E. Bishop's Address& Daily Proceedings

a. Bishop's Address

North Arkansas Annual Conference June 6, 1988

Two hundred fifty years ago, on May 24th, 1738, the Anglican priest, John Wesley, recorded in his journal:

"Wednesday, May 24 - I think it was about five this morning that I opened my Testament on those words, 'There are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises, even that ye should be partakers of the divine nature' (2 Peter 1.4). Just as I went out, I opened it again on those words, 'Thou are not far from the kingdom of God.' In the afternoon I was asked to go to St. Paul's Church. The anthem was 'Out of the deep have I called unto Thee, O Lord: Lord, hear my voice. O let thine ears consider well the voice of my complaint. If thou, Lord, wilt be extreme to mark what is done amiss, O Lord, who may abide it? For there is mercy with thee; therefore shalt thou be feared. O Israel, trust in the Lord: for with the Lord there is mercy, and with Him is plenteous redemption'.

"In the evening I went very unwillingly to a society in Aldersgate-street, where one was reading Luther's preface to the Epistle to the Romans. About a quarter before nine, while he was describing the change which God works in the heart through faith in Christ, I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone, for salvation; and an assurance was given me that He had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death.

"I began to pray with all my might for those who had in a more special manner despitefully used me and persecuted me. I then testified openly to all there what I now first felt in my heart.

"Thursday, 25 - The moment I awaked, 'Jesus, Master,' was in my heart and in my mouth; and I found all my strength lay in keeping my eye fixed upon him, and my soul waiting on him continually. Being again at St. Paul's in the afternoon, I could taste the good word of God in the anthem, which began 'My song shall be always of the loving-kindness of the Lord: with my mouth will I ever be showing forth thy truth from one generation to another."

Some churches remember the <u>birth</u> or <u>death</u> of a saint or of their founder. But Methodism remembers an experience - a certain night when the Holy Spirit entered the heart of a preacher, gracefully cleaned that heart of pride and took control.

Just as Christianity was born in the fires of Pentecost, Methodism was born again in the heart strangely warmed at Aldersgate.

The fires are still burning. I have just returned from General Conference in St. Louis where you feel the fire of grace and fellowship. Bishop Grandison of the Philippines told me that amid political and economic confusion, each United Methodist congregation seeks to start a new congregation and the church is growing 10% a year.

Bishop Zotelle of Chile described how the United Methodist Church could not hold the fires of Pentecostalism, and Methodist Pentecostal burst out, now numbering nearly 4 million people.

Bishop Chang of Korea has invited Julia and me to visit Korea in September as official representatives of the Council of Bishops. In 1974 Korean Methodists counted 300,000 believers; in 1984, the year of their Centennial when they remember American Methodist missionaries setting foot on Korean soil, they counted 1 million believers.

Africa is ablaze with conversions. Laymen and laywomen will stand up during a church service, ask for prayers, and walk off to witness, teach, convert, and start a new congregation in a distant village.

Desperate for trained leaders in every field of life - church, business, education, professions, government, the United Methodist churches of Central and South Central Africa have asked for a

United Methodist University to be built at the old Umtali Mission station where they have given 1000 acres in Zimbabwe.

The bishops from Zaire, Zimbabwe, Sierre Leone and Nigeria and Liberia stood and hugged each other with tears on their cheeks as the General Conference overwhelming voted to apportion 2 1/2 million dollars in Mission Special gifts to build, first a seminary, then a teacher training college, slowly a great university.

And in typical United Methodist fashion, we here in Conway, Arkansas, gear up in our budget considerations, knowing full well that we have many needs close by, prepare to help make that

dream a reality.

Every hymn and song we sang at General Conference was from the new hymnal, just as, I believe, all of our great singing at this annual conference will be.

There are EUB and Methodist hymnals, but this will be the first United Methodist hymnal -- and it is a book of the people.

The old gospel song we sang at my mother's funeral, "It Is Well With My Soul", is in it. So is "The Old Rugged Cross" and "What A Friend We Have In Jesus". Some contemporary songs are in it, and songs like "He Touched Me" and "Fill My Cup, Lord".

Scores and scores of Charles Wesley hymns like "O For a Thousand Tongues" and "Love Divine" are in it. And the great classic hymns - well loved so much - "A Mighty Fortress", "God of Grace and God of Glory" -- spirituals - "Take My Hand, Precious Lord", ethnic hymns, modern songs and choruses are in it.

So are several crisp vigorous liturgies for Holy Communion and Baptism.

And the scripture responsive readings - more of them - and this time with moving musical responses, Amens, and Praise melodies, laced within them.

The language, both of hymns and liturgy, is appropriate, avoiding blatant sexist or racist

language, yet keeping devotional and tradition.

The hymnal will be available in 1989. I hope you will advance order, with payment now, so that you will save \$1.50 per copy, so that Arkansas will lead the way, and so that your congregation will be known as a great singing church.

General Conference turned a spotlight on evangelism and church growth. Leaving the tasked to the conferences and not apportioning money for it, nevertheless, we walked away from St. Louis under the Banner of Celebrate: Witness, challenging ourselves to start 200 new congregations a year, hold confirmation classes in every church possible, and have each year some special evangelistic effort in every congregation,

I'm so pleased with what we have accomplished in Arkansas these past four years. Our new Church Development Campaign in the Little Rock Conference and our "Catch the Vision" Builder's Club in North Arkansas has helped us initiate twelve new congregations.

Count them - from the top in the lad of opportunity -

Grace Church at Rogers;

A Korean United Methodist Congregation at Springdale;

St Andrew at Fort Smith;

A Korean pastor assigned to start a new church in Jacksonville;

A new pastor assigned to a piece of land on Brockington Road, Sherwood, North Little Rock;

An ecumenical group becoming a United Methodist Church and exploding in growth in Maumelle;

The Winfield Church, relocating on Highway #10, merging with Mt. View and building a new church;

A new work projected in the Quapaw at old Winfield Church, in the fall of th year;

Christ of the Hills congregation at Hot Springs Village;

Piney Grove Church at Hot Springs;

St. John's Church in Hope;

Twelve new congregations - requiring fresh, well, trained, highly dedicated pastoral leadership, lots of financial help, and encouragement from nearby churches, and prayers for all of us.

Like the frontier Methodists, we're going with the gospel where the people are - - The fire is still burning.

When you consider the splendid efforts made by the conferences to strengthen the Sunday Schools, develop stronger program ministries in the local churches, and invite people to our fellowship, it is no wonder that we are experiencing a turn around in all levels of participation.

In the Little Rock Conference we had a net loss of only 324, the lowest level of decline in years. In North Arkansas Conference - a net gain of 21 souls, the first net gain since 1974, I congratulate you.

Our United Methodist Colleges continue to bring honor to Arkansas. Philander Smith college, under new President Myer Titus, is serving 550 students, is financially solvent, and ready to break into a new plateau of excellence. Our Faithful support for the Black College Fund and extra gifts make this bench mark possible.

Hendrix is basking in national recognition - one of the great church related colleges of America. Not only does she provide leadership for the state and nation, but everywhere I go in Arkansas - among clergy and laity - I find Hendrix graduates in leadership positions.

The <u>Disciple</u> plan of bible Study for Leadership development is so powerful; it is changing people's lives an putting a strong spiritual base under congregations.

I urge you to enroll your church, go to one of the national training events this summer - Julia and I will be at the one in Dallas - and be ready to begin a <u>Disciple</u> group this fall.

The Sunday School continues to demand our best efforts. We have begun several hundred new adult classes this quadrennium.

"Offer them Christ" is for all of Arkansas, held at Pulaski Heights Church Sept. 28 - Oct. 1. The top people from the Board of Evangelism in Nashville, Tennessee will be present to help us learn more about lay evangelism, meaningful worship, growth plus consultation, membership training classes, children and youth ministries. I plan to be there the entire time. I have asked each district superintendent to be present. I ask each church to send it's pastor and three of four key lay persons to "Offer Them Christ". Out of it will come inspiration dn information for your own ministry and your own congregation.

Springing out of "Offer Them Christ" will be workshops, later in the year, on confirmation training for youth and adults, plus a statewide Sunday School Attendance campaign in 1989.

Do you ever get spiritually dry - I mean empty in your soul? I took an Emmaus Walk some years ago - and I felt the Holy spirit - fresh and alive in my heart. For me it was a little Aldersgate all over again.

Every few months our church provides an Emmaus Walk - a spiritual retreat emphasizing prayer, lay and pastoral presentations on Biblical and Wesleyan themes, Holy Communion, and quiet time. If you need a fresh touch from the Lord - a new sense of peace and forgiveness and joy - I encourage you to look into Emmaus Walk.

Now a word about our compassionate ministries.

The Hunger Ingathering in Arkansas is an inspiration to me. With the United Methodist Church front and center, Christian denominations cooperated in raising millions of dollars of aid for starving people all over the world. We obey our Lord's statement "I was hungry and you gave me food".

Our Aldersgate camp provides medical camps for children with dread diseases - - 10 weeks, 10 different illnesses. Respite care is provided each week-end for young people with severe handicapping conditions. A day care center serves children who have been abused or neglected. Pray for it's ministry.

Our great work through the Children's Home is os fundamental a part of Arkansas Methodist that we take it for granted. But don't forget that for years and years, young people from troubled families have stepped forth from the shelter of the Children's Home and its satellite cottages to become responsible, well adjusted citizens - and, many of them, dedicated church members. Make the Children's home a normal part of your stewardship life.

Our social witness continues to be strong and clear. Let me highlight several issues.

a) Public education

Sometimes I think that if we were to take all of the United Methodist preachers' wives out of public schools, they would collapse. If we took the United Methodists out, I know they would.

We believe in the public schools. We believe every child in Arkansas should have a quality education.

I appeal to all United Methodists to work for better salaries, better financial support, better public schools in Arkansas.

b) Capital Punishment

Never has the issue been so emotional, so close to home, so difficult. The United Methodist Church has officially and historically opposed capital punishment. Now with people waiting on death row, it is a good time for us to speak out.

We do urge the state to use life imprisonment with no parole as the alternative to capital

punishment, but we oppose the taking of a life for these reasons:

- our Saviour was killed by capital punishment;
- sometimes mistakes are made that are irreversible;
- usually the poor, who have limited legal help, are the ones finally executed;
- it does not deter crime;
- execution fails to reinforce the reverence for life we espouse.
- c) Nuclear Disarmament

We rejoice that the U.S.A. and the U.S.S.R have concluded a nuclear arms reduction treaty. More, much more, can be done.

So many of our churches have studied or are studying the Bishops' Pastoral Letter on the Nuclear

Crisis. I commend it to you.

We are called to be peacemakers, and I believe God is depending on us to help keep this crazy world from blowing up the planet.

d) Ethics

Both the governor and key United Methodist state legislators are proposing an ethics bill with disclosures for lobbyists and legislators. I urge whole hearted support by the churches. In our churches, all financial matters are open and are public record. The government should do the same.

e) Lotteries

The people called Methodists have always opposed gambling in all its forms. Gambling undermines the Christian work ethic; becomes, in effect, a heavy tax on th poor; puts the state in the gambling business; and inevitably attracts crime and corruption. I believe all the religious communities in Arkansas will join us on this issue.

Thank you for allowing me to catalogue the great work of our 747 United Methodist churches, our two great conferences, our splendid institutions. Owe a hundred years of loyalty to Christ and

Methodist Church continues in power.

But I began with a man whose heart was strangely warmed and who went out to save souls. I want to close by telling about a contemporary preacher whose heart is on fire. (Illustration of Reverend Lee of Korea going to Jacksonville.)

Lewis See, Jr. presented questions 27, 31, & 38. Candidates were examined according to the Historic Questions and then dismissed for the vote. These were elected and then greeted by the Conference.

See presented question 39(b). It was done.

Bishop Wilke requested the privilege of later examining Ben Anderson according to the Historic Questions.

Frank Clemmons presented questions 41, 42, 45, & 46. These were received.

Clemmons presented question 47. Persons requesting Leave of Absence were voted individually without negative vote.

Clemmons moved question 50(c). It was done. David Orr inquired concerning the appointability of persons on Disability Leave.

Clemmons moved questions 51, 52, & 54. It was done.

Jim West moved that we receive the entire report of the Board of Ordained Ministry as perfected. It was done.

Bishop Wilke expressed appreciation to Joe Kennedy and members of the Board.

ADJOURNMENT. Bishop Wilke adjourned the Executive Session.

Second Day---Monday Morning Session June 6, 1988

The Conference was assembled at 8:15 for worship. The preacher was Steve Coburn. The liturgist was Evelyn Banks.

Bishop Wilke convened the Conference at 8:55 a.m.

ORGANIZATION OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

RULES OF ORDER: Charles Watt presented the rules of order.

Those desiring the floor of the Conference shall be within the Bar of the Conference and will move to a microphone and when recognized by the Chair will state their name, local church or area of responsibility.

To vote and have your vote counted, you must:

- 1. be within the Bar of the Conference and be seated.
- have your name tag where it can be seen by the teller.Note:
 - a) Lay Members may vote on all matters except ordination Conference relations, and clergy delegates to General Jurisdictional Conference.
 - b) Probationary, Associate, Local Full Time, Part Time, and Student Local Pastors: may vote on all matters ex-

cept Constitutional amendments, election of General and Jurisdictional Conference delegates, and matters of ordination and ministerial relations.

c) Full Members: may vote on all matters except the election of Lay delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences.

Jim Beal reported on changes in voting privileges for Local Pastors. Beal moved that we permit, at the 1989 Annual Conference, student and part-time local pastors to vote on the matters allowed by the 1988 Discipline. It was done.

Watt moved the Bar of the Conference be the lower floor of the auditorium. It was done.

Debate on each motion shall be limited to three two-minute speeches for the motion and three two-minute speeches against the motion (excluding persons rising to points of order, amendments, or final summation). A timer shall be useed to measure debate at the discretion of the Chair.

All resolutions and reports not printed in the Pre-Conference Journal shall be legibly written in duplicate, and shall be in the hands of the Conference Secretary and Presiding Officer before such can be considered by the Conference. Any material which is not in the hands of the Conference Secretary within two days of the close of the Conference session may be omitted from the Conference Journal.

The Annual Conference sessions shall be governed by the Standing Rules, otherwise Roberts Rules of Order; all of which shall comply with the Discipline of the United Methodist Church.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: The Secretary made multiple announcements.

UNITED METHODIST CHILDREN'S HOME: Bob Orr brought greetings from the Children's Home.

METHODIST HEALTH SYSTEMS: Bob Howerton brought greetings from the Methodist Hospitals.

PHILANDER SMITH COLLEGE: Dr. Myer Titus brought greetings from the college.

CATCH THE VISION: Greg Webb presented the report of "Catch the Vision" and introduced Don Hall, Leonard Higgins, and George Wayne Martin to speak to the program.

RECESS: Bishop Wilke declared a brief recess to prepare for the reading of the appointments.







PROCEDURE FOR IMPLEMENTING THE CCOM'S COMMITMENT TO THE DCOM'S AS THE LOCUS FOR CONFERENCE PROGRAMS

Planning process adopted June 1985

Part 1 - - Evaluation and General Planning - - February. The CCOM meeting will concentrate on evaluating the previous year's programs and goals. New objectives will be selected for presentation to the Annual Conference. A partial list of program ideas will be included in the presentation to demonstrate how the goals and objectives can be accomplished. Budget figures will be assigned to Conference Goals rather than to specific programs. A detailed budget will be adopted at the CCOM's Fall Meeting.

Part 2 - - Action of the Annual Conference - - June. The CCOM will present a report to the Annual Conference showing how the past year's goals and objectives have been achieved and which programs enable those accomplishments. Goals, budgets and possible programs for the coming year will then be presented for revision and adoption.

Part 3 - - Program Suggestions - - June-October. Following Annual Conference, the CCOM will solicit program ideas from local churches, DCOM's, Boards and Agencies, as avenues

for accomplishing the adopted goals and objectives of the Annual Conference.

Part 4 - - Program Adopted - - November. Suggestions from the various churches, districts and boards will then be presented and reviewed by the CCOM. Specific programs will then be selected which will best accomplish the Conference Goals, and specific budgets will be adopted for individual programs, within the limits set by the Annual Conference.

Part 5 - Goal Suggestions - November-February. The CCOM will solicit ideas for Conference Objectives from local churches, DCOM's, Boards and Agencies. These ideas will be collated and presented to the CCOM for review at the Evaluation-Planning meeting in February.

- 4. Caring congregations will be engaged in global mission.
- 5. Caring congregations will be involved in ecumenical and interreligious activities.
- 6. Caring congregations will be intentional in organizing groups that express mutual love and concern for one another in the church family and for persons in the community at large.
- 7. Caring congregations will be equipping all persons to grow in grace through corporate worship, spiritual discipline, stewardship, study, leadership training, and lay ministries.
- 8. Caring congregations will be sharing their faith in Christ, offering Christ, and inviting persons into life in Christ and into the church.
- Caring congregations will be supportive of the connectional life and programs of the United Methodist Church.

AREA COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

Approved by North Arkansas Conference Council on Ministries — February 19, 1988. Approved by Little Rock Conference Council on Ministries — February 25, 1988

Communication is vital to ministry in the connectional system of the United Methodist Church. The Arkansas Area Communications Committee reviewed the work of the Arkansas United Methodist Study Committee which was charged with the task of evaluating and making recommendations about the future of this major communications tool in the North Arkansas and Little Rock Annual Conferences.

The Study Committee began by reviewing the history of the paper and the current situation, including the anticipated change in editors January 1, 1988, the complete financial picture, and the goal set in 1982 of decreasing the apportionment by increasing advertising and subscription income. The committee decided to focus attention on clarifying the purpose of the Arkansas United Methodist, determining the best structure for fulfilling this purpose, and recommending a way to fund the newspaper.

The attached "Arkansas United Methodist Policy Statement" reflects the conclusion that the newspaper's primary goal should be to inform and enable local church leaders — "the people who need to know." This is the target audience for which the Arkansas United Methodist should be a vital resource.

Stemming from this narrowed, concentrated focus came the conclusion that the annual conferences must be willing to provide the major support for the newspaper. The Arkansas United Methodist must be viewed as a ministry-enabling tool which deserves basic funding to support its ministry.

Costs of producing a newspaper have increased sharply during the five years since the current system was adopted. For example, bulk postage spending has more than doubled from \$11,775 in 1983 to \$25,650 in 1987. Typesetting costs have increased from \$9,190 to \$12,974 in those five years.

The newspaper has been able to absorb these rising costs with advertising and subscription income, but it is unrealistic to anticipate this generated income can increase enough to allow for major apportionment decreases. Costs will continue to rise in the future. The price of an individual

paid subscription covers only the additional cost of producing that subscription.

The allocation system which provides up to 10,000 copies to individuals named by their local church has the advantage of bringing AUM into many homes, and the disadvantage of "gutting" the list of potential subscribers. Many of those people most likely to subscribe already receive a copy through their local church's allocation list. Thus, tremendous increases in subscription income are unrealistic. Any increases obtained offset the cost of that subscription and do not impact the basic funding needed to provide the allocated copies.

Considerable attention was given to improving the efficiency of the operation to promote better stewardship of AUM funds. The new editor should be encouraged to continue her investigation of expenditures in an effort to provide the best possible stewardship of funds. The proposal by the AUM Executive Committee to purchase a desk-top publishing system was strongly endorsed by the Study Committee and should be implemented as soon as possible, saving up to \$14,000 each year in typesetting costs and freeing the print shop staff and equipment for other important tasks. The addition last fall of an advertising sales person working on a commission is another step in the right direction.

Extensive consideration was also given to other methods of structuring the newspaper, including options such as an in-house printed newsletter or a combination with the *United Methodist Reporter*(Review (UMR). Representatives of UMR met with the Study Committee and provided cost figures for various options. Added to the basic costs of providing an office and staff (salary and benefits, rent, equipment, travel, etc.), the cost of the bi-weekly Review was comparable to costs of independent operation. Attractive options such as separate conference editions and additional area/conference pages increased the cost far above the present apportionment.

Concerns were expressed about the readability of a newsletter format and the substantial decrease in space available. Costs would remain high unless the editor's job was a portion of an existing

conference/area staff position, which would cut ability to cover news substantially.

In reviewing the survey of pastors and lay leaders done in 1982 before the creation of the present paper, the Study Committee noted a strong message from respondents who wanted an "Arkansas paper." Respondents valued general church news but placed an emphasis on news of the church within the state, including the area, conferences, districts and local churches.

The Arkansas United Methodist can best fulfill its mission through continued operation as an independent newspaper, with some modifications to the present operation. The Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conferences would maintain complete control over the newspaper's objectives, content and format, directing the staff to tailor the newspaper to respond to needs expressed by its readers and conference leadership. General church news which is essential for leaders to stay informed can be presented, but an emphasis can be placed on the impact of this news on Arkansas conferences and local churches.

Local control can also enable the staff to investigate any new opportunities to improve the newspaper's ability to reach local church leaders with the information and interpretation they need. Creative approaches can be explored continually, such as the creation of a Council on Ministries page for each conference once a month or the possibility of publishing separate conference editions.

Maintaining the present system will also allow the United Methodist Church of Arkansas to remain supportive of the state's economy by spending funds to produce the paper locally.

Focusing on local church leaders as the target audience would allow the newspaper to decrease the number of pages for most issues from 12 to eight, cutting printing costs which is one of the most expensive line items in the budget.

This change would also decrease the amount of staff time needed to produce a high quality newspaper, saving on the cost of salaries. A quality 12-page newspaper needs two full-time staff members which the present budget has not allowed for the past year. An eight-page newspaper could be produced by the present full-time editor and part-time administrative assistant, thus continuing the savings of the difference between the salary of a full-time and a part-time assistant.

Narrowing the focus of the content and improving the efficiency of the operation will allow Arkansas United Methodists to reduce the cost of the newspaper, yet maintain an essential communication tool of our connectional church.

The attached 1989 Proposed Budget reflects the following recommendations made by the Study Committee and endorsed by the Area Communications Executive Committee.

ARKANSAS UNITED METHODIST POLICY STATEMENT

The Arkansas United Methodist is a semi-monthly publication designed to inform, support and motivate members of the United Methodist Churches of Arkansas,

The primary focus of the Arkansas United Methodist will be to help local church leaders to carry out the mission of the Church.

Primary goals of the Arkansas United Methodist shall be:

- —to report news of religiously significant events, ministries and ideas in the Arkansas Area,
- —to interpret the mission of and encourage participation in general church, area and annual conference programs and missional priorities,
- —to inspire local church leaders by acquainting them with significant involvements of others in Christian mission.

The Arkansas United Methodist will also serve:

- -to provide for discussion of issues in the light of gospel concerns,
- —to personalize the connectional system through news of the involvement of individuals in the life of the church at all levels,
- —to report significant regional, national and world religious matters, including denominations and faiths other than United Methodist,
 - -to preserve matters of enduring significance,
 - —to support the social principles and doctrines of the United Methodist Church,
- —to report those local church programs of interest to the general readership as a sharing of new ministries,
- —to record births, marriages and deaths of clergy, diaconal ministers, church professionals and conference lay leadership.

Within these guidelines, the content of the Arkansas United Methodist shall be the responsibility of the editor who is accountable to the Area Director of Communications and the Area Communications Committee.

SUMMARY OF RECOMMENDATIONS

- A. The Arkansas United Methodist should continue operation as an independent newspaper.
- B. The focus of the newspaper should be narrowed to target local church leadership.
- C. The Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conferences should provide the basic funding for distribution of the Arkansas United Methodist to local church leaders. Efforts will continue to increase individual paid subscription and advertising income, but generated income will not be expected to significantly impact the basic funding for local leadership.
 - D. Costs should be reduced whenever possible, and particularly in the following ways:
 - 1. purchase a desk-top publishing system, and
 - 2. decrease number of pages per issue from 12 to 8.

AREA OFFICE OF COOPERATIVE PARISH MINISTRIES AND NEW CHURCH DEVELOPMENT

For the past eight years and eight months the Office of Cooperative Parish Ministries, and the current successor office, has functioned to assist the churches of the Arkansas Area to be in ministry. The promotion of Cooperative Parish Ministries as a style of ministry became central to the effort. In this way the connectional system of our great church can be enhanced and greater mission and ministry becomes the result.

At this time there are 28 parishes in the three stages of evolvement — exploratory, probe, organized — though some of them have undergone restructure and re-alignment due to district and pastoral changes over the years. Arkansas is still looked to by other areas as one of the leaders in the C.P.M. development.

New Church development has been significant in 1987-1988. In the Little Rock Conference new churches have been started in Joplin (Joplin United Methodist Church) and in Hot Springs Village (Christ of the Hills United Methodist Church). The Winfield United Methodist Church is in the process of relocating in west Little Rock at the intersection of Highways 10 and 300, and a new mission work and congregation is to be initiated at 16th and Louisiana. At the time of this report (March) there are approximately 85 new United Methodists due to this work, and nearly 130 members in the new churches.

In the North Arkansas Conference there are now three new United Methodist congregations: St. Andrews UMC, Fort Smith; First UMC, Maumelle; Hanmaum Korean UMC, Springdale. These churches now have 47, 190, 70 members respectively. (The Maumelle congregation was averaging 35 in June, 1987 and following becoming a United Methodist church in September, is now averaging 260.) These new churches are still the ones receiving the highest percentage of unchurched persons. Plans are also underway to begin another Korean congregation in Jacksonville in June 1988, and to appoint a pastor to pioneer a second church in the city of Sherwood.

Since this is the final report of this Office, there are no goals, objectives and courses of action for 1988-1989.

BOARD OF DIACONAL MINISTRY - 1988

Diaconal Ministers are lay persons called by God to specialized ministries of service, justice, and love within local congregations and in the wider world. Diaconal Ministers are educated in the Biblical and theological precepts of the Christian faith and in the historical and doctrinal traditions of the United Methodist Church. Diaconal Ministers are professional lay persons trained to focus their service through a variety of ministries such as community development, social services, health ministries, missions, peace-making, education, counseling, evangelism, administration, and music. They function as assistants in worship, partners in governance, leaders in mission, ministers of pastoral care and teaching, and agents of Christian unity. The diaconal ministry involves interpreting to the church the needs, concerns and hopes of the world; serving and nurturing persons within the household of faith; responding to the needs of the corporate body; thus enabling the church to be in ministry in the world. Diaconal Ministers are consecrated by the church and appointed by the Bishop to serve time-honored functions and offer flexibility for expressing ministry in new ways responsive to contemporary needs.

When a person hears and heeds the call to serve as a Diaconal Minister his/her first formal step is to qualify as a candidate for Diaconal Ministry. During this time of searching and defining of their call, the Board of Diaconal Ministry teams them with a Mentor. The Mentor is a guide and resource person who has been selected and trained because of personal experience and sensitivity to the importance of this time of exploration. Working together, the prospective candidate and the Mentor are able to clarify his/her calling and how to proceed into his/her Christian Vocation. During his/her candidacy the conference office of Pastoral Care and Counseling also provides psychological testing which aids the candidate and the Board in the many decisions involved in becoming a professional minister in the United Methodist Church.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

The North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions is charged with the work of providing for and contributing to the support, relief, assistance and pensioning of the ministers and their families of The United Methodist Church. The board works closely with the General Board of Pensions of The United Methodist Church which has provided excellent counsel, interpretation and guidance in our pension program.

All eligible clergy must be enrolled in the pension program. Enrollment is the responsibility of the participants. Enrollment blanks may be obtained from Mrs. Faye Douglas Watson, Administrative Secretary, P.O. Box 119, Marion, AR 72364. Enrollment will be dated from the first day of the quarter in which the participant enrolls.

The Board of Pensions recommends that:

1. The 1989 annuity rate for service completed prior to 1982 be \$223.

- 2. The North Arkansas Conference continue participation in the Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) and the Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) of the General Board of Pensions of The United Methodist Church as follows:
 - That the contribution rate for Ministerial Pension Plan be 10% of the plan compensation of the participant up to the Denominational Average Compensation (DAC). Plan compensation includes salary plus housing.

That each minister contribute 3% of his/her Plan Compensation up to the DAC to

his/her personal account with the General Board of Pensions.

- That the contribution to Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) be 4.4% of which 1% c. shall be contributed by the participating minister. d.
- That both current service and past service be paid by apportionment to the churches of the conference.
- That our unfunded obligation be amortized over a forty (40) year period beginning e. January 1, 1982.

That the Death Benefit Program (DBP+) be continued for active clergy. f.

That we include any ministers in the Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) who are eligible for the Special Arrangement feature. h.

That the surviving spouse continue to receive benefits at 70% of the Formula Benefit rate for pre-1982 service.

that the board be authorized to oversee completion of the Bicentennial Pension Fund Campaign.

3. In order to provide adequately for this program plus the group insurance for retired ministers and families, the churches shall pay an apportioned amount totaling \$1,384,373.

Policy Regarding Non-payment of Pension Apportionment. Regrettably, the conference can no longer afford to be generous regarding delinquent pension payments. Therefore, in accordance with Para. 736.4, 1984 Book of Discipline, which provides for a lien upon the pension of

a pastor serving a church which has defaulted upon pension apportionments, the conference Board of Pensions must use the following procedure:

a. When a church defaults on the pension apportionment, the pastor, local church treasurer, and district superintendent shall be notified and informed regarding disciplinary

provisions and board policy;

b. The names of churches and pastors of record which default on pension apportionments shall be published in the conference journal in the year following said default, providing that payment in full has not been made nor a satisfactory explanation given to the conference board in the interim;

c. Defaulting churches will have one year in which to pay the balance of the pensions apportionment in full before the General Board of Pensions shall be notified and the provisions of Para. 736.4 implemented, providing that said churches and pastors have been given opportunity for a hearing before the conference Board of Pensions for the purpose of explaining the default.

5. Allowance grants, retirement love offerings and local expenses of the Board of Pensions is paid by the Treasurer of the Conference Board of Pensions, subject to the approval of the

Conference Board of Pensions and the 1984 Book of Discipline.

6. The institution, board or organization paying the salary of a minister on special appointment without annuity claim on the conference shall make provision for the pension of such person. Attention is called to Para. 1606.3a(3), 1984 Book of Discipline, regarding eligibility to participate in Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) and Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP).

7. There shall be apportioned to each agency and institution served by a ministerial member under special appointment with annuity claim on the conference an amount equal to 13.4% of the Denominational Average Compensation (DAC).

8. Listing of special appointments.

a. WITH ANNUITY CLAIM upon the conference subject to 1984 Book of Discipline, Para. 1606.3a(3):

B. All legal documents executed at direction or with approval of Annual Conference. Trustees "amenable" to Annual Conference. Paragraph 2512, Part 2., 1984 Discipline.

C. Trustees authorized to take immediate action by Conference Telephone Call. Paragraph 2546, Part 4, 1984 Discipline. Such action subject to approval of next Annual Conference.

III. Abandoned and/or Discontinued Church Property

A. Actions:

1. Fort Smith District Trustees are in negotiation with trustees of the West Mount Zion Cemetery Association to sell the property of the West Mount Zion United Methodist Church to the Cemetery Association for the sum of \$200.00. Such a sale would reserve all mineral rights for the North Arkansas Conference of The United Methodist Church and would carry protective conditions so that the property could not be used by any other denomination or church. If the conditions of the sale were violated, the property would revert to the Annual Conference. Property-approximately 1 acre. Proceeds from sale would go to Fort Smith District Mission Fund.

Mineral rights would be reserved for the Annual Conference and protective conditions with a reversion clause would apply to the use of the building. Proceeds of the sale would go to Fort Smith District Mission Fund. Approved 6/6/88.

4. New Blaine United Methodist Church, Logan County, Fort Smith District. Declared abandoned and for sale by Conference Trustees at District Superintendent's request. Conference Call,

5. Owens Chapel United Methodist Church, Greene County, Paragould District. Trustees voted to accept offer of \$1,000 by J.B. Harris for this property. See 1987 Journal, P. 153 for action and description. This sale has been completed.

to accept offer of \$1,500 for this lot. See 1987 Journal, Page 153.

7. The Arkansas Historic Preservation Program has notified the Trustees that the following United Methodist Church properties have been included in the National Register of Historic Places as a part of the Benton County (Fayetteville District) Multiple Resource Area.

b. Council Grove Methodist Church, vicinity of Osage Mills

c. New Home School-Church, Bella Vista

8. Harvey's Chapel, Greene County (?), Paragould District to be considered for future action of Trustees.

9. Upon recommendation from the District Board of Church Locations and Buildings,

approved by the Cabinet of The North Arkansas Conference;

We hereby declare the Round Pond United Methodist Church in St. Francis County abandoned and for sale. All mineral rights shall be reserved to the Annual Conference. Proceeds of this sale, less costs if any, shall be returned to the Forrest City District Mission Fund. Approved 6/6/88

10. Upon recommendation from the District Board of Church Locations and Buildings,

approved by the Cabinet of The North Arkansas Conference;

We hereby declare the Mellwood United Methodist Church in Phillips County abandoned and for sale. All mineral rights shall be reserved to the Annual Conference. Proceeds of this sale shall be used first to satisfy a \$1,200.00 lien to the Board of Global Ministries. Any excess over the amount of the lien shall be returned to the Elaine United Methodist Church for expansion or improvement. The Mellwood members are now worshipping with the Elaine UMC.

11. The Gar Creek United Methodist Church in Franklin County voted in a Charge

Conference held March 20, 1988, to discontinue services as of May 31, 1988.

Upon request of the District Superintendent, we hereby declare the Gar Creek United Methodist Church to be abandoned.

Further action on this property shall be postponed until after the next regular meeting

of the Conference Trustees on September 10, 1988. Approved 6/6/88

12. The Arbor Grove (Freewill Baptist) Church was deeded in 1904 jointly to the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, the Presbyterian Church of the United States, and the Free Will (Baptist) Church. The Church has been jointly and alternately used by all three denominations. Methodist and Presbyterian Churches used it from 1904 to 1915, and the (Freewill) Baptists have used it from 1904 to the present. Continual services have been held in the church from 1904 to the present, so a three-year cessation of services with a reversion clause has never been effective.

The Arbor Grove Freewill Baptist Church wishes to secure a loan to build a new building on the site, and they request a quitclaim deed to the property (209' by 209') which is located

in Lawrence County, near Hoxie, Arkansas

C. Board of Trustees will require two appraisals on all property before sale.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES UNITED METHODIST CENTER

The Articles of Incorporation have been amended and filed with the Secretary of State and the Circuit Clerk of Pulaski County. The changes are as follows: 1) name of corporation is changed to THE UNITED METHODIST CENTER. 2) name and address of the resident agent is Ann Onstott. 3) Directors are F. Gladwin Connell, Georgia Sells, Jean Major, Eugene Brand, Doris Fish and James B. Gannaway.

We are negotiating with the Women's Division of the General Board of Global Ministries regarding the possibility of locating our area offices on Aldersgate property. The time schedule does not permit completion of this process prior to the 1988 Annual Conference. However, we hope to be

able to make specific recommendations to the 1989 conference.

We express our thanks to the members of the United Methodist Study Committee and request that they remain as a subcommittee of the Trustees until the negotiations with the Women's Division are complete.

UNITED METHODIST CHILDREN'S HOME, INC.

Institutional care for children/youth is a challenging, fast changing field of service. Regulations are ever-changing and highly sophisticated. The nature and severity of the problems confronting our youth continue to deepen at an astounding pace. This is not a cry for sympathy but a reminder of the importance of the church's mission to these youth whose very lives, in some instances, rest completely on the possibility of this Home being able to fulfill its mission.

In 1987 UMCH served 122 (89 girls and 33 boys) ranging in age from six to eighteen for a total

of 18,817 child care days.

The Home has a rich heritage in service to children and youth. I found so many good things in place upon my arrival. In the past year we have worked in some areas to update and in other areas we have sought new directions. We have redefined and tailored a Chapel service for our youth and staff; brought into our program Mr. Len Bobo to be in charge of an integrated program of Christian Education/Music; linked a new concept called Independent Living with our existing Transitional Living Program in an effort to better equip our youth to stand on their own as they reach the majority age; instituted a program called "First Resort" which is staffed by well qualified persons in an effort to do preventive ministry to avoid the break-up of family units; brought in on a retainer/part-time basis a local psychologist (Ph.D.) to help us chart some directions as a child care ministry; provided some training events for members of our Board of Trustees; established a fund which enables us to offer the option of advanced education in the direction of Vo-Tech; had an openair picnic involving the residents, staff and Trustees; had a volunteer work-day where some 35/40 lay persons spent the day working at the main campus; a local church UMW group made all new banners for our Chapel; offered a project for anyone desiring to participate to "Send a Kid to Camp" in our summer church camps; and a host of other things that time and space defies writing.

The Board also elected to hire a professional (Don Manes) to do a survey on behalf of the Home in an effort to establish: 1) who we are; 2) where we are; and 3) where we might need to go in the future. At the time of this writing, the results of this study are not in, but I am excited about what this study will offer us in the way of directions for our present and future. We are indebted to the United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas and Jim Argue, Jr., for making it possible for us to have this study done. I hope by Conference time to be able to share with you the results of this study.

We have been working on reorganization and economy measures in an effort to streamline both organization and programming without down grading the quality of service. This is not completed but we have been able to make some reductions and to move from the 1986-87 budget into the 1987-88 budget with no increases in the bottom line. We are still committed to further economy measures

once we can identify and achieve them without sacrificing quality.

Financially, we share the economic crunch felt by others. Our Endowment Trust is producing far less income because of low interest rates. Inherited oil interests that once produced large sums of money are now producing very little. Our annual Christmas offering from the churches of Arkansas was the second largest ever, but it still reflected an 11\$ loss form the 1986 offering. The redeeming element of our financial year (1987) was wills and bequests. I understand this is a traditional fact across the years.

Whatever the case, I want the United Methodists of Arkansas to know how grateful we are for the generous support you continue to direct toward this ministry. Your gifts continue to offer a ray of hope every day for a group of youth whose present and future life is brighter because, in the name of Christ, you have given.

I thank God and the United Methodists of Arkansas for the privilege of serving in ministry here at the Home. I also commit to God (and you) my intention to serve where we are, and also to seek out avenues that might enable us to serve better in areas as yet uncharted.

THE COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES

I. MINIMUM SALARY SCHEDULE

The Commission on Equitable Salaries recommends that the 1989 Minimum Salary Schedule and Guidelines for persons in full-time ministry be established as follows:

A. Minimum Salary Schedule

The 1989 MINIMUM SALARY for a Full-Time Local Pastor is approximately equal to
the Base Plan Compensation for the Board of Pensions Comprehensive Protection Plan
(CPP) coverage for all persons in full-time ministry. The additional increments of \$1,000
and \$2,000 are designed to recognize the levels of experience, ordination and conference
relationship.

 The CHARGE is required to provide at least 60% of the Minimum Salary as a BASE SALARY for the category in which its minister falls. When no parsonage is provided, the charge must provide a Housing Allowance equal to 20% of the Minimum Salary for its pastor IN ADDITION TO THE BASE SALARY ALREADY STATED.

3. The Commission on Equitable Salaries will provide Salary Aid up to 40% of the Minimum Salary for pastors in the various categories. Our first priority is to bring all pastors up the the Minimum Salary, and then, AS FUNDS ALLOW, to give aid up to the Maximum Total Compensation level.

4. The CHARGE is required to provide adequate TRAVEL AND UTILITIES ALLOWANCES as routine obligations of having a full-time pastor. After a CHARGE has met the BASE SALARY requirement, it may then allocate an additional amount on the salary package UP TO \$4,500 AS TRAVEL AND UTILITIES ALLOWANCES.

No pastor on Minimum Salary Aid may earn more than the MAXIMUM TOTAL COMPENSATION amount for the category in which he/she falls.

Requirements for Qualification В.

The CHARGE must meet the required BASE SALARY (including HOUSING ALLOWANCE, when applicable) before qualifying for Minimum Salary Aid. If there is a great disparity between the Minimum Salary Guidelines and the CHARGE'S ability to provide for them, it is suggested that the Cabinet either realign the charge so as to strengthen its financial state, or consider it a part-time charge.

The CHARGE shall pay at least 60% of its APPORTIONMENTS for Pension and 2. Benefit Fund, Episcopal Fund, District Superintendent's Fund, and the Equitable Salaries

Fund, as per paragraph 925, 1984 Book of Discipline).

APPLICATIONS for Salary Aid must be submitted on the appropriate form, filled out 3. completely, and sent to the chairperson of the Commission not later than December 20, 1988. The Commission will meet in late January, 1989 to review the applications... Applications for June 1989 should be submitted by May 15, 1989.

The CHARGE shall submit a copy of its approved BUDGET for 1989. 4.

We refer applicants to paragraph 436, 1984 Book of Discipline, for the definition of 5. "Full-Time Ministry."

The CHARGE shall submit a copy of its STEWARDSHIP CULTIVATION PLAN for 6.

ASSOCIATE PASTORS (not to be confused with Associate Members of the Conference) 7. are not eligible for Minimum Salary Aid.

RETIRED PASTORS are not eligible for Minimum Salary Aid, as per paragraph 453.6,

1984 Book of Discipline.

1989 budget reflects a straight 5% increase over present load.

II. E.M.L.C. SALARY SUPPORT

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

#1: The C.O.R.R. wishes to express to the C.C.O.M., the North Arkansas Conference and the larger church our concern regarding the K.K.K. therefore the North Arkansas Conference Commission on Religion and Race feels the need to make a statement regarding recent meetings/rallies by American extremist/terrorist groups. In western and north-western Arkansas, such groups as K.K.K., C.S.A., and other white supremacist organizations have once again released the ugliness that has always existed. Like the demon that is a part of, and sometimes too large a part of, us all, it seems to find and take comfort in groups such as these. Though unlike long ago and far away times, our society is now sweltering with the heat of arrogance and defiance from many and varying spirits of evil. We are rapidly approaching a time when the straw is becoming too much for the camel to carry. We, the church, must not remain silent in the face of such goings-on. Therefore we, along with other agencies, committees, and commissions encourage all Christians and other religious organizations to stand firm on the principles of Jesus Christ and/or the beliefs of their respective doctrinal creed of human edifying beliefs.

#2: We recommend an Area Convocation on Racism be planned, and that the date in 1989 be worked out cooperatively with the chair of the Little Rock Conference Commission on Religion and

Race.

#3: We wish to extend a word of greeting and welcome to the new Korean United Methodist Church in Springdale.

#4: Because of our deep respect and admiration for the work done in the name of Christ by our sisters and brothers, the Community Developers, and

Because of our understanding that their work offers hope and support to those for whom Jesus Christ repeatedly expressed concern and love, and

Because we see in today's world an ever-increasing need for the very ministries being carried out

the the Community Developers.

the members of the North Arkansas Conference Commission on Religion and Race urge the General Conference of the United Methodist Church to preserve the funding for Community Developers as stated in Section IX, Paragraph 272, 1, a) Community Developers Program: 60% (administered by the National Division, General Board of Global Ministries). (p. 169 in 1984 Discipline)

#5: In order to help the church we:

a. Sponsor and carry out an Area Convocation on Racism.

b. Offer a Speakers Bureau supplying speakers for interchanges between the ethnic minority congregations and the majority congregations.

c. Encourage black members of boards and agencies to be present for the meetings and work of

those groups.

#6: We wish to report that the Arkansas Land Development Association has received a grant of \$5,000 from the General Commission on Religion and Race to bring together resource people, black family farmers, lending agencies, etc. to help black family farms meet the problems experienced in east Arkansas at present. Included in the plans is the restoration of the Fargo Training Center, a prominent area education center in past years.

The Commission on Religion and Race

COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS

The North Arkansas Conference Committee on Nominations is primarily responsible for nominating persons to serve on conference agencies each quadrennium as specified by the Conference Structure and the Book of Discipline. In January of 1988 each local church pastor was sent a worksheet on which the conference agencies with vacancies for 1989-1992 were listed. The pastors were asked to work with their committee(s) on Nominations and Personnel to fill out the worksheets

and then to submit them to the District Superintendent. In the event that the local church would be involved in changing districts in 1989, pastors were asked to send extra worksheet copies to the new districts. The District Superintendents were asked to meet with their District Committee on Nominations to fill out a district worksheet which would utilize the local church nominations and district nominations. The local church worksheets and the district worksheets were forwarded to the Conference Committee on Nominations.

At the present time, the Conference Committee on Nominations is meeting to fill each position on a conference agency. As directed by the changing structure from this past Annual Conference, the committee is focused upon the following priorities: 1) when possible to give priority to district nominations; 2) to follow the 1/3 laywomen, 1/3 laymen, 1/3 clergy formula where specified and all other agencies when possible; 3) to be intentional in inclusiveness of ethnic minority membership and all agencies; and 4) to be aware and sensitive to the nominations of youth, local church pastors, and small membership churches. The nominees submitted for consideration (from local church, district and conference nominations) but not nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations will become the pool of names for task forces and interim vacancies during the quadrennium 1989-1992.

The structure specifies the following procedure: The nominations from the Conference Committee on Nominations will be presented and any other nominations from the floor may be received at this time. A ballot will be prepared and voting will take place the following day. Members of the annual conference are urged to familiarize themselves with the 1987 Journal structure document and standing rules found on pages 184-206.

COUNCIL ON LAY LIFE AND WORK

ALL OF GOD'S PEOPLE IN ALL PLACES - AND AT ALL TIMES ARE CALLED TO MINISTER. The sooner the Laity seriously recognize that they have been called by God, just as the Clergy have been called, then God's Kingdom can come on Earth. What are you doing to recognize this calling? How have you as Lay or Clergy tried to help others to know they are being called by God.

As we recognize our calling by God, the meaning of Membership in The United Methodist Church comes alive. The Discipline speaks to the meaning of membership in Para. 213 and Para. 214.

Para. 213. Faithful participation in the corporate life of the congregation is an obligation of the Christian to fellow members of the Body of Christ. A member is bound in sacred covenant to shoulder the burdens, share the risks, and celebrate the joys of fellow members. A Christian is called to speak the truth in love, always ready to confront conflict in the spirit of forgiveness and reconciliation.

Para. 214. A member of The United Methodist Church is to be a servant of Christ on mission in the local and worldwide community. This servanthood is performed in family life, daily work, recreation and social activities, responsible citizenship, the stewardship of property and accumulated resources, the issues of corporate life, and all attitudes toward other persons. Participation in disciplined groups is an expected part of personal mission involvement. Each member is called upon to be a witness for Christ in the world, a light and leaven in society, and a reconciler in a culture of conflict. Each member is to identify with the agony and suffering of the world and to radiate and exemplify the Christ of hope. The standards of attitude and conduct set forth in the Social Principles (Part III) shall be considered as an essential resource for guiding each member of the Church in being a servant of Christ on Mission.

I commend to every church in the North Arkansas Conference that a special Sunday be designated

whose theme is "Called to Minister - Taking Membership Seriously." The use of Para. 213 and Para. 214 could be the foundation for this service.

GROUP INSURANCE REPORT #1: PROGRAM

- American Continental Insurance Company is recommended to be engaged as the Third Party Administrator (TPA) of our health benefits program.
- 2. All members and full time local pastors of the North Arkansas Conference under appointment (except students serving in or those employed by other Conferences or agencies which have compulsory programs, members under special appointment outside the Conference, or retired chaplains serving in the Conference), and every full time employee of the Conference, shall participate in the Health Benefits Program of the North Arkansas Conference.
- 2A. The Health Benefits Program will be open for Probationers, Local Pastors, Student Local Pastors, Diaconal Ministers, and those appointed to attend seminary. This is optional for the eligible participant and the participant must make the necessary arrangements and be responsible for the total premium.
- 2B. No evidence of insurability will be required if a participant enrolls self and dependents within 90 days after the eligibility date.
- 2C. Local churches may enroll lay employees between June 1 and July 15 by following the guidelines found in the 1969 Journal, p. 104, par. 1b; and of the 1978 Journal p. 128, par. 6b.
- 2D. The Insurance Treasurer will check with the District Superintendent concerned in the case of a pastor applying for enrollment for the first time. The eligibility of any full time lay employee of a church will be checked with the pastor concerned. In either case, the first premium payment must accompany the application for enrollment before the application can be processed.
- 3. The Charge (church) pays at least 80% of the premium, and the participant pays not more than 20%.

- 3A. 1% is added to the premiums to cover administrative costs of the committee.
- 3B. All participants of the program age 65 and older are to be enrolled in Medicare. The North Arkansas Board of Pensions pays Health Benefits Program premiums for all retired persons drawing an annuity from the General Board of Pensions; all surviving spouses and children, as well as those persons on Disability Leave, except those who are not in the program at the time of retirement. Persons retiring prior to the 1988 session of the Annual Conference get 100% payment of premium, persons retiring in 1988 and subsequent years will have their insurance premium benefit payed on a formula of 2.5% of the actual premium times (x) the number of years of service rendered to the North Arkansas Conference; the retiree will be responsible to pay the remainder of the premium.
- 4. The Health Benefit Program premiums are due quarterly on the date shown on the statement sent from the Treasurer. All participants are responsible for seeing that the total premium due is sent to: Mrs. Faye Watson, P.O. Box 119, Marion, AR 72364, no later than the date due.
- 5. The Committee shall use the measures listed on p. 149, par. 5 of the 1984 Journal when premiums are not received on time.
- 6. The Cost Containment Program as implemented is being continued. Features are:
 - a. Pre-admission certification (\$100 additional deductible is applied for failure to pre-certify a hospitalization)
 - b. Concurrent tracking
 - c. Ambulatory surgery
 - d. Bill auditing
- 7. Participants in the Health Benefits Program whose appointment/employment is terminated will be granted an extension of coverage of up to three months, provided that: (1) The participant makes a written request to the Insurance Committee; and (2) The Participant is responsible for payment of the total premium. Any extension beyond this three month period requires approval by the Insurance Committee.
- 8. The premium rates for 1989 will be determined based on the claims experience of the group through the year. In order to achieve the most accurate and favorable rate, the experience will be tracked through September. The Committee will meet and establish the premiums, under the guidance of the TPA, and notify participants in October of the new year's rate.

REPORT #2: ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS

RESPONSE TO RESOLUTION #5 ADOPTED BY THE 152 SESSION NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

REPORT CONCERNING ALTERNATE HOUSING FOR ELDERLY PERSONS

The Health and Welfare Ministries Committee of the Methodist Health Systems Board recommends to the North Arkansas Conference and to the Little Rock Conference that the Conferences establish housing ministries for the elderly for the Arkansas Episcopal Area.

The Health and Welfare Ministries Committee further recommends that the Bishop of the Arkansas Episcopal Area appoint a task force, not to exceed 15 people, and representative of each Annual Conference and Methodist Health Systems, to develop the structure of the proposed housing ministry. The task force is to report back with recommendations for implementation to the 1989 sessions of the Annual Conference.

The Health and Welfare Ministries Committee requests that \$900 be appropriated for meeting expenses of the task force. The Committee recommends that the North Arkansas Conference requests \$300 from the Conference Council on Ministries. The Committee recommends that the Little Rock Conference requests \$300 from the Conference Council on Ministries. The Committee recommends that the Health and Welfare Ministries Committee requests \$300 from Methodist Health Systems.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR OUTDOOR MINISTRIES

Whereas participation by the people of God in outdoor ministry is of utmost importance, and
whereas the level of participation, and the number of camps offered, in our conference's outdoor
ministry program has decreased over the past decade, and

whereas this is in part due to the attractiveness, in facilities and program, of other camping opportunities available to families in north Arkansas, and

whereas other conferences in United Methodism have met with great success when they have centralized camping programs and location, and

whereas our current outdoor ministries facilities, with the exception of Nawake Conference Center, do not allow us the opportunity to attractively offer the variety and quality of camping we consider necessary and

whereas greater cost effectiveness will be served by a centralization of program and facilities,

therefore we recommend, in compliance with previous action of the North Arkansas Annual Conference, that the Master Plan for the Nawake Conference Center be implemented in accordance with that plan, and, that the Nawake Conference Center become the main site and focus for Outdoor Ministries in the North Arkansas Conference. (See 1977 Journal of the North Arkansas Annual Conference, pp. 141-142 and p. 48).

2) In order to truly develop and utilize Nawake Conference Center as the primary site for outdoor

ministries, the following time-line and strategy will need to be implemented:

by June 1989 - - ask the Annual Conference to adopt this report.

by January 1989 - - the Kaetzell Mini-lodge shall be completed and operational. b)

by January 1, 1990 - - ask the bishop to appoint clergy or laity as the Nawake Site c) Manager by June 1, 1990, with duties and responsibilities such as those now borne by our district camp managers.

by January 1, 1990 - - the total Outdoor Ministries Program (including Nawake and d) regional campsites) shall be funded at the Annual Conference level through a conference apportionment. It is our assumption that there will be no Annual Conference funding of regional campsites (former district camps) beyond A.D. 2000.

by June 1, 1991 - - have a second mini-lodge completed and operational. Funds for e) construction shall be solicited from local churches, families, individuals, etc. (memorials,

gifts).

by June 1, 1993 - - the Basic Resident Camp II (see map, p. 29 and Appendix V, p. 39), f) as described in Nawake Master Plan, shall be completed so as to accommodate larger

assembly camps.

by June 1, 1995 - - the second of the former district campsites is recommended to be sold g) or otherwise disposed of. (The first district campsite to be sold was Kamp Kaetzell which was sold on April 1, 1987). We recommend that Bear Creek Camp be the second campsite to be sold (buildings and improvements only; the land belongs to the Federal Government).

The remaining two former district campsites are recommended to be sold as follows: h) Wayland Spring Camp by June 1, 1997

Shoal Creek Camp by June 1, 1999

by January 1, 2000 - - the Nawake Master Plan shall have been implemented to the extent i) of the outdoor ministry needs of the North Arkansas Conference.

Further, by this date, there will be a full-time resident manager/director at Nawake Conference Center whose duties shall include supervision of maintenance, scheduling, and programming of on-site and off-site outdoor ministries. The manager/director will be accountable to the Director of the Conference Council on Ministries and the Conference Committee on Outdoor Ministries.

3) Between January 1, 1990, and such time as all district camps shall cease to operate as conference related campsites, the Conference Committee on Outdoor Ministries shall structure the operation of the district campsites according to the Model for Regional Campsites which is attached to these recommendations (see pp. 14-15).

4) We recommend that when a present district campsite is sold, and the proceeds of the sale are given toward the construction of a mini-lodge at Nawake Conference Center, the mini-lodge shall bear the name of that former district camp, and an appropriate recognition of the camping history at that district campsite be provided on the premises of the resulting mini-lodge.

5) We recommend that the Committee on Outdoor Ministries and the North Arkansas Conference

encourage local congregations, families, individuals, and other interested groups to make memorial gifts and other contributions to Nawake Conference Center for the construction of lodges and other facilities as have been outlined in the Nawake Master Plan and in accordance

- with the priorities established by the Conference Committee on Outdoor Ministries.
- 6) With regard to specific programming for various types and settings of outdoor ministries, we recommend that the Conference Committee on Outdoor Ministries follow the four guidelines set forth in the "Theology of Outdoor Ministry" that begins this report. In addition, we recognize that for many persons in the present and the past outdoor ministries experiences have been crucial as 1) a means of personal spiritual formation and religious awareness out of which meaningful decisions were often made concerning life vocation; and 2) a source of pivotal and/or meaningful religious experience which provided rich memories of one's spiritual development in childhood and youth. We do recommend that all future planning for outdoor ministries intentionally incorporate these important considerations.
- 7) We recommend the continuation of annual training events for the leaders of all conference outdoor ministry programs. Furthermore, we recommend that attention be given at each year's training event to the "Theology of Outdoor Ministry" as the foundation document for all that we do.

THE MODEL FOR REGIONAL CAMPSITES

1) Our present campsites located at Shoal Creek, Wayland Springs, and Bear Creek traditionally have been district or bi-district campsites. These camps have increasingly become regional in usage. Therefore, we recommend that the North Arkansas Conference adopt the policy of regarding the present district campsites as "regional conference campsites." Further, we share concerns about present policies and means of funding the operation of these district campsites. We recommend a change in how the operation of the campsites is funded.

The model below addresses these concerns, and seeks to offer an interim solution until such time as Nawake Master Plan has been implemented.

2. THE MODEL FOR THE OPERATION OF THE REGIONAL CAMPSITES

- A. The present District Campsites will become regional campsites serving the entire Annual Conference, but specifically serving the region of the conference in which each is located.
- B. The new Regional Campsites will be structured and operated much like our Wesley Foundations.
 - A regional Board of Advisors for each regional campsite will be elected by the annual
 conference upon nomination by the Conference Committee on Outdoor Ministries to
 monitor the program and make recommendations concerning the facility. The Board of
 Advisors will provide a crucial link between the Conference Committee on Outdoor
 Ministries, the camp and/or district trustees, and the Regional Campsite manager.
 - Funding for the basic operational costs will be apportioned at the annual conference level
 and will become a part of the budget of the Conference Committee on Outdoor
 Ministries.
 - 3. Title, and responsibility for capital improvements to the regional campsites, shall continue to reside in those Boards of Trustees presently holding title to the properties.
 - 4. The regional campsite manager will be a conference appointment.
 - 5. Programming at the Regional Campsites shall be at the direction of the Conference Committee on Outdoor Ministries.
 - The Conference Committee on Outdoor Ministries will provide a job description for the Regional Campsite Managers, allowing for some flexibility as pertains to the unique needs of each campsite.
 - 7. Insurance coverage will be provided at the Annual Conference level to cover all Regional Campsites with liability and property damage insurance.

RECOMMENDATIONS BY THE STRUCTURE COMMITTEE FOR THE PRE-CONFERENCE DIGEST

The Structure Committee recommends that if the 1988 General Conference Action changes
the Discipline 726.3 regarding the election of the chairperson of the CCOM, that the North
Arkansas Conference Structure be amended to allow the Conference Committee on
Nominations to nominate the chairperson and the Annual Conference will elect the

chairperson of the CCOM.

2. Another concern brought before the Committee was a suggestion that there should be a coordinator for young adult ministries, a coordinator for single ministries, a coordinator for adults, and a coordinator for older adults on the CCOM, making two more coordinators than there are now on the CCOM. After discussion of this issue, the Structure Committee recommends that in keeping with the mandate of the 1987 Annual Conference in restructuring, rather than add more coordinators at this time, there should be more delegation by the two existing coordinators. For example, a coordinator can have one person under him or her working with single ministries and another working with adult ministries; the person designated as coordinator should coordinate rather than direct. This could equally apply to adult and older adult ministries. Several committees in the Annual Conference invite specialists in the field to meet with them and serve without vote to enhance the work of the committee, and generally these are given the same travel allowance as members.

3. After discussion of the problem of the Committee on Parish and Community Development, and the Board of Global ministries having overlapping responsibilities, the Structure Committee found that according to the Discipline 730.5, the Committee on Parish and Community Development should be accountable to the Conference Board of Global Ministries unless the Annual Conference assigns it to another agency (which it did not do in 1987). Furthermore, the Discipline requires that the chairperson of the Committee on Parish and Community Development and the chairpersons of its sub-committees shall be members

of the body to which the committee shall be amenable.

4. A concern of Wayne Jarvis was that the Area Hunger Task Force and the Disaster Response Task Force were not under any structure. The 1987 Conference Journal (p. 195) states that the Hunger Task Force is under the Board of Global Ministries. The Structure Committee recommends that this Task Force and the Disaster Response Task Force should have a person from each district nominated by the District Nominating Committee and that the resulting committees elect chairpersons.

 The Structure Committee recommends to the Conference Nominating Committee that one or more members of the present Structure Committee be nominated to serve on the new

Planning and Research Committee.

(See Minutes for action taken by Annual Conference regarding the above recommendations.)

FINAL REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STRUCTURE

Introduction

This will be the final report ("the last will and testament") of the Committee on Structure, a committee of several years standing that will not exist after this session of the Annual Conference. The report consists of three sections — a brief statement of rationale, a sharing of ideas that have accumulated over a span of years, and a valedictory sharing of continuing concerns.

In the nineteenth century, Matthew Arnold described the situation as he saw it in the words, "We stand between two worlds, the one dead and the other powerless to be born." The Second Book of Kings (18:3) recounts that Hezekiah sent word to Isaiah, "This is a day of distress, of rebuke, and of disgrace; children have come to the birth, and there is no strength to bring them forth." Many feel that United Methodism is approaching such distresses, but have a faith that there are still glimmers of hope. Some of the vital signs are still there.

Most commonly, we hear that "O, for a thousand tongues to sing" was John Wesley's favorite of the hymn poems written by his brother, Charles. There is some reason to believe, however, that

John Wesley had a partiality towards the poem called "Wrestling Jacob." Methodism was a wrestling faith, a journey, a going, a struggling. Indeed, this could be a large part of the explanation of the successes Methodism enjoyed in America. Other churches had arrived, but Methodism's metaphor was wrestling. Its structures, its conference system, its system of itineracy, all these and other factors, were devised and implemented to ensure that the church would be able to confront issues and respond to emerging needs. The structures have provided context for ministry, and have always been in process of study and refinement, with both successes and failures along the way.

There is yet another text from the ministry of Isaiah. In verse 20 of the 28th chapter of Isaiah we find the words, "For the bed is too short to stretch oneself on it, and the covering is too narrow to wrap oneself in it." We do not feel we have reached this state in United Methodism, but we sense some danger that we are approaching. We are convinced that Methodism has much to offer, and that it has never been at a more strategic, yet dangerous, juncture than at present. Structure will not save us. It will, however, allow us to function in ministry — the only reason for structure of any sort in our system.

A Sharing of Needs and Concerns

Without apology we offer our <u>last will and testament</u> in the form of sharing some ideas that have accumulated over a period of years. We believe these can strengthen our structures and help in bringing growth in numbers as well as in depth of quality in the North Arkansas of the United Methodist Church in years to come.

I.

We must continue to work toward a structure that will place more emphasis on local churches and the District Councils on Ministries. In a book Future Trends, the author talks about "decentralization." Our structures should be responsive and responsible to the needs of local churches and provide means to see that things happen in these churches. For example, here is a need identified in a local church. We must be able to train someone to meet that need. Here is a local church that wants training in making calls on prospective and inactive members. The structure should provide help in responding to such a call. Boards, committees, and Conference Council on Ministries, the Annual Conference have their major reasons for being in the assisting and enabling of local churches to do their work. With this comes a warning that we not train persons to meet needs that do not, or never did, exist.

There is a crying need to improve lines of communication between the local churches and the agencies and structures of the Conference. When we listen to local churches and develop programs to assist them in ministry, improvement is rapid and sure. For years, Dr. Brumley listened to local churches in the area of Christian Education. Some here know the results of this as he led in programs of leadership training and church growth. Today we need this kind of structure in Evangelism, stewardship, alcohol and drug abuse, understanding children, youth, adults, and so on and on.

We may need to shift some money and power from the CCOM to the DCOM, because the DCOM is closer to the local church. It does not appear unreasonable to allocate sufficient planning and program funds each year to the DCOMs.

Responsive and effective structures demand adequate research and understanding. They also demand time. We need to ask ourselves what can the CCOM do that the DCOM cannot do, and vice versa. But, above all, we must always ask the question as to the difference it will make in the local church.

II.

Closely related to what we have been talking about is the matter of linkage. We need more effective linkages between local leaders and the members of the local churches, the DCOM, the CCOM, the Annual Conference, and the general church. When all of these work in concert and mutual commitment, we find ourselves doing things we never dreamed before. The linkage is there. All we need to do si to capitalize on it. With oil in the wheels, rather than sand in the gears, of our connectional system, we can be constantly re-examining our programs, and we can experiment with new ideas and organizational procedures. The CCOM would not be as far removed from the local church as it appears to many to be at present. This is a viewpoint of many laity who don't even begin to grasp the whole idea of "structure" — but rather persist in their understanding of the church organization as "them" and "us."

More effective ways of listening to the laity in the local church must be found (filling out a questionnaire once a year is just not enough). We must work to improve lines of communication throughout the levels of church structure. Perhaps persons who serve at District and Conference levels should be limited to shorter periods of service, for even the most dedicated can reach the point where they are not really "hearing" new thoughts and ideas. Ministry to hurting, needy, spiritually-hungering persons does not happen in a committee or board planning session — but rather, in the local church and community.

III.

One of the more pressing concerns we have seen is the necessity to work toward a structure that does not get in the way of what we are trying to do because of time lag. Sometimes, from the time an idea is conceived until we are able to implement it, the time lapse is so great that the idea's motivation and energy are gone. We go on vacation or give up. There are, no doubt, times when we need a task force to study something, implement it, and disband itself.

IV.

Our structures must continue to emphasize greater laity involvement, an idea stressed over and over at General Conference. We need structural patterns that can encourage and allow clergy to draw back and give laity more meaningful opportunities for ministry in the church at all levels. There just are some things that lay persons can do better. Every local church has members with a broad range of skills, abilities and experience to draw upon. Careful study should be done to determine the places where clergy serve on Conference boards and agencies and should be limited.

This may disturb some but such is biblical when we read about disturbing the waters. Too much clergy control or too much control by laity, either can be bad. God has never created any minister with sufficient brains, ideas, wisdom, and physical and emotional strength to enable that person to do all that needs to be done in a local church, district or conference.

Structure should aid in church growth. We know that church growth takes place when we build new churches at strategic locations. We never have enough money to build these new churches. With planning, we could start a new church by starting an outreach Sunday School. We may have Sunday School and Church at times other than on Sunday. We could have outreach through the Sunday School.

But we must also bring about re-vitalization of existing churches. Often churches reach plateaus where they just sit in a state of neutral complacency. Could we not have structures that we could utilize to train persons to go into several churches in the conference to try something that would vitalize these stagnant churches? And could the results not be shared across the conference?

Have you ever skipped a flat rock over a body of water? It just goes skipping along, and it may even reach the bank on the other side. But, if it ever slows down, it sinks!

It must be our task to keep up the momentum, to constantly study and attempt to improve our structure. And, whatever we are doing, we must ask at every turn, what impact will this have on the local church.

STATISTICAL REPORT YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1987

Last year it was noted that there was a positive note in a negative report in that the membership decline was lessening each year. After an average decline of 1,545 members per year, from 1975 through 1986, there was an end to the decline in 1987 with a gain of 21 in the membership of the North Arkansas Conference. From a high of 100,523 in the 1975 to a low of 86,623 in 1986, the membership now stands at 86,644.

There is bad news intermingled with this good news. There was a decline in profession of faith of 13%. The average attendance at worship service was down by .89% and attendance at Sunday School which is a strong future indicator was down by 2.1%. Persons receiving Baptism was down by .10%

There are positive signs that need to be noted. There was an increase of .28% in Sunday School enrollment. The constituency rolls increased by 19.6% and preparatory rolls grew by 1.8%. Short term class showed an improvement of 18.6%. This would indicate some promise for future growth.

Another important statistic has to do with the relationship of other denominations. United Methodist churches still have a strong appeal to persons from other denominations. There were 172 more persons received from other denominations than the previous year. This is an increase of 20%. The number of persons leaving to join other denominations declined by 18%. This equals a 38% gain in the differential in one year. The positive and theology of the United Methodist church are not losing their appeal as some suggest, at least not in this conference.

The total money received for all causes in the church increased by 10.4%. This is an improvement over the gains of the previous year. This could signal an upturn in economic conditions or at least adjustments are being made to meet these conditions.

With the increase in Sunday School enrollment, growth in short and long term study groups and larger constituency rolls, there is reason to have hope for growth in the future. It will require a strong commitment on the part of the clergy and laity in the desire for church growth and development.

IV. DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS AND CONFERENCE

COUNCIL DIRECTOR:

A.We recommend the following schedule of support for District Superintendents and the Conference Council Director for 1989.

Salary \$41,800

Utilities \$4,000

Total \$45,800

B. We recommend that a district superintendent, when traveling as a cabinet representative to or as a member of a board, agency, or district other than his own, shall have the room, board, and travel expense paid by that board, agency, or district.

C. We recommend that the district superintendents when traveling on Conference business, other than that provided for in the preceding paragraph, shall have a vouchered expense fund of \$42,000 for room, board and travel expense; their reimbursement for such Conference related travel shall be at the rate of 18 cents per mile.

D. We recommend that the Conference Council Director and Associate Director, when traveling at the request of a board, agency, or district, shall have the room, board and travel expense borne by the board, agency or district. When traveling out of state at the request of a board, council, or agency, they shall have their expense paid for by the board, council or agency.

E.We recommend that the Conference Director and Associate Director, when traveling on conference business, other than that provided for in the preceding paragraph, shall have a vouchered travel pool of \$10,000, and their reimbursement for such Conference travel shall be at the rate of 18 cents per mile.

F. We recommend that the Conference Council Director and Associate Director shall each receive an allowance for housing and appurtenances of \$7,800 per year.

V. OTHER RECOMMENDATIONS: We recommend:

A. Pastor's Moving Expense conditions of eligibility are as follows:

1. The following persons shall be eligible:

Pastors

Lay pastors

Student lay pastors after first appointment

District superintendents

Persons in conference connectional positions

Retiring pastors

Persons on disability leave

Any other person recommended by the Board of Ministry

2. The following amounts shall be paid:

\$300 per pastor plus

\$.75 per mile, measured from parsonage to parsonage.

Persons moving into or out of the conference shall measure the mileage from the conference boundary to the parsonage.

3. Monies shall be paid by the conference treasurer upon presentation of a voucher of mileage

signed by the district superintendent.

- B. The Conference direct the Area Treasurer to withhold dispersal of funds to any agency, institution, or organization until the Council on Finance & Administration has received the most recent audit of a Public Accountant or Certified Public Accountant from the agency, institution or organization and that audit has been found satisfactory by the audit committee of the Council on Finance & Administration.
 - C. A uniform percentage "pad" of three per cent be applied to all 1989 apportionments.
- D. All interest earnings on Conference monies be credited to the Conference Contingency Fund.
- E. The Conference acknowledge the need for maintaining monies to be used as needed for the stabilization of the accounts of Wesley Foundation, Arkansas United Methodist, Church Extension, District Superintendents, Council on Ministries (approximately \$75,000).
- F. Participation by the Conference in area programs must not exceed 50% of the cost of that program, with exceptions approved by the Council on Finance & Administration.
 - G. Reimbursement for travel be on the following schedule:

Motel allowance - \$25 per day Meals allowance - \$5 per meal

Mileage allowance:

1 person - 12 cents per mile

2 persons - 14 cents per mile

3 persons - 16 cents per mile

4 persons - 18 cents per mile

- H. That balances remaining in the Conference Benevolence Fund and the Conference Administration Fund at year end be transferred to the Contingency Fund.
- I. Any capital asset purchase or lease over \$1,500 must be approved by the Council on Finance & Administration prior to purchase or lease, even if that budget has been previously approved.
- J. Permission be granted to the Area Treasurer to borrow funds (on a short-term basis) from the Arkansas Area account if North Arkansas Conference funds are insufficient to meet current needs. Both Council on Conference Finance & Administration presidents must approve the loan before it is transacted.

Interest on such loan will be paid at the current money market rate.

K. The Conference provide fidelity bonding insurance in compliance with Paragraph 2510 of the 1984 Book of Discipline.

VI. ADMINISTRATIVE CONCERNS:

A. All funding requests from institutions shall be presented to the appropriate board or agency of the Conference for recommendation before presentation to the Council on Finance & Administration.

B. All persons authorized to vouch for funds shall be identified by agencies and approved by the Council on Ministries prior to the dispensing of funds.

C. All apportionments shall be received by the Area Treasurer by 2:00 p.m. on Wednesday after the first Sunday in January.

D. Each charge shall declare all ministerial support. The report shall include remuneration for salary, travel, utility expense, insurance, social security, and all additional compensation paid to the pastor or on behalf of the pastor.

E. All benevolent and connectional funds shall be sent to the Office of Finance and Management, P.O. Box 3364, Little Rock, Arkansas 72203, except for the following which shall be sent as

designated:

- 1. Arkansas United Methodist Children's Home Christmas offering and special gifts to the Office of the Superintendent, P.O. Box 4125, Little Rock, Arkansas 72214.
- 2. All insurance premiums be sent according to the instructions from the Committee on Group Insurance.
- F. We recommend that Ann Onstott be elected to the office of Conference Treasurer for the 1988-92 quadrennium or until her successor is chosen.
- G. We express our appreciation to Ann Onstott and her staff, Cheryl Beck, Barbara Skiles, and Mary Lois Stanfield, for the excellent service they perform for the Conference.

THE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN FOR THE ETHNIC MINORITY LOCAL CHURCH (Referred to as "the Plan")

SECTION A

NOTE: The Plan is conceived as a living and growing document rather than a finished and static product. It is assumed, therefore, that one responsibility of the Committee on Ethnic Minority Local Church Concerns will be to revise and update the Plan with the addition of objectives and strategies as new issues emerge.

SECTION A HISTORICAL BACKGROUND AND THE PURPOSE OF THE PLAN

For the past two quadrenniums the United Methodist Church has had among its priorities, or as its single priority, the ethnic minority local church. During 1985-88 it has been stated as "Strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church for Witness and Mission," and been supported by a denominational apportionment of \$6,311,500 annually.

We affirm the conscientious involvement of many in the annual conference in this Missional Priority, and the persistent and patient work of our conference Missional Priority Coordinating Committee. We celebrate a lifting of awareness of issues related to the ethnic church in North Arkansas and the advances and gains that have been made.

During this 1985-88 quadrennium there have been two major assessments of the progress made and the work yet to be done. The first resulted from a Course of Action of the Council on Ministries. On February 20, 1986 the General Commission on Religion and Race resourced a daylong event with the Cabinet and the Council that addressed issues of racism. On January 29, 1987 an Annual Conference Review (1984 Discipline, 2108.3) of the North Arkansas Conference was conducted by a team of persons from staff and representatives of the General Commission on Religion and Race. Both events found much to commend in our past and present efforts, and much to be agendized for the future. The results of these two soncultations are available in the Conference Council office and from the General Commission of Religion and Race.

The purpose of this North Arkansas Conference Ethnic Minority Local Church Comprehensive Plan is to call us to continue to address both issues and opportunities among the ethnic/racial constitutencies of our conference. The intent is to gather up and carry forward what has been begun in and with our ethnic congregations in the past eight years, to give direction to the conference as the current Missional Priority ends on December 31, 1988, and to provide a structure, strategies and funding for the future.

SECTION B OBJECTIVES, STRATEGIES, RESOURCES

I. ELIMINATION OF RACISM: OBJECTIVE - To raise consciousness of, and continue to address root causes of institutional and personal racism among us, so as to more fully model the inclusive nature of the Body of Christ.

STRATEGIES -

I.1. A strategy addressing this objective shall be the implementation of the Charter for Racial Justice Policies.

Other strategies shall be developed to address this objective in such areas as open itineracy, representation on conference and district boards/agencies/institutions, participation in leadership events enabling ethnic persons to serve in fulfilling ways in various groups, awareness and celebration of ethnic dimensions in the history of American Methodism, awareness and celebration of the richness of ethnic contributions to the worship life of the church, monitoring and reporting by the Committee for the Coordination of Ethnic Minority Local Church Concerns as to progress the conference, districts and local churches have made in addressing and eradicating expressions of racism.

II. ANNUAL CONFERENCE STRUCTURE: OBJECTIVE - To identify by June 8, 1988, and have fully operational by January 15, 1989 a conference structure to implement the Plan.

STRATEGY -

There shall be a Committee for the Coordination of Ethnic Minority Local Church Concerns. The Committee shall be composed of a representative from each of the following conference boards and agencies: Church and Society, Discipleship, Global Ministries, Higher Education and Campus Ministry, Finance and Administration (without vote), Lay Life and Work, Equitable Salaries, Parish and Community Development, Religion and Race, United Methodist Women, Commission on Role and Status of Women, ethnic/racial caucuses and the Conference Council on Ministries. These are the principal agencies into which most ethnic minority local church concerns are to be institutionalized. To insure the Committee conforms to the requirements of the 1988 DISCIPLINE, the Committee members and the chairperson shall be nominated by the Executive Committee of the Conference Council on Ministries from persons recommended by the above agencies. The Commission on Religion and Race may name any additional at large members needed to guarantee the required ethnic make-up of the Committee. The Committee and the chairperson shall be elected by the Conference Council on Ministries at its fall meeting beginning with the November 10, 1988 meeting. The CCOM Chair shall be an ex-officio member with vote. The Area Consultant for the Ethnic Minority Church shall be an ex-officio member without vote. A member of the Council on Ministries staff shall be an ex-officio member without vote. The Committee may have up to fifteen (15) members.

The Committee shall be responsible for implementing, monitoring and evaluating the Plan. The Committee shall be amenable to the Council on Ministries, as was the Missional Priority Coordinating Committee in the 1985-88 quadrennium. It shall report to the Council once each year on strategies for implementation of phases of the Plan, and once each year on accomplishments.

III. CONGREGATIONS/PROJECTS/MINISTRIES: OBJECTIVE - To identify and list all the racial/ethnic congregations/projects/outreach ministries within the boundaries of the annual conference, and annually update the list by constituency, location, size, program profile and funding.

(See Section C. Appendix for listings for Section B. III.)

IV. DEMOGRAPHIC DATA: OBJECTIVE - To maintain and periodically update ethnic demographic information for the annual conference.

(See Section C. Appendix for data for Section B. IV.)

V. DESIRED OUTCOMES: OBJECTIVE - To achieve desired outcomes in the ethnic minority local church in such areas as congregational development and redevelopment, leadership recruitment/development/retention and and financial support.

STRATEGIES -

- V.1. It is our intention to fully incorporate the Ethnic Minority Local Church into any and all existing visions, plans and programs for congregational development and redevelopment in the annual conference.
- V.1.a. As possibilities for new church development are studied in the annual conference full consideration shall be given to those population areas where ethnic persons are not represented by a United Methodist Church.
- V.1.b. Every effort shall be made in the 1989-92 quadrennium to establish a black United Methodist Church where there is none.
- V.1.c. We record and celebrate the establishment of the Hanmaum United Methodist Church (Korean) in Springdale, and the placing in June, 1988 of a "pioneering pastor" in Jacksonville for the establishment of a Korean United Methodist congregation.
- V.1.d. As other constituencies emerge we will seek to provide for new United Methodist ministries among them and with them.
- V.1.e. We will seek to fully incorporate these congregations/ministries into the life of the annual conference, undergird them with our support and be in ministry with them.
- V.1.f. As persons of other ethnic backgrounds are identified (i.e. Native American, Hispanic) in our population and demographic data we shall seek to be open and inclusive in the churches and congregations of our annual conference.
- V.1.g. As congregations are identified for redevelopment and revitalization our ethnic minority local churches shall be among those congregations, and shall participate fully in any programming and/or funding available for such redevelopment.
- V.2. In succeeding quadrennia attention shall be given to programmatic and leadership development specifically for the ethnic church. These churches have not been well served nor enabled by program and leadership models designed primarily with the middle-size and majority church in mind. Areas to be planned for are worship, the Sunday School, outreach ministries, stewardship, youth ministries, leadership development of lay and clergy persons, and facilities.
- V.2.a. Beginning in 1989 the North Arkansas Annual Conference shall be one of five (5) participating annual conferences in the General Board of Discipleship "Ethnic Church Resource and Training Project". The encompassing goal of this project is "to define and deliver specific resources and programs to leaders of ethnic congregations within each annual conference. These resources and programs will be focused on the leadership and program needs of the congregation and members. The theme of the program and resources we expect to provide will include:

Leadership training for lay and clergy;

Church growth:

Evangelism ministries;

Worship enrichment;

Christian education;

Cultural resources and materials for education

and evangelism training; and

Stewardship."

The target audiences are identified thus by the General Board of Discipleship: "We will focus on ethnic congregations and those lay and clergy leaders who are responsible for the life and growth of congregations. We will endeavor to respond to each ethnic constituency in each annual conference with specific programs and resources to match the needs identified through a consultation process. Our goal is to consult and work with key ethnic leaders within each annual conference as well as

other conference staff and designated leaders."

- V.2.b. Within the 1989-92 quadrennium a major resource for ethnic church programmatic and leadership development will be the General Board of Discipleship "Ethnic Church Resource and Training Project" referred to in V.2.a. above.
- V.2.c. In the 1988 program of the Conference Council on Ministries fourteen (14) Courses of Action involving the ethnic minority local church were approved. Funding for these amounted to \$32,250, or 35.5% of the \$90,914 program budget of the Conference Council on Ministries.
- V.2.d. The approximately \$7,000 of Missional Priority funds that have been available annually for program support in the ethnic minority church shall be incorporated into the Conference Council on Ministries program budget and designated for ethnic minority local church program development.
- V.2.e. The Conference Council on Youth Ministries shall provide for ethnic youth involvement in its organizational structures, and ethnic youth participation in its program and activities. The CCYM strategy for implementing V.2.e. shall be submitted to the Committee on Ethnic Minority Local Church Concerns by June, 1989. The CCYM shall provide scholarship aid to ethnic youth to enable such participation.
- V.2.f. The annual conference shall continue to provide college scholarships in the amount of \$500 each per year with some of the scholarships reserved for females and some for use at Philander Smith College. The Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry shall be responsible for requesting these funds from the CCOM program budget annually. Other scholarship information for ethnic students shall be available and cultivated by a scholarship task group of the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry. This task group shall also be responsible for administering the scholarship guidelines and funds.
- V.2.g. An ethnic person shall be recruited by the Committee on Education of the conference Board of Discipleship and trained to serve as a Sunday School consultant to the ethnic churches. This person shall be capable of dealing with overall ethnic local church education concerns and age-levels, or as needed, shall recruit other necessary leadership. The schedule of payment for services and expenses of such consultation shall be in keeping with the policies established for training events, and the funding shall be from leadership training funds and ethnic church program funds in the CCOM program budget.
- V.2.h. Lay speaker training and use has been very effective at different times and places in our annual conference. Lay speaker/leader training shall be planned with, by and for the ethnic church. The training shall focus on pulpit supply and other local church leadership needs and roles. Funding shall be provided from the DCOM Leadership Training funds, and funds allocated for lay speaker training in the annual conference. The Council on Lay Life and Work shall be responsible for implementing V.2.h.
- V.2.i. A dimension of leadership training in and for the ethnic minority local church shall be equipping majority and minority persons in the use of the local church leadership training design titled "Black Leaders Make a Difference". A short-term task group of representative ethnic persons shall implement provisions of V.2.i. with the assistance of the Conference Committee on Education and the CCOM staff person responsible for education and leadership concerns.
- V.2.j. To address local church issues of growth, evangelism, outreach, worship and stewardship there shall be planned annually a special ethnic minority local church event to resource, share, train and inspire local church programming in one or more of these areas. Events shall grow out of needs assessment in each of these areas in the ethnic churches, and the events shall be highly specific and practical to local church persons. The events shall be planned in consultation with the annual

conference ethnic/racial caucuses and networks. These events shall become part of the programming of the appropriate conference boards and agencies. These agencies shall be partners in the design and implementation of the events. Funding shall be drawn from the ethnic minority local church program funding in the CCOM budget, and from registrations.

- V.2.k. The conference shall be supportive of the creation and growth of annual conference expressions of the official national church ethnic caucuses.
- V.2.1. Outreach ministries to meet basic human needs shall be established in ethnic communities. Models of such ministry shall be identified.
- V.3. The issue of a climate for ethnic clergy professional growth and advancement shall be addressed in the annual conference. That shall be done by planning a strategy to move the conference step by step to open itineracy. Other recommendations are the use of ethnic persons in majority churches as Pastors in Charge, Associate Pastors, Diaconal Ministers, staff persons for program, seminary interns, summer youth workers, visiting lecturers/preachers, leadership event resource persons.
- V.3.a. The Council on Professional Ministries through its Boards of Diaconal Ministry and Ordained Ministry, in cooperation with the Cabinet, shall be actively involved in recruitment of ethnic persons for these two avenues of career ministry in the church. Once recruited, the annual conference through the Boards named above, and the Cabinet shall maintain close and supportive relationships with these persons looking to place them in local church ministries in the annual conference, and shepherd them in appropriate career growth and fulfillment.
- V.4. Over the last quadrennium the annual conference, districts and other entities and individuals have made significant investments in the ethnic minority local church at the points of pastoral/personnel support and program support. That support for 1988 is as follows.

V.4.a. All funding for ethnic pastor salary support shall be incorporated under the Commission on Equitable Salaries. A record of what is currently being expended, and what is being recommended for

1989 is in the report of the Commission on Equitable Salaries to the 1988 Session of the Annual Conference.

V.4.b. Funding for other leadership recruitment/training and program is incorporated into the program budget of the Conference Council on Ministries. (Section B.V.2.ff.)

V.4.c. The Ethnic Minority Local Church Missional Priority is to be mainstreamed, institutionalized, incorporated into General Board and Agency structures after 1988. Funds appropriated for these Agencies at the general church level will reserve amounts for ethnic concerns support. To enable the ethnic churches and ministries, present and proposed, in our annual conference, to lay claim to these funds, there shall be held periodically a workshop on grant/request writing. The audience for the workshop will be ethnic local church pastors and lay leaders, and district and conference personnel. General church persons and area and conference persons who have had experience in grant/request writing will be recruited to lead such workshops and to aid in the actual writing of grants/requests. Expenses for such workshops shall be borne by expense funds of general agency staff giving leadership, and EMLC program funds in the CCOM program budget.

BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY

The purpose of the Board of Ordained Ministry is to provide support and resources to those men and women whose vocation is lived out in covenant fellowship of the Ordained Ministry of the Annual Conference. The aim of our work, therefore, is to fulfill faithfully our responsibilities to the persons entrusted to our care at every stage of the pilgrimage of their ministry as well as our responsibilities to the Church. This board seeks, through the diversity of its members and its approach to its tasks, to reflect and affirm the pluralism which makes rich the weave of the tapestry which is the tapestry which is United Methodism. We reaffirm our commitment to adhere faithfully to the requirements of the Discipline in all matters related to the Ministry.

I. POLICY AND PROGRAM

- A. The financial resources of the Board will be disbursed in the following ways.
 - 1. For the normal work of the Board and its officers in fulfilling our responsibilities to persons related to the Board in preparation for ministry.

2. For financial assistance to students enrolled in the Master of Divinity program (or its equivalent) in seminaries listed by the University Senate of the United Methodist Church, and to candidates enrolled in basic degree programs for Diaconal Ministries. Interest free loans will be made as follows:

\$600 for students attending United Methodist Seminaries (Full-time)

\$300 for students attending United Methodist Seminaries (Part-time)

\$200 for students attending United Methodist Seminaries (summer)

\$300 for students attending Non-United Methodist Seminaries (Full-time)

\$150 for students attending Non-United Methodist Seminaries (Part-time)

\$100 for students attending Non-United Methodist Seminaries (summer)

Loans will be given for not more than four seminary years. To be eligible for loans, students must have received the Certificate of Candidacy and be attending an approved institution. Students are expected to provide information concerning their standing and circumstances to the Registrar of the board. The Loan Officer for the Board is Gerald Rainwater.

Further that the loans are to be paid back at the rate of:

One service year per year of loan for full-time students.

One-half service year per year of loan for part-time students.

Service in any United Methodist conference is payment.

Service in any other denomination does not count. If persons leave the United Methodist ministry they will repay the loan at a rate of \$600/year.

B. The Course of Study Schools:

- Local Pastors attending the Course of Study Schools at St. Paul School of Theology
 will receive financial aid from the Board based on tuition and room and board
 expenses.
- 2. The Board will no longer be able to pay for books for the Course of Study Schools.

C. The Arkansas Pastor's School:

We will support the Arkansas Area Pastor's School by providing funding which matches the Little Rock Conference up to \$1,500.

D. Supervision of Resident Probationers:

The Board has adopted a process to insure supervision of post-seminary probationary members through assignment of Board of Ordained Ministry members as Supervisors to each individual and joint assignment to a geographic cluster group.

E. Continuing Education:

- 1. The Board has adopted a Guideline for Continuing Education in conjunction with the Board of Diaconal Ministry which establishes an expectation of ten Continuing Education Units during a three-year period. (The Guidelines have been circulated and are available from the Chairperson of Continuing Education, Max Whitfield.)
- 2. Special emphasis will be given to group-study programs such as district or subdistrict groupings. The Board will provide an equal amount to each district from our budgeted amount for Continuing Education.
- 3. We recommend that each local church or charge allow the pastor continuing education leave time for their minister as provided in paragraph 446.2 of the Book of Discipline. This leave time should not be considered a part of the pastors annual vacation.
- 4. Since the Board will no longer fund individual continuing education projects, we further recommend that each local church or charge provide in its budget a Continuing Education Fund. This item should be separate from salary, utilities, and other expense items and should not be counted therein. This fund should be a reimbursed expense to encourage professional and personal growth. We request that each District Superintendent make this an item of inquiry at each Charge Conference.
- F. In consideration of paragraph 414.4 and 423.4 of the 1984 Book of Discipline the board will require psychological evaluations of person seeking membership in the Annual Conference.
- G. Methodist Hospital of Memphis will be doing evaluation and testing.

II. RECOMMENDATIONS

- A. We recommend continued emphasis on the Ministerial Education program and our United Methodist Seminaries. We ask that each local church pay its full apportionment of the Ministerial Education Fund. The portion of this fund, which is retained in the Annual Conference, provides the Board's funds for Continuing Education. Tuition Loans, support of persons attending the Course of Study Schools, and the Arkansas Pastor's School, and Diaconal training.
- B. We recommend that those persons desiring to make inquiry concerning the Ordained Ministry as their vocation secure proper application forms for Candidacy from their District Superintendent or from the Assistant Registrar for Candidacy Lowell Eaton.
- C. We recommend that each pastor become familiar with the Candidacy for Ministry process in order to give proper counsel to members of his/her congregation. Each individual entering the Ordained Ministry must complete the Candidacy program.
- D. We recommend that local churches (and especially Committees of Staff/Parish or Pastor/Parish Relations) become familiar with the Disciplinary provisions which relate to Ordained and Diaconal Ministry. Local churches have an increasing role in the process through which a person enters the Ministry.
- E. We recommend that all pastors be encouraged to attend the Arkansas Area Pastor's School to be held August 24-26.
- F. We recommend that congregations in the North Arkansas Conference be encouraged to participate in the seminary intern program if requested.

We have examined the statement of assets, liabilities and fund balances of the North Arkansas Conference of The United Methodist Church as of December 31, 1987 and 1986, and the related statement of changes in fund balances for the year ended December 31, 1987. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in note 1, the organization's policy is to prepare its financial statements on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements. Consequently, certain receipts and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain disbursements are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred. In addition, expenditures for capital assets are reflected as disbursements and are not shown as assets of the organization. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial position and changes in fund balances in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the aforementioned financial statements present fairly the assets, liabilities and fund balances of the North Arkansas Conference of The United Methodist Church as of December 31, 1987 and 1986, and the changes in its fund balances for the year ended December 31, 1987, on the basis of accounting described in note 1, which has been applied in a manner consistent with that of the preceding year.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting - The financial statements of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church have been prepared on the cash basis. The records are held open for approximately two weeks after year end in order to include the remittances from the churches in the conference for the last few weeks of the year. This policy is consistent with the prior year.

2. Income Taxes

The conference meets the requirements of section 501(c) 3 of the Internal Revenue Code and is therefore exempt from federal income taxes.

3. Cash Investments

All cash investments are recorded at cost plus interest income as received in the account. These balances approximate current market value of the particular investments.

Interest on savings accounts is received quarterly. Interest on Merrill Lynch Ready Asset Trust and Colonial Government Mutual Fund is received monthly. Interest on all other cash investments is not recognized until maturity.

Government agency securities are reported at purchase cost. Due to the pooling nature of these securities, the actual basis of the investment changes daily. At December 31, 1987 and 1986, these investments had unrealized losses of \$6,834 and \$2,690, respectively.

4. Pension Plans

Substantially all conference employees are covered under one of two defined contribution pension plans.

a. Ministerial Employees - All ministerial employees, including the bishop, are covered under a defined contribution pension plan whereby the participant contributes 3% and the church or conference contributes 11% of the participants' annual contribution base (compensation).

b. Lay Personnel - All lay employees are covered under a defined contribution pension plan whereby the participant contributes 3% and conference contributes 6% of the

participants' annual contribution base (compensation).

Both of the aforementioned plans provide benefits upon retirement based on converting accumulated contributions for that participant to an annuity or an actuarial equivalent basis.

Both plans are multi-employer plans by which all contributed assets of participating

employers and employees are commingled and are not segregated by employer. This commingling of assets prevents a matching of individual employer's plan assets to plan liabilities.

Total pension cost for the years ended December 31, 1987 and 1986 were \$638,385 and \$638,384, respectively.

c. Other Reports

CAMP ALDERSGATE, INC.

Camp Aldersgate, Inc. feels an extreme urgency to be recognized and better supported financially by the Church.

Hear our plea. . .we respectfully request that Camp Aldersgate be placed in this conference budget as a \$50,000 apportionment for the 1989 year, instead of the \$25,000 we now receive.

We have grown. Our programs have grown. And how reassuring it would be for The Church to recognize and support that growth. With a small budget of \$414,000 we have served over 18,250 clients from 63 of our 75 counties here in Arkansas. The people have found us, but the money has not.

There is a lot of mileage from your mission dollars at Camp Aldersgate. For each dollar the United Methodist Church gives, us, we match it with \$8.40 in other giving. In addition to this, over 30,000 hours of volunteer time was donated to clients by youth in the age group 14-20. These services if paid for, would cost an additional \$100,000,00!

HENDRIX COLLEGE

Hendrix College is a gift from Arkansas United Methodists to the state of Arkansas, the nation, and the world. The college values its relationship to the church and the support that United Methodists have provided which has enabled Hendrix to become increasingly effective at providing students with a liberal arts education.

Enrollment. Hendrix began the 1987 fall term with 1,035 students. The college

continues to enroll approximately 50 percent women and 50 percent men. The largest religious denomination on campus continues to be United Methodist with approximately 34 percent of the student body listing Methodist as their denomination. Eighty-two percent of the students live in campus housing, either in dormitories or in apartments provided by the college near the campus. Five percent of the students are black and 1.5 percent are from outside the United States. Eighty-seven percent are residents of the state of Arkansas.

Tultion. Tuition for the 1987-88 school year is \$4,900; room and board costs average

\$2,205; fees are \$97. The total cost to the student at Hendrix is \$7,202.

Financial need. Seventy percent of all students receive some form of financial aid at Hendrix in the form of scholarships, loans, grants, and work. Dependents of ministers (all denominations) and ministerial students (all denominations) receive an automatic one-half tuition scholarship from the college. Ministerial grants amounted to approximately \$150,000 for the 1987-88 academic year.

Hendrix continues to meet 100 percent of the demonstrated financial need of its students. The college uses a national formula in calculating financial need which assesses the student's and parents' ability to pay for his or her education. After determining the financial need, the college puts together a "package" of scholarships, grants, work, and some loans. There are a number of students at Hendrix whose total family income is less than \$10,000. Many of these students and their families contribute little or nothing to the cost of their education. The college remains committed to the proposition that we will not let financial condition prohibit any student who is otherwise qualified from getting a Hendrix education. This program is costly and continues to escalate each year, but the college is committed to ensuring that students have an opportunity to receive a Hendrix education. We ask that local churches throughout the state help inform prospective students of this long-standing policy.

Miscellaneous statistics. There are 64 full-time equivalent faculty members at Hendrix. Seventy-two percent of them hold doctorates and 89 percent have appropriate terminal degrees. Sixty-seven percent of the faculty are tenured. The student faculty ratio is

15:2 and the average class size is 21.

Hendrix offers 409 courses in 23 majors, Nineteen percent of the 1988 graduates are economics and business majors, 11 percent are political science majors, 9 percent biology, 9 percent history, and the remaining fall into a variety of disciplines. Fifty-five to 60 percent of our students continue their education at graduate or professional schools.

The market value of the college's Endowment Fund was \$46.3 million on July 31, 1987. The return on the endowment for the year which ended July 31 was 24.5 percent. Total operating expenses of the college continue to rise and the total budget for the 1987-88 academic year is \$11.3 million. The college continues to have a strong fiscal history and

anticipates balancing its budget for the 31st consecutive year on July 31.

The Campaign for Hendrix. The Campaign for Hendrix was launched to improve a variety of programs on campus. The total goal for the Campaign is \$16.8 million, and on January 31, 1988, the college had received in cash and pledges \$10.8 million. The Campaign runs through December 31, 1989. In addition to significant increases in endowment and merit scholarship, the Campaign has made possible a 50-bed addition to Couch Hall as well as the refurbishing of Staples Auditorium and Greene Chapel. The renovation of the auditorium and chapel will be completed in late spring and will be ready for the North Arkansas Conference meeting in June.

The Methodist Division of the Campaign for Hendrix has a goal of \$425,000. As of January 31, 1988, the division had raised more than \$412,000. Hendrix is grateful to United Methodists for their participation in this important financial drive to help Hendrix

improve its programs.

The \$16.8 million goal also includes monies for the operating fund or Annual Fund. The support that both conferences of the United Methodist Church give through their apportionments goes into the Annual Fund, and this is extremely important for Hendrix. In the fiscal year which ended July 31, 1987, the churches of the combined conferences gave

\$288,793. This represents a gift of approximately \$300 to each student attending Hendrix. The Church and the College. The college understands that its primary mission is "to transmit knowledge, to refine the intellect, to develop the character, and to encourage a concern for values." But it si pleased to be involved directly in helping the Church in its mission. To this end, the college provides a number of services to Arkansas United

Methodism.

1. The college makes its facilities available for various church functions. The North Arkansas Conference, the United Methodist Women's School of Mission, the Pastors' School, the Local Pastors' License School, and a number of Youth Assemblies are among some of these activities which are held annually on campus.

2. Through the Marshall T. Steel Center for the Study of Religion and Philosophy, the Hendrix-Murphy Foundation Programs in Literature and Language, and other activities, the college offers programs which are designed to enrich the lives of United Methodist laity and clergy from across the state. Dr. Langdon Gilkey and Dr. Martin Marty were on campus this year and are examples of the college's effort to serve churches as well as students attending Hendrix.

Through the Steel Center, the college is trying to give continuing education to recent graduates of theological seminaries. Events this past year included workshops to consider matters such as preaching, stress management, viewing and presenting

Biblical teaching, and pastoral care.

3. The Hendrix library houses the Historical Center for Arkansas Methodism.

4. Faculty and staff members of Hendrix are available to help local churches in a variety of training and worship situations. Almost every week faculty and staff are in

some Arkansas United Methodist Church teaching or preaching.

5. The college is trying to demonstrate to students that full time professional ministry is a viable career option. This year the Steel Center sponsored discussions on "Women in the Ministry" and on "The Nature of Ministry." Ministerial students on campus meet regularly to give each other support and to study the current religious scene and other topics.

Hendrix remains vitally interested in the church and Arkansas Methodists. During the year college officials have met with pastors from around the state to share ideas and to discuss the mission and direction of the institution. We greatly value our relationship with the church and will continue to look for ways to strengthen this relationship and to demonstrate our appreciation for the support the church has given Hendrix.

Several conferences have over subscribed their apportionments by more than 100% of their askings.

Lydia Patterson Institute is committed to purveying the finest possible quality of academic opportunity to those students whom God has entrusted to our tutelage, and to undergirding their academic work with very intentional spiritual nurture. The staff and administration are also committed to serving the General Church through a thorough "Cross Cultural" laboratory setting that helps to provide language study; helps to raise cultural awareness of the ever growing Hispanic presence all across the nation, but especially in the southwest; helps to research and make available viable ways for the church to be involved in meaningful Hispanic ministry.

Lydia Patterson Institute's most meaningful days of ministry still lie ahead of her!

MOUNT SEQUOYAH

This year was a banner year for the Mount Sequoyah Conference and Retreat Center in Fayetteville, Arkansas. This 65 year old facility served the largest number of persons in it's history and was open for more days of activity.

Cokesbury Bookstore was expanded to become full time and year round.

People came from all of the Annual Conferences of the South Central Jurisdiction. Retirees attend seven special events. The youth came as representatives to the JYME, for the second consecutive year. Celebrating Marriage brought married couples to two events. Church school leaders came for Laboratory School and Seminar training. Volunteers in Mission (VIM) attended the first "annual" Superserve training event.

Support came from across the Jurisdiction. A person in each annual conference was asked to serve as an Ambassador. In the North Arkansas Conference, this person was Rev. Harold Eggensperger. These Ambassadors were asked to represent Mount Sequoyah at the Annual Conference level. Together with your elected Trustee of Mount Sequoyah Mr. Nelson Barnette, Jr. and your Bishop, this team has helped us greatly to publicize and fund the programs and to draw attention to the contribution of Mount Sequoyah to the life of the Church.

I want to express my appreciation to the North Arkansas Annual Conference for your support. You provided \$3,061 in 1987 as payment of the Jurisdictional apportionment. Gifts came as well from individuals and groups. A total of \$51,300 came from Jurisdiction Apportionments, making up 12.07% of the income of this institution. All other income is devised from user fees and individual or group contributions.

The budget for 1988 is set at \$447,700. This amount of money will pay for the food costs and housing of 18-20 thousand overnight guests. In addition, it will pay salaries of employees, maintenance of fifty buildings on thirty acres of grounds, and pay utilities and other related costs of operation.

Major improvements are being planned, such as a large meeting space hosting 250 persons in a conference setting. Additional repairs and refurbishing are being done and road

repairs are high on the agenda.

This facility belongs to the North Arkansas Conference as part of the South Central Jurisdiction and functions to meet the needs of the local churches, districts and the Conference. Leadership training, personal retreats, planning events and growth opportunities are available. The invitation is open to all to use the facilities and to enjoy the fellowship in 1988. COME GROW WITH US!

PERKINS SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

As we have celebrated the 40th year since assuming the name "Joe and Lois Perkins School of Theology," it seems important to look to the future. Academic priorities occupy us, while new needs and anticipated faculty changes challenge our commitment to excellence.

Perkins' priorities are expressed in expenditures for instruction, library, and student aid, and key issues for seminaries of inclusiveness and pluralism, ministerial recruitment, globalization of the church and future mission, spiritual formation for ministry, and the relating of theory and praxis. Enrollments declined from the all-time highs of four years ago, yet we are holding above ten year averages. Ethnic constituents have remained about the same.

We plan to complete the Jurisdictional "Fair Share Goal" campaign during the 1988-92 quadrennium, and urge the ongoing support of Ministerial Education Fund, Perkins Alumni Loyalty Fund, and other efforts which are vital to our well being. Endowment gifts have increased during this quadrennium.

New faculty members this year are: Dr. Robert Maloy, Bridwell Library; Dr. Kenneth Wayne Hart, Sacred Music; Dr. Danna Nolan Fewell, Old Testament; and Ms. Debra Hulse-Bowles, Development. Dr. Stanley J. Menking is now Associate Dean for External Affairs. Retiring are Dr. W. Richey Hogg, Professor of World Christianity and Dr. H. Neill McFarland, Professor History of Religions.

Community life of Perkins students has been strengthened by active programs for Hispanic students, internationals, blacks, women, evangelical students, and spouses, both male and female. Vital worship life in the Perkins chapel and spiritual formation groups continue to nurture these crucial elements in ministerial training.

Perkins Continuing Education has served both clergy and laity through Ministers' Week, Laity Week and local Lay Academies, study tours to China and the Soviet Union, Ministry Monday workshops, Mentor Programs for Young Pastors and in Evangelism, and the Doctor of Ministry program.

Our community continues to be enriched by the participation of former students and lay persons. Through Internship committees, the Executive Board, sthe Perkins Alumni Council, and numerous individual contacts, we listen as well as join with our church constituency to work towards the common goals on enhancing ministry for the church.

SAINT PAUL SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY Kansas City, MO

Saint Paul School of Theology serves the North Arkansas Annual Conference by educating men and women for pastoral leadership in the United Methodist Church. For more than twenty-five years Saint Paul, along with other United Methodist seminaries, has served the church.

This past year saw another increase in the enrollment in the Master of Divinity program. In the 1987-88 school year, 150 students enrolled in that program, an increase of 11.9 percent. Saint Paul is now the seventh largest of the thirteen United Methodist seminaries in the Master of Divinity program.

Currently more than 1,000 Saint Paul graduates serve in ministry around the world. Saint Paul has focused through the years on local church ministry and has the highest percentage of graduates serving in local churches of all the seminaries.

Last fall, Sandra M. Aikens joined our faculty in Christian Education. Also Dr. Tex S. Sample, a long-time member of the Saint Paul faculty, served the year as acting academic dean.

This spring two members of the original Saint Paul faculty retired. Dr. Charles W. Baughman served as Professor of Old Testament. Dr. William F. Case retired as Professor of Practical Theology and Religious Education.

In the next fourteen years, thirty-five percent of current United Methodist pastors must be replaced. Even more important than the numbers is the church's need for pastors of outstanding gifts and graces to meet the challenges of today and tomorrow. We at Saint Paul must do more than train competent professional ministers to serve the church. We must prepare persons to provide bold and committed leadership for the church.

With your help, we at Saint Paul are training a new generation of leaders in the Wesleyan tradition. And, given the needs both of the world and the church, this new generation of "circuit riders" will be called upon to out-preach, out-pray, out-love, out-study, and, finally, out-endure all of us who have served before. That is a tall order, but nothing less will do for those called of God to ministry.

The support of churches, laity, and clergy of the North Arkansas Annual Conference, through your prayers and financial support, will play a significant role in making that new generation of leaders for the church a reality.

UNITED METHODIST MEN

I still believe in United Methodist Men fellowships and the need for them in every church. I call upon every minister in the North Arkansas Conference who does not have a United Methodist Men fellowship in their church to urge, insist, and help organize and charter one. You will find it to be a very valuable addition to your church. Not only will it help men to be better Christians but it will also help attendance. Let me read to you some of the Purpose and Objectives of United Methodist Men.

General Conference legislation of 1988 placed a renewed emphasis on "men's work" and took a vital step toward church renewal. "The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church, 1988", states:

UNITED METHODIST MEN - Each church or charge shall have an organized unit of United Methodist Men chartered and annually recertified through the Division of United Methodist Men, General Board of Discipleship, to provide another channel for involving men in the total ministry of the church.

a) Resources for organization and implementation of the ministry of men at the local church, district, conference, and jurisdictional levels shall be provided by the United Methodist Men's

Division, General Board of Discipleship.

b) United Methodist Men shall be a creative supportive fellowship of men who seek to know Jesus Christ, to grow spiritually, and to seek daily his will. It's primary purpose is to declare the centrality of Christ in the lives of men and in all of their relationships. The major concerns are:

- (1) To encourage knowledge of and support for the total mission of the United Methodist Church.
- (2) To engage in evangelism by sharing the fullness of the gospel in its personal and social dimensions.
- (3) To clarify and speak to the identity and role of the man in the contemporary society.

(4) To seek commitment to discipleship.

- (5) To study and become familiar with The United Methodist Church, its organization, doctrines, and beliefs.
- (6) To cooperate with all units of United Methodist Men in obtaining the objectives through district, conference and church-wide goals.

I know you are busy with other church matters, but this is important and I need your help. Won't you help? Have a UMM Sunday Service and Sign-Up, send in the charter or renewal. I will be glad to furnish the blanks; Nashville has UMM programs if needed.

We are gaining in strength. A year ago we had 93 active fellowships and now we have 110. Our EVERY MAN SHARES is also gaining. We promote and finance the living prayer WATS line in Nashville, TN. United Methodist Men and The Upper Room share a partnership. The Upper Room provides the Living Prayer Center with a staff of volunteers and relays to Covenant Prayer Groups all prayer requests. If you have a need for prayer call 1-800-251-2468 anytime - it is staffed 24 hours a day. We now have a UMM Conference Prayer Advocate who will appoint District Prayer Advocates who in turn will recommend local Advocates and organize local Covenant Prayer Groups. His name is John Kovalich of Eureka Springs. Many things are possible through prayer; I know.

Terry Holly of North Little Rock is Conference Scout Coordinator. He has a Scout program that will reach into every district. He plans to have a Bishop's dinner in at least one district a year to honor a local Scout. He will reveal his plans at the UMM Annual Retreat at Mt Sequouyah August 26-27. We must promote our Scout program, not only to help the young people but also to help bring many unchurched people to God - young and old. In our society where both parents often have

to work to make ends meet there is less time for the children, who at their tender age usually need more attention than they receive.

Our BOWL-A-THON net to the UMM Foundation this year was \$79,948.38, about the same as last year. The UMM Foundation is a creation of Conference Presidents of UMM to do projects, to finance projects, to raise funds and to be controlled by the UMM through their Conference presidents.

Ken Drezinski, Conference Coordinator for Purdue 1989, has registration blanks in the hall for those who wish them. Posters will be ready soon. Information, posters, forms, etc. will be at our Retreat, so don't miss it. This is Conference UMM election year and a Retreat location must be approved for next year.

UNITED METHODIST YOUTH

Every year God blesses the North Arkansas Conference with a slightly different variety of youth on the youth council. I believe that this year God has overly blessed us. Each individual on the youth council has something very special to give. For some it may be their creativity while for others it may be their deep conviction in Jesus Christ. But for whatever reason they arrive on the council, they arrive through God's guidance.

This year the council did a lot of brainstorming, and I believe that in the next few years the events that we think can't get any better, will get better!

The functions that CCYM plans are faith retreat, spring rally, Jr High Assembly, Sr. High Assembly, and Youth Tour.

Faith Retreat which was held Feb 5 - 7, at the Ozark Folk Center in Mr. View, was overrun with campers. We set a limit on the number of youth that could attend, but we didn't know how to turn anyone down. Faith Retreat is an even that is geared to reaching deep into one's own faith, studying that faith, and spiritual growth. Our only problem is that we are afraid our purpose of faith retreat is not being completed, that maybe the youth are using the weekend as a time to visit friends, instead of spiritual growth. But still it is a good event with an excellent purpose. Marty Cash Burless was this years speaker. She spoke on dreams, meditation, and prayer.

The next function CCYM plans is Spring Rally. Which was held April 16. It is a one day event that has lost most of its purpose. This years Spring Rally speaker was Alvin Law, and music was by Glenn Allen Green. It has become evident to the council that attendance to Spring rally has decreased yearly and so the council has decided to take a good look at rally and do some brainstorming with it.

Then come assemblies. This year Jr. High assembly comes after Sr. High Assembly. Jr. High assembly will be held Aug. 5 - 7, and Sr. High Assembly will be held Aug 1 - 5. Both of these events are very spiritually fulfilling. Top talents are brought in and each year attendance to both events has increased by sizable numbers.

One thing new the CCYM has done this year is to have undated task forces. These are task forces that meet at other times rather than at scheduled meetings. These groups are: Spiritual Life, Missions, Leadership, and publicity.

The leadership task force just held a successful workshop in Conway where Tom and Joni Schultz from Group Magazine came and introduced youth based ministries.

The publicity task force got a mailing list together of as many of the youth in the conference as we could. It is divided up by grades and by districts. So, if you need any addresses of the youth, they are available through the conference office. If there are any pastors here, whose youth are not receiving the conference material, please send their name, address, age, and grade to the conference office.

Each year CCYM members are picked through several ways. Kids who haven't made it on through the district have always had the chance to run at large when they came to Sr. High Assembly. Well, now we have changed all that and all members will go through a screening process on the district level. There will be no at-large members screened at assembly.

YSF is still a main issue with the council and we encourage you to go home and remind your

youth about YSF.

This years Youth Tour was successful, and I believe that this particular event should not be charged. It is a fun trip but also one that offers spiritual development in a slightly different way and atmosphere. There has however been a new tour discussed, that will also take place. This tour will not take the place of Youth Tour, but it will be an additional tour that will be strictly a missional tour that tours only one major city such as Washington D.C. or New York City.

I believe that God is working in the North Arkansas conference. Every year I see new faces and new believers, this is positive and good. We are trying hard and we hope that you will try to help us

pull in more young people; so that they may find a deeper faith in Jesus Christ.

I hope I haven't forgotten to tell you anything. Thank You and God Bless.

Our Social Issue Priorities are Locally - Child Abuse, National - Literacy, International Goal - Health Care. Our overall goal for the quadrennium is the implementation of the Charter for Racial Justice that will be implemented into each unit in all of our districts. Two new persons have attended the New Officer's Training: Gina Wingo and Lynn Baker. Both of these women have taken on their responsibilities with fervor and complete dedication.

We continue to increase and have our skills and knowledge by being involved in different areas. Bonnie Bumpers in the Silent Retreat held in Maryland during the month of February and Mary Catherine McSpadden in the Seminar on Apartheid held in Washington D.C.

during April.

Our representative to "Youth 2000," Gina Wingo, let us know there is a statewide Call to Action to enlist all sectors of society in active partnership, to help our youth achieve social economics self-sufficiency and fulfill their potential as contributing members of American society. She has described suicide, accidents, and drug/substance abuse as the three (3) leading killers of our teenagers. Since the three are interrelated, it is sometimes hard to report on the exact cause of death.

We gave our support to Jim Beal as a person who would be a great Bishop. I remember going to Rector and to the broom factory where Jim's dad worked. Claud, Jim's dad, invited me to have lunch with him at home. The first time I ever met him, I think. I graciously accepted the invitation. Upon arriving, Jim's mother said: "We do not have anything to feed the preacher." Claud said: "Don't we have a can of vienna sausage?" The United Methodist Church has a long history of concern for social justice. Its members have often taken forthright positions on controversial issues involving Christian principles. Early Methodists expressed their opposition to the slave trade, to smuggling and to the cruel treatment of prisoners.

United Methodists continue to speak to the human issues in the contemporary world from a sound biblical and theological foundation as historically demonstrated in United Methodist traditions.

Therefore, in keeping with our concerns, the Board of Church and Society presents the following resolutions:

Capital Punishment
Illiteracy and Functional Illiteracy in Arkansas

RESOLUTION #1 A.I.D.S.

Whereas the incidence of the devastating illness of AIDS continues to increase worldwide, with the most rapid rate of increase in the United States, and

Whereas a cure for the disease remains undiscovered and successful treatment limited, and

Whereas public response to the epidemic still tends to be governed too much by misinformation, fear and prejudice;

Be it resolved that we reaffirm the resolution on AIDS adopted by the North Arkansas Annual Conference in 1986 and urge local churches to develop AIDS ministries.

Be it also resolved that we reject unequivocally the notion that AIDS is God's punishment for the wrongdoing of AIDS victims. Where AIDS is concerned, we believe that the activity of God is to be discerned in the compassion and concern of the community of faith to bring healing and new life.

RESOLUTION #2 CAPITAL PUNISHMENT

Whereas the Social Principles of the United Methodist Church states that "we oppose capital punishment and urge its elimination from all criminal codes," and

Whereas the 1984 Book of Resolutions "declares our opposition to the retention and use of capital punishment in any form or carried out by any means," and

Whereas the North Arkansas Conference in its 1981 Resolution on Capital Punishment "affirmed the sacred value of all persons, law-abiding and law-breaking alike" and "opposed capital punishment as a means of dealing with criminal behavior," and

Whereas lay and clergy persons in the North Arkansas Conference are in ministry to persons on death row in Arkansas, and

Whereas certain prisoners on death row are near the end of their legal appeals process, making their executions imminent;

Therefore be it resolved that the North Arkansas Conference

1. re-affirms its opposition to capital punishment and

2. calls upon Governor Bill Clinton and the Arkansas Board of Correction to stop implementation of the death penalty in Arkansas.

RESOLUTION #3 ILLITERACY AND FUNCTIONAL ILLITERACY IN ARKANSAS

Whereas the current level of illiteracy and functional illiteracy is extremely high in Arkansas, and Whereas "Every person has the right and responsibility to work for the benefit of himself or herself and the enhancement of human life and community and to receive adequate remuneration." (Para. 73 C. Social Principles);

and Whereas illiteracy and functional illiteracy severely limit a) personal and societal fulfillment

and b) the scope of employment for which a person is eligible;

Be it resolved that we, the 1988 Session of the North Arkansas Conference of The United Methodist Church, call upon persons to

a) participate in learn-to-read programs where they are available either as

(1) students, realizing there is no shame in bettering one's skills in order to raise personal and community horizons, and/or (2) those helping others to learn to read;

b) seek and develop learn-to-read programs where they are needed.

RESOLUTION #4 INCLUSIVE MINISTRY

Whereas the United Methodist Church is a church which is inclusive of persons of color; and Whereas the ministry of the United Methodist Church is inclusive of persons of color; and Whereas the ministry of the United Methodist Church is by definition an itinerate ministry; and Whereas the North Arkansas Conference has by its resolutions, goals, objectives and courses of action stated that the "recruitment, retention and support of Ethnic Minority Clergy" has been an important part of the church's Missional Priority;

Therefore be it resolved that we the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church reaffirm our covenant to support any efforts to provide information for an inclusive ministry and to

support ethnic minority persons in the appointive process.

RESOLUTION #5 WEAPONS REDUCTIONS

Whereas we, the members of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church, resolved in 1986 to "...call our Federal Government and the Government of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics...to present before the peoples of the world a comprehensive and verifiable plan (including testing, production and deployment of weapons' systems, proliferation, efforts at cooperation to ease tensions) for the elimination of nuclear weapons.";

Be it resolved that we

a. applaud

1. the efforts of these two governments in the reduction of intermediate range nuclear weapons:

2. the citizens of these two countries who have worked to establish the atmosphere whereby this reduction can take place;

b. encourage all parties to work toward the final goal of multilateral nuclear disarmament.

The Conference session 1939 voted to retain the numerical notation of the Conference in The Methodist Church.



STRUCTURE OF THE NORTH ARKANSS CONFERENCE THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

SECTION I

1. The foundational and doctrinal guiadance for this structure document is the 1984 Discipline of the United Methodist Church. The following paragraph is quoted:

"P. 706, 1984 Discipline of The United Methodist Church:

The Annual Conference shall provide for the connectional relationship between the general boards and commissions and the conference, district and local church.

1. The Annual Conference shall structure itself for effective misson ln any mode deemed appropriate. In each Annual Conference, there may be conference program boards related to the general program boards

organized as the Annual Conference shall determine. The Annual Conference shall provide for the connectional relationship between the general program boards and the conference districts, and local churches, and shall specifically assign the program responsibilities related to the objectives and scope of the general program boards to agencies of the Annual Conference.

[NOTE: Decision No. 417 (Oct 30, 1976) of The Judicial Council of The United Methodist Church found that P. 706.1 was constitutional. The council declared that "if a conference should determine not to create any of the boards or divisions thereof, it shall specifically assign the liaison functions and responsibilities of each such board or division to another agency in the conference."]

2. The Annual Conference may appoint additional committees for the purpose of promoting the work of The United Methodist Church within the bounds of said Annual Conference and may prescribe their

membership and their powers and duties.

3. Each Annual Conference may make its agencies of such size as its work may require; provided that consideration shall be given to the inclusion of lay and clergy persons from small membership churches. Full-time local pastors serving charges are eligible for election or appointment to such agencies, except those dealing with qualifications, orders, and status of ministers and local pastors.

Insofar as possible, the membership of councils, boards, and agencles of the Annual Conference shall include one-third clergy, onethird laywomen, and one-third laymen, except for the Board of Ordained Special attention shall be given to the inclusion clergywomen, youth, young adults. older adults. persons with a handicapping condition, and racial and ethnic minority

keeping with policles for general church agencles.

5. Members of general agencies shall serve as ex-officio members of the corresponding Annual Conference agency or its equivalent structure. If this results in a person being a member of more than one Annual Conference agency in violation of either Annual Conference policy or another provision of the Book of Discipline, the person shall choose the Annual Conference agency on which to serve."

2. All Disciplinary references herein are to the 1984 Book of Discipline of The United

Methodist Church.

3. Glossary of Terms; Abbreviations; Acronymns:

- a. North Arkansas Conference of The United Methodist Church hereinafter referred to as the Conference.
- b. The <u>Discipline of The United Methodist Church</u> hereinafter referred to as the <u>Discipline</u>.
- c. The North Arkansas Annual Conference hereinafter referred to as <u>The Annual Conference</u> refers to the sessions of the Annual Conferences.
- d. The word <u>agency/agencies</u> refers to all Councils; Boards; Committees; Commissions; Work Areas and other organizational entities of the Conference.
- e. Quadrennium -- the four year period beginning January 1 following the adjournment of the regular session of The General Conference (1984 General Conference = Quadrennium Jan. 1, 1985 thru Dec. 31, 1988) (1988 General Conference = Quadrennium Jan. 1, 1989 thru Dec. 31, 1992).
- f. Task Force -- where authorized herein a Task Force may be established for the purpose of accomplishing specific and particular goals of an Agency. A Task Force shall be

oriented to immediate tasks and will be disestablished upon completion of its assigned task. A Task Force shall always be directly amenable to the agency under which it was created.

SECTION II

4. Nomination; Election; Term and Tenure; Vacancies:

a. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- all offices, established in this Structure document, are filled by nomination of the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by The Annual Conference. The right to nominate from the floor

shall not be abridged.

b. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- the term of office shall be one quadrennium (from January 1 of the first year of the quadrennium through December 31 of the last year of the quadrennium). Election, for offices to be filled at the beginning of each quadrennium, shall take place during The Annual Conference of the last year of each quadrennium. Total tenure in any one office by any individual shall not exceed one quadrennium past the one in which that tenure first began.

c. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- where only two people are being considered for election to an office a simple majority will elect; where more than two persons are being considered for election to any office the one receiving the most votes

shall be declared elected.

d. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- all members and ex-officio

members of every agency shall have voice and vote.

e. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- The Chairperson of each agency shall be nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and elected by The Annual Conference. Each agency shall elect other officers as it may determine are required to carry out its responsibilities and functions. At the option of the agency those officers elected and other designated members may constitute an Executive Committee.

f. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- vacancies occurring within offices and agencies of the Conference, during the quadrennium, shall be filled by nomination of the Conference Committee on Nominations and election by the next Annual

Conference.

g. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- when a vacancy occurs between sessions of The Annual Conference and it is determined, by the Conference Committee on Nominations, that the vacancy must be filled immediately because of the nature and scope of the responsibilities of the position, that Committee may nominate and elect an individual to fill the position until The Annual Conference next convenes and elects a person, nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations, to fill the position for the remainder of the quadrennium.

h. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- all offices and agencies

established by this Structure Document shall be directly amenable to the Conference.

i. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- all agencies of the Conference that are governed by a Charter, Constitution, or By-Laws shall operate in

compliance of those documents; and this Structure Document.

j. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- insofar as possible, the membership of all agencies of the Annual Conference shall include one-third clergy, one-third laywomen, and one-third laymen. Special attention shall be given to the inclusion of clergywomen, youth, young adults, older adults, persons with a handicapping condition, and racial and ethnic minority persons. Consideration shall be given to the inclusion of lay and clergy persons from small membership churches; and full-time local pastors serving charges.

k. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- members of general and jurisdictional agencies of The United Methodist Church shall serve as ex-officio members of

the corresponding Annual Conference Agency or its equivalent structure.

1. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- agencies of the Conference may organize themselves into sub-groups; task forces; work groups; committees or similar groupings to facilitate meeting their assigned and assumed responsibilities and functions.

m. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- membership on Task Forces of the Annual Conference and its agencies shall be inclusive of ethnic minorities and persons from small membership churches. Persons are limited to membership on one

Conference Task Force at any given time. Para 4j, above, shall apply.

5. It is the intent that this structure Document be in complete harmony and compliance with the Discipline. Any wording or provision herein that shall prove to be in contradiction of the Discipline shall be considered to be null and void -- it is the Discipline that shall prevail in all instances.

SECTION III

6. Members of The Annual Conference [P. 35 & 701, Discipline]:

a. Clergy Members. The ministerial membership of an Annual Conference shall consist of members in full connection, probationary members, associate members, affiliate

members and local pastors under full-time appointment to a pastoral charge.

(1) Members in full connection shall have the right to vote on all matters in the Annual Conference except in the election of lay delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences; and shall have sole responsibility for all matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of ministers.

- (2) Probationary members shall have the right to vote in the Annual Conference on all matters except constitutional amendments, elections of delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences, and matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of ministers.
- (3) Associate and affiliate members shall have the right to vote in the Annual Conference on all matters except constitutional amendments, election of delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences, and matters of ordination, character and conference relations of ministers.
- (4) Local pastors under full time appointment to a pastoral charge shall have the right to vote in the Annual Conference on all matters except constitutional amendments, election of delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences, and matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of ministers.

(5) Part-time and student local pastors shall be seated in the Annual Conference and shall be given the privilege of the floor <u>without</u> vote.

b. Lay Members. There shall be a lay member from each Charge within the Annual Conference [where there is more than one minister appointed to the charge there shall be a lay member elected for each minister]. The Annual Conference shall also provide for election of Lay Members at Large to assure that there is at least an equal number of lay and clergy members of the Annual Conference. [NOTE: The Judicial Council has ruled (Judicial Council Decision #479, April 22, 1980) that there can be more lay members than clergy; however there cannot be more clergy members than lay]. The lay members of the Annual Conference shall participate in all delibarations and vote upon all measures except on the granting or validation of license, ordination, reception into full conference membership, or any question concerning the character and official conduct of ministers; and the election of clergy delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences. When at any time a lay member is excused by the Annual Conference from further attendance during the session, the alternate lay member may be seated instead. It shall be the duty of the lay member of the Annual Conference to report on actions of the Annual Conference. Lay members shall have been for the two years next preceding their election members of The United Methodist Church and shall have been active participants in The United Methodist Church for at least four years next preceding their election.

- c. Secretary of The Annual Conference. Shall carry out those functions described in various paragraphs of the Discipline and those assigned by the Annual Conference. Additionally the Conference Secretary, in compliance with P. 745.2 of the Discipline, shall be responsible for examination of the District Conference Journals and shall assure that copies are on file in the proper files and archives repositories. The Conference Secretary shall be responsible for annual review of the North Arkansas Conference Rules of Order and to recommend them for adoption at the beginning of each Annual Conference.
- d. Statistician of The Annual Conference. Shall carry out those functions assigned by the Annual Conference, and shall make all statistical data and information available to The Annual Conference.
- e. Conference Lay Leader. Shall carry out those functions described in various paragraphs of the Discipline and those assigned by the Annual Conference. Shall serve as Chairperson of the Conference Council on Lay Life and Work. Shall, in cooperation with the Bishop, assure that each Episcopal address to The Annual Conference, addresses concerns of the Laity of the Conference; or that provision is made for a "State of the Laity" address.
- f. Conference Treasurer (P. 715.1) [Nominated by the Conference Council on Finance and Administration to the Annual Conference for election. Amendable to the Council on Finance and Administration; where they serve with voice and without vote.
 - g. The Diaconal Ministers
 - h. Conference President of United Methodist Women
 - i. Conference Presidnet of United Methodist Men
 - j. The District Lay Leaders
 - k. Presidnet (or equivalent) of Conference Youth Organization.
 - 1. Two (2) Young Persons under 25 years of age from each District.

Section IV

- 7. Agencies of The Annual Conference:
 - a. Conference Committee on Nominations [No Disciplinary Reference]
 - (1) Membership 16 members (8 lay and 8 clergy). Names of persons shall be nominatin from the floor of the Annual Conference. Balloting shall proceed by written ballot. Election will be declared for the nominee receiving the There shall be no division of the house in the most votes for the position. election. A class of four persons (two clergy and two lay) shall be elected annually to a four-year term. At least two ethnic persons shall be on the Committee on Nominations at all times. Those elected shall not succeed themselves for four years. Any vacancy occurring between sessions of the Annual Conference shall be filled for the remainder of the term at the succeeding session of the Annual Conference by vote of the Annual Conference, in the same manner as described above. The Bishop and Conference Lay Leader shall serve as ex-officio members with vote.. Conference Council Director shall serve as a consultant to the Committee. This committee shall elect its own Chairperson and such other officers as it may deem necessary.
 - (2) Responsibilities: The Conference Nominating Committee will nominate the Conference Secretary and the Conference Statistician; the Conference Lay Leader; and 2 persons under 25 years of age from each District; and the Chairpersons and all members of the Conference agencies (unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein). In January of the last year of each quadrennium the Nominating Committee shall publish a list of all offices which will be vacant at the beginning of the next quadrennium. This listing will be sent to all local churches requesting them to nominate members who meet the requirements and have the desire to serve on an Annual Conference agency. This listing will then be sent to the District

Nominating Committee. The District Nominating Committee will compile a listing of District nominees for all vacancies and forward that listing to the Chariperson of the Conference Nominating Committee. Prior to Annual Conference, the Conference Nominating Committee will meet and, from the District Nominees, and from any additional nominees proposed by the Conference Nominating Committee, prepare their list of nominees for each office, to be presented to The Annual Conference for election; giving priority to the District Nominees. All nominees shall be consulted regarding their nomination. Those personnel on the District lists who are not elected to Annual Conference offices will serve as a nominee pool for interim vacancies and Task Forces during the quadrennium.

. Conference Council on Ministries [CCOM] [P. 726-727, Discipline]

Presiding Bishop; the District Superintendents; Confernce (1) Membership: Secretary; two representatives of the conference youth organization, one of whom shall be the president; two representatives of the conference United Methodist Women, one of whom shall be the president; two representatives of the conference United Methodist Men, one of whom shall be the president; two young adults; the Conference Lay Leader (who also serves as Chairperson of the Conference Council on Lay Life and Work); one lay person and one clergy person from each District Council on Ministries (DCOM), one of whom shall be the DCOM Chairperson; coordinators of age level and family departments (Children, Youth, Young Adult, Adult and Family Life); the Chairperson of the Council on Professional Ministry. Chairperson of the Committee on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns; Committee on Parish and Community Development; Commission on Religion and Race; Commission on Status and Role of Women. The Conference Statistician; the Chairpersons of the Boards of Discipleship, Church and Society, Global Ministries, and Higher Education and Campus Ministry. The Chairpersons of all Committees of the Conference Council on Ministries [Committee on Communications and Publishing Interest; Committee on Planning and Research; Committee on Personnel]. The following shall be members without vote (with voice): Director and Associate Directors of the CCOM; Conference Treasurer; and the Chairperson of the Council on Finance and Administration. The officers of the CCOM shall be a Chairperson, a Vice-Chairperson, a secretary, and such other officers as the council may determine. All officers shall be elected by the CCOM in a manner as they shall determine. The Nominee for Chairperson may be a current member of the council or shall automatically become a member upon election. The Chairperson shall be required to vacate any other conference offices held upon his/her election.

(2) <u>Responsibilities</u>: The CCOM shall perform those functions as defined in Para 726.10 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Conference.

(3) There shall be an Executive Committee composed of persons holding the following offices: Chairperson; Vice-Chairperson; Secretary; the Bishop; a Cabinet representative; the Conference Lay Leader; Chairpersons of the Boards of Church and Society, Discipleship, Global Ministries, and Higher Education and Campus Ministry; and one representative from each of the DCOM Teams on the CCOM [this person is to be chosen by the DCOM]; and the Conference representative to the General Council on Ministries. The following will serve as members of the Executive Committee without vote: Executive Director and the Associate Director(s) of the CCOM; Chairperson of CFA; Secretary of the Annual Conference.

(4) There shall be a <u>Personnel Committee</u>, of no more than six, which shall be elected from the CCOM membership in a number and manner determined by the CCOM. The Personnel Committee shall elect its own Chairperson and Personnel Committee shall be empowered to make recommendations concerning staff personnel and salaries and to be in consultation with the Bishop concerning clergy

appointments to CCOM staff. The Personnel Committee shall perform those

functions assigned to it by the CCOM.

(5) The CCOM may form committees and task forces from within or outside its membership for the purpose of carrying out specific assignments of the Council and its agencies.

(6) The following are Agencies of the Conference Council on Ministries and shall be amendable thereto:

(a) Committee on Communications and Publishing Interests

(Paragraph. 726.5 and 726.5c, Discipline)

Membership: 9 persons. The Chairperson and eight other persons shall be nominated by the CCOM Executive Committee and shall be elected by the CCOM; the Chairperson shall serve as a member of the Council. The Area Director of Communications shall serve on this Committee without vote. It should not be deemed necessary for all members of this Committee to be members of the CCOM. Due consideration should be given to the inclusion in the membership of persons with expertise in communications and publishing. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote Responsibility: The Committee shall perform those functions as defined in P.726.5a and 726.5c of the Discipline and those asigned to it by the Annual Conference and the CCOM.

Arkansas Area Responsibilities: There shall be a Joint (North Arkansas and Little Rock Annual Conferences) Committee on Communications which shall consist of all the members of the North Arkansas Conference Committee on Communications and Publishing Interests and all of the members of the Little Rock Conference Committee on Communications. This Joint Committee shall be jointly chaired by the two Chairpersons of the two constituent Communications Committees. The Joint Committee shall administer the adopted Arkansas Area Communications Program. The Joint Committee shall be responsible for the oversight and management of the Arkansas United Methodist newspaper; the Arkansas Area Resource Center, and the Arkansas Area Media Center. Ex-Officio members (without vote) shall be the Area Director of Communication; the Editor of the Arkansas United Methodist Newspaper; and the Area Treasurer.

(b) Committee on Planning and Research [Par. 726.5 Discipline]

Membership: The Committee shall be composed of 15 members, one of which will be the Chairperson. The Chairperson and fourteen other persons shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Nominating Committee and shall be elected by the Annual Conference; the Chairperson shall serve as a member of the CCOM. The Committee shall elect other officers and establish subcommittees as it deems necessary to carry out its responsibilities and functions. It should not be deemed necessary for all members of this Committee to be members of the CCOM. Due consideration should be given to the inclusion in the membership of persons with expertise in planning and research. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

Responsibility: To engage in planning and research on behalf of the Conference Council on Ministries and the Annual Conference and to serve as an advisory group to the Annual Conference and its agencies. To serve as a clearing house for all planning and research projects under the sponsorship of the Annual Conference and its agencies. The Committee shall have the authority and responsibility to examine the policies and administrative practices of the agencies of the Annual Conference and make recommendations to them of ways and means by which work of the church might be more effectively performed or the cause of the church more adequately promoted. To annually review the Conference Standing Rules for adequacy and accuracy and to recommend changes thereto to the Annual Conference. The Committee shall have the authority to review this Structure document to assure that it continues to meet the functional needs of the Conference and is in unity and conformity with the Discipline; and to recommend changes hereto. When engaged in planning and research on behalf of or at the direction of The Annual Conference (i.e. Structure, Standing Rules, etc.) this Committee shall be amenable directly to the Annual Conference.

(c) <u>Missional Priority Coordinating Committee</u> [No Disciplinary requirement] Upon the adoption of a General Church Missional Priority a Conference Missional Priority Coordinating Committee, consisting of no more than seven members, shall be formed by the CCOM. The basis for membership will be determined by the scope and direction of the adopted General Church Missional Priority. The responsibilities of this Committee will to be to assure that the proper administrative and programmatic actions are taken to assure complete implementation of the Missional Priority.

(d) Board of Church and Society [Par. 728.1, Discipline]

Membership: Chairperson and one representative from each District elected by the Annual Conference. The Board may elect other officers and establish committees as it deems necessary to carry out its responsibilities and functions. Task Forces may be appointed, as needed, by the Chairperson of the Board of Church and Society, using the Conference Committee on Nominations Nominee Pool as a resource. The Mission Coordinator for Christian Social Involvement of the Conference United Methodist Women shall serve as an ex-officio member of this Board. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

Responsibilities: This Board shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 728 of the Discipline and those tasks assigned to it by the Council on Ministries.

- (e) Age-Level and Family Coordinators [Par. 726.6, Discipline] There shall be Coordinators of Children, Youth, Young Adult, Adult and Family Life who will serve as advocates of these segments of our society and Church on the CCOM. Task Forces may be appointed, as needed, by the Age Level and Family Coordinators, using the Conference Committee on Nominations Nominee Pool as a resource.
- (f) Board of Discipleship [Par. 729, Discipline]

Membership: Board Chairperson and the Chairperson of each of the Committees functioning under this Board. Task Forces may be appointed, as needed, by the Chairperson of the Baord of Discipleship, using the Conference Committee on Nominations Nominee Pool as a resource. The Board may elect other officers and establish committees as it deems necessary to carry out its responsibilities and functions. The Conference President of UMM shall serve as an ex-officio member of this Board. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

Responsibilities: This Board shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 729 of the Discipline and those tasks assigned to it by the Council on Ministries.

The following are the Standing Committees of the Board of Discipleship:

1. Committee on Education [Par. 729.2, Discipline]

Membership: Chairperson and one representative from each District elected by the Annual Conference. The Committee may elect other officers and establish sub-committees as it deems necessary to carry out its responsibilities and functions. Task Forces may be appointed, as needed, by the Chairperson of the Committee on Education, using the Conference Committee on Nominations Nominee Pool as a resource. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

Responsibilities: This Committee shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 729.2 of the Discipline and those tasks assigned to it by the Council on Ministries.

2. Committee on Evangelism [Par. 729.3, Discipline]:

Membership: Chairperson and one representative from each District elected by the Annual Conference. The Committee may elect other officers and establish sub-committees as it deems necessary to carry out its responsibilities and functions. Task Forces may be appointed, as needed, by the Chairperson of the Committee on Evangelism, using the Conference Committee on Nominations Nominee Pool as a resource. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

Responsibilities: This Committee shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 729.3 of the Discipline and those tasks assigned to it by the Council on Ministries.

3. Committee on Worship [Par. 729.4 and 729.6, Discipline]:

Membership: Chairperson and one representative from each District elected by the Annual Conference. The Committee may elect other officers and establish sub-committees as it deems necessary to carry out its responsibilities and functions. Task Forces may be appointed, as needed, by the Chairperson of the

Committee on Worship, using the Conference Committee on Nominations Nominee Pool as a resource. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

Responsibilities: This Committee shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 729.4 and 729.6 of the Discipline and those tasks assigned to it by the Council on Ministries. The Worship Committee shall be responsible for planning the Devotional and Worship services for the sessions of The Annual Conference; and in consultation with the Conference Boards of Ordained and Diaconal Ministry will provide for the Annual Conference Memorial Worship Service.

4. Committee on Stewardship [Par. 729.5, Discipline]:

Membership: Chairperson and one representative from each District elected by the Annual Conference. The Committee may elect other officers and establish sub-committees as it deems necessary to carry out its responsibilities and functions. Task Forces may be appointed, as needed, by the Chairperson of the Committee on Stewardship, using the Conference Committee on Nominations Nominee Pool as a resource. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

Responsibilities: This Committee shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 729.5 of the Discipline and those tasks assigned to it by the Council on Ministries.

5. Committee on Outdoor Ministries [No Disciplinary requirement]:

Membership: Chairperson and one representative from each District elected by the Annual Conference; the District Coordinators of Outdoor Ministries. The Committee may elect other officers and establish sub-committees as it deems necessary to carry out its responsibilities and functions. Task Forces may be appointed, as needed, by the Chairperson of the Committee on Outdoor Ministries, using the Conference Committee on Nominations Nominee Pool as a resource. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

Responsibilities: This Committee shall plan, administer and implement Outdoor Ministries in the Annual Conferences. Schedule and select the directors and curriculum for the Conference camping program for all campsites. Discover, recruit, train, assign and support leadership for Outdoor Ministries. Develop and promote standards to verify that all campsites are ready for camping. Administer the finances, building, improvement and grounds at Camp Nawake within the framework of established Conference policies and the provisions of the Discipline; and those tasks assigned to it by the Council on Ministries.

(g) Board of Global Ministries [Par. 730.1, Discipline]

<u>Membership</u>: Chairperson; one representative from each District [elected by the Annual Conference]; a representative from Conference United Methodist Women;

Institutional representatives (voice, without vote) from Methodist Health Systems, Memphis, TN; the United Methodist Children's Home, Little Rock, AR; Camp Aldersgate, Little Rock, AR [Note: These Institutions shall be responsible for the Travel and/or Per Diem costs of their representatives]. Task Forces may be appointed, the Conference Committee on Nominations Nominee Pool as a resource. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

Responsibilities: The Board of Global Ministries shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 730.1 thru 730.4 of the Discipline and those tasks assigned to it by the Council on Ministries. The Board of Global Ministries shall establish a World Hunger Task Force whose responsibility will be to keep the CCOM and the Conference aware of the World Hunger emphasis of UMCOR and the General Board of Global Ministries and to coordinate, in cooperation with the participating communions, the annual World Hunger emphasis within the Arkansas Area.

(h) <u>Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry</u> [Par. 731.1 thru 731.5, Discipline]

Membership: Chairperson; one representative from each District; two representatives from each Wesley Foundation, one of which shall be the Director (who shall be an ex-officio member without vote) and the other a student member of the Board of Directors. The President (or designated representative) of Hendrix College and Philander Smith College, who shall serve as ex-officio without vote. Task Forces may be appointed, as needed, by the Chairperson of the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry, using the Conference Committee on Nominations Nominee Pool as a resource. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

Responsibilities: This Board shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 731.1 thru 731.5 of the Discipline, and those tasks assigned to it by the CCOM.

c. Conference Council on Lay Life and Work [Par. 729.7, Discipline]

Membership: The Conference Lay Leader, who shall serve as the Chairperson; the Conference Director of Lay Speaking; the District Lay Leaders; one laywoman slected by the Executive Committee of the Conference United Methodist Women; one layman selected by the Executive Committee of the Conference United Methodist Men; four youth selected by the Conference Council on Youth Ministries; four at-large lay members nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and elected by The Annual Conference; and the currently elected lay-delegates to General Conference. A representative from the Cabinet and a member of the CCOM Staff shall serve as Ex-Officio members without vote.

Responsibilities: The Council shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 729.7 and 729.8 of the Discipline and those tasks assigned to it by the Conference. The Council shall have the responsibility to interpret and spread throughout the conference all the rich meanings of the universal priesthood of all believers, or Christian vocation, and the ministry of the laity. It shall help the Annual Conference and local churches in programs which aim to recruit and to equip the laity for the widest and most productive

ministry possible throught the church. The Conference Council on Lay Life and Work, in consultation with the Conference Committee on Nominations, shall nominate and elect a lay person from within the Conference to serve as the Conference Director of Lay Speaking. The Council, through its Director of Lay Speaking, shall encourage participation in the United Methodist Church Lay Speaking program by the laity of the Conference. The Council, through the Conference Director of Lay Speaking, shall provide assistance to the Districts in planning for and facilitating training opportunities for laity involved in Lay Speaking within the Conference.

d. <u>Conference Council on Professional Ministry</u> [No Disciplinary requirement]

<u>Membership</u>: Chairperson; Chairpersons of the following seven agencies of the Council on Professional Ministry [Board of Ordained Ministry; Board of Diaconal Ministry; Board of Pensions; Commission on Equitable Salaries; Committee on Group Insurance; Joint Review Committee; and the Committee on Disability.].

Responsibility: Coordinate all responsibilities pertaining to professional ministry. It shall no way abridge the disciplinary responsibilities of its agency groups.

(1) Board of Ordained Ministry [Par. 732, Discipline]

Membership: 15 clergy (at least one from each District of the Conference) in full connection. They shall be nominated by the Bishop after consultation with the Chairperson of the Board and the Cabinet. Membership may include a retired clergy in full connection. At least one member of the Board will be engaged in an appointment beyond the local church and will represent to the board all other clergy so assigned. The board membership shall include women and ethnic minority persons. The board shall elect a registrar and such associate registrars as it may determine, one such associate registrar to be given responsibility for candidacy; a cabinet representative shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote. The Board shall elect its own Chairperson and such other officers as it deems necessary to carry out its assigned functions and responsibilities.

Responsibilities: The Board of Ordained Ministry shall carry out those functions as defined and described in Par. 732 of the Discipline. The Board of Ordained Ministry shall act as an advisory agency for the Bishop, Cabinet and Annual Conference on all matters pertaining to the various aspects of the chaplaincy. To serve as an initial screening Board for all applicants who are asking for ecclesiastical endorsement from the Division of Chaplians and Related Ministries of The United Methodist Church and to furnish information to agencies, institutions and industry, both within and without the United Methodist Church, on the many aspects of ministry through the Chaplaincy program and to perform those functions and responsibilities assigned to it by the Council on Professional ministry and the Annual Conference.

(a) Joint Review Committee [Par. 455.1c, Discipline]

<u>Membership</u>: Six members and three Alternate Members as follows: Two district superintendents appointed annually by the bishop (category 1); two Board of Ordained Ministry members nominated by the chairperson and elected annually by the board (category 2); two non-Cabinet, non-Board of Ordained Ministry members in full connection, one nominated by the bishop and Cabinet, one by the Board of

Ordained Ministry, and elected annually by the members in full connection in ministerial executive session (category 3). An alternate shall be provided in each of the three categories. The alternate who is not a member of the Cabinet or Board of Ordained Ministry shall be nominated by the bishop and Cabinet. The Committee shall elect its own officers. This committee shall be amenable to the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry.

<u>Responsibilities</u>: The Conference Joint Review Committee shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 455.1c of the Discipline and perform those functions and responsibilities assigned to it by the Board of Ordained Ministry; the Council on Professional Ministry and the Annual Conference.

(2) Board of Diaconal Ministry [Par. 730.6 and 733, Discipline]

Membership: 10 members (at least one from each District of the Conference) of which no less than 4 shall be in diaconal careers, preferably diaconal ministers. They shall be nominated by the Bishop after consultation with the Executive Committee of the Board of the previous quadrennium. The Board shall elect its own Chairperson and such other officers as it deems necessary to carry out its assigned functions and responsibilities. This Board shall also function as a Committee on Deaconess and Home Missionary Service [Par. 730.6, Discipline], and shall maintain the records of and continuing relationships with all Deaconesses and Home Missionaries (either active or retired) residing within the bounds of the Conference.

<u>Responsibilities</u>: The Board of Diaconal Ministry shall carry out those functions as defined and described in Par. 730.6 and 733 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Council on Professional Ministry and the Annual Conference.

(3) Board of Pensions [Par. 736, Discipline]

Membership: 15 members (none of which may be indebted to pension and benefit funds, plans, and programs, or receiving pensions therefrom) 1/3 laywomen; 1/3 laymen; and 1/3 clergy; elected for a term of eight years and arranged in classes as determined by the Annual Conference Nominating Committee. Ad-interim vacancies will be filled by the board for the remainder of the conference year in which the vacancy occurs in consultation with the Conference Committee on Nominations. Each member elected or appointed to the Board shall serve no more than eight consecutive years. The eight year tenure shall begin when the individual joins the Board. The Board shall elect its own Chairperson and such other officers as it deems necessary to carry out its assigned functions and responsibilities.

Responsibilities: The Boad of Pensions shall carry out those functions as degined and described in Par. 736 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Council on Professional Ministry and the Annual Conference.

(4) Commission on Equitable Salaries [Par. 722, Discipline]

Membership: 10 members (5 laypersons and 5 clergypersons) including at least 1 layperson and 1 clergyperson from churches of fewer than 200 members). One district superintendent named by the cabinet shall be a member. The Chairperson shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference.

Responsibilities: The Commission on Equitable Salaries shall carry out those functions as defined and described in Par. 722 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Council on Professional Ministry and the Annual Conference.

(5) Committee on Group Insurance [No Disciplinary Requirement]

Membership: 10 members [5 laypersons; and 5 clergypersons]. The Chairperson shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference.

<u>Responsibilities</u>: To administer the Conference Group Insurance program and to perform those functions and responsibilities assigned to it by the Council on Professional Ministry and the Annual Conference.

(6) Joint Committee on Disability [Par. 743, Discipline]

Membership: Five members consisting of the Chairperson and Registrar of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry (or two other representatives elected by the Board of Ordained Ministry); the Chairperson and Secretary of the Conference Board of Pensions (or two other representatives elected by the Board of Pensions); and a District Superintendent. The Committee shall elect its own officers.

Responsibilities: The Conference Joint Committee on Disability shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 743 of the Discipline and perform those functions and responsibilities assigned to it by the Council on Professional Ministry and the Annual Conference.

e. <u>Conference Council on Finance and Administration (CFA)</u> [Par. 707-716, Discipline]

Membership: 15 members (with at least 1 more lay member than clergy members). Any ad-interim vacancy shall be filled by the CFA, in consultation with the Conference Nominating Committee. The Bishop; Cabinet representative; Director of CCOM and the Conference Treasurer shall be ex-officio members without vote. Any member of the General Council on Finance and Administration who resides within the bounds of the conference, with vote, unless voting membership is in conflict with another provision of the Book of Discipline, or this structure document, in which case their membership shall be without vote; in either case, they shall not be eligible Vice-President; Secretary and such other officers as it may deem necessary. The conference treasurer shall be the treasurer of the council. The treasurer shall not be eligible for voting membership on the council and shall not be eligible for election to any of those offices which are to be filled by voting members of the council.

Responsibilities: The CFA shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 709-716 of the Discipline. The apportionments to the districts recommended by CFA and adopted by the Annual Conference shall be apportioned to the local churches in accordance with Par. 711 of the Discipline. The United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas shall report to the CFA. The membership and functions of the United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas are prescribed by its charter and by-laws.

f. Conference United Methodist Women (UMW) [Par. 741, Discipline]

The Membership; officers, committees, functions, relationships and duties are as set forth in the Charter, Constitution and By-laws of the organization.

g. Conference United Methodist Men (UMM) [No Disciplinary requirement]

The membership; officers, committees, functions, relationships and duties are as set forth in the Charter, Constitution and By-laws of the organization.

h. Conference Council on Youth Ministries (CCYN) [Par. 742, Discipline]

The Membership; officers, committees, function, relationships and duties are as set forth in the Charter, Constitution and By-laws of the organization.

i. Conference Board of Trustees [Par. 2512-2515, Discipline]

Membership: 12 members [at least 4 of which shall be women], who must be of legal age as determined by law and of whom six shall be ministers in the effective relationship in the conference and six shall be lay members in good standing of local churches within the bounds of the conference. They shall be divided into three classes, each class serving a term of three years. They shall meet at least annually and organize by electing a president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer.

<u>Responsibility</u>: The Conference Board of Trustees shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 2512-2515 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Conference.

j. Commission on Archives and History [Par. 737, Discipline]

Membership: 9 members with at least 1 from each District.

Responsibility: The Conference Commission on Archives and History shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 737 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Conference.

k. Commission on the Status and Role of Women [Pasr. 740, Discipline]

Membership: Chairperson (who shall be a woman); I representative from each District; 6 at-large members (the additional at-large membership shall ensure that the total membership shall maintain the 1/3 laywomen, 1/3 laymen, and 1/3 clergy balance) (a majority of the members shall be women); a representative of Conference United Methodist Women; the CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

<u>Responsibility</u>: The Conference Commission on the Status and Role of Women shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 740 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Conference.

1. Commission on Religion and Race: [Par. 739, Discipline]

Membership: 12 persons with a majority of the membership being represented by racial and ethnic minorities, proportionately reflecting the racial and ethnic minority constituency of the conference. Steps should also be taken to ensure adequate representation of both young/young adults and women. Where districts have elected a

District Director of Religion and Race (or equivalent), that person shall serve on this Commission. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

Responsibility: The Conference Commission on Religion and Race shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 739 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Conference.

m. Conference Committee on Courtesies [No Disciplinary requirement]

Membership: Chairperson and the following ex-officio members: Dean of the Cabinet; CCOM Director and Associate Director(s); Conference Secretary; Conference Lay Leader; and the Conference President of United Methodist Women.

<u>Responsibility</u>: The Committee will introduce and present Institutional Representatives and other visitors of the Annual Conference as the Conference Agenda will allow. The Committee will present a closing resolution of appreciation to the Annual Conference.

n. <u>Committee on Parish and Community Development</u> [Par. 730.5, Discipline]

Membership: Chairperson (serves as a member of the Conference Council on Ministries); one representative from each District; the Secretary of the Church Extension Fund; the Secretary of the Loan Fund; the Director of Catch the Vision; and the Conference President of United Methodist Rural Fellowship (all of these with vote). The following members without vote (ex-officio): A representative of the Conference Board of Global Ministries; a Representative of the Commission on Equitable Salaries; any Church and Community Workers serving for the Conference in the Bounds of the Conference; and the CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area.

Responsibility: The Conference Committee on Parish and Community Development shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 730.5 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Conference. The entire membership of this Committee shall serve on the Committee on Area Director of Cooperative Parish Ministries with a like number of members from the Little Rock Conference, when such a Committee is required and operational.

o. <u>Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns</u> [Par.738,Discipline]

<u>Membership</u>: Chairperson; one representative from each District (which will be the District Coordinator for Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns [or equivalent]). The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member <u>without</u> vote.

<u>Responsibility</u>: The Conference Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 738 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Conference.

p. Committee on Episcopacy [Par. 734, Discipline]

Membership: Three laywomen; three laymen; three clergy persons; three additional persons to make possible the representation of racial and ethnic minorities, youth and young adults; three additional persons appointed by the Bishop [at least five of the fifteen persons shall be clergy]. One of the laypersons appointed shall be the Conference Lay Leader. The Committee shall meet at least annually. It shall be convened by the Bishop and shall elect a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, and a secretary. The bishop and/or the chairperson are authorized to call additional meetings when desired.

Responsibilities: The Conference Committee on Episcopacy shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 734 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Conference.

q. Episcopal Residence Committee (Arkansas Areas) [Par. 735, Discipline]

Membership: The Chairperson of the Episcopal Residence Committee shall be the Chairperson (or a representative of the Committee on Episcopacy of the Little Rock Conference; other members are the Chairperson (or his/her designate) from the Conference Committee on Episcopacy from the North Arkansas Conference; The Chairperson (or his/her designate) from the Conference Council on Finance and Administration from both the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conferences; The Chairperson (or his/her designate) from the Conference Board of Trustees from both the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conferences.

Responsibility: The Episcopal Residence Committee shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 735 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Conference.

r. Annual Conference Planning Committee [No Disciplinary requirement]

Membership: The Bishop (who shall be the Chairperson); the CCOM Director and Associate Directors; the District Superintendents; Host institution representative and/or host pastor; the Conference Secretary; the Chairperson of the Conference Committee on Worship; five persons from the Conference Council on Lay Life and Work (two laymen; two laywomen; and the Conference Lay Leader); three ethnic minority persons (if three are not already named; the Bishop shall have the authority to appoint persons to fill this quota).

Responsibility: The Annual Conference Planning Committee shall plan the agenda and entertainment of the Annual Conference; set the registration fees; recommend a budget for the operating expenses of the sessions; advise the Bishop on setting the dates of the Annual Conference; and those other duties and fuctions assigned to it by the Conference.

s. Committee on Investigations [Par. 2623.3 and 2623.4, Discipline]

Membership: (For investigation of Ministerial Member or Local Pastor) 7 elders in full connection nominated by the presiding bishop and elected by the Annual Conference. Three reserve members shall also be elected. None of the members or reserve members shall be members of the Joint Review Committee or Board of Ordained Ministry. (For investigation of Diaconal Ministers) Not less than 3 Diaconal Ministers nominated by the presiding bishop and elected by the Annual Conference. Two diaconal minister reserve members shall be elected. The Committee shall elect its own officers.

<u>Responsibilities</u>: The Conference Committee on Investigation shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 2623.3 and 2623.4 of the Discipline and perform those functions and responsibilities assigned to it by the Annual Conference.

SECTION V

- 8. Agencies of the Districts of The Annual Conference:
 - a. <u>District Committee on Nominations</u> [No Disciplinary requirement]

<u>Membership</u>: District Superintendent (who shall be the Chairperson); six members elected by the District Conference (3 lay and 3 clergy). Names of persons shall be placed in nomination from the floor of the District Conference. A class of two persons (1 lay and 1 clergy) shall be elected annually to a three year term.

Responsibilities: To nominate to the District Conference persons to fill all of the offices within the District and those District Members to Annual Conference agencies. To receive from the Churches/Charges of the District their nominees for offices within the District and Annual Conference. To forward to the Annual Conference Nominating Committee a listing of all persons nominated by the District Nominating Committee for offices within the Annual Conference. This listing will be forwarded during the last year of the quadrennium as requested by the Conference Nominating Committee. During the quadrennium the District may send in additions or deletions to the listing as changes in membership or circumstances may require.

b. The District Conference [Par. 744, 745, Discipline]

Membership:

[Clergy] All Clergy members of the Annual Conference (both active and retired) appointed to or residing within the bounds of the District.

[Lay] All lay persons residing within the bounds of the District who hold any elected or appointed offfice within the District; Annual Conference; Jurisdiction; or General Church. Any Diaconal Ministers; Deaconesses or Home Missionaries residing within the District. Lay Persons holding the following offices within the Churches/Charges of the District: Lay Member of Annual Conference; Lay Leader(s); Church School Superintendent; Presidents of UMW; UMM; UMY; Chairpersons of the Administrative Board or Council, Council on Ministries; and Committee on Finance; District Steward (if elected); an at-large older adult, young adult and youth, if not already included in the delegation. The District Superintendent shall be the presiding officer of the District Conference. Such other officers of the District Conference may be elected as may be required to accomplish its responsibilities.

Responsibilities: To receive and act on the report from the District Committee on Nominations; to receive and act on the reports from the District agencies; to adopt budgets for the District Administration, Missionary, Camp and Program needs. To receive a report from the District Superintendent on the "State of the District". To apportion the District financial needs to the Churches/Charges of the District using the same apportionment formula as that used by the Annual Conference. To furnish two copies of Journal of the District Conference to the Secretary of the Annual Conference. The District Conference shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 744-745 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Annual Conference.

c. District Council on Ministries [Par. 747, Discipline]

Membership: District Superintendent; District Lay Leader; Associate District Lay Leaders; District Director of Lay Speaking; Members of Annual Conference, urisdictional, and General Church agencies residing within the District; District Presidents of UMW, UMM, UMY; individuals having District responsibility in the following areas: Education, Stewardship, Worship, Global Ministries, Higher Education and Campus Ministry, Church and Society, Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns; Communications; Status and Role of Women; Religion and Race; Coordinators of Children, Youth, Young Adult, Older Adult, and Family Ministries; and Peace With Justice. The Council will elect its Chairperson and such other officers as it may determine are required to accomplish its responsibilities. The Council will elect one of its members (other than the Chairperson or District Superintendent) to be a member of the Conference Council on Ministries; this person shall be a layperson if t he DCOM chairperson is clergy and vice-versa. The DCOM may form Committees and Task Forces as needed. The District Superintendent, who shall not be the Chairperson, is the DCOM's executive officer, and shall be responsible for implementation of adopted programs.

Responsibilities: The District Council on Ministries shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 747 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Annual Conference and the District Conference.

d. District Committee on Ordained Ministry [Par. 749, Discipline]

Membership: The District Superintendent and five other members in full connection in the district, including women and ethnic clergy (when appointed or residing within the District), nominated annually to the Annual Conference by the Superintendent in consultation with the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry. Ad-interim vacancies may be filled by the District Superintendent. One of the five members shall be one of the District's members of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry. This Committee other officers as may be required to carry out its responsibilities.

Responsibilities: The District Committee on Ordained Ministry shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 749 of the Discipline and those asigned to it by the Annual Conference and the District Conference.

e. <u>District Board of Church Location and Building</u> [Par. 2518-2523, Discipline]

Membership: District Superintendent; three clergy and three laypersons. Nominated by the District Superintendent, in consultation with the District Nominating Committee, to the Annual Conference. The Board shall elect its own Chairperson and such other officers as may be required to carry out its responsibilities.

Responsibilities: The District Board of Church Location and Building shall perform t hose functions as defined in Par. 2518-2523 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Annual Conference and the District Conference.

f. District Board of Trustees [Par. 2517, Discipline]

Membership: Nine Members, at least three of which shall be women (all of whom s shall be laymembers meeting the same qualifications as Local Church Trustees). The Board shall elect its own Chairperson and such other officers as may be required to carry out its responsibilities.

Responsibilities: The District Board of Trustees shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 2517 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Annual Conference and the District Conference.

g. Committee on the District Superintendency [Par. 751, Discipline]

Membership: District Lay Leader; two laywomen; two laymen; two clergy; and two atlarge members nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the District Conference; two additional persons appointed by the District Superintendent; provided that at least three of the 11 members are clergy and seven are lay persons. The Bishop (or his/her authorized representative) shall be an ex-officio member of this Committee. The Committee shall elect its own Chairperson and such other officers as may be required to carry out its responsibilities.

<u>Responsibilities</u>: The Committee on the District Superintendency shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 751 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Annual Conference and the District Conference.

h. District United Methodist Women (UMW) [Par. 752, Discipline]

The Membership; officers, committees, functions, relationships and duties are as set forth in the Charter, Constitution and By-laws of the organization.

i. District United Methodist Men (UMM) [No Disciplinary requirement]

The Membership; officers, committees, functions, relationships and duties are as set forth in the Charter, Constitution and By-laws of the organization.

j. <u>District Council on Youth Ministries (DCYM)</u> [Par. 753, Discipline]

The Membership; officers, committees, functions, relationship and duties are as set forth in the Charter, Constitution and By-laws of the organization.

STANDING RULES OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

- 1. The number answering the question in the pastor's report to Annual Conference "Members reported last year" shall in every case be the number of members printed in the statistical tables of the Journal of the last Annual Conference [unless there was a typographical or printing error.]
- 2. The apportioned amounts arrived at by the use of the Conference decimal are to be accepted as the official apportionment.
- 3. The apportionment for World Service and Conference Benevolences will be combined in the statistical report; and, the amount paid will be the amount reported by the Conference Treasurer.

- 4. All statistical reports, after being checked for correctness by the District Superintendent and District auditors, shall be delivered by one of them to the Conference Statistician, within 31 days after the receipt of the final print out from the Conference Treasurer for the year just ended.
- 5. The District Superintendents are instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or of the District for insertion in the Conference Journal.
- 6. The expenses of the Annual Conference shall be paid by funds received from:
 - a. Registration fees, which shall be set by the Annual Conference Planning Committee;
 - b. Offerings received at the Annual Conference; and
 - c. If necessary, the Conference Administration Fund.


The expense of retired ministers, spouses, and surviving spouses shall be paid in keeping with the guidelines of the Annual Conference Planning Committee when the proper vouchers are presented. No registration fee shall be required of retired ministers, their spouses or surviving spouses.

- 7. A listing of lay members and their addresses elected as members of the Annual Conference by Charge Conferences shall be compiled by the district superintendents and set to the conference secretary at least 90 days prior to the opening of the session.
- 8. No one shall be eligible to serve on a board or commission more than one quadrennium past the quadrennium in which tenure in that elected position first began (unless tenure is otherwise prescribed by the Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church).
- 9. That part of the report of all councils, boards, commissions and other agencies of the conference which provides for changes in policy or makes recommendations, if not printed in the Pre-Conference Journal, shall be reproduced and distributed to the membership of the conference prior to the time scheduled for action in said report. Any Resolution not printed in the Pre-Conference Journal, or that is not presented as a formal action of a Board, Commission, Committee or Agency of the Annual Conference shall lie on the table overnight before being debated and voted on.
- Each Annual Conference session shall designate a moving date. Any exceptions to the designated date shall be agreed upon by the pastors involved.
- 11. No person shall be elected by the Annual Conference to serve on more than one (1) major Boad, Committee, Commission, Agency, etc, at any one time. This does not affect ex-officio positions or the Conference Committee on Episcipacy. [Major Boards, Committees, Commissions and Agencies are defined and listed in the Conference Journal]
- 12. All councils, boards, committees, and commissions of the Annual Conference shall be more representative. Special consideration should be given to the use of women and youth, full-time local pastors, and ethnic minority groups.
- 13. No person shall serve as an elected trustee of more than one United Methodist related institution of the Arkansas Area at a time. No one who by virtue of their office would be an ex-officio trustee, shall serve as an elected trustee of the same agency.

14. Each year the Conference Council on Ministries will determine the number of additional lay persons, if any, to be named as members of the Annual Conference. Lay Delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conference and chairpersons of major boards and councils, as defined in the Journal under the heading "Major Boards of the Annual Conference' (this does not include related committees, subcommittes, Task Forces and boards), will be named by the Conference Council on Ministries as Lay Members At-Large. Persons already serving as lay members from local churches or by virtue of Discipline requirement will be excluded from those named.

When additional lay members are required to equalize representation, the Council on Ministries will notify each District Council on Ministries of the number of persons, if any, to be named, encouraging them to use the following formula with top priority to be give to Number 1, etc:

- 1. Ethnic minority and small membership churches.
- 2. Elected chairpersons of conference boards and agencies not included above.
- 3. Officers of the Conference Council on Lay Life and Work,
- Conference officers of United Methodist Women; United Methodist Men; and Conference Council on Youth Ministries residing within the bounds of a district.
- 5. Elected lay persons to general and jurisdictional conference board and agencies.
- District presidents of United Methodist Women; United Methodist Men and United Methodist Youth Fellowship.
- 7. Lay members of conference boards and agencies.
- 8. One additional youth from each district.
- 9. United Methodist students being served by campus ministers.
- 10. At-large district representation.
- 15. Pastors who are to move following appointment changes at the Annual Conference shall not receive any of the June compensation from the charge which they are leaving; thus the conference appointive year and pay period shall be June 1-May 31.
- 16. Motions requesting or requiring expenditure of Annual Conference funds, which are not included in the proposed budget submitted by the Conference Council on Finance and Administration (CFA) shall first be referred to CFA who will study the proposal and report back to the Annual Conference as to where the funding would have to come from and how that would impact the overall Conference budget.
- 17. Each agency of The Annual Conference will keep records of attendance at its respective meetings. After one year, a conference agency shall be authorized to declare a vacancy in membership because of non-attendance. Once a vacancy is declared, the person shall be notified and the chairperson of the Conference Committee on Nominations shall be notified immediately.
- 18. The financial records of each District will be audited at the end of each calendar year. The results of those audits will be forwarded to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration no later than July 31 of each year.
- 19. "Roberts Rules of Order" and Parliamentary Procedures at a Glance by O. Garfield Jones" shall be the procedural authority for the Annual Conference when not in conflict with The Discipline of The United Methodist Church.
- Any proposal to change the Standing Rules shall lie on the table overnight, and then its passage shall requrie a 3/4 vote of those present and voting.

Survivors include his wife, Floella Porter Gaither; two daughters, Debra Gaither and Diana Gaither Garner, both of Little Rock; and two brothers Gerald Gaither and Harold Gaither, both of Batesville.

Funeral services were conducted at the Central Avenue United Methodist Church by Rev. Roger Hook, Rev. Joe Kennedy and Rev. Lloyd Conyers.

Something of his contribution to the church was lifted up by the Rev. Joe Kennedy. He was an effective youth leader in his local church as a lay person, highly respected by the youth. He was an associate lay leader of the conference, District Lay leader for seven years, and Lay Leader at Central Avenue United Methodist Church for two years. He was also delegate to Jurisdictional Conference in 1972, 1976 and 1980 and a member of the North Arkansas Conference from 1974-1981. He was also a member of the Conference Council on Ministries in 1975 and 1981, a member of the Conference Board of Discipleship three years, a member of the Conference Committee on Nominations for three years, Secretary of the Conference Council on Lay Life and Work in 1978 and a member of the Conference Committee on Personnel for two years. He served Sharp United Methodist Church for 10 years, six as lay speaker and four as part-time local pastor. He was currently working on his conference course of study at St. Paul's School of Theology at Kansas City.

The Rev. Lloyd Conyears said of the Sharp church, "They wanted no better minister than Marvin because he was a most effective lay pastor." Interment was at the Campground Cemetery at Bathesda.

REV. BRADY COOK

The Rev. Brady Cook was born on October 25, 1911 at Emmet, Arkansas. He was the son of Thomas Lee and Bessie Brady Cook.

Brady was reared in a very devout Christian home where the family met together each evening for devotions. The attending of worship services, Sunday School and Wednesday evening prayer services were a part of Christian living.



The Cook home was also a place of music. The parents thought that singing was a vital part of every Christian's life. One of the favorite activities in the evenings was sitting together as Brady played the

piano. From this experience in the home, a family trio was born consisting of Brady and his two sisters. They, the Cook trio, sang in churches, high schools and other area events. Their singing extended into several surrounding states where they sang in revivals, retreats, camp meetings and annual conferences; and finally their singing became an open door to college in their denominational school where they were given scholarships. This was an answer to prayer because college for the Cook family was an impossibility during the depression years.

Brady was born and reared in the Methodist Protestant Church, where he was ordained as an elder in 1939, shortly before the uniting and the formation of the Methodist Church.

He was converted at the age of 10 and felt God's call into the ministry as a young teenager. His entire theme from the time he accepted Christ was Evangelism. His personal desire was to live like Christ and encourage others to come to know him. Some of his most joyous experiences were shared in churches which were growing spiritually and materially. His most effective work was with youth. A number of young people became ministers or went into other fields of Christian service under his leadership.

He served in th following pastorates during his 43 1/2 years of active ministry: Fourth Street in Rector, Grand Avenue in Fort Smith, Gentry, Greenwood, Dardanelle, Griffin Memorial in Paragould, Beebe, West Helena and one year in Augusta where he retired in 1981.

He often said his most rewarding work was the five years which he spent as Conference Evangelist, an appointment assigned to him by Bishop Paul E. Martin in 1951. His work was not confined to the conference. He and his sister, Irene, worked in eight different states where he preached and did youth work, part time music director in 129 revivals. Irene worked with children and sang special music. The last year and one half of his time was spent in Evangelism work, he served as secretary of the National Methodist Board of Evangelism. He was forced to resign from the Evangelism program due to the illness and death of his mother. He went back into the work of the pastorate which was also a first love with him. He also served on various boards and committees of the North Arkansas Conference.

After retirement in 1981, he moved to Fort Smith, and became active in First United Methodist Church where he taught Sunday School classes and served in capacities where needed. He was one of the three teachers of the Aldersgate class where he served until he had to resign because of ill health. He also filled the pulpit for other area pastors when they had to be away.

He went home to be with the Lord on August 26, 1987 after a progressive heart condition. He had told family and friends that he was tired and ready to go. As he was dying he was whispering words to those of us who stood around his bed, which we could not understand. I like to think that he could have been quoting the words which the Apostle Paul spoke to Timothy shortly before his departure: "For I am now ready to be offered and the time of my departure is at hand. I have fought the good fight, I have finished the course. I have kept the faith henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give to me at that day and not to me only, but to all those who love his appearing. (II Timothy 4:6-8)

He is survived by two sisters, Miss. Irene Cook and the Rev. Fern Cook of Fort Smith.

The funeral service was held in the Roebuck Chapel in First United Methodist Church on August 28 with Dr. Ben Hines, Rev. Keith Goza, Rev. J.M. Rogers and Rev. Raymond Hawkins officiating. Active and honorary pallbearers were members of the Aldersgate Class. A second service was held in the United Methodist Church at Emmet, conducted by Rev. Wayne Jarvis and Rev. J.E. Callicott. Pallbearers were high school classmates and cousins. Burials was in Snell Cemetary at Emmet.

DR. YRA A. BRUMLEY

Ira Allen Brumley, the son of Walter Daniel and Elizabeth Rice Brumley was born near Bono, Craighead County, Arkansas on September 4, 1894.

He began his career when he was 13 years old by representing his church in a county Sunday School Convention. When he was 16 years old he taught a training class for a group of Methodists and Presbyterians. He attended a small town school through the 8th grade. At age 16, he entered Hendrix College Academy, and at age 22, he graduated from Hendrix College having completed



both his high school and college work. His leadership ability was evidenced by the fact that during his senior year at Hendrix College he was editor of a monthly publication, captain of the track team, president of the Harland Literary Society, head waiter of the dining hall, assistant in the chemistry laboratory, orator of the year and held other leadership positions.

After graduation he entered the ministry of the North Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South and served three and one-half years before going on to graduate school.

He married Miss Mary Cureton on November 3, 1920 and they moved to Dallas, Texas to attend Southern Methodist University School of Religion. (Now Perkins School of Theology.) He graduated from this school 21 months later.

Dr. Brumley returned to the North Arkansas Conference and served as pastor of the First United Methodist Church, Springdale and Gardner Memorial Church in North Little Rock before being elected as Executive Secretary of the Board of Christian Education of the North Arkansas Conference in March of 1932. He served in this position until his retirement in 1967. He also served eight months as superintendent of the Conway district in 1944 and taught one semester at Hendrix College in 1951.

Upon retirement, he became supply pastor the Salem Methodist Church in Conway, where he served 5 years, building a fellowship hall and making other property improvements. The fellowship hall was named for Dr. Brumley.

During his pastorate at Salem, he served two days a week for 18 months as educational consultant for the First United Methodist Church in Little Rock.

Dr. Brumley was honored by the North Arkansas Conference twice and three times by the Conway district. In 1950 Hendrix College honored him with a doctorate degree. In 1983 he was selected as a Distinguished Alumnus of Hendrix College and in 1984, Hendrix established the Ira and Mary Brumley Christian Education Fund, from which an award will be made annually.

Dr. Brumley served on the Board of Trustees of Hendrix College for 26 years, on the Board of Trustees of Southern Methodist University for 22 years, on the Board of Education of the United Methodist Church for 16 years and was on the curriculum committee for four years. He was a representaive of the Methodist Church at the organizing Convention of the National Council of Churches of Christ in 1950. He attended five world conferences: Oslo, Norway; Amsterdam, Holland; Toronto, Canada, Oxford, England; and Lake Junaluska, North Carolina.

In 1959-1960 Dr. Brumley initiated and promoted a campaign for a half million dollars to build six Wesley Foundation Centers at state schools in Arkansas.

Dr. Brumley, 92, died August 28, 1987 at the Heritage Center in Conway. His burial was in the Oak Grove Cemetery. Funeral services were held in the First United Methodist Church in Conway, officiated by Revs. Tom Weir, Jim Beal, and Charles Lewis.

JAMES W. KROHN

James W. Krohn was born October 28, 1916 at Watonga, Oklahoma and died January 19, 1988 in the Johnson County Regional Hospital, Clarksville. He is survived by his wife, Betty; two daughters, Margaret Taverner of Little Rock, and Janie Chappell of Clarksville; two sons, John Krohn of College Station, Texas and James F. Krohn of Clarksville; one brother, Grover Krohn of Leesburg, Florida; one sister, Louisa Krohn of Marshall, Texas and eight grandchildren.
