

- 2. We encourage each Conference Board and Agency to keep records of attendance at its respective meetings. After one year, a Conference Board or Agency shall be authorized to declare a vacancy in its membership because of non-attendance. Once a vacancy is declared, the person dropped shall be notified and the chairperson of the Conference Committee on Nominations shall be notified immediately.
- 3. The Conference Committee on Nominations, in recommending a nominee to the Annual Conference for election in order to fill a vacancy, shall do so according to the provisions of Para. 706.4 of the 1980 Discipline.
 - a. It is the intention of the Conference to be in compliance with Para. 706.4 of the 1980 Discipline in regards to the memberships of Conference Boards and Agencies by the end of the quadrennium, insofar as possible.
- 4. A policy for submitting requests to the Committee on Structure.
 - a. All requests are to be submitted by May 15th. Any requests received after that date will be handled at Annual Conference the following year.
 - b. All requests to the Committee on Structure are to be presented in writing to the committee chairperson.
 - c. To avoid personalities becoming involved, requests for study will be held in confidence.



North Arkansas Conference
The United Methodist Church
Held At Hendrix College, Conway
September 10, 1982

The special called session of the North Arkansas Annual Conference met September 10, 1982 concurrently with a special called session of the Little Rock Annual Conference. The special session convened in Staples Auditorium on the campus of Hendrix College at 1:30 p.m.

OPENING: The Conference was opened with a devotional from Philippians by Bishop Kenneth W. Hicks.

GREETINGS: Dr. Joe Hatcher, president of Hendrix College, extended the welcome of Hendrix to the special sessions of Conferences of the Arkansas area.

SECRETARY STAFF: Charles E. Watt, Secretary of North Arkansas Conference presented the secretarial staff: Carolyn Park; Tellers for the special session: Mike Mattox, John Copher, and Mark Lasater. They were elected.

BAR OF THE CONFERENCE: Gladwin Connell, Director of the Little Rock Conference Council on Ministries, moved that the Bar of the Conference be the lower floor of Staples Auditorium. It was so ordered.

QUESTION: Charles Ramsey asked which Conference? Is this a joint session?

MOTION: Gladwin Connell moved that we act as a body of the whole in all matters of debate, amendments, and substitute motions preceding the vote with main motions and that the vote on the main motions be taken by separate conference on a written ballot. It was not seconded.

QUESTION: Charles Ramsey asked if this were constitutional and asked for an official ruling from the Chair.

MOTION: George W. Martin moved we vote on the Connell motion as two separate bodies. No second.

OFFICIAL RULING: The Chair ruled that we would act as separate bodies on all matters. So ordered.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Introduced Joe Hughes, Pastor of White Memorial Church who asked for our prayers following a fire at White Memorial. Maxine Callaway spoke on behalf of the congregation expressing appreciation for the love show following the fire.

JOINT COMMITTEE ON COMMUNICATIONS: Bill Eason presented the committee's proposal and perfected the report. Herschel McClurkin moved the adoption of the joint proposal. Seconded. The report is before us.

THE PROPOSAL: Bill Eason introduced the presentation team, Rev. Keenen Williams for the Little Rock Conference, Bob McCord, a layman, from the North Arkansas Conference and Rev. Sam Teague from the cabinet. All spoke of the need for a joint communication tool. They presented the rationale used in arriving at their recommendation.

MOTION: Jim Beal moved we amend the report as follows: Item #1 change to "semi-

monthly" and Item #6 to read \$95,000 apportionment. . . \$47,500 each conference. It was seconded. After several questions about the survey used, when publication will be started, editorial policy, and others, the question was called on the amendment. The vote was as follows: North Arkansas 229 for; 25 against. Little Rock 161 for; 84 against. The amendment passes.

MOTION: A substitute motion was offered by Will Dublin. It was ruled out of order at this point, but would be considered later. The main amended motion is before us. Several questions were raised. Bill Eason spoke about the money figure in Item #6 and suggested it

be raised to \$100,000 total; \$50,000 each conference. It was accepted by Jim Beal.

RULING: The Chair ruled we should vote on the change. The vote was North Arkansas 212

for; 21 against. Little Rock 136 for; 73 against. The change in money was ordered.

MOTION: John Walker asked that a search be made for an editor, moved that item #8 be added calling for a search committee to be formed. The vote was as follows: North Arkansas 238 for; 1 against. Little Rock 189 for; 5 against. It was ordered.

MOTION: Jim West moved the deletion of item #4 and that item #5 be changed to read \$3.00 subscription in place of \$10.00, there being no free papers. It was seconded. The motion

failed.

QUESTIONS: There followed a lengthy question and answer session concerning how paper will be distributed. Who will sell the subscriptions?

SUB-MOTION: Will Dublin's sub-motion was perfected and it failed both conferences.

MAIN MOTION: The Chair called for a final vote on the main motion as amended. North Arkansas 226 for; 10 against. Little Rock 142 for; 67 against. The proposal as perfected and adopted by both Conferences is as follows:

1. A semi-monthly tabloid-size newspaper is recommended.

2. It is recommended that the newspaper be called the "Arkansas United Methodist."

3. It is recommended that each Conference draw \$5,000 from existing funds to use, starting October 1, 1982 for promotion and "start-up" funding.

4. A maximum 10,000 copies of each issue will be printed, with even distribution to each Conference.

5. Additional subscriptions to be sold at a maximum of ten dollars (\$10).

6. A one hundred thousand dollar (\$100,000) apportionment is recommended for 1983 publication. (\$50,000 per Conference).

7. It is recommended that a five-year plan be adopted. (After five years, not more than fifty percent (50%) of the total budget will be expected to come from apportionment.)

8. It is recommended that a search committee be established to interview applicants for the position of editor.

ADJOURNMENT: Motion to adjourn, seconded. Following several announcements and closing remarks, Bill Elliot was asked to dismiss both sessions with prayer. We adjourned at 3:53 p.m.

First Day — Tuesday Afternoon Session June 7, 1983

OPENING: Bishop Hicks invited Pam Taylor, President of Conference Youth to ring the Bicentennial Bell followed with prayer by Bishop Hicks.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Bishop explained the purchase of the Bicentennial Bell by the Arkansas Area noting that \$1000. of the purchase price of \$1984. goes to the Bicentennial Development Fund.

GREETING: Bishop Hicks spoke greetings from the Rocky Mountain Conference which meets concurrently with ours. Greetings were exchanged by the North Carolina with other Conferences.

ORGANIZATION: Conference Secretary Charles E. Watt presented the secretarial staff as follows: Lewis T. See — Daily Proceedings; Allan Bruner — reports; Michael Mattox — floor; Jerry Pulliam — Audio and recording; David Hanshaw — photographer. He moved their election. It was done.

AGENDA: Conference Secretary moved the agenda as printed in Pre-Conference Journal be adopted as official with the Chair having the privilege to adjust it as needed.

BAR OF CONFERENCE: Conference Secretary moved the Bar of the Conference be the lower floor of Staples Auditorium, including the projection booth. It was done.

TELLERS FOR GENERAL AND JURISDICTION CONFERENCES: Conference Secretary introduced the tellers for the 1983 Session: Laity: Head Teller — Gerald O'Malley; Bill Pippin, Bruce Bynum, Gladys McKelvey, Bill Lindsey, John E. Smith, Jane Steinegger, Larry Goddard, Ralph Jennings, Marie Roberson, Marlane Lamb, Alternate Nancy Morrison. Clergy: Head Teller — David Driver; Joe Wilkerson, Jerry Canada, Mark Lasater, Jim McKay, Nick Lascaro, Dennis Spence, W. P. Fiser, Steve Brizzi, Bennie Harmon, Steve Broom, and Alternate Edward Pruett. He moved their election. It was done.

RULES OF ORDER: Conference Secretary introduced rules of order for the 1983 session as follows:

Rules Of Order For The 1983 Session:

- A. Speaking: Those who desire the floor of the Conference shall be within the Bar of the Conference; shall stand or raise their hand and when recognized by the Chair shall state their name, local church or special area of responsibility.
- B. Voting: To vote and have your vote counted, you must:
 - 1. Be within the Bar of the Conference and seated.

2. Have your name tag on where it can be seen by the teller.

a) Lay Members: May vote on all matters except matters of ordination and clergy delegates to General and Jurisdiction Conferences;

b) Probationary, Associate or Local Full Time Members: May vote on all matters except constitutional amendments, election of General and Jurisdictional Conference delegates, and all matters of ordination, character and conference relationship of ministers;

c) Part Time and Student Pastor Members: Privilege of the floor without vote;

d) Full Members: May vote on all matters except the election of lay delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences.

3. Your ballot will be invalid if:

a) You vote for more than the number to be elected. For example, if the Chair calls for three to be elected and you vote for four, your ballot will be invalid.

b) Your writing and spelling is such that two tellers cannot agree on the name.

c) You use the wrong numbered page in your ballot book. For example, if the Chair calls for ballot #1 and you use #3 page in the book it will be invalid. Do not give anyone a sheet from your book. Should you make a mistake go to the teller in your section and it will be taken care of by the teller.

d) You are clergy and vote for lay-invalid, and vice versa.

e) Keep your ballot book with you. Should a lay member leave Conference please give your name tag and ballot book to your Alternate.

4. Move that on the first ballot only the names of those persons receiving two or more votes be read, and on all following ballots only those persons receiving five or more votes be read.

5. Move that all delegates to General and Jurisdiction Conferences including the reserves be elected in the same manner, and that we not declare the two receiving the highest total to be elected as the reserves.

C. Motions: Shall be on the form supplied by the secretary and shall be handed to a page to be brought to the secretary's table immediately. All motions shall be signed and legible.

- D. Debate: Debate on each motion shall be limited to three two minute speeches for the motion and three two minute speeches against the motion (excluding persons rising to point of order, making amendments or final summation). A timer shall be used to measure debate at the discretion of the Chair.
- E. Resolutions and Reports: All resolutions and reports not printed in the Pre-Conference Journal shall be legibly written in duplicate, and shall be in the hands of the Conference Secretary and Presiding Officer before such can be considered by the Annual Conference. Any material which is not in the hands of the Annual Conference Secretary within two days of the close of Conference session may be omitted from the Conference iournal.
- F. Pages: Youth from the area churches will serve as pages. They will be wearing tee shirts which will serve to identify them. Michael Mattox, one of the assistant secretaries, is responsible for the announcements and the pages. All announcements shall be written and handed to him. All materials for distribution shall, insofar as possible, be assembled in packet form to be distributed at one time each day. These shall be delivered to Michael for distribution at the proper time.

He moved their adoption. It was done.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Bishop Hicks, using an article written by Bishop Hardt of the Oklahoma Area gave an inspirational list of prayerful considerations for members of the Conference. He spoke a personal word to tellers about need for confidentiality for counting and reporting the results of balloting.

WELCOME: Bishop Hicks introduced Dr. Joe B. Hatcher, President of Hendrix College. He spoke words of welcome from Hendrix and expressed pleasure at having this Annual

Conference at Hendrix.

POLICY AND REVIEW: Bob Orr introduced changes for Standing Rules #20 and #9.

They are to lay on table overnight to be voted on tomorrow.

MOTION: Charles Casteel moved an agenda change so that first ballot will not be taken until the laity has their opening session. It was done.

ADJOURNMENT: Bishop called on conference song leader, John Copher, who led us in singing "O For A Thousand Tongues to Sing," after which we adjourned to the executive session for Clergy and Laity session for lay.

LAITY SESSION: The Laity reconvened in Staples Auditorium at 3 p.m. The session was opened by Emily Cockrill, Conference Lay Leader.

WELCOME: Buddy Arnold welcomed the delegates to Annual Conference and encouraged the members to become a vital part of this session.

STRUCTURE: Pat Freemyer, Chairperson of Conference Committee on Structure, explained the structure of Conference and how it was developed emphasizing the importance of participation by lay members.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES: Gene Brand explained work of the C.C.O.M. and its role in the structure of the church.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION: Phyllis Johnson described the work of C.F.A. She reported that the increase in the Conference budget would be 1% for 1984.

COUNCIL ON PROFESSIONAL MINISTRIES: Jim Lane reported on the work of this Council.

LAY LIFE AND WORK: Emily Cockrill outlined the work of this council and introduced members of the council.

LEGISLATIVE FORUMS: Bill Lindsey explained purpose of Forums and encouraged the laity to actively participate.

GENERAL CONFERENCE: Gene Brand explained purpose and work of General Conference and the laity's role in electing delegates.

CANDIDATES: Emily Cockrill introduced persons who are candidates for election to General Conference

RELIGION AND RACE: Mary Katherine McSpadden described the Commission and its work and expressed a desire that the delegates elected be representative of the church membership.

ADJOURNMENT: Emily Cockrill adjourned laity session at 4:08 p.m.

EXECUTIVE SESSION OF CLERGY: Bishop Hicks opened the session explaining the Disciplinary requirements concerning traveling preachers. He explained that any traveling preacher is eligible for election to General and Jurisdiction Conference. A traveling preacher is any preacher who is in the "on trial" relationship to Annual Conference or one in full connection.

BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY: Clif Christopher presented the Board of Ministry Report #1 and perfected it. Question #20 moved to remove the names David Tucker and David Weber. It was done. Question #21: add Louise O. Finney. It was done. Question #22b: Moved to remove Louise O. Finney. It was done. Question #22c: add Robert Keck, University of Arkansas, Fayetteville. It was done. Question #27: Clif Christopher presented candidates for probationary membership. He moved Larry Gantt be removed. Dr. John Farthing asked why Larry Gantt was removed. Answer: Larry Gantt is asked by the Board to defer another year.

POINT OF ORDER: Bishop explained that while we were in Executive Session we had probationary members present and asked all but full connection members be excused. They were excused.

BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY REPORT, Con'd.: Clif Christopher gave the rationale in asking Larry Gantt to defer. He also gave background of Board's relationship to him, explaining that the interview team recommended admitting him to probationary membership. The full Board, voting 16 to 1, recommended he wait another year before entering probationary membership. There followed questions by Jim Keith, Glen Pettus, Charles Armour, and others.

POINT OF ORDER: Bishop spoke a word of explanation stating that church law forbids an Annual Conference from approving someone whom the Board of Ordained Ministry has

disapproved unless the Board of Ministry requests the question be reconsidered.

POINT OF INFORMATION: Can we ask the Board to change their mind? Yes, however, the Board is not bound to honor it. There followed expressions of appreciation, concern and further inquiry.

MOTION: Jim Clemmons moved to close the discussion and that the Board continue to act

in the best interest of Annual Conference. Seconded. It was done.

SESSION RESUMED: The other clergy were called back in. Question #27 is again before us. Clif Christopher presented persons for probationary membership. They were elected.

QUESTION 30: Clif Christopher presented and approved persons for full membership and associate membership. Bishop Hicks asked the Disciplinary questions. They were elected.

QUESTION 33: Motion to restore Ivan Bys to effective relationship. It was done.

QUESTION 41: Move Dennis Beets be discontinued. It was done.

QUESTION 44b: Moved Robert Cantrell be terminated by surrender of ministerial office. It was approved but not unanimous.

MOTION: Phil Hathcock moved Maurice Lanier be restored to effective relationship.

Seconded. It was done.

MOTION: Phil Hathcock moved Maurice Lanier be listed on disability. Seconded. It was done.

QUESTION 49, 51, 52: Clif Christopher moved the retired status. It was done.

QUESTION 65: It was moved by the Board that Marcia Crossman, Will Dublin, J. D. Lawrence be granted less than full time appointment. It was done.

MOTION: Clif Christopher moved we adopt Board of Ordained Ministry Report #1 as amended in its entirety. It was done.

MOTION: Charles Armour moved we admonish Board of Ministry to encourage prospective candidates for the ministry to attend United Methodist seminaries. Seconded. It was done.

OLD BUSINESS: Phil Hathcock presented the North Arkansas Conference ministerial

assistance plan. He perfected the report and moved its adoption. It was done.

MOTION: Phil Hathcock moved we adopt a suggested plan whereby ministers may assist in the retirement of the pension indebtedness. Seconded. Discussion followed with Bill Williams, Joe Taylor and Bob Orr speaking against motion. Leon Wilson and Bill Wilder spoke in favor. Question was called. Motion carried.

- 3. Assist in the training of persons and the development of leaders in all areas of ministry;
- 4. Coordinate the planning and implementation of those programs and ministries common to local churches;
- 5. Oversee the process by which the church at all levels defines, understands, and carries out its mission, and
- 6. Evaluate the preparation for and performance of the persons engaged in mission within and on behalf of the Annual Conference.

COORDINATED REPORT CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The Council on Ministries of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church is a servant of the Church at the Conference level. It is directly answerable to the Annual Conference, and works closely with the Bishop and Cabinet, District Council on Ministries and Boards and Agencies of the

The purpose of the Council on Ministries is six-fold:

Conference.

1. TO LISTEN—to be sensitive to the leadership of God's Holy Spirit and to be aware of missional needs of the Church as expressed from local churches, District Councils on Ministries, Annual Conference Agencies, and Jurisdictional and General Agencies of the Church.

2. TO PLAN — to receive, to initiate, and to research program suggestions that are consistent with the goals and policies of the Annual Conference.

3. TO COORDINATE — to develop program suggestions — from the various Conference Agencies, General Church Agencies, District, and local church agencies — into a coordinated program for recommendation to the Annual Conference.

4. TO SUBMIT — the coordinated Conference program, with recommended program priorities to the Annual Conference for consideration, amendment and adoption.

5. TO IMPLEMENT AND ADMINISTER — to implement and administer the adopted program of the Annual Conference and assign the "program" to the various Boards and Agencies of the Conference and Districts. (It is understood that special committees and task forces will be used from time to time to carry out special program tasks.)

6. TO EVALUATE — have an ongoing evaluation of programs and procedures to test effectiveness in carrying out the Conference program. (The evaluation content and process shall reflect our primary concern for the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ at a personal and congregational level.)

GOALS 1981-1984

GOAL 1: ETHNIC MINORITY LOCAL CHURCH

The North Arkansas Conference will assist the local churches to implement the actions of the General Conference in regard to the ethnic minority local church, especially in the areas of inclusiveness, open itineracy, development of black leadership (lay and clergy), and developing resources for and with the local churches.

GOAL II: CHURCH EXTENSION

The North Arkansas Conference through church extension shall explore the possibility of establishing new congregations and revitalizing existing churches as a study, research and available financing deem possible and feasible. This shall be initiated and accomplished with the aid and cooperation of the conference, the districts and the local churches. Special attention shall be given to: non-concentrated rural areas; revitalizing existing churches in key areas; and clarifying implications of parish development for church extension.

GOAL III: COMMUNICATIONS

The North Arkansas Conference will assist the church at local, district and conference levels in interpreting and communicating: what the church is doing in the conference and the world; our theological and biblical understandings of the nature of the church; and, how we function at conference, district and local church levels — from the local church to the conference, and from the conference to the local church.

GOAL IV: FAMILY LIFE

The goal of the North Arkansas Conference is to strengthen the family life ministry of churches so that they will intentionally minister to the needs of all persons through the community with particular emphasis on new programs for families and persons in crisis situations. This ministry is to be provided for all persons — children, youth, young adults, the elderly, the divorced, married and/or single — and that these persons shall come to a greater understanding of their relationship with God and each other.

GOAL V: STRENGTHENING THE LOCAL CHURCH FOR ITS EVANGELISTIC MISSION IN THE WORLD

In the next four years, we as the North Arkansas Conference will recognize that "the" priority of the Church of Jesus is to proclaim, hear, and respond to the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and that we, as a goal for the quadrennium, challenge each local church with this priority and offer special programs to each local church aimed at the revitalization and rejuvenation of clergy and laity to the end that they may joyfully involve themselves in the mission of Christ through evangelism, Christian education, worship, ministry, stewardship, social action, service, and mission.

GOAL VI: WORLD HUNGER

During 1981-84 to bring the latest information to persons in the North Arkansas Conference relative to the causes, effects and scope of world hunger; to emphasize the successes in the global food and nutrition programs; to lead each local church to identify and utilize appropriate channels of response; and, lead each local church and district to examine and experiment with Christian lifestyles in a hungry world.

I. STRENGTHENING AND DEVELOPING THE ETHNIC MINORITY LOCAL CHURCH

I.1. OBJECTIVE: T

To continue full-time ministry for charges consisting of Taylor's Chapel, Wesley's Chapel and Livingston in the Forrest City District, and McCabe's Chapel in the Conway District.

Assistance by providing salary supplementations to these two Charges.

In 1982 we had Gordon Caswell in a series of meetings over the conference which helped us realize something of the potential of planned giving for people of our churches. A follow-up training event is planned for pastors September 13-14, 1983. There is a strong feeling that this emphasis should be continued.

COOPERATIVE PARISH MINISTRIES

The purpose of Cooperative Parish Ministries is to strengthen the mission and ministry of local churches in close geographical proximity through working together. Where cooperation has become the norm for churchmanship this purpose is being realized in congregations, among clergy, and by agencies of the annual conferences.

Through the Office of Cooperative Parish Ministries we propose the following:



A. Training and Consultation

- To provide training for directors of parish and probe staffs and for coordinators of exploratory areas;
- To provide training for exploratory, probe and parish teams in each district;
- 3. To provide for consultation and training for parish councils;
- 4. To provide funding and/or opportunities for individual staff members to acquire specialized training in cooperative parish ministries at district, conference, jurisdictional, and general church levels;
- 5. To provide training for cabinet and conference personnel in cooperative parish ministries.

B. Interpretation and Communication

- 1. To publish and distribute a brochureon the cooperative parish process and existing service areas;
- 2. To share news, information, and resources about cooperative parish ministries;
- 3. To continue development and production of new resources in cooperative parish ministries;
- 4. To provide for interpretive events in churches that are interested in cooperation;

C. Administration

- 1. To provide for annual evaluation of the Area Direc;
- 2. To evaluate yearly the "Arkansas Area Policy on Cooperative Parish Ministries";
- 3. To evaluate cooperative efforts at preparatory, probe and parish levels;
- 4. To continue cooperation with conference and area staff;
- 5. To assist the Bishop and cabinets in site selection, development, and staffing for cooperative parish ministries;
- 6. To work closely with Parish and Community Development committees and other conference agencies for purposes of resourcing, funding and program development in cooperative parish ministries;
- 7. To cooperate with the Office of Town and Country Ministries, National Division, Board of Global Ministries;
- 8. To cooperate with the Office of Church and Community Ministries, National Division, Board of Global Ministries, for the purpose of providing workers in cooperative settings;

(6) Seminary Student — Local Pastor

(7) Undergraduate Student — Local Pastor

(8)Other categories

Applications for Salary Supplements from Equitable Salaries shall be considered in the order listed above. It is the primary responsibility of the Commission to provide for full-time ministry in the Conference. We will do all we can to fund all applications which meet the Guidelines, but limited funds may prevent us from giving full funding in all cases.

ENABLING LEGISLATION

2. We recommend that the Directors shall each receive an allowance for housing and appurtenances of \$6,700 per year.

3. The Directors when traveling at the request of a board, agency, or district, shall have the room, board and travel expense borne by the board, agency, or district. The directors when traveling out of state at the request of a board, council, or agency, shall have their expense paid for by the board, council, or agency.

4. We recommend that the Directors when traveling on conference business, other than that provided for in the preceding paragraph, shall have a vouchered travel pool of \$12,000, and their reimbursement for such Conference travel shall be at the

January 1, 1984 IRS business rates.

G. We recommend that the Pastor's Moving Expense Fund continue to be distributed at the same rate and under the same conditions of eligibility described in the 1976 Journal.

III. Other Recommendations

- A. That the Conference direct the Area Treasurer to withhold dispersal of funds to any agency, institution or organization until CFA has received the most recent audit of a Public Accountant or Certified Public Accountant from that agency, institution or organization and that audit has been found satisfactory by the audit committee of CFA.
- B. That the Conference fund two reserve clergy and two reserve lay delegates to both Jurisdictional and General Conference at the same rate at which full delegates are funded, with the exception that reserve delegates to General Conference will receive no per diem funding for the first three days of General Conference.
- C. That there be applied to all 1984 apportionments a uniform percentage "pad" of three per cent. (Such a "pad" has been added to and IS REFLECTED IN all apportionments appearing in this report.)
- D. That all interest earnings on Conference monies be credited to the Conference Contingency Fund.
- E. That the cash assets of the Conference be handled in a manner that will insure adequate liquidity to protect the safety and soundness of all funds. A basic consideration is to maximize the income of the Conference while insuring that the bank balances at all times should adequately cover the day-to-day operations of the Treasurer's Office.

We Further recommend that all investments be kept at the highest rate of interest available, always fully insured on a short-term basis, generally ninety days, and never over six months without approval of the Investment Committee of CFA. Although there may be times when various monies can be invested for longer periods, long periods of time are discouraged because of unforeseen needs for funds and the volatility of interest rates.

When the Area Treasurer is unsure about an investment, it is recommended that she consult with a majority of the Investment Committee of CFA. This policy is

intended to be flexible in its operation in order to deal with rapidly changing economic conditions.

This policy may be amended from time to time to meet changing situations and to enhance the income of the Conference.

Foremost in consideration of this policy is the maintenance of adequate funds and

the avoidance of speculative investments.

- F. That the Conference provide funds for the stabilization of the monthly income for the Arkansas United Methodist and guarantee 90% of the monthly income from the apportionment and that the fund be adjusted quarterly.
- G. That the Conference acknowledge the need for maintaining monies to be used as needed for the stabilization of the accounts of Wesley Foundation, Arkansas United Methodist, Church Extension, District Superintendents, Council on Ministries, and Cooperative Parish Ministries (approximately \$50,000).
- H. That participation by the Conference in Area programs must not exceed 50% of the cost of that program, with exceptions approved by the CFA.
- I. That the Conference retain 30% of the Missional Priority Fund for Conference projects related to the ethnic minority local church.

IV. Administration Concerns

- A. The financial study authorized by the Conference and conducted by CFA is being submitted to the Conference in a self-contained separate report.
- B. In determining the program budget of the Conference, we remind the Conference of the following procedure: (1) the CCOM determines the cost of programs and ministries; (2) the CFA determines the total amount of funds available for the conference benevolence budget; (3) the CCOM recommends to the CFA an itemized program budget totalling no more than the amount the CFA recommends. The responsibility for determining budget priorities rests with the CCOM. Changes made during the year in program board and agency budgets can be made only with the approval of the CCOM or by the Executive Committee of the CCOM.
- C. All requests from institutions shall be presented to the appropriate board or agency of the Conference for recommendation before presentation to the CFA.
- D. All persons authorized to vouch for funds shall be identified by agencies and approved by the CCOM prior to the dispensing of funds.
- E. All apportionments shall be received by the Area Treasurer by 2:00 p.m. on Wednesday after the first Sunday in January.
- F. Each charge shall declare all ministerial support. The report shall include remuneration for salary, travel, utility expense, insurance, social security, and all additional compensation paid to the pastor or on behalf of the pastor.
- G. All benevolent and connectional funds shall be sent to the Office of Finance and Management, P.O. Box 3401, Little Rock, Arkansas 72203, except for the following which shall be sent as designated:
 - 1. Arkansas Methodist Children's Home Christmas offering and special gifts to the Office of the Superintendent, 2002 Fillmore, Little Rock, Arkansas 72204.
 - 2. All insurance premiums be sent according to the instructions from the Committee on Group Insurance.
- H. We express our appreciation to Ms. Ann Onstott and her staff for the excellent service they perform for the Conference.

FINANCIAL STUDY CONDUCTED BY THE NORTH ARKANSAS COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

Introduction — At the 1981 session of the North Arkansas Annual Conference, the Conference Council on Finance and Administration was instructed to arrange for a study of "all aspects" of the structure of the conference including "pension program, and to include a serious consideration of a definite policy on salaries conference wide." (1981 Journal, North Arkansas Conference, page 150, IIIB.) This study was to be conducted by a "General Board Agency." Since the Commission on Equitable Salaries was authorized to help in the

study of salaries (1981 Journal, North Arkansas Conference, page 71), the Council on Finance and Administration asked the Commission on Equitable Salaries to be primarily responsible for the study of pastors' salaries. Other salary studies would be done by the CF&A.

At the 1982 session of the North Arkansas Annual Conference, the CF&A requested an extension of the study time until the 1983 session.

Since the original action of the conference in mandating the financial study asked that a "General Board Agency" make the study, the Conference CF&A contacted the General Council on Finance and Administration and listed for the GCFA the areas of our concern. The GCFA responded in a very responsible way, sending a great deal of statistical data, especially statistics on eleven annual conferences similar in size to the North Arkansas Annual Conference. Other materials have been gathered from the South Central Jurisdictional office, from special studies conducted by conferences, etc. The CCFA has given attention to this material at several meetings and presents the following as its report to the North Arkansas Annual Conference.

Salaries Of District Superintendents — From a study made by Dr. Duane Bruce, Executive Director of the South Central Jurisdiction, we conclude that the North Arkansas Conference is somewhat below mid-range of the 1983 remuneration received by District Superintendents in the conferences of this jurisdiction. Counting base salary only, there are nine conferences that pay more than North Arkansas and five that pay less than North Arkansas. The average base salary is \$31,596 and North Arkansas pays \$30,000. The median salary for the jurisdiction is \$31,600. Housing, utilities and travel items allowed by the various conferences are roughly the same.

Salaries Of Council Directors — Since most annual conferences try to keep the salary of the Council Director on a par with the salaries of District Superintendents, what is true in the category above is also true for this category.

Administrative Expenses — From a 1982 study made by Earl Carter of the Administrative/Program funding of thirteen conferences of the South Central Jurisdiction, we conclude that the North Arkansas Conference spends less on administration and more on program than the average conference. The average percentage which is spent by the 13 conferences on program is 30%. That means that 70% is the average spent on administration. The North Arkansas Conference spends 39% on program and 61% on administration.

The following conclusions are based on a study of twelve annual conferences (including North Arkansas) roughly comparable in membership and number of churches (within 20% plus or minus).

Pastors' Salaries — 1980 — The total salaries paid to all senior pastors in the North Arkansas Conference rates number 11. The North Arkansas Annual Conference rates number 12 in the percentage of total local church expenditures paid to pastors.

1 & 2. We are improving our church property in a very acceptable way, putting a high percentage of our available monies into building and debt retirement.

General Conclusions -

- 1. According to his/her ability to pay, the average member of a United Methodist Church in this conference is supporting the total program of the church in a very acceptable way. Our per member total local church expenditures on a percentage of our "Effective Buying Power" is No. 3 in the list of 12 conferences. This is a commendation of our stewardship, but may be suggesting that increases in all kinds of askings should be approached cautiously.
- 2. The per member payment to apportionments is rated higher (8) than our ability to pay is rated (12). Again, this commends our stewardship, but seems to indicate the use of caution in increasing our apportionments.
- 3. These studies seem to support a conference financial program of modest increases $-\,3\%$ to 6% .
- 4. This CCFA feels that the projected apportionments for pensions and the current cost of hospitalization are "out of line" with the increases which are feasible at this time.

- We are a small conference and we would not expect the total of our salaries to be highly rated.
- 2. This means that our conference gives a much higher priority to other local expenses than to pastors salaries when compared to other conferences.
- 3. This low rating is realted to our economic situation as well as number 2. But our conference has moved from \$13.44 per member in 1976 to \$22.56 per member in 1980.

THE COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES

The Commission on Equitable Salaries shall be composed of seven ministers of the Conference and one lay person from each District in the Conference, including one minister and one lay person from churches of fewer than 200 members. The Annual Conference shall elect a chairperson quadrennially. The Commission shall elect a vice-chairperson and a secretary quadrennially. These officers shall compose the Executive Committee. A representative of the Town and Country ministries of the Conference Board of Global Ministries and a representative of the Board of Ordained Ministry appointed by that Board shall serve as non-voting ex-officio members of the commission



PURPOSE

The Commission on Equitable Salaries is charged by the 1980 Book of Discipline with the responsibility of working to improve the conditions, both financial and physical, in which the full-time ministers of the Conference work. The program described below is designed to apply the resources of the Conference toward that end.

SALARY SUPPLEMENTS

The salary supplements shown in the schedule below are designed to relate to the "average cash salary" of the Conference for the year 1982. The 1982 "average cash salary" was \$14,723.00.* The goal of these supplements is to provide a conference member working full-time with an income equal to 90% of the average cash salary.

This schedule shall take effect on January 1, 1984, for that calendar year.

(1) This amount shall be 60% of the Total Compensation Package.

(2) Members in Full Connection, Associate Members and Probationary Members, and Local Pastors who serve Charges with more than two (2) churches, shall be eligible for an additional \$400 per church up to \$800 per year. This amount shall be in addition to the Minimum Salary for each classification.

*Equal to the Board of Pensions actual cash salary less 20% for housing.

C. Requirements for Qualification

- (1) The Base Salary must be paid by the charge, or an amount equal to 60% of the total proposed salary for the year 1984, which amount shall not be less than that paid by the charge in 1983.
- (2) The charge shall pay in full its apportionments for World Service, Episcopal Fund, District Superintendent's Fund, The Equitable Salaries Fund, and the Pension and Benefit Fund. Any underpayments shall result in a proportionate reduction in the amounts of Equitable Salaries Aid given.
- (3) An application for Equitable Salaries Aid must be submitted in writing to the Chairperson of Equitable Salaries by December 10, 1983. It must be made on the appropriate 1983 Application Form and be filled out completely. No other form of application will be accepted! The Commission will meet by January 15, 1984, with the District Superintendents to consider applications that were submitted in December, and to approve applications that meet guidelines.
- (4) Applications must be signed by the District Superintendent, the Pastor and at least one of the following: Lay Leader, Chairman of Finance, or Chairman of the Administrative Board of the church or charge.
- (5) The charge shall submit a report of stewardship cultivation for the year in which Salary Aid is requested.
- (6) The pastor shall submit a copy of the budgets for the various churches on the charge, for the year 1984, as adopted by the Charge Conference.
- (7) Retired pastors are not eligible for minimum salary aid according to the 1980 Book of Discipline, paragraph 447.6.

D. Exceptions

(1) Special consideration may be given to a limited number of charges whose salaries do not meet the guidelines in the Schedule of Supplements listed on the preceding page.

KEY CHARGE

Key Charges shall be related to the Commission on Equitable Salaries by a contractual agreement. The Commission, or representatives from the Commission, shall meet with a committee from the charge which shall include the pastor, the lay leader, the District Superintendent, and two other persons selected by the charge to prepare a contract that outlines the proposed needed salary support of the charge. The contract would be signed by the Chairman and the Secretary of the Commission, the District Superintendent, and three representatives of the charge (two of which shall hold the following positions: the Pastor, the Chairperson of the Administrative Board, the Charge Lay Leader, the charge or local Church Treasurer, the Chairperson of Finance, and the Chairperson of Pastor Parish Relations). The contract shall include the amount of salary aid needed and a specified number of years for which the aid will be needed. The contract can last for up to five years, and the amount of aid granted shall decrease proportionately each year until the amount of aid reaches \$0. During the years of the contract, as the amount of aid decreases, the amount of the Charge's support increases, thus keeping the pastor's salary stable. During the years of the contract, the charge shall endeavor to grow in such a manner that it will be able to support its pastor on its own.

Under the Key Charge Arrangement there would be no maximum or minimum salary level requirements, but the level of support would be determined by the Commission and the Charge Committee.

GENERAL GUIDELINES FOR ADMINISTRATION

A. Definitions:

(1) A MEMBER IN FULL CONNECTION is understood to be a minister voted into the Full Connection relationship in the Annual Conference, and who is serving in a full-time appointment.

(2) AN ASSOCIATE MEMBER OR A PROBATIONARY MEMBER is understood to be a minister voted into that particular Conference relationship, and who is serving a full-time appointment.

(3) A FULL-TIME LOCAL PASTOR is understood to be a lay person who is classified as such by the Board of Ordained Ministry and appointed to a full-time charge.

(4) A STUDENT-LOCAL PASTOR is understood to be a student enrolled as pretheological or theological student and appointed to a charge.

- (5)A LESS-THAN-FULL-TIME CONFERENCE MEMBER is understood to be a ministerial member of the Conference (Full Member, Associate, or Probationary Member) in good standing who requests to serve an appointment in an amount of time less than full-time as agreed upon by the Bishop and the Cabinet, the ordained minister and the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry. The key requirement is that the individual has a claim on the Equitable Salaries Fund (1980 Book of Discipline, paragraphs 437.2 and 438.3b.) A less-than-full-time Conference Member may receive Equitable Salaries Aid in one-quarter increments according to the arrangements of the appointment.
- (6) FULL-TIME SERVICE is understood to mean that the person's entire vocational time is devoted to the work of ministry in the field of labor appointed by the Bishop.
- (7)TOTAL COMPENSATION PACKAGE is understood to be the total of all budgeted compensation paid by the local church/charge plus assistance from all other denominational sources. This shall be added to the amount required by charge before the Supplement from the Commission on Equitable Salaries is computed.

Conclusion (refers to numbers above) —

- 1 & 2. We are doing fairly well on total and per member local church expenditures.
- 3. The total amount being apportioned by the annual conference is not high, as some have thought, but low compared to other conferences.
- 4. However, we are doing a little better when apportionments are figured on a per member basis
- 5. The apportioned budget in our conference is relatively low when considered as a percentage of local church expense. This is contrary to the thinking of some churches.
- 6. This is a state figure reflecting the low economic bracket of the state of Arkansas.
- 7. The high rating of our conference in this category indicates that our members are contributing very well, considering their low "effective buying power." This is at once a commendation of our stewardship and perhaps a warning that increases in giving may be slower in the future.

The Session of Annual Conference offers the Council an opportunity thru the Laity Session to impart information about the workings of Annual Conference. The intent is to empower all delegates to be participating members of the Conference. The Laity Dinner provides a time of fellowship and inspiration thru speaker and music.

We pledge ourselves to serve with the members of the professional ministry in strengthening our beloved United Methodist Church as we seek to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ.

THE BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY

The purpose of the Board of Ordained Ministry is to provide support and resources to those men and women whose vocation is lived out in the covenant fellowship of the Ordained Ministry of the Annual Conference. The aim of our work, therefore, is to fulfill faithfully our responsibilities to the persons entrusted to our care — at every stage in the pilgrimage of their ministry — as well as our responsibilities to the church. We declare, once again, that we will faithfully adhere to the Disciplinary requirements in all matters relating to the Ministry, and we recommend the following:



I. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- A. That we ensure the continuance of our present program by reserving each year an amount sufficient for our commitments to financial aid to students.
- B. That the Annual Conference appropriate for the working budget of this Board the necessary funds in order for the Board to accomplish its goals.
- C. That we continue our emphasis on the Ministerial Education Program and our United Methodist Seminaries. We urgently request that each local church pay its fair share of the \$163,324. Ministerial Education Fund apportionment for 1984.
- D. That those who desire to make inquiry concerning the Ordained Ministry as their vocation secure proper application forms for Candidacy from their District Superintendent or from the Assistant Registrar for Candidacy, the Rev. Frank Clemmons.

II. POLICY AND PROGRAM

- A. The funds of the Board will be disbursed in the following ways:
 - 1. For the normal work of the Board and its registrars in the operation of the Board and in the guidance of persons related to the Board in training.
 - 2. For financial assistance to students enrolled in seminaries listed by the University Senate of the United Methodist Church, and to candidates enrolled in basic degree programs for Diaconal Ministries. Priority shall be given to students enrolled in United Methodist institutions. Grants will be made on the basis of basic tuition. Grants will be given for not more than four seminary years. To be eligible for grants, students must have received the Certificate of Candidacy and be attending an approved institution. Students are expected to provide information concerning their standing and circumstances to the Assistant Registrar for Seminarians, the Rev. Joe Kennedy. The Grants Officer for the Board is the Rev. Jim Harrison.
- B. The Course of Study Schools:
 - 1. Local Pastors attending the Course of Study Schools at St. Paul School of Theology or Perkins School of Theology will receive financial aid from the Board based on tuition fees and room and board expenses.
 - 2. The Board will no longer be able to pay for books for the Course of Study Schools.
- C. We will support the Arkansas Area Pastors' School by providing funding in the amount of \$1,000.
- D. Continuing Education
 - The Board has adopted a Guideline for Continuing Education in conjunction with the Board of Diaconal Ministry which establishes an expectation of ten Continuing Education Units during a three-year period. (The Guidelines have been circulated and are available on request from the Chairperson of Continuing Education, Dr. Ron Clark.)
 - The Board will provide scholarships for ministers to participate in continuing education opportunities. The maximum grant will be \$50 per person. A pastor may

receive only one grant per year. Such grants will not be made to ministers for whom a continuing education allowance is provided by their local churches. Applications for funds should be made through the Continuing Education Committee of the Board before the event. Pastors will then be reimbursed upon completion of the event. For those in Doctor of Ministry Programs the grants shall be made one time during the work on the degree.

- Special emphasis will be given to group-study programs such as district or subdistrict groupings. The Board will also plan and provide several studies across the Conference in 1984 to further enhance the opportunities for continuing education credits.
- 4. We recommend that each local church or charge allow the pastor Continuing Education leave time as provided in paragraph 441.2 of the 1980 Book of Discipline. This time should not be considered a part of the pastor's vacation.
- 5. We further recommend that each local church or charge provide in its budget a Continuing Education Fund. This item should be separate from salary, utilities, and other expense items, and should not be counted therein. This fund should be a reimbursed expense to encourage professional and personal growth. We request that each District Superintendent make this an item of inquiry at each Charge Conference (par. 441.3)
- E. Office of Pastoral Care and Counseling:

We recommend the continuation of pastoral care and counseling services to pastors and their families. The Advisory Committee on the Office of Pastoral Care and Counseling approves the office of William R. Barling as the office which conducts testing and evaluation for the Board and as a source of counseling for clergy and their families in our Conference. Address:

F. In consideration of paragraphs 414.4 and 424 (4) of the 1980 Book of Discipline, the Board will require psychological evaluations of persons seeking membership in the Annual Conference.

III. RECOMMENDATIONS

- A. That each pastor become familiar with the Candidacy for Ministry process in order to give proper counsel to members of his/her congregation. Each individual entering the Ordained Ministry must complete the Candidacy program.
- B. That local churches (and especially Committees on Pastor/Parish Relations) become familiar with the actions of the General Conference which relate to ministry. Local churches have an increasing role in the process through which a person enters the Ordained Ministry.
- C. That all pastors be urged to attend the Arkansas Pastors' School. This year's School will be held at Hendrix College, August 22-25, 1983.
- D. That congregations in the North Arkansas Conference be encouraged to participate in the seminary intern program.

OUTDOOR MINISTRY

Camp Registration Day is to be April 15, 1984.

Camping Brochures — More brochures will be sent to Pastors.

More registration forms will be included in the brochures.

Flyers for spring youth rally and registration forms will be included.

Camp Directors Certification Program will be in May of 1984.

Certified Camp Directors are to receive \$20 per camp day honorarium. The honorarium is to be divided evenly in the case of co-directors. The money for this honorarium is to come from camp registrations. All Conference and District Camps are to be involved in this program.

\$6.00 is to be included in the camp registrations. This money is to be sent to the Area Treasurer for disbursement. The

Treasurer will pay the insurance for each camper and send the honorarium to each Camp Director. The camp manager is to handle this transaction for the camp directors. Camp directors will handle the transactions when camps are held other than in District camp sites.

The Outdoor Ministries Committee wishes to retain the right to raise \$100,000 for development on Nawake. About \$1,000 has been raised toward this goal from timber management on Nawake by Arkansas Kraft. The timber management contract continues at this time. Arkansas Kraft is doing a very fine job with the contract.

The Outdoor Ministries Committee reserves the right to about \$8,000 that is being carried over in our budget. This money is for purchase of one more piece of property at Sunset Point on Nawake. It is to be purchased when available. This site is the only place where wheelchairs may be taken at this time.

An oil and gas lease agreement has been drawn up with the remote possibility of revenue for development of Nawake.

This is the lease agreement we will follow:

- 1. 5-year lease term
- 2. 1/6 rovalty
- 3. Negotiate for \$50 per acre
- 4. No trespass clause this means they cannot drill on Nawake without our consent as to when and where.

A Master Plan for development of Nawake Conference and Retreat Center was prepared by The Committee on Camp and Conferences of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church and Charles C. Stott, Conference Center and Camp Planner from Raleigh, North Carolina. This report was prompted by a study done concerning needs of Outdoor Ministries for the future. It was indicated that a centralized program and location was needed. Nawake was purchased and the Master Plan completed in 1977. The Outdoor Ministries Committee of the North Arkansas Conference has worked toward development of that Master Plan.

A Caretaker-Director was to be one of the first concerns. Carl and Beverly Fletcher now reside in a new mobile home on Nawake.

Another part of the Master Plan involves the removal of old buildings. This has been completed.

Timber management was a concern after the hot summer of 1980. Arkansas Kraft is doing a very fine job with timber management. Money is coming from this project for development of Nawake.

A Retreat Center is a part of the Master Plan in the development of Nawake. Input has come to The Outdoor Ministries Committee from several sources expressing a concern about the use of such facilities. Input has come from: Hendrix College, Philander Smith College, Youth Council of the North Arkansas Conference, United Methodist Men, United Methodist Women, Board of Ordained Ministry, Health and Welfare Agencies, and some local churches.



The Board of Discipleship asked the Outdoor Ministries Committee to continue with plans toward construction of a Conference Retreat Center on Nawake. The Committee is to bring a proposal as to how this may be done to the North Arkansas Council on Ministries meeting. The Board of Discipleship approved the general idea of a Retreat Center proposal January 28, 1983. The Council On Ministries of the North Arkansas Conference heard the proposal from Outdoor Ministries concerning the retreat center February 25, 1983.

The proposal made by Methodist Health Systems of Memphis is a part of The Outdoor Ministries report to the North Arkansas Council on Ministries. This proposal is a way to complete a major portion of The Nawake Master Plan. The proposal is included in the next part of this report. A more complete proposal will be presented to the 1983 session of the

North Arkansas Conference for approval.

In our continuing effort to fulfill our commitment of expanded support to the needs of the three owning conferences, Methodist Health Systems of Memphis has established a Life Enrichment Program. This program consists of:

*Marriage and Family Counseling/Education

*Continuing Education Seminars and Workshops

*Redemptive Counseling for Pastor and Family

*Geriatrics Counseling Centers

A definitive description of the Life Enrichment Program is attached for your information. To fully realize the potential that this program promises, we discovered that a Retreat Center — in a pastoral setting — was needed.

As we developed the program, it became apparent that there was no Retreat Center within the boundaries of the owning conferences which would accommodate our basic needs, or those needs of the conference members.

When we learned of the property at Nawake, and an already existing master plan for a Retreat Center similar to what we were envisioning, we were anxious to determine the

status of that ambitious project.

In view of the needs which we have identified for the Life Enrichment Program and the needs of the North Arkansas Conference for a similiar Retreat Center, Methodist Health Systems is prepared to make the following proposal relating to the Nawake conference grounds.

Methodist Health Systems will finance and build a retreat complex to consist of the

following:

* A retreat center with individual lodging rooms, adequate number of meeting rooms, dining facilities, book/gift shop, chapel, parking facilities, small number of individual cottages, and basic recreational facilities.

Additionally, we propose the following:

* The retreat center and recreational facilities will be available to the membership of the North Arkansas Conference, as well as Methodist Health System's

personnel.

We recommend that the Annual Conference approve the plan of the Methodist Hospital Foundation, Inc., Memphis, Tennessee, for the building and operation of a Life Enrichment Center on the site of the Nawake Conference Center, Stone County, Arkansas, subject to the following provisions and restrictions:

- (1) That the North Arkansas Conference deed up to fifty (50) acres of the Nawake Conference Center land to the Methdist Hospital Foundation, Inc. for this project, and that the Conference direct the Conference trustees to take the necessary actions for this. It is further provided that a reversionary clause shall be included in the deed.
- (2) That whatever is built must be in harmony with the Master Plan for the Nawake Conference Center which was developed by Mr. Charles C. Stott, Raleigh, North Carolina, in 1977 and approved by the North Arkansas Conference in June 1977.
- (3) That The Methodist Hospital Foundation, Inc. include substantial representation from the Committee on Outdoor Ministries of the North Arkansas Conference Bd. of Discipleship in whatever management team (Board of Directors, etc.) is designed to develop and operate the Life Enrichment Center.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

The North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions is charged with the work of providing for and contributing to the support, relief, assistance and pensioning of the ministers and their families of the United Methodist Church.

In order to fulfill this responsibility, the Board of Pensions must:

- 1. Recommend an Annuity Rate for Pre-1982 Service years.
- Pay Hospitalization premiums for eligible retired and disabled personnel.
- 3. Provide special grants for persons in distress.
- 4. Pay Death Benefit Premium (DBP) for eligible retirees and active ministers not covered under the Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP).
- Process claims for benefits such as disability benefits, survivors, benefits and pension benefits.
- 6. Make annual evaluation of the Pension and Benefit Program and recommend appropriate changes and improvements and provisions for funding.
- 7. Provide a Love Offering for retirees and support for the Fellowship of Retired Servants.
- 8. Coordinate the Pension and Benefit Program with other Boards, Committees, and Councils of the Annual Conference.

Therefore, we recommend that:

- 1. The Pre-1982 Annuity Rate for Fiscal 1984 be set at \$168.00 per service year.
- 2. The North Arkansas Conference continue participation in the Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) and the Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) of the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church as follows:
 - (a) that the contribution rate for Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) be up to 12% of the Denominational Average Compensation (DAC).
 - (b) that each minister contribute 3% of his/her Plan Compensation up to the DAC to his/her personal account with the General Board of Pensions.
 - (c) that the contribution to Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) be 4.4% of which 1% shall be contributed by the participating minister figured on his/her compensation base.
 - (d) that both current-service and past-service be paid by apportionment to the churches.
 - (e) that our unfunded obligation be amortized over a forty (40) year period beginning January 1, 1982.
 - (f) that the Death Benefit Program (DBP) Supplement of 150% of the Denominational Average Compensation (DAC) be continued as an addition to the Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP).



(g) that we include any ministers in the Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) who are eligible for the Special Arrangement feature.

(h) that the surviving spouse continue to receive benefits at 70% of the Formula Benefit

rate for pre-1982 service.

3. In order to adequately provide for this program (Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP), Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP), HMEP Insurance for the retired ministers and families, and prior service funding), the churches shall pay an apportioned amount totaling, for the Conference, \$1,200,000.

4. The work of the Board of Pensions on Proportional Payment of Ministerial Support be continued in accord with provisions of Paragraph 726.4 of the 1980 Discipline, using the

guidelines listed on page 121 of the 1978 Journal.

- 5. Allowance grants, retirement love offerings and local expenses of the Board of Pensions be paid by the Treasurer of the Conference Board of Pensions, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee of the Conference Board of Pensions and the 1980 Discipline, Paragraph 1706.13.
- 6. The institution, board or organization paying the salary of a minister on special appointment without annuity claim on the Conference shall make provisions for the Pension of such person. Attention is called to the 1980 Discipline, Paragraph 1706.3a(3); with reference to eligibility to participate in Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) and Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP).
- 7. There be apportioned to each agency and institution served by a ministerial member under special appointment with annuity claim on the Conference an amount equal to 15.4% of the Denominational Average Compensation (DAC).

- 11. In determining years of service, the Board of Pensions shall carefully examine and consider those years listed in the Conference Journal prior to accepting them as valid years; and any years in question shall be subject to validation by the applicant and by approval of the Board of Pensions.

12. All approved local pastors continue to provide all information necessary relative to their

service records.

13. The Executive Committee elected by the Board of Pensions be designated in the Journal with the roster of the members of the Board of Pensions.

14. Eligible claimants who have been retired by the North Arkansas Conference will have their Conference Death Benefit Program (DBP) premium paid by the Conference Board of Pensions. We recommend that all retired ministers, widows and dependent children, who are our responsibility, be covered under the Hospitalization Insurance Policy (HMEP). The cost to be paid 100% by the Board of Pensions. Retired individuals, eligible for Medicare, shall personally pay the Medicare monthly payments.

15. Each minister at the time of full retirement and drawing annuity from the General Board of Pensions be given a love offering of \$600.00.

16. An amount equal to 100% of the pension or any amount in excess of the first \$5,200 of disability payments received during the year of 1984 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance respectively for each retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister of the North Arkansas Conference. (See Resolutions).

17. Special grants be made to:

18. Ministers desiring to participate in the TAX-DEFERRED program of the General Board of Pensions should write Dr. Eugene Moore, Assistant General Secretary, General Board of Pensions, 1200 Davis Street, Evanston, Illinois 60201.

19. As of January 1, 1980, Paragraph 1706.4a(2) of the 1980 Discipline be enforced.

20. The payments to annuitants from the General Board of Pensions be filed with the Secretary of the Conference Board of Pensions, to be made available upon request.

PROPOSAL TO THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE FOR A SPECIAL FUND-RAISING PROGRAM

PURPOSE: In order to properly fund the minister's Pension Plan, to reduce the Pension Plan's unfunded liability, and to avoid the undue restriction of monies for other conference programs, the North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions submits the following Proposal for a fund-raising campaign.

An effective fund-raising program in an Annual Conference should enable the Conference to raise the funds needed for its specified cause(s), and should also benefit the on-going

program of the local churches, especially in the area of financial stewardship.

I. The proposed Conference Program Plan requires the support of the local churches

and is based on the following premises:

- That the Annual Conference give thoughtful and enthusiastic approval of the fundraising program.
- That there be active participation in the Program by the Resident Bishop, District Superintendents, Conference Staff, Pastors, Lay Leaders and other members of the churches.
- 3. That the methods, leadership and basic program offered by the Office of Finance and Field Service be followed.
- 4. That all local churches be encouraged to cooperate in a unified effort to secure financial commitments to meet the program goal.
- II. The proposed Conference Program would be carried out in three phases, as follows, with suggested dates:
 - 1. Preparation Phase: July 1 to December 31, 1983
 - a. Resident Director from Office of Finance and Field Service assigned and in residence part time.
 - b. Conference Committee functions under guidance of Resident Director.
 - c. Calendar established, promotional/interpretation/guidance materials prepared and distributed, office established, etc.
 - d. District and Local Church committees organized.
 - 2. Intensive Phase: January 1 to May 31, 1984
 - a. Resident Director in residence full time.
 - b. Conferencewide Pastors and spouses meeting, District Rallies and Cluster Workshops, for information, inspiration and training.
 - c. Local Church committees function to implement program through information, inspiration and invitation to members to respond with financial commitment.
 - d. Commitments are received and reports shared with churches and Annual Conference.
 - 3. Follow-Up Phase: June 1, 1984 to May 31, 1987
 - a. Payment period of financial commitments.
 - b. Reports on progress of program shared with local churches.
 - c. Regular "record of giving" reports distributed.
 - d. Opportunity given for churches not participating at time of Intensive Phase to do so at an alternate time.
 - e. Additional informational materials developed as needed and desirable.
- III. The proposed Program Financial Goals are to be as follows:
 - 1. Causes and amounts to be included:

Pension Fund (to reduce Conference's unfunded liability)

Total Yield Goal: \$3,000,000.00

2. To reach this Yield Goal, the following need to be included in the Total Program Goal:

- 3. Items in the Total Program Goal:
- a. Yield Goal:

The Yield Goal is recommended upon the basis of the following factors:

- 1) Strength of the Conference in members and Budget.
- 2) Performance and response in the recent years by the Churches to Conference causes.
- The nature of the causes and the appeal and challenge to giving that they should convey.
- 4) The opportunity that this program will give the local churches and members

to grow in their Christian financial stewardship commitment and outreach.

h Attrition:

Our office has found that in Conference programs, it is necessary to add an attrition factor to provide for shrinkage in some local church acceptances and in payment of some commitments.

c. Service Charge:

Covers all costs related to our Office and Directors. The Service Charge is to be paid as follows: \$5,000 on signing of contract, and \$57,500 on May 15, 1984.

d. Program Costs:

Covers preparation of materials, printing, mailings, office costs, secretarial help, telephone and travel expenses. It is customary for a representative of an Executive Committee to jointly approve all expenditures with the Resident Director.

e. Follow-up Costs:

An allowance to provide for personnel, materials, etc., to assure an adequate follow-up to the program.

IV. The Office of Finance and Field Service will provide the services of a Supervising Director, a Resident Director and additional Associate Directors as needed during the District Rallies and Cluster Workshops.

THEREFORE: The North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions moves the adoption of this proposal, with authorization granted to contract with the Office of Finance and Field Service, National Division, General Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church, to conduct this special fund-raising program in the North Arkansas Conference.



COMMITTEE ON POLICY AND REVIEW

The Committee on Policy and Review, in keeping with the duties assigned to it and after careful consideration, make the following recommendations:

- I. 1. Reimbursement for travel be on the following schedule:
 - A. 1 Person −12¢ per mile
 - B. 2 Persons 14¢ per mile
 - C. 3 Persons 16¢ per mile
 - D. 4 Persons 18¢ per mile
 - Persons traveling to Board and Agency meetings within the State of Arkansas by Air Transportation or other means of public conveyance shall be reimbursed at Conference rate of travel for one person.



- 4. Meal allowances shall be five dollars (\$5.00) per meal.
 5. All boards and agencies highly encourage (1) carpooling, (2) block rental of motel facilities, (3) use of conference camps or local church facilities when possible, (4) use conference telephone calls if business can be completed at lesser expense.
- 6. We recommend that the Committee on Policy and Review be authorized to review the travel allowance semi-annually and, in light of fluctuating costs of gasoline, be authorized to alter the travel allowance. Also, that they be authorized to ask the various boards and committees to contribute a proportional amount to the travel and expense fund of the Conference from their budgets.
- 7. All vouchers for travel, meals, lodging and other board expenses be within thirty (30) days of incurred bill.
- 8. We recommend that for meetings held out of state that Annual Conference boards and agencies consider sending not more than two persons if air travel is involved. When it becomes essential or important to send more than two persons to an out-of-state meeting, we recommend that the board or agency chairman and the Conference Council Director confer and plan travel arrangements that will take into consideration economy of time and finances. We further recommend a per-diem allowance of up to \$45 per day (\$30 for room and \$15 for meals) for out-of-state meetings.
- 9. We recommend that it shall be the policy of the Annual Conference that all funding for meetings must be presented to the proper board or council before the meeting takes place. It shall be the policy of the Annual Conference not to fund a meeting after the fact.

These rules shall apply to United Methodist meetings only — meetings planned and sponsored by a board or agency of the United Methodist Church.

We further recommend that travel, room and board expenses to meetings not planned and/or sponsored by United Methodist Boards and agencies not be funded by Conference funds.

- II. In keeping with the priorities of the program of the General Church with regard to Ethnic Minority Local Church programs, we recommend:
 - The Annual Conference continue the policy that receipts from the sale of former Southwest Conference properties be designated to strengthen black ministries in the North Arkansas Conference.

- III. We recommend that Standing Rule 20, Page 187, 1982 Journal be changed to read:
 - (20) Each year the Conference Council on Ministries will determine the number of additional lay persons, if any, to be named and will notify each District Council on Ministries of the number of persons to be named by it, encouraging them to use the following formula with top priority to be given to Number 1, etc:
 - 1. Diaconal Ministries
 - 2. Lay Delegates to general and jurisdictional conference
 - 3. Ethnic minority and small membership churches
 - 4. Elected chairpersons for conference boards and agencies
 - 5. Officers of the Conference Council on Lay, Life and Work
 - 6. Conference United Methodist Women officers within the bounds of a district.
 - 7. Elected lay persons to general and jurisdictional conference boards and agencies
 - 8. District presidents of United Methodist Women and district presidents of United Methodist Men and United Methodist Youth Fellowship
 - 9. Lay members of conference boards and agencies
 - 10. One additional youth from each district
 - 11. At-large district representation.
- IV. In response to the directive of the Annual Conference of 1982 (1982 Journal, Pages 70 and 71) Policy and Review will present the results of the studies on Pastor's Moving Expense and Pay Periods to the 1983 session of the Annual Conference. This will be presented as a supplement to our report.

STUDY 1 DR. J. RALPH HILLIS

SUBJECT: TRAVEL ASSISTANCE FOR INTERNS AND SEMINARIANS

Motion: Vic Nixon moved that we amend Policy and Review guidelines to include Seminary interns and returning Seminarians among those eligible to receive moving expense funds from seminary to Conference line.

By order of the Annual Conference, page 70, 1982 Journal, we have defined our moving expense fund as: Assistance at a stated rate, churches are apportioned to assist in moving expense, the distance from each seminary to the conference line being different, and with no conference policy on facilities used to move, (U-Haul, Professional Moving Companies, or local movers, etc.), it is therefore recommended that we continue the assistance program from conference line to parsonage as our guideline.

STUDY 2 REV. JERRY PULLIAM

SUBJECT: STUDY RELATIVE TO CONFERENCE PAYING TOTAL COSTS FOR PASTOR'S MOVING TO CHARGES FOR WHICH THE COMPENSATION IS AT OR BELOW THE CONFERENCE AVERAGE SALARY.

Motion: Philip L. Hathcock moved that we request the Committee on Policy and Review continue its study of the moving expense policy with the suggestion that the conference shall pay actual expense for Pastor's moving to appointments for which the compensation is at or below the conference average salary.

I have researched the pay schedules of each district, contacted the Equitable Salaries Committee for the figures they use to arrive at their level of compensation, been in contact with the General Board of Pensions, and find that each time we talk of Salary or Average Compensation, we use different figures.

Therefore, with this ambiguity in the term Salary, do we include housing, utilities, travel or 20% added compensation for parsonage, if provided, and due to the conference vote of 1982, page 70, 1982 Journal, that our program be considered an Assistance Program at a stated rate. It is recommended that we continue with the present assistance program for all eligible participants.

STUDY 3

SUBJECT: STUDY RELATIVE TO PAY PERIODS FOR PASTORS INVOLVED IN CONFERENCE MOVES.

"Victor Nixon moved that Policy and Review study the matter (of problems) caused

by pay schedules related to moving date in the annual conference. Recommendations to be presented to next year's (1983) annual conference." (1982 Journal, page 76).

I have researched the (NA) Conference Journals from 1961-1982 for a total of twenty-two (22) annual moving dates. Out of these years, we had four (4) years with moving dates on or later than June 15. There were eighteen (18) years when moves were earlier than June 15. The latest moving date was June 17. The earliest moving date was June 4.

I also have contacted the sixteen other Annual Conferences in our jurisdiction and I have letters in hand from every one of them stating that they each operate on a June 1-May 31

Conference appointment and pay period. This was without a single exception.

In view of the history of our Conference and the obvious uniform policy throughout the jurisdiction, the Committee on Policy and Review recommends that the Annual Conference officially adopt as policy what it has practiced historically by stating that, (1) the pay period for the conference year be stated as June 1-May 31, and that (2) Pastors who are to move following appointment changes at the Annual Conference be reminded that they are not to receive any of the June salary from the charge which they are leaving.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

"For as many of you as were baptized into Christ have put on Christ. There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is neither male nor female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus." Gal. 3:27-28

The inclusive character of God's Kingdom, particularly represented through the Christian community, is neither debatable nor negotiable. It is a theological/Christological reality or given. When Christian bodies, in their institutional forms, fail to reflect this inclusiveness they cease to faithfully represent the will of God or the true nature of Christian existence. Concern for the elimination of racism, sexism, everything that belies our inclusive nature, is, therefore, the task of the whole church. Since it is the primary responsibility of the Annual Conference Commission on Religion and Race to assist the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church, in its institutional life, to be what it truly is as a manifestation of the Christian community — an inclusive body — we make the following recommendations:



- 1. That the North Arkansas Conference commit its economic resources to assist existing ethnic congregations in their evangelizing task, without regard to the percentage of ethnic membership within the conference;
- 2. That the Bishop and cabinet during 1984, in consultation with churches that have signed the "Covenant for an Inclusive Church" and the Conference Board of Ministry, actively recruit ethnic pastors for appointment to some of these churches:
- 3. That every district and local church of the conference include programs designed to create better understanding, and enhance closer, more meaningful working relationships between minorities, both within the churches and the larger society;
- 4. That every district assist the local churches in studying the "Covenant for an Inclusive Church" during 1984; addressing those obstacles to manifesting the church's inclusive nature; and proposing steps to overcome them.

In addition to fulfilling its monitoring responsibilities, the Conference Commission on Religion and Race will be available to help the districts, local churches, and conference agencies in their efforts to fulfill these recommendations.

In pursuit of developing an inclusive church, United Methodist boards, agencies, commissions, and committees of an Annual Conference are expected to operate within the

Disciplinary guidelines of the 1980 General Conference (Discipline, Paragraph 729). Whether such organizations are the creatures of the Annual Conference, or of the General Conference, periodic evaluations are required if the purpose of the General Conference is to be realized through effective stewardship.

Historic diversities within Methodism relate to geographic regions, population composition, cultural (ethnic) characteristics, and social environments to such a degree that evaluation procedures must be both inclusive and specific; and, meaningful evaluation must reflect local contributions to this effort. A statement of policy regarding the organization's commitment to the inclusive church, in terms of existing environmental and internal constraints and potential growth, should make possible this local aspect of the definition of what is to be evaluated.

A unified compliance with the General Conference program mandates does not automatically flow within local churches, districts and annual conferences from the 1980 Discipline. Without a systematic monitoring system no informed measure of progress toward the goal of inclusiveness is possible.

The 1980 General Conference charged the Conference Commission on Religion and Race with the responsibility to perform this monitoring function; to examine all of the conference boards, agencies, commissions, and committees, as well as the governing boards of related institutions. On the basis of these evaluations the Commission on Religion and Race is then charged to make appropriate recommendations for total inclusiveness within the conference.

From a practical viewpoint, therefore, it seems appropriate to adopt an evaluation procedure that provides two levels of analysis: a) evaluation of mandated structures and programs, and b) evaluation of specific Annual Conference, District, and Congregational goals directed toward this program.

Structures and agencies subject to a standard evaluation for the inclusive church are: The Annual Conference, the Annual Conference Program Council, the Councils on Ministries, the Annual Conference boards, agencies, institutions, commissions, committees, local United Methodist Churches, and their employed staff personnel, along with laity/clients served.

Definitions:

Ethnic minority is a population category which is intentionally or unintentionally blocked or omitted from full participation in the United Methodist Church because of stereotyped perceptions of the majority, resulting in discrimination, prejudice, segregation of minority persons (e.g., elderly, women, handicapped, racial and ethnic populations).

Full participation refers to the ability to have minority in-put considered and adopted in ways which will provide minority persons some control over those church activities that eventually affect their lives and the ministries of the United Methodist Church.

A standard evaluation schedule should include:

- A. 1. Minority demographic data, related to characteristics of the majority; minority churches; minority families; individuals within the preview of the specific conference, board, agency, etc.
 - A trend analysis based on the 1980 year and the 1983 recent year would be helpful.
 - 2. Minority presence in offices and/or leadership positions in the above.
 - 3. Financial outlays for/of minorities within the above (A. 1.).
- B. Assessment of the Conference, board, agency, etc., awareness of the General Conference goals and objectives concerning the inclusive church.
- C. Assessment of the Conference, board, agency, etc., response to the General mandates regarding structure and program requirements toward the inclusive church.
 - 1. Compliance with the disciplinary goals:
 - Development of any additional local components of disciplinary goals in a formal policy.
- D. Assessment of the methods and specific objectives implemented by the UMC organizations, as outlined in the policies.

E. Assessment of progress, as of the current year, in both methods and objectives, through the use of demographic, attitudinal and behavioral research.

METHODIST FOUNDATION OF ARKANSAS

The United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas is a benevolent, not for profit corporation charted by the State of Arkansas on October 31, 1963, pursuant to authority granted by the Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conferences. The Foundation is an area service agency of the United Methodist Church in Arkansas in stewardship through bequests in wills, trusts, property gifts, life income agreements, life insurance, and other forms of current or deferred giving.

The services of the Foundation are mutually beneficial to the institutions and programs of the two Annual Conferences and to prospective donors. The Foundation serves donors by providing estate and charitable gift planning counsel, and in some instances, by serving as an executor of an estate or as a trustee of a charitable trust agreement.

The business of the Foundation is managed by a Corporate Board of Directors, nominated by the resident Bishop of the Arkansas Area of the United Methodist Church, elected by the Corporate Board, and approved by each of the two Annual Conferences. The Board is comprised of 24 directors, 12 from each Annual Conference. In addition, the Foundation has 8 ex-officio directors. The Foundation has 4 active committes; executive, investment, budget and finance, and development.

President's Report — 1982

Although we are far from reaching even our intermediate goals, 1982 showed more progress than any other twelve months in the history of The United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas. The accompanying financial statement and the commitments of our executive director, James B. Argue, Jr., reflect not only a steady growth of funds which we administer, but show the breadth of the service we now render to local churches, Methodist related institutions, and individual parishioners.

Because the two annual conferences within the Arkansas Area appropriate sufficient funds to pay about one-third of our operating overhead (the other two-thirds being furnished by board members and other donors), we have been able to handle the various trusts at no cost to the Methodist constituents. Our operating expenses are kept at a minimum, and if we need to make charges for services in the future they should be modest.

The board of directors of the foundation met for its semi-annual meeting on November 5, 1982, and several noteworthy actions were taken. A \$35,000 grant from foundation funds was extended to Good Shepherd Ecumenical Retirement Center for its new facilities. Good Shepherd is a joint venture of the United Methodists, Episcopalians, and Catholics. This grant represented our denomination's participation in the expansion project. When completed, about 55 new apartments will be available at Good Shepherd.

A \$20,000 loan was extended to North Pulaski United Methodist Church under favorable terms. This congregation was established in 1982, and the loan is intended to help in building their new facility. The income earned from this loan will benefit the North Arkansas Conference ministerial pensions program.

Our legal advisers, Phil Dixon and Larry Yancey, offer solid legal and tax advice to our giftmakers. Our attorneys do a great deal with very little remuneration. And, of course, I am indebted to the many United Methodist pastors who see the merit in our purpose.

But our efforts would be fruitless if not for those persons who made gifts to the foundation. Association with these persons has been my greatest reward. They are loving, caring, benevolent, and committed United Methodists who want to see the ministries of the Church on a solid financial footing. Unlike popular belief, they are not exclusively wealthy or elderly. We have not led any of these persons to give generously. Instead, we've simply offered counsel, and sometimes solved problems, so that these persons could achieve their charitable ambitions. The faith, love, and commitment expressed by these persons has been humbling.

As you read this report, please recognize that there are many ways in which you can support our mission. You can make gifts utilizing the services of the foundation. You can be informed. You can refer persons who may benefit from our services. In fact, if someone comes to mind, send us a note and we'll send them this report.

A review of the foundation financial statement will quickly point out our phenomenal growth in 1982. Our growth can continue with your support.

Financial Highlights

The year 1982 marked the greatest growth in any twelve month period in the history of the foundation. Assets soared from \$206,000 to \$539,000. This represents a 162% increase.

Basically, the foundation receives five types of monies during the year. First, outright, unrestricted gifts to a United Methodist program or institution are received. These gifts flow through the foundation to the beneficiary, and since no further services are rendered by the foundation, these gifts are not reported on our financial statement. Second, gifts establishing endowments are received. With these gifts, only the income earned each year is available to support the work of the Church. Third, we receive gifts through life income agreements. With these gifts the donor retains the income from the gift for his or her lifetime. Fourth, we receive funds under management agreements. Through this device the foundation provides management and investment services to other institutions. Fifth, the foundation has reserves that are used at the discretion of the Board.

1982-1983 REPORT FROM THE CANDLER SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY **EMORY UNIVERSITY**

The Candler School of Theology at Emory University has a long-standing and significant relationship with the North Arkansas Conference. Not only does it share in the present task of preparing men and women for ministry, but like Emory University, it also has an historical tie to this conference as an educational institution founded nearly 70 years ago by the Southeastern Jurisdiction of the United Methodist Church.

During this current academic year Candler has had an average enrollment of 637 students. This is the highest enrollment in the history of the School and Candler remains the largest seminary in the United Methodist Church. Candler enjoys a national reputation for its strength in preparation for local church ministry. About 85% of these students are preparing to serve in local churches.

Through their teaching, their work with students and their contributions in regional and national settings, Candler's faculty of 53 believing scholars makes an enormous contribution to strengthening the Wesleyan traditions of knowledge and vital piety in our

Church.

In the past year the Institute for World Evangelism, sponsored by the World Methodist Council and Candler, has been launched on the Emory campus. It is working to provide training for pastors in local church evangelism in social and cultural contexts throughout the world.

The new William R. Cannon Chapel has provided intellectual and spiritual nurture for more than 55,000 persons in the past year, through various worship, artistic, and educational programs carried on there. We are grateful to this conference for its financial support in the construction of this building and for your assistance in providing this significant facility for the worshiping community at Emory.

The Candler School of Theology and its students continue to rely heavily on the income from the Ministerial Education Fund for support. We wish to express our thanks to the churches of your conference for their part in sustaining Candler in its mission through the

Ministerial Education apportionment.

THE ARKANSAS UNITED METHODIST

The Arkansas United Methodist was created in September 1982 by joint action of the two annual conferences.

The proposal approved by the special session called for a semi-monthly tabloid publication. Georgia M. Daily was employed as editor and the paper began publishing in January 1983.

The proposal came from the Joint Committee on Communications, recommending a "communications tool" for the United Methodists of Arkansas. It included these provisions:

— That each conference draw \$5,000 from existing funds to use, starting October 1, 1982, for promotion and "start-up" funding.

- That a maximum 10,000 copies of each issue be printed,

with even distribution to each conference.

— That additional subscriptions be sold at a maximum of \$10, with a goal of 500 for the year.

— That a \$100,000 apportionment be provided for 1983 publication, \$50,000 per conference.

— That a five-year plan be adopted. (After five years, not more than 50 percent of the total budget will be expected to come from apportionment.)

- That a search committee be established to interview applicants for the position of

editor.



In June 1983, the AUM office had received more than 1300 subscriptions, more than doubling in five months the goal for the year, and the mailing list was up to 9,000 copies.

A subcommittee of the Joint Committee on Communications supervises the operation of the AUM office.

DIRECTORS REPORT COOPERATIVE PARISH MINISTRIES

North Arkansas Conference — 1983

Bishop Hicks, members and guests of the North Arkansas Conference:

In keeping with our tradition of reporting to the annual conference a portion of the good news in Cooperative Parish Ministries I have asked two persons to assist with our report. Both of these persons are serving as Church and Community Workers in Cooperative Parishes. The first, Linda Tyler, is a US-2 working in South Sebastian County Cooperative Parish, Fort Smith District, with the clergy staff and parish council. Churches in South Sebastian Cooperative Parish are Greenwood, Milltown, Hackett, Bonanza, Hartford, Midland, Huntington, and Mansfield. Linda was assigned to the parish in September last year and comes to us from Michigan. She received her B.A. degree from Albion College and her M.A. degree from Calvin College. In the nine months that Linda has been with us, she has already made a significant contribution to the parish and conference.

The second person is Harold Vault, serving as Church and Community Worker in Marianna Larger Parish, Forrest City District, Tri-County Probe. Mr. Vault is no stranger to the North Arkansas Conference having served as delegate many times from Taylor's Chapel United Methodist Church, Cotton Plant. After a distinguished career in the public school system as educator and administrator, Mr. Vault began a second career as a Church and Community Worker. His assignment became effective in January and, with typical enthusiasm and expertise, he has begun a marvelous ministry in Marianna Larger Parish and Tri-County Parish. We are pleased to welcome him to speak in our report.

The Office of Cooperative Parish Ministries serves training, interpretive, coordinating, consultative and administrative roles to local churches, parishes, districts and agencies in both conferences. Briefly, I want to touch on the more important features of its work over the past year.

1. Training:

- A. Seminar on Leadership Development, Dr. Craig Emerick, Perkins School of Theology, at Camp Aldersgate in August.
- B. Cabinet Consultation with Directors and Coordinators, October.
- C. Covenant and Power in the Cooperative Parish, Dr. Tex Sample, St. Paul School of Theology, February.
- D. Leadership in Cooperative Parish Ministries, Hinton Rural Center, 9 persons, March.
- E. Team Development and Communication Skills, Dr. Martha Hipp, May.

In addition, the Office has been involved in planning the National Consultation on Cooperative Parish Ministries, November 7-10 in Ohio which will feature leadership by Arkansas people and input from two of our Cooperative Parishes.

2. Interpretation:

The Development of the CPM Network Resource Team has enabled us to design and publish two new resources:

A Theology of Cooperation, by Sam Williams

Team Development: A Model Approach, by Phil Hathcock.

Other resources are slated for future publication.

Both in and out of state, persons with CPM experience and expertise continue to provide valuable interpretive resourcing for local churches, districts and conferences that wish to learn about the "Arkansas Model" for cooperation. It is with a large measure of pride that I say that Arkansas United Methodism has assumed a leadership role throughout the whole Church in Cooperative Ministries.

3. Administration:

In addition to routine matters of administration and planning, two items have become extremely important in our efforts to strengthen local churches through cooperation.

The first is seminary internship in cooperative settings. For the past two years we have had Perkins interns in Yell County and North Lonoke/West Prairie Cooperative Parishes. One lay person summed up the evaluation of internships for his church: "The cooperative parish internship has revitalized our church." It also represents one of the most valuable contexts for practical training in Christian ministry. This year we will field three Perkins interns. They are: Dale Gillis, Yell County Cooperative Parish; Katharyn Lehman, Independence County, and Greg Rittenhouse, Boone County.

The second effort has involved a coordinating function in placement of Church and Community Workers with the National Division, BGM, annual conference boards of Global Ministries, and local parishes. You have heard from Linda Tyler and Harold Vault. We are prepared to place two additional workers, one in Three Rivers Cooperative Parish and the other with Metropolitan United Methodist Committee on Relief (MUMCOR), the cooperative relief agency of Little Rock/North Little Rock churches.

4. Parish Development:

It is my happy privilege to announce the organization of two cooperative parishes this year: Three Rivers, Arkadelphia District, LRC, and Marianna Larger Parish, Forrest City District, NAC. Marianna Larger Parish is composed of eight ethnic minority churches under the capable leadership of the following:

Taylor's Chapel, Wesley Chapel, Livingston — Edward Davis, Director

Kynette-Cornerstrong — Everett Scruggs

Smith's Chapel — Sylvester Harris

Scrugg's Chapel — Victor Moore

Church and Community worker — Harold Vault

I would like for these clergy and lay delegates to stand and be recognized by the conference for their hard and productive work.

Cooperative Parish Ministries is one of the most useful and effective strategies for implementing the missional priority to strengthen the Ethnic Minority Local Church.

Thanks to National Division, Edwards' Estate, individuals for training and project funds.

Finally, a personal word. I want to thank the conference for its support for Cooperative Parish Ministries; you have, indeed, made a difference in the life and ministry of congregations. It is a pleasure to leave this office in the capable hands of Louis (Biff) Averitt. It is my hope that you will support him as he leads us into another phase of this exciting and needed form of church that values working together as an effective witness to the re-newing and creative spirit of God among us.

HENDRIX COLLEGE

The 1982-83 school year finds Hendrix continuing to attract superb students and provide them with a superior education. Our educational strength results from a commitment to academic excellence and the quality of the faculty. In a continuing effort to keep the curriculum appropriate to the needs of the students, the faculty is currently reviewing the general education program. The Hendrix goal continues to be much more than training for a career as we try to challenge students and prepare them for the role of servant in all of life.

In September, 1982, we began the school year with a somewhat smaller student body, 962 students compared to 1,017 in 1981. We are pleased that applications for the 1983 freshman class are ahead of last year when a number of other institutions are reporting decreases. The number of High School graduates will decline significantly this year and next year and will continue to decline through at least 1986.

Because we budgeted properly for our enrollment this fall and because of the strong support of the Church, our friends, and alumni, we will finish 1982-83 with a balanced budget for the 26th consecutive year.

One of the exciting innovations on campus this year was the student phonathon to parents and alumni. Thanks to challenge gifts by two anonymous donors and some very hard work by staff and students, this effort netted \$47,500 new dollars on a goal of \$20,000. The two-week, nightly phonathon generated lots of excitement among the student body as housing units and individuals competed for awards.

The construction of Fausett Hall to replace the administration building that was destroyed by fire February 6, 1982, is projected for completion by the time students arrive for the 1983 fall term. Of the \$2.6 million necessary to replace the building and furnishings, only some \$100,000 are yet needed to fund the reconstruction, which will provide not only replacement space for administrative offices but additional classrooms and other needed equipment.

In 1980 we launched the United Methodist Church Endowed Scholarship Program with a goal of \$800,000 to be raised by the close of 1984. At the mid-way mark on December 31, 1982, some \$650,000 had been given in cash or pledges from churches, families, and individuals

throughout the state for these \$10,000 endowed scholarships.

We solicit your continued concern and support for our church-related college. As the Church, Hendrix administration, trustees, and faculty and student body, we must constantly be renewing our investments of talent, time, energy, and financial resources into the mission of this great college of ours.

LYDIA PATTERSON INSTITUTE El Paso, Texas

It is our great privilege to present this report on the church's educational mission at Lydia Patterson Institute: the final third of 1982 saw Lydia Patterson Institute experience one of the most difficult periods in its history. The spring semester had been a normal and exciting one for over 500 students and the summer session had enrolled a record number of eager young people, primarily in the ESL department. Continued growth was being projected by the administration. The drastic devaluation of the peso which occurred in August was unforeseen and its negative effect on the LPI, student body unexpected. Enrollment fell to 335, with 88% of this drop experienced by the English as a Second Language Department.

Although the financial difficulties which set in last fall because of the loss in tuition income are receiving much of our attention, some very notable and positive programs were

developed during 1982:

The day school served 511 students in curriculum ranging from English as a Second Language (ESL) through high school.

The night school attracted 25 factory and garment workers in ESL classes.

Our two summer schools were attended by 415 students a record in the history of LPI. Since these students came from all over Mexico including Guanajuato, Puebla and Mexico City, the vital significance of the international outreach ministry of LPI was made clearly evident.

The barrio project served 60 youth, ages 8 to 13, who live in tenement houses neighboring the school, by providing them with recreational, devotional and tutorial programs after school hours. Both faculty and students at LPI are active in implementing this project.

Conversational Spanish classes were initiated in the fall, primarily for professional persons from our United Methodist Churches.

Over 110 high school and college youth work campers visited our campus in the summer, doing maintenance work assisting in chapel and recreational programs, and serving as language informants to the ESL summer classes. Participating students came from Nebraska, Washington State, Kansas and Oklahoma, as well as Texas.

Aggressive attempts to recruit students from Juarez and El Paso for the school's various programs were made and will continue to be made in the future. The school will continue to serve students through an enriched Language Arts Department having Spanish as well as English language studies; a High School which is fully accredited and provides value-

centered education and prepares students for vocational or higher education goals in the U.S. and Mexico; and a Bible and Religion department which provides a strong program of Religious Education.

We ask for your continued prayers and support as we seek to be faithful to this educational mission of the church at Lydia Patterson Institute.

METHODIST HEALTH SYSTEMS AND METHODIST HOSPITALS OF MEMPHIS

The period from 1977-1983 has been one of change and growth for the Methodist Hospital System, which is jointly owned by the North Arkansas, North Mississippi and Memphis Conferences of the United Methodist Church. Reflecting that change and growth, the establishment of Methodist Health Systems, Inc., has given structure and definitive direction for the present and future of some 20 affiliated organizations.

Formally organized late in 1981 as a Tennessee non-profit corporation, Methodist Health Systems, Inc. was established to further the health and welfare ministry of the three Conferences. Additionally, it provided a means to protect and enhance markets, to diversify into new product lines and generate new sources of income. Within the corporations under the Methodist Health Systems umbrella there remains great emphasis on acute patient care. But other organizations, while hospital related, are not in that traditional mode.

At Methodist Hospitals of Memphis, a Commitment to Quality advertising campaign was launched in August for the purpose of positioning the hospital system as the quality health care alternative in the Mid-South. To help fulfill that commitment, construction and renovation are underway or planned at all three Methodist Hospitals of Memphis. Completion of the ten-floor tower project in 1984 will restore Methodist Central to licensed bed capacity and provide a state of the art critical care floor. At Methodist South, a \$15 million renovation and expansion project will add 26 inpatient beds and renovate and enlarge the ancillary services area. Finally, a new Ambulatory Surgery unit is scheduled for a June starting date at Methodist North.

In 1982, Methodist Hospitals of Memphis admitted 47,165 patients, had 75,035 emergency room visits, delivered 2,334 babies, performed 28,536 operations, handled 15,063 clinic visits and maintained an 87.9 percent average occupancy. Guided by the tradition and mission of the Methodist Church, the hospitals provided more than \$12 million in free care.

Shared Services capabilities were expanded in 1982 with the establishment of the Comprehensive Services Department at MHOM. The department markets a variety of health care services to hospitals and other health care institutions. Included are clinical services such as mobile nuclear medicine and CAT Scan, as well as laundry, pharmacy, purchasing and other administrative services.

An important Methodist Health Systems organization is Methodist Hospitals Foundation, a not-for-profit Tennessee corporation entrusted with the responsibility for fund-raising for the support of hospital-related causes and programs that serve the public good. Included are nursing and medical education programs; Lifeline, an emergency response system for elderly and disabled persons; Hospice; the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit; and Pastoral Ministry.

In addition to affiliated hospitals and the Foundation, other Methodist Health Systems organizations include American Medical Management, a for-profit hospital management and acquisition company responsible for contract management, lease, direct acquisition or purchase; Mid-South Properties, a residential and commercial real estate division of AMM; Methodist Outreach, Inc., a family treatment program for alcohol and drug abuse; United States Security Insurance Company, providing the hospital with self-insurance for malpractice coverage; and U.S. Security Fire and Casualty Insurance Company, a for-profit fire and casualty company.

Finally, Methodist Health Systems instituted in 1982 an intensified effort to more clearly define the role of the United Methodist Church in the organization and to integrate the mission of the Church in the planning and decision making process throughout the system.

Accordingly, a Religious Affairs Division was established for Methodist Health Systems to work closely with the Human Services Division of the Methodist Hospital System. This reorganization is designed to help carry out the commitment to provide quality pastoral care to all patients in every health care facility connected to Methodist Health Systems and to enable pastors and lay persons from all religious groups to make their own unique contributions to hospitalized members of their churches.

Major accomplishments of the Religious Affairs Division in 1982 included establishment of a hospital Employee Assistance Program; development of the Family Life Institute; national accreditation of the Clinical Pastoral Education residency program; and

organization of the first of three Pastors' Clinics held at Methodist Central.

We are happy to report that 1982 was a good year, bringing an increase in attendance over 1981.

Contributions from the 17 Annual Conferences within the Jurisdiction amounted to \$56,290.00, or 94% of the Annual Apportionment. This is the best record since the apportionment of \$60,000 annually was made by the 1980 Jurisdictional Conference. The North Arkansas Conference is to be commended for responding with 117% of its annual apportionment. Contributions ranged from 13% of the apportionment to 724% in the 17 Annual Conferences which comprise the Jurisdiction.

During the winter of 1982-83, improvements were made on Parker Hall, equipping it for more comfortable year round use. These improvements included the installation of storm windows and doors, a fireplace insert, along with painting and redecorating the interior. The plan is to keep this building open for small retreat groups during the winter months. It contains 33 beds in the 17 bedrooms, a kitchen, a large lounge and classrooms.

Greetings from the Perkins Dean

Dear Friends:

As we begin this new year, I am pleased to have an opportunity to acquaint you with some of the background of Perkins School of Theology and to update you on our current situation.

The School of Theology came into being with the founding of the university in 1915. It occupies eight attractive buildings located on the southwest corner of the SMU campus. Since its founding, Perkins has grown steadily in stature and in service to the Church, the region, and the nation. Its graduates now number 3,556, and the faculty has been ranked by its peers as being among the top six seminary faculties in the United States. Operating expenditures for 1981-82 were nearly \$5,000,000.

Last fall 437 degree students were enrolled from 35 states and 12 foreign countries, representing 17 religious denominations. Most of our students are preparing for the pastoral ministry, though some are following courses of study which will lead to work as missionaries, directors of religious education, directors of church music, chaplains, and workers and ministers in other specialized fields. Today's Perkins students are more diverse than ever before; they are older, and many have had other careers. There is more to learn than ever before and there are higher expectations of the clergy than ever before. Yet the students of today are persons of ability and maturity who bring enthusiasm and optimism to their demanding tasks.

A seminary is no less subject to economic pressures than any other educational enterprise. Theological education is expensive. Moreover, students preparing to enter the ministry often have fewer personal financial resources with which to cover the cost of the education than those students planning to enter other professions. That is certainly the case with students at Perkins. This year, tuition and fees at Perkins School of Theology are \$3,600 for two semesters. The added cost of room and board brings this amount to \$7,361. On the average, every Perkins student will need approximately \$1,740 in financial aid to meet the cost of tuition and fees alone.

PRIORITY NEED FOR SCHOLARSHIP SUPPORT

As one of the 13 United Methodist seminaries, we are grateful for the generous support of United Methodists through the Ministerial Education Fund, which provided \$823,955 to Perkins last year. While this money accounted for three-fourths of our annual giving in 1981-82, the funds from the Ministerial Education Fund are for current operating support only, and may not be used for scholarship aid. As a result, a top priority during the coming five years is to do all possible to secure funding for scholarship aid and to underwrite fully the general scholarship program at Perkins. This would require an endowment of 7 million dollars.

Perkins School of Theology is proud of its long standing relations with the North Arkansas Annual Conference. Among its clergy members are 69 Perkins alumni/ae.

We need your support, and hope you will consider a gift to Perkins. Your contribution to the scholarship program may be given in a variety of ways, including memorial funds, and will go a long way to help maintain the quality education that has become synonymous with the Perkins School of Theology.

PHILANDER SMITH COLLEGE

The Academic Year 1982-1983 witnessed a landmark event in the 106-year history of Philander Smith, namely, the celebration of the Centennial of the chartering of the College as a four-year, degree granting institution in 1883. Founded in 1877 as Walden Seminary in Wesley Chapel United Methodist Church in Little Rock, it was the second school to be established west of the Mississippi River by the Freedman's Aid Society of the former Methodist Episcopal Church.

It is our privilege again this year to report to you some of our achievements and concerns and to say thank you for your support of our work, primarily — but not exclusively — through the Black College Fund.

This brief report will be related under several headings which describe the work of the College:

Enrollment — The Second Semester of 1982-1983 reflects a slight increase in enrollment following a decline from 1981-1982. Several factors caused us to lose about one hundred students — uncertainty regarding student aid funding, high youth/student unemployment last summer, and stringent regulations regarding payments on past-due and current accounts. The resultant picture is a student body of slightly under five hundred.

Recruitment — An aggressive recruitment program has forged ahead to challenge the enrollment decline referred to above. A dedicated staff of two, including a coordinator and a secretary/assistant are meeting and talking with prospective students at high schools, in community centers and at churches. Additionally, alumni/ae are deployed to follow through with likely prospects. Local media outlets have been cooperative in carrying our message. Philander Fest '83, a college day event for high school juniors and seniors, will be held this Spring.

Academic Services — A unique academic venture at the College during 1982-1983 is a venture in instructional cooperation. Philander Smith, in cooperation with the Arkansas Arts Center, is providing instruction in visual arts and the use of the Center's studios, library, and theater.

Our financial condition did not warrant the expense of a regular summer school session in 1982. In view of this fact, a full complement of faculty members volunteered their services to provide a five-week Summer School. Concurrently, the Administration, other faculty and staff took the months of June, July and August to do some reorganization and realignment in view of the realities of a reduced budget and the probability of a smaller Fall entering class of new students.

W. D. Lester Library — The College was notified in August, 1982, by the family of the late W. D. Lester, a Trustee of the College for forty-eight years, that his professional library was being given as a gift to the College. This collection of religious books, United Methodist Books of Discipline, General, Jurisdictional, and Annual Conference Journals, sermons, addresses and papers has greatly enhanced our Methodist and archival holdings.

UNCF — Philander Smith, in cooperation with the United Negro College Fund, Inc., raised \$79,494.38 during the annual fund-raising campaign, which was held from September through December, 1982. The campaign is part of the national effort by the United Negro College Fund to raise \$21,000,000 to help support its forty-two member institutions. Philander Smith is the only college in Arkansas which benefits from the UNCF fund.

NCA — The date for the visitation of the North Central Association reaffirmation of accreditation has been set for April 25-27, 1983. A major and comprehensive self-study and evaluation of the College has been done. A grant of approximately \$5,000 has been received from the Southern Education Foundation for the College's preparation for this visit.

Adopt-A-School — In continuance of the pursuit of an objective of the College to relate to the community, Philander Smith is participating in the Little Rock School District Adopt-A-School Program by "adopting" the Dunbar Junior High School. This means that the College

has assumed the responsibility to have a special relationship to the school by assisting it in providing direct and indirect benefits to students, such as tutoring, counseling, encouragement to teachers, informing the public of the needs of public schools, and stimulating volunteer services among faculty and students.

The Collegiate Chorale — Continuing a legacy of fine choral music at the College, the thirty-nine voice Collegiate Chorale performed for numerous college events, in churches and community locations. It also took a Spring tour in eight states, singing in United Methodist Churches and for Philander Smith College Alumni Chapters. A typical program of the Chorale features musical selections from the choral masters, as well as contemporary composers. Highlights of the past year included the performance of the Schubert Mass No. 2 with a chamber orchestra composed of members of the Arkansas Symphony and performing at the inauguration of Governor Bill Clinton.

Development/Fund-Raising — a highlight of the year was the establishment of the Office of Development in January, 1983. The office, under the guidance of the Development Committee of the Board of Trustees, is planning a long-range fund-raising campaign to be launched in the fall of 1983. A significant component of the campaign is to increase the

funding support of the United Methodist Church.

A Philander Smith College Scholarship Endowment Fund has been established by the United Methodist Foundation through a gift from an anonymous donor. This Scholarship Fund will provide much needed additional scholarship assistance for the 1983 Fall term. Approximately 85% of Philander Smith's students must have financial aid in order to attend college.

SAINT PAUL SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

"The purpose of the learning at Saint Paul is to bring the knowledge of theological scholarship to bear on the practice of ministry. Our real concern is that people learn to see life theologically, and interpret the meaning of what is going on in ways that are faithful to the gospel."

This statement by a Saint Paul faculty member provides the focus and motivation for all

of our efforts and activities.

The Fall 1982 enrollment of 216 students was the largest in the history of the seminary. Both the Master of Divinity and the Doctor of Ministry programs experienced considerable growth, with the greatest increase among women students. The 1982 Summer Conference Course of Study School was also the largest in its history, composed of 127 students from 20 annual conferences.

A number of personnel changes have occurred since the previous annual report. These include a faculty appointment in Church History, a Vice President for Student and Alumni/ae Development, a new Director of Development, and the seminary's first full-time Director of Publicity and Public Relations.

With a 14% increase in income, the seminary managed a balanced budget for the 1981-82 fiscal year. The Alumni/ae of Saint Paul completed a remarkable accomplishment by raising more than \$40,000 and thus securing a \$20,000 grant from the Kerr Foundation. In February 1983 the seminary made its final payment on our campus note, thus bringing to an end a 180-month obligation dating back to 1968.

Currently we are in process with Emphasis 25, a \$2 million three-year Major Funds Campaign. This campaign celebrates 25 years of service and launches our next quarter century. Strong lay leadership undergirds the effort, with more than \$800,000 in commitments as of the January public kick-off. A Phase II is designed to raise capital funds through the support of annual conferences. This phase is in process of conversation and exploration, dependent of course on annual conference affirmation.

The life of the seminary is enriched by a marvelous variety of groups and conferences throughout the year. Among these are the Lay Consultation Council which held its Tenth Annual meeting in April, and the Ethnic Minority Student Coalition's worship services.

The Ministerial Education Fund provides the largest single income item in our budget year after year, currently about 25% of our \$2,196,000 1982-83 budget. Saint Paul School of

Theology offers gratitude and appreciation for your indispensable support. More importantly, we offer in response our very best efforts to be a faithful and effective instrument of the Church in the preparation of men and women for the ministry to which they have been called.

All of these training events were designed to give helps to annual conference leadership.

Long range planning has been done by the Jurisdictional Council on Ministries, projecting programs for the 1980's.

Work has been done in designing a Volunteers in Mission program for the South Central Jurisdiction. This would call for a Jurisdiction director to coordinate and give guidance to individuals and groups desiring to do short term mission work within the jurisdiction and beyond

The Jurisdictional Council on Ministries has authorized the purchase of a computer for the office. The use of this machine will facilitate communication with annual conference and general personnel.

Plans have begun for the 1984 Jurisdictional Conference to be held July 16-19, 1984, the Convention Center, Lubbock, Texas. The Northwest Texas-New Mexico Area along with the Rio Grande Annual Conference will be hosting this conference.

A quarterly communication paper has been inaugurated, "S.C.J. Mix," and is being

distributed to approximately 1000 persons across the Jurisdiction. This edition will include brief stories of "good things" happening in the various conferences of the Jurisdiction, models of which can be made available.

Individual convocations of the four ethnic minority groups in the South Central Jurisdiction were held during 1982 and plans were made for an Inter-Ethnic Convocation to be held February 17-19, 1983. At the writing of this report, approximately 250 people attended a very successful event.

The committee on Inter-Ethnic Concerns administered a scholarship fund through the Jurisdictional office. These funds were made available by the Division of the Ordained Ministry.

Approximately 93% of the apportioned items for Jurisdiction Administration was paid by the respective annual conferences.

The South Central Jurisdictional office located at 8035 East R. L. Thornton Freeway, suite 408, Dallas, Texas 75228, telephone 214/321-7077, serves as a communication center for concerns of the Jurisdiction and relationships to general agencies. Reports from the three institutions owned by the South Central Jurisdiction: Mt. Sequoyah, Southern Methodist University, and Lydia Patterson Institute, will be made by each of these institutions.

THE UNITED METHODIST CHILDREN'S HOME, INC.

The United Methodist Children's Home, Inc. came into being eighty-four years ago as the result of the united efforts of the Methodist Conferences of Arkansas. Its stated purpose was to care for orphaned children until "a Christian home" could be found for them. It was not until 1902 that the first child was taken into care. However, since the admission of the first child, the United Methodist Children's Home, Inc. has been in continuous operation meeting the needs of children and helping in every way we could to move them toward a better life.

It is interesting to note that in our original charter the purpose of the "orphanage" was to find a permanent home for the child as soon as possible. However, the population we serve has greatly changed and we have very few true orphans in our care.



Our primary goal for every child is to work with the youth and their families so that the environment can be reconstructed to the point that the child can return to their own home. Needless to say, it is not possible, in every case, to return a child to their own family because of circumstances that, apparently, will remain unchanged in that place. It is, at that time, that we seek together with other child family service agencies to find a permanent placement for the child outside of institutional care.

The support of these rather generally stated goals, the United Methodist Children's Home, Inc. maintains three basic programs: The first program is the care center in Little Rock, in which ten residences for children are operated and where the care is the most intensive and professional resources of the community are more readily available. Our second program of Group Homes is designed for the child requiring a minimum of supervision and structure and are situated in residential settings and the life of the children is directed toward

participation in the life of the community. Also, if it should appear that we have a child that will be with us for a longer than average stay, this child would possibly be placed in a Group Home, where institutional living impact can be held to a minimum. The third program is represented in our authorization to establish and maintain 22 foster homes in the state of Arkansas. These foster homes are used to place the younger children, from birth until six, and also to place children where it is felt that a small family setting and one-to-one relationship can be of benefit to the child.

These homes are established by the United Methodist Children's Home, Inc., supervised by the United Methodist Children's Home, Inc., and are funded by the United Methodist Children's Home, Inc. I would, especially, want to thank the North Arkansas Conference for

its consistent support and concern of this work.

Camp Aldersgate Report

Camp Aldersgate is an outreach ministry of the United Methodist Church. It is a place where the Church has the opportunity to do something for others. Dedicated to meet and fulfill human needs, Aldersgate is at the cutting edge of life where there are so many basic human needs.

In addition to a food pantry and clothes rack for emergency needs, regular programs are provided for:

Senior citizens nutritional needs

Weekend respite care for handicapped children

A free health clinic for the medically needy

Summer medical camps for handicapped children

Last year we served people from 75 towns in Arkansas and from 5 other states. Over 15,000

people turned to our ministry for help.

The Aldersgate Senior Citizens Program is a daily outreach directed toward the spiritual, social and nutritional needs of the elderly. Initiated in 1972, the program has served over 160,000 meals and has been recognized as a model among programs for the elderly. Since 1981, this ministry has been conducted in cooperation with Pulaski County Council on Aging.

Respite care is a new program offering which was begun in October of 1982. Designed as a service of parental relief and support, this program provides weekend care for children with severe mental and physical handicaps. This new concept is planned to strengthen family relationships by temporarily relieving parents of handicapped children from their increased responsibilities.

A free health clinic operates at the Camp each Wednesday evening. As a cooperative ministry with Catholic Social Services, the clinic provides free medical examinations and treatment to anyone in need. A corps of volunteer doctors, nurses and pharmacists donate

their time to make this service possible.

Each year Camp Aldersgate provides a series of summer camps for children with handicapping conditions. These camps allow the children to enjoy the benefits of outdoor recreation and a residential camping program while learning ways to manage their individual medical problems.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STRUCTURE

Realizing that General Conference is 1984, we will be doing a complete study and evaluation of the North Arkansas Conference Structure and looking at any changes mandated from General Conference.

We affirm the workability of the present structure. It is yours. Our function is to take your suggestions and your ideas and put them in structure form and present them to you for your approval or disapproval. It is the adopted policy of the Annual Conference that all matters concerning structure be presented in writing to the chairperson of the committee by May 15th for the suggestion to receive attention at the up-coming Annual Conference.

In fulfilling the Purpose as stated in the Structure Booklet, page 1, the Annual Conference is called upon to:

1. Listen to the local church as it expresses its specific needs, resources, and opportunities; and to the General Conference as it expresses the same;

2. Develop resources and support services for use by the local church as it equips itself;

3. Assist in the training of persons and the development of leaders in all areas of ministry;

4. Coordinate the planning and implementation of those programs and ministries common to the local churches;

5. Oversee the process by which the church at all levels defines, understands and carries out its mission, and

6. Evaluate the preparation for and performance of the persons engaged in mission within and on behalf of the Annual Conference.

This proposal for the design of structure incorporates this understanding of the purpose of the Annual Conference, thus establishing a vehicle through which the local church makes known its needs and by which the resourcing agencies at all levels make their response.

No structure is any stronger than those persons who carry it out. Let us commit ourselves to what we have approved, and as we see need for change, make those changes, so that we can better listen, develop, assist, coordinate, oversee and evaluate.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON THE STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN North Arkansas Annual Conference 1983

The Commission sent a team to a Regional Training Event for COSROW this spring. We learned that we have basically three functions, to serve as an advocate, a catalyst, and to monitor. We were not aware, as members of the Conference may not be, that the Commission is to serve as an advocate in cases of sex discrimination in local churches or institutions of the Annual Conference. In our monitoring function we are continuing to monitor membership on conference and district boards and agencies and are moving into monitoring meetings of boards and agencies.

In the catalyst function, we are planning a seminar on "Women and Our United Methodist Heritage" to be held in 1984.

The purpose of the seminar will be to heighten our knowledge of the contributions of women to our past and to examine the role of women in our church's future.



Continuing last year's recommendation we urge that the effort be continued to secure a woman to serve as our conference preacher. This would strengthen the acceptance of women in the role of minister as many of the members of our Conference have never heard a woman preach.

The Commission moves that child care be provided for all business sessions of the Annual Conference as well as for worship services each year. The cost of child care shall be an expense of the Conference and therefore taken care of according to Standing Rule #9.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN'S ANNUAL CONFERENCE

1983

As we reflected on the Purpose of United Methodist Women and studied the 1982 evaluations sent in by 215 of the 227 units in our conference, we became even more aware of the presence of United Methodist Women in the North Arkansas. Without a doubt, the North Arkansas Conference United Methodist Women is definitely a "going" concern about which we can all be excited.

Five new units were organized and one unit re-activated. Our 1982 pledge to mission was exceeded, and our 1983 pledge was increased to \$133,000.00. The Women's Division is still the single largest source of appropriations income for the General Board of Global Ministries. Thirty-five percent given by United Methodist Women. The total giving by United Methodist Women is \$16,739,347 — this affects 9,000 programs and projects around the globe and touches the lives of millions of persons.

Attendance at Conference level events was greater! Scholarships were offered to each district for Annual Meeting and School of Christian Mission. 405 persons were present for this year's Annual Meeting with the theme — "From Inner Peace to World Peace — Our Journey."

The Conference Mission Team continues to give unselfishly of their time and talents. As president, I attended the Jurisdiction's Consultation for Presidents in Dallas and represented UMW on the Council on Ministries, Board of Global Ministries, Council on Lay Life, Commission on Role and Status of Women plus my specific responsibilities to the Conference UMW. Freddie Nixon, vice-president, represented us at the Women's Division Fall Board Meeting and the World Federation of Women's meeting in Virginia. Mary Martin served on the Consultation Committee to the Region Staff. Norma Ferguson attended a seminar on the agencies of the National Division, while Elizabeth Buchanan represented us on the Board of Church and Society; Euba Harris-Winton on Board of Global Ministries, and Marcia Vaughn on the Council on Lay Life.

In our district organizations of United Methodist Women, we wish to recognize these services:

Batesville District — President Marlene Cothern reports 40 units with 1747 members with the majority of the units in churches with small membership, yet they gave over \$22,000 for missions.

Conway District — President Lois Griffin reports growth in this district; twelve units reported an increase in membership and an increase in giving, totaling \$26,000. Eleven units are involved in Criminal Justice Ministries, nine in Women in Crisis events, ten dealt with Legislative concerns and twelve did projects related to Aging.

Fayetteville District — President Emma Sue Hanna reports that 26 units in this district completed "Mission" studies. They had 91% of the district units present at their Annual

Meeting and gave \$28,000 to missions.

Forrest City District — President Kay Calhoun states that programming events like Mini-Missions, Spiritual Day Apart and a Shepard Program, where each officer contacts, supports and cares for chosen local units, has created giving that exceeded \$22,000.

Fort Smith District — President Virginia Oliver shows a 10% increase in pledge, making it \$22,000. The Fort Smith District was a 100% in their reporting. This district was honored by the Conference UMW with a special gift to missions for having had the most studies that

met certification in a one year period.

Jonesboro District — President Marcia Vaughn had another 100% reporting district. This area has been especially involved in the ecumenical programs of the churches. Fourteen units participated in the May Fellowship Day and World Community Day of Church Women United. President Vaughn is a recipient of a Women's Assembly Scholarship for the continuing of her journey in becoming a Diaconal Minister, along with Sharon Bouregois, who is studying for the professional ministry.

Paragould District — President Vivian Davis describes the district's strongest point as "a Mission team that is dedicated, responsible and creative" as it makes the Purpose come alive through, Officer Training events, School of Mission participation, and A Day for Women under 40.

What does all this mean? United Methodist Women are responsive and caring about all aspects of life as they accept the call to grow and "become whole persons through Jesus Christ."

NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES REPORT 1983

I. Articles of Incorporation:

A. The Board of Trustees of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church is incorporated according to the provision of Section 1, Paragraph 2510 of the Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church, 1980.

B. The Articles of Incorporation were issued on July 25, 1959, and the Charter of Incorporation is recorded in the office of the County Clerk of Sebastian County,

Arkansas, in the city of Fort Smith, Arkansas, Book E, page 69.

II. Release from Restriction:

We recommend that the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church release any claim it may have by virtue of a restriction clause in a deed to property located in the town of Marvell, Phillips County, Arkansas. The paragraph of the deed with the restriction clause reads as follows:

Town Lot 64, with church building lying and being situated in the Town of Marvell, Phillips County, Arkansas, in trust that said premises shall be used and kept maintained and disposed of as a place of divine worship for the use of the ministers and membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, subject to the Discipline, usage and ministerial appurtenances of said Church as from time to time authorized and declared by the general conference of said Church and the annual conference within whose bonds the said premises are situate.

This property was conveyed in 1972 and was evidently not conveyed in accordance with proper church procedure, but it was conveyed in good faith. We do not think that it would be worthwhile or justifiable for the church to pursue any claim it might have on this property, and we recommend that the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church release this property from the restriction clause and relinquish any and all claims it might have on this property, making it possible for the Asbury Missionary Baptist Church to obtain clear title to said property.

III. Abandonment and Sale of Church Property:

A. Be it resolved that the property of the Thornberry United Methodist Church be declared abandoned and the title of the property be transferred to the Trustees of the Thornberry Cemetery Association and their successors with the following qualifications:

 If the above named cemetery association fails to continue as a legal body, the title of the property will be returned to the Trustees of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church or its successor.

2. The building will be used for no religious functions other than funeral services. Violation of this restriction would constitute cause to forfeit the title to the donor.

3. Any and all fees connected with the transfer of the title with stated conditions will be paid by the Thornberry Cemetery Association with no cost to the United Methodist Church.

Be it further resolved, that if the Thornberry Cemetery Association is not legally constituted so as to hold property in the name of the trustees, consideration will be given to a sale of the property, excluding the cemetery, with conditions, to the persons who are the elected trustees of the Cemetery Association. The price to be negotiated at the time of the sale. Should a sale be made, any funds derived from

the sale shall be deposited with the Fayetteville District Missionary Society for use in developing property of the United Methodist Church within the bounds of the District.

B. Resolved that the property consisting of approximately 2½ acres, more or less, near Kingston, Arkansas, recorded in the name of The United Methodist Church, be declared abandoned and for sale at fair market value. Funds derived from the sale shall be given to the Fayetteville District Missionary Society for use in the development of United Methodist Church property within the bounds of The Fayetteville District.

The most promising statistic in the reports having to do with membership is the number received by profession of faith. There was an increase of 65 over the previous year. Even though less was received from other denominations than was received in 1981, the number from other denominations still exceeded the number that was lost to the other denomination. Perhaps the United Methodist Church is still attractive in spite of our critics.

The problem area is still charge conference action. This increased by 967 and represents almost 40% of all losses. Perhaps the problem of losing members is increased because we have only three ways to receive persons while we have four ways to lose them.

It was not a good year for United Methodist. There was an increase of 226 in the number of deaths in the churches during the year. This statistic may be an indicator of note. It may well tell us that the United Methodist profile is an increasing average age within the membership. Hopefully, we do not allow the United Methodist Churches to become homes for the aged. This is not to imply that there is anything wrong with increasing in age. I have a growing appreciation of that fact myself.

There appears to be a slight hope for the future. There was an increase in preparatory membership figures and more persons are being listed on the constituency rolls. Lyle E. Shaller suggests that every church that desires to grow should have a prospect list of persons that equals 5 names for each 100 members on the roll of the church. Are you intent on growth in your church? Check the number of persons on the prospect roll and see. An accurate prospect roll will demonstrate your intent as a church.

Only one district in the seven which compose the North Arkansas Conference, had a gain

in membership. This is a decrease from 3 in 1980 and increased from none in 1981.

In Christian Education, there were gains in only two areas. One was in the total number of leaders in the church school and the other was an increase in the number of persons in short term groups of learning. Apparently, we are using more leaders to care for fewer people.

There was an increase in the number of members in the United Methodist Men. But, the most disturbing statistic of all is the decline in membership of the United Methodist Women. This is the first time this has happened since I became the Conference statistician. A strong United Methodist Women is vital to the life and health of the church.

Financially speaking, there was an increase in over-all giving, but the rate of increase was less. There was a sharp decline in funds for property development. This could indicate a long range problem. It suggests delayed expansion and needed improvements or deferred maintenance. These delays will not be felt until some years down the road.

The financial record also indicates more selective giving. The funds suffering the most have to do with General Conference matters. The most positive giving was in district funds and local programs. The Pastor's Moving Fund received a fine support. Laity certainly have a way of saying things. If you want a change in clergy leadership, you have assured transportation and want nothing to stand in the way.

Last year, we were all greatly pleased that a new congregation had been established in North Pulaski County. It was a great event to be sure. It was the first in quite sometime. However, if we continue to lose the equivalent to two fine congregations a year, it will be necessary to establish three congregations a year to stay even. One new congregation every 5 to 7 years just will not do the job. This means that the growth in membership in the North Arkansas Conference depends on the presently established congregations. These are the ones that will play the major role in reversing the decline in membership.

There are thousands of books and articles being written on the subject of "How Do Churches Grow?" With apologies to Cokesbury Book Stores, I can give you the answer and you will not need to get a book and will have the reading time available for something else. My method is simple and sure. I know that it works because my calculator has proved it. I tested it several times and it never fails. It works like this.

If you punch more numbers on the add key than you do on the subtract key, there is gain every time. So, how do churches grow? They simply add more members than they lose. The major ingredients involved are dedication and hard work. You try it. I believe it will work for you, every time.

Statistics can be just numbers if that is all that you want them to be. However, these numbers indicate trends in the churches and certainly make us aware of the needs within the church. They indicate success and failure. You are encouraged to read the message that is written in the tables that will be published at the end of the 1983 Journal. I believe these can tell you a lot more than you would want to know. If you study the numbers and are undisturbed, then we are in deep trouble.

There is a Television Station in our area that has at least one story a week that is good news. They advertise, "We cover the good news too." Well, me and my calculator like to cover good news too. You make the news that I report each year, good or bad. You provide the ingredients of the stories that I write.

Perhaps next year at this time, you will have given me more numbers for my add key than you have for my subtract key and I will have good news for you. And believe me, I much rather report good news, too.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRIES

The purpose of our Council is to provide youth opportunities for:

(B) Family Life — Vaughn Marsden: 1. They printed a card of hotline numbers which included child abuse, alcohol abuse. 2. They are also supportive of Child-Find, which is the fingerprinting of children for identification purposes. (C) Spiritual Life — Norman Moyer: 1. they have been responsible for all devotions at the meetings. 2. They are in charge of morning watch and vespers at both Assemblies. (D) Youth Service Fund — Jane Keith: 1. They sponsored "Challenge of the Churches" where youth groups challenged other youth groups to raise the most money for YSF. (E) Peace with Justice — John Christie and Mark McDonald: 1. They saw that peace with justice was emphasized at the Spring Rally and will be at both Assemblies. 2. They also sponsored a very special retreat for the CCYM at Kamp Kaetzell in January. We discussed and strengthened our knowledge on the issue of peace with justice so that we could be better able to support and promote this priority. They are looking toward expanding this workshop for Conference Youth. (F) Each member of the Council also works on a task force to plan and carry out our events.

He oversees all events and has an exceptional quality of funneling our efforts so that they will turn out for the good of North Arkansas youth. He is a wonderful leader, coordinator and friend. The Council appreciates him very much.

We also appreciate very much the whole Church — for all its support, trust and most of all for its care; and we hope that will continue.

COMMITTEE ON GROUP INSURANCE

REPORT #1 GROUP HOSPITALIZATION INSURANCE

We make the following recommendations and information:

- 1. That the American Medical Benefit Administrators, a subsidiary of Methodist Health Systems of Memphis, Tenn., be our insurance carrier of the Health Insurance Program.
- 2a.1. All members and full time local pastors of the North Arkansas Conference under appointment (except students serving in, or those employed by other Conferences or agencies which have compulsory insurance programs, members under special appointment outside the Conference, or retired Chaplains serving in), and every full-time employee of the Conference, shall participate in the Health Insurance Program of the North Arkansas Conference.
- 2a.2. The Health Insurance Program will be open for Probationers, Local Pastors, parttime Local Pastors, Student Local Pastors, Diaconal Ministers, and those appointed to attend Seminary. This is optional for the eligible participant and the participant must make the necessary arrangements and be responsible for the total premium.

b. No evidence of insurability will be required if a participant enrolls self and dependents within 90 days after the eligibility date.

- c. Local churches may enroll lay employees between June 1 and July 15 by following the guidelines found in the 1969 Journal, page 104, Par. 1b; of the 1978 Journal, Page 128, Par. 6b.
- d. The Insurance Treasurer will check with the District Superintendent concerned in the case of a pastor applying for enrollment for the first time. The eligibility of any full-time lay employee of a church will be checked with the pastor concerned. In either case the first premium payment must accompany the application for enrollment before the application can be processed.
- 3a. That the Charge (church) pay at least 80% of the premium, and the participant pay not more than 20%.
- b. That 11/2% must be added to the premiums to cover administrative costs.
- c. The quarterly premium rates for HMEP for the period July 1, 1983 through June 30, 1984 are as follows:
- d. PERSONS UNDER 65 (Comprehensive Coverage) (The 1½% Administration costs are included in the following premiums).

e. PERSONS 65 and OVER

Each person who enrolls pays 143.20

Note:

All persons 65 and over must be enrolled in Medicare, as it becomes the person's primary insurance and our program becomes supplemental. It is the claimant's

responsibility to enroll in Medicare by completing application forms at the Social Security Office no later than three months before reaching age 65.

- f. The North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions pays Health Insurance Program premiums for all retired persons drawing an annuity from the General Board of Pensions; all surviving spouses and children, as well as those persons on Disability Leave, except those who are not in the program at the time of retirement. HOWEVER, IT IS THE CLAIMANT'S RESPONSIBILITY TO PAY THE PORTION REQUIRED BY MEDICARE.
- g. The Health Insurance Program does not duplicate Medicare but supplements it by paying 40% of customary and reasonable charges of that part Medicare does not pay, after the \$75 deductible has been satisfied.
- 4. The Health Insurance Program premiums are due quarterly on the date shown on the statement sent from the Treasurer! All insured persons are responsible for seeing the total premium due is sent to: Mrs. Faye Watson, P.O. Box 119, Marion, AR 72364, no later than the date due.
- 5. We recommend the following procedure when payment is not received by due date:
 - a. A second notice will be sent to the Participant 14 days after the due date. A copy of the second notice will be sent to the District Superintendent concerned.
 - b. A third notice will be sent to the participant and Cabinet Representative 7 days after the second notice with termination date clearly stated.
 - c. Seven (7) days after the third notice has been sent, and no response made, the participant will be dropped from the Program and the Cabinet Representative notified.
 - d. When coverage is terminated reinstatement requires a physical examination and approval of the Conference Insurance Executive Committee.
- 6. NOTE: To file a Claim, send the first Notice of the Claim form to: The Claim Department, AMBA, P. O. Box 40747, Memphis, Tennessee 38174-0747
 Follow the instructions on the form.
 - a. First Notice of claim forms are available from the District Superintendents, Mrs. Faye Watson, Rev. Leon Wilson, or American Medical Benefit Administrators.
 - b. Prescriptions must have the doctor's diagnosis for the first prescription only, but not for refills.
 - c. Full and complete itemized details of all tests and medical services are required and should be included in the claim.
- 7. The stop Loss Rider Clause in our policy means your total "out of pocket" expenses for reasonable and customary hospitalization charges cannot exceed \$600 per person, or \$1,500 per family per year.

REPORT #2: OPTIONAL PROGRAMS

1. Multi-Peril Insurance for Churches and Parsonages:

We strongly recommend that all churches of the Conference investigate the multi-peril insurance program of the United Methodist Church, offered by the General Council on Finance and Administration. This insurance program now covers the pastor of the insured church for liability arising from counseling situations. COMPARE! Your church may experience great savings on fire insurance and comprehensive coverage for all church property! Contact: The United Methodist Church Insurance Department, 5th Floor, 88 Pine Street, New York, New York, 10005. Your local independent agent can broker this insurance and collect the commission.

- 1. Worker's Compensation:
 - a. We recommend that all churches provide a workers compensation plan for all paid church staff, including the minister. See your local insurance agent for details.
 - b. We recommend and endorse the covering of the District Superintendents and the

Conference Council on Ministries staff with workers and compensation on one central policy, with compensation coming from the district funds and Conference Council on Ministries funds respectively.

3. We recommend that each charge carry a Home Owners Tenant Policy paid for by

the local church.

4. We recommend that the Church and the pastor's name to their church policy so the Pastor's professional property at the Church will be covered in the event of loss.

REPORT #3: ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS

1. The Conference Insurance Committee, on behalf of the members of our Group Insurance Programs, wish to commend Mrs. Faye Watson for the outstanding job she has done during the time she has served at the Insurance Treasurer.

2. We recommend Mrs. Faye Watson be continued as our Insurance Treasurer and her

salary be \$4600 for 1984 becoming effective January 1, 1984.

3. The estimated budget for 1984:

a. Treasurer's salary\$4,600.



REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS — 1983 North Arkansas Annual Conference The United Methodist Church

Those of us who are, at the present time, privileged to serve in the Cabinet of the North Arkansas Annual Conference receive a unique "over-view" of the Church's life. While most of you find your religious activity centered in one local church, we have the opportunity of moving about from one church to another. We are thus aware of the great diversity in the Church, a diversity based on such factors as location, size of membership, character of the community, available leadership, as well as economic, political, and social experience. We do not claim to be expert — we do recognize that ours is a different view of the Church.

As your District Superintendents, we would remind you of the treasure which is our connectional system of church



One place to affirm and re-affirm our connectional character is in the District itself. The district, in United Methodist structure, affords us an appropriate setting for cooperative effort. The District Council on Ministries must be encouraged to plan, implement, oversee and evaluate programs that will strengthen the local church. We encourage the development of clergy support groups and study groups within the district or sub-district setting. We urge that the Annual Conference institute a study of its district structure,



looking for ways to achieve improved funding for district program and administration.

Two years ago, in this report, the Cabinet expressed the hope that our Conference would soon achieve the goal of longer tenure for its ministers in their local church appointments. We believe that progress has been made. This year many clergy will be assigned to a charge for a third, fourth, and even a fifth year or longer. We urge all clergy to see this year's appointment as a call from God. Let us all seek, with diligent prayer and thought, to discover unique opportunities for ministry in the place to which we are assigned. Longer tenure can be a negative experience for that church whose laity see a change of pastors as a "quick fix" for their problems, or whose pastor views a return for another year as a sign of failure to achieve upward mobility. Longer tenure can be a blessing for those churches where clergy and laity alike recognize that effective ministry and enduring relationships are the result of long, patient and loving effort.

Concern has been expressed in our Conference for the matter of clergy morale. We feel that the question of morale should be viewed as both a clergy and lay concern. It is the conviction of your Cabinet that our morale will be high as we discover a greater sense of purpose and mission in the life of the local church. We believe that morale will be high when ours is a shared leadership, pastor and members working together. Morale will be high in any local church where a spirit of caring and concern for one another is nurtured, and where rivalries are not allowed to shatter a church's unity. Loss of morale can often be traced to a loss of nerve, the fear that a courageous ministry and a prophetic voice will be divisive, too painful for a church to endure. As District Superintendents, we recognize that ours is an obligation to build bridges of communication with pastors and laity. Thus we pledge ourselves to do more "listening" and less "telling." We also recognize that clergy morale is often hampered by "salary lists" and charges of "favoritism." We are sensitive to these matters and, with you, seek ways to respond to every person and every church.

It is unthinkable that we who have answered the call to serve in the ministry of the Church of our Lord Jesus Christ should lose heart and miss the exciting challenges of the present day. It is unthinkable that any church, small or large, should let any issue blind it to the ongoing call of God to be a servant church, in the community where that church is located,

and in the world of which it is a part.

Today the Church is challenged, at some quarters, to draw inward and deny the ecumenical spirit that has long characterized United Methodism. The recent publicity regarding the work of the National Council of Churches and the World Council of Churches has raised many questions and stirred many emotions. Let us say simply this: we must be dedicated to discovering the truth . . . the truth about the charges that have been made and the truth about the many facets of the work of such ecumenical agencies. We must seek to bring positive good out of what is viewed as an unfortunate situation. This may well happen when we discover what is really being done with the dollars we choose to invest in ecumenical ministries. This may well happen as we call into question statements that lack balance and actions that ignore accountability. This may well happen when United Methodists seek to better understand, theologically, ethically, and practically, why we are compelled to involve ourselves in cooperative efforts with other communions. LET US DARE TO ACCEPT SOME RISKS IN ORDER TO BE FAITHFUL TO THE CLAIMS OF THE GOSPEL TO SERVE AND WITNESS IN THE NAME OF A GOD WHO LOVES ALL HIS WORLD.

It is impossible to speak of the ''state of the Church'' — the United Methodist Church — the North Arkansas Annual Conference — without referring to the challenge surrounding our

Pension program.

Later this week the Conference Board of Pensions will bring to the Annual Conference delegates a report which will recommend a 46% increase in the Pension and Benefits apportionment to the local churches. They will give careful and thoughtful explanation of the causes for such a startling increase. Your Cabinet has heard this explanation and supports the Board of Pensions in the forthright, responsible manner in which they bring this matter to the Annual Conference. We agonize with the Board of Pensions, as with all of you, over the effects of inflation on the Pension program of our Church. We recognize the

correlation between clergy salary increases and the funding required to maintain adequate pensions. We are sensitive to the common criticism heard today that, in placing such great emphasis on clergy pensions, we are thinking more of ourselves than we are of the mission of the Church. At the same time, we cannot help but point out that this Conference has an obligation to keep faith with all those pastors, active and retired, who have contributed the 5,000 + years of service which makes up our "unfunded liability." These servants have invested a goodly portion of their lives in ministering, in the name of Christ, in the United Methodist churches of North Arkansas. We will surely want to keep their well-being as a high priority in our planning.

We endorse, whole-heartedly, the proposal of the Conference Board of Pensions that we embark on an ambitious Capital Funds campaign in the North Arkansas Conference, as a means of raising funds to reduce as much of our unfunded liability as possible. Since past-service funding is the major portion of the overall apportionment, such a campaign is urgently needed. We are convinced that the ministers of the North Arkansas Conference will choose to exert strong leadership, both in terms of personal, sacrificial giving and in outspoken support, should the Conference decide to launch this Campaign. It is also our conviction that the laity of our churches, once they fully understand the needs of our Pension program, will respond in generous fashion. We commit ourselves to cooperate in every way with the Board of Pensions to educate our people concerning the Pension program, its needs, its challenges and its possibilities. We trust that the North Arkansas Annual Conference will deal fairly and adequately with this crucial issue.

There are many matters concerning our Church's ministry to be considered as we meet together this week. We will hear a call for help on behalf of Philander Smith College. Dr. Thomas Trotter, General Secretary of the Board of Higher Education and Ministry of the United Methodist Church, said in an article in The Christian Century, "Churches can express care for the future of the human family by caring for humane institutions — such as colleges — that exist to shape that future in meaningful ways. By supporting these institutions and their aspirations, the churches are filling one of the important missions of the people of God." Philander Smith College deserves our continued support as it responds to the mandates of the gospel by enhancing the dignity of humanity through higher education.

We will hear from representatives of the Ethnic Minority Local Church, reminding us that our work is just beginning in this long-neglected area of our Church's life. The Cabinet affirms its continued commitment and support for this, our Missional Priority. This week we enter a new era in the work of Cooperative Parish Ministry as we welcome Louis "Biff" Averitt as the new C. P. M. Director for the Arkansas Area. We will no doubt hear many proposals related to moral and social issues, some in the form of petitions to the 1984 General Conference. And somewhere in the midst of all this, we will elect lay and clergy delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences.

There are times when the Church is tempted to shrink from the challenges of the present age: the rediscovery of an evangelism that is authentic for this time — articulation of a witness that is essentially United Methodist — finding a way to fund the cost of Pension and Insurance programs without sacrificing the support deserved by other Conference and General programs — continuing to explore Cooperative Parish Ministry as an appropriate style of ministry for churches of all shapes and sizes — embracing the ideals of open itineracy.

It would seem that the answer to this malaise of problems and opportunities for the people called United Methodist lies in our willingness to know and to apply the will of God in our decision-making. It must never be just the will of our Annual Conference that we seek. We must never be content to simply realize the will of the local church. God save us from the temptation to seek only that will expressed in our personal whims and prejudices. If we would be faithful in this hour, we must seek to make real the will of Christ in our plans and deliberations. May this be the prayer of one and all as we proceed with the work of this Annual Conference.

ARKANSAS AREA OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 1982

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES


Basis of Accounting — The Financial Statements of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church have been prepared on the cash basis. The records are held open until the first Wednesday after the first Sunday in order to include the remittances from the churches in the conference for the last few weeks of the year. This policy is consistent with the prior year.

2. INCOME TAXES

The area meets the requirements of Section 501(c)3 of the Internal Revenue Code and is therefore exempt from Federal Income Taxes.

3. CASH INVESTMENTS

All cash investments are recorded at cost plus interest income as received in the account. These balances do not reflect crreent market value of the particular investment. Interest on savings accounts is received quarterly. Interest on Merrill Lynch Ready Asset Trust and Government Fund is received monthly. Interest on all other cash investments is not recognized until maturity.



IX. Resolutions*

*Section IX Contains Petitions And Resolutions Adopted By The North Arkansas Annual Conference.

North Arkansas Conference Petitions To General Conference

I.

The Wording For New Paragraph 737

Para. 737. Each district of an Annual Conference may origanize a district Council on Finance and Administration.

- 1. The purpose of the Council shall be to develop, maintain, and administer a comprehensive and coordinated plan of fiscal and administrative policies, procedures, and management services for the district which are consistent with the policies of the Annual Conference.
- 2. The responsibilities of the Council shall be determined by the Annual Conference.
- 3. Each Annual Conference may determine the membership and method of election of its district Councils on Finance and Administration.
- 4. Membership shall be chosen, insofar as possible, to include $\frac{1}{3}$ clergy, $\frac{1}{3}$ lay women, and $\frac{1}{3}$ lay men (with special attention to the inclusion of clergy women, youth, young adults, persons with handicapping conditions, and racial and ethnic persons) in keeping with the policies for general church agencies.
- 5. The district superintendent shall be the chief executive officer for the district Council on Finance and Administration.
- 6. The district Council on Finance and Administration in an Annual Conference shall cooperate with the Annual Conference Council on Finance and Administration so that there may be a harmonious and holistic approach to the ministry of the Conference.

II.

Title: Ministerial Chargeable offense

Whereas ministerial members are called to live up to the highest ideals and currently only practices declared "incompatible with Christian teachings" in the Social Principles are included in the list of chargeable offenses, practices with the similar designation of "incompatible with the gospel and Spirit of Christ" be also included in the list of chargeable offenses.

To Para. 2621.1b add: "or incompatible with the gospel and spirit of Christ."

2621.1B will read:

"practices declared by the United Methodist Church to be incompatible with Christian teachings or incompatible with the gospel and spirit of Christ."

III.

To petition General Conference to make "Youth Ministries" a priority in the Quadrennium 1984-1988.

IV.

Whereas Paragraph 71.F of The Discipline plainly states that the practice of homosexuality is incompatible with Christian teachings and,

Whereas the extensive footnotes of Paragraph 404 (606) on pages 182-185 of The Discipline expresses the clear moral intention of the 1980 General Conference in regard to the matter of the practicing homosexuals in the ordained ministry, but

Whereas the present wording of **The Discipline** leaves room for ambiguity in this regard, I move that

The North Arkansas Conference petition the 1984 General Conference to amend The Discipline by adding to all those sections which pertain to the moral qualifications and

character of those persons eligible for the ordained ministry, the following paragraph:

No person who is a self-avowed practicing homosexual shall be eligible for candidacy,
ordination, appointment or reappointment by a Bishop or Superintendent in the
United Methodist Church.

V.

— A ministerial member of the annual conference, or a local pastor amenable to the conference, who reaches the age 70 before July 1, of the year the conference is held, may or may not be automatically retired, depending on the following; If such pastor has served a short time of one, two, or three years in the local church, and if the PPR committees asks for his/her return; and if it should be considered discreet, by the Bishop and Cabinet; the minister should be allowed to remain in that appointment; for a part of or until the old automatic age of 72. A minister or pastor benefiting from such an extension of time would not receive retirement benefits, until the actual time of retirement.

VI.

701.d. Local Pastors under full time appointment and part time Local Pastors and Student local pastors appointed to a pastoral charge shall have the right to vote in the Annual Conference on all matters except Constitutional Amendments, election of delegates to General or Jurisdictional Conferences, and matters of ordination, character and Conference relations of ministers.

VII.

701.2 The following shall be seated in the Annual Conference and shall be given the privilege of floor without vote; lay missionaries regularly appointed by the Board of Global Ministries in fields outside the United States: and diaconal ministers serving within the bounds of the Annual Conference. By authorization of a Central Conference national diaconal ministers may be given the same privileges.

VIII

In the plan document for the Ministerial Pension Plan and comprehensive protection plan delete entirely paragraph 2.lb which reads:

Effective commencing January 1, 1986, the amount designated as utility allowance; or where the church pays the utilities directly, the amount paid, but not to exceed 10% or the sum of the cash salary plus any tax-deterred annuity contributions.

IX.

Change paragraph 434 the Order of Deacon, to include after the words "or as an Associate Member": or as a Local Pastor who has completed all the educational requirements for associate membership but chooses not to seek associate membership.

v

CHANGE PARAGRAPH 434.1 to include after the words "the requirements of 420.", or paragraph 420 less the requirements of four years full-time service for those not seeking associate membership.

XI.

FOR APPOINTMENT OF A GENERAL CONFERENCE STANDING COMMITTEE ON UNITED METHODIST INVESTMENTS

WHEREAS, the Council of Bishops of the United Methodist Church on May 16, 1982, issues a pastoral letter to all members of this Church body concerning the impending threat of nuclear war and the escalation of the arms race, calling upon "every United Methodist to pray for and work for peace with justice and freedom... (and) to join together in seeking an end to the arms race,"

WHEREAS, the 1980 General Conference of the United Methodist Church established a

special program on Peace with Justice, calling "for persons who affirm the Lordship of Jesus Christ (to recognize this quadrennium as) a time for renewal and commitment to a major effort for peace," naming as one of its four themes "A Disarmed World" based on the "the prophet Micah's vision, 'they shall beat their swords into plowshares and spears into pruning hooks' (4:3), to seek reduction and eventual abolition of nuclear weapons and even conventional arms and to work for conversion of military research and production to peaceful efforts to meet human needs."

WHEREAS, prophets of old, of the ancient writings and of the new, envision the kingdom of God on earth as in heaven, a kingdom whose leaves of the tree of life are "for the healing of the nations" (Revelation 22:2), and whereas our Lord Jesus Christ commissioned his disciples to go into all the world, sharing through the Word and Spirit his Peace for all

people, and

WHEREAS, the General Board of Pensions and other agencies of the United Methodist Church maintain millions of dollars of various investments in corporate and government securities for the benefit of its people in mission and for the benefit of the mission of Christ's

whole church, and

WHEREAS, investments made by these agencies of the Church include securities of numerous corporations engaged in the research, production, and deployment of nuclear and conventional weapons and their delivery systems, a practice incompatible with beliefs and resolutions of the United Methodist Church;

WHEREAS, as of December 31, 1981, approximately 30% of the Board of Pensions investments were in the top 10 defense contract corporations' common stock and bonds, and current Board of Pensions assets are \$1.3 billion, and as of this time some concessions have

been made by the Board of Pensions, but investment guidelines are not consistent.

THEREFORE, the Board of Church and Society of the North Arkansas Annual Conference petitions the General Conference of the United Methodist Church 1984 to establish a Standing Committee for United Methodist investments for the purpose of advising boards and agencies of the church on ethical concerns of investment objectives regarding such areas as defense and military, South Africa, support of repressive regimes, environmental preservation, labor relations, equal employment opportunities and others which are in keeping with the United Methodist Principles, and for the purpose of establishing guidelines for investment objectives and proposing alternative, primarily through investments within the Church itself, its building and development missions, as well as corporate and government securities which have the public interest and ethical concerns in mind:

by the Council of Bishops naming representatives of boards and agencies of the United Methodist Church as follows: one from Board of Church and Society, one from Board of Global Ministries, one from Board of Discipleship, one from Board of Pensions, two clergy, two lay, four at-large * from such agencies as Interfaith Center for Corporate Responsibility, Methodist Federation for Social Action and the Women's Division. Funding for the committee to be provided by the General Council on Ministries. The Standing Committee will make an initial report to the General Council on Ministries of its findings, recommendations and guidelines before January 1986

*These representatives shall be appointed to four-year terms.

Resolution To North Arkansas Annual Conference From The Board Of Church And Society

A suggested statement of concern for use by the United Methodist Church. UNTO OUR CHILDREN, our grandchildren, and unto their children, we wish to bequeath a peaceful world, free from a nuclear threat to life on this planet. We support a reduction of nuclear weapons, under an effective verification system. While

negotiations are underway for reductions of nuclear weapons, we support a world-wide freeze on further production and testing of nuclear weapons, understanding that continued stockpiling of these weapons increases tremendously the odds of an accidental nuclear holocaust.

The possibility of a nuclear exchange, either intentional or accidental, is the gravest issue ever to confront humanity.

WE, THEREFORE, urge our nation's leaders to move forward in the earnest endeavor of negotiating a multi-national freeze on production and testing of nuclear armaments and for international agreements for a safe dismantling and destruction of existing nuclear weapons so that they will no longer cause a threat to life.

WE TAKE THIS STAND IN THE KNOWLEDGE OF GOD'S LOVE FOR US, AND

BECAUSE OF OUR LOVE AND TRUST IN GOD AND HUMANKIND.

Resolution Relating To Rental/Housing Allowances For Retired Or Disabled Ministers Of This Conference

WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as The United Methodist Church has and functions through Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed; and

WHEREAS, the practice of The United Methodist Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and

WHEREAS, pensions paid to retired ordained or licensed ministers of The United Methodist Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service, and disability benefits are considered payments in lieu of compensation for active service; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that the North Arkansas Annual Conference is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired ordained or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference; and

WHEREAS, the disabled minister has the same legal relationship to an Annual Conference as does the retired minister and, thus, this Annual Conference is also the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for a disabled ordained or licensed minister who is a member of this Conference;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

- 1. An amount equal to 100% of the pension or any amount in excess of the first \$5,200 of disability payments received during the year of 1984 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance respectively for each retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister of the North Arkansas Conference.
- 2. The pension or disability payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension or disability payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference, General Agency, or institution of The United Methodist Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The United Methodist Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension or benefit funds of The United Methodist Church for such retired minister's pension or disabled minister's benefits.

NOTE:

The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the

minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-280, 1971 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the Code as a 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities." Since, under current Federal law, the first \$5,200 of disability benefits received by an individual is excludable from gross income, the housing allowance designation from disability payments is, in the above resolution, designated to be only those payments made which are in excess of the first \$5,200 of disability benefits during any given year.

RESOLUTION In Support Of Advocacy On Behalf Of First Asylum Seeker Refugees

In the Refugee Act of 1980, the U.S. Congress adopted as law the standards of the United Nations Conventions of Protocol Relating to Refugees. According to this, the U.S. should accord refugee or asylum status to persons who cannot return to their country of origin because of persecution, or fear of persecution for reasons of race, religion, nationality, membership in a particular group, or political opinion. It has become a "country of first asylum" for thousands of people fleeing from tyranny and often from the threat of death.

Confronted by this major problem, for which it is ill prepared, the United States Government has refused to grant people fleeing here from El Salvador and Guatemala the legal status of "refugee" or the privilege of "extended voluntary departure," which would enable them to remain in the United States until it is safe for them to return home. As undocumented aliens in the United States, they are not entitled to assistance from government programs, and often are afraid to leave their places of hiding to take jobs or to seek help for their basic needs.

The United States stands virtually alone in its actions of refusing to recognize these Central Americans as refugees. The United Nations High Commission for Refugees has declared that all Salvadorans who have fled their country since early 1980 are in a "refugee-like" situation, have a valid claim to protection, and should not be returned or

"repatriated."

More than forty churches around the country are giving sanctuary to persons from Central America who would face deportation to their war-torn countries. In recent months congregations of the United Methodist Church have become increasingly concerned about

the plight of these refugees.

The value of sanctuary to the first asylum seeker is without measure, and those who provide it make a powerful statement for God's love and compassion. To people of faith these persons are not aliens but are our sisters and brothers. The consequences of deportation to these our neighbors are so brutal that persons of sensitized conscience must cry out in protest. Sanctuary for the refugees is an expression of brotherhood which requires resistance against injustices which thrive within our communities.

Giving sanctuary may be construed to be acts of civil-disobedience toward the state, even though grounded in the gospel. As Christians dedicated to the goodnews, we are committed to uphold and safeguard human life. We commend all congregations which have already opened their doors to offer sanctuary to those persons whose only alternative seems to be

death.

Therefore, as an expression of our faith in God, seeking justice and love for our neighbor, the Board of Church and Society, North Arkansas Annual Conference, recommends to the North Arkansas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church that it call upon its local congregations in the United Methodist Church to become advocates for first asylum refugees within their communities by asking the government of the United States:

a. to guarantee full due process rights for all asylum seekers.

b. to commit itself to the principle of non-refoulement (no forced return when life is in jeopardy) in relation to those who seek asylum in this country.

c. to put an end to all actions which exert pressure upon asylum seekers to leave U.S. without delay when they are seeking refuge here, or which intercept them on the seas or outside the borders of the U.S. in order to prevent their entry.

d. to seriously consider granting to Salvadorans and other Central Americans seeking refuge in this country the privilege of "extended voluntary departure"

until they can return home with a reasonable degree of safety.

e. to grant legal entrant status to Haitian refugees who arrived between October 10, 1980 and June 29, 1982, the date of Federal Judge Spellman's court order releasing them from detention.

For churches seriously considering to provide sanctuary to the Central American refugees and any other persons whose life seems to be in jeopardy as they face deportation, the Board upon request will clarify implications and offer informational advice for such ministry.

Resolution To North Arkansas Annual Conference From The Board Of Church And Society

As United Methodist Christians, we are committed to the Gospel of Jesus Christ, the good news that God was in Christ reconciling the world to himself, and to the conviction that we have been given the task to continue that reconciliation in the world.

We affirm the Gospel's call for all Christians to work for the good of themselves and others and to love all persons as we have been loved by God.

We affirm the call of the Bible and Christ to work for the elimination of

economic and social distress, injustice, and oppression.
We affirm with the Social Principles of The United Methodist Church the values of human dignity, truth, fairness (justice), and moral responsibility, and and are these practices, which each process the second of the second operations.

of human dignity, truth, fairness (justice), and moral responsibility, and endorse those practices which enhance the realization of those values in personal, community, and societal living.

We affirm the right to freedom of inquiry, speech, media and religious belief and practice by all persons in an atmosphere of respect and integrity.

We affirm the right of committed Christians to differ in their understanding of the imperatives of the Gospel upon their lives and their right to respond with integrity according to their understanding in addressing the issues and concerns of our impure, ambiguous, confused and complicated world. We believe that sincere Christians can differ and disagree while maintaining respect and integrity within their relationships.

THEREFORE:

We object to the biased presentation which distorted the work of the United Methodist Church, the National Council of Churches of Christ, and the World Council of Churches;

We object to the CBS News "60 Minutes" use of the powerful and persuasive techniques of innuendo; the guilt by implication, association, and allegation;

And we call upon CBS News to offer a public apology on the same program and grant equal time for the maligned groups to answer and present their story in a format of their design during prime time.

Further, we call on United Methodist Communications to initiate action with the National Council of Churches of Christ and other Christian groups to secure advertising to underwrite and air a presentation to tell the story of the mission work of our churches, answer allegations, and deal forthrightly with issues which underlie the attack by CBS News, the Institute on Religion and Democracy, and Reader's Digest.

A Resolution To The North Arkansas Annual Conference Urging Local Churches To Study The Issue Of Homosexuality

United Methodists are more frequently being asked to make decisions which affect the lives of homosexual persons. These decisions are often made based on the myths and

stereotypes we have learned during our lifetimes, because we do not have the benefit of objective information related to the issue of homosexuality.

Therefore, the North Arkansas Conference Board of Church and Society encourages each local congregation to study this issue in the spirit of Christian love in order to enable us as United Methodists to make decisions based on wisdom and not myth and which will reflect God's love.

In order to facilitate this process, the North Arkansas Conference Board of Church & Society will make resource persons and materials available to our local churches in the North Arkansas Conference using United Methodist procedures of scripture, tradition, experience and reason.

WHEREAS, As United Methodists, we have been traditionally committed to ecumenical involvement as an indispensable means by which we and other Christians follow Christ's commands to serve the needy persons of the world, seek justice for oppressed persons and express the unity which we share in Christ.

WHEREAS, We encourage responsible examination of the World Council of Churches and National Council of Churches of Christ and other institutions, since all institutions, including the Church, are fallible and constantly under the judgment of God,

WHEREAS, We welcome constructive criticism, which is based on full information and a sincere desire to help the institution under scrutiny to better serve God's mission in the world.

WHEREAS, We call upon all United Methodists to take every opportunity to increase dialogue and understanding of our basic ecumenical commitment, We commend the Council of Bishops for establishing a special committee to look into the allegations made concerning the National Council of Churches and World Council of Churches,

WE AFFIRM United Methodist membership both in the National Council of Churches of Christ and World Council of Churches, and remain committed to and expect full accountability of these agencies to their constituencies.

Resolution Of Appreciation Committee On Courtesies And Resolutions

The One Hundred Forty-Seventh Session of the North Arkansas Conference of The United Methodist Church opened on Tuesday afternoon, June 7, with the bicentennial bell ringing out to call us to order. And we voted . . .

The bell was used to call us to order several more times — though more than once it sounded more like the bell on a train calling us to get on board or the bell at a prize fight saving us from a knockout. And we voted . . .

"My Lord" Bishop Hicks conducted our Conference with his usual wit, patience and loving endurance. And we voted . . . As we found ourselves falling behind schedule and our spirits lagging, or the "turnstile tellers" dizzy from maneuvering through the revolving doors to their rooms, we were saved by the meaningful worship services. We thank The Reverend Dr. Joe Washington for his inspiring preaching, the worship committee for their planning, and the retired clergy who led the morning devotions. They may be in a retired relationship, but their spirit was far from retiring as the songs and words gave direction to our day. And we voted . . .

The District Superintendent's report reminded us that there are no "quick fixes" to the problems of our world and our church. That report listed as goals for this year a search for the discovery of truth; the continued movement toward longer tenure for ministers, and a constant re-examination of issues from a theological, ethical and moral perspective. And we voted . . .

One question "My Lord Bishop" asked that did not get answered was figuring out who clergy persons really live with. However, the important issue of being an inclusive church was occasionally raised. And we voted...

As of this year's Annual Conference, we, who own $\frac{1}{3}$ of Methodist Hospital Systems, traded them 50 acres for a conference center, came under their health insurance plan, voted support of their nursing school and C.P.E. programs and viewed on audio-visual their work. It was beginning to sound as if they own $\frac{1}{3}$ of us. And we voted . . .

Perhaps the report of Council on Finance and Administration, which we quickly adopted, led us very calmly and openly into committing ourselves to spending 3.3 million dollars that boldly proclaims that WE DO care about the lost, WE DO care about the needy, WE DO care about each other; WE DO care about our pastors; and WE DO care about OUR CHURCH.

With all the voting over we can give praise to God knowing there is a future into which we go, a living Christ who is there waiting for us, and an assurance that in His love we go TOGETHER to do God's work. As Bishop Hicks astutely observed, "The laity are often ready to go where the ministers are not ready to lead them." Let us take one more vote to leave here together as one in Jesus Christ.



Funeral service was held at 11:00 a.m. September 15, 1982, at Livingston Chapel United Methodist Church in Marianna. The Reverend Edward Davis officiated.

Elmer Jewel Holifield 1906-1982

The Reverend Elmer Jewel Holifield was born on August 8, 1906, in Johnson's Chapel, Arkansas, as the first of four children of Claude E. Holifield and Mamie Susie (McCord) Holifield. His father was a Methodist minister who had formerly been the President of the Protestant Methodist conferences of Arkansas, Louisiana, and Missouri. After graduating in 1923 from the Sloan-Hendrix Academy in Imboden, Arkansas, Mr. Holifield attended college at Arkansas Tech and Arkansas State College, from which he graduated in 1938. He then studied for three years at the Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University, graduating in 1941.



In 1953 he was appointed District Superintendent of the Jonesboro District, where he served for six years before accepting the position of Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission for the North Arkansas Conference and then for the state of Arkansas. Having spent six years on the Commission, he became the District Superintendent of the Batesville District, where he worked until his retirement in 1971. As a retired minister, he was the pastor on the Mount Pleasant Charge, during which time the Mount Pleasant Church was nominated as the Rural Church of the Year in North Arkansas. Throughout his ministry, he had a special interest in small-membership churches, and he was a continuing

advocate of the Larger Parish program — a project designed to enhance ministry to persons in rural congregations.

In 1931 he married Irene Hewlett French of Rector, Arkansas, and on September 14, 1981, they observed their fiftieth wedding anniversary. They had one son, E. Brooks Holifield, who was born on January 5, 1942, and who serves now as the Professor of American Church History and the Director of the Graduate Division of Religion at the Candler School of Theology, Emory University, Atlanta, Georgia. Mr. Holifield was also survived by one sister, Claudine Kloepfel, of Kansas City, and by two grandchildren.

The funeral services for Elmer Holifield were held in Rector, Arkansas, after his death on October 18, 1982. The Reverend Ben Jordan, the pastor of the First United Methodist Church in North Little Rock, preached the funeral sermon. He was assisted by the Reverend Sherman Waters of Rector and the Reverend Samuel B. Teague, the Superintendent of the Paragould District. He was buried on a hillside in the Woodland Heights Cemetery in Rector.

When his own father died in 1960, Mr. Holifield concluded the obituary notice with a quotation: "The Lord was his light and salvation; the Lord was the strength of his life." No statement could better express the meaning of the life and ministry of Elmer Jewel Holifield.

Fred McMillan Thompson was born February 27, 1902, near Linden in Perry County, Tennessee. He was the son of Joe and Martha (Murphy) Thompson.

He was united in marriage with Miss Lona Mae Bunch December 23, 1927, and to this union was born one son, Benton McMillan Thompson.

In 1945, Fred and his wife, Lona, were both given license to preach and pastor churches. The charges they served are: Waltreak Circuit, Conway District (1945-'47); Naylor Circuit, Conway District (1947-'50); Branch Circuit, Fort Smith District (1950-'52); Waldron Circuit, Fort Smith District (1952-'54); Belleville Circuit, Conway District (1954-'58); Aubrey-Lexa, Forrest City District (1958-'60); Black Rock Circuit,



Paragould District (1960-'61); Brookland Circuit, Jonesboro District (1961-'62); Izard County Circuit, Batesville District (1962-'64).

Fred and his wife, Lona, were ordained by Bishop Paul E. Martin. They both worked in the ministry under the following District Superintendents: Horace M. Lewis, Richard E. Connell, C. M. Reeves, Henry W. Goodloe, Robert E. L. Bearden, Henry Rickey, Raymond Franks, Lloyd M. Conyers, A. N. Storey, and Elmo Thomason.

They retired in June of 1964 and moved to Belleville for the remainder of his life. On July 13, 1982, Brother Thompson suffered a severe heart attack while working in his garden, and on Sunday, July 18, about 9:20 p.m., the Lord took him home. He leaves his wife, Lona; a son, Benton, and four grandchildren.

Funeral services were held in Belleville United Methodist Church with Pastor Derek Weber officiating, July 20, 1982. Burial was in Russell cemetery in Belleville.

Hattie May Harger Moore

Hattie May Moore was born January 3, 1898, in Choctaw, Van Buren County, Arkansas, to Felix Thomas Anderson and Julie Ann (Gwaltney) Anderson. Her family moved to Heber Springs when she was too young to remember any other home. She was reared by Christian parents in the Methodist Church and at the age of fourteen was baptized in the church.

She passed the teachers' examination when she finished the eighth grade and began teaching in Cleburne County's one-room schools. She worked her way through high school and college while teaching short, split-term schools and graduated from Arkansas State Teachers College with a B.S.E. Degree.

In November, 1937, she married James Wesley Harger, a Methodist Minister, and served with him in the parsonage for seventeen years until his death in 1954. In 1957 she married the Reverend Mr. Jason W. Moore at which time she retired from teaching and devoted her full time to parsonage home keeping as Brother Moore after he retired continued to serve as a

supply pastor.

Mrs. Moore was always active in the work of the church, having taught in every department of the Church School and having worked with the women's organization in both local and district levels. She loved Bible study and never missed an opportunity to take Bible studies in college, Pastor's Schools, and Training Schools. She wanted to learn music and managed to take enough lessons to learn to play simple hymns. She was especially inspired by the hymns of Fanny Crosby. Lucy Lewis Peterson, daughter of Thomas A. and Josephine (Ainesworth) Lewis, was born November 15, 1894, at Village, Arkansas, where she attended the public school through high school.

She was united in marriage with the Reverend Mr. W. W. Peterson, November 7, 1925. Three sons and one daughter were born to them, all of whom survive. They are: John

Peterson of Tulsa, Oklahoma; Bill Peterson of Houston, Texas; Sherman Peterson of Little Rock; and Nina Martin of Little Rock. Mrs. Peterson is survived also by a stepson, Ralph Peterson of Carson, California; and by two step-daughters, Hazel Claypool of Oceanside, California, and Lois Worth, also of Oceanside. She is survived also by one sister, Mildred Rogers of Magnolia, Arkansas, by sixteen grandchildren, and twelve great-grandchildren.

In 1978, Mrs. Peterson moved from Village to Little Rock to make her home with her daughter, which she did until repeated illnesses caused her to be hospitalized. XII. Standing Rules Of The North Arkansas Conference

(1) That each undergraduate, each Local Pastor, and each candidate for conference membership be required to meet with the Board of Ministry before or during the session of the Annual Conference unless hindered by circumstances beyond his/her control.

(2) That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one member from each church in each

Pastoral Charge.

(3) That the figures answering the question in the pastor's report to Annual Conference "Members reported last year" shall in every case be the number of members printed in the statistical tables of the Journal of the last Annual Conference.

(4) That the apportioned figures arrived at by the use of the Conference decimal be

accepted as the official figures.

(5) That the apportionment for World Service and Conferences Benevolences be combined in the statistical report; and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.

(6) All statistical reports, after being checked for correctness by the District Superintendent and District auditors, shall be delivered by one of them to the Conference

Statistician, within 31 days after the closing of the Conference Treasurer's books.

(7) That the District Superintendents be instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or District

Superintendent's District for insertion in the Conference Journal.

(8) There shall be an Annual Conference Planning Committee made up of the Bishop (who shall be chairperson), Council Directors, host institution representative, District Superintendents, the Conference Secretary and four persons from the Council on Lay Life and Work, two of whom shall be women. The responsibility of this committee shall be to plan

the agenda and entertainment of the Annual Conference.

- (9) The expenses of the Annual Conference shall be paid by funds received from: 1. registration fees, which shall be set by the Annual Conference Planning Committee; 2. offerings received at the Annual Conference; and 3. if necessary, the Conference Administration Fund. The expenses of retired ministers, spouses, and widows shall be paid in keeping with the guidelines of the Conference Planning Committee when the proper vouchers are presented. No registration fee shall be required of retired ministers, spouses or widows.
- (10) A list of lay members elected to Annual Conference shall be compiled by the district superintendents and sent to the conference secretary prior to the opening of the session.

(11) No one shall be nominated for re-election to a board or commission on which he/she

has served more than a quadrennium immediately preceding his/her election.

(12) The Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Pensions shall be members of the secretarial staff of the Conference, and these persons shall be charged with the responsibility of seeing that all records pertaining to service years be made identical.

(13) Any proposal to change the Standing Rules shall lie on the table overnight, and then

its passage shall require a 34 vote of those present and voting.

(14) That part of the report of all councils, boards, commissions, committees and other agencies of the conference which provides for changes in policy or makes recommendations shall be mimeographed, printed, or otherwise duplicated and distributed to the membership of the conference prior to the time scheduled for action on said report.

(15) Each Annual Conference session shall designate a moving date. Any exceptions to

the designated date shall be agreed upon by the pastors involved.

(16) That no person shall be elected by the Annual Conference to serve on more than one (1) major Board, Committee, Commission, Agency, etc., at one time. This does not affect ex-officio positions, or the Conference Committee on Episcopacy.

(17) That all councils, boards, committees, and commissions be made more representative. Special consideration should be given to the use of women and youth, full-time local pastors, and ethnic minority groups.

(18) No person shall serve as an elected trustee of more than one United Methodist

related institution of the Arkansas Area at a time.

(19) No one who by virtue of their office would be an ex-officio trustee, shall serve as an

elected trustee of the same agency.

- (20) Each year the Conference Council on Ministries will determine the number of additional lay persons, if any, to be named and will notify each District Council on Ministries of the number of persons to be named by it, encouraging them to use the following formula with top priority to be given to Number 1, etc.:
 - 1. Diaconal Ministries
 - 2. Lay Delegates to general and jurisdictional conference
 - 3. Ethnic minority and small membership churches
 - 4. Elected chairpersons for conference boards and agencies
 - 5. Officers of the Conference Council on Lay, Life and Work
 - 6. Conference United Methodist Women officers within the bounds of a district
 - 7. Elected lay persons to general and jurisdictional conference boards and agencies
 - 8. District presidents of United Methodist Women, district presidents of United Methodist Men and United Methodist Youth Fellowship
 - 9. Lay members of conference boards and agencies
 - 10. One additional youth from each district
 - 11. At-large district representation




