category shall make an application annually and shall be reviewed annually. The charge shall pay at least 50% of the total salary support (1976 Discipline pp. 934.8).

B. SUSTÂINING CHARGES: This category is designed for providing salary assistance to charges which require long term assistance because of declining or stable population. This category would cover members, associate and probationary members of the Annual Conference. The charge shall pay at least 50% of the total salary support (1976 Discipline pp.

934.8).

C. KEY CHARGES: This category is designed to assist charges where there is potential for growth and where the church is willing to expand its ministry. The Commission is conscious of the need and potential for church growth within our Conference and feels its responsibility to recognize and support those charges which display a willingness to expand their ministry and missional outreach in their situation. The charge shall submit the request to become a "Key Charge" to the Commission, with final approval resting with the Commission on Equitable Salaries.

Key charges shall be related to the commission on equitable salaries by a contractual agreement. The commission or representatives from the commission shall meet with a committee from the charge which shall include the pastor, the charge lay leader, the District Superintendent and two other persons selected by the charge to prepare a contract that outlines the proposed needed salary support of the charge. The contract would be signed by the chairman and secretary of the commission, the District Superintendent and three representatives of the charge (two of which shall hold the following positions: pastor, chairperson of administrative board, charge lay leader, charge or local church treasurer, chairperson of finance, chairperson of pastor-parish relations). This contract would be for either three or five years with the salary support provided by the commission to decrease each year until at the end of the contract time, the charge would no longer be eligible to receive salary support.

Under the key charge arrangement there would be no maximum or minimum salary level, but the level of support would be determined by the commission in accordance with the needs and requests of the charge as reported by the committee.

IV. Guidelines

- A. To be eligible to receive equitable salary aid a charge shall meet the following guidelines:
 - File with the District Superintendent and the Secretary of the Commission by December 10 of each year:
 - a. A written application for salary aid (forms are available from the Commission Secretary) NO APPLICATION WILL BE CONSIDERED UNLESS IT IS SUBMITTED IN WRITING.
 - b. Applications for salary aid shall be signed by the District Superintendent, the pastor, the charge lay leader and the church treasurer.
 - c. A report of the stewardship cultivation period or report of the efforts toward a stewardship cultivation period.
 - d. A copy of the budget for each church on the charge, adopted by the Administrative Board.
 - 2. Each church shall annually pay in full all Conference and District apportionments. The Commission may reduce the salary grant by any percentage of the apportionments unpaid the previous year.
 - 3. Salary aid shall be paid on a calendar year basis. However, a charge may qualify for equitable salary aid within the first three months of the Conference year provided it meets the above requirements. Such aid, if approved may become retroactive to the beginning of the Conference year.
 - Except for students, part-time pastors are not eligible to receive equitable salary funds.
 - 5. Retired pastors are not eligible to receive equitable salary funds (1976 Discipline pp. 434.7).
 - Between meetings of the Commission, all applications must meet the approval of the Executive Committee.
 - 7. In the event of insufficient funds to meet all approved requests, each charge shall share proportionately from the funds available.

COMMITTEE ON GROUP INSURANCE

Report #1: Group Life Insurance DBP

We make the following recommendations:

- 1. That the General Board of Pensions Death Benefit Program, plan D, including alternate option 3, be continued as the group life insurance program of the North Arkansas Conference.
- 2. All members and fulltime Local Pastors of the North Arkansas Conference under appointment, (except students serving in, or those employed by Conferences which have compulsory insurance programs, or members under special appointment outside the Conference, or retired Chaplains serving in), shall participate in the North Arkansas Conference Death Benefit Program, subject to its laws and regulations.
- 3. An open enrollment period shall be held each year during the month of December for those persons rendering full-time service to, or those employed by the Conference.
- 4. A limited enrollment period shall be held each year for 90 days following the session of the Annual Conference for those newly eligible by Conference action.
- 5. Individual enrollment may be requested at any time within 90 days after becoming eligible for the first time.
- 6. The Insurance Secretary/Treasurer shall check the eligibility of persons applying for enrollment for the first time by contacting the District Superintendent concerned in the case of pastors, and the pastor involved in the case of full-time lay employees.
- 7. The First Premium Payment shall accompany the application for enrollment, otherwise the application will not be processed.
- 8a. The 1980 Premium is based on 1.82% of the 1979 Average Annual Conference Salary of

\$12.764. The yearly premium is \$235.78. At least 80% (88.62) is to be paid by the charge and no more than 20% (47.16) is to be paid by the participant. This is a change from the 70-30 division last year.

8b. That 11/2% be added to DBP premiums to cover committee administrative costs, except on those premiums paid by the Conference Board of Pensions. Should this percentage raise excess money beyond administrative costs, the 11/2% will not be added to the premium next due.

8c. DBP premiums are due yearly. The Total Premium must be in the hands of the Insurance Secretary/Treasurer, Faye Watson, 1316 Nettleton Circle, Jonesboro, Ark. 72401, no later than November 10, 1979. Both premiums and Benefits increase or

decrease in direct proportion to the Annual Conference Average Salary.

Benefits for 1979 are found on page 127 of the 1978 Journal. Before retirement, or while on Disability Leave, or after retirement at any age, benefits are paid according to the age in the fiscal year of death. The age brackets and corresponding percentages of the average Conference Salary paid as benefits are as follows:

- 10. If the spouse of a participant dies the benefit is as follows: 20% if there is no child below age 21, and 30% if there is a child under age 21, of the Average Annual Conference Salary used to determine benefits for that year.
- 11. For each child of the decedent, including a child legally adopted, in full-time attendance at a standard institution of higher learning, beyond the secondary school level, up to age 25, educational benefits will be available to a student for such academic work in accordance with the following table: Maximum payment per academic year\$1,680.00

- 12. The District Superintendent should notify the Treasurer of the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions as soon as possible after the death of a minister, active or retired, or a spouse or surviving spouse, who has resided within the bounds of his district.
- 13. The District Superintendent should notify the Insurance Secretary/Treasurer as soon as possible when a person should be dropped from the DBP program because of loss of eligibility. This will save the Conference Insurance Program money.
- 14. The North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions pays the premiums for retired persons drawing annuity from the General Board of Pensions, their spouses, as well as the premiums for those on Disability Leave.
- 15. DBP rules and regulations were amended this year to enable participating Annual Conferences to enroll Diaconal Ministers, as a group, in the program. 75% of the eligible group as determined by the Annual Conference must be enrolled, provided further that if the Annual Conference pays the entire contribution on behalf of the enrolled ministers, then 100% of the eligible group must be enrolled.

Report #2: Group Hospitalization Insurance (HMEP)

We make the following recommendations:

That the General Board of Pensions HMEP program be continued under the basic plan adopted by our Conference.

- 2. a. All members and full time Local Pastors of the North Arkansas Conference under appointment, (except students serving in, or those employed by other Conferences or agencies which have compulsory insurance programs, or member under special appointment outside the Conference, or retired Chaplains serving in), and every full-time employee of the Conference, shall participate in the HMEP of the North Arkansas Conference.
 - b. No evidence of insurability will be required if a participant enrolls self and dependents within 90 days after the eligibility date.
 - c. Local Churches may enroll Lay Employees between June 1 and July 15 by following the guidelines found in the 1969 Journal, page 104, par. 1b; or the 1978 Journal, page 128, par. 6b.
 - d. The Insurance Secretary/Treasurer will check with the District Superintendent concerned in the case of a pastor applying for enrollment for the first time. The eligibility of any full-time Lay Employee of a church will be checked with the pastor concerned. In either case the First Premium Payment must accompany the application for enrollment before the application can be processed.
- 3. a. That the General Board of Pensions request for premiums for July 1, 1979 to July 1, 1980, as negotiated with Travelers Insurance Company, be approved. There is an increase of about 16% for participants under 65, and 7.5% for dependents under age 65, and an 18% increase age 65 and above. The increase is effective with the June 20, 1979 payment due. The rates quoted in item 4 below reflect this increase.
 - b. That the Charge pay at least 80% of the HMEP premium, and the participant pay no more than 20%. This is a change from the 60-40 division last year.
 - c. That $1\frac{1}{2}$ % be added to the HMEP premiums to cover administrative costs. These funds were formerly requested through CFA. Should this percentage raise excess money needed by the Conference Insurance Committee to administer the program, the $1\frac{1}{2}$ % will not be added to the premium next due.
- 4. The quarterly premium rates for HMEP for the period July 1979 to July 1980 are as follows: (they include the percentage in item 3c above)

- NOTE! All 65 and over should be enrolled in Medicare. It is the Claimant's responsibility to enroll by completing application forms at the Social Security Office no later than 3 months before reaching age 65.
- b. The North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions pays HMEP premiums for all retired persons drawing an annuity from the General Board of Pensions, all surviving spouses and children, as well as for those persons on Disability Leave. However, it is the claimant's responsibility to pay the portion required by Medicare.
- c. HMEP does not duplicate Medicare but supplements it by paying that portion of hospital expenses not covered by Medicare.
- 5. HMEP premiums are due quarterly, on June 20; September 10; December 10; and March 10. All insured persons are responsible for seeing the total premium due is sent to Faye Watson, 1316 Nettleton Circle, Jonesboro, Ark. 72401, no later than the due date.
- 6. NOTE! TO FILE A CLAIM send the First Notice of Claim form to the Claim Department, Travelers Insurance Company, P. O. Box 51, Little Rock, Ark. 72203. Follow the instructions on the back side of the form.

- a. First Notice of Claim forms are to be submitted only once a year for each person making a claim.
- b. First notice of claim forms are available from the District Superintendents, Faye Watson, Gail Anderson, or Travelers Insurance Company.
- c. Prescriptions must have the doctor's diagnosis for the first prescription only, but not for refills.
- d. Full and complete itemized details of all tests and medical services is required for including them in the claim.
- e. Claims for the calendar year 1979 must be submitted to Travelers by April 1, 1980.
- 7. The Stop Loss clause in our policy means your total "out of pocket" expenses for hospitalization cannot exceed \$500.00 per person, or \$1,500.00 per family, per year.
- 8. The collection of late premiums will be in accordance with the guidelines stated in the 1977 Journal, page 133, par. 5.

Report #3: Optional Programs

1. Multi-peril Insurance for Churches and Parsonages

We strongly recommend that all churches of the Conference investigate the multi-peril insurance program of the United Methodist Church, offered by the General Council on Finance and Administration. Compare! Your church may experience great savings on fire insurance and comprehensive coverage for all church property! Contact the United Methodist Church Insurance Department, 5th Floor, 88 Pine Street, New York, NY 10005. Your local independent agent can broker this insurance and collect the commission.

2. Worker's Compensation

- a. We recommend that all churches provide a workers' compensation plan for all paid church staff, including the minister. See your local insurance agent for details.
- b. We recommend and endorse the covering of the District Superintendents and the Conference Council on Ministries Staff with Workers' Compensation on one central policy, with compensation coming from the District Funds and Conference Council on Ministries funds respectively.
- 3. We recommend that each charge carry a Home Owners' Tenant policy paid for by the local church.
- 4. We recommend that the Church add the pastor's name to their church policy so the pastor's professional property at the church will be covered in the event of loss.

Report #4: Administrative Matters

- 1. The Conference Insurance Committee, on behalf of the members of our Group Insurance Programs, wish to commend Faye Watson for the outstanding job she has done during the time she has been the Insurance Committee Secretary/Treasurer.
- 2. We recommend Faye Watson be continued as our Insurance Secretary/Treasurer and her salary be \$2,400.00 per year, effective January 1, 1980.
- 3. The Budget for 1980:
 - a. Secretary/Treasurer Salary\$2,400.00
- 4. We shall continue to work with the District Superintendents to see that all persons who come under the guidelines for enrollment in both DBP and HMEP programs are enrolled properly and on time.
- 5. Persons coming into the Conference during our session can obtain enrollment cards from Gail Anderson, insurance chairman.

COMMITTEE ON OUTDOOR MINISTRIES (Camps And Conferences)

To share and to implement the philosophy of Outdoor Ministries by helping the conference, districts, and local churches to plan and participate in such outdoor education activities as well as enrich lives of children, youth and adults through awareness of our ecological heritage, through greater appreciation of God's created world, through deeper commitment to a stewardship of natural resources and to our Christian mission of aiding others. To help in development of these facilities and programs on conference and district levels which will enable our people to experience the intrinsic values of outdoor ministry.

We seek to achieve this purpose through the following functions of the committee:

- To interpret philosophy of Outdoor Ministries to churches in the conference.
- To provide leadership training.
- To communicate with district site committees on camping and their trustees.
- · To supervise development and use of Nawake.
- To cooperate with district Outdoor Ministries coordinators in development and program.
 - To evaluate all programs and facilities in Outdoor Ministries.
- To provide Outdoor Ministries opportunities to supplement those presently being offered.
 - To design or select recommended core curriculum for Outdoor Ministries.
- To research Outdoor Ministries trends, facts, and projects and to use data gained to strengthen our Outdoor Ministries.
 - To do long range planning for Outdoor Ministries in our conference.

Continuing Plans And Strategies For 1980

- 1. We recommend that some person in each local church be elected to serve as Coordinator of Outdoor Ministries. The names of these persons should be turned over to the Conference Committee on Outdoor Ministries and that publicity for events will be handled through this person.
- 2. We recommend that each local church report to the Charge Conference the number of persons attending Outdoor Ministries events during the year and also how many events were planned and carried out through the local church.
- 3. We recommend that \$2.00 per camper be sent to the CCOM office and that such amount be used for insurance for campers and publicity for events. Insurance for camps shall be carried on a conference-wide basis. Camps directors shall provide camp managers (when involved in district camps) with a list of all campers and the \$2.00 per camper for insurance and publicity. The camp manager shall send this to the Conference Council office each week. Events on the conference level shall be handled by the director of the event.
- 4. We recommend that a financial plan for developing additional "use" areas of Nawake, be presented at the 1979 annual conference.
- 5. To encourage participation in camping experiences from minority groups in the conference. And to make available funds for Scholarships where necessary.

- 6. To provide experiences in camping and Outdoor Ministries which will allow people to get involved in the Conference priorities.
- 7. We recommend that a resident manager/director be secured and placed on the Nawake property as soon as possible in order for proper development of the Master Plan for the property.

Program Cost for 1980: \$10,570.00

We recommend: That the CCOM design a form that will provide our Committee and other agencies of the Conference, with needed information (names, addresses, etc.) about persons in the local church who will be doing specific jobs (such as: local hunger coordinator and local outdoor ministries coordinator). These forms would be mailed to the local pastors and District Superintendents prior to the time for planning charge conferences for this fall. The forms would be turned in to the DS at the fall charge conference and the information collated and sent to the various groups and agencies for their use.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

Since the Commission on Archives and History of your conference has responsibilities to the General Church Commission, the Jurisdictional Commission, the Annual Conference, the Districts of the Conference, and each local church and we have had a request and studied that request as your conference commission we wish to place the following resolution before you for adoption.

"Mt. Olive UMC, our Black church in the Ft. Smith District, being a congregation in existence since 1869, its present building being 100 years old and in the National Registry as a Historic landmark site, and the church in which the Black Southwest Conference held its first Annual Conference Session in 1879,

"Be it resolved that the Mt. Olive UMC, Van Buren, Arkansas, become a Historic Site of the North Arkansas Conference and so designated with a plaque which the Commission will help Mt. Olive purchase."

The year has been a most interesting one for the Commission. Our workshop, held last October with Dr. John H. Ness Jr., from the Commission on Archives and History at Lake Junaluska, was very informative and helpful for those who attended. He spent time detailing the responsibilities of members of the Conference Commission and then helped us in working on local histories. Anyone who attended the workshop on the Commission would be happy to come to your church or district and help in a workshop.

We understand that there are still some copies of the most recent Methodist History of Arkansas, by Dr. Walter N. Vernon, in storage at the Headquarters Building. We encourage anyone who has not to purchase a copy.

During the year several individuals and groups have purchased and placed the plaque denoting the graves of Methodist ministers.

We have been encouraging Districts to place a complete set of Conference Journals somewhere in the District. There is a complete set at Hendrix and an almost complete set in the Fort Smith District office belonging to the Rev. William M. Wilder. We hope others are attempting to do this.

Several members of our Commission attended Jurisdictional Workshops at Kansas City and Dallas. From these meetings new ideas were brought back to be explored by our Commission.

The Commission part-time archivist, Mrs. Virginia Upton, has done an excellent job for us again this year. If you desire particular information, please direct your inquiries to her at 1212 Winfield, Conway, 72032. We ask that you send her copies of local church histories and founding dates of churches so those lists may be completed.

Mrs. Upton has given us the following report on her work for us:

During the year of 1978 I have attended all Conference meeting of the History Committee.

I also attended the Conference Workshop with Dr. John Ness as leader. This met at Hendrix College.

I attended the Jurisdictional Workshop which met at Perkins Seminary and was led by Dr. Walter Vernon.

We have put in our Collection at Hendrix College the following:

- 1. A paper weight belonging to Bishop Hendrix for whom the College was named. This is a silver one and was given to us by the Rev. John Guice. He had been the pastor of the Melrose Church, Kansas City, Missouri, where the Hendrix family worshipped and the Bishop had given it to him.
- Materials concerning Capt. W. W. Martin and his work as the first President of the Conway Retail Merchants. Dr. Paul Bumpers gave this to us. Capt. Martin was instrumental in moving Hendrix to Conway.
- An old bulletin from First United Methodist Church, Conway, for Feb. 16, 1939. Rev. Sam Wiggins was pastor. It has a picture of ministerial students at Hendrix College for 1939.
- 4. The "Story of Eli Lindsey Memorial United Methodist Church, Jessup, Arkansas." It is authored by Rev. A. N. Storey.
- 5. Booneville District Records 1901-1923 and Yellville Ct. Conference (Liberty) 1882, 1884. These were given by the Rev. William Wilder.
- 6. Old records from the Republican Church, Conway District, which is now combined with the Greenbrier Church.
- 7. Eli Lindsey gavel from his old home at Jessup.
- 8. History of the Augusta Church.
- 9. Two booklets on Winfield Methodist Church, Little Rock, Centennial celebration.
- 10. Centennial history of Danville Methodism, 1872-1972.
- 11. From the Walnut Ridge Times Dispatch a story of the Powhatan United Methodist Church which has been placed on the National Register, Lawrence County.

Our program for the coming year is as follows:

 To encourage churches to write a history of their church or to update histories already written. These materials to be placed in the Hendrix Library.

- 2. To help expand our program of placing grave markers on all graves of ministers within the boundaries of the conference. The markers cost \$20.00 each. These may be purchased through the Commission. We ask for the cooperation of families and local churches in this project.
- 3. Encourage each district to create a biographical file and history on each minister with their conference record and send it to Mrs. Upton to help us in gaining information for the new Union Catalogue of all United Methodist ministers being created by the General Commission at Lake Junaluska.
- To send representatives of the Commission to any Jurisdictional Workshop that may be held.
- To help with expenses for Mrs. Upton to Lake Junaluska for archival training, under Dr. Bill Beal, the archivist of The United Methodist Church.
- 6. To encourage churches, pastors, groups and individuals to send items of present interest, which will become historical (bulletins of building dedications, special anniversaries, honor programs, etc.), to Mrs. Upton to be put in a Daily Journal the Commission has started.
- 7. That District Superintendents and pastors encourage people in their district and churches, who might find old church records lying around in churches or stored in private homes to be sent to Hendrix for safekeeping before they are lost or destroyed.
- 8. To work with all boards and agencies of the Conference in transferring their records and historical data to our Commission for safekeeping and preservation.
- To check with the Commission of the Little Rock Conference for programs with which
 we can cooperate, one being the formation of a Methodist Historical Society of
 Arkansas.

The final part of our report for this Annual Conference is a Policy Statement, based upon the Discipline of the United Methodist Church, the Commission would like for the North Arkansas Annual Conference to adopt:

Archival Policy Of The North Arkansas Annual Conference

The 1976 Discipline of The United Methodist Church delegates to the Annual Conference Commission on Archives and History the responsibility "to preserve the records of the Annual Conference; to collect and preserve data relating to the organization and history of the conference; to maintain a firesafe historical and archival depository and to see that all current items which obviously will have value for future history are preserved therein; to provide for the ownership of real property and to receive gifts and bequests; to assist the bishop or conference program committee in planning for the historical hour at Annual Conference sessions; and to encourage and assist the local churches in preserving their records and compiling their histories." (para. 735.1)

Definition of Archives — "Archives, as distinguished from libraries, house not primarily books, but documentary materials such as records, minutes, journals, diaries, reports, pamphlets, letters, papers, manuscripts, maps, photographs, audio visuals, recordings, and any other items, regardless of physical form or characteristic, which pertain to the current activities and the history of The United Methodist Church." (para. 1911.1)

To comply with the requirements of the Discipline of The United Methodist Church, to assist the North Arkansas Annual Conference and its local churches in recording and preserving those records having continuing historical values, the following procedures shall be followed by the appropriate agencies, officers and members of the North Arkansas Annual Conference.

- 1. The Commission on Archives and History of the North Arkansas Annual Conference shall be the official custodian of the official records (minutes, correspondence, deeds and other archival material described above) of all the Boards, Commissions, Committees and Agencies and the like. It shall also be the custodian of the records of the general officers of the Conference (District Superintendents, Program Council Staff, Staff Members, Executive Secretaries, Presidents of Boards and Agencies, and the like). And it shall continue to be the custodian of the records of all closed and abandoned churches.
- 2. The Annual Conference and each of its boards, commissions, committees, agencies and the like shall make certain that its activities are adequately recorded. These records should document the policies, programs and actions of each organizational unit, including initiation, planning, adoption, and implementation phases.
- 3. The secretary of each board, commission, committee, agency, and the like, shall deposit the inactive records and files of their respective organization to the Conference Archives.
- 4. No archival materials shall be destroyed without the approval of the Commission on Archives and History.
- 5. All archival materials, except the active files of each agency shall be deposited with the Commission Archivist and placed in the Arkansas Room of the Hendrix College Library. The archivist shall on request furnish to the Commission on Archives and History an updated inventory of all such materials.
- 6. Where records contain information of a confidential nature, restrictions may be placed on their use at the time of deposit in the Archives.
- 7. All material in the Archives, subject to any restrictions which may have been placed upon them, shall be available for research or for the use of the responsible officers of the Conference and subject to the approval of the Chairman of the Agency whose records they are, Chairman of Archives Commission, or Archivist. They may not be taken from their place of deposit except by written consent of the board or agency whose records they are, Archives Commission or Archivist.
- 8. It is to be understood that the Commission on Archives and History is but the custodian of these records. They remain the property of the Board or Agency depositing them.
- 9. Ministers and laypersons possessing personal or official records, artifacts, or other materials pertaining to the history of the North Arkansas Conference, including any of its predecessors, or to any of the boards and agencies are encouraged to deposit or bequeath such records, artifacts, or materials to the Conference Archives Depository.
- 10. Local churches and pastors are to assume the responsibility for maintaining and safeguarding all permanent records of the local church (charge and church conference records, administrative board and council on ministries minutes, membership records, and local church history and artifacts). Local churches and pastors are to be responsible for the preservation of these items. A current inventory of all such materials shall be filed with the Commission on Archives and History.
- Merged churches shall maintain records of their predecessor churches. No active church may give away or dispose of its permanent records except to the Conference Archives.

- 12. The records of all closed or abandoned churches of the Conference which have not been accepted for safekeeping by another local church or district office, shall be transferred to the Conference Archives.
- 13. In connection with the program for maintaining a depository for, and the servicing of, inactive records of the conference, as outlined above, the Commission on Archives and History hopes to provide in the future, as it gains the proper storage containers, for the fumigation and restoration of records, arrangement of records in archival containers according to provenance, the creating of finding aids and the conducting of record inventories of the Conference, boards and agencies and local church levels.

COMMITTEE ON POLICY AND REVIEW

The Committee on Policy and Review, after investigation and careful study of the matters, makes the following recommendations:

- I. In the interest of maintaining the most exemplary sense of stewardship possible at the level of the Annual Conference, it is recommended that:
 - 1. Travel allowance shall be fifteen cents (\$.15) per mile.
 - 2. Motel allowance shall be fifteen dollars (\$15.00) per day.
 - 3. Meal allowances shall be two dollars (\$2,00) per meal.
 - 4. All boards and agencies highly encourage: (1) carpooling, (2) block rental of motel facilities, (3) use of conference, camp or local church facilities when possible, (4) consider assignment of meal refunds to UMCOR, (5) use conference telephone calls if business can be completed at lesser expense.
 - All vouchers for travel, meals, lodging and other board expenses be in within 30 days of incurred bill.
 - 6. We recommend that for meetings held out of state that annual conference boards and agencies consider sending not more than two persons if air travel is involved. When it becomes essential or important to send more than two persons to an out-of-state meeting, we recommend that the board or agency chairman and the Conference Council Director confer and plan travel arrangements that will take into consideration economy of time and finances. We further recommend a per-diem allowance of up to \$36.00 a day (\$30.00 for room and \$6.00 for meals) for out-of-state meetings.

These rules shall apply to official United Methodist meetings only—meetings planned and sponsored by a board or agency of the United Methodist Church.

We further recommend that travel and room and board expenses to meetings not planned and sponsored by United Methodist boards and agencies not be funded by conference funds. All of the above policies shall become effective June 1, 1979.

- II. In the kindred spirit we felt at the time of the merger between the Southwest Conference and the North Arkansas Conference, and although the date for quotas established by the merger document is past, it is recommended that:
 - 1. The bishop consider the selection of a black for the District Superintendency at the earliest possible date.
 - 2. The Annual Conference elect some ethnics as full delegates to either the coming Jurisdictional Conference or the General Conference.
 - 3. The Annual Conference adopt the policy that receipts from the sale of former Southwest Conference properties be designated to strengthen black ministries in the North Arkansas Conference.

UNITED METHODIST MEN

"United Methodist Men shall be a creative, supportive fellowship of men who seek to know Jesus Christ, to grow spiritually and to seek daily his will, and whose primary purpose is to bring Jesus Christ into the lives of men and into all their relationships."

The following activities and events are being planned and implemented in the conference:

.. Toll free WATS line—The National Association of Conference Presidents of United Methodist Men and the Upper Room have installed a toll free line (#1-800-251-2468) to the Living Prayer Center to handle prayer requests from people throughout the United States, Canada, and Mexico. The North Arkansas Conference United Methodist Men contributed \$700.00 to help finance the WATS line.

Mr. Lloyd Stone of Conway is the Conference Prayer Advocate.

- 2. Organize an active district organization of United Methodist Men in each district in the conference.
- Conduct a district workshop to train officers of local organizations of United Methodist Men in each district.
- 4. Assist with organization and chartering of new local church units of Methodist Men throughout the conference as well as assisting units currently organized to strengthen their local organizations and recertify them annually.
- 5. Conduct the North Arkansas United Methodist Men's Retreat at Mt. Sequoyah on August 4 and 5, 1979. The Retreat in 1978 was really a mountaintop spiritual experience.
- Cooperate with the Area Ingathering which will climax its activities in November, 1979 in Little Rock.

Current conference officers are: Charles Mabry, President of Batesville; Lloyd Stone, Vice-President of Conway; Jim Lane, Secretary of North Little Rock; and Bill Phillips, Treasurer of Paragould.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

"The organized unit of UNITED METHODIST WOMEN shall be a community of women whose PURPOSE is to know God and to experience freedom as whole persons through Jesus Christ; to develop a creative, supportive fellowship; and to expand concepts of mission through participation in the global ministries of the Church."

Within the areas of the three sections of the above stated PURPOSE, United Methodist Women continue to work toward its implementation as follows:

Section One—Area of spiritual growth and personal enrichment

- a) Bible study on wholeness, Revelation, and on the Parables.
- b) Establishing a theological base for program and action.
- c) Participation in retreats.
- d) Devotionals and theologizing at every Conference event.
- e) Emphasize on lifestyle assessments.

Section Two-Area of a caring, supportive community

- a) Support of membership development in the local unit by Conference Mission Team itinerating the Districts with officer training and other helps in programming.
- b) Good Neighbor and Shepherdess programs for local units within the Districts.
- c) Supporting programs for the aging and promoting the film, "Minnie Remembers" (available from the Council Office)
- d) Affirming the International Year of the Child and establishing a Conference Coordinator for Child Advocacy.
- e) Acceptance for study and implementation a New Charter for Racial Justice Policies.
- f) Networking resources for battered women.
- g) Support for women clergy and women in decision-making processes of the Church.
- h) Working for the ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment.

Section Three—Area of Christian involvement and Global mission

- a) Pledge to Missions of \$123,600 (includes \$3,000 missionary support on behalf of Percy and Estelita Brown). Approximately 60% of our Conference pledge to missions goes to the National and World Divisions of the General Board of Global Ministries for the Church's mission projects.
- b) Participation in a state-wide legislative training event.
- c) Study and action in the areas of Criminal Justice, Human Rights, and the Middle East.
- d) Seminar on Human Rights at New York City in September for local women across the Conference.

The Annual Meeting, November 3, 1979, at Hendrix College will be the BIG EVENT of the year for all United Methodist Women. The theme of the meeting is geared toward making the PURPOSE an exciting reality in shaping the future.

COMMITTEE ON STRUCTURE

Since the approval of the new Conference structure in 1975, there have been numerous changes and amendments in the structure. An updated copy of the Conference structure will be printed and distributed by the Council on Ministries office.

The Committee on Structure wishes to reaffirm an action of the North Arkansas Annual Conference at its 1978 session. Recorded in the minutes in the 1978 Journal (page 62) is the recommendation that "Aldersgate, Inc. will be related to the North Arkansas Conference through the Committee of Health and Welfare of the Conference Board of Global Ministries." This recommendation was passed but is not reflected as a structural change on page 164 of the 1978 Journal.

In regard to our study of the structure during 1978 we wish to make the following recommendations:

- We recommend the deletion of the section in the structure concerning the Episcopal Residence Committee.
- 2. We recommend that the committee known as the Conference Committee on Camps and Conferences be changed to Conference Committee on Outdoor Ministries.
- 3. Addition to Part IV., Council of the Professional Ministry

Committee On Chaplaincies

- A. This Committee shall be composed of all the active duty Chaplains of the Conference endorsed by the Division of Chaplains and Related Ministries, as well as six ministers in full connection who have served as Chaplains. These six members shall be nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Conference each quadrennium. The chairperson of the Committee on Chaplaincies shall be elected by its own members.
- B. The functions of the Committee on Chaplaincies are:
 - 1. To act as an advisory agency for the Bishop, the Cabinet and the Annual Conference on all matters pertaining to the various Chaplaincies in which the members of the Conference serve.
 - 2. To serve as an initial screening committee for all applicants who are asking for ecclesiastical endorsement from the Division of Chaplains and Related Ministries of the United Methodist Church.
 - 3. To facilitate the re-entry of Chaplains from active duty in the military and civilian Chaplaincies to the Annual Conference for appointment.
- C. This committee will function as a Committee of the Council on the Professional Ministries as a minor committee.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

- I. Articles of Incorporation
 - A. The Board of Trustees of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church is organized and incorporated according to the provisions of Section V, Paragraph 2410 of the Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church, 1976.
 - B. The Articles of Incorporation were issued on July 25, 1959, and the Charter of Incorporation is recorded in the office of the Circuit Clerk of Sebastian County in Fort Smith, Arkansas, in Book E, Page 69.
- II. Execution of Legal Documents
 - A. The President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees are authorized to sign legal documents of the Board of Trustees.
 - B. Legal documents executed must be a "directive action" of the Annual Conference to the Board of Trustees in compliance with the Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church, 1976.
- III. Abandoned and/or Discontinued Church Property
 - A. The Board of Trustees respectively requests that the District Superintendents, pastors, and District Boards of Missions be informed as to the various provisions of Section V, Paragraph 2410 et.seq. as to Annual Conference property and join with

the Conference Board of Trustees in their effort to have a record of all properties within the bounds of the Conference, in which the United Methodist Church has an interest.

B. That each District Superintendent provide the Secretary of the Board of Trustees with a description of all property within his/her district that is not being used by the United Methodist Church; and as to whether or not Annual Conference action has been taken to (1) discontinue use of; or (2) abandon.

C. Sales and Transfers

- The sale of the property of the Bailey Chapel United Methodist Church, Faulkner County, Arkansas was consummated in accord with Resolution IV-A of the 1978 Session of the North Arkansas Annual Conference Minutes.
- 2. The sale of the property of the Hill Creek United Methodist Church, Conway County, Arkansas, was consummated in accord with Resolution IV-B in the Minutes of the 1978 Session of the North Arkansas Annual Conference.
- 3. The sale of a single lot on Highway 287, Conway County, Arkansas, owned by the United Methodist Church was consummated in accord with Resolution IV-D in the Minutes of the 1978 Session of the North Arkansas Annual Conference.
- 4. The property of the Watalula United Methodist Church, Franklin County, Arkansas, was transferred to the First United Methodist Church in Ozark, Arkansas in accord with Resolution IV-C of the Minutes of the 1978 Session of the North Arkansas Annual Conference.
- 5. The property of the Weldon United Methodist Church, Jackson County, Arkansas, was declared abandoned and sold to the residents of the community of Weldon for use as a community center in accord with Paragraph 2441.4 of the 1976 Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church.

IV. Resolutions

- A. Be it resolved that the property of the Weldon United Methodist Church, Jackson County, Arkansas, be declared abandoned by the North Arkansas Conference in accord with the provisions of Paragraph 2441.4 of the Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church 1976. The Trustees are empowered to sell the property with the proceeds being turned over to the Committee on Church Building and Location of the Paragould District for use in improving and/or extending the property of the United Methodist Church within the bounds of the District.
- B. Be it resolved that the property of the Crossroads United Methodist Church (not including the building or the cemetery, 13 acres more or less) be declared abandoned in accord with Paragraph 2441.4 of the 1976 Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church and that the Board of Trustees be empowered to sell the property at fair market value and that the proceeds be turned over to the Committee on Church Building and Location of the Paragould District for use in improving and/or extending the property of the United Methodist Church within the bounds of the district.
- C. Be it resolved that the property of the Williford United Methodist Church, Sharp County, Arkansas, be declared abandoned and that the Board of Trustees of the North Arkansas Conference be empowered to transfer the property to the Williford Cemetery Association, a non-profit corporation, for a minimal charge of \$250.00 with the following restrictions:
 - 1. The property shall be used as a chapel for the Williford County Cemetery Association and shall be used for no form of divine worship other than that needed for the Williford Cemetery Association to carry out the function for which it is organized.
 - Should the property cease to be used by the Williford Cemetery Association in accord with this agreement or if the Williford Cemetery Association cease to function as an organization, the property shall be returned to the Board of Trustees of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church or its successors.

The funds received from this transfer will be turned over to the Committee on Building and Location for use in extending and/or improving the property of the United Methodist Church within the bounds of the Paragould District.

- D. Be it resolved that the property of the Mountain Springs United Methodist Church of the Batesville District, located in Lonoke County, Arkansas, be declared abandoned and the Board of Trustees of the North Arkansas Conference be empowered to transfer the property to the trustees of the Mountain Springs Cemetery Association, a state chartered non-profit corporation, with the restriction in the deed to provide that if the Mountain Springs Cemetery Association be dissolved or cease to function in the intended purpose of the Mountain Springs Association, the title to the property shall revert to the trustees of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church or their successors.
- E. Be it resolved that the property of the Iuka United Methodist Church, Batesville District, located in Izard County, Arkansas, be declared abandoned by the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church and the trustees be empowered to sell the property with the proceeds from the sale going to the Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Batesville District to be used in the work of the Committee.
- V. Budget Request from the Council on Finance and Administration is \$500.00 for 1980. Muriel Peters, Chairman

THE ARKANSAS METHODIST, BOARD OF MANAGERS

I. Report

The current status of the Arkansas Methodist may best be reported by making a brief reference to the past.

Five years ago our paper faced a crucial turning point in its history. The loss of the **Louisiana Methodist** after a 25-year partnership left our publication with a one-third reduction in revenue and a similar loss in circulation. The immediate result was the necessity of emergency funding from our two Annual Conferences and the need to develop a totally new plan of financing the paper.

Such a bold new proposal—to make the paper available to every United Methodist of the state through an appointment plan to local churches—was adopted by both Conferences in 1974, to begin in January, 1975.

The effect of the plan was immediate: the first year the paper's circulation increased by 93% (from approximately 17,000 to 33,000) with only an 11% increase in cost.

Also, the reception of the new plan by the local churches of the two Conferences was especially gratifying. The first year, 93.36% of the total apportionment was paid; the second, 97.93%; the third, 95.33%; and the fourth (1978), 96.07% — making the average of the four years, 96.42%. We believe that this is a marvelous response to the plan and we are grateful to the churches for such support.

But to keep the paper "in the black" has been a continuing struggle. Having experienced three years of very difficult and uncertain times—through which we were helped by our two Councils on Finance and Administration and other friends—our Board was determined to operate within its budget and work to overcome a long pattern of deficit spending.

Two years ago that stance began to show results. We were able to report to you in 1977 that we had completed one of the paper's most successful years in its recent history in terms of management of resources. We finished the year with a balance in the bank—the first year in the previous twelve that we did not have to borrow money to "pay out" at the end of the year.

That success was not achieved, however, without having to make sacrifices. We reduced the paper from 12 to 8 pages; reduced the staff from five to four, and were not able to keep pace with what we felt were deserved salary increases for our staff.

Concerning our financial status at the end of 1978, we report to you that we finished the year just barely in the black. Again such accomplishments were made possible only by continued economies, such as the delay of much needed and deserved staff salary increases.

The full impact of inflation came upon the paper early this year when increasing postage and printing costs forced a reduction to a bi-weekly publication schedule. Facing an anticipated deficit of \$16,000 by the end of 1979, the paper sought without success, supplemental aid from private sources. It then informed the two CFA's, at a February 13 joint meeting, of the impending shortages and reported that contingency plans were under consideration by the staff. On February 24 the paper was notified by the Council on Finance and Administration of the Little Rock Conference that it "must live within its expected income for 1979 without a deficit and that the CFA will make no further gifts from other funds," further stating, "the funds we supplemented your operating budget in the past are at the point where we can no further with good conscience and good management draw on them."

Board and staff members felt, as stated by Chairman Jim Lane in the paper's issue of March 15, that "in order for us to be fiscally responsible to our two Annual Conferences, we are left with no choice but to begin the reduced schedule as soon as possible." The new biweekly schedule was instituted with the issue of April 5.

Concerning the future, the members of our Board's executive committee and our editor have been working with a recently-named Area Task Force on Communications, named by the Committees on Communication of the two Conferences. That task force has been charged with the responsibility of bringing to this year's Annual Conference sessions "recommendations concerning the Arkansas Methodist newspaper and its relationship to the total communications program of the Arkansas Area."

II. Recommendations

- 1. The Board of Managers continues to recommend that the costs of publication of the Arkansas Methodist be apportioned to the local churches, as determined by the Cabinet and Councils on Finance and Administration.
- 2. The Board recommends for 1980 a total of \$112,200.00 be apportioned to the two Annual Conferences (to be divided equally between the two Conferences or as determined by the Cabinets and Councils on Finance and Administration).
- 3. The 1980 Plan of Publication is as follows: We will publish 26 issues (every two weeks) of 12 pages each—total pages for the year 312. We feel that the larger paper each issue will allow for expanding some of the popular features of the publication. Additionally the new "deadline" schedule will allow for more complete and comprehensive coverage of "news" issues prior to publication.
 - 4. The "Plan-of-Circulation" proposal is as follows:
 - a. Any clergy member of the Annual Conference AND any member of a local United Methodist Church who requests it. (We suggest that these requests be made in writing or by phone to the local church to which the person is related.) NOTE: Postal regulations require the following from each church whose members receive the paper:
 - (1) The completion of a form, furnished to the church by the paper, certifying that "subscription" costs for the papers received by members of that church are paid by a portion of its members' contributions to their church. That form must be filed in the paper's office to meet Second Class Mail requirements.
 - (2) Some payment, within the first six months of the year, of the Arkansas Methodist apportionment item. Postal authorities inform us that if no such payment is received in that time we must remove that church's members from our mailing list.

PLEASE NOTE: The Board and editorial staff are totally depending upon local church pastors and leaders to see that these guidelines are followed. We urge these leaders to help avoid waste by not sending names and addresses of those who do not request the paper, yet at the same time encouraging all who will to take the paper and read it. (The amount which a local church is apportioned by its district for the Arkansas Methodist is NOT determined by the number of papers sent to its members.)

- b. Conference-connected persons (when submitted by the appropriate authorities, along with their correct address):
 - (1) Retired ministers or their surviving spouse.
 - (2) Seminary students.
 - (3) Ministers in connectional appointments.
- c. Any subscriptions not qualifying in any of the above categories (Para. 4a and 4b) will be \$5.00 per year.
- 5. Every-Family Plan:

When the publishing schedule has been confirmed following Annual Conferences in 1979, the paper will announce specifics of this plan.

6. Local Church Special Edition Plan:

When the publishing schedule has been confirmed following Annual Conferences in 1979, the paper will announce specifics of this plan.

Report And Recommendation Of The Arkansas Area Task Force On Communications To The

1979 Little Rock And North Arkansas Annual Concerences

In the last few years there has been a renewal of interest and appreciation in the importance of communications by the United Methodist Church. The 1976 General Conference authorized bold new ventures into Mass Communications that are proving to be helpful to the United Methodist people, and in reaching out to others. Never before has the call been so clear and timely for us to interpret and share the work of the church both internally to our own members, and externally to those outside the church. As Jesus so often reminded us, what was sufficient in the past is not always adequate for the present or for the future. A modest appraisal is that our church is twenty years behind the times in communications. "New wineskins" are required to hold the "new wine" of today!

For several months, the Executive Committees of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Communication Committees, the Executive Committee of the Board of Managers of the Arkansas Methodist, and our Conference Staffs have been working on a comprehensive program of communication for presentation to our two 1979 Annual Conferences. The scope of the work has been awesome. Many plans and suggestions have been discussed and developed at length, but we share with you here the very best proposal we can develop to begin to move us into the 1980's with a comprehensive communications program.

Structure

To begin with, a structure must be developed to carry the program that is needed. Presently, our various communication structures are neither well coordinated, clarified, nor adequately linked. Thus, we recommend "that the Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conference structures be amended to include the following, and that any articles presently in the Annual Conference Structure that are in conflict with the following be deleted:

"A Joint Committee on Communications shall be established and made up of the total membership of the Little Rock Conference Council Committee on Communications and the North Arkansas Committee on Communications and Publishing Interests. The Joint Committee shall be jointly chaired by the two Chairpersons of the two constituent Communication Committees. The Joint Committee shall administer the adopted Area adopted Area Communication Program of the Arkansas Area. Standing Sub-Committees of the Joint Committee on Communication shall include a Sub-Committee on the Arkansas Methodist, which shall act as the Board of Managers for the Arkansas Methodist, and a Sub-Committee on the Arkansas Area Resource Center. All standing

Sub-Committees shall be nominated by the Joint Committee on Communications to the two Conference Committees on Nominations and elected by the respective Annual Conferences. Nominees may include persons who are not members of the Joint Committee on Communications. Other Sub-Committees may be established in order to accomplish the Area Program and may include Sub-Committees on Media Outreach, Interpretation and Promotion, etc. All standing Sub-Committees shall be composed of three lay persons and three clergy persons from each Annual Conference divided into three classes of two persons each (one lay, one clergy) with each class serving a three-year term. The joint chairpersons of the Joint Committee on Communications shall be ex-officio members with vote on all standing Sub-Committees."

Comprehensive Program of Communication

For any program of communication to be comprehensive, it must include a wide variety of elements. The Area Communication Proposal for 1980 is spelled out in the Pre-Conference Report to the North Arkansas Conference and in the printed supplement of the Little Rock Conference's Member's Workbook. Professional persons with expertise in the media, national United Methodist Communication staff, and Arkansas clergy and lay persons have worked together to develop this Area Communication Program.

Elements included are the Arkansas Methodist, a United Methodist News Service, programs of interpretation, promotion, public relations, Area Resource Center, Area Production Center, and training opportunities for communication skill development. The

results expected are:

1) a strong weekly Arkansas Methodist newspaper,

2) a better contact with and use of the media,

3) an increased visibility of our church at work,

- 4) an awareness and appreciation of the connectional United Methodist Church,
- 5) an understanding of our benevolent funds and the ministry they support,

6) a supportive Area Resource Center,

7) better quality in make-up and printing of promotional materials, and

8) training of persons in communication skill development.

The important fact to keep in mind in the whole proposal is that we are now moving towards a comprehensive program of communication. We are now creating "a new creature"; we are now turning a new corner and we have had nothing in our past with which we can compare.

Recommendations

1. That we publish a weekly Arkansas Methodist using the facilities of the United

Methodist Reporter.

- 2. That we publish 12,000 copies of the Arkansas Methodist each week. Twelve issues (once a month) will have a total of six pages each (including 3 pages of local news) and forty issues will have a total of four pages each (including one page of local news). It should be noted that one page printed by the United Methodist Reporter is the equivalent of two of our current pages.
- 3. That the Distribution Schedule of the Arkansas Methodist be as follows:

a. Each Church shall receive a minimum of five copies.

- b. That each church be requested to submit the total number of copies needed to supply their church families who specifically wish to receive the Arkansas Methodist. These totals are to be sent to the North Arkansas Council on Ministries office and are to be used as a basis for determining distribution in the North Arkansas Conference.
- c. Where our initial distribution is inadequate to meet these needs, the Council on Ministries is to develop a program to assure that no church family be excluded because of subscription costs. Local churches may be called upon to assist in this program.
- d. All retired ministers, widows of ministers, seminary students, etc., will receive the

paper at no charge.

- e. Additional subscriptions will be available at a standard subscription fee (around \$5.00 in 1980) for other persons who desire to receive the paper.
- 4. That the budget for this Arkansas Methodist be as follows:

Printing & mailing of paper	48,500.00

5. That each Annual Conference cut its present apportionment for the Arkansas Methodist from \$56,100 (total of \$112,200) to \$53,500 (total of \$107,000). It is further recommended that each Annual Conference fund the total communications program (as described below):

Total Cost of Area Communication Plan for 1980:

NOTE: In the Little Rock Annual Conference, the \$11,035 figure is already included in the Conference Council on Ministries budget. In the North Arkansas Annual Conference, the \$11,035 figure is to be funded through an increase in the Mass Communications apportionment.

- 6. That the administrative structure for the Area Communication Program be as follows:
 - a) Area Director of Communications
 - who is a member of Area Council on Ministries Staff (as assigned by the Area Steering Committee)
 - have overall supervision of total communications program and staff
 - work with the Joint Committee on Communications in the accomplishment of the Area Communications Program
 - b) Editor of Arkansas Methodist
 - work under supervision of the Sub-Committee of the Arkansas Methodist
 - publish Arkansas Methodist
 - serve as United Methodist News Officer for Arkansas Area (see Area Communication Program in Pre-Conference Report)
 - relate to the Conference Councils on Ministries through the Area Director of Communications
 - c) Associate Editor (to serve until retirement in July, 1980)
 - d) Secretary to the Editor and A-V Librarian for Area Resource Center NOTE: The other employee now working in the Arkansas Methodist may be employed as the Area Production Assistant as described in the Area Communication Program (see Pre-Conference Report).
- 7. That the Joint Committee of Communications and Area Director of Communications be authorized by the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences to meet following the sessions of the 1979 Annual Conference to negotiate any changes made by either or both of the Annual Conferences that are not substantial changes. It is understood that substantial disagreement in the plans adopted by the two Annual Conferences would be non-negotiable and thus, a Comprehensive Area Communications Program not a possibility.
- 8. That the Joint Committee on Communications be asked to evaluate each element of the adopted Area Communication Program within one year of its inception and make any recommended changes or amendments to the plan to subsequent sessions of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conferences for their consideration and action.

Benefits of the Area Communication Plan

1. The development of a viable Comprehensive Arkansas Communication system.

- 2. Better utilization of staff personnel with more flexibility and higher output level due to better job analysis and accountability.
- 3. Provides better resourcing and promotion of local church, District, and Annual Conference programs and interests.
- 4. Definite financial economy in publishing a weekly Arkansas Methodist.
- 5. Greatly enhances Arkansas Methodist outreach and witness to our state through the use of media and other forms of communication.
- By using the facilities of the United Methodist Reporter to publish the Arkansas Methodist, the following additional benefits may be seen:
 - a. A high emphasis on Arkansas news will be retained and an even more comprehensive coverage of national news will be achieved.
 - b. Our Arkansas Methodist will return to a weekly newspaper and many local churches may choose to purchase their own "church page" for their own publicity and news.
 - c. Better financial planning may occur since printing and mailing costs are guaranteed by the United Methodist Reporter before budgets are adopted by the Annual Conference. This will eliminate the necessity of coming back in the middle of the year for additional funding due to unexpected increases in mailing or production costs.
 - d. Low subscription rates may be continued. Presently, the United Methodist Reporter has the lowest per-unit subscription rate of any 52-issue church news publication in the country.
 - e. Using the facility of the United Methodist Reporter to publish our Arkansas Methodist allows us to realign staff time and responsibilities so as to present a more comprehensive communication program.

Conclusion

We appreciate your consideration of these concerns and ask for your best judgment and support as we embark on a comprehensive venture in communications in Arkansas.

The accepted allocation from the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church for 1979 is \$5,000.00. The Asking Amount for 1980 remains the same. NOTE: Any increase you may be able to make will apply to proposed program plans.

1978 Financial Report — For Your Information:

The accepted allocation for 1978 was \$4,000.00. \$491.67 was received early in the year of 1978 to apply on 1977's allocation. During 1978, \$2,947.35 was received, making a total of \$3,419.02 actually received during 1978. A contribution arrived in January 1979 of \$628.21 to apply to 1978. THUS for 1978 actually received \$3,575.56 leaving \$424.44 not received toward the \$4,000.00 allocated for 1978.

ARKANSAS METHODIST CHILDREN'S HOME

In January of 1979 there were 105 children within the Methodist Children's Home program. All of these children were in need of an alternative to living in the home of their natural family. In some cases it is the child's disruptive behavior which makes it impossible for him or her to live in the home of their parents. In other cases it is problems within the family which makes it necessary for an agency such as MCH to provide care for these children. The purpose of the Methodist Children's Home is to provide care for these children with this suitable alternative to home and to work with the child and the child's family in order to make the most suitable long range plan for the child. These plans may be returning to the home of the natural family or some other type of permanent living arrangement.

These children were placed in the part of the Methodist Children's Home system which was able to meet their needs the most appropriately. Our residential program in Little Rock housed 42 children in January of 1979. Our group home program which has individual cottages throughout the state had 37 children living in this arrangement. Our newly developed foster care program allowed us to have 13 children living in foster homes and we had 13 children in the other parts of our program. The different program segments have been developed to give the organization the ability to provide a range of services to the children who need a very structured to a not very structured living arrangement and to be able to work with children who are going to need an alternative living situation for either a short or a long period of time.

All of the children within the Methodist Children's Home system have an opportunity to live as "normally" as possible. They attend regular public schools and churches in the community. They visit with their families on regular intervals and participate in extracurricular activities such as attending movies, ball games, etc. At the same time that we are providing an alternative living arrangement, our staff works with children in any area which is causing them problems and we attempt to work with the natural families, as much as possible, so that they might be able to resume care of their children at some later date.

During the year of 1978 this work with families and children was illustrated in the fact that of the 93 children discharged from the Methodist Children's Home, 71 of the children

returned to the care of a parent or relative, was adopted, or reached majority and was able to function independently. It is the two-pronged approach of the Methodist Children's Home: a) an alternative living arrangement, and b) intensive casework, which has allowed families the opportunity to get back together.

CHRISTIAN CIVIC FOUNDATION OF ARKANSAS

Alcohol-Narcotics Education Program—The 1978-79 school year was the seventeenth year in which the Alcohol-Narcotics Education Program was presented in the public schools. 95 appointments for our Educational Assistant were scheduled, 65 for classrooms, 30 for assemblies, 28 for Junior and Senior High Schools, and 67 for elementary schools. Since the drug abuse arena has shifted to the elementary grades, we have expanded from 37% to 75% in elementary school appointments.

We continue to serve the public schools without any financial charges. Any loss of revenue would endanger this program.

Alcoholic Beverage Control Board: We continue to represent all communities and individuals who request our support before the ABC Board in opposition to applications for permits of any type in wet and dry counties.

Local Option Elections—We provided completely revised Local Option Handbooks, mimeographed summaries of Arkansas Statutes, sample copies of Local Option petitions, directions for using them, copies of a newsletter containing all related materials to all individuals and communities who requested our assistance in 1978. These involved Boone, Hempstead, Jefferson, Marion, Sharp, Pulaski, Conway, Phillips, Baxter, Van Buren, and Craighead Counties. All counties threatened by or involved in Local Option elections were in North Arkansas.

The General Assembly—Rev. Don Hook represented the Foundation as Legislative Information Assistant, and will make a verbal report to the Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors on March 19.

The Christian Citizen—Three issues of The Christian Citizen were published in 1978. We anticipate publication of three issues of this quarterly newsletter in 1979.

Finances—Total income for the year was \$52,218.94, with disbursements of \$51,931.95. The North Arkansas Conference contributed \$11,599.01 of the Methodist total of \$24,608.08. Baptist giving totaled \$23,358.66. Baptist giving for 1979 includes \$20,000 from the Convention, and approximately \$6,000 from local churches. Other churches gave \$265. Individuals, memorials, and other income totaled \$3,987.20.

The new budget for 1979 totals \$61,794, as compared with the 1978 budget total of \$55,208.

We deeply appreciate the financial support of every local church in the North Arkansas Conference. We respectfully request that the North Arkansas Conference continue to support the Christian Civic Foundation in 1980.

Twentieth Birthday—The Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors was held on Monday, March 19, at First United Methodist Church, Eighth and Center, Little Rock. Many Board members, friends, and supporters joined with us as we made plans for the future program of civic righteousness in the areas of alcohol, narcotics, gambling, and obscenity.

This report covers the highlights of the personal services of three staff members in carrying out the program during the past year. They are the Executive Director, Rev. Edward W. Harris; the Educational Assistant, Mr. Ronnie P. Sparks; and the Office Secretary, Mrs. Beverly B. Williams. The Executive Director will complete seven years of service June 1st; our Educational Assistant completed three years in February of 1979; and our Office Secretary completed fourteen years in December of 1978.

HENDRIX COLLEGE

Hendrix College is one of 107 United Methodist colleges and universities throughout the United States. Our heritage as a United Methodist college is one which says that education is open to all, one which avoids narrow sectarianism, and one which is cosmopolitan and ecumenical in nature. It is a heritage in which the aim of education is to free persons from

ignorance and parochialism and from the limitations of a particular age, upbringing, or circumstance.

As a church-related liberal arts college, there is really one basic concern. It is a passionate concern for the development of the whole person. The single question we ask ourselves is, "What kind of human being do we want to see emerge?" The fact that we ask this question separates us from state-supported universities, which by virtue of their being a creation of the political system are prevented from asking this basically religious question.

For a century, Hendrix has responded to this question in a distinctive way. The response has been something like this:

First, Hendrix understands itself to be a learning community in the best traditions of the academy. In that tradition, a liberal arts education has always meant an education in which students learn to do as well as to be. It means an education which prepares persons for useful careers in society. From the beginning, this has been the meaning of a liberal arts education in this country, and it has been the meaning at Hendrix. The invidious distinction between liberal and vocational education should be removed once and for all.

Second, Hendrix understands itself to be a faith community as that is understood within the Judeo-Christian heritage. Within this community, we recognize the Judeo-Christian ethic to be the acceptable standard of conduct, and we affirm that value choices and ethical dilemmas can only be resolved through rigorous, disciplined study informed by theological understanding, consistent with the heritage of this faith community.

One of the important reasons for the continuing strength and vitality of the College is its relationship to the United Methodist Church. It is because Hendrix is a church-related college within the Judeo-Christian tradition that we are concerned about the full development of the individual.

As the College celebrates its centennial era, Hendrix is an institution of 1000 students. The faculty is comprised of 53 full-time and 5 part-time persons, 90 percent of whom have the doctorate or the appropriate terminal degree. The physical plant is valued at \$28 million, and the value of the College's endowment stands at \$16.4 million. The College's annual operating budget is now at the level of \$5 million.

To enable every student who wishes to benefit from a Hendrix education to have that opportunity in the years ahead, we shall need to maintain the same relative dependence on each of the three revenue sources available to the College (tuition, endowment income, and current gifts). To accomplish this objective by the end of our centennial era in 1984, we shall need to increase tuition charges at least in line with the consumer price index, move the \$16.4 million endowment total to \$25 million, and increase the flow of operating gifts from approximately \$500,000 a year to more than \$800,000 a year.

The support of the United Methodist Church in Arkansas is a critical component in the financing of Hendrix since the Church has traditionally provided more than half of the gift and grant support for the current operating budget.

We want to assure you that we will do everything possible to continue to merit your confidence and support and that we will exercise good stewardship in allocating funds for the most urgent priorities of the institution in the years ahead.

LYDIA PATTERSON INSTITUTE

Lydia Patterson Institute, owned and operated by the South Central Jurisdiction through its several annual conferences, is completing its 66th year of service as part of our Church's concern for education: During the past year, we acquired the last lot that enables us to own the entire city block.

This year we experienced a slight decrease in enrollment. Nevertheless, we enrolled 579 in our regular day program. We feel the drop was the direct result of a most necessary increase in tuition. As it has been customary, better than 80% of these students come from Juarez, Mexico, and because so many of them come from Mexico, where the rate of exchange in currency is so high, we must make effort to keep tuition fees as low as possible.

Our Board of Trustees policy on Grant-in-Aid has a goal that 25% of our students be granted aid. This insures our activity in providing an education for students who otherwise

could not afford to attend school. Presently, 77 students are on Grant-in-Aid (scholarships). Additionally, every student paying the established tuition of \$450 a year receives almost a 50% subsidy in terms of average actual cost.

Some outstanding things have taken place this year. The Board of Trustees have established an Endowment and Development Committee to ensure our future financial stability. We have already been recipients of wills and 160 acres (grazing land) in Southeastern New Mexico. Several conferences of the Jurisdiction have assured their "fair share."

This has greatly enhanced our financial base as it has given us a firm base heretofore unknown to us.

There have also been good things taking place in the academic arena. Through a special grant from the National Division of the Board of Global Ministries we have brought on a Coordinator of Religious Life Activities, whose efforts have already made a pronounced difference. Also, we have added a part-time counselor. His main thrust is in career development as well as assisting students in college placement. In addition to the above named we have made other excellent additions. Five United Methodist Colleges or Universities in this Jurisdiction have provided total Scholarships for our graduates. These are McMurry, Southwestern, Lon Morris (Texas), Oklahoma City University (Oklahoma), Hendrix College (Arkansas).

We are fortunate to be in partnership with the North Arkansas Annual Conference. Through your representatives on our Board, Bishop Kenneth W. Hicks, Dr. Earl B. Carter, Rev. William P. Connell and Mrs. Mary Lou Gall, Dr. Ben Jordan and Mr. Homer Fulbright, we trust we can always address the needs of students who are attracted by what a church-related school offers. This will also take your help. With it we can help those who need us, and also train persons who can bear a positive influence in this international setting of which we are a part.

MT. SEQUOYAH ASSEMBLY

Mt. Sequoyah Assembly opened its fifty-seventh season in March of 1979. During 1978, it had 100 calendar days of occupancy, with a per day average of 94, making 9,420 resident person days. There were 1,768 commuter days of occupancy, and 24,660 meals were served. The season extends from March through November each year.

The assets of the Assembly are valued at over one million dollars, and there is no indebtedness. The Assembly belongs to the South Central Jurisdiction of the United Methodist Church. It is one of the three institutions owned by the Jurisdiction.

A part of one of the earliest buildings on the campus has been renovated, and will be ready for use during the summer and fall months. This building was originally used for classroom space, and it was a part of the original open-air-auditorium. This renovated structure will contain seven bedrooms, a like number of bathrooms, and 21 single beds.

In a special meeting on January 25, 1979, The Board of Trustees authorized the renovation of the superintendent's residence. This course was adopted in lieu of an earlier plan to build a new residence.

Maintenance and capital improvements have been made possible by the Ten Dollar Per Pastoral Charge Plan. With inflation eroding the purchasing power of the dollar, it was recognized that this amount must be raised to \$15.00 per pastoral charge. The trustees voted to ask for this amount at their meeting in October of 1978. The amount contributed by the North Arkansas Conference during 1978 amounted to \$3,370.00, or 9.8% of the total received from the 17 conferences within the Jurisdiction. This amounted to 7.2% of all contributions received during 1978. Then, too, the annual bequest from the Edwards Estate is a vital part of the Assembly's budget for maintenance. This amounted to 9.6% of all contributions during 1978.

A 35mm filmstrip with sound cassette has been produced to give a brief history of Mt. Sequoyah Assembly, and its development. This filmstrip is available through the Conference Council Office, or you may write directly to Mt. Sequoyah Assembly, Fayetteville, AR 72701.

The daily rate per person for 1979 ranges from \$13.00 to \$15.50, and includes room, meals, health and accident insurance. Non United Methodist groups pay \$1.00 per person per day ground fee in addition to the rates listed above.

Local church and district groups are welcome to schedule retreats.

SAINT PAUL SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

In the spring of 1978 Saint Paul was chosen by the Health and Welfare Division, Board of Global Ministries, to be the recipient of a gift establishing the Oubri A. Poppele Chair in Health & Welfare Studies, with special emphasis on gerontology. This permanently endowed professorship was made possible from the estate of Miss Poppele, a United Methodist laywoman from Illinois. The Poppele Chair will offer special attention to studies and ministries with the aging in all segments of society. This gift, expected to be approximately \$700,000, establishes the first endowed Chair in the 20-year history of Saint Paul School of Theology and constitutes the largest single gift to the seminary's endowment. The earnings from the endowment gift will support a new faculty member and a new emphasis in gerontology for the seminary. Interviews for the Chair will begin in February 1979

Two new emphases in the seminary's curriculum have strengthened our training for ministry. One is a program allowing for specialization in parish development. Students who wish to specialize for ministry in a cooperative parish setting may do so by fulfilling a "Specialization in Parish Development" as a major in the Master of Divinity Program. In addition, a full year internship program in a cooperative parish setting is arranged through the Field Education Office. A second new offering is a first-year elective entitled "Practicum." This course is designed to meet needs of students in their settings for ministry.

In October 1978 an International School for Native American Ministries (ISNAM) was established on the Saint Paul campus, funded by the Division of Ordained Ministry, The United Methodist Church, yet responsible to its own Board of Directors, and working with the seminary, the latter constituting a supportive and interactive colleague. ISNAM's Executive Director is the Reverend Mr. Homer Noley, a Saint Paul graduate previously serving as Director of the Native American Program at Baker University. ISNAM will be headquartered at the seminary, but its program will include on-campus and field activities. All programs will be aimed at the strengthening of Native American studies and ministries.

During the 1977-78 academic year a faculty committee was engaged in careful research on Christian Formation at Saint Paul. As a result, the ground floor of Kresge Chapel is presently being adapted to form a space of relative silence, creating a retreat area for individuals and small groups. This Center for Christian Formation is to be seen as one of many methods and styles of Christian Formation, a number of which have been present in the life of the seminary for years. More importantly, the Center is to be used as a connecting link with the total life and mission of the seminary and the church, not as a separate or unrelated dimension of piety. The space will provide for four rooms to be used during the day for reading, study, and meditation; a seminar room for small groups; a chapel with communion table, chairs and lectern; and a small library featuring devotional classics. The Center will be available to students, faculty, clergy on retreat, and lay persons when space conversion is completed near the close of the 1978-79 academic year.

The 1978-79 school year marked the twentieth year of service for the seminary, with appropriate celebration reflecting on past, present, and future. During the year a 1980's Planning Committee began its task of researching and exploring key issues for the next decade. The committee is responsible to the Board of Trustees.

In last year's summary the forthcoming appointment of Dr. Julius E. Del Pino to the Martin Luther King, Jr. Living Professorship was announced. This appointment of the first full-time ethnic faculty person in the history of the school is now a fact, and Dr. Del Pino is teaching as Assistant Professor of Church Administration and Field Education.

With a Master of Divinity enrollment virtually identical to the previous year, our enrollment profile includes these facts and figures: Missouri 45; Kansas 27; Iowa 14; Arkansas 10; Nebraska 7; and the remaining students from 11 other states. 21% (37) of the students are women and 79% (137) men; 82% are United Methodist from 24 Annual Conferences; 150 students are engaged in some form of ministry, including 70 appointed to pastoral charges and 64 on church staffs in a four state area.

Once again the Ministerial Education Fund has provided indispensable support to the seminary for the training of ministers, constituting approximately 30% of the seminary's income. The strength of the MEF plan is that each United Methodist member can participate in the financial undergirding of ministerial training. On behalf of the 174 students, and all faculty, administrative, and staff persons, I express enthusiastic appreciation for the MEF from the conference.

We look forward each year to seeing many of you on our campus, and always to receiving your concerns and prayers.

SCARRITT COLLEGE FOR CHRISTIAN WORKERS

Scarritt College is owned by the General Conference and operated on behalf of the entire United Methodist Church. This ownership becomes a reality only as Scarritt is able to establish a working relationship with every annual conference of the Church. It is the local church and service agencies created by the Church which Scarritt serves by providing an educated and competent lay ministry, and it is to the Church that Scarritt turns to find qualified students and financial and moral support.

The College has a unique mission which aligns it in partnership rather than competition with liberal arts colleges and theological seminaries related to every annual conference. The purpose of Scarritt College is to educate lay persons for professional and volunteer Christian ministries in the Church and society. Three inter-related programs achieve this purpose. (1) The degree program consists of upper division undergraduate studies leading to the B. A. degree in drama, religion, behavioral science, and social welfare. For this program Scarritt recruits junior college graduates interested in completing their professional studies in preparation for diaconal (lay) ministries. The Master of Arts degree—in Christian education, Church music education, Church and community, and evangelism—is for those seeking certification and consecration as diaconal ministers.

(2) The Center of Continuing Education and (3) the Center of Women's Studies provide short courses year-round on campus and in various parts of the nation. These courses are for the general laity, lay professionals, and the ordained ministry.

The faculty includes twenty full-time and seventeen part-time teachers whose expertise is consistent with Scarritt's stated purpose. The College is strategically located in proximity

to several United Methodist general board headquarters and is also a member of the Nashville University Center with Vanderbilt University, Peabody College, Fisk University, and Meharry Medical College.

Students and participants in Scarritt's programs come from throughout the nation and from several other countries every year. Scarritt's 4,000 alumni live and work throughout the world.

Scarritt College is dedicated to the mission of Jesus Christ as carried out through the Church. The College is profoundly appreciative of the interest and support of this annual conference.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

The One Hundred Forty-Fourth Session of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church was called to order by Bishop Kenneth W. Hicks on May 23, 1979, at 9:00 a.m. at the First United Methodist Church in Fort Smith, Arkansas. Bishop Hicks, in his morning devotion, said that Jesus calls upon us to speak and act in daring ways. Our Bishop stated that after the Crucifixion the disciples moved out into the world breaking down barriers, showing compassion, and loving people.

Bishop Hicks' patience and deep understanding never waned, as hours of debate and lines of delegates formed in the sacred aisles in front of microphones, feeling as free as church members on Sunday morning dozing away in comfortable sanctuaries. If, upon entering the Kingdom of Heaven we hear a voice say, "I want to make an amendment," we will know Wayne Jarvis is there.

Elaine Hicks moved among us at various dinners, Conference sessions, and hither and yon, brightening our tired and weary selves. More and more her rich sense of humor and her genuineness is becoming a vital and relevant part of our lives. The better we know our Bishop and his life's companion, the more we are assured that they were meant for each other.

Our deep gratitude goes to Dr. George Ivey for his warmth and friendship that has meant so much to so many of us this week, and has meant so much to so many down across the years. Our gratitude to Aaron Barling for his much needed help and to Loretta Parker who no doubt will enter Heaven through the back door—the service entrance. Our thanks to Tom Clarke, Business Manager, and to Paul Bell, Head Usher, for their help in causing things to run smoothly.

Dr. Barry Bailey inspired us anew that sometimes in the lives of people there is little enough love and warmth in the world and too much coldness and bitterness, and the hearts and the souls of people cry out for someone to listen and someone to talk to when life is tumbling in. Dr. Bailey's grim humor caused his sermons to have life and vibrance. We know that there is nothing wrong when we have our pictures taken with two vests on, and that there is nothing wrong with our asking our wives to return the vest from whence it was liberated. This could well be one of the glories of married life that we have learned this week.

An interesting part of Annual Conference this year were the extracurricular dinners and side attractions where fellowship and learning took place. At the Laity Session June Spotts indicated that one of her friends said to her, "I'll see you at the bar of the Conference where lively spirits are participated in." Homer Fulbright, giving a report on what it means to be a delegate to General and Jurisdictional Conference, said, "In the period that I have been going to these Conferences I have had a voice in electing ten Bishops, and that is enough."

At the Laity dinner the featured speaker complimented the Heifer Project International for sending United Methodist jackasses around the world to help in farming enterprises. When the United Methodist Church can use its jackasses in this way it is going in the right direction. We can see Dr. Ebright's ears pricking up at this point. We are sure there will be a welter of these animals at the Hunger Ingathering next year. We had a great time listening to Red River Valley and Dr. Dwain Bruce at the Town and Country dinner. Our gratitude to Sherman Waters and Midland Heights Church for their hospitality.

Our appreciation to the Institutional representatives for their brevity in reporting to the Annual Conference. We realize anew that God still does things in a mysterious way his wonders to perform. We must never forget the greatness of United Methodism, through its

institutions, as it reaches around the world to all kinds of people standing in need.

As Bishop Hicks said last night, our lives have been richly blessed with great music. The choirs from Van Buren, the Methodist Children's Home, Goddard Memorial, and First Church were an inspiration to our lives. Don Mooney, organist, used his great talents to help make the Annual Conference one never to be forgotten. Reverend Dick Haltom, and the members of the Conference Worship Committee spent many hours working out, beautifully, the Worship services. The service of Commemoration was a high point of Annual Conference. Rev. Jimmy Brooks entuned us with the spirits of those who have gone into the great beyond, but whose spirits motivate us to higher realms of life and living. The Conference is deeply indebted to Ann Jackson for the liturgical banners, and to Vina Calhoun, Earl Carter, and Vic Nixon for the mass of mimeographed material and for their performing so well in so many ways. Our hearts were strangely warmed by Bishop Hicks, Jim Beal, Aaron Barling and George Ivey for the morning devotionals, and also by the soloists.

The District Superintendents were ever present to give guidance and leadership to this Conference. Over and over again praise was paid by laymen from their various districts. It was obvious that the Boards and agencies of our Conference have been straining away to better accomplish God's work in our Conference and around the world.

One of the high points of the Conference was the dramatic performance of the young adult task force, as it endeavored to challenge the Church to make the Christian religion more revelant for young adults. The Parish Development Program, and Communications Program, are relatively new and it will be up to all of us to see that these programs will

better promote God's work in our Conference.

When John Wesley narrowly escaped the fire that burned the Wesley House, his mother rushed up to her young son and told him he was destined to do something great for the world. His mother never let these positive words stop ringing in his ears. As we return home, some of us to old appointments, and some to new, may we be motivated by the Spirit of Jesus Christ, at an even deeper level as we hear the words, "You are destined to do something great for the Kingdom of Almighty God." May these words never stop ringing in our ears until our last breath is gone.

Containing costs without sacrificing quality of care remains a critical issue. While continuing to initiate programs that offer cost-savings opportunities to patients, full

advantage is also being made of the "system" approach in sharing services to spread overhead costs. Under an April 1 agreement, the Methodist System is providing management services to Doctors Hospital of Memphis and has also included that East Memphis hospital in the System's planning process.

Central's convenient, self-contained day surgery care unit is a major new cost-containment project and will be completed for opening in early June. Day surgery package prices are offered for more than 100 procedures, giving appropriate patients opportunity for substantial savings over inpatient care costs.

One of many outstanding and innovative programs, the Oncology Special Care Unit, after a full year in service, has proved to be a model multi-disciplinary care unit for patients with cancer.

All programs, whether directly related to patient care or to essential support services, are directed toward the goal of providing the best health care service available for the lowest possible cost.

The directors shall each receive a housing allowance of \$5,200.

- C. That participation by the North Arkansas Conference in area programs must not exceed 50% of the cost of that program, with exceptions approved by the CCOM.

IV. Administrative Concerns

- A. In determining the program budget of the Annual Conference, we remind the conference of the following procedure: (1) the CCOM determines the cost of programs and ministries; (2) the CFA determines the total amount of funds available for the conference benevolence budget; and (3) the CCOM recommends to the CFA an itemized program budget totaling no more than the amount the CFA recommends. The responsibility for determining budget priorities rests with the CCOM. Changes made during the year in program board and agency budgets can be made only with the approval of the CCOM or by the Executive Committee of the CCOM. The policy is effective March 15, 1979.
- B. All requests from institutions shall be presented to the appropriate board or agency of the annual conference for recommendation before presentation to the CFA.
- C. All persons authorized to vouch for funds shall be identified by agencies and approved by the CCOM prior to the dispensing of funds.
- D. All apportionments in the report shall be for the calendar year 1980 and shall be received by the Area Treasurer by 2:00 p.m. on Wednesday after the first Sunday in January.
- E. Each charge shall declare all ministerial support. The report shall include remuneration for salary, travel, utility expense, insurance, social security, and all additional compensation paid to the pastor or on behalf of the pastor.
- F. All benevolent and connectional funds shall be sent to the Office of Finance and Management, P. O. Box 3364, Little Rock, Arkansas 72203, except for the following which should be sent as designated:
 - 1. Arkansas Methodist Children's Home, Christmas Offering and special gifts, to the Office of the Superintendent, 2002 Fillmore, Little Rock, Arkansas 72204.
 - 2. All insurance premiums be sent according to the instructions from the Committee on Group Insurance.
- G. We express our appreciation to Ms. Ann Onstott and her staff for the excellent service they perform for the annual conference.

VII. Memoirs

Jefferson Sherman 1877-1978

The Rev. Jefferson Sherman, retired member of the North Arkansas Conference, died July 25, 1978 at the age of 100. He had resided with his son Edwin, of Gurdon, Arkansas, and his wife for the past ten years. The funeral was July 27, at First United Methodist Church of Searcy, Arkansas conducted by Rev. Alvin Murray and Bishop Paul V. Galloway. Burial was at Roselawn Memorial Park in Little Rock, Arkansas.

The Rev. Sherman was born at Elm Springs, Arkansas November 25, 1877. He was ordained Deacon in 1903 and Elder in 1909, admitted to Conference in 1905 and retired at the 1950 session of the North Arkansas Conference. He was married to the former Mary Ada Hughey on November 21, 1905. To this union three sons were born. His wife and two sons, Eugene "Bo" Sherman and Jefferson Sherman, Jr. preceded him in death.



He graduated from Hendrix College in 1905, and was assigned his first pastoral appointment at Eureka Springs. Other appointments were Dardanelle, Rogers, Hartford-Midland, Greenwood, Bentonville, Earle, Blytheville, Marianna, Gardener Memorial at North Little Rock, Newport, Huntington Avenue at Jonesboro. After retirement he was pastor of the Judsonia Church and associate pastor of First United Methodist Church of Searcy for 15 years. He also served as presiding Elder of the Searcy and Batesville Districts. He was elected Pastor Emeritus of the Searcy Church, for life, in 1955.

The Searcy Church honored "Brother Jeff," as he was affectionately known, on his 100th birthday in November 1977. Members of the Sherman Class were hosts for the reception, which was held in the Green Room of the church.

Mr. Sherman was a Mason and was elected Master Mason in 1920. He received his 50 Year Pin in 1970. He was named ''Man of the Year'' while residing in Searcy. To those who knew him he epitomized the meaning of being a Christian.

Survivors, other than his son, are four grandchildren and ten great-grandchildren.

Myrtis Elizabeth Watson 1915-1978

Mrs. Myrtis Elizabeth Watson of Jonesboro died August 17, 1978 at Crittenden Memorial Hospital in West Memphis.

She was born December 15, 1917 in Louann, Arkansas. During her childhood and youth she lived in Rector, Arkansas. She was very much involved in school activities, including being Homecoming Queen both her junior and senior years. She attended Arkansas State University. On June 2, 1935 she married J. William Watson, whom she had met while living in Rector.

Myrt was characterized by deep devotion to her loving family and an encouraging witness to all who came to know her. Her Christian faith and courage were very evident during the last months of her illness, and her life was a blessing to those who came into contact with her.



Myrt Watson is survived by her husband, Rev. J. William Watson, Superintendent of the Jonesboro District; three daughters, Mrs. Victor Saig of West Memphis, Mrs. Jim Crane of Seattle, Washington, and Mrs. Joe McGill of West Memphis; a sister, Mrs. Lucille Clay of Detroit, and six grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at First United Methodist Church, Jonesboro, with Bishop Paul V. Galloway, Rev. Worth W. Gibson and Rev. Merle Johnson officiating. A graveside service was at Crittenden Memorial Park in Marion, Arkansas with Rev. Ben Hines and Rev. Bill Williams officiating.

Reverend J. H. Hoggard 1888-1978

Reverend J. H. Hoggard, pastor emeritus of St. Paul United Methodist Church, Fort Smith at the time of his death, September 3, 1978, was born Jabez Henry Hoggard in Enola, Arkansas, November 23, 1888. He was a graduate of the Conway public schools and attended Arkansas State Teachers College, (now University of Central Arkansas) in Conway, and completed the Course of Study for the Methodist ministry at Southern Methodist University at Dallas, Texas. He was licensed to preach in the Methodist Church, November 17, 1923 by the Conway District Conference. Brother Hoggard was admitted on trial in the North Arkansas Conference in 1927, and admitted into full connection in 1929 and ordained deacon. Two years later he was ordained elder. He retired in 1961, having served thirty-seven and one-half years as a minister in the North



Arkansas Annual Conference. His service includes four years as an accepted supply pastor at Vilonia, Cato-Levy, Jacksonville, and Salem, and thirty-three and one-half years as a full time conference member. His appointments included: Griffithville, Levy, Fisher Street, Jonesboro, Parkin, Tuckerman, First Church, Rector, Paris, Central Avenue, Batesville, First Church, Van Buren, and St. Paul, Fort Smith.

He was active on the conference Board of Evangelism, and the Board of Education, in addition to responsibilities he carried as district Secretary of Evangelism, and as a member of the district Committee on Ministerial Training.

Brother Hoggard was a devoted and loyal churchman. He was characterized by a frank and open spirit. Quick to express his deep convictions, he had little patience with sham or pretense. He brought joy to all who knew him with his ready wit and deep love of life. His love for his church and his people generated a respect and love in the members of his congregations. He was an inspiration and guide for younger ministers whom he helped with understanding and wise counsel as they prepared themselves for the ministry and began their work in the church. As a follower of Christ he led many into Christian commitment of life and membership in the church.

In 1910 he was married to Annie Mae Fleming, for whom the Educational Building of St. Paul Methodist Church in Fort Smith is jointly named. Two sons, Jabe Hoggard of El Dorado, and Kendall Hoggard of Conway; and two daughters, Mrs. Robert L. Jones, Jr., of Fort Smith and Mrs. James Hendrickson, Jr., of Conway survive this union. She preceded her husband in death in 1960.

Other survivors include his wife, Mrs. Esther Hoggard; a step-daughter, Mrs. Ed Ray of Bentonville; a brother, Ernest Hoggard of Conway; nine grandchildren and eight greatgrandchildren.

Funeral services were held in St. Paul United Methodist Church, Fort Smith by Arvest Lawson, William Wilder, Harold Spence, and Ethan Dodgen. Burial is in Roselawn Cemetery in Fort Smith, Arkansas.

William A. Patty 1888-1978

Reverend William A. Patty was born in Santiago, Arkansas, February 22, 1888. He was admitted on trial in the North Arkansas Conference in 1920. In 1923 he was admitted into full connection and ordained deacon. Two years later he was ordained elder.

He retired in 1943, having served in the North Arkansas Annual Conference as a minister twenty-four years.

He was married to Leona M. Wand, December 29, 1912. She died in June of 1971 in Illinois.

Brother and Mrs. Patty had two children, Christine Flynn of Illinois and M. Patty Brooks of Phoenix, Arizona. Mrs. Brooks has written of her father: "My father was really a wonderful person! He was always known as a peacemaker, and truly, he was. He served poor works, but was never a poor man!

I am enclosing an article he had written. And he had it placed in his Bible at Job. . . . My minister loved it and several people out here have used it."

"My income is like Truth and Love; it is equal to all demands made upon it. This income is my inalienable possession derived from no earthly source, supplied through no material channel, dependent upon no personality or person's effort, not even my own, but coming to me direct from God, mine to receive, to possess, to use, to share, but never to waste or to hoard. It is to be received without fear or doubt, possessed without fear, used without scruple, shared without apprehension that supply can fail. All things that the Father hath are mine; they come to me and constitute my income, unfailing abundance, ample for every demand that can be made upon it."

Mrs. Brooks continued, "My daddy was the richest person I ever knew not to possess more, monetarily speaking."

His funeral was conducted September 21, 1978 by Dr. Blaine Mays. Burial was at Phoenix.

Lewis T. Thompson 1896-1978

Louie T. Thompson was born October 3, 1896 at College Station (Conway), Arkansas. After becoming a Christian early in life he was a member of Saint Matthew Church, and remained a member there until he answered the call of his Lord to the pastoral ministry. 
She was a graduate of Arkansas State University and earned the master's degree at the University of Arkansas.

He was a native of Monticello and was a graduate of Arkansas


College, Batesville.

IX. Miscellaneous

STANDING RULES OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

- (1) That each undergraduate, each Lay Pastor, and each candidate for conference membership be required to meet with the Board of Ministry before or during the session of the Annual Conference unless hindered by circumstances beyond his control.
- (2) That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one member from each church in each Pastoral Charge.
- (3) That the figures answering the question in the pastor's report to Annual Conference "Members reported last year" shall in every case be the number of members printed in the statistical tables of the Journal of the last Annual Conference.
- (4) That the District Superintendent's figures of all apportionments be accepted as the official figures.
- (5) That the apportionment for World Service and Conferences Benevolences be combined in the statistical report; and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.
- (6) All statistical reports, after being checked for correctness by the District Superintendent and District auditors, shall be delivered by one of them to the Conference Statistician, within 31 days after the closing of the Conference Treasurer's books.
- (7) That the District Superintendents be instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or District Superintendent's District for insertion in the Conference Journal.
- (8) There shall be an Annual Conference Planning Committee made up of the Bishop (who shall be chairperson), Council Directors, host institution representative, District Superintendents, the Conference Secretary and four persons from the Council on Lay Life and Work, two of whom shall be women. The responsibility of this committee shall be to plan the agenda and entertainment of the Annual Conference.
- (9) The expenses of the Annual Conference shall be paid by funds received from: 1. registration fees, which shall be set by the Annual Conference Planning Committee; 2. offerings received at the Annual Conference; and 3. if necessary, the Conference Administration Fund.
- (10) Every council, board, commission and committee receiving any money from conference funds shall present to the Council on Finance and Administration annually by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference a detailed financial report including all receipts and expenditures.
- (11) A list of lay members elected to Annual Conference shall be compiled by the district superintendents and sent to the conference secretary prior to the opening of the session.
- (12) The district stewards shall apportion all annual conference askings to the several charges on each district on an equitable basis.
- (13) The Conference Treasurer shall hold his books open for 15 days following the close of the fiscal year.
- (14) No one shall be nominated for re-election to a board or commission on which he has served more than a quadrennium immediately preceding his election.
- (15) The Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Pensions shall be members of the secretarial staff of the Conference, and these persons shall be charged with the responsibility of seeing that all records pertaining to service years be made identical.
- (16) Any proposal to change the Standing Rules shall lie on the table overnight, and then its passage shall require a ¾ vote of those present and voting.
- (17) That part of the report of all councils, boards, commissions, committees and other agencies of the conference which provides for changes in policy or makes recommendations shall be mimeographed, printed, or otherwise duplicated and distributed to the membership

of the conference prior to the time scheduled for action on said report.

(18) All churches employing more than one appointed member of an annual conference shall pay all percentages based on pastor's salary on the salaries of all ministers so employed.

(19) Each Annual Conference session shall designate a moving date. Any exceptions to

the designated date shall be agreed upon by the pastors involved.

(20) That no person shall be elected by the Annual Conference to serve on more than one (1) major Board, Committee, Commission, Agency, etc., at one time. This does not affect ex-officio positions, or the Conference Committee on Episcopacy.

(21) That all councils, boards, committees, and commissions be made more representa-

tive. Special consideration should be given to the use of women and youth.

(22) No person shall serve as an elected trustee of more than one United Methodist related institution of the Arkansas Area at a time.

(23) No one who by virtue of their office would be an ex-officio trustee, shall serve as an

elected trustee of the same agency.

(24) Each year the Conference Council on Ministries will determine the number of additional lay persons, if any, to be named and will notify each District Council on Ministries of the number of persons to be named by it, encouraging them to use the following formula with top priority to be given to Number 1, etc.:

1. Diaconal Ministers

- 2. Officers of the Conference Council on Lay Life and Work
- 3. Conference United Methodist Women Officers within the bounds of a district
- 4. Elected chairpersons for conference boards and agencies
- 5. Elected lay persons to general and jurisdictional boards and agencies

6. Lay delegates to general and jurisdictional conferences

- 7. District Lay Leaders, District Presidents of United Methodist Women, and District Presidents of United Methodist Men
- 8. Lay members of conference boards and agencies
- 9. One additional youth from each district
- 10. Inclusiveness of ethnic minorities
- 11. At-large district representatives

In 1978 the Conway and Fort Smith Districts each had a small increase in members whereas the other five lost. The net result was the North Arkansas Conference had a decrease by 1582. The total full members at the close of 1978 was 96,848 for the Conference. The only increase for the Conference in members received was the number from other denominations. There were decreases in the members removed by charge conference action, removed by transfer to other United Methodist Churches and to other denominations.

There were increases in the number baptized, the number on preparatory membership rolls and constituency rolls.

In the church school the increases were in the number of leaders, the number of adults and the average attendance in the short term classes.

The United Methodist Men show an increase of nine percent in membership, and they doubled the amount paid for projects. The United Methodist Women had a slight decrease in members of 13, but their total paid for local church and community work was five percent increase over 1977.

The total property value for all churches in the Conference increase around \$9.7 million while the indebtedness increase by only \$1.3 million and the amount paid on both indebtedness and building and improvements totaled nearly \$3.9 million. Again, as in previous years, this indicates the local trustees are continuing to re-evaluate their property yearly in the light of inflation and replacement costs. The largest increase in these figures was the amount paid for buildings and improvements. This amount was \$2,885,527 which is twice the 1977 amount.

The total amount for pastors salaries and utilities increased this year over 1977; however, the total for travel shows the first decrease since this has been a line item starting in 1964.

The increases in the benevolences are evident in the columns where the world hunger offerings were reported; however, these increases do not reflect the amount raised as much was "given-in-kind" and thereby not paid through the conference treasurer.

This was the first year where the total spent by the churches in any district was over \$2 million. The Batesville District churches spent over \$2.5 million; Conway, \$2.3 million and Fayetteville \$2 million. The total reported spent by all the local churches in the Conference was \$13,430,290 which is almost 19 percent over 1977.
