E. BISHOP'S ADDRESS AND DAILY PROCEEDINGS

a. Bishop's Address North Arkansas Annual Conference June 5, 1989

An Annual Conference is a unique critter. We are not a convention; we're not an assembly, not a church legislature. In many respects we're a family.

The preachers have no local church membership, but belong to the Annual Conference -- offering in return their joy in service wherever they are appointed. It is their spiritual home. Laity represent local churches as spiritual advisors, friends, with a willingness to receive their appointed pastors. So it's a very special group of people who come together.

Our business is to see what we can do collectively that we cannot do individually. Since we are family, the strong help the weak, in establishing new congregations, providing minimum support to modest congregations, helping each other with insurance, preachers, pensions and emergency aid.

Together we support our institutions: Arkansas can be extremely grateful for splendid colleges under the brilliant leadership of Dr. Joe Hatcher at Hendrix and Dr. Myer Titus at Philander Smith. They are literally leading the way in the education field in the United Methodist Church. SMU, under Dr. Kenneth Pye, is refreshingly alive and vibrant. Our Methodist Hospital System flourishes, guided by John Casey and Reverend Bob Howerton in Memphis and Hank Walkley in Jonesboro. The Children's Home, headed by Reverend Bob Orr, is ministering to troubled youth in changing times. Mr. John Blundell draws national attention to Aldersgate and its work with ill, handicapped, and/or abused children and youth. Mt. Sequoyah has doubled its participation and dramatically improved its facilities under Don and Constance Waddell.

<u>Together</u> we can do great things. Time would not allow us to look at our world participation in United Methodist ministries. But a symbol of world wide connection is the new United Methodist University in Zimbabwe. The African bishops are ecstatic. They say it will impact the South Central Africa and will impact the future as ministers, doctors, and business people, civil servants, and teachers come out of that University.

As you know, Julia and I were privileged to make an official Episcopal Visitation to the Republic of Korea in September. America sent troops to Korea in the early 50's to preserve her freedom. The Methodist Church sent missionaries into the ravages of a war-torn country to offer them Christ - and schools, hospitals, and agricultural stations and new churches. The Holy Spirit moved into a spiritual vacuum so that Korean Methodism now numbers over a million people and is sending missionaries and preachers all over the world, even to Arkansas.

So we are together as family -- soul brothers and sisters in the Wesleyan heritage, knitted together by our vows and commitments, our history and heritage, and, perhaps most important of all, our dreams of ministry and service in the days ahead. We have one driving question. "Together, how much can we do for God?"

Part I - DISCIPLESHIP

I want to focus on three areas of church life this morning. Discipleship - the itinerancy, our professional ministry - and the issues of our society.

First, our obedience to the command of our Lord to make disciples, baptizing

and teaching. How are we doing?

You can imagine how thrilled I was to observe the North Arkansas Conference have a net gain in 1987 - the first in sixteen years. We fell back into the loss column again last year, but 1989 seems strong so far.

Pastors are relearning how to reach the unchurched. Lay Christians are rediscovering how to witness, how to invite, how to teach. The <u>Disciple</u> and <u>Trinity</u> Bible studies are powerful tools for renewal. I respectively ask each congregation to enter into the <u>Disciple</u> plan within the next two years as a dramatic way of rediscovering the Word of God amid the intimacy of Christian fellowship. Churches that are really alive are including several unchurched people in the <u>Disciple</u> groups.

This foundation undergirds the Sunday School, the pre-schools, the Vacation Bible Schools, the Youth programs, the adult classes. You cannot have good church schools without good teachers, and you need Biblical, theological and practical

training.

We're on the brink! Lab schools are filling up again. So are teacher training workshops. District Superintendents are offering themselves as resources. So is the Conference staff. What we are striving for is a revitalized Christian Education. With the spiritual vacuum in our schools, with the breakdown of our homes, we must do everything we can to see that every Christian from six weeks to ninety-six years is in some form of Christian education.

I am delighted that our Sunday School grew.

Forty-five churches were FIVE STAR churches.

Pastors expecting advancement of responsibility must have lay leadership

development and vital Sunday Schools.

You can take great satisfaction in your dream of new church extension. The Catch the Vision program you have developed is one of the best in the United States. I hope everyone in this room has agreed to give \$60.00 upon call each year. You have watched the North Pulaski Church become self supporting. You have launched Grace, Rogers into a vital church. You have initiated work at St. Andrews, Fort Smith, and Good Shepherd in Sherwood, North Little Rock, where 100 people worship respectively each Sunday. Two Korean churches, Hanmaum in Springdale and the Korean Methodist Church in Jacksonville, agressively reach out to Korean speaking people in Arkansas.

We are appointing two fine pastors to launch in new territories, to lead the Massard and New Hope in Fort Smith to consider relocating in East Fort Smith and

to start new work in the Scott area of Bella Vista.

With population shifts, we must agressively explore Conway, Russellville, Mountain Home, Bentonville, and other areas as we prepare to enter the next decade.

Our statistics can be read in different ways. My Dad used to say figures don't lie, but liars can figure.

On one hand we baptized 1220 people - 44 more than last year. On the other hand, we buried 1417 people; that's 197 more than we baptized.

Our Sunday Schools grew by nearly 400 in average attendance, but our confirmation classes were down by nearly 200.

Total membership declined by 532.

Let me appeal to you faity----

Get out of your mind the worldly values - we want a bigger church. We want to be as big as the Baptists. We need more members to help pay our bills.

Put into your minds the Godly values. Is every child receiving Christian training? Has every man and woman been invited to our fellowship? Do we have new ministries that would attract the unchurched? Are we praying daily for converts? Can we help begin a new congregation? Does our pastor need help in confirmation training? How can we reach youth for Jesus Christ?

We will not be satisfied until every church has a conversion. We will not let up until we baptize more souls than we bury. We will be unrelenting that we open our doors to the poor, the disenfranchised, the black, the young, the newcomer within our gates.

During my ministry in Arkansas, I dream of a resurgence of enthusiasm, a growing church school, a youth ministry, and an expanding membership of our churches.

PART II - THE APPOINTMENT MAKING PROCESS

For better or worse, we live under an appointive style of ministry. I am assigned, and every United Methodist pastor is assigned. The bishop, with the advice of the cabinet, hearing through a consultative process with pastors and staff or Pastor Parish Committees, annually assign each member of the Conference and each local pastor to her or his charge.

Across the years, the process has evolved. In early days, young men on horseback were assigned by the bishop to whole territories - Kentucky - or Missouri - or Arkansas. When preachers were ineffective or became worn out, tired, or sick, they were located. So were they if they got married, for they were encumbered by a family and considered unable to itinerate. There was no shortage of settlements in which to preach.

Now things are different. Ministers, both men and women, often have strings tied to their appointments: the job of a spouse, the education of children, the care of parents, the health and welfare of a family member — all are legitimate concerns, but they restrict freedom to itinerate. An oft unspoken restriction is the reluctance to receive a drop in salary.

The laity, on the other hand, are becoming increasingly involved. They are properly consulted by way of the Pastor Parish Committees through the district superintendent. For several years now we have been receiving large numbers of members from other denominations. Some of these fine Christians expect congregational votes, or church-wide meetings to discuss the pastor. Or they would

like to send a group of people to visit with the superintendent or bishop. That action violates our **Discipline** and our proper process. Help your people know that our consultation is only and always through the Pastor Parish Relations Committee. The Lay Member of the Conference is a member of that committee, hopefully, also, so is the lay leader, providing excellent linkage.

More and more, through the consultative process, committees are properly encouraging their pastor throughout the year, making and achieving mutual goals, affirming strengths, pointing out weaknesses, helping the pastor receive additional training, rest, or spiritual enrichment. More and more committees are developing a profile of expectation when a change of pastors seems appropriate.

This year was the best ever for consultation. We were able to have 20% fewer moves and most moves went smoothly.

Two or three hitches occurred, however.

In some committees, a vote was taken, and it was felt that that vote was determinative — in other words, for example, a 5 to 4 vote or a 6 to 3 vote for the pastor to move or stay, thinking that decided the matter. We do not recommend a vote at all, for it is a judgment call that should try to reach both the will of God and the mood of the Church. But, whether a consensus or a vote, the action is still advisory; the Bishop with the advice of the cabinet must finally decide what seems to be in the best interests of the church and the pastor.

In the same manner, it is an unwise pastor who says in the Spring - "I'm moving", or "I'm staying". A Methodist pastor has more appropriate words to say, such as "I am requesting to stay" or "I'm under evaluation". Some pastors burn their bridges, forgetting there may be no place for them to go.

The hardest thing to explain is both our glory and our difficulty. When I read the appointments for the North Arkansas Conference and the Little Rock Conference (incidently, we are forced more and more to think of the entire state - and beyond - in appointment matters) - When the appointments are read, every church, every church, no matter how small, will have a pastor. Several people are asking for ministry -- elders from other states, pastors from other denominations, lay persons wishing to be local pastors -- and we do not, this year, have room for them.

Recently I talked with a Presbyterian executive who said his system works only when 10% to 20% of their churches are without a pastor -- it allows the system to call and respond.

Our system is more like musical chairs -- and every chair is full. A pastor cannot move until a church is open and a church is not open until a pastor moves. The informal kitchen cabinet cannot understand this because they usually leave someone out, making things a lot easier. To make our system work we sometimes need a pastor who should not move. That upsets everybody, including me. But to use a simple, hypothetical illustration:

Here is a pastor with responsibility for 600 souls, who, after 8 years, is moving. Here is a pastor of 200 souls, who after 6 years, is ready for a new challenge. But the responsibility jump is great, maybe too great, the salary increase is large, the morale of the conference is shaken. What to do? Here is a pastor right in between - 400 souls, with good experience - the salary in between -

but who is in her or his third year - a unanimous vote of the P.P.R. Committee requests no move - has assumed he or she will stay.

This year, more than ever before, P.P.R. Committees objected when that change was made, even though it never was done without the pastor's approval.

So, to modify our system even more, we are going to:

- a) avoid such situations as often as we can, moving pastors with longer tenure even if it means significantly larger churches.
- b) notify immediately the P.P.R. Committee if an unexpected move is being considered, and
- c) allowing the P.P.R. Committee more time to reflect and prepare a profile of their needs before a new appointment is made.

All this is difficult, because often a series of appointments - 10 or 12 - must all be made together. To paraphrase Benjamin Franklin - "They hang together" or fall together. But we are determined to try.

No conference has ever been blessed with finer, more caring superintendents.

During the coming year, I'm asking them to do two things specifically. Spend more time with the pastors, less time in committee meetings; more time with the churches, listening, and less time prreaching. Like the Conference Staff, I want them to be available to you, to help you start a Fisherman's Club, carry teachers to a Sunday School training workshop; study a city to dream in a new congregation. Their goal will be to help every pastor succeed, every appointment to work well, and every church to flourish.

And second, and this I want to say very heavily to the pastors, I'm asking superintendents to form cluster groups of all pastors. We have worked alone too long. We have walked lonely vigils too long. It is time we became a fellowship once again, to meet regularly for prayer, for Bible Study -- not just to hand out mimeograph sheets (I've been on both sides of that), but to have a time of sharing and fellowship.

Do you realize it is a precious gift of Christ that we would have not only the strength from the scriptures and the sacraments, but that we would have each other. Please, please, help us to do that. Satan is destroying a minister here, a minister there, tearing up a family, driving competitive wedges within the fellowship, causing pride and jealousy -- who's serving what church - and that has to be overcome by a sweet spirit of cooperation. Homes are at stake, spiritual morale is involved, and fellowship is essential.

Help us build a ministry with the same type of Koinonia we covet for every Christian.

A word about women in ministry. Folks, it's here. No longer is it coming. It is here! No longer is it acceptable for a church to say, "Don't send us a woman preacher."

I haven't done what one of my bishop friends has done. He said to the Pastor Parish Committee, "If you make that request, please put that in writing so that the civil suit will be directed to you."

I believe with all my heart that God needs all God's people. The work is so huge. The task of Kingdom building is so great, we need us all, and the Lord needs us all. One third of all of our seminary students in the United Methodist

seminaries are women; half in my own seminary. We have been asked by the Episcopal Committee, and actually I am more eager than they, to have a woman superintendent as soon as possible.

We need women pastors in our largest congregations. We're having some of our strongest and finest leadership given by women. Each of you go back to your home church, and you are on your Pastor-Parish. Men and women are called by God to preach. I feel so strongly because our two daughters are in a form of ministry, and believe you me, God gave them some special gifts that are reaching people for Christ and the Church. Women are in ministry, and they will be in every level of our denomination.

PART III- THE ISSUES OF OUR SOCIETY

A word about the hymnal. We are going to have the greatest liturgical renewal that our Church has seen in a half of a century. The new hymnal is so exciting! You can sing "We're Climbing Jacob's Ladder" or "A Mighty Fortress is Our God" or "There's A Sweet, Sweet Spirit In This Place" or "Precious Lord, Take My Hand". It's all there! And you can sing and sing and sing and sing and sing. And I hope that some of you will blow the three hymns and a prayer right out of the saddle.

Sing, sing, and sing again. And I hope you will start singing on Sunday nights, and I hope you will start singing around the piano, and I hope you'll sing in your homes. I hope the young people will sing, and I hope the children will sing, and I hope the Methodists will once again be a "singing people".

The morning news reminds us that we are in a changing world. China is struggling with democracy; when Russia is referring to God and passing out Bibles - when Koreans are sending missionaries all over the world.

A renewal of the things we hold deepest is happening all over the world. Christianity and Christian principals are swelling up. Every person is a child of God. People believe that. Freedom comes when Christ breaks the sin-hold on a human life. Life has meaning when it's shared. And so, how do we live out our faith?

I can't get a better handle on it than to think of our own discipleship and our own intensity. In your pre-schools, teach as much of the Gospel as you can. Don't farm that out to somebody down the street. In your Mom's Day Out, teach your little ones as much as you can. In your Vacation Church Schools, laugh and play and help young people know that Christ came to give the abundant life. And ask everybody to come to your Vacation Bible School - the greatest way for the small and the rural church to reach the unchurched.

Open your church for tutoring. The library in your church for young people to read. Volunteers in the jail to do tutoring. Both <u>Trinity</u> and <u>Disciple</u> are moving into some of the prisons.

<u>Pray</u> for better schools in Arkansas. The critical issue in Arkansas in the public sector is <u>schools</u>. <u>Pray for the schools</u>, <u>pay for the schools</u>. Let the Methodist Church demand higher pay for teachers - better classrooms - better colleges - stronger education! <u>And we don't need a lottery to do it!</u>

Now this final word about young people. I've been asked by the Lay Life and Work Committee to say something that I believe strongly. Most of you are not dying of illegal drugs. Few alcoholics are in this room. Many of you have been saved from

diseases, chemical abuse, alcohol, tobacco usage because when you were twelve years old, someone told you that the body is the Temple of the Holy Spirit - Somebody shared with you that Jesus Christ could lead you into an abundant life where you did not need alcohol or tobacco or - we didn't know so much about drugs in those days, but now we do.

Who's going to tell our twelve-year olds if you don't tell them? Who's going to show the way if you do not abstain? Who is going to offer to the youth of America a sober, clean, traditionally Methodist life, free from alcohol, tobacco and chemical abuse if you don't do it?

Who is going to proclaim it, publicly and personally? Should the surgeon general of the United States be more excited than the Methodist preacher? Should we have to look - and I praise God for him - for him to be the evangelist to our society on drunk driving? An advertising of alcohol where, as he put it, the athletes and the movie stars teach our young people that it is sexually and socially wise and prominent to drink.

I ask your churches to take as a great mission field the youth of America. Not the youth of your church - that's not big enough. The youth of your town - the youth of your community - the youth as far as you can count them. Put some money in it; hire some youth workers; bring some college kids back for the summer and help your youth program. Take your finest lay people off your administrative board, off your Pastor Parish Committee, and have them become youth workers and teachers.

Every Methodist preacher ought to be working in a youth camp. Where did we get the idea that once you're 35 you no longer have an impact on young people?

Oh, listen, you are going to be discussing Outdoor Ministries, and that decision is yours and how you go about it. But I don't know how many teen-agers there are in the Northern half of Arkansas, but every one of them needs Jesus Christ.

And if the people called Methodist can't do it, then we ought to go out of business.

Folks, I have never been so excited about the ministry of the Church; I've never been so excited about the Christian community around the world. I believe that God is whispering to us today, that He has brought us to this hour for a very, very special purpose, and that He expects the North Arkansas Conference to be a powerhouse in the days ahead.

Peters presented Question #54.a. These were approved.

Waymon Hollis moved the adoption of the Board of Ordained Ministry report #1 as perfected. This was done.

Jim West requested that the Board review the procedures through which ministers from other denominations are recognized as Local pastors with Deacons orders.

PRIVILEGE: Joe Kennedy asked that the Conference express its concern to Norm Moyer, Frank Warden, and Kim Cloninger who have lost parents in recent days.

At 10:30 p.m. Bishop Wilke adjourned the Executive ADJOURNMENT. Session with prayer.

SECOND DAY---Monday Morning Session JUNE 5, 1989

The Conference assembled at 8:15 a.m. for Worship. Bill Wilder was the preacher. Carol Goddard was the liturgist. Conference organist was Diana Faas Brandon.

Bishop Wilke convened the Conference at 8:48 a.m.

ORGANIZATION OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

RULES OF ORDER: Charles Watt presented the rules of order.

Watt moved the bar of the Conference be the lower floor of the auditorium. It was done.

Watt introduced the Secretarial Staff: Suze Anderson, Philip Hathcock, Jerry Pulliam, Martha Watt, Steve Johnson, Terri Gregory, David Hanshaw. These were elected.

Those desiring the floor of the Conference shall be within the Bar of the Conference and will move to a microphone and when recognized by the Chair will state their name, local church or area of responsibility.

To vote and have your vote counted, you must:

- 1. be within the Bar of the Conference and be seated.
- 2. have your name tag where it can be seen by the teller.
- Lay Members may vote on all matters except ordination Note: a) Conference relations, and clergy delegates to General Jurisdictional Conference.
 - Local Full Time Local Probationary, Associate, Pastors: may vote on all matters except Constitutional b) amendments, election of General and Jurisdictional Conference delegates, and matters of ordination and ministerial relations.
 - c) Part Time and Student Local Pastors: Privilege of the floor without vote.
 - d) Full Members: may vote on all matters except the election of Lay delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences.

Motions shall be on the form supplied by the Conference Secretary and shall be handed to a page to be brought to the Secretary's table immediately. All motions shall be signed and legible.

Debate on each motion shall be limited to three two-minute speeches for the motion and three two-minute speeches against the motion (excluding persons rising to points of order, amendments, or final summation). A timer shall be used to measure debate at the discretion of the Chair.

All resolutions and reports not printed in the Pre-Conference Journal shall be legibly written in duplicate, and shall be in the hands of the Conference Secretary and Presiding Officer before such can be considered by the Conference. Any material which is not in the hands of the Conference Secretary within two days of the close of the Conference session may be omitted from the Conference Journal.

The Annual Conference sessions shall be governed by the Standing Rules, otherwise Roberts Rules of Order; all of which shall comply with the Discipline of the United Methodist Church.

Watt moved adoption of the rules. It was done.

Watt moved the agenda as printed. This was adopted.

Roll call procedures were announced.

WELCOME: Joe Hatcher welcomed the Conference to Hendrix College. Mayor Kinley welcomed the Conference to Conway.

BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY REPORT #1: Gerald Rainwater brought the report and perfected it. (See BUSINESS OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE) He then brought the report from the Executive Session. Those persons coming into the Conference were presented. These were greeted by the Conference.

STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN. Marie Jordan presented the report and introduced members of the Commission (see REPORTS). Jordan recognized the clergywomen and clergy couples. Jordan recognized the Laywomen members of the Conference. It was adopted.

RELIGION AND RACE: Joe Hughes perfected the report of the Commission on Religion and Race. (see REPORTS) Hughes moved the report, and it was adopted.

The Conference reconvened at 10:02 a.m.

Amendment was adopted.

Bill Cheyne moved to amend part IV to read that only the total budget figure of \$54,500 be approved by the North Arkansas Conference and that the Committee on Outdoor Ministries be instructed to make a more equitable distribution of Conference funds among the regional camps, including a more equitable salary provision for regional camp managers.

Amendment was adopted.

Jim West moved to amend the "Recommendations" section (II.2.d) to delete the sentence beginning "It is our assumption that..."

The amendment failed.

The Outdoor Ministries report is before us. It is adopted.

C.C.D.M GOAL: Nixon spoke of the 1990 Goal, "Celebrate God's Grace: Witness for Jesus Christ Through Global Dutreach." Nixon perfected the report and introduced Barbara Ihne and Max Marble to speak to this emphasis.

AMENDMENT: Ruth McNeill moved to delete 1) "and call for an end to" and to delete the entirety of 2.

MOTION: Max Whitfield asked that the amendment be divided. Without objection it will be done.

Deletion of "and call for an end to" fails. Deletion of "a return to the rule of law." prevails. Deletion of "Reconciliation of the parties..." fails.

The resolution was adopted.

RESOLUTION: Jarvis brought the resolution concerning the use of Biodegradable Plastics (see RESOLUTIONS).

AMENDMENT: Charles Cooper moved to amend by adding that we will refrain from using styrofoam cups at Annual Conference. The amendment is adopted.

AMENDMENT: Mark McDonald moved to delete "upwards of five", "American," "last summer....Europe," and add "in the U.S. and abroad. Delete the last three "Whereas" sections. And amend to read "the Conference stands firmly in support of legislation banning or limiting the use of plastic products, calls for further research into better biodegradable plastic products, calls for the passage and enforcement of state and federal legislation that mandates the use of biodegradable plastics, asks all individuals to prayerfully consider using only biodegradable plastics, wherever possible, as a witness to one's Christian stewardship."

POINT OF ORDER: Vaughn Marsden asked if this constitutes a substitute motion. The chair rules that the question is before us, regardless.

The amendment is adopted.

The amendment is adopted.

COURTESIES: Charles Casteel brought the courtesies resolution. This was received.



Planning process adopted June 1985

- Part 1 -- Evaluation and General Planning -- February. The CCOM meeting will concentrate on evaluating the previous year's programs and goals. New objectives will be selected for presentation to the Annual Conference. A partial list of program ideas will be included in the presentation to demonstrate how the goals and objectives can be accomplished. Budget figures will be assigned to Conference Goals rather than to specific programs. A detailed budget will be adopted at the CCOM's Fall Meeting.
- Part 2 Action of the Annual Conference June. The CCOM will present a report to the Annual Conference showing how the past year's goals and objectives have been achieved and which programs enable those accomplishments. Goals, budgets and possible programs for the coming year will then be presented for revision and adoption.
- Part 3 -- Program Suggestions -- June-October. Following Annual Conference, the CCOM will solicit program ideas from local churches, DCOM's, Boards and Agencies, as avenues for accomplishing the adopted goals and objectives of the Annual Conference.
- Part 4 - Program Adopted - November. Suggestions from the various churches, districts and boards will then be presented and reviewed by the CCOM. Specific programs will then be selected which will best accomplish the Conference Goals, and specific budgets will be adopted for individual programs, within the limits set by the Annual Conference.
- Part 5 - Goal Suggestions - Nevember-February. The CCOM will solicit ideas for Conference Objectives from local churches, DCOM's, Boards and Agencies. These ideas will be collated and presented to the CCOM for review at the Evaluation-Planning meeting in February.

If this were added to the Discipline it would be a new number 8 to Para. 726.7b.


The following statements are understood to be implicit with the new assignment:

- 1. Annual Conference activities of agencies/institutions shall be placed on the Conference calendar as early as possible.
- It is acknowledged that more than one activity can be scheduled for the same day and hour without serious conflict to any of the agencies involved.
- 3. The Council Director shall recommend that an activity/event/meeting not be held at a particular time if it would be close enough to another to have a

negative effect on the previously scheduled one. The Council Director shall negotiate with the agency/institution for another, acceptable calendar date. The agency/institution shall have the right of appeal to the Executive Committee of the CCOM or sub-committee thereof, to stay with the date of first choice, if an acceptable agreement cannot be reached.

- 4. The third week of each month (beginning on the third Sunday) shall be reserved for district meetings.
- 5. Dates for district activities shall be sent to the CCOM office for inclusion in the Conference calendar.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

Duties of this commission -- Discipline, 1988, Para. 738.1

- 1. Preserve records of the Annual Conference and closed churches.
- 2. To collect and preserve data relating to organization and history of the Conference.
- 3. To maintain a firesafe historical and archival depository.
- 4. To preserve all current items valuable for future history.
- 5. To provide for the ownership of real property and to receive gifts and bequests.
- 6. To provide liaison with shrines, landmarks and conference historical sites.
- 7. To assist the Bishop/Conference program committee in planning for historical hour or historical observance at the Conference.
- 8. To establish retention and depository schedule for local church records.
- 9. To encourage and assist local churches in preserving their records and in compiling their histories.
- 10. To lift up our joint heritage with other related denominations.

The three major functions of this commission are:

- 1. Sharing the heritage through (a) Archives (b) Museums (none in existence, but needed).
- 2. Preserving our heritage through (a) Historical society, (b) historical sites, shrines and landmarks.
- 3. Assisting local churches to preserve their history by (a) Training local historians; (b) Encouraging local churches to preserve their records; (c) Write and update local church histories.

Goals for 1989

- 1. Begin to cooperate with the Little Rock Commission (A & H):
 - A. Possibility of area archivist funding.
 - B. Systemize the archival materials in the two conferences.
 - C. Work out ways to preserve: Museum pieces and additional.
- In 1989, program three workshops in North Arkansas for training local church historians, one workshop per two districts.
- 3. Continue the goal of previous commission: secure local church histories for the conference archives.
- 4. Provide four displays at Annual Conference this June:
 - A. Local church histories and Black History in the Arkansas Room, Hendrix College Library.
 - B. "Deaconesses and Missionaries" at Mills Center.
 - C. "Local Church Records" at Mills Center.
 - D. "Sesquincentennial at Batesville" at Mills Center.
- 5. To study historical places in North Arkansas Methodism that

would qualify for sites, shrines and landmarks. (Note: According to the latest directory of the United Methodist Churches Archives and History, no shrines nor landmarks are registered with the General Commission for North Arkansas.)

BOARD OF DIACONAL MINISTRY

Diaconal Ministers are lay persons called by God to specialized ministries of service, justice and love within local congregations and in the wider world. Diaconal ministers are educated in the Biblical and theological precepts of the Christian faith and in the historical and doctrinal traditions of the United Methodist Church. Diaconal Ministers are professional lay persons trained to focus their service through a variety of ministries such as community development, social services, health ministries, missions, peace-making, education, counseling, evangelism, administration, and music. They function as assistants in worship. partners in governance, leaders in mission, ministers of pastoral care, and teaching and as agents of Christian unity. The diaconal ministry involves interpreting to the church the needs, concerns and hopes of the world, serving and nurturing persons within the household of faith; responding to the needs of the corporate body; thus enabling the church to be in ministry in the world. Diaconal ministers are consecrated by the church and appointed by the Bishop to serve time-honored functions and offer flexibility for expressing ministry in new ways responsive to contemporary needs.

When a person hears and heeds the call to serve as a Diaconal Minister his/her first formal step is to qualify as a candidate for Diaconal Ministry. During this time of searching and defining their call, the Board of Diaconal Ministry teams them with a Mentor. The Mentor is a guide and resource person who has been selected and trained because of personal experience and sensitivity to the importance of this time of exploration. Working together, the prospective candidate and the Mentor are able to clarify his/her calling and how to proceed into his/her Christian vocation. During his/her candidacy, the conference office of Pastoral Care and Counseling also provides psychological testing which aids the candidate and the Board in the many decisions involved in becoming a professional minister in the United Methodist Church.

II. RECOMMENDATIONS

A. We request that the ministerial support packages of consecrated Diaconal Ministers be listed in the Conference Journal as a part of the Statistical Tables beginning in 1990.

- B. We request that a representative of each consecration class be given time for a personal testimony on the Conference floor.
- C. We request that candidates for consecration be presented to the Lay Briefing Session each conference year for recognition.
- D. We request that persons to be consecrated are voted on at the beginning of the Annual Conference session so that they can be full participants of the Annual Conference.

Board of Ordained Ministry

The purpose of the Board of Ordained Ministry is to provide support and resources to those men and women whose vocation is lived out in covenant fellowship of the Ordained Ministry of the Annual Conference. The aim of our work, therefore, is to fulfill faithfully our responsibilities to the persons entrusted to our care at every stage of the pilgrimage of their ministry as well as our responsibilities to the Church. This board seeks, through the diversity of its members and its approach to its tasks, to reflect and affirm the pluralism which makes rich the weave of the tapestry which is United Methodism. We reaffirm our commitment to adhere faithfully to the requirements of the Discipline in all matters related to the Ministry.

I. POLICY AND PROGRAM

- A. The financial resources of the Board will be disbursed in the following ways.
 - 1. For the normal work of the Board and its officers in fulfilling our responsibilities to persons related to the Board in preparation for ministry.
 - 2. For financial assistance to students enrolled in the Master of Divinity program (or its equivalent) in seminaries listed by the University Senate of the United Methodist Church, and to candidates enrolled in basic degree

programs for Diaconal Ministries. Depending on the availability of funds, interest free loans will be made as follows:

\$600 for students attending United Methodist Seminaries (Full-time)

\$300 for students attending United Methodist Seminaries (Part-time)

\$200 for students attending United Methodist Seminaries (summer)

\$300 for students attending Non-United Methodist Seminaries (Full-time)

\$150 for students attending Non-United Methodist Seminaries (Part-time)

\$100 for students attending Non-United Methodist Seminaries (summer)

Loans will be given for not more than four seminary years. To be eligible for loans, students must have received the Certificate of Candidacy and be attending an approved institution. Students are expected to provide information concerning their standing and circumstances to the Registrar of the board. The Loan Officer for the Board is Larry Washington.

Further that the loans are to be paid back at the rate of:

One service year per year of loan for full-time students.

One-half service year per year of loan for part-time students.

Service in any United Methodist conference is payment.

Service in any other denomination does not count. If persons leave the United Methodist ministry they will repay the loan at a rate of 600/year.

C. The Arkansas Pastor's School:

We will support the Arkansas Area Pastor's School by providing funding which matches the Little Rock Conference up to \$1,500.

D. Supervision of Resident Probationers:

The Board has adopted a process to insure supervision of post-seminary probationary members through assignment of Board of Ordained Ministry members as Supervisors to each individual and/or joint assignment to a geographic cluster group.

E. Continuing Education:

- 1. The Board has adopted a Guideline for Continuing Education in conjunction with the Board of Diaconal Ministry which establishes an expectation of ten Continuing Education Units during a three-year period. (The Guidelines have been circulated and are available from the Chairperson of Continuing Education, Max Whitfield.)
- 2. We recommend that each local church or charge allow the pastor continuing education leave time for their minister as provided in paragraphs 445.2 and 445.5 of the 1988 **Book of Discipline**. This leave time should not be considered a part of the pastor's annual vacation.
- 3. We recommend that each local church or charge provide in its budget a Continuing Education fund. This item should be separate from salary, utilities, and other expense items and should not be counted therein. This fund should be a reimbursed expense to encourage professional and personal growth. We request that each District Superintendent make this an item of inquiry at each Charge Conference.

4. The Board will continue to support the Clergy Professional Growth Training which is promoted by Bishop Richard B. Wilke and the Cabinet.

F. Testing and Evaluation:

- 1. In consideration of paragraph 414.4 and 423.4 of the 1984 Book of Discipline the board will require psychological evaluations of person seeking membership in the Annual Conference.
- 2. Methodist Hospital of Memphis will be doing testing and evaluation.

II. RECOMMENDATIONS

- A. We recommend continued emphasis on the Ministerial Education program and our United Methodist Seminaries. We ask that each local church pay its full apportionment of the Ministerial Education Fund. The portion of this fund, which is retained in the Annual Conference, provides the Board's funds for Continuing Education, Tuition Loans, support of persons attending the Course of Study Schools, the Arkansas Pastor's School, and Diaconal training.
- B. In the light of the increasing costs of Theological Education, we recommend that each District in the North Arkansas Conference establish at least one Ministerial Education Scholarship to be granted annually to a seminary student from the North Arkansas Conference.
- C. We recommend that those persons desiring to make inquiry concerning the Ordained Ministry as their vocation secure proper application forms for Candidacy from their District Superintendent or from the Assistant Registrar for Candidacy Kim Cloninger.
- D. We recommend that each pastor become familiar with the Candidacy for Ministry process in order to give proper counsel to members of his/her congregation. Each individual entering the Ordained Ministry must complete the Candidacy program.
- E. We recommend that local churches (and especially Committees of Staff/Parish or Pastor/Parish Relations) become familiar with the Disciplinary provisions which relates to Ordained and Diaconal Ministry. Local churches have an increasing role in the process through which a person enters the Ministry.
- F. We recommend that all pastors be encouraged to attend the Arkansas Area Pastor's School to be held August 8-10.
- G. We recommend that congregations in the North Arkansas Conference be encouraged to participate in the seminary intern program if requested.
- H. We recommend and encourage that all Pastors of the North Arkansas Conference support and participate in the Ministerial Assistance Fund by contributing annually an amount equal to 1/4 of 1% of their base salary to the fund. Any Pastor may apply for emergency assistance with the understanding that this is a one time grant. The maximum grant is \$500. Grant applications are processed through the office of the District Superintendent.
- We recommend that each local Staff/Parish or Pastor/Parish Relations Committee insure that the Pastor's Compensation Package be arranged in such a way as to be as tax efficient as possible in light of new tax laws.

We, your Board of Ordained Ministry, want to express to you our increasing concern for the level of financial support given Candidates for Ordained and Diaconal Minstry. The cost of theological education has, over the past several years, increased dramatically. Students from three United Methodist seminaries have shared with the Board of Ministry the tuition cost at their schools. Two of these

schools are in the South Central Jurisdiction and one in the South Eastern Jurisdiction. Costs range from \$2600 to \$3000 per semester now, with an increase in tuition anticipated this fall.

The Conference schedule of loans from Ministerial Education funds is now \$600 per semester. This is helpful, but hardly adequate. Your Board of Ordained Ministry has had a special committee working since last fall, exploring ways to more effectively meet the needs of candidates for Ordained and Diaconal Ministry. The Committee will now be called upon to continue its work for another year, seeking ways to increase scholarship funding. In the meantime, we ask each of the six District Superintendents to invite, through the Chairperson of the Board, representatives of the Board to attend district meetings, district conferences, etc., to present to the people of our church the critical need for financial support for candidates for Diaconal and Ordained Ministry.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

The North Arkansas Conference Board of Pensions is charged with the work of providing for and contributing to the support, relief, assistance and pensioning of the ministers and their families of The United Methodist Church. The board works closely with the General Board of Pensions of The United Methodist Church which has provided excellent counsel, interpretation and guidance in our pension program.

All eligible clergy <u>must</u> be enrolled in the pension program. Enrollment is the responsibility of the participant. Enrollment blanks may be obtained from Mrs. Faye Douglas Watson, Administrative Secretary, P.O. Box 119, Marion, AR 72364. Enrollment will be dated from the first day of the quarter in which the participant enrolls.

The Board of Pensions recommends that:

- 1. The 1990 annuity rate for service completed prior to 1982 be \$230.
- The North Arkansas Conference continue participation in the Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) and the Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) of the General Board of Pensions of The United Methodist Church as follows:
 - a. That the contribution rate for Ministerial Pension Plan be 12% of the plan compensation of the participant up to the Denominational Average Compensation (DAC). Plan compensation includes cash salary plus 20% for parsonage or cash amount for housing, plus any tax-deferred annuity program, plus any amount paid to participant as a reimbursement for Social Security Taxes.
 - b. That each minister contribute 3% of his/her Plan Contribution up to the DAC to his/her personal account with the General Board of Pensions.
 - c. That the contribution to Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) be 4.4% of which 1% shall be contributed by the participating minister.

- d. That both current service and past service be paid by apportionment to the churches of the conference.
- e. That our unfunded obligation be amortized over a forty (40) year period beginning January 1, 1982.
- f. That the Death Benefit Program (DBP+) be continued for active clergy.
- g. That we include any ministers in the Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) who are eligible for the Special Arrangement feature.
- h. That the surviving spouse continue to receive benefits at 70% of the Formula Benefit rate for pre-1982 service.
- that the board be authorized to oversee completion of the Bicentennial Pension Fund Campaign.
- In order to provide adequately for this program plus the group insurance for retired ministers and families, the churches shall pay an apportioned amount totaling \$1,418,983.
- 4. Policy Regarding Non-payment of Pension Apportionment. Regrettably, the conference can no longer afford to be generous regarding delinquent pension payments. Therefore, in accordance with Para. 737.4, 1988 Book of Discipline, which provides for a lien upon the pension of a pastor serving a church which has defaulted upon pension apportionments, the conference Board of Pensions must use the following procedure:
 - When the church defaults on the pension apportionment, the pastor, local church treasurer, and district superintendent shall be notified and informed regarding disciplinary provisions and board policy;
 - b. The names of churches and pastors of record which default on pension apportionments shall be published in the conference journal in the year following said default, providing that payment in full has not been made nor a satisfactory explanation given to the conference board in the interim;
 - c. Defaulting churches will have one year in which to pay the balance of the pensions apportionment in full before the General Board of Pensions shall be notified and the provisions of Para. 736.4 implemented, providing that said churches and pastors have been given opportunity for a hearing before the conference Board of Pensions for the purpose of explaining the default.
- 5. Allowance grants, retirement love offerings and local expenses of the Board of Pensions is paid by the Treasurer of the Conference Board of Pensions, subject to the approval of the Conference Board of Pensions and the 1988 Book of Discipline.
- 6. The institution, board or organization paying the salary of a minister on special appointment without annuity claim on the conference shall make provision for the pension of such person. Attention is called to Para. 1606.3a(3), 1988 Book of Discipline, regarding eligibility to participate in Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) and Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP).
- 7. There shall be apportioned to each agency and institution served by a ministerial member under special appointment with annuity claim on the

conference an amount equal to 13.4% of the Denominational Average Compensation (DAC).

The benefit is 20% of the Denominational Average Compensation. Retirees may purchase additional benefits (DBP+) at their own expense.

(b) The board will pay for 80 percent of health insurance premiums for persons who retire with pension benefits prior to age 65, subject to the general rule of two and one-half percent per year of service in the Arkansas Area of The United Methodist Church. (c) Retired individuals, eligible for Medicare, shall personally pay Medicare charges. (d) Family clergy who die while serving effectively have 80% of their insurance paid by the Conference until that spouse remarries.
- 15. Resolution Relating to Rental/Housing Allowance For Retired or Disabled Ministers of This Conference:

Whereas, the religious denomination known as the United Methodist Church has functions through Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed; and

Whereas, the practice of the United Methodist Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers, and

Whereas, pensions paid to retired ordained or licensed ministers of the United Methodist Church are considered as deferred compensation and paid to said retired ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous active service and disability benefits are considered payments in lieu of compensation for active service, and

Whereas, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that the North Arkansas Annual Conference is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/allowance for retired ordained or licensed ministers who are members of the Conference; and

Whereas, the disabled minister has the same legal relationship to the Annual Conference as does the retired minister and, thus, this Annual Conference is also the appropriate organization to designate a housing/allowance for a disabled ordained or licensed minister who is a member of this Conerence; Now Therefore Be It Resolved:

- 1. An amount equal to 100% of the pensions payments received by a retired minister, or 100% of the disability benefit payments received by a disabled minister, during the year 1990 be and is hereby designated as a rental/allowance respectively for each retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister of the United Methodist Church who is or was a member of the North Arkansas Annual Conference at the time of his/her retirement or disability.
- 2. The pension or disability payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension or disability payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference, General Agency, or institution of the United Methodist Church or any former denomination that is now a part of the United Methodist Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension or benefit funds of the United Methodist Church for such retired minister's pension or disabled minister's benefits.

NOTE: The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-280, 1971 C.B.92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the Code as a 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities." Beginning in 1984, there is no longer a sick pay or disability income exclusion available with respect to disability benefit payments.

Therefore, the full amount of disability benefit payments will be taxable income to the recipient beginning in 1984.

- 16. Each minister at the time of full retirement and drawing annuity from the General Board of Pensions will be given a love offering with the following formula being used: a maximum of \$1,000 which will be figured at \$25.00 per service year in the North Arkansas Conference up to a maximum of 40 years.
- 17. We recommend that a special grant be made to Donna McCammon, dependent child.
- 18. Ministers desiring to participate in the tax-deferred program of the General Board of Pensions should write Dr. E. Merris Brady, Assistant General Secretary, General Board of Pensions, 1200 Davis Street, Evanston, 11 60201.
- 19. As of January 1, 1980, Para. 1606.4a(2), 1988 Book of Discipline, be enforced.
- 20. Participants in our pension programs should notify the Administrative Secretary, Faye Douglas Watson, when:
 - a. a death in the immediate family occurs;
 - b. any change in address or income occurs;

- c. a change of beneficiary is desired;
- d. information relative to pensions matters is needed;
- e. to enroll in our pensions program;
- f. retirement is intended (90 days prior to the session of the annual conference at which retirement is contemplated):
- g. you have a question of annuity credit for past service.
- 21. A generous gift of \$3,000 was presented to the Conference Board of Pensions by Dr. David and Alice Barnett Gibbons as a memorial to their parents, Rev. James M. Barnett and Nora Barnett. Rev. and Mrs. Barnett served the North Arkansas Conference for thirty seven and one-half years.

- a. If the above named cemetery association fails to continue as a legal body, the title to this property will be returned to the Trustees of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church or its successors.
- b. The building will be used for no religious functions other than funeral services. Violation of this restriction would constitute cause to forfeit the title to the donor.
- c. Any and all fees connected with the transfer of the title with stated conditions will be paid by the Flat Rock Cemetery Association with no cost to The United Methodist Church.
- d. All mineral rights will be reserved to the North Arkansas Conference of The United Methodist Church.

Be it further resolved, that if the Flat Rock Cemetery Association is not legally constituted so as to hold property in the name of the trustees, consideration will be given to a sale of transfer of title to the property, with conditions, to the

persons who are elected trustees of the Community Cemetery Association. The price is to be negotiated at the time of sale. Any proceeds from such a sale will go to the Batesville District Church Extension Fund.

- 2. Be it resolved, that the Harvey's Chapel United Methodist Church in the Paragould District be declared abandoned, and sold to the Harvey's Chapel Cemetery Association and their successors with the following qualifications:
- a. If the above named cemetery association fails to continue as a legal body, the title to this property will be returned to the Trustees of the North Arkansas Conference of The United Methodist Church or its successors.
- **b.** The building will be used for no religious functions other than funeral services. Violation of this restriction would constitute cause to forfeit the title to the donor.
- c. Any and all fees connected with the transfer of the title with stated conditions will be paid by the Harvey's Chapel Cemetery Association with no cost to The United Methodist Church.
- 4. All mineral rights will be reserved to the North Arkansas Conference of The United Methodist Church.

Be it further resolved, that if the Harvey's Chapel Cemetery Association is not legally constituted so as to hold property in the name of the trustees, consideration will be given to a sale of transfer of title to the property, with conditions, to the persons who are elected trustees of the Community Cemetery Association. The price is to be negotiated at the time of sale. Any proceeds from such a sale will go to the Paragould District Church Extension Fund.

- 3. Be it resolved that the Central City United Methodist Church in the Fort Smith District be declared abandoned and sold according to the policies and procedures of the North Arkansas Conference Board of Trustees. Any proceeds from the sale of Central City United Methodist Church in Fort Smith shall go to the Fort Smith District Board of Missions.
- 4. The membership of the Egypt United Methodist Church, Paragould/Jonesboro District, voted at a Church Conference held on Sunday, May 21, 1989, to discontinue services and close the church. The District Superintendent has been notifed of this action and it has been approved by the Bishop and Cabinet.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that we declare the United Methodist Church of Egypt, Arkansas, discontinued and the property for sale according to the policies and procedures of the North Arkansas Conference Board of Trustees. The District Superintendent of the Paragould/Jonesboro District shall be authorized to act as the representative of the Conference Trustees in effecting the sale of this property. All proceeds of this sale shall be deposited to the Paragould/Jonesboro District Mission Fund.

CAMP ALDERSGATE, INC.

Edward R. Murrow, the distinguished journalist, radio, and TV personality, during the 1950's had a popular TV program "See It Now" in which he reported important events as if you were there. Let me borrow on this idea and present some important happenings at Camp Aldersgate so you may "See it Now"....

The Jacksons are at the end of their strength. The pressure of taking care of Jessica 24 hours a day, seven days a week has become so intense these parents must have help. Jessica has autism and a severe seizure disorder. The Jacksons bring their child to Camp Aldersgate where a support system is already in place to provide relief from Friday afternoon until Sunday afternoon, giving much needed respite to these weary care givers. Matt and Susan Jackson are now able to relax and enjoy the other members of the family for the weekend knowing that Jessica is having the time of her life and is completely cared for through the Respite Care program and the people at Camp Aldersgate.

The 19th year of Med Camps at Aldersgate for children with medical problems has just begun. A series of week-long camps offer children with various handicapping conditions an opportunity to enjoy the benefits of outdoor recreation while learning ways to manage their individual medical problems and improve their lifestyle. The activities may include nature hikes, cookouts, swimming, fishing, archery, drama, and music. "See it Now"....Chris has Cerebral Palsy and arrives for a week of camp activities. Little does he know that in all of these fun things he does, he will tearn ways of managing his medical problems and becoming more independent. For the first time in his life, Chris learns how to transfer by himself in and out of his wheelchair and to bait a fishhook all in one week. In wheelchair races, he has tearned to take command and anytime you give a young person wheels, life will never be the same again. Chris has become a real WINNER!

Lula arrives on Thursday for the Aldersgate Senior citizens' program. Initiated in 1972, the program has served over 200,000 meals, and has been recognized as a model among programs for the elderly. Through this program, Lula can get counseling assistance and emergency food. She can also experience educational programs, Bible study, and fellowship. Lula looks forward to this, knowing with a little help from her friends, she can cope with problems which had appeared almost

impossible. And after all, where else could she celebrate her birthday with 75 joyful voices singing "Happy Birthday Dear Lula"?

Each Wednesday evening the free Westside Health Clinic operates at Camp Aldersgate in cooperation with the Catholic Social Services. People from all walks of life, young families, elderly, teenagers, anyone with a health problem, can come to the clinic for free medical examinations and treatment. A corps of volunteer doctors, nurses and pharmacists donate their time to make this service possible. On a crisp November day, the late afternoon sun was casting long shadows across our parking lot. Already the feel of fall was in the air. A young couple in their early 20's drove an old clunker Ford onto the lot. I walked over and introduced myself and asked if I could help. Jane and Wes had heard about our Westside Clinic and had driven in from Benton wondering if the doctor would "see a pregnant lady". I told them I felt sure he would, but if it was related to her pregnancy, it would be better if she went to her own doctor. Jane looked into the distance and said softly something about how difficult it had been for Wes to get regular work...she was now in the 9th month of her first pregnancy without having seen a doctor. That night the doctor on duty did see Jane and arranged to deliver their baby when the time came. A few days later, a fine, healthy boy was born to them which they named Wesley. "See it Now"...this beautiful example of the ecumenical work of the church where Catholic, Presbyterian, Methodist and others, all come together to make this medical clinic happen at Camp Aldersgate.

Drawing upon our expertise in working with medically handicapped children we have just launched two new innovative and very creative programs which hold vastly exciting possibilities.

Through our work with the Respite Care program, we know there are a number of children and parents with critical needs whom we have been unable to help thus far. But now we have dared to ask some "what if" questions. What about those situations where parents no longer could cope with their problems and would have to place their child in an institution? "What if"...we were able to go into the homes and see if we would make a difference? "What if"...we could build ramps and widen doors? "What if"...we could provide wheelchairs, beds, or hydraulic lifts? Could we then make it possible to keep these children in their homes? "What if"...we had the funds to do this? What then would happen?

We know the cost of keeping each child in an institution here in Arkansas is \$42,000 per child, per year. Through the State we have obtained funds to try a bold, new experiment of working with 16 families seeing if we can help them to keep their child in their home. We call this program "Family Support" and is administered by one of our regular staff members, Lynn Baker. It was begun this last July and has proven to be one of the most exciting and rewarding programs we have ever done. Through Family Support, 14 year old Michael has a new wheelchair and a communications board which he operates with the only part of his body that he can really control --- his eyebrows! For the first time in his life, Michael can get around where he wants to go and now even tells jokes with the help of his new board. Not one of these 16 pilot families has had to place their child in an institution and all are successfully caring for their own. The results have been so positive that we will begin anew this year with 30 additional families to see the

difference we can make. New?....Resourceful?.....Innovative?....Bold?..... caring?....You bet! We have developed a responsible image for our leadership in this field. What we are doing is not unique. The fact that we <u>are doing</u> it, is what's so unique!

The next natural step in our dream plan was: "What if"...we could only Xerox what we are doing and send it all over the state"....And then our staff asked, "why not?"!

So, beginning this year, we started a training program designed to do just this which we call "Family Friends". It is under the direction of seminary trained staff member, Greg Gibson. People are coming from all over the State of Arkansas for instruction in the art of caring for children with handicapping conditions. They come in small groups of 15 to 20 at a time, and by year's end, we will have trained 100 people from local communities across Arkansas who will be competent in the care and nurture of these children. This is a start, but we have begun. Now, this is no longer part of our dream. It has become a reality! "See it Now"....for there is help and hope where there had been none!

There are countless Jessicas and Jacksons, Lulas and Michaels, Chrises, Janes, and Weses who look to Camp Aldersgate for help and hope. Each year these numbers are ever increasing. This past year we have served more people than anytime in our history. We have had more children in Med Camp and Respite Care. The Westside Health Clinic has become so crowded we have scheduled extra nights to take care of the overflow. The two new programs of Family Support and Training have extended new horizons for us. Expanding the amount of help and hope we give at Camp Aldersgate will ultimately improve the quality of life for so many people in Arkansas.

I can't find in my Bible where Jesus said: "If you can afford it, do these things in my name." I do read where He said: "If you love me...feed my sheep.....tend my lambs."

I hear Him say: "Inasmuch as you have done it unto one of the least of these, my brethren, you have done it unto me."

Can you "See it Now"? It is happening here!

THE COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES

I. MINIMUM SALARY SCHEDULE

The Commission on Equitable Salaries recommends that the 1990 Minimum Salary Schedule and Guidelines for persons in full-time ministry be established as follows:

A. Minimum Salary Schedule

- 1. The 1990 MINIMUM SALARY for a Full-Time Local Pastor is approximately equal to the Base Plan Compensation for the Board of Pensions Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) coverage for all persons in full-time ministry. The additional increments of \$1,000 and \$2,000 are designed to recognize the levels of experience, ordination and conference relationship.
- 2. The CHARGE is required to provide at least 60% of the Minimum Salary as a BASE SALARY for the category in which its minister falls. When no parsonage is provided, the charge must provide a Housing Allowance equal to 20% of the Minimum Salary for its pastor IN ADDITION TO THE BASE SALARY ALREADY STATED.
- 3. The Commission on Equitable Salaries will provide Salary Aid up to 40% of the Minimum Salary for pastors in the various categories. Our first priority is to bring all pastors up the the Minimum Salary, and then, AS FUNDS ALLOW, to give aid up to the Maximum Total Compensation level.
- 4. The CHARGE is required to provide adequate TRAVEL AND UTILITIES ALLOWANCES as routine obligations of having a full-time pastor. After a CHARGE has met the BASE SALARY requirement, it may then allocate an additional amount on the salary package UP TO \$4,500 AS TRAVEL AND UTILITIES ALLOWANCES.
- 5. No pastor on Minimum Salary Aid may earn more than the MAXIMUM TOTAL COMPENSATION amount for the category in which he/she falls.

B. Requirements for Qualification

- 1. The CHARGE must meet the required BASE SALARY (including HOUSING ALLOWANCE, when applicable) before qualifying for Minimum Salary Aid. If there is a great disparity between the Minimum Salary Guidelines and the CHARGE'S ability to provide for them, it is suggested that the Cabinet either realign the charge so as to strengthen its financial state, or consider it a part-time charge.
- The CHARGE shall pay at least 60% of its apportionments for Pension and Benefit Fund, Episcopal Fund, District Superintendent's Fund, and the

Equitable Salaries Fund, as per paragraph 925, 1988 Book of Discipline).

- 3. APPLICATIONS for Salary Aid must be submitted on the appropriate form, filled out completely, and sent to the chairperson of the Commission not later than December 20, 1989. The Commission will meet in late January, 1990 to review the applications.. Applications for June 1990 should be submitted by May 15, 1990.
- 4. The CHARGE shall submit a copy of its approved BUDGET for 1990.
- 5. We refer applicants to paragraph 437, 1988 Book of Discipline, for the definition of "Full-Time Ministry."
- 6. The CHARGE shall submit a copy of its STEWARDSHIP CULTIVATION PLAN for 1990.
- 7. ASSOCIATE PASTORS (not to be confused with Associate Members of the Conference) are not eligible for Minimum Salary Aid.
- 8. RETIRED PASTORS are not eligible for Minimum Salary Aid, as per paragraph 451.6, 1988 Book of Discipline.

The Commission on Equitable Salaries recommends approval of the following charges for Minimum Salary Aid, at the stated annual rates:

II. KEY CHARGE PROGRAM

The Key Charge Program provides Salary Aid to pastors who are appointed to charges which are targeted for significant growth by the Conference, or which require short-term support for pastoral leadership for various other reasons, beyond the Minimum Salary Level.

Key Charges are related to the Commission on Equitable Salaries by a contractual agreement. The contract is negotiated by representatives of the Commission, the District Superintendent, and representatives appointed by the charge. These persons, or their successors, shall be the trustees of the contract, having verified it with their signatures.

The contract shall include: (a) the initial amount of Salary Aid needed, (b) the duration of the contract (up to five (5) years), and (c) the signatures of the persons negotiating the contract. The nature of the contract is such that the amount of

Salary Aid given shall decrease proportionately each year, while the base salary paid by the charge increases by the same amount, thus keeping the salary at least stable over the contract period. After the contract has expired, no further Salary Aid will be granted to the Charge.

Under the Key Charge arrangement, there will be no required minimum or maximum levels of support by the Charge. The only limitation will be the amount of money budgeted for this program.

We recommend the continuation of the following Existing Contracts:

III. E.L.C. SALARY SUPPORT

We recommend that the Conference continue its mission through its Ethnic Minority local churches by providing, in addition to opportunity to participate in the normal Minimum Salary Aid Program, a Special E.L.C. Salary Support Program, intended to provide financial enabling for trained and capable pastoral leadership in churches which function in areas of extreme economic limitation, such that they are unable, even when formed into larger charges, to provide the level of salary support required under the Minimum Salary Program.

Application for E.L.C. Special Salary Support shall be made to the Commission on Equitable Salaries using the same application form as required for Minimum Salary applications or Key Charge Applications.

The level of Salary Support shall be negotiated with the Commission by the District Superintendent, in consultation with officials of the charge.

The application shall be accompanied by a mission statement and rationale for giving support as requested. Priority will be given to charges which show significant promise for growth, increased effectiveness of ministry, and potential for advance in self-support.

The Commission on Equitable Salaries recommends continuing the following charges in the E.L.C. Salary Support Program, and granting of support at the following annual rates:

COMMISSION ON STATUS AND BOLE OF WOMEN

The report of the Commission on the Status and Role of Women is a call to celebrate the claiming of our Biblical heritage and accepting the mandate of where it leads us.

In II Kings we read about King Josiah who needed the authenticity of a scroll determined. The book was taken to the prophet Huldah, a woman, who interpreted the scripture and told the King it did indeed contain the word of God. Her interpretation was accepted without question.

The book of Judges tells the story of Deborah, another prophet and a judge. Miriam was recognized as a prophet and in Micah 6:4 Miriam is said to have been sent by God to the Israelite people just as were Aaron and Moses.

Ruth became the community of God in caring for the needs of Naomi and was her redeemer.

Jesus revealed his Messiahship first to a woman - the Samaritan woman at the well. She is turn proclaimed Jesus as Messiah and spread his fame throughout the whole city. Not only did a woman proclaim <u>Jesus as Messiah</u>, but women were the first to witness and preach <u>Jesus as risen</u> when the women at the tomb were sent forth by the risen Lord to tell others what had happened.

Paul entrusted Phoebe, a deacon in the early Church, with the safety of his letter to the Romans as she carried it from Corinth to Rome. Paul also accepted freely the abilities of Priscilla and the business expertise of Lydia.

In all of this we see women as interpreters of scripture, proclaimers, redeemers, messengers, witnesses, preachers, leaders. Clergywomen and lay women throughout the years have found their biblical mandate from these and the many other scriptures in the Bible that speak specifically of women.

Today there are 22 clergywomen serving charges in the North Arkansas Conference. Other clergywomen include one intern, two serving in other conferences, one on leave, four retired not serving charges, and ten students. This makes a total of 40 clergywomen connected with this Conference. Will all the clergywomen present please stand?

Our mandate is to accept and support the ministries of these clergywomen in the appointive system and in caring, loving congregations.

Today laywomen in the North Arkansas Conference are fulfilling many responsible leadership roles in our local churches.

Our mandate is to continue to work for full and equal participation of women in the local church and establish a work area or its equivalent on the Status and Role of Women as provided in Para. 260, 261.8, and 252 of the 1988 Book of Discipline. Will all the women here today who are serving on local church boards or committees please stand?

Today on the Conference level in North Arkansas, women are serving in fairly equal numbers and in power positions on boards and agencies of the Conference. The Nominating Committee did a fantastic job at the beginning of this quadrennium and are to be commended for it. This didn't just happen. It was made possible in the first place by General Conference legislation that ensures equal representation

of women and by the careful hard work of United Methodist Women and past Commissions on Status and Role of Women and Structure Committees of our Conference.

Those of us who are women, sitting in this room, serving on committees, boards, and agencies in the local church, district, and conference are benefiting from this past hard work of both women and men.

Our biblical mandate is to follow the example of Esther and take risks, to do, to participate when we are placed in leadership, to be supportive of other women and their leadership for "who knows whether you have come to the kingdom for such a time as this"? Who knows whether you are on a board or agency for such a time as this to speak out and participate?

Today we celebrate those women and men in our conference who dare to claim the biblical heritage of a full, participating, inclusive, caring Church.

At second meeting, we discussed our disciplinary responsibilities, and like the Committee on District Superintendency and PPR/SPR in the local church, our main function is to help make ministry effective for our Bishop. We also discussed the work of the bishop. These discussions were frank, open and honest. We talked of ways to bridge the gap between perceptions and realities as related to Bishop Wilke and all of us.

At that second meeting the Committee was given a recommendation from the Little Rock Conference Committee on Episcopacy in which it had asked Bishop Wilke to appoint a Study Committee on the feasibility of merging the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences. We were asked to take similar action. Some committee members favor such a move, others are opposed, while some are neutral. What we agreed to do was talk with members of the Little Rock Conference.

Our third meeting was a joint meeting of the two Conference Committees. The main thrust of that meeting was to put shape and form to Bishop Wilke's desire to itinerate all the districts this conference year for day long meetings with clergy. We were all excited about a format which would provide time for intentional listening on the part of Bishop Wilke; a way to receive feedback; a lunch together; and a long study session, led by Bishop Wilke, on the new theological statement. Bishop Wilke is now working on his schedule when these significant events can take place.

It seemed premature to bring up this year the matter of joint study committee on the feasibility of merging the two conferences. Since some funds would be required, that would take a vote of the Conference. We ask for your feedback this year on that matter.

We do want to be helpful to the Conference and to Bishop Wilke as we continue the Kingdom's work together.

COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS

After the nominations for the quadrennium are completed, the responsibility of the Committee on Nominations in interim years is to make nominations to fill vacancies which have occurred and for classes of Boards and Agencies, as appropriate. The information submitted by local churches and districts was retained to use as a pool of nominees. This information was used, to the extent possible, to make nominations for vacancies and classes to be elected during this Annual Conference session.

The Committee on Nominations wishes to encourage attention to the process for nominating persons for Conference offices. The structure, which was given final approval in the 1988 session, outlines the process which the committee has endeavored to follow. Although the implementation was not perfect the first time around, the Committee feels strongly that the process was very beneficial and identified persons with interests and leadership abilities that had not been previously known. The Committee also recognized the need to offer assistance in implementing the system and assuring its efficacy and will take steps in this next year to provide that assistance.

When making nominations for the Committee on Nominations, consideration should be given to nominating at least one Ethnic. District representation is not pertinent as all six districts are presently represented. When the 1989 Class terms expire, there will be 7 male, 5 female members excluding the Class to be elected.

II. APPORTIONMENTS AND ASKINGS:

A. WORLD SERVICE AND CONFERENCE BENEVOLENCES: We recommend that the General Conference apportionment of \$492,693 for WORLD SERVICE be accepted and that an amount of \$482,846 be apportioned for CONFERENCE BENEVOLENCES for 1990; for a total apportionment of \$975,539. Further, we recommend that the monies received for World Service and Conference Benevolences be distributed on a basis of 50.49% for World Service and 49.51% for Conference Benevolences.

B. MINISTERIAL SUPPORT: We recommend that the MINISTERIAL SUPPORT apportionment of \$684,603 be accepted in full by the Annual Conference and that it be apportioned to the local churches.

C. OTHER APPORTIONED FUNDS: We recommend that the Annual Conference accept in full the askings listed below and they be apportioned to the local churches.

Each program will have a Conference goal of \$14,000 (total goal: \$28,000).

IV. DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS AND CONFERENCE COUNCIL DIRECTOR:

A.We recommend the following schedule of support for District Superintendents and the Conference Council Director for 1990.

Salary \$44,000 Utilities \$4,000 Total \$48,000

- B. We recommend that a district superintendent, when traveling as a cabinet representative to or as a member of a board, agency, or district other than his own, shall have the room, board, and travel expense paid by that board, agency, or district.
- C. We recommend that the district superintendents when traveling on Conference business, other than that provided for in the preceding paragraph, shall have a vouchered expense fund of \$39,000 for room, board and travel expense; their reimbursement for such Conference related travel shall be at the rate of 18 cents per mile.
- D. We recommend that the Conference Council Director and Associate Director, when traveling at the request of a board, agency, or district, shall have the room, board and travel expense borne by the board, agency or district. When traveling out of state at the request of a board, council, or agency, they shall have their expense paid for by the board, council or agency.

E.We recommend that the Conference Director and Associate Director, when traveling on conference business, other than that provided for in the preceding paragraph, shall have a vouchered travel pool of \$10,000, and their reimbursement for such Conference travel shall be at the rate of 18 cents per mile.

F. We recommend that the Conference Council Director and Associate Director shall each receive an allowance for housing and appurtenances of \$7,800 per year.

Y. OTHER RECOMMENDATIONS: We recommend:

- A. Pastor's Moving Expense conditions of eligibility are as follows:
 - 1. The following persons shall be eligible:

Pastors

Local pastors

Student lay pastors after first appointment

District superintendents

Persons in conference connectional positions

Retiring pastors

Persons on disability leave

Any other person recommended by the Board of Ministry

2. The following amounts shall be paid:

\$300 per pastor plus

\$.75 per mile, measured from parsonage to parsonage.

Persons moving into or out of the conference shall measure the mileage from the conference boundary to the parsonage.

- Monies shall be paid by the conference treasurer upon presentation of a voucher of mileage signed by the district superintendent.
- B. The Conference direct the Area Treasurer to withhold dispersal of funds to any agency, institution, or organization until the Council on Finance & Administration has received the most recent audit of a Public Accountant or Certified Public Accountant from the agency, institution or organization and that audit has been found satisfactory by the audit committee of the Council on Finance & Administration.
- C. A uniform percentage "pad" of three per cent be applied to all 1990 apportionments.
- $D.\ All$ interest earnings on Conference monies be credited to the Conference Contingency Fund.
- E. The Conference acknowledge the need for maintaining monies to be used as needed for the stabilization of the accounts of Wesley Foundation, *Arkansas United Methodist*, Church Extension, District Superintendents, Council on Ministries, and the Salary Support Fund.
- F. Participation by the Conference in area programs must not exceed 50% of the cost of that program, with exceptions approved by the Council on Finance & Administration.
 - G. Reimbursement for travel be on the following schedule:

Motel allowance - \$25 per day

Meals allowance - \$5 per meal

Mileage allowance: 1 person - 12 cents per mile

2 persons - 14 cents per mile

3 persons - 16 cents per mile

4 persons - 18 cents per mile

- H. That balances remaining in the Conference Benevolence Fund and the Conference Administration Fund at year end be transferred to the Contingency Fund.
- I. Any capital asset purchase or lease over \$1,500 must be approved by the Council on Finance & Administration prior to purchase or lease, even if that budget has been previously approved.
- J. Permission be granted to the Area Treasurer to borrow funds (on a short-term basis) from the Arkansas Area account if North Arkansas Conference funds are insufficient to meet current needs. Both Council on Conference Finance & Administration presidents must approve the loan before it is transacted.

Interest on such loan will be paid at the current money market rate.

K. The Conference provide fidelity bonding insurance in compliance with Paragraph 714.1 of the 1988 Book of Discipline.

L. The following is to be adopted as the guide for the care and investment of all Conference funds: (Para. 709.5 the 1988 Book of Discipline.

The Area Treasurer is charged with the responsibility for managing all Conference funds. It is the purpose of this investment policy to establish perimeters within which the monies of the North Arkansas Conference will be managed.

The objective of the investment of North Arkansas Conference monies is to

provide:

1. Preservation of capital.

2. Liquidity - to meet anticipated and unanticipated future needs.

3. Maximization of income - while simultaneously insuring preservation of capital and liquidity.

4. Compliance with the Social Principles and the Discipline of the United Methodist Church.

To accomplish this objective:

- 1. Funds should be deposited in Arkansas institutions in a fully insured status: i.e., AA or better state and national banks, CD/Savings and Loan and Bank FDIC insured, maximum investment \$100,000 per institution.
 - 2. Securities:
 - A. Direct obligation of United States Government Treasury Bills and Notes.
 - B. CDs, Time Deposits, interest bearing accounts.

3. Funds should be deposited on a short-term basis, generally 60 or 90 days, but up to six months when all objectives can be satisfied.

This policy is intended to be flexible in its application in order to meet changing economic conditions. Investments made for longer than 90 days may be made after the approval of the executive committee of the North Arkansas Conference Council on Finance and Administration. While income is desirable, the primary emphasis is to be on the maintenance of adequate funds and the avoidance of speculative investments.

This policy may be amended to meet changing conditions and to fulfill the needs of the Annual Conference.

M. The North Arkansas Annual Conference gives the Conference Council on Finance and Administration the authority to fund extraordinary needs relating to the life and ministry of the North Arkansas Annual Conference. These needs shall be funded from available unrestricted funds and contingency funds. This authority shall not be used nor is it intended to replace or circumvent normal funding procedures of the North Arkansas Annual Conference.

This is in reference to Para. 709.6 of the 1988 Discipline.

N. The office of the Bishop requested \$27,000. for the purpose of providing computer equipment for each District Office. After working with the Bishop and the District Superintendents, the C.F.A. is recommending \$12,250. for the purchase of computers. The remaining funds will be provided by the various districts and the Bishop's office will provide \$1,000 for additional training. This money will come from Conference Contingency funds.

O. We recommend that \$2,225. be paid from Conference Contingency funds to support a United Methodist Ministry presence on the Southern Methodist University campus during 1990.

VI. ADMINISTRATIVE CONCERNS:

- A. All funding requests from institutions shall be presented to the appropriate board or agency of the Conference for recommendation before presentation to the Council on Finance & Administration.
- B. All persons authorized to vouch for funds shall be identified by agencies and approved by the Council on Ministries prior to the dispensing of funds.
- C. All apportionments shall be received by the Area Treasurer by 2:00 p.m. on Wednesday after the first Sunday in January.
- D. Each charge shall declare all ministerial support. The report shall include remuneration for salary, travel, utility expense, insurance, social security, and all additional compensation paid to the pastor or on behalf of the pastor.
- E. When any agency's total budgeted funds have been expended, no further expenditures will be authorized without CF&A approval.
- F. All benevolent and connectional funds shall be sent to the Office of Finance and Management, P.O. Box 3364, Little Rock, Arkansas 72203, except for the following which shall be sent as designated:
- 1. Arkansas United Methodist Children's Home Christmas offering and special gifts to the Office of the Superintendent, P.O. Box 4125, Little Rock, Arkansas 72214.
- 2. All insurance premiums be sent according to the instructions from the Committee on Group Insurance.
- G. We recommend that Joe Eason be elected to the office of Conference Treasurer for the 1989-92 quadrennium or until his successor is chosen.
- H. We express our appreciation to Joe Eason and his staff, Cheryl Beck, Barbara Skiles, Alvin Burks, and Mary Lois Stanfield, for the excellent service they perform for the Conference.

GROUP INSURANCE REPORT #1: PROGRAM

- 1. American Continental Insurance Company is recommended to be engaged as the Third Party Administrator (TPA) of our health benefits program.
- 2. All full and probationary members and full time local pastors of the North Arkansas Conference under appointment (except students serving in or those employed by other Conferences or agencies which have compulsory programs, members under special appointment outside the Conference, or retired chaplains serving in the Conference), and every full time employee of the Conference, shall participate in the Health Benefits Program of the North Arkansas Conference.
- 2A. The Health Benefits Program will be open for Probationers, Part-time Local Pastors, Student Local Pastors, Diaconal Ministers, and those appointed to attend seminary. This is optional for the eligible participant and the participant must make the necessary arrangements and be responsible for the total premium.
- 2B. No evidence of insurability will be required if a participant enrolls self and dependents within 90 days after the eligibility date. Eligibility date shall be date of appointment or employment.
- 2C. Local churches may enroll lay employees between June 1 and July 15 by following the guidelines found in the 1969 Journal, p. 104, Para. 1b; and of the 1978 Journal, p. 128, Para. 6b.
- 2D. The Insurance Treasurer will check with the District Superintendent concerned in the case of a pastor applying for enrollment for the first time. The eligibility of any full time lay employee of a church will be checked with the pastor concerned. In either case, the first premium payment must accompany the application for enrollment before the application can be processed.
- 3. The Charge (church) pays at least 80% of the premium, and theparticipant pays not more than 20% .
- 3A. 1% is added to the premiums to cover administrative costs of the committee.

- 3B. All participants of the program age 65 and older are to be enrolled in Medicare. The North Arkansas Board of Pensions pays Health Benefits Program premiums for all retired persons drawing an annuity from the General Board of Pensions; all surviving spouses and children, as well as those persons on Disability Leave, except those who are not in the program at the time of retirement. Persons retiring prior to the 1988 session of the Annual Conference get 100% payment of premium. Persons retiring in 1988 and subsequent years will have their insurance premium benefit paid as follows: (a) The conference board will pay health insurance premiums for persons who retire with pensions benefits at age 65 at the rate of two and one-half percent per year of service in the Arkansas Area of the United Methodist Church up to and including forty years of service. (b) The board will pay for 80 percent of health insurance premiums for persons who retire with pension benefits prior to age 65, subject to the general rule of two and one-half percent per year of service in the Arkansas Area of the United Methodist Church. The retiree will be responsible to pay the remainder of the premium. (c) Retired individuals, eligible for Medicare, shall personally pay Medicare charges.
- 4. The Health Benefit Program premiums are due quarterly on the date shown on the statement sent from the Treasurer. All participants are responsible for seeing that the total premium due is sent to: Mrs. Faye Watson, P.O. Box 119, Marion, AR 72364, no later than the date due.
- The Committee shall use the measures listed on p.149, para. 5 of the 1984 Journal when premiums are not received on time.
- 6. The Cost Containment Program as implemented is being continued. Features are:
 - a. Pre-admission certification (\$100 additional deductible is applied for failure to pre-certify a hospitilization).
 - b. Concurrent tracking
 - c. Ambulatory surgery
 - d. Bill auditing
- 7. Participants in the Health Benefits Program whose appointment/employment is terminated will be granted an extension of coverage of up to three months provided (1) The Participant makes a written request to the Insurance committee; and (2) The Participant is responsible for payment of the total premium. Any extension beyond this three month period requires approval by the Insurance Committee.
- 8. The premium rates for 1990 will be determined based on the claims experience of the group through the year. In order to achieve the most accurate and favorable rate, the experience will be tracked through September. The Committee will meet and establish the premiums, under the guidance of the TPA, and notify participants in October of the new year's rate.
- 9. Paragraph (c) under Eligible Dependents in our Health In surance booklet shall read: "The unmarried children 19 years of age, but under 23 years of age of an employee or the surviving spouse of a deceased employee who are fulltime students in an accredited college, university or occupational training facility, provided such children are not (1) employed on a full time basis or

- (2) covered under any other plan of group insurance, other than insurance on account of accident; residing in the United States of America, Canana, or Puerto Rico.
- 10. Effective January 1, 1990 coverage for chemical dependency, including drug and alcohol abuse is limited to \$3,000 per month and a life time limit of \$15,000. Treatment must be in an approved hospital as defined in our plan Health Insurance.
- 10A. Paragraph c. (III) under the definition of hospital in our health insurance plan booklet shall read: "It is operated continuously with organized facilities for operative surgery on the premises, except this prevision will not apply to treatment in psychiatric or tuberculosis hospitals or approved chemical dependency treatment centers.

REPORT #2: ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS

- The Conference Insurance Committee, on behalf of the members of our Conference, wishes to commend Mrs. Faye Watson for the superior work she does as the Insurance Treasurer.
- We recommend Mrs. Faye Watson be continued as the Insurance Treasurer and that her salary be \$9,000.00, effective July 1, 1989.

HENDRIX COLLEGE

It is a privilege for Hendrix College to report to the United Methodist Church of Arkansas, for it was that church which gave birth to the college a little more than 100 years ago. The church has faithfully continued its support of the college across the years. Hendrix has not forgotten her origins.

It is deep in the nature of Hendrix to be concerned about the spiritual goodness, character, human thriving, and the good life.

The college holds fast to the church's expectation that it strive to be the best educational institution possible. In every way Hendrix seeks to prepare students with rigorous academic studies, to develop written and oral communication skills, and to provide opportunities for culturally relevant liberal education within the context of the Judeo-Christian heritage.

The Hendrix report to the Conferences last year ended with a commitment to look for ways to strengthen the college's relationship to the church and "to

demonstrate our appreciation for the support the church has given Hendrix." We have taken several steps.

HENDRIX FELLOWSHIP TEAMS. This year the college has reinstituted a program known as Fellowship Teams. Groups of four to six students and a staff advisor go (on invitation) into local United Methodist Churches where team members teach a class of young people, serve as liturgist in worship, give a children's sermon, sing a solo, preach, direct recreation, give two-minute talks on Hendrix, show videos on Hendrix, and lead discussion groups. Hendrix wants the impact of this program to be a genuine "thank you" to the church and a presentation of the college to the local church. The program is also very meaningful to our students. We have made six visits and will do three more during the Spring term. The teams have had three times as many invitations from churches as they have been able to fill.

PREACHING WORKSHOP. There will be a pastor's preaching workshop at Hendrix October 12-14, 1989. All the plans have not yet been completed, but we believe it will be a helpful session.

RECOGNITION OF CHURCH LEADERS. Hendrix continues a program established as part of her centennial celebration, that annually recognizes selected church leaders who have distinguished themselves in the fields of Christian Education and Social Awareness. These awards were established in memory of Mary and Ira Brumley (Education) and Ethel K. Millar (Social Awareness).

RELIGIOUS STUDIES. Year after year the college makes its facilities available for church functions. Under the auspices of the Marshall T. Steel Center for the Study of Religion and Philosophy, Hendrix continues to bring to campus programs designed to enrich the lives of United Methodist laity and clergy. The Hendrix library houses a growing historical center for Arkansas Methodism. Faculty and staff members are available to give lectures, preach, and teach Sunday School in local churches. Students interested in the professional ministry are organized and have a staff counselor. They meet regularly to give each other support and to study matters of current interest.

STATE OF THE COLLEGE. The \$16.8 million Campaign for Hendrix will draw to a close in just a few months. On March 20, 1989, the college had collected \$14.9 million in cash and pledges. Money is also being raised to refurbish Raney Hall, a women's residence hall. Part of the campaign's success results from the support of United Methodists who went considerably beyond their goal (\$425,000) of providing seating for Staples Auditorium. Also, for the first time in history the churches of Arkansas Methodism contributed more than \$300,000 to the annual fund in 1988 which is also part of the campaign.

ENROLLMENT. Hendrix began the 1988-89 school year with 1,029 students, 46 percent men and 54 percent women. Methodists make up 35 percent of the enrollment. There are 5 percent black students and 1 percent international. Eighty-five percent live in college housing, and 87 percent of the students are from Arkansas.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE. Sixty-nine percent of all students receive some form of financial aid. Dependents of United Methodist ministers and ministerial students receive an automatic one-half tuition scholarship from the college.

Dependents of ministers of other denominations also receive special scholarship assistance. Grants of this nature total \$140,000 for 1988-89.

FINANCIAL AID. The college believes financial conditions should not be the deciding factor on whether a student chooses Hendrix. The college works with students and families to develop a financial aid package designed to meet the demonstrated need of that student.

MISCELLANEOUS STATISTICS. There are 67 full time equivalent faculty members at Hendrix. Seventy-seven percent hold doctorates and 92 percent have appropriate terminal degrees. Sixty-four percent are tenured. The faculty-student ratio is 15 to 1, and the average class during the winter term was 19.

The market value of the college's endowment fund was about \$43 million on July 31, 1988. The total operating budget of the college in 1988-89 is \$12.225 million. The college continues to have a strong fiscal history and anticipates balancing its budget for the 32nd consecutive year on July 31, 1989.

HENDRIX HIGHLIGHTS. The cottege was named in THE FISKE GUIDE TO COLLEGES as "something this side of remarkable..." It was listed in PETERSON'S GUIDE TO COMPETITIVE COLLEGES and was recognized in GOOD HOUSEKEEPING magazine's October, 1988, issue as one of the 50 best educational values in the nation. Hendrix students have received Watson Fellows for five consecutive years. The cottege again has been listed in THE BEST BUYS IN COLLEGE EDUCATION. It was recognized in CHANGING TIMES magazine as one of the 50 best buys in education and has been described by North Central Association as one of the outstanding, small liberal arts colleges in the country.

Our commitment to the church is this: Hendrix will continue to strive to equip her graduates for service in God's creation.

KOREAN MISSION IN SOUTH CENTRAL JURISDICTION

Korean Mission work in South Central Jurisdiction was started on February 15, 1989. Its primary purpose is to enable congregational development among the growing Korean immigrant communities. The key concept of MISSION is to enable new congregational birthing and incubation which is described in the DISCIPLINE (P.663-664). Until the new congregations have been chartered (the Organization of the Charge Conference) within the Annual Conference and District, the proceeding conditions call for much closer relationship between the Korean Mission and Annual Conferences and Districts in which the work is carried on.

The mission projects presently carry on are six congregations: Springdale-Hanmaum (North Arkansas), Wichita-Sarang (Kansas West), Jacksonville (North Arkansas), Copperas Cove (C. Texas), Waco (C. Texas), Enid (Oklahoma), and ongoing projects are five: Irving (North Texas), Kansas City (Kansas East), Corpus Christi (S.W.Texas), Waynsville (Missouri East), Forth Smith (North Arkansas, and in surveying projects are: Houston Second (Texas), Shreveport (Louisiana), College Station (Texas), Abilene (N.W. Texas), Lake Charles (Louisiana), Laredo (S.W.Texas), Topeka (Kansas East), Omaha (Nebraska) and Denton (North Texas).

The mission leadership development is very important for the new church development and nurturing with the Korean churches, especially recruitment and training of mission pastors.

 - . 50 candidates for ministry from North Arkansas and Memphis Annual Conferences were provided physical and psychological assessments.
- 2. WITHIN ITS RESOURCES, METHODIST HEALTH SYSTEMS CONTINUES THE DEVELOPMENT AND EXPANSION OF HEALTH CARE AND RELATED SERVICES IN RESPONSE TO THE NEEDS OF THE PEOPLE WHO RESIDE WITHIN THE AREAS OF THE CONFERENCES.
 - . Methodist Outreach is a quality drug and alcohol treatment program which continues to do well.
 - . Employee Assistance Program provides counseling and referral guidance to nearly 21,000 employees of Mid South companies including Methodist Health System.
- 3. METHODIST HEALTH SYSTEMS ENCOURAGES ITS OFFICERS, EMPLOYEES, AND ASSOCIATES TO PARTICIPATE IN THE HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES OF THE CONFERENCES AND THEIR MEMBER CHURCHES.
 - . Numerous Methodist Health Systems associates are involved in various activities at the local, district, and Annual Conference levels.
 - . The Hospital Auxiliary links Methodist Health Systems to local churches through United Methodist Women.
- 4. METHODIST HEALTH SYSTEMS REPORTS SYSTEM ACTIVITIES TO THE CHURCHES IN THE CONFERENCES AND THE GENERAL PUBLIC.
 - . "NEWS from Methodist Health Systems" is circulated bimonthly to 40,000 United Methodist Homes and 6,000 Methodist Health Systems Associates.
 - . Health care issues and personnel items of interest are provided through news releases to all media sources.
- 5. METHODIST HEALTH SYSTEMS CONTINUES THE PROGRAM OF PUBLIC RELATIONS, HEALTH MINISTRY, EDUCATION AND DEVELOPMENT IN THE CHURCHES THROUGHOUT THE CONFERENCES.
 - . Wellth Fairs were provided for 20,000 persons through churches, community, and corporations in a four state area.

- . Clergy/Laity Training The Annual Church and Health Symposium cosponsored by Methodist Health Systems and the Upper Room enrolled over 300 participants from 29 states.
- . Clinical Pastoral Education is provided on full time and extended quarter basis.
- . Clergy Professional Growth Training is provided to two nominees per district in the Arkansas Area.
- . Special programs are presented by Methodist Health Systems associates in local churches and community organizations.
- 6. METHODIST HEALTH SYSTEMS PROVIDES HEALTH, EDUCATION AND RESOURCE MATERIALS TO THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCHES, THEIR MINISTERS AND LAY PERSONS THROUGHOUT THE CONFERENCES.
 - . Nearly 30,000 pieces of literature were requested and distributed by church and community groups and through health promotion activities.
- 7. METHODIST HEALTH SYSTEMS ACCEPTS FINANCIAL GIFTS, UNRESTRICTED OR DESIGNATED, FROM MEMBERS OF THE CHURCHES IN THE CONFERENCES AND FROM OTHER APPROPRIATE SOURCES.
 - . School of Nursing enrollment is 324. Fifty-two scholarships totaling nearly \$40,000 were provided from the three Annual Conferences.
 - . Clinical Pastoral Education is supported in part by gifts from the Conferences.
 - . The Foundation Annual Fund campaign underwrites the Humanitarian Fund which responds to emergency requests for help from associates and patients.
- 8. METHODIST HEALTH SYSTEMS CONDUCTS THE BUSINESS OF THE SYSTEM IN A PRUDENT MANNER, CONSISTENT WITH ITS RESOURCES AND MISSION.
 - . Despite the fiscal challenges in healthcare, \$18,122,000 in indigent care was provided in 1988 in the name of the United Methodist Church of the three Annual Conferences.

MOUNT SEQUOYAH ASSEMBLY

The Olin C. Bailey Center has been completed and is serving the needs of the South Central Jurisdiction. Mount Sequoyah was favored by the jurisdiction in its 1988 session in New Orleans with the approval of funding for the construction of this 5,000 square foot building. It serves as a place for 250 persons to meet in a seminar setting.

Funding for this new addition will be apportioned to the churches in 1990 which will raise the \$300,000 cost of the building in four years. This will be in addition to the present apportionment of \$60,000 per year which is used to support the existing program of Mount Sequoyah.

New Trustees were introduced to the board this year after election by the jurisdiction. Outstanding persons from all seventeen Annual Conferences of the jurisdiction serve on this board along with three bishops. From the North Arkansas Annual Conference we have the able assistance of Bishop Richard B. Wilke who serves on the Executive Committee; Mrs. Sharon Spurlin, Trustee at Large, who serves on the Buildings and Grounds Committee; and Jack Meadows, Trustee at Large, who serves as Chairman of the Buildings and Grounds Committee; Ed Matthews who serves as Chairman of the Development and Endowment Committee and Bill Hutchenson who also serves on the Buildings and Grounds Committee.

A theme was selected for 1989 which features the rose. A new event will be held in August 1989, called the "Festival of Roses". New roses have been planted near the cafeteria to augment the two hundred roses already growing on the grounds.

In conjunction with the University of Arkansas, Mount Sequoyah will hold its first Elderhostel program. This fine educational program has been around for more than a decade but in recent years has increased in importance. We are pleased to offer this addition to programming for retired persons.

A jurisdictional work camp was planned for 1989 with the intention of joining all of the annual conferences into one week of work in support of this facility which serves the entire area.

The Trustees have started a Bishop's Club to gain support for Mount Sequoyah. Persons who are able to generate \$1,000 or more of new support are to be honored during Bishop's Week. Such generosity is the life's blood of the institution helping to insure its future place of importance, serving the seventeen conferences of the South Central Jurisdiction.

Mount Sequoyah reaches out to all of the members of the churches in the North Arkansas annual conference. You are invited to seek the presence of God, to deepen your faith, and to define more clearly your ministry and mission as you join into events held on the mountain top in this "Year of the Rose."

PART 1. THEOLOGY OF OUTDOOR MINISTRY

Introduction

Why should the Church be involved, or even interested, in camping? How can, does, or should camping enhance or facilitate ministry, much less belong as a part of ministry?

Although Christians have been doing and thinking "theology" for as long as they have been doing and thinking, it is unfortunately true- we contend- that there has been far too little attention devoted to the specific kind of theology indicated in questions such as these. Too little thought has been given to any theology or rationale or philosophy for Christian camping. And because there has been little consideration, there is even less consensus, and consequently there has arisen a whole range of radically different activities, each one of which is called church camp or outdoor ministry. More importantly, because we have not adequately and properly answered the "why" questions, church camping too often is either no different from secular camping, on the one hand, or no different than Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, or any other type of Christian assembly inside or outside - on the other hand.

It is our intent to show, based on a brief examination of why the church ought to camp, that church camping should deliberately be both "church" and "camp". That is, we affirm that true outdoor ministry can be and must be both fully outdoors and wholly ministry. The camping program of the Church is and must be unique, both among the whole array of outdoor experiences and also within the Church's education program.

The purpose of outdoor ministry, not unlike the purpose of all ministry, is to make it posible for persons to enter into and grow in relationship with God in Christ. The means of achieving that end, or purpose, differ according to the type of ministry, though, and we believe that the way in which outdoor ministry facilitates relationships with God in Christ is indeed unique. As we shall see, outdoor ministry utilizes a four-fold strategy of 1) experiencing total dependence on God; 2) perceiving interdependence with and responsibility for creation; 3) becoming receptive through play; and 4) sharing self with others in Christian community. Not only then do these four aspects of outdoor ministry constitute its peculiarity, but also, taken as a whole, they become the standards by which we judge whether a program is indeed outdoor ministry, or church camping.

But let us first look more closely at outdoor ministry's general purpose of enabling relationship with God in Christ.

To Camp is To Relate

The Christian understands that both the origin and purpose of life, the essence and sustenance of all life, is relationship. It is relationship with God, relationship with others, relationship with the rest of creation, and relationship with self. This basic tenet of Christian understanding, which is the premise not only of church camping but also for all that the Church is and does, is first set forth in the act and doctrine of creation. To be created in the image of God means to be created in and

for relationship. Because humankind is created in the image of God, we can say, not that humanity is somehow God-like, but that humanity's very existence is oriented toward God. Humanity's true nature is to be found in God. Being in the image of God means having the capacity, the potential, and the intended purpose of relationship with God, to humans only has God given the capacity for a deeper, fuller, more personal and loving relationship that we call covenant relationship. God's purpose for us is covenant. Only in this intended state of creation is the human fully human, for full humanity is defined as relatedness to God. Humans exist only to the extent that they are in relationship, and we are most fully human when we accept relationship with God in Christ as central to our lives. It is for that purpose - for reconciliation, for the restoration of covenant relationship - that Christ came to live, die and be raised for us and with us.

This relationship for which we are created, and re-created in Christ, is not with God only but issues forth in other relationships - both human and non-human - which are crucial and essential to life. What God has created and is creating is not just an individual human here and there, but a vast, marvelous network of everchanging relationships. To the degree that we are able to relate to and encounter the other - whether the other is God, persons, or nature - meaningfully and personally, we find that our own intended personhood and created humanity more fully emerges.

Church camping can enable precisely this most important of all aspects of being human: enjoying full relationship with God in Christ, and with all of God's family and God's creation. The primary manner in which outdoor ministry enables relationships is by revealing to us our complete and utter dependence on God, our Creator.

To Relate is To Be Dependent On God

The most important, and unique, strategy that is available to outdoor ministry is the strategy of creating opportunities for persons to experience the dependent nature of their relationship with God. In fact the first and most basic criterion which an event must meet in order to be a true example of outdoor ministry is its ability to confront persons with the fact that our relationship with God is a particular kind of relationship; it is a relationship of full and total dependence on God.

Again, this notion of our complete and utter dependence on God is best and first seen in the doctrine of creation. It is because the divine-human relationship is inherently a Creator-creature relationship that not only our existence but also the relationship itself is entirely dependent on God and God's initiative. To affirm that God is creator is also to assert that creation is still continuing. If God were not choosing every moment to give us life - to create - we would not exist. Every breath we take is due to the inbreathing of the creative spirit of God. Within the doctrine of creation, especially as it can and should be exemplified in the experiences of church camping, then, we come to understand not only that God is revealed as love but also that our relationship with God is one of utter dependence.

This complete dependence on God is true in spite of and because of the fact that we are also wholly distinct from God. Because God is Creator and is infinite, and

because we are creatures and finite, then God is transcendent or completely other, and unreachable by human effort. Creation - that which is created - is good precisely because it is given life by the loving God, but creation, including humankind, is not God. It is our created finitude, the possibility and actuality of death, that makes humanity and all of creation at once distinct from and totally dependent on God. We come from and go to God.

In our finitude the human is a creature in the same order as other animals. Yet, unlike the animal world, humankind alone is able to confirm and experience its dependence on and need for God. To be a human creature is to sense the temporality of life. To be a human creature is to know that one is unable to a large extent to control what happens to him or her, to determine where or when one is born, one's physical and emotional make-up, what opportunities one will have, and so on. In his or her reflective moments the human is aware that there is something deeper and higher than oneself, and that because one is creature there must surely be creator. However, this continual human awareness of dependence and finitude is increasingly being threatened by today's world of technology, in which all of daily life is a matter of ready availability. Indoors, and in the presence of modern conveniences, we too easily take for granted our food, shelter, and other necessities. Indoors, and in the presence of human-made structures and devices of every kind, we begin to see ourselves as in control and humanity as belonging to us. Outdoors, when we are confronted with opportunities to get caught in the rain, to play in the mud, to be hot and thirsty before reaching camp - outdoors, we once again are forced to see that God is in control and to see that humanity belongs to God. Outdoors, where we see sprouting buds and dying brown grass, rabbits scurrying away in fear, and vultures feasting on carrion, we are reminded that we too are a part of God's creation, the ordered natural processes of the world, and that we too are dependent for every moment of our existence on the good graces of our Creator God.

It is incumbent on persons designing outdoor ministry, or church camping situations, that they provide experiences that demonstrate and reveal to us the essential nature of our relationship to God - one of complete and utter dependence.

To Relate is To Be interdependent and Responsible

The lesson on human creatureliness, temporality, and dependence on God is reinforced by a second lesson of human interdependence on and with the rest of God's creation. The second method (and thus also criterion or standard), which outdoor ministry can and must utilize as a way of fostering persons' relationship with God in Christ, is the method of promoting interaction with, understanding of, and appreciation for nature as a gift of God to which we are integrally and intimately related. The more we can be exposed to and learn about nature – botany, zoology, ecology – through observation, experiments, projects, etc., the more that outdoor ministry can facilitate a sense of interdependence with the rest of the creation, and dependent relationship with God.

Scripture claims that God saw all God's work and proclaimed it good. Nature and humanity are both part of God's creation, where neither is superior to the other, but both are part of an interdependent, mutually nourishing system.

Furthermore, we are dust-to-dust created. Earth is of us. It is God's gift that supports and sustains us and without it we die. More even than nature is dependent on humanity, we are dependent on nature. The dominion over creation which humans are biblically given is not a license to dominate. All creation belongs to God and not to us, and we are shepherds of all that God provides us. To the degree that we are to be managers of the natural system, our health and well-being depend on the care and support we give to the natural world, of which we are integrally a part.

Let us be clear that purpose an appropriate understanding of nature serves, or rather what purpose it does not serve. Nature is <u>not</u> the primary source of the revelation of God. Nature <u>is</u> a place to meet God, and nature is God's, but nature is not God; nor does nature replace Jesus Christ as the primary and infinite source of God's self-revelation. It is not so much revelation as it is relationship - interdependent and dependent relationship - that nature and being in nature provide. To believe that God can clearly be seen in nature is to reduce God to the level of nature, just as believing that God can be captured in human thought and logic is to make God merely a product of the human mind. Nevertheless, all of the created order is to be regarded sacramentally because anything which stirs us to the reality of who we are and who God is, as nature does, is sacred. It is our responsibility to treat nature with dignity and respect, and to learn from nature of our shared dependence on God and our interdependence with creation.

To Play is To Be Receptive to Relationship

The third essential component or feature (and thus also the third criterion or standard) of outdoor ministry is more subtle and mystical than the first two. The third aspect which must be present to have legitimate outdoor ministry is the condition of play, or leisure, or recreation/re-creation. Outdoor ministry must provide settings in which persons can truly relax and can be comfortable in both organized and spontaneous play, for play is a significant means by which humans are and can be open and receptive to the gifts and guidance of the spirit of God. Relationship is dependent on revelation, and while that which is revealed of God through Christ is of God's own choosing (and is in no way limited to the realm of nature), it is nevertheless our obligation to be as open and accepting and receptive as possible to God's revealing of himself.

Jesus said we must become childlike in order to enjoy the fullness of relationship with God in Christ (Matthew 18:3-4). While Jesus mainly meant we must be as dependent as children, it is also true that play makes us childlike. It makes us feel silly and vulnerable. It takes us back to our childhood and enables us to recapture the natural, no-preservatives-added us. While we don't fully understand why this is so, research by Lyman Coleman, Walter Wink, and others is showing that it is while we are playful and childlike, while we are functioning in our "right brain", creative, non-analytical frame of mind, that we are most open to the Spirit of God, and thus to relationship to the Creator and creation. Play, especially non-competitive play, and the recreation and relaxation that are so naturally a part of being outdoors break down the barriers we erect between us and

God, between us and others, and between warring parts of our own selves. Persons at play are inevitably persons whose masks of pretense are stripped away.

In the same mystical kind of way, play gives us the ability to be re-creative. The spirit of God makes all things new, and the insights about God, self, and others that are available in recreation are often the basis for true re-creation. Outdoor ministry nurtures our relationship with God and our relationships with others, self, and the created order by providing persons with opportunities to receive revelation through re-creative play.

To Be In Community Is To Be In Relationship

The final essential of church camping is participation and involvement in a caring community. A church camp that does not provide opportunities for communal relationships does not and cannot be true outdoor ministry.

The Christian community is a community where each person is led to feel a sense of personal belonging and acceptedness, a point which can only be reached to the degree that persons are willing to take the risk of opening and sharing themselves - who they really are - with others. Christian community, or koinonia, is not constructed or achieved, but is received as a gift from God wherever and whenever persons are helped to disclose themselves to themselves and to others. Because of the mystical, mysterious way in which the Spirit of God works, we know that when we open ourselves to others as well as to ourselves, that we also open ourselves to God and can perceive the way, in which, through Christ, God has and is opening (revealing) God's self to us. Full relationship with others, with self, and with God comes when we discover that, in spite of the "me" we have to share, we have nevertheless been accepted and loved. Like divine covenant relationship itself, Christian community is purely a matter of God's grace. It is due solely to God's freely choosing to love us and accept us just as we are. Community happens when we can accept others because we know God has forgiven and accepted us, and when we can feel accepted by God because others have met our risks of self-disclosure by reaching out to us with love and care and acceptance. In the sharing of secrets with a new friend, the trust offered by a counselor, the judgment and forgiveness of some corporate or personal crisis, the experience of Christian camping enables persons to discover God's grace and acceptance as unearned gifts. It is in this Christian community - essential to outdoor ministry - that persons learn of the grace available in Christ Jesus and are thus strengthened in their relationship with self, with others, and with God.

Suggary

We submit that true Christian camping, or outdoor ministry, exists only to the degree that each of the above four criteria is properly met. It is incumbent upon planners of church camps to provide experiences in which persons 1) are confronted with their dependence on and need for God; 2) perceive themselves as a part of, interdependent with, and responsible for the whole of creation; 3) become receptive through re-creative play, and 4) share self with others within the grace of Christian community. All programming for Christian camping should offer Christ with intentionality and should meet the standards, or guidelines, set out in this

statement of theology. And, as is the case in that other quadrilateral, the camping quadrilateral is not composed of four parts of equal weight, but rather the first standard carries the greatest significance. In a time when persons find it too easy to ignore or overlook our essential human need and dependence on God, the church must make an adequate and diligent investment of its resources in order to provide attractive opportunities where persons can develop an appropriate awareness of who God is and who they are in relationship to God and God's created family.

II. RECOMMENDATIONS FOR OUTDOOR MINISTRIES

1) WHEREAS participation by the people of God in outdoor ministry is of utmost importance, and

WHEREAS the level of participation, and the number of camps offered, in our conference's outdoor ministry program has decreased over the past decade, WHEREAS this is in part due to the attractiveness in facilities and program of other camping opportunities available to families in North Arkansas, and

WHEREAS other conferences in United Methodism have met with great success when they have centralized camping programs and location, and

WHEREAS our current outdoor ministries facilities, with the exception of Nawake Conference Center, do not allow us the opportunity to attractively offer the variety and quality of camping we consider necessary and

WHEREAS greater cost effectiveness will be served by a centralization of program and facilities.

THEREFORE WE RECOMMEND, in compliance with previous action of the North Arkansas Annual Conference, that the Master Plan for the Nawake Conference Center be implemented in accordance with that plan, and, that the Nawake Conference Center become the main site and focus for Outdoor Ministries in the North Arkansas Conference. (See 1977 Journal of the North Arkansas Annual Conference, pp. 141-142 and p.48).

- 2) In order to truly develop and utilize Nawake Conference Center as the primary site for outdoor ministries, the following time-line and strategy will need to be implemented:
- a) by June 1989 ask the Annual Conference to adopt this report.
- b) by January 1989 the Kaetzell Mini-lodge shall be completed and operational.
- c) by January 1, 1990 ask the Bishop to appoint clergy or laity as the Nawake Site Manager by June 1, 1990, with duties and responsibilities such as those now borne by our district camp managers.
- d) by January 1, 1990 the total Outdoor Ministries Program (including Nawake and regional campsites) shall be funded at the Annual Conference level through a conference apportionment. It is our assumption that there will be no Annual Conference funding of regional campsites (former district camps) beyond A.D.2000.
- e) by June 1, 1991 have a second mini-lodge completed and operational. Funds for construction shall be solicited from local churches, families, individuals, etc. (memorials, gifts).

- f) by June 1, 1993 the Basic Resident Camp II (see map, p. 29 and Appendix V. p.39), as described in Nawake Master Plan, shall be completed so as to accommodate larger assembly camps.
- g) The Conference encourages the trustees of the property at Shoal Creek, Bear Creek, and Wayland Springs to give strong consideration to the disposal of their property as soon as is practical and within the next ten years.
- h) by January 1, 2000 the Nawake Master Plan shall have been implemented to the extent of the outdoor ministry needs of the North Arkansas Conference. Further, by this date, there will be a full-time resident manager/director at Nawake Conference Center whose duties shall include supervision of maintenance, scheduling, and programming of on-site and off-site outdoor ministries. The manager/director will be accountable to the Director of the Conference Council on Ministries and the Conference Committee on Outdoor Ministries.
- 3) Between January 1, 1990, and such time as all district camps shall cease to operate as conference related campsites, the conference Committee on Outdoor Ministries shall structure the operation of the district campsites according to the Model for Regional Campsites which is attached to these recommendations (see pp. 14-15).
- 4) We recommend that when a present district campsite is sold, and the proceeds of the sale are given toward the construction of a mini-lodge at Nawake Conference Center, the mini-lodge shall bear the name of that former district camp, and an appropriate recognition of the camping history at that district campsite be provided on the premises of the resulting mini-lodge.
- 5) We recommend that the Committee on Outdoor Ministries and the North Arkansas Conference encourage local congregations, families, individuals, and other interested groups to make memorial gifts and other contributions to Nawake Conference Center for the construction of lodges and other facilities as have been outlined in the Nawake Master Plan and in accordance with the priorities established by the Conference Committee on Outdoor Ministries.
- 6) With regard to specific programming for various types and settings of outdoor ministries, we recommend that the conference Committee on Outdoor Ministries follow the four guidelines set forth in the "Theology of Outdoor Ministry" that begins this report. In addition, we recognize that for many persons in the present and past outdoor ministries experiences have been crucial as 1) a means of personal spiritual formation and religious awareness out of which meaningful decisions were often made concerning life vocation; and 2) a source of pivotal and/or meaningful religious experience which provided rich memories of one's spiritual development in childhood and youth. We do recommend that all future planning for outdoor ministries intentionally incorporate these important considerations.
- 7) We recommend the continuation of annual training events for the leaders of all conference outdoor ministry programs. Furthermore, we recommend that attention be given at each year's training event to the "Theology of Outdoor Ministry" as the foundation document for all that we do.

III. THE MODEL FOR REGIONAL CAMPSITES

- 1. Our present campsites located at Shoal Creek, Wayland Springs, and Bear Creek traditionally have been district or bi-district campsites. These camps have increasingly become regional in usage. Therefore, we recommend that the North Arkansas Conference adopt the policy of regarding the present district campsites as "regional conference campsites." Further, we share concerns about present policies and means of funding the operation of these district campsites. We recommend a change in how the operation of the campsites is funded. The model below addresses these concerns, and seeks to offer an interim solution until such time as Nawake Master Plan has been implemented.
- 2. THE MODEL FOR THE OPERATION OF THE REGIONAL CAMPSITES
- A. The present district campsites will become regional campsites serving the entire Annual Conference, but specifically serving the region of the Conference in which each is located.
- B. The new regional campsites will be structured and operated much like our Wesley Foundations.
 - A regional Board of Advisors for each regional campsite will be elected by the Annual Conference upon nomination by the Conference Committee on Outdoor Ministries to monitor the program and make recommendations concerning the facility. The Board of Advisors will provide a crucial link between the Conference Committee on Outdoor Ministries, the camp and/or district trustees, and the Regional Campsite manager.
 - 2. Funding for the basic operational costs will be apportioned at the Annual Conference level and will become a part of the budget of the Conference Committee on Outdoor Ministries.
 - Title, and responsibility for capital improvements to the regional campsites, shall continue to reside in those Boards of Trustees presently holding title to the properties.
 - 4. The regional campsite manager will be a conference appointment.
 - Programming at the regional campsites shall be at the direction of the Conference Committee on Outdoor Ministries.
 - 6. The Conference Committee on Outdoor Ministries will provide a job description for the Regional Campsite Managers, allowing for some flexibility as pertains to the unique needs of each campsite.
 - Insurance coverage will be provided at the Annual Conference level to cover all regional campsites with liability and property damage insurance.

Parish and community development committee

In 1989, the Parish and Community Development Committee became a committee of the annual conference, rather than a committee of the Board of Global Ministries as it had previously existed. The duties of the Parish and Community Development Committee are elaborated in the 1988 Book of Discipline, Para. 731.5. These

include responsibilities for cooperative parish ministries, congregational development, town and country ministries, and urban ministries.

As we began our work, we attempted to assess the state of cooperative parish ministries in the North Arkansas Conference. At this time it appears that several parishes are functioning independent of conference support and that no efforts are currently being made to develop any new parish arrangements. The Parish & Community Development Committee stands ready to resource any existing parishes as we are able and will respond to individual parish requests. Other than this, we have no program or policy to submit, but would welcome suggestions for our increased participation in Cooperative Parish Ministries from those who are involved in this ministry.

A major responsibility of the Parish and Community Development Committee is the administration of our Conference's church extension and congregation development programs. The revised policies by which we propose to operate are as follows:

Church Extension Program

The Church Extension Program of the North Arkansas Conference exists to undergird and lend conference support to projects in existing churches to improve or expand their facilities to better serve their parish area.

The Church Extension Program is a program of the Committee on Parish and Community Development, administered by said Committee.

Funding for projects is made available through grants from the Church Extension Fund. Limited loans are made from the Conference Loan Fund.

GRANT OR LOAN ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

A church receiving a grant or loan shall have a period of financial stewardship cultivation during each year assistance is given.

A church receiving a grant or loan shall be expected to show diligence in paying its apportionments for the total program of the United Methodist Church.

It is highly recommended that an architect be employed for building and remodeling projects. In most cases the services of an architect shall be regarded as essential. An architect is available for consultation, without charge, through the General Board of Global Ministries, to give assistance to churches which have been approved for a General Board or Conference Board grant or loan.

APPLICATION FOR GRANTS OR LOANS:

All applications for grants or loans shall be submitted on forms provided by the Parish and Community Development Committee and shall provide in full the requested supportive information including the approval and recommendation of the Pastor and District Superintendent.

An application for a grant or loan to build a new building, obtain land for a church site, expand an existing building, or provide major renovation of a building shall be accompanied by a letter or minutes from the District Committee on Church Location and Building showing approval and support.

Applications for grants from the Church Extension Fund are to be sent to the Conference Secretary of Church Extension: Roger B. Hook, 1151 North Central Avenue, Batesville, AR 72501. Phones: 793-2365 or 793-7225.

Applications for loans from the Conference Loan Fund are to be made through the Conference Loan Secretary: Sue Brand, 508 Southeast 2nd, Walnut Ridge, AR 72476. Phone: 886-3115.

Inquiries for further Church Extension information, services and assistance may be directed to the Chairperson of Committee on Parish and Community Development: Greg Webb, 2200 Phoenix, Fort Smith, AR Phones: 646-9702 and 646-2780.

Applications for grants are to be in the hands of the Secretary of Church Extension by February 15 each year. Applications for loans are to be in the hands of the Conference Loan Secretary by February 15 and October 1 each year.

Applications for grants or loans from the General Board of Global Ministries may be made through the same officers listed above and must be submitted by February 15.

GUIDELINES FOR NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE LOAN FUND

1. Loans shall be given upon completion of the project.

2. An application requires the approval of the District Board Church Location and Building (p. 1414-1416 in the Discipline).

3. An application requires a note signed by the trustees of the church, secured by a mortgage or deed of trust.

4. There shall be insurance on the property that is mortgaged with the Parish and Community Development Committee as Payee for an amount not less than the

5. The guidelines established in the Discipline p. 1431, 1432 and 1435 and the guidelines for loans in the 1989 Conference Journal shall be followed.

6. There shall be no prepayment penalties.

7. The interest rate shall be 6% per annum.

8. The minimum repayment of the loan shall be \$1,000 for principal plus interest annually. The term of the loan shall not exceed fifteen (15) years.

9. The Secretary of the Conference Loan Fund shall advise the Director of the United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas when payment is to be made.

ACTION ON APPLICATIONS:

The Parish and Community Development Committee will act on applications for grants during the month of March and applications for loans during the months of March and October of each year.

Factors entering into the consideration of applications shall include the evident need for the project, the extension of Christian ministry the project will make possible, the population and area to be reached, the degree to which other churches are serving the area under consideration, the evaluations of the proposed project by the District Superintendent, the Bishop, Cabinet, and district agencies, as well as the results of research by the Parish and Community Development Committee. The level of local commitment and effort are also significant factors.

Full approval and authorization of grants from the Church Extension Fund and loans from the Conference Loan Fund shall be lodged in the Parish and Community Development Committee.

DISBURSEMENTS OF GRANTS OR LOANS:

In general, disbursement of a grant may be made to a project when the Pastor and the District Superintendent certify by letter to the Secretary of Church Extension that the funds, thus made available, will, when combined with other available funds, make possible the completion of the project. Disbursement of a loan may be made when all requested forms are in the hands of the Conference Loan Secretary.

As money becomes available in the appropriate Fund, a disbursement check shall then be mailed to the District Superintendent for delivery to the project. Approved grants must be requested within two years of the approval date.

New Congregation Development Program

The Parish and Community Development Committee, is charged with and supporting the development of ne₩ and congregations", (P 731.5e) and the Catch the Vision Fund is the process whereby meaningful contributions can be made in starting new churches and to the proposed relocation of existing congregations when justified.

I. NEW CONGREGATIONS:

- A. Goal: It shall be a goal of the North Arkansas Conference to start one new congregation a year within our conference as the need arises and the resources are available.
- B. New Congregations may be started in a variety of ways, including (but not limited to): (1) an existing congregation initiating a mission location; (2) an existing congregation initiating an extension Sunday School in another location; (3) a pastor may be appointed to a given area for the purpose of establishing a congregation; (4) a pastor may be appointed to a piece of property already owned to start a new church; (5) the District Board of Church Location and Building identifies an area or community of significant growth for a new or relocated congregation and one of the above may take place; (6) Bishop, Cabinet and Committee on Parish and Community Development may identify an area or community as a target for a new church or relocated congregation.
 - C. Criteria for an Emerging Congregation:
 - Missions and Ministry shall be a focus from the beginning of each congregation. The purpose of a United Methodist Church is to be held forth by each pastor so as to present the Gospel in the community.

2. A strong community of faith, fellowship or koinonia, will be an aim to provide strength and support to each person in the Body of Christ.

- 3. Stewardship in all its aspects (time, talents, finances) will be taught so as to enrich the goals above as well as to financially undergird the fledgling congregations.
- 4. While the pastor is critical in the formation of a new church, the people need to help provide a setting conducive to the high morale of the pastor.
- 5. New congregations will be encouraged to contribute a tithe of their current year's operating budget to the apportioned funds of the annual conference in lieu of apportionments for a maximum of 5 years. Specific amounts and division among the various apportionment items to be arrived at in consultation with the District Superintendent.
 - II. FINANCIAL SUPPORT FOR NEW CONGREGATIONS

Support for the new congregations can come from several sources such as: the congregation itself, district mission funds, district "special" funds/apportionment. interested individuals or groups in the community, Equitable Salary Commission (key charge arrangement), and Catch the Vision funds. These new and relocated congregations, particularly the new ones, will need this assistance for clergy salary and housing and utilities support, first meeting facilities, site purchase, program, outreach ministries, advertising, signs, leadership training.

- A. First meeting facilities can include arenas, theaters, community building, other religious group buildings, public buildings (schools, auditoriums). We do not recommend or endorse the use of trailers. It is important to have a focal point for identity during the beginning for the new congregation, but deliberate, longrange plans need to be made to avoid premature, debilitating indebtedness.
- B. Salary, utilities and housing for the pastor will be needed until such time as the new congregation can become self-sufficient. A five year declining rate of support from district, Equitable Salaries, or other funds, is anticipated, however, each church will be urged to make stewardship education among its primary goals to shorten the time whenever possible.
- Site selection and purchase can come at any time prior to, or after the organization of the church; unless there are unusual circumstances, five acres will be considered the minimum goal for a new congregation. Once the property is identified through the combined efforts of the Bishop, Cabinet, District Board of Church Location and Building, and the Parish and Community Development Committee, the purchase will be pursued in accordance with the Book of
- D. Outreach and programs of nurture should begin with the advent of the new church, even before there is a sizeable number of members and constituents. A recommended goal for the congregation's budget is seen as one-fourth salary, onefourth mission/outreach (including initiating apportionments), one-fourth program (including advertising) and one-fourth debt retirement.
- The First Phase in the building program will be crucial to the continued growth and nurture of the new congregation, therefore, a premature program is to be avoided. The first phase of the building program should not be initiated until attendance is averaging 100 or better. This first phase needs to be constructed within the bounds of a reasonably manageable debt for the membership (national statistics indicate the need to be at a \$60,000 self-generated budget with 1/3 for debt retirment as the minimum requirement). Catch the Vision funds are seen as one way to help avoid indebtedness which might severely limit the focus and capabilities of those members and future members.
 - III. CATCH THE VISION FUNDS
- A. Monies collected from the Catch the Vision Annual Calls will provide support to eligible projects for the following purposes:
 - 1. Site purchase for a present or future development.
 - 2. Assistance for start-up and first meeting facilities.
 - Assistance in the first phases of the building program.

- B. New Congregations/Churches formed by Relocation or Merger. Relocating churches and new congregations formed by merger will be eligible for funds under the following criteria:
- 1. A relocation church shall be defined as one which is moved at the initiative of the Bishop, District Superintendent/Cabinet, District Board of Church Location and Building, with the advice and consultation of the Parish and Community Development Committee.
- 2. New churches resulting from a merger of two or more congregations will be eligible under the same process as for relocation.
 - B. Limits on Catch the Vision Funding.

The following shall be the limits of time and dollars for new congregations.

- 1. A church shall be considered new for five years from the date of the appointment of the pastor. An extension of up to two years may be granted for special circumstances after an indepth review.
- 2. A maximum of \$ 350,000 will be allowed to any one situation, covering all items as noted in III.A. Actual funding will be determined by the needs of the project and the availability of funds.
- 3. Projects elegible for funding within the above limit must have been approved as a qualifying project by the Parish and Community Development Committee prior to the beginning of the project.
 - D. Application for Catch the Vision Funds.
- 1. Secure an application form from: Rev. Jerry Meeks, P.O. Box 306, Clinton, AR 72031.
- 2. Complete the form, including the signature of the District Superintendent and others as needed for the specific request.
- 3. Return the form/request to: Rev. Jerry Meeks, P.O. Box 306, Clinton, AR 72031.
- 4. Requests will be considered at any time during the year by the Parish and Community Development Committee with funds being disbursed according to need and availability.

PERKINS SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

Concern over the effect on seminary education of the increasing number of "second career" students was raised during the year with the observation that this population now represents 65% of enrollments. This involves more part time

students who choose courses for convenience as much as content. Previous life experiences are difficult to credit for these persons. Broader interpretations by the church of study requirements for ministerial qualification burdens seminaries with responding to these factors with integrity, while aiding the church in meeting increasing demands to train persons adequately for ministry.

Student enrollment this year maintained a balance with last year, with 271 in the Master of Divinity degree program and distribution among other degrees totalling 417 for the fall, with a small rise to 423 in the spring. Women constitute 38% of the students in all programs and the combination of Asian Americans, African American, Hispanic students reaching a total of 63, with 31 internationals. The ages of students showed the largest segment in ages 25-34, though a significant number are in the 40-49 age range.

Renewal of a sort other than theological has been the norm this year as the Perkins Chapel and the Bridwell Library have undergone redecoration and major renovation. The Chapel received its regular face-lift, with general painting and cleanup accomplished during December and January.

The Bridwell Library has functioned "in exile" for almost the whole year, while total renovation of the building has been accomplished. Circulating collections were shifted to a dormitory basement, while staff dispersed to other office locations. With the reopening in March, services of the library for students and researchers will be vastly improved. Carefully designed reading rooms, private study carrels, conversation facilities, galleries, and archival storage will constitute one of the foremost research and knowledge facilities in this part of the world.

Emphasis of the Ministerial Education Fund remains crucial as the annual base of local church support for ministerial studies in the seminary. The Jurisdictional "Fair Share Goal" campaign continues for Perkins as we seek to improve the endowment that is essential to the perpetuity of support for student financial assistance, the Intern program, and other important facets of education for ministers in training. Several significant estate gifts were gratefully received, including \$65,000 for the Fern Woodhull-Oden Memorial Scholarship Fund, \$500,000 for a lectureship on the arts as interpreters of religious faiths and practices, and \$160,000 for the Faculty Development Program funded jointly by the Lilly Endowment. A new program, Partners With Perkins, seeks special gifts with an emphasis on International students and general scholarship support from persons able and interested in this type of investment.

New faculty this year include Dr. Thomas William Spann and the Rev. Marilyn Spurrell Atkins in the Intern Program; Dr. Yap Kim Hao of Malaysia and Singapore has been Visiting Professor of World Christianity. Bishop James S. Thomas retired from the East Ohio Conference and came as Distinguished Visiting Professor of Practical Theology. Bishop John Wesley Hardt became Bishop in Residence upon retirement from the Oklahoma Area. Dr. Ruth Tiffany Barnhouse retires this year. We were saddened by the death of Bishop W. McFerrin Stowe, who had served eight years as Bishop in Residence, following retirement from the episcopacy.

Search committees for five faculty positions that are coming open due to retirements began early in 1989, driven by inspiring visions that Perkins may equip itself and its students to meet the challenges of ministry in the 21st Century.

PHILANDER SMITH COLLEGE

Philander Smith College made significant improvements in its endeavors during the past year under the capable leadership of Dr. Myer L. Titus, President, who completed his first year as CEO February 1, 1989.

Student enrollment is up 8% for the 1988 Fall term over the 1987 Fall term - 594 and 550 students respectively. The physical environment of the campus has been improved. Improvements include renovations in the Administration Building, the College Cafeteria and Snack Bar. Campus lighting has been improved and campus security has been strengthened.

Undergirded by the ideals of Christianity in the great tradition of The United Methodist Church, the faculty continues to maintain excellence in teaching, learning and research. With regard to research, in 1989 a faculty member visited South Africa on grant funds pursuant to the scientific research he conducts at the College designed to impact on the economic and social welfare of Third World people.

For the first time in recent years, Philander Smith College was represented at all United Methodist Annual Conferences assigned to it to visit in 1988 in interest of the Black College Fund (BCF) and the College. President Titus visited Annual Conferences in Arkansas, Missouri and Kansas.

The College's alumni is showing increased interest in supporting their Alma Mater. During its annual convention in 1988, the National Alumni Association awarded the College \$25,000. The Association also pledged to buy the College a heavy duty commercial bus. During the President's Inauguration in October, 1988, an alumnus held a fund-raiser which netted the College approximately \$11,000.

The Commission on Black Colleges, Nashville, Tennessee, approved the College for continued funding from the Black College Fund after the Commission's on-site visit to the campus November, 1988. The North Central Association of Colleges and Schools approved the College's annual report showing its progress on student recruitment, fiscal management, fund-raising and the endowment.

Sound fiscal management continues to be practiced at the College. It finished the fiscal year, 1987-88, in the black; and its annual audit by professionals was received with only minor exceptions. Significant improvements were made in the insurance benefits to college personnel. The faculty received a 15% increase in salary and the staff received 8%.

Fund-raising continues to be a high priority, inasmuch as additional financial support to the College is critical. Proposals amounting to \$392,388, have been submitted to various agencies. The College raised \$54,148, in cash and pledges during the 1988 United Negro College Fund (UNCF) campaign and the UNCF Telethon aired on television December, 1988. Funds from a proposal submitted to federal, state and other agencies have been received in the amount of \$1,667,193, to support various education programs.

The intercollegiate basketball teams (men and women) and the Collegiate Choir continue to play important roles in the positive morale of our students as well as serve as ambassadors for the College.

The College is optimistic about its future as a viable United Methodist institution of higher education.

THE GENERAL CONFERENCE THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH Proposed Constitutional Amendment

On Friday evening, May 6, 1988, at a session of the General Conference of The United Methodist Church held in St. Louis, Missouri, the following Constitutional Amendment was made by a recorded vote of 783, yes; 85, no; 3, abstaining. It is now presented to the Annual Conferences for vote.

In Section VII, Paragraph 35, Article I, insert the following words:

In the Annual conferences of the Central Conferences, the four-year participation and the two-year membership requirements may be waived by the Annual Conference for young persons under twenty-five (25) years of age. Such persons must be members of the United Methodist Church and active participants at the time of election.

If voted and so declared by the Council of Bishops, Par. 35 would then read:

The Annual Conference shall be composed of ministerial members as defined by the General Conference, together with a lay member elected by each charge, the diaconal ministers, the conference president of United Methodist Women, the conference president of United Methodist Men, the conference lay leader, district lay leaders, the president or equivalent officer of the conference young adult organization, the president of the conference youth organization, and two young persons under twenty-five (25) years of age from each district to be selected in such manner as may be determined by the Annual Conference. In the Annual Conferences of the Central Conferences, the four-year participation and the twoyear membership requirements may be waived by the Annual Conference for young persons under twenty-five (25) years of age. Such persons must be members of the United Methodist Church and active participants at the time of election. charge served by more than one minister shall be entitled to as many lay members as there are ministerial members. The lay members shall have been for the two years next preceding their election members of The United Methodist Church and shall have been active participants in The United Methodist Church for at least four years next preceding their election.

If the lay membership should number less than the ministerial members of the Annual Conference, the Annual Conference shall, by its own formula, provide for the election of additional lay members to equalize lay and ministerial membership of the Annual Conference.

REPORT OF TASK FORCE ALTERNATE HOUSING FOR ELDERLY REPORT *1

TO: Members of the North Arkansas Annual Conference

The United Methodist Church

The North Arkansas and Little Rock Annual Conferences, in session in June, 1988, approved a resolution asking Bishop Richard B. Wilke to appoint a task force to study alternate elderly housing needs in the state of Arkansas. This task force is made up of five persons from the North Arkansas Annual Conference, five persons from the Little Rock Annual Conference and five persons from Methodist Health Systems. They include the following people: Robert B. Howerton, Jr., Chairperson (Methodist Health Systems); Dr. James Argue, Sr. (Little Rock); Rev. Jim Beal (Methodist Health Systems); Mr. Johnnie Brannon (Little Rock); Rev. J. W. Carroll (Methodist Health Systems); Ms. Gina Cowan (North Arkansas); Rev. Paul Eubanks (Methodist Health Systems); Ms. Pat Freemyer (North Arkansas); Mrs. Shirley Garison (Little Rock); Mr. Fred Garritson (Little Rock); Rev. Ed Matthews (North Arkansas); Ms. Ann Schulze (Methodist Health Systems); Mrs. Mary Truitt (North Arkansas); Rev. Joe Wilkerson (Little Rock); and Dr.Larry Wright (North Arkansas).

This task force has met several times during the year and has used as a consultant, Mr. Donovan Gardner, of the Program Department of Health & Welfare Ministries, General Board of Global Ministries, New York City.

Based on the results of the meetings and the data gathered, we are attaching three documents for your information: the Bylaws of United Methodist Senior Services of Arkansas, Inc.; the Covenant Relationship Statement between the two annual conferences and United Methodist Senior Services of Arkansas, Inc.; and thirdly, a proposed budget and implementation plan.

It is recommended that the proposal to establish United Methodist Senior Services of Arkansas, Inc. be approved by the two annual conferences at their annual sessions in June, 1989, and that January 1, 1991 be established as the beginning date of United Methodist Senior Services of Arkansas, Inc. It is further recommended that the task force be continued to do promotion and cultivation of the mission and program of United Methodist Senior Services of Arkansas, Inc. and that each annual conference allocate \$500 during 1990 to underwrite the expenses of the task force.

REPORT #2

PROPOSED BYLAWS OF UNITED METHODIST SENIOR SERVICES OF ARKANSAS,INC. A NON-SHARE, NON-PROFIT CORPORATION ARTICLE I

NAME AND OFFICES

Section 1. Name. The name of the corporation is United Methodist Senior Services of Arkansas, Inc.

Section 2. <u>Principal Office.</u> The principal office of the corporation shall be located at United Methodist Center, 715 Center Street, Little Rock, Arkansas, which shall also be the corporation's registered office in the State of Arkansas.

Section 3. <u>Additional Offices</u>. The corporation may also have offices at such other places within the State of Arkansas as the board of directors or the executive committee may from time to time deem appropriate.

ARTICLE II PURPOSES

The corporation is organized for the following purposes:

The purposes for which the corporation is formed are exclusively charitable, educational, and scientific, including, for such purposes, constructing, owning, acquiring and operating retirement homes, nursing homes and other facilities and services for the aging, and subscribing for, obtaining, and holding membership in not-for-profit corporations exempt from federal income taxation under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code and to do every act and thing specifically to establish a network of retirement homes, nursing homes and other facilities and services for the aging and to direct the operation of not-for-profit exempt corporations through membership therein; provided however, the corporation shall not possess or exercise any power or authority either expressly by interpretation, or by operation of law that will prevent it at any time from qualifying and continuing to qualify as a corporation described in Section 501 (c) (3)of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended: nor shall it engage directly or indirectly in any activity which would cause the loss of such qualification.

No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, its members, trustees, officers, or other private persons except that the corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth herein. No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these bylaws, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170 (c) (2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. <u>Designation and Election</u>. For purposes of these bylaws, the members of the corporation shall be referred to as "trustees." The designation herein of the members as "trustees" shall not serve to expand or constrict the powers which such persons, as members, have. The trustees shall govern the corporation by delegating certain authority to the board of directors. All elected

trustees must be members of the United Methodist Church within the State of Arkansas. The number of trustees, including ex officio trustees, shall not be less than 24 and not more than 36. The number of trustees shall be determined by the trustees.

Ex officio trustees of the corporation shall be the presiding bishop of the Arkansas Area of the United Methodist Church, the director of the Council on Ministries of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church, the director of the Council on Ministries of the Little Rock Conference of the United Methodist Church, a district superintendent selected by the Cabinet of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church, a district superintendent selected by the cabinet of the Little Rock Conference of the United Methodist Church, and the president of the corporation.

The remaining trustees of the corporation shall be elected by the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church and the Little Rock Conference of the United Methodist Church. An equal number of trustees from each conference shall be elected by each conference during its annual meeting. The elected trustees shall take office on the following January 1. One-third (1/3) of the trustees shall be lay men and one-third (1/3) of the trustees shall be lay women.

Section 2. Term. Ex officio trustees shall not be limited as to the number of years which they may be trustees. As to the elected trustees, they shall be classified in respect to the time for which they shall severally hold office by dividing them into three (3) classes, each class consisting of one-third (1/3) of the whole group of elected trustees and with equal representation from each conference in each class. Except as otherwise provided, the elected trustees of the first class shall be elected for a term of one (1) year, the elected trustees of the second class shall be elected for a term of two (2) years, and the elected trustees of the third class shall be elected for a term of three (3) years. Thereafter, on January 1 of each year, the successors to the elected trustees shall take office for the term of three (3) years, so that the term of one class of elected trustees shall expire in each year. After an elected trustee has served three (3) consecutive three (3) year terms, such elected trustees shall not be eligible for re-election for one (1) year.

Section 3. <u>Voting Rights.</u> In all meetings of trustees each trustee (including ex officio trustees with the exception of the president) present shall be entitled to one (1) vote.

Section 4. Functions of Trustees. In addition to exercising all powers granted by statute and these bylaws, the trustees shall hear reports and evaluate the programs and services of the corporation and its subsidiaries. The trustees shall also promote the general welfare of the corporation, in particular, the relationship of the corporation to the United Methodist Church and the public. The Trustees shall have sole authority to select and dismiss any member or all members of the boards of directors of the corporation and its subsidiary corporations; to select and dismiss any officer of the corporation; to select the auditor for the corporation; to elect the nominating committee; to amend the charter; to amend the bylaws and to dissolve the corporation.

ARTICLE IV
MEETINGS OF TRUSTEES

Section 1. Regular Meetings. There shall be two (2) regular meetings of the trustees each year. The regular meetings shall be designated as the annual meeting and the mid-year meeting. The annual meeting shall be held at the principal office of the corporation during the month of December. The date and site of the mid-year meeting shall be set by the board of directors. At the annual meeting the trustees shall elect the boards of directors of the corporation and its subsidiary corporations and transact such other business as may properly be brought before the meeting including the selection of an auditor for the corporation and the election of directors of any foundation which may be formed to benefit the corporation and its subsidiaries. At the annual meeting the trustees shall elect a Nominating and Board Development Committee composed of at least four (4) trustees to recommend persons to stand for election to the boards of directors of the corporation and any formed subsidiary corporations and persons to stand for election as officers of the corporation at the following annual meeting and also transact such other business as may be properly brought before the meeting. The chairperson of the board of directors shall be an ex officio member of the nominating and board development committee. The presence in person of one-third (1/3) of the trustees shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at a regular meeting.

Section 2. <u>Special Meetings.</u> Special meetings of the trustees may be called for any purpose by the chairperson of the board of directors or by the president. Special meetings shall be called by the president or the secretary at the written request of five (5) trustees or a majority of the board of directors. Such request shall state the purpose of the proposed meeting. The presence in person of two-thirds (2/3) of the trustees shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 3. Notice of Regular and Special Meetings. Written notice of the regular meetings of the trustees shall be given to each member not less than thirty (30) nor more than sixty (60) days prior to the meeting. Written notice of special meetings of the trustees shall be given to each member not less than ten (10) days nor more than sixty (60) days prior to the meeting. Such notice shall state the time and place of the meeting and in the case of special meetings, shall state the general nature of the business to be transacted.

Section 4. <u>Presiding Officer</u>. The chairperson of the board of directors shall preside at meetings of trustees. If the chairperson is not present, the vice chairperson shall preside; if the vice chairperson is not present, then a person chosen by the board of directors or the executive committee shall preside. The secretary of the corporation shall act as secretary at meetings of trustees. If the secretary is not present, then a person chosen by the board of directors or the executive committee shall act as secretary.

Section 5. <u>Voting.</u> Unless otherwise provided by law, a majority of the trustees voting at any meeting at which there is a quorum shall be the act of the trustees. Proxy shall not be allowed.

ARTICLE V DIRECTORS Section 1. <u>General Powers. Number and Tenure.</u> Subject to the authority of the Trustees, the board of directors shall be the governing body of the corporation, and may exercise all powers of the corporation and perform all acts that are not by law or these bylaws required to be exercised or performed by the trustees. The board of directors shall vote the membership interests of the corporation in all of the corporation's subsidiary corporations.

The number of directors, which shall be not less than fifteen (15) nor more than eighteen (18) (including ex officio members), shall be determined by the board of directors. A majority of the directors shall be trustees of the corporation. The two (2) most recent past chairperson of the board of directors and the president shall be ex officio directors. All ex officio directors shall have full voting rights. The remaining directors shall be elected at the annual meeting of the trustees.

The elected directors shall be classified in respect of the time for which they shall severally hold office by dividing them into (3) classes, each class consisting of one-third (1/3) of the whole number of the elected board of directors. Each class of directors shall include at least one (1) person who is also a member of the board of directors of any subsidiary corporations in existence at the time of election. Except as otherwise provided, the directors of the first class shall be elected for a term of two (2) years, and the directors of the third class shall be elected for a term of three (3) years. Thereafter at each annual meeting of the trustees, the successors to the directors shall be elected to hold office for the term of three (3) years, so that the term of office of one class of directors shall expire in each year. After a director has served three (3) consecutive three (3) year terms, such director shall not be eligible for re-election for one (1) year.

Section 2. <u>Nominations</u>. Nominations for persons to serve on the board of directors shall be made by the Nominating and Board Development Committee elected at the annual meeting of trustees as provided in Article IV, Section 1. Nominations may also be made from the floor.

Section 3. <u>Vacancies.</u> Any vacancy in the board of directors shall be filled by the trustees at their next meeting for the unexpired term.

Section 4. Removal or Resignation. Any director or the entire board of directors may be removed, with or without cause, by the trustees, but only at a special meeting called for that purpose or at any regular meeting, where prior notification of that item is on the agenda. Any director may resign by giving written notice to the chairperson of the board of directors, to the president, or to the secretary. Unless otherwise specified in such notice, the resignation shall take effect upon delivery to the designated officer. A resignation need not be accepted in order to become effective.

Section 5. Attendance. Board members shall be required to attend all meetings in person or via previously approved telephone or similar communications equipment. Any member who is absent from three consecutive meetings shall be deemed to have resigned effective with the last missed meeting.

Section 6. <u>Function of Directors</u>. In addition to exercising all powers granted by statute and these bylaws, the directors shall have responsibility to ensure that the corporation has adequate funds to carry out its programs, to ensure proper management of the corporation's funds, facilities and services, to establish

guidelines for the development and operation of subsidiaries and to develop strategic and long range plans for the growth and welfare of the corporation.

ARTICLE VI MEETINGS OF DIRECTORS

- Section 1. <u>Annual Meeting.</u> The annual meeting of the board of directors shall be held immediately following the annual meeting of trustees.
- Section 2. Regular Meetings. Additional regular meetings of the boards of directors may be held at such time and place as may be established by the board of directors.
- Section 3. <u>Special Meetings.</u> Special meetings of the board of directors may be called by the chairperson of the board of directors or by the president. Special meetings shall be called by the president or by the secretary on the written request of a majority of the board of directors or of the executive committee. The secretary shall give written notice to each director or special meetings at least three (3) days before the date of said meeting or by telephoning notice to each director at least twenty-four (24) hours before the meeting.
- Section 4. Quorum and Adjournments. At all meetings of the board of directors a simple majority of the membership shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The act of a majority of the directors present at any meeting at which there is a quorum shall be the act of the board of directors, except as may be otherwise specifically provided by law, the certificate of incorporation or these bylaws. If a quorum is not present at any meeting of the board of directors, the directors present may adjourn the meeting from time to time and from place to place, without notice other than announcement at the meeting at which the adjournment is taken, until a quorum shall be present.
- Section 5. Presiding Officer. The chairperson of the board of directors shall preside at all meetings of directors. If the chairperson of the board of directors is not present, the vice chairperson shall preside; if the vice chairperson is not present, then a person appointed by the board of directors of the executive committee shall preside. The secretary of the corporation shall act as secretary of the meeting. If the secretary is not present, then a person chosen by the board of directors or the executive committee shall act as secretary.
- Section 6. Action by Consent. Any action required or permited to be taken at any meeting of the board of directors may be taken without a meeting if a written consent to such action is signed by all members of the board of directors and such written consent is filed with the minutes of its proceedings.
- Section 7. Meetings by Telephone or Similar Communications Equipment. The board of directors may participate in a meeting by means of conference telephone or similar communications equipment by means of which all directors participating in the meeting can hear each other, and participation in such a meeting shall constitute presence in person by any such director at such meeting. A member may be a voting participant by telephone or similar communications equipment only with prior approval of the chairperson. Minutes must be taken and approved at the next regular meeting.

ARTICLE VII OFFICERS

Section 1. <u>Designation</u>. The trustees shall elect the officers of the corporation who shall be a chairperson of the board, a vice chairperson, a president, and a secretary. In addition, the board of directors may elect a vice president or vice presidents, one or more assistant secretaries, a treasurer and one or more assistant treasurers and other officers and agents as it shall deem necessary or appropriate. All officers of the corporation shall exercise the powers and perform the duties that shall from time to time be determined by the board of directors. Any two or more offices may be held by the same person except the offices of chairperson of the board of directors, vice chairperson, president and secretary.

All officers of the corporation, except those also serving as members of the administrative staff, shall serve without compensation. The board of directors shall conduct an annual personnel evaluation of the president. The salary of the president shall be established and reviewed by the board of directors.

Section 2. Term of, and Removal from, Office. Officers shall be elected at the annual meeting of trustees. Each officer of the corporation shall hold office until his successor is chosen and shall qualify. Any officer elected by the trustees may be removed, with or without cause, at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the trustees. Such removal shall not affect the officer's rights under any employment contract he may have with the corporation. Any vacancy occurring in any office of the corporation, excluding compensated staff, may be filled for the unexpired term by the trustees. Any vacancy in compensated staff shall be filled through nominations to the Board of Trustees by the Board of Directors.

Section 3. Chairperson of the Board of Directors. The chairperson of the board shall be an officer of the corporation and, subject to the direction of the board of directors shall perform such executive functions and duties as may be assigned to him from time to time. The chairperson shall, if present, preside at all meetings of the board of directors and the executive committee.

Section 4. <u>Vice Chairperson</u>. The vice chairperson shall, in the absence of the chairperson of the board of directors or in the event of the chairperson's disability, perform the duties and exercise the powers of the chairperson and shall generally assist the chairperson and perform such other duties and have such other powers as may from time to time be prescribed by the board of directors.

Section 5. <u>President.</u> The president shall be the chief executive officer of the corporation and, subject to the direction of the board of directors, shall have general charge of the business, affairs and property of the corporation and general supervision over its employees and agents. In general, the president shall perform all duties incident to the office of president including the staffing of the corporation's administrative staff. Further, the president shall appoint administrators for the corporation's subsidiaries after consultation with the board of directors of the subsidiaries. In addition, the president shall see that all policies and resolutions of the board of directors are carried into effect. The president shall also, at the direction of the board of directors, act as membership interest in its subsidiary corporations.

Section 6. Secretary of the Board of Trustees. The secretary shall attend all meetings of the board of trustees and record all votes and the proceedings of the meetings in a minute book kept for that purpose. The secretary shall give, or cause to be given, notice of all meetings of trustees and shall perform such other duties as may from time to time be prescribed by the board of trustees or the chairperson of the board of trustees.

Section 7. Secretary of the Board of Directors. The secretary shall attend all meetings of the board of directors and record all votes and the proceedings of the meetings in a minute book kept for that purpose. The secretary shall perform like duties for the executive committee. The secretary shall give, or cause to be given, notice of all meetings and special meetings of the board of directors, and shall perform such other duties as may from time to time be prescribed by the board of directors or the executive committee, the chairperson of the board of directors, or the president. Secretary shall have custody of the seal of the corporation and shall have authority to affix it to any instrument requiring it, and when so affixed, the seal may be attested by the secretary's signature. The board of directors or executive committee may give general authority to any other officer to affix the seal of the corporation and to attest the affixing thereof by his signature.

Section 8. Assistant Secretary. The assistant secretary, if any, or in the event there be more than one, the assistant secretaries in the order designated, shall, in the absence of the secretary or in the event of the secretary's disability perform the duties and exercise the powers of the secretary and shall perform such other duties and have such other powers as may from time to time be prescribed by the board of directors or the executive committee.

Section 9. Treasurer. The treasurer, if any, shall have custody of the corporate funds and other valuable effects, and shall keep full and accurate accounts of receipts and disbursements in books belonging to the corporation and shall deposit all moneys and other valuable effects in the name and to the credit of the corporation in such depositories as may from time to time be designated by the board of directors or the executive committee. The treasurer shall distribute the funds of the corporation in accordance with the orders of the board of directors or the executive committee, taking proper vouchers for such disbursements, and shall render to the chairperson of the board of directors, the president, and the board of directors and the executive committee an account of all his transactions as treasurer and of the financial condition of the corporation.

Section 10. <u>Assistant Treasurer.</u> The assistant treasurer, if any, or in the event there shall be more than one, the assistant treasurers in the order designated, shall, in the absence of the treasurer or in the event of the treasurer's disability, perform the duties and exercise the powers of the treasurer and shall perform such other duties and have such other powers as may from time to time be prescribed by the board of directors or the executive committee.

ARTICLE VIII COMMITTEES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. Executive Committee. The executive committee shall be composed of the chairperson of the board of directors, vice chairperson of the board, the

president who is non-voting, the immediate past chairperson of the board, the secretary of the board of directors, the treasurer, chairperson of the Personnel Committee and chairperson of the Strategic Planning Committee.

- (a) <u>Powers of Executive Committe.</u> During the intervals between the meetings of the board of directors, the executive committee shall have and may exercise all the powers authorized by the board of directors to the extent permitted by law, except that the executive committee shall not: (1) increase or decrease the number of directors, or (2) dispose of the corporation's assets upon dissolution of the corporation. All actions of the Executive Committee shall be presented at the next regular board meeting for their confirmation.
- (b) <u>Presiding Officer</u>. The chairperson of the board of directors shall be the chairperson of and preside at meetings of the executive committee. If the chairperson is not present, the vice chairperson shall preside; if the vice chairperson is not present, then a member of the executive committee chosen by a majority of the members present shall preside. The secretary of the corporation shall act as secretary at meetings of the executive committee. If the secretary is not present then another member chosen by the executive committee shall act as secretary of the executive committee.
- Section 2. <u>Personnel Committee of Board of Directors.</u> There shall be a personnel committee composed of members of the board of directors. The members shall be appointed by the chairperson of the board. Subject to the direction of the board of directors, the personnel committee shall study personnel policy and advise with and make recommendations to the board of directors on personnel matters. The personnel committee shall not have authority to select or supervise members and the staff or administration.
- Section 3. Nominating and Board Development Committee of Board of Directors. There shall be a nominating and board development committee elected by the trustees in accordance with the provisions of Article IV, Section 1, above. The nominating and board development committee shall be responsible for development of continuing programs for identification of persons qualified to be trustees and directors, for nominating persons to stand for election as officers of the corporation, for nominating persons to stand for election to the boards of directors of the corporation and of any subsidiary corporations and shall develop orientation and educational programs for the trustees and directors.
- Section 4. Audit Committee of Board of Directors. There shall be an audit committee composed of members of the board of directors and shall also include at least one member of the board of trustees. The audit committee shall be appointed by the chairperson of the board of directors. The audit committee shall be responsible for maintaining close contact with the corporation's auditors and comptrollers. The audit committee shall also advise, review, evaluate and make recommendations to the trustees on matters pertaining to the selection of auditors and to the review of audits, financial statements and budgets of the corporation.
- Section 5. <u>Strategic Planning Committee of Board of Directors.</u> There shall be a strategic planning committee composed of members of the board of directors. The members shall be appointed by the chairperson of the board of directors. The strategic planning committee shall develop a comprehensive long range plan which

includes a strategic projection for at least five (5) years and shall update, refine and monitor the plan as needed.

ARTICLE IX MEETINGS OF COMMITTEES

- Section 1. <u>Procedure and Meetings.</u> Except as otherwise provided in these bylaws, each committee shall establish its own rules of procedure and shall meet at such time and place as shall be established by the committee. Each committee shall keep minutes of its meetings.
- Section 2. <u>Ouorum.</u> A majority of the members of any committee shall constitute a quorum. The affirmative vote of a majority of the members of the whole committee shall be necessary for the passage of any resolution, or the taking of any action.
- Section 3. Action by Consent. Any action required or permitted to be taken at any meeting of any committee may be taken without a meeting if a written consent to such action is signed by all members of the committee and such written consent is filed with the minutes of its proceedings.
- Section 4. Meetings by Telephone or Similar Communications Equipment. The members of any committee may participate in a meeting of such committee by means of conference telephone or similar communications equipment by means of which all persons participating in such meetings can hear each other, and participation in such a meeting shall constitute presence in person by any such committee member at such meeting.
- Section 5. <u>Authority</u>. All committees appointed by the board of directors shall operate under the authority of the board and shall take no action except as permitted in these bylaws or as authorized or approved by the board of directors.

ARTICLE X NOTICES

- Section 1. Form and Delivery. Whenever notice is required to be given to any director or trustee it may be given in writing mailed to the director or trustee at his address as it appears on the books of the corporation, unless otherwisde specifically provided by law or these bylaws. Notices given by mail shall be deemed to be given when they are deposited in the United States mail, postage prepaid. Notice to a director may also be given by personally delivering written notice to the director or by telephoning notice to the director or by telegraphing such notice to the director at his address as it appears on the records of the corporation. Notice given by telegraph shall be deemed to be given when transmitted.
- Section 2. <u>Waiver</u>. Whenever any notice is required to be given, a written waiver thereof signed by the person entitled to said notice, whether before or after the time stated therein, shall be deemed to be equivalent to such notice. Any member who attends a meeting of members in person without protesting at the commencement of the meeting the lack of notice thereof or any director who attends a meeting of the board of directors or any committee without protesting at the commencement of the meeting the lack of notice or any person absent from such

meeting who does not provide written notice within ten days of distribution of the minutes shall be conclusively deemed to have waived notice of such meeting.

ARTICLE XI

DISSOLUTION

Section 1. Disposition of Assets. Upon the dissolution of the corporation by the trustees in accordance with the statute, the board of directors shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all of the liabilities of the corporation, dispose of all the assets of the corporation exclusively for the purposes of the corporation in such a manner, or to such organization or organizations organized and operated exclusively for charitable, educational, religious, or scientific purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law), as the board of trustees shall determine. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the chancery court of the county in which the principal office of the corporation is then located, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations, as said court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

ARTICLE XII

FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year of the corporation shall begin on the first day of January and end of the last day of December each year.

ARTICLE XIII

SEAL

The corporate seal shall have inscribed thereon the name of the corporation, and the word "Seal."

ARTICLE XIV

AMENDMENTS

The trustees shall have sole authority to alter, amend or repeal these bylaws and to adopt new bylaws by an affirmative vote of two-thirds (2/3rds) of the trustees; provided however, the trustees shall not amend any provision in a manner which would adversely affect the corporation's exemption under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

ARTICLE XV

RELATIONSHIP TO UNITED METHODISTS OF ARKANSAS

The corporation acknowledges its special relationship to the United Methodists of Arkansas with whom it considers itself to be in a cooperative ministry in behalf of older persons.

REPORT #3

RELATIONSHIP STATEMENT

THE LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE AND THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE (The Conferences)

AND

UNITED METHODIST SENIOR SERVICES OF ARKANSAS, INC. (UMSSA) Preamble

Throughout its history, the United Methodist Church has demonstrated its care and concern for people by responding to human needs in our society. The Conferences believe that the Church's health and welfare institutions are ways through which United Methodists may become participants in such ministries. These institutions give concrete expression to our Christian faith and provide arenas where we may witness to that faith. Such institutional ministries give added integrity to our proclamation of the Gospel.

From this perspective the Conferences developed a growing concern for the needs of older Arkansans. The 1988 Annual Conferences of the Arkansas area adopted a resolution to establish a task force to develop the structure for a proposed housing ministries for the elderly. In June of 1989 "United Methodist Senior Services of Arkansas, Inc." (UMSSA) was designated as the Conference-related organization to develop and operate facilities and services for older persons throughout the State.

UMSSA affirms its commitment to provide facilities and services to older persons without regard to their race, religion, economic or social condition. Its Methodist heritage is stated in its bylaws: "UMSSA acknowledges its special historical relationship to the United Methodists of Arkansas with whom it considers itself to be in a cooperative ministry in behalf of older persons."

In recognition of this historical relationship and their common purposes, the Conferences and UMSSA affirm their mutual support and cooperation, and, do covenant together as follows:

- -The Conferences shall provide the origination of governance for UMSSA through the election of its trustees/members. These trustees/members elected by the Conferences serve as the corporate membership of UMSSA. These trustees/members of UMSSA act independently to provide such organizational structures, policies, and programs as they deem appropriate to effectively carry out the ministry of UMSSA.
- -UMSSA shall provide information concerning its activities and plans to the Conferences at such times and in such forms as the Conferences may request.
- -The Conferences shall encourage local churches and individuals to give voluntary financial support to the ministries of UMSSA as the Conferences may deem appropriate from time to time.
- -UMSSA shall provide members of the local churches with opportunities to serve in mission by participating personally in its ministries as volunteers and as staff members.
- -The Conferences do not guarantee, nor do they assume, any responsibility for the obligations of UMSSA, or any of its related corporations.

Although the Conferences and UMSSA share missional purposes and goals in addressing the needs of the elderly, and although each of them supports conformity with the highest standards of care and operational integrity, it is understood that

each of these parties is an independent entity making its own decisions in these

This relationship statement shall be reviewed jointly at least quadrennially, or more often if requested by any of the agreeing parties, and shall be revised or renewed at the beginning of each quadrennium.

Suggested Operating Budget and Implementation Plan

TIMETABLE:

Study of demographic, economic, funding sources and other factors.

Develop philosophy and review process, including criteria for selection and prioritization of projects.

Travel throughout Arkansas to talk with church leaders, local communities, supporters, and other publics.

Travel to meetings of national organizations (AAHA, United Methodist Association), national church-affiliated housing corporations (Good Samaritan), and visit housing organizations in communities similar to those in Arkansas. Year II:

Refine information and dates and begin to identify selected communities where projects are needed and feasible.

<u>Year III:</u>

Develop funding possibilities and plan for implementation. Refine selection criteria. Select projects. Year IV:

Continued refinement of selection criteria. Select projects and implement.

At the end of the fourth year, should have operational funding from several sources including project fees and consultation.

SAINT PAUL SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

Saint Paul School of Theology serves the North Arkansas Annual Conference by preparing persons for effective leadership in the church.

Throughout our first thirty years of service our focus has been squarely on the local church. In a survey of laity and clergy, when asked that word or phrase first came to their minds when they heard the name of Saint Paul School of Theology, the overwhelming response was "local church." That has been our past; it is also our future.

The effectiveness of Saint Paul and your other seminaries cannot be separated from the commitment and capabilities of those in the church who respond to God's call to ministry. Seminaries and churches together have the responsibility of consistently lifting before persons the challenge to respond to God's invitation to serve. The challenges facing the church in the years ahead demand the very best leadership possible. This will be particularly true in the United Methodist Church in the coming decade when the number of retirements of pastors will increase dramatically over the past decade.

We at Saint Paul thank you for your generous support of theological education at Saint Paul and the other United Methodist seminaries. The thirteen United Methodist seminaries comprise perhaps the finest family of denominational seminaries in the United States. You can be proud of all thirteen. We work together very well and want to make it possible for every United Methodist student to be able to attend a United Methodist seminary.

In our thirtieth academic year, many significant events occurred. Dr. Eleanor Scott Meyers came to Saint Paul from Union Theological Seminary in New York City as our third Academic Dean. Harold C. Washington joined our faculty in Old Testament. Two faculty members announced their retirements, Dr. Carl Bangs, Professor of Historical Theology, and Dr. Gilbert Ferrell, Associate Professor of Church Administration.

The William K. McElvaney Chair in Preaching was established in September with Dr. Eugene L. Lowry named as the first occupant. A major curriculum revision took place. It keeps the integrated, interdisciplinary approach to theological education but is much more flexible, making it easier for students who find it necessary to go part-time. Last year we did a survey of 10,000 lay persons and 300 clergy leaders of the church asking what they felt to be most important in the preparation of pastors and leaders. The survey has been extremely helpful in focusing areas of curricular need and priority.

We appreciate your support and seek your involvement. We at Saint Paul can do our work well only when we stay in close and ongoing dialogue and relationship with those of you in the churches who brought us into being, who have supported us through the years, and for whom we are preparing a new generation of leaders in the Wesleyan tradition.

FUNDING GROWS FOR CHAIR ENDOWMENT

During 1988 the endowment fund to establish a Chair for Town and Country Ministries at St. Paul grew from \$67,706. to \$92,146. Major sources included a \$5,000 grant from the W.W. Woodworth Estate funds, interest accumulation, and payments from a number of Annual Conferences. (Five percent of Emphasis 25 capital funds payments is designated for the Chair.)

FIFTH ANNUAL CONSULTATION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY MINISTRIES HELD IN MARCH

The theme of the consultation was "Training for Rural Ministry". Held March 15-17 on the St. Paul Campus, the major speakers were Godffrey Lilburne from United Theological Seminary in Dayton, Ohio; Joan Blundall from Northwest Iowa Mental Health Center; Max Glenn, Oklahoma Conference of Churches; and Larry Wagley, St. Paul School of Theology. In addition, there were a number of workshops dealing with practical issues of ministry.

We welcome the South Central Jurisdiction Council on Ministries as a new source of support for the Consultation, the National Division of Board of Global Ministries, and Missouri West Conference Board of Global Ministries.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS AT WORK FOR HEARTLAND CENTER

SOUTHERN METHODIST UNIVERSITY

This has been an important year of self-study, transition, and progress in the life of the University. The academic mission of SMU is being refined and clarified through a series of internal committees and the work of a Task Force on Academic Priorities. A Task Force on Financial Feasibility and one of Diversity will also report this Spring. Based upon these deliberations, I shall make recommendations to the faculty and ultimately to the Board of Trustees this Fall. I can assure you that our mission, and my vision, will be in tandem with our fiscal ability to make our plan a reality. SMU is a strong university that must continue to do well what it can do best, namely, teach undergraduate students through a broad-based program of education in a personalized living and learning environment. At the same time, we must continue the outstanding tradition of the Perkins School of Theology and the School of Law, as well as a limited number of graduate programs.

The Board of Trustees, elected in July 1988, has functioned superbly. The Board has proved to be a hard-working, hands-on governing body. Its committee structure provides members with a broad understanding of policies and procedures, the opportunity for meaningful discussion, and with those, a real sense of responsibility for and to the institution. As chairperson of the Board, Ray Hunt continues to provide outstanding service and leadership.

Several initiatives have been set in motion this year that should, over the next few years, strengthen our important United Methodist ties. For example, we have increased our involvement with TUMCA by participating in its new brochure, as well as hosting a "Day at SMU" for chairpersons of the Boards of Higher Education and Ministry. We have produced for the first time at SMU a poster with tear-off forms requesting more information, which has been sent to all episcopal appointments in the South Central Jurisdiction. SMU will be the host institution for the 1990 Jurisdictional Youth Rally, in which some 2,000 United Methodist young people from throughout the Jurisdiction will be on the SMU campus July 13-1990.

The Task Force on Church Relatedness, which I appointed in the fall of 1988, has made its report, which reinforces the importance of SMU's United Methodist connections and reaffirms the positive steps we are taking.

I would be remiss if I did not talk about athletics. I have been very pleased at the direction in which Athletics Director Doug Single is moving our overall program. In particular, I believe we are on the right track in renewing our football program with integrity and in a manner that is consistent with the mission of the University.

After almost two years as SMU's president, I am pleased to report that we continue to make progress in meeting our current challenges, and we pursue with increased vitality our quest toward excellence as an outstanding United Methodist institution of higher learning.

STATISTICAL REPORT YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1988 Judy Stroud, Statistician

At 86,105 members the North Arkansas Conference membership shows a decline of 539 members. One-thousand-four-hundred-nineteen deaths were reported, which is 58 more than last year. A more important factor to look at is the average attendance of worship (up 130) and Sunday School (up 47).

One-hundred-twenty-three churches did show a net gain in membership. A breakdown by district is Batesville 25; Conway 21; Fayetteville 19; Forrest City 12;

Fort Smith 26; Jonesboro 12; and Paragould 8.

Many churches still appear to be overburdened with people on the rolls who do not come. Paragraph 233 of The Book of Disciplime states "....The administrative Board shall appoint a committee to audit the membership rolls, submitting the report annually to the Charge Conference." When was the last time this was done in your church? The Disciplime also says (Para. 234) "The basic membership records in each local church shall consist of: a permanent church register and a card index, a loose-leaf book, or a membership record on an electronic information system." (emphasis added). Suzanne G. Braden feels record-keeping is so important that she has one chapter on the subject in her book, The First Year. In it she says, "Careful record-keeping is important for every size congregation, but absolutely essential for mid- and large-size congregations that are serious about membership care." Hoyt L. Hickman has a book titled, Taking Attendance: Growing Through Worship.

A subject which needs to be addressed by the annual conference is the advisability of having extension churches. Arkansas is the only area in the United States to have extension churches. These churches have been closed or are not functioning and the District Superintendent has the membership books. Paragould is the only district which reported any deaths in extension churches. Many have been carrying the same number of members for several years. Batesville District has three churches, 85 members and assets of \$22,500; Conway District has fifteen

churches, 282 members and \$ 131,800 in assets; Fort Smith District has six churches, 441 members and \$294,525 in assets; Jonesboro District has an abandoned church valued at \$6,000; and Paragould District has four churches, 144 members and assets of \$60,600. The totals for the Conference are 962 members and \$485,425.

CONFERENCE COMMITTEE ON PLANNING AND RESEARCH

The Structure and Standing Rules Document of The North Arkansas Conference has been editorially changed to reflect the actions of the 1988 session of the North Arkansas Conference, and the 1988 session of the General Conference, of the United Methodist Church. Those sections of the attached document are immediately followed with either a "AC" or "D" in italics. The following changes are coming as recommendations of The Conference Committee on Planning and Research (they are followed by "CPP" in italics.)

- a. (Page L-14 (para. 7b. (6) (g) 5. Section IV) Committee on Outdoor Ministries) The first sentence of the subparagraph entitled "Responsibilities:" is changed to read as follows: "The Committee on Outdoor Ministries shall carry out those outdoor ministry functions...."
- b. (Page L-15 (Para. 7b. (6) (i), Section IV) Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry) The membership is changed to add the Chairpersons of the four Wesley Foundation Boards as voting members. The first sentence of the paragraph entitled "Membership" is changed to read as follows: "Chairperson; one representative from each District; three representatives from each of the four Wesley Foundations (Arkansas State University, Jonesboro; Arkansas Tech University, Russellville; University of Arkansas, Fayetteville; University of Central Arkansas, Conway), the Chair of the Board of Directors, and a student member of the Board of directors shall serve with vote; and each Wesley foundation Director shall be an ex-officio member without vote."
- c. (Page L-17 (Para 7d. (1), Section IV) Board of Ordained Ministry) The fourth sentence of the sub-paragraph entitled "Membership:" is changed to read as follows: "Two Lay Observers (one man and one woman) shall be elected to participate in the work of the board but without vote."
- d. (Page L-20 (Para 7h, Section IV) Conference Council on Youth Ministries) The following sentence is added: "The make up of the membership of the CCYM and its responsibilities shall be in compliance with Para 743 of the Discipline. For administrative purposes the CCYM shall be related to the CCOM."
- e. (Page L-21 (Para. 7j, Section IV) Commission on Archives and History) The following paragraph is added to create an Arkansas Area Joint Commission on Archives and History: "Arkansas Area Responsibilities: There shall be an Arkansas Area Joint Commission on Archives and History which shall consist of all of the members of the North Arkansas Conference and Little Rock Conference Commissions on Archives and History. This Joint Commission shall be jointly chaired by the Chairpersons of the two constituent Commissions on Archives and History. Among the responsibilities of the Arkansas Area Joint Commission on

Archives and History shall be the administering of the United Methodist (and its predecessor bodies) Archives in the Arkansas Room of the Hendrix College Library; and to carry out Resolution No. 2 of the November 8, 1986 Arkansas Area Sesquicentennial Conference, which instructed both Annual Conference Commissions on Archives and History to establish a suitable historical and archival depository for the United Methodist Churches in Arkansas.

- (page L-22 (Para. 7n, Section IV) Committee on Parish and Community Development) The words "and the Conference President of United Methodist Rural Fellowship" have been removed from the "Membership" paragraph.
- g. (Page L-25 (Para. 8b, Section V) The District Conference) The first sentence of the subparagraph entitled "Responsibilities:" is changed to read as follows: "To receive and act on the report from the District Committee on Nominations and elect persons to offices within the District and those District Member nominees to Annual Conference agencies; to receive...."
- h. (Page L-25 (para 8c, Section V) District Council on Ministries) The sentence that reads: "Members of Annual Conference, Jurisdictional and General Church Agencies residing within the District." has been changed to remove the words "Annual Conference". The sentence now reads: "Members of Jurisdictional and General Church Agencies residing within the District." The following sentence is added: "The District Committee on Nominations shall, insofar as possible, nominate those persons who are representing the District on Annual Conference agencies for comparable positions on the District Council on Ministries."
- i. (Page L-26 (para. 8d, Section V) District Committee on Ordained Ministry) The following sentence is added: "The District's member(s) of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry shall be a member(s) of this Committee."
- j. (page L-29 (Standing Rule 11) In compliance with the recommendation of the former Structure Committee to the 1988 Annual Conference the Annual Conference Committee on Planning and Research recommends that the listing of the "Major Boards, Committees, Commissions and Agencies of the Annual Conference" be added to Standing Rule 11. (See Section L, Structure and Standing Rules).

THE UNITED METHODIST CHILDRENS HOME

The United Methodist Children's Home of Arkansas was conceived in the heart and mind in 1897. The Charter was issued by the State of Arkansas in 1899. The Home was initially named the Methodist Orphanage. The first child came to the Home in February, 1902. Since that day the United Methodist child care mission has continued to serve at-risk children and youth in the name of our Christ.

The Home is licensed by the State to serve children between the ages of 6-18. Our residents attend public schools and we also have a supplemental education program on our Little Rock campus. We provide supervised recreation, health care, a home and food, clothing, professional social work direction, counseling, job skill training, Christian Education/music and a Sunday worship service in our oncampus chapel.

In addition to the main campus in Little Rock we also have one group home in Searcy and two group homes in Magnolia. During the year just ended we served a total of 125 children/youth as their primary home (in residence) for a total of 18,105 child care days. Some were with us for a short time and some have been with us for as long as six years. Our average length of stay is 19 months. Our goal is to provide loving care while working to make it possible for the child to be acceptably reunited with the natural family or assure them a stable, permanent base in which they may develop and mature.

We are receptive to children referred by pastors, individuals, parents/guardians, Juvenile Court and the State Department of Children, Youth and Family. We offer continued service to a resident past 18 if they are still in school or college. We offer college scholarships and assistance for those capable and desiring higher education. We also have a Vo-Tech fund for residents needing this type of job preparation. Our kids are encouraged to attend summer church camps. We had our own Vacation Bible School on campus this year in addition to sharing in a couple of Vacation Bible Schools in nearby churches.'

We gratefully report a 9% increase in support from church sources (Christmas offering, etc.) for 1988. Although this increase did not bring us back to the 1986 level of support, it was a significant increase over 1987. The Home does not receive any part of church apportioned funds, is not a United Way agency, nor is it supported by state or federal tax dollars. The only tax dollar found here is when the State Department of Human Services buys services by placing a child (in their custody) in our Home. Our sources of funding are as follows:

Under the direction of the Board of Trustees, the Home is doing an in-depth study in an effort to determine our future as a mission in the field of child care. A "Planning and Management Study" (by Don Manes) was completed and presented to the Trustees in mid-May, 1988. The trustees set up a Long-Range Planning Committee at that time and charged that Committee with the task of searching out what directions might be indicated by the findings of that study. The Committee has been working at that task and in the not too distant future will produce their findings and/or proposals and options for consideration.

The Home is thankful to the Church at large for making this mission a living reality. We are a mission of United Methodism. We at the Home work on your behalf and for our Lord. Your spiritual and monetary support give us life and we, in turn, seek to give life to those children and youth whom we serve. Please keep in mind that during the 366 days of 1988 there were 125 kids who had a place to call home because of you.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE REPORT ON LONG RANGE PLANNING PROGRAM METHODIST CHILDRENS HOME

On January 3, 1938 - President Franklin D. Roosevelt brought into being the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis (Polio).

On April 12, 1955 - Salk Vaccine was determined safe and effective and polio was conquered.

On July 22, 1958 - The Foundation's name was changed to "National Foundation - March of Dimes" as the first concerted effort to prevent birth defects.

In 1979 - The name was changed to "March of Dimes Birth Defect Foundation".

Needs have changed....so the foundation was changed.

In 1897 a group of concerned church leaders approached the Conference about a need to effectively relate to orphans in our state. That concern culminated with the State of Arkansas granting a charter for the Methodist Orphanage in 1899. The Orphanage received its first orphan in February 1902. No one knows how many orphans found good homes because of the work of the Methodist Orphanage.

In 1907 it was determined that the original house on Commerce Street in Little Rock was no longer filling the needs. Land was purchased and a more suitable facility was erected at 16th and Elm. The move was completed in 1910.

In the Mid-1940's the rambling, single structure at 16th and Elm was deemed less than adequate and the child care facility was relocated on the northeast corner of the recently purchased 80 acre tract of land that was bounded by 20th Street, 28th Street, Fillmore Street and Hays Street (University). When the Home moved to the Fillmore location (in 1947) the needs of children being served had so changed that the mission and name of the Home was changed from "orphanage" to "The Methodist Children's Home".

CHANGEI It has been said that "the only thing that is constant, is change".

The crying need of today's children is not that of finding adoptive parents for orphaned children, nor is "bed and breakfast" the most pressing issue. The term most often heard today is the "at-risk" child. It is not a baby without a crib, it is teenagers on streets that are filled with drug/smut peddlers. It is children whose natural parents either don't care, or are not capable of helping their children through the terrible maze of growing up to be healthy, wholesome adults.

These kids need a stable base in a well-rounded society. They don't (so much) need to be integrated as a functioning part of a strong, healthy society. They don't need a peer group made up predominately of other youths like themselves. They need to be nurtured in a setting where acceptable role models can be observed and with whom they can naturally interact.

More than 18 months ago the Trustees of UMCH made the decision to take an indepth look at who we were and what it was we were trying to do; to see where we were and what we were really doing in serving the needs of "at-risk" children. They voted (in November, 1987) to retain a professional consulting firm to do this study for us. In doing this study, the planners sorted through every aspect of the Home. They also delved into the entire community of professional child care as

well as identifying some areas of need in the juvenile population. They left no stones unturned, either inside or outside our agency.

Just over one year ago (May 1988) the consultants made their report to our Trustees. The Trustees, recognizing the value of this study, authorized the Chairperson to appoint a Long Range Planning Committee to receive this report. That Committee was charged with the task of taking the planning and management study; digesting, researching and bringing back to the Board their findings and recommendations for the future of the Home.

That Committee, and those chosen as resource persons to the Committee, consisted of four clergy members of the Board (all of whom are, or have served as District Superintendents), one lay member of the Board (the Executive Director of the Arkansas Methodist Foundation), one qualified and certified researcher for studies, one licensed social worker (our Director of Children and Family Services), and one Ph.D. in Psychology (our Director of Professional Services).

The Committee chose Dr. C. Ray Hozendorf to chair the Committee. Dr. Hozendorf, in his systematic and dedicated manner, led the Committee to a conclusive end. I want you to listen closely as he walks you swiftly through this year-long study that has resulted in some daring and radical changes that should open a whole new world of exciting service to children/youth whose future may well rest in our hands. (Bob Orr, Administrator)

Bishop Wilke and members of the North Arkansas Annual Conference, thank you for the privilege of speaking to you on behalf of the United Methodist Children's Home and the exciting changes the Board of Directors has approved. The change of direction from campus oriented to community based group homes is one of the most exciting things that has happened.

Every member of the Long Range Planning Committee has worked diligently to study the need, to understand the situation under which we have been operating, to discover the alternatives and to recommend a plan that would allow the Children's Home to fulfill its mission and purpose, which is "to develop each child to his fullest potential physically, mentally and spiritually, to provide a decent home life, adequate food and clothes, and an opportunity for an education and an environment conducive to spiritual growth. This is to be done through a program of child care which shall effectively meet the needs of the children served, without regard to race, creed, or national origin, and through residential care, foster home care, group home services, etc."

Various members of the Committee visited the Louisiana Children's Home, the Texas Children's Home and the North Carolina Conference Children's Home. On other occasions members met with the deputy director of the Arkansas Department of Human Services, with Bishop Wilke and with others to secure insights and knowledge of human service needs and policies. After gathering as much information as we could the Committee formulated its recommendations. The statement of purpose includes the phrase: "to have an environment conducive to spiritual growth." As the Committee considered this aspect of our mission we discovered that the neighborhood in which the Children's Home is located has deteriorated. It is located near the highest crime area in Little Rock, where drugs,

pornography and prostitution are easily accessible to residents of the Home. The Home has felt this so keenly that off duty police officers have been employed to protect our children and teaching parents from the dangers of the area. In our present group homes at Magnolia and Searcy the above problems are practically non-existent.

The following changes in strategy of the UMCH were unanimously approved by the Board of Directors on May 16, 1988:

- 1. That additional community based group homes be established with properly equipped, trained and funded teaching parents. The community would be asked to be involved in a supportive manner and committed to this relationship on a continuous basis. The group home system would emphasize the teaching of basic values, morals and ethics in a supportive family style environment. The community based group home has proven to be a superior approach for teaching social, academic, maintenance and self help skills in a supportive family relationship.
- 2. Develop the Independent Living Program approved by the Directors some eighteen months ago for older youth, aged 18 to 21, and move forward in this program as rapidly as possible.
- 3. Foster Home Care is the number one placement of children by Human Services. The United Methodist Children's Home is capable of promoting, locating, training personnel, and maintaining a network of foster homes. The Home will pursue this strategy enthusiastically and with commitment of personnel and financial resources.
- 4. When all the children who are under our care have been cared for adequately, and each staff member given individual and proper concern, the 27.7 acres on South Fillmore may be offered for sale. The appraisal and the land use study which has been approved and are approaching completion will be of inestimable value in determining the future use of the property.
- 5. The plan is that the administrative offices remain in Little Rock, with the professional staff relating to the community based group homes.

You may ask, are you going to have a home in Little Rock or North Little Rock? Any county in the state can have a home. It will depend on meeting the supportive conditions mentioned previously.

What will you do with the proceeds of any possible sale? We would like to place all proceeds received in the endowment fund. We only have \$1,427,000 in the endowment now. Some of the money may have to be used in establishing homes, but we hope the communities will help with the actual buildings.

Will we ever need this campus again? As long as the crime and drug situation continues you would not want to keep or place homes at this location.

We used to have other group homes at Fort Smith and Arkadelphia, but abandoned them; why are we going back to them? We were 15 years ahead of the times on the Fort Smith Home. The two homes in Arkadelphia were never United Methodist Children's Homes. They were Clark County owned. UMCH provided personnel and funding for the residents.

The plans we have presented are long range plans. It will take about two years to provide for the present group of children. The process of securing a location for

future community based group homes and finding foster homes and training foster parents will be developing over a ten year period.

Through the ninety year history of the Children's Home you have trusted your trustees and supported the Home generously. Today we ask for your continued trust and support. It has been said that troubled youth come from troubled homes. This plan offers United Methodists of Arkansas the opportunity to minister to troubled youth and to troubled families. You are asked to (1) give of your interest and time to help secure community based group homes; (2) continue to give generously to the Christmas offering and through your memorials, wills and bequests; and (3) pray for the Children's Home and for the guidance of the Holy Spirit as we seek to minister to troubled children and troubled families.

This move is to help us effectively achieve one of your goals and that was to be in the out of doors and experience God's creation. We will be working with the districts to help coordinate a transportation network to Fayetteville. This is a bold move on our part, and I feel that with God's help it will exceed every expectation. The director for Jr. High Assembly is Carlos Sommers and for Sr. High Assembly Terry Gregory.

In October, another new event is on the state. Simply called Reunion, this event is designed to accommodate for the fellowship gathering that Faith Retreat was becoming. This event will give people a chance to see each other and catch up,

rather than doing it at an event where social activity would inhibit the purpose. Watch for dates and location. The director for this event is Cassie Allbaugh.

Youth Tour will continue as always for this year with a few added extras. We will attempt to heighten the awareness of the youth in our Conference to mission work in the cities, the boards and agencies within the Methodist Church in Washington D.C. and New York City and much more, without taking away the thing we currently are doing. Beginning next year however, we will alternate trips. In 1990 the trip will be to Washington D.C., and then New York in 1991. Each youth will be allowed to go once on each trip in a four year period. Roger Beal is directing the Youth Tour this year.

The publicity task force, directed by Beverly Bryan, has been busy gathering the names and addresses that were lost on the Conference computer system. If you know of a youth who may not be on our list, let us know!

YSF is still a priority with our CCYM and this task force is directed by Cassie Allbaugh. We would like to see more involvement in YSF by individual churches and opened up to more people.

I know I have been amazed with the attitude and hard work of this year's council. If you take a good look at our purpose and how we are meeting it, I think you will be too. Also, I would like to hear feedback from youth and adults alike, so that we may make things better.

UNITED METHODIST FOUNDATION OF ARKANSAS

This is the 9th year I've reported to you as the executive director of your United Methodist Foundation. In each of these years it's been my pleasure to come before you and report great succes at the Foundation. Our assets have grown each year. On April 30 of this year, our assets totaled \$6,054,999.85.

I want to tell you how much I enjoy serving you in this capacity. After eight years of promoting this cause, I'm still as enthusiastic as ever. It's such a wonderful thing to earn a living by developing and managing permanent charitable funds that benefit our great church! My sense of fulfillment is immense, and I've been blessed in so many ways. Thank you so very much for this opportunity, and for your support and friendship.

I thought I'd spend just a minute with you today reflecting on the most significant changes at the Foundation during my eight year tenure. What are those things that have changed dramatically, and that really make a difference.

First, I'd list our growth in assets. In 1981, we had assets of less than \$100,000. Now we are in excess of \$6 million. This size means many things. It means we're no longer an experiment. We're a proven success. It means many of you believe in our mission and support it with your gifts. It has allowed us to diversify our investments. It has given us the means of financing local church building projects. With prospective giftmakers, it gives us credibility. But most importantly, our growth means we're doing more and more to undergird the ministries of our local churches, institutions, and programs.

The second item on my list would be the successful creation of the Bishops' Club. This is a group of 53 United Methodists from throughout Arkansas who have agreed to contribute \$1,000 a year to fund the Foundation's own operation. This income now represents 35% of our budget. Because of the Bishops' Club, we are able to provide our services to individuals and local churches without charging any fee. 100% of our investment income is paid out each year to some United Methodist purpose.

The Bishops' Club has also insured that we manage these church funds in a professional, effective manner. When it comes to investment management and trust accounting, we don't come in second to anybody. Our associate director is Mr. Bill Webster, who is the former head of the Union National Bank trust department. Bill handles our investments and provides invaluable estate planning counseling to our clients. Thanks to the Bishops' Club and Bill's own devotion to the Church, we were able to recruit someone of Bill's caliber.

The third item on my list of significant changes would have to be the growing awareness and understanding of the Foundation. Our pastors now see the Foundation as an ally. We're a friend that can help local churches achieve their objectives. Our newsletter, which we call <u>Legacies</u>, now reaches 3,000 United Methodists in the State. Local churches regularly call on us to conduct seminars and meet with local church leaders. I'm delighted with this improved awareness, and know that it points to a bright future for your Foundation.

The other day I heard my friend Chester Jones give a devotional in which he referred to a passage in Proverbs that says, "Without vision, the people perish." I've thought a great deal about that passage. In fact, I've been so taken by it that I've now read the entire book several times looking for more pearls of wisdom. Without vision, the people perish. Without a vision of a better world, without a vision of peace, my people would indeed perish. I take great gratification, though, in the thought that the Foundation's success is evidence of the United Methodist vision. The Foundation will make the future better. Again, thank you.

UNITED METHODIST MEN

Bishop Wilke, members of this Conference, guests. The United Methodist Men of North Arkansas are alive and well. We presently have over one hundred fellowships chartered throughout this Conference. We are chartering new fellowships monthly. Our men are active in all areas of our church. We are found in men's choirs, men's Sunday School classes, as part of our Lay Speakers program, and in many other areas too numerous to name. We are becoming more involved in our church and are becoming increasingly supportive of our pastors and their families.

We support through our Every Man Shares program our local Bowl-A-Thons, and through other donations, a nationwide prayer line ministry - a ministry that receives hundreds of prayer requests daily.

Our moving ministry was established to help put an end to that 60% of moving Methodist families that became lost to our church. A simple phone call can put a moving Methodist family in touch with one of our churches anywhere in the USA.

Another program United Methodist Men are actively involved in is the great Scouting movement which we support with both our money and participation.

Another program United Methodist Men have is a life membership in the United Methodist Men's movement. This program is used to honor some deserving person within the church or community. Last year ten of our men were so honored.

I can report that the Paragould/Jonesboro District United Methodist Men have already come together, chartered, elected officers and is in operation. I wish I could say the same for the Forrest City District.

On July 14-16, 1989, a gathering of men, nearly 6,000 strong, will come together at Purdue University for our 5th International Congress of United Methodist Men. Our theme is "Uniting Men In Christ/Many Ministries-One Spirit". Some of our speakers will be Bishop Woody White from the Illinois Area, Bishop Paul Granadosin of the Phillipines, and Bill Curry, Alabama football coach. While 6,000 men are expected, so far about 4,500 have registered, and there is still time to register. We at present have 27 men from our Conference registered. There is room for more.

Hardly back from Purdue than the 14th Annual Retreat of the North Arkansas Conference United Methodist Men will gather for a "Mountain Top Experience" at Mt. Sequoyah. Our principle speaker will be Reverend Jack W. Kaley, an approved Conference evangelist with the Central Illinois Conference. His ministry is incorporated under the title of "Closer to God Today". He has been a senior pastor, a football and baseball coach, and an outstanding athelete in undergraduate school. He holds bachelor's and master's degrees in Education and a master's of divinity degree from Evangelical Theological Seminary. Our song leader will be Les Oliver from First Church, Bentonville. To bring joy to our hearts, we will again have "The Miracles" of Baddour Memorial Center, Senatobia, Mississippi, providing music. Those who have heard this group know of the joy they bring.

From the United Methodist Men of North Arkansas we thank you for your support and guidance. This completes my report, Bishop Wilke.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

To Bishop Wilke, members of the North Arkansas Annual Conference, I bring you greetings from 10,247 organized United Methodist Women of our six districts.

We in the local units of the churches and districts have put forth every effort in seeing to it that our goals, both conference and district, are met and the programs followed as closely as possible in order to get maximum involvement.

We completed the merging of the two upper districts with ease and is now known as the Paragould/Jonesboro District.

Our two most important goals the past year has been increasing membership and increasing our financial responsibility. We are quite happy to report membership increased 486 members. We made our pledge of \$138,109.81 in undesignated giving. Our conference goals budget is \$17,340; total operating budget for the year is \$55,567.55. The challenge we have made to ourselves is to increase our pledge giving by 5.5%.

Our women are doing some wholesome reading. There were 452 individual subscriptions of <u>Response</u>. 108 presidents received and shared with their units from the Letters to the Presidents. 101 units increased their pledges to missions. 105 units made an intentional effort to empty their treasury at the end of the year.

As United Methodist Women we are constantly challenged by our Christian Personhood Chairperson to read, discuss and share books in our leisure. We have been renewed by our Christian Responsibility Retreat that was held at Heifer Project International May 19 and 20 led by Darlene Hunt and Bonnie Bumpers.

We are fortunate to have Bonnie Bumpers serving in an ex-officio capacity. One of the international focus is health care for all. Bonnie has just returned from a world jaunt and has been appointed as one of 12 women on the World Division (6 from the U.S.) to plan for phase four in implementation of planning for children's ministries. Our hope is we implement well, for we know that one child in four is poor. One child in five is at risk of becoming a teenage parent. One child in six lives in a family where neither parent has a job. In response to these concerns, North Arkansas women joined with other women in sending over 5,750 post cards to members of Congress in support of the Act for Better Child Care. There is a video available – "Who Speaks for the Children?" – from our Supportive Community Chairperson, Jean Kraus.

United Methodist Women are concerned about incarcerated women and their children. May 6-9, 1989, a national training event on ministry to incarcerated women and their children was held in Kansas City at St. Paul School of theology and was sponsored by the Women's Division of the General Board of Global Ministries. Freddie Nixon was one of forty women from throughout the United States who was chosen to participate, representing the North Arkansas Conference United Methodist Women. Our Conference Mission Team will hear recommendations from the training event in our September meeting and we look forward to working with the Annual Conference Prison Ministry Task Force as it plans for prison ministry throughout our Annual Conference and state.

Intentionality is the key word as we begin our thrust on implementing the Charter for Racial Justice. The video "Charter for Racial Justice, A History", is one of the resources that we are hoping you will avail yourselves of as you go about your christian responsibilities. Cecelia Weeden, chairperson of Christian Social Relations, attended the IMPACT legislative briefing in Washiington D.C., the first week of April where she studied with other United Methodist Women the issues that will be before Congress. Her report to us in September will help us better prepare ourselves for the future.

We celebrate our missionaries such as Lennie Hache in Sierre Leone; Bill and Jimmye Whitfield, who have begun teaching recently at the Hartzell United Methodist Secondary Boarding school in Zimbabwe (the school is an 800 coed student body); and our own mission team member Evelyn Banks, who has been commissioned as a Church and Community missionary in the Forrest City District.

Thanks to you who came to our second annual United Methodist Women's breakfast. This is our time together as an organized unit of the Annual Conference. We look forward next year to bringing programs that will continue to lift up missions and concerns that together we as all people of God can benefit.

We look forward to seeing each of you at the Arkansas Area Schools of Christian Mission this summer. The dates are August 1-4 for participation in the weekday school, and August 4-6 for the weekend school. There are scholarships available - you may be fortunate enough to receive one. Our studies this year are: the Psalms, to be taught by Rev. Ruthenia A. Finley of White Plains, N.Y.; The World of Islam, to be taught by Mary Grace Lyman, Women's Division, Dr. Grant Shockley, Duke School of Divinity, Durham, N.C., and Mary Weathers of Ft. Worth, TX. The geographical study is The Phillipines, to be taught by Ernestine Dixon, of San Antonio, TX., Leora Hatch, Miami, FL, and Robert E. Young, Burleson, TX.

The Annual Meeting and Training Event will be held this year at Mount Sequoyah, October 27-28-29. We look forward to this new experience and invite you to share it with us, and then on to Kansas City for the Women's Assembly, May 3-6, 1990.

We as people of God believe in our purpose which is "The organized unit of United Methodist Women shall be a community of women whose PURPOSE is to know GOD and to experience freedom as whole persons through JESUS CHRIST; to develop a creative, supportive fellowship; and to expand concepts of mission through participation in the global ministries of the church. We look forward to the year 2000 with great anticipation. THEREFORE, REJOICE as we go together into the new century as co-creators with Christ.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

DECEMBER 31, 1988 AND 1987

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING - THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH HAVE BEEN PREPARED ON THE CASH BASIS. THE RECORDS ARE HELD OPEN FOR APPROXIMATELY TWO WEEKS AFTER YEAR END IN ORDER TO INCLUDE THE REMITTANCES FROM THE CHURCHES IN THE CONFERENCE FOR THE LAST FEW WEEKS OF THE YEAR. THIS POLICY IS CONSISTENT WITH THE PRIOR YEAR.

INCOME TAXES

THE CONFERENCE MEETS THE REQUIREMENTS OF SECTION 501(c)3 OF THE INTERNAL REVENUE CODE AND IS THEREFORE EXEMPT FROM FEDERAL INCOME TAXES.

CASH INVESTMENTS

ALL CASH INVESTMENTS ARE RECORDED AT COST PLUS INTEREST INCOME AS RECEIVED IN THE ACCOUNT. THESE BALANCES APPROXIMATE CURRENT MARKET VALUE OF THE PARTICULAR INVESTMENTS.

INTEREST ON SAVINGS ACCOUNTS IS RECEIVED QUARTERLY. INTEREST ON MERRILL LYNCH READY ASSET TRUST AND COLONIAL GOVERNMENT MUTUAL FUND IS RECEIVED MONTHLY. INTEREST ON ALL OTHER CASH INVESTMENTS IS NOT RECOGNIZED UNTIL MATURITY.

THE AGGREGATE MARKET VALUE OF INVESTMENTS WAS \$375,929 AT DECEMBER 31, 1988. GROSS UNREALIZED LOSSES AMOUNTED TO \$12,967 WHICH ARE CONSIDERED IMMATERIAL AND TEMPORARY IN NATURE AND WILL BE REFLECTED WHEN REALIZED.

4. PENSION PLANS

SUBSTANTIALLY ALL CONFERENCE EMPLOYEES ARE COVERED UNDER ONE OF TWO DEFINED CONTRIBUTION PENSION PLANS.

- a. MINISTERIAL EMPLOYEES ALL MINISTERIAL EMPLOYEES, INCLUDING THE BISHOP, ARE COVERED UNDER A DEFINED CONTRIBUTION PENSION PLAN WHEREBY THE PARTICIPANT CONTRIBUTES 3% AND THE CHURCH OR CONFERENCE CONTRIBUTES 10% TO 12% OF THE PARTICIPANTS' ANNUAL CONTRIBUTION BASE (COMPENSATION) BASED ON THE CONFERENCE AVERAGE COMPENSATION AS COMPUTED BY THE GENERAL BOARD OF PENSIONS.
- b. LAY PERSONNEL ALL LAY EMPLOYEES ARE COVERED UNDER A DEFINED CONTRIBUTION PENSION PLAN WHEREBY THE PARTICIPANT CONTRIBUTES 3% AND THE CONFERENCE CONTRIBUTES 6% OF THE PARTICIPANTS' ANNUAL CONTRIBUTION BASE (COMPENSATION).

BOTH OF THE AFOREMENTIONED PLANS PROVIDE BENEFITS UPON RETIREMENT BASED ON CONVERTING ACCUMULATED CONTRIBUTIONS FOR THAT PARTICIPANT TO AN ANNUITY OR AN ACTUARILY EQUIVALENT BASIS.

BOTH PLANS ARE MULTI-EMPLOYER PLANS BY WHICH ALL CONTRIBUTED ASSETS OF PARTICIPATING EMPLOYERS AND EMPLOYEES ARE COMMINGLED AND ARE NOT SEGREGATED BY EMPLOYER. THIS COMMINGLING OF ASSETS PREVENTS A MATCHING OF INDIVIDUAL EMPLOYER'S PLAN ASSETS TO PLAN LIABILITIES.

TOTAL PENSION COST FOR THE YEARS ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1988 AND 1987 WERE \$581,713 AND \$638,385, RESPECTIVELY.

J. RESOLUTIONS

RESOLUTION #1

The Committee on Nominations would like to recommend the approval of the following resolution to the Judicial Council of the United Methodist Church. A copy of the decision referenced is included.

A RESOLUTION

REQUESTING A DECLARATORY DECISION OF THE JUDICIAL COUNCIL OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

WHEREAS, the Judicial Council of The United Methodist Church, in its Decision #601, dated October 28, 1988, declared that:

"Those portions of Para.805.2(a) and (c) which mandate guaranteed representation of clergy, laymen and laywomenon general program boards are unconstitutional. Those provisions of Para. 805.2(a) and (c) which "recommend" or ask that "special attention" be given to membership of certain categories of persons on general program boards are constitutional."

WHEREAS, Paragraphs 726.5a, 734.1, 735.1, 737.2, 741.2, 754.1, 2512.1, 2518 and 2524 of the 1988 Discipline of The United Methodist Church contains similar and like language which mandates guaranteed representation of clergy, laymen and laywomen on Annual Conference, District and Local Church structural entities. WHEREAS, Judicial Council Decision No. 601, by its ruling, creates a question as to the constitutionality of all other representational mandates in The Discipline. WHEREAS, in order to remove any doubt about the constitutionality of all other representational mandates within the Discipline it seems prudent to request that all of these references be considered and ruled upon by The Judicial Council. BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the North Arkansas Annual Conference, meeting in regular session, in Conway, Arkansas, in accordance with Para. 2615.2(j) of the 1988 Discipline, hereby requests that the Judicial Council of The United Methodist Church issue a Declaratory Decision on the constitutionality of the provisions of Paragraphs 726.5a, 734.1, 735.1, 737.2, 741.2, 754.1,2512.1, 2518 and 2524, and any other Paragraphs of the 1988 Discipline of The United Methodist Chuirch that mandate guaranteed representation of clergy, laymen and laywomen.

1988 Discipline of The United Methodist Church Paragraph References Containing Representational Mandated Structure Provisions

Para, 726.5a Committee for the Coordination of Ethnic Local Church concerns:

.. "The committee <u>shall</u> comprise one-third laywomen, one-third laymen, and one-third clergy. At least one-half of this committee <u>shall</u> be racial/ethnic persons, where feasible."

Para. 734.1 Board of Diaconal Ministry:

"...at least one-third <u>shall</u> be clergy, two thirds lay members, and at least one-half of the lay members <u>shall</u> be in Diaconal ministry careers, preferably Diaconal Ministers."

Para, 735.1 Conference Committee on Episcopacy:

"...the committee <u>shall</u> consist of the following representatives: one-fifth laywomen, one-fifth laymen, one-fifth clergy persons, one-fifth persons to make possible the representation of racial and ethnic groups, youth, young adults, and older adults and one-fifth persons appointed by the bishop..."

Para. 737.2 Conference Board of Pensions:

"...The board shall be composed of ...one-third laywomen, one-third laymen, and one-third clergy..."

Para. 741.2 Conference Commission on the Status and Role of Women:

"...The addition of the at-large membership shall ensure that the total membership shall maintain the one-third laywomen, one-third laymen, and one-third clergy balance."

Para. 754.1 Committee on District Superintendency:

"...This committee <u>shall</u> be composed of the district lay leader, two laywomen, two laymen, two clergy, and two at-large members selected to make possible the representation of racial and ethnic persons, youth, young adults, and older adults, and two additional persons appointed by the district superintendent; provided that at least three of the eleven persons are clergy and seven are lay persons."

Para, 2512.1 Annual Conference Board of Trustees:

"...the board <u>shall</u> consist of twelve persons of which one-third <u>shall</u> be clergy, one-third laywomen, and one-third laymen..."

Para. 2518 District Board of Church Location and Building:

"...The board <u>shall</u> consist of the district superintendent and a minimum of six and a maximum of nine additional persons (one-third clergy, one-third laymen, and one-third laywomen)..."

Para. 2524 Local Church Board of Trustees:

"...consisting of not fewer than three nor more than nine persons, at least one-third of whom shall be laywomen, and at least one-third of whom shall be laymen..."

DECISION NO. 601

IN RE: Constitutionality of Representational Requirements for General Program Board Membership.

DIGEST

Disciplinary provisions which mandate guaranteed representation of a preferred status on general program boards are unconstitutional.

STATEMENT OF FACTS

The Judicial Council was directed by the 1988 General Conference to rule on the constitutionality of certain portions of Para. 805.2(a) and (c) of the Discipline. The disciplinary paragraphs, in pertinent part, read as follows:

- (a) Each jurisdiction shall elect one person from each of its Annual and Missionary Conferences to each program board. The jurisdiction membership on each program board shall incorporate one-third clergy (at least one of whom shall be a woman), one-third laymen, and one-third laywomen (with the exception of Para. 1412.2), and shall ensure adequate representation of youth (para. 263.2), young adults (para. 263.3) and older adults (para. 263.5)....
- (c) Additional members shall be elected by each general program board in order to bring into the board special knowledge or background and to perfect the representation of knowledge or background and to perfect the representation of racial and ethnic minority persons, youth (para. 263.2), young adults (para. 263.3), older adults (para. 263.5), persons with a handicapping condition, and distribution by geographic area. There shall be not less than five nor more than twelve additional members of each general program board. Such additional membership shall maintain one-third laymen, one-third laywomen, and one-third clergy balance.

Jubisdiction

The Judicial Council has jurisdiction under para. 2615 of the 1984 Discipline. ANALYSIS

We spoke most recently in Decision 594 on the matter of disciplinary requirements as to membership in constituent bodies in The United Methodist Church. There we reaffirmed our long-standing position that Para. 4 and 15.14 forbade, "any legislation which would guarantee a preferred status not extended to others." Thus, that portion of Para. 805.2(a) which provides, "The jurisdiction membership on each program board shall incorporate one-third clergy (at least one of whom shall be a woman), one-third laymen, and one-third laywomen, and shall ensure adequate representation of youth, young adults and older adults", (our italics) since it mandates guaranteed representation of a preferred status, is unconstitutional.

Because it contains the same mandatory language, we also hold that portion of para. 805.2(c) which provides "such additional membership (of program boards) shall maintain the one-third laymen, one-third laywomen, and one-third clergy balance" (our italics) to be unconstitutional.

The provisions of para. 805.2(a), however, which state they are "in order to ensure" the adequate representation on general program boards of certain racial and ethnic minorities and persons with a handicapping condition are

constitutional. In the language in question "it is <u>recommended</u> that at least 25 percent of a jurisdiction membership on each general program board be racial and ethnic minority persons" and that "<u>special attention</u> shall be given to the inclusion of persons with a handicapping condition." (Italics ours) This does not mandate or guarantee a preferred status; rather, it only "recommends" certain action be taken or urges "special attention" be given. There is no violation of para. 4 or 15.14.

Similarly, the provisions of para. 805.2(c) that "additional members shall be elected by each general program board in order to bring into the board special knowledge or background and to perfect the representation of racial and ethnic minority persons, youth (para.263.2), young adults (para. 263.3), older adults (para. 263.5), persons with a handicapping condition, and distribution by geographic area" give no guaranteed preferred status not extended to others. Therefore, these provisions do not violate either para. 4 or para. 15.14 and are constitutional.

Since the General Conference called upon us to determine only the validity of mandatory representation on general program boards we express no opinion as to other representational mandates in the Discipline. See, e.g., para. 1412.2, 1412.6. Furthermore, so as not to disrupt the work of the general program boards for the 1989-1992 quadrennium, the mandate of this opinion will not become effective until the election of general program boards for the 1993-1996 quadrennium.

DECISION

Those portions of para. 805.2(a) and (c) which mandate guaranteed representation of clergy, laymen and laywomen on general program boards are unconstitutional. Those provisions of para. 805.2(a) and (c) which "recommend" or ask that "special attention" be given to membership of certain categories of persons on general program boards are constitutional.

RESOLUTION #2: THIRD WORLD DEBT CRISIS

WHEREAS current economic policies of the U.S., World Bank and the International Monetary Fund are failing to help reduce the \$1.3 trillion debt crippling the economies of Third World Countries.

WHEREAS most Third World debtor countries must borrow more money to simply pay the interest on their loans.

WHEREAS many debtor countries have by necessity taken out additional low interest loans through I.M.F. and World Bank to purchase food for their people.

WHEREAS the very poor in Third World debtor nations suffer most from economic reforms imposed by their governments in response to I.M.F. and World Bank policies.

WHEREAS these reforms have driven peasants off of subsistence farms, cut already low wages, cut government subsidies and increased the cost of basic necessities while living standards have been sharply reduced.

WHEREAS paragraph 73. IV. of the <u>Social Principles</u> claims "all economic systems are under the judgments of God no less than other facets of the created order and recognizes the responsibility of governments to develop and implement sound fiscal and monetary policies that provide for the economic life of individuals..."

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the North Arkansas Conference supports a Third World debt relief plan which will reduce the overall debt and ease interest payments. We urge that our legislators support a debt forgiveness and reduction plan which values human life over monetary returns.

RESOLUTION *3: RESURGENCE OF THE KU KLUX KLAN AND THE DEVELOPMENT OF OTHER HATE GROUPS

WHEREAS the resurgence of the Ku Klux Klan in recent months has been widely reported in the media.

WHEREAS the development of other hate groups such as the Skinheads has also been widely reported in the media.

WHEREAS these groups are actively recruiting youths.

WHEREAS these groups espouse anti-Semitic and racist ideals.

WHEREAS these groups embrace violence as a means to achieve their goals.

WHEREAS (paragraph 72.III.A) of the <u>Social Principles</u> states that "we recognize racism as sin and affirm the ultimate and temporal worth of all persons."

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the North Arkansas Conference reaffirms our stance in opposition to any and all groups which advocate racism, anti-Semitism and violence as activities which are incompatible with Christian teaching and the faith and practice of the United Methodist Church.

RESOLUTION #4: SUFFICIENT SHELTER

WHEREAS "Christians must judge all programs, including economic and community development, new towns, and urban renewal by the extent to which they protect and enhance human values, permit personal and political involvement, and make possible neighborhoods open to persons of all races, ages, and income levels." "Social Principles, para. 72 III The Social Community, N) Urban-Suburban Life.", The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church 1988, p. 102.

AND WHEREAS "We support the right of persons and families to live and prosper as farmers, farm workers, merchants, professionals, and others outside of the cities and metropolitan centers. We believe our culture is impoverished and our people deprived of a meaningful way of life when rural and small-town living becomes difficult or impossible. We recognize that the improvement of this way of life may sometimes necessitate the use of some lands for nonagricultural purposes. We oppose the indiscriminate diversion of agricultural land for nonagricultural uses when nonagricultural land is available. ibid. "M) Rural Life." pp 101f.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT we, the members of the North Arkansas Conference of The United Methodist Church and its local churches, commit ourselves to (1) raising the awareness of all persons in the rural-suburban areas of our state to the necessity for every person no matter his or her race, age or income level to have housing which provides safety from the elements and housing related health risks, (2) supporting all efforts to establish said housing.

RESOLUTION *5: SEXUALITY IN THE IMAGE OF GOD

WHEREAS, "We recognize that sexuality is God's good gift to all persons. We believe persons may be fully human only when that gift is acknowledged and affirmed by themselves, the Church and society. We call all persons to the disciplined, responsible fulfillment of themselves, others, and society in the stewardship of this gift." "Social Principles, para. 71.II The Nurturing Community, F) Human Sexuality," The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church 1988, p. 95.

AND WHEREAS, "Although all persons are sexual beings whether or not they are married, sexual relations are only clearly affirmed in the marriage bond. Sex may become exploitative within as well as outside marriage. We reject all sexual expressions which damage or destroy the humanity God has given us as birthright, and we affirm only that sexual expression which enhances that same humanity, in the midst of diverse opinion as to what constitutes that enhancement." ibid.

AND WHEREAS, "We deplore all forms of the commercialization and exploitation of sex with their consequent cheapening and degradation of human personality. We call for strict enforcement of laws prohibiting the sexual exploitation or use of children by adults. We call for the establishment of adequate protective services, guidance, and counseling opportunities for children thus abused. We insist that all persons, regardless of age, gender, marital status, or sexual orientation, are entitled to have their human and civil rights ensured." ibid.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT we, the members of the North Arkansas Conference of The United Methodist Church and its local churches, (a) recognize within the state of Arkansas:

- 1. The continued exploitation of men, women and children for the perverted sexual gratification of others,
- 2. The sale of pornographic material which enhances the sexual oppression of men, women and children,
- 3. The high rate of teenage pregnancy with its resultant financial and emotional burden for all the residents of our state

and (b) call for all United Methodists within the North Arkansas Conference and its local churches to:

1. Condemn publicly and privately the exploitation of men, women

- and children for the perverted sexual gratification of others and to report such cases of which they become aware to the appropriate authorities,
- Resist the consumption of pornographic materials by personal abstinence from such materials and by taking legal and legislative actions which will tend to limit the sale and use of such materials in our state,
- 3. Support all efforts at sex education which (a) celebrate human sexuality as a gift of God and therefore as a part of human life in its totality to be understood and accepted as such, (b) present abstinence outside the marriage bond and the fulfillment of both parties within the marriage bond as normative, (c) support and guide those participating in abnormal behaviors toward more fulfilling lifestyles.

RESOLUTION *6: PRESERVATION OF OUR NATURAL RESOURCES

WHEREAS, "We support and encourage social policies that serve to reduce and control the creation of industrial by-products and waste; facilitate the safe processing and disposal of toxic and nuclear waste; provide for appropriate disposal of municipal waste; and enhance the rejuvenation of polluted air, water, and soil."... "We support policies that retard the <u>indiscriminate</u> use of chemicals, including those used for growing, processing, and preserving food, and encourage adequate research into their effects upon God's creation prior to utilization." "Social Principles, Para. 70.1. The Natural World, A) Water, Air, Soil, Minerals, Plants," The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church 1988, pp. 92f.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT we, the members of the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church and its local churches, call upon our political, economic and industrial leaders to 1. Reexamine, with an eye to the lasting effect upon the environment (a) our current usage of agricultural chemicals, (b) our waste disposal policies and practices and 2. Work with all persons interested to halt the practices currently harming our state's natural resources.

RESOLUTION *7: BAN ON ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE ADS

"Use of drugs and alcoholic beverages and other drugs causes a tremendous amount of pain, suffering, and destruction of body, mind, and family. It is a major contributing cause in many different criminal activities ranging from rape and incest to robbery and burglary. The United Methodist Church has historically encouraged abstinence from alcohol as a faithful witness to God's liberating and redeeming love for persons. The Church also strongly supports measures designed to curb the abuse of other drugs. We commend recent federal law requiring a warning to prospective mothers and the general public of the dangers of alcohol use on beverage containers.

"We are deeply concerned, however, that the advertisement of alcoholic beverages, particularly on television and radio, presents a false and misleading picture of beneficial social effects from the consumption of alcohol.

"We call on the national TV and radio networks, cable television industry, and local stations to voluntarily bar all advertising of alcoholic beverages. Similar banning of tobacco products on the airwaves has produced a beneficial social effect. In the event a voluntary ban is not undertaken, then we encourage federal legislation to end all advertisement of alcoholic beverages on radio and television.

"We encourage all United Methodists and other persons of moral persuasion and judgment to support the effort to ban the advertising of alcoholic beverages on radio and television and to exercise all possible influence to deter the illegal use of drugs and the misuse of over-the-counter and prescription drugs. We solicit the support of all U.S. Senators and Congressmen in banning the advertisement of alcoholic beverages on television and radio."

RESOLUTION '8: OUR CHINESE BROTHERS AND SISTERS

WHEREAS "We hold governments responsible for the protection of the right of the people to free and fair elections and to the freedoms of speech, religion, assembly, and communications media, and petition for redress of grievances without fear of reprisal,..." The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church 1988, para, 74.

"V. The Political Community, a) Basic Freedoms", p. 105.

AND WHEREAS "Governments and laws should be servants of God and of human beings. Citizens have a duty to abide by laws duly adopted by orderly and just process of government. But governments no less than individuals are subject to the judgment of God. Therefore we recognize the right of individuals to dissent when acting under the constraint of conscience and after exhausting all legal recourse, to disobey laws deemed to be unjust. Even then, respect for law should be shown by refraining from violence and by accepting the cost of disobedience.We assert the duty of churches to support everyone who suffers for the cause of conscience, and urge governments seriously to consider restoration of rights to such persons while also maintaining respect for those who obey." ibid. "E)Civil Obedience and Civil Disobedience", p. 107.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT WE, the Members of the North Arkansas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church

- 1. Deplore and call for an end to:
 - a. The acts of military repression which have resulted in the deaths of so many people in Beijing over the past few days;
 - b. The acts of violence on the part of some of the students which have likewise resulted in death and destruction.
- 2. Call for a normalization of relations which will result in the reconciliation of the parties involved in this conflict.

- 3. Grieve with our Chinese brothers and sisters throughout the world over the loss of life.
- 4. Pledge our support a) in prayer for a peaceful conclusion to this conflict; b) in any material way appropriate for our local churches to aid in binding the wounds.
- 5. This resolution be sent to the two statewide newspapers and to our federal legislators.

RESOLUTION #9: USE OF PLASTIC

"All creation is the Lord's and we are responsible for the ways in which we use and abuse it." So begins <u>Section 1. The Natural World</u> of the <u>Social Principles</u> of the United Methodist Church. "Water, air, soil, minerals, energy resources, plants, animal life and space are to be valued and conserved because they are God's creation and not solely because they are useful to human beings. Further, we recognize the responsibility of the Church toward life style and systemic changes in seciety that will promote a more ecologically just world and a better quality of life for all creation."

WHEREAS, the petroleum product called plastic is lightweight, strong and durable and may take centuries to degrade, and

WHEREAS, plastic products have invaded all aspects of life, with four billion polyethylene bags of garbage being tossed into landfills every year, and

WHEREAS, an estimated 50,000 northern seals have been killed by entanglement in fragments of plastic nets and debris with seabirds and whales also getting caught in plastic nets, monofilament line and sixpack connectors, and

WHEREAS, medical waste and sewage, either partially or entirely made of plastic, washed ashore in the U. S. and abroad.

WHEREAS, biodegradeable plastic, made from corn starch, has been developed that may be decomposed by exposure to ultra-violet light or a variety of microorganisms, such as fungi and bacteria.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the North Arkansas Conference:

- 1) Stand firmly in support of legislation banning or limiting the use of plastic products wherever possible.
 - 2) Calls for further research into better biodegradable plastic products.
- 3) Calls for the passage and enforcement of state and federal legislation that mandates the use of biodegradable plastics.
- 4) Ask all individuals to prayerfully consider using only biodegradable plastics.
 - 5) Discontinue use of styrofoam cups at Annual Conference.

RESOLUTION #10: LOTTERY

WHEREAS, in 1990 a state-wide referendum will be held to authorize the legislature to create a state-owned and operated lottery in Arkansas; and

WHEREAS, historically the lottery has proven to be a regressive tax; has a disproportional appeal to and use by the poor; requires no education, skill or special knowledge to participate; and creates no new industry, jobs, or goods for Arkansas; and

WHEREAS, other states with higher per capita incomes than Arkansas have experienced shortfall in anticipated revenue through the lottery; and

WHEREAS, the General Conference of the United Methodist Church has stated: "we deplore the establishment of state lotteries and their use as a means of raising public revenues;

BE IT RESOLVED, that the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church calls upon its members and upon the voters of Arkansas to oppose the adoption of the lottery and its use by the state as a means for additional revenues.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the North Arkansas Conference urges all of its members and all Arkansans to seek out and support alternative means of raising state revenues for the support of education and other essential services for all of our state's citizens.

RESOLUTION #11: UMCOR 50th ANNIVERSARY

WHEREAS, 1990 will mark the 50th anniversary of the United Methodist Committee on Relief, and

WHEREAS, the United Methodist Committee on Relief has enabled members of The United Methodist Church to respond to the suffering of the world in Jesus' name, providing life-saving actions to people in crisis and despair, and

WHEREAS, the United Methodist Committee on Relief has involved United Methodist Church members in ministry with refugees and initiated and supported programs which work to alleviate the root causes of hunger,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the North Arkansas Conference affirms the history and work of the United Methodist Committee on Relief and commends the members of its United Methodist churches for their support of the United Methodist Committee on Relief and encourages each local church to participate in giving to the One Great Hour of Sharing each year, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the North Arkansas Conference reaffirms the mandate of the United Methodist Committee on Relief in relief, rehabilitation, root causes of hunger and refugee ministries and pledges its cooperation to enable each church to celebrate the 50 years of service of UMCOR and to dedicate support to the future work of this Committee.

RESOLUTION # 12: JONESBORO DISTRICT PARSONAGE

WHEREAS, the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church voted at its Annual Conference held in June, 1987, to reduce from seven to six the number of districts; and

WHEREAS, as the result of such action the former Jonesboro district was dissolved and was absorbed into the Paragould and Forrest City districts; and

WHEREAS, the district parsonage of the former Jonesboro District is vacant and it is necessary that a proper disposition be made thereof; and

WHEREAS, Bishop Richard B. Wilke has appointed a committee composed of Jerry Burns, Robert W. Henry and Rev. George Wayne Martin to investigate the disposition of such district parsonage and to report to him a recommendation thereon; and

WHEREAS, said committee met and organized on February 23, 1989, at Conway, Arkansas and by common consent Jerry Burns was selected chairman and Robert W. Henry was selected secretary, and at such meeting the committee undertook to examine the provisions of The Beek of discipline which are applicable to the determination of the assigned task; and

WHEREAS, para. 2517.3 of The Beak of Discipline provides that the committee shall hear claims of each district regarding its interest therein before making a decision, the committee consulted with the Reverend Dewey Dark, the Reverend Charles Ramsay and the Reverend Bill Wilder, district superintendents of the present Paragould District, Jonesboro District and Forrest City District, respectively; and

WHEREAS, said para. 2517.3 of The Book of Discipline further provides that each of the two newly constituted districts shall be entitled to receive its just share of the then reasonable value of the parsonage; that the said committee shall determine the amount of such just shares; and that any sum received as and from such just share shall be used for no other purpose than purchase or building of a parsonage in the district; and

WHEREAS, the committee has received the benefit of computations of allocations of each church in the present Jonesboro District which clearly illustrates that the amounts received from such allocations from churches which will be incorporated into the Paragould District equal approximately seventy five percent (75%) of the total allocations of the district and that the amounts received from such allocations from churches which will be incorporated into the Forrest City District approximate twenty five percent (25%) of the total allocations of the district:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the aforesaid committee that the following recommendation for the disposal of the district parsonage of the Jonesboro District and the distribution of the funds therefrom be made to Bishop Richard B. Wilke:

That the said district parsonage be appraised by one or more qualified appraisers having knowledge of property values in Jonesboro, Arkansas; that the

said district parsonage be sold in a manner reasonably calculated to obtain the greatest sum therefor; and that, following such sale, the net proceeds remaining after payment of the costs of sale be distributed as follows: Seventy five percent (75%) thereof to the Paragould/Jonesboro District and twenty five percent (25%) thereof to the Forrest City District, to be used by the districts for the purposes set forth in the Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church.

RESOLUTION AFFIRMING A DIVERSITY OF LANGUAGE USAGE IN THE UNITED STATES AND OPPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT MAKING ENGLISH THE OFFICIAL LANGUAGE

The United States is a land whose inhabitants are enriched by diverse traditions, languages, and cultures. While English is the commonly used or primary language of the country, there have always been other languages present throughout the history of the nation. Native American languages and Spanish were already spoken when the first English colonists arrived at Plymouth. Throughout that same history, there have been various efforts to prescribe the use of English and proscribe the use of other languages. These efforts sometimes resulted in legislation which had the effect of legalizing discrimination against various language minority groups. However, such legislation was eventually overcome by the constitutional principles of equal rights for all. The acknowledgement of English as the primary language of the United States does not deny the right and contribution of other languages or the inherent right of people to retain and speak their mother tongues.

In recent years there have been renewed efforts in different parts of the country to make English the official language of the nation. We are concerned that the movement to declare English constitutionally as the official language of the nation is not based upon any real need but, in fact, may be motivated by an effort to deny the pluralistic foundation of the country; and to deny the dignity and wholeness of persons from different racial and ethnic groups who rightly considered their languages an integral part of their cultures. We fear the real purpose of some may be not so much to make English the official language of the U.S. as to make English the exclusive language of the nation.

For example, there is an English-only "movement" which has, within the last year, gained more national recognition. Organizations, such as "U.S. English" and English First," continue gaining support through active national activities and local English-only campaigns. In addition to promotion of their principles through the media, they are also involved in various legislative and lobbying activities. Those include: efforts to pass a constitutional amendment making English the official language of the United States; opposition to federal legislation for bilingual education, voting rights bills, and the FCC licensing applications for Spanish language broadcasts.

These efforts and their implications are another manifestation of the systemic racism which has infected this country for generations. The English-only movement blames the deterioration of the American fabric on immigration and the use of languages other than English. It contends that the nation's unity rests upon the use of an official language. It defines multi-culturalism and multi-lingualism as "anti-unity." Consequently, the movement, if successful, could further discriminate and segregate the racial/ethnic population of the U.S. Essential information such as the 911 emergency telephone number, hospital emergency rooms, police, fire fighters, language services, bilingual education, and interpreters in the judicial system might be denied.

As Christians, we believe that we are children of God, created in God's image, and members of the family of God.

We believe that diversity is a gift of the creative genius of God and that languages are an expression of the wisdom of God;

We believe that competence in the English language is important to participate fully in the life of the United States, but that we also live in a global context, the global Family of God, where people and nations experience interdependency at all levels:

We believe that our nation needs to take advantage of the rich contributions that the ethnic/language groups bring to this country by preserving those languages and encouraging North Americans to learn other languages;

We believe that it is the will of God that each human being is affirmed as a whole person and that it is in the acceptance and interchange of our uniqueness that we find Oneness--total wholeness-Shalom:


We condemn the attempt to rob a person of his/her language as dehumanizing and as a denial of that person's wholeness:

We condemn the English-only movement as a manifestation of the sin of racism; therefore,

The General Conference shall:

- 1) Express in writing to the President of the United States its support for practices and policies which permit provision of information in languages appropriate to the residents of communities and its opposition to the movement which seeks to make English the only language of the United States, which movement is discriminatory and racist;
- 2) Forward this resolution to members of Congress, governors and the legislatures of the fifty states and territories;
- 3) Commend this resolution to all Annual Conferences for promotion and interpretation within the Annual Conferences; and
- 4) Ask that the General Board of Church and Society make this resolution an urgent item in their agenda for lobbying, constituency education and advocacy.

STRUCTURE OF THE NORTH ARKANSS CONFERENCE THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

SECTION I

- 1. The foundational and doctrinal guidance for this structure document is the <u>1988</u> <u>Discipline of the United Methodist Church</u>. The following paragraph is quoted:
 - "P. 706, 1988 Discipline of The United Methodist Church:

The Annual Conference shall provide for the connectional relationship between the general boards and commissions and the conference, district and local church.

1. The Annual Conference shall structure itself for effective misson in any mode deemed appropriate. In each Annual Conference, there may be conference program boards related to the general program boards organized as the Annual Conference shall determine. The Annual Conference shall provide for the connectional relationship between the general program boards and the conference districts, and local churches, and shall specifically assign the program responsibilities related to the objectives and scope of the general program boards to agencies of the Annual Conference.

[NOTE: Decision No. 417 (Oct 30, 1976) of The Judicial Council of The United Methodist Church found that P. 706.1 was constitutional. The council declared that "if a conference should determine not to create any of the boards or divisions thereof, it shall specifically assign the liaison functions and responsibilities of each such board or division to another agency in the conference."]

- 2. The Annual Conference may appoint additional committees for the purpose of promoting the work of The United Methodist Church within the bounds of said Annual Conference and may prescribe their membership and their powers and duties.
- 3. Each Annual Conference may make its agencies of such size as its work may require; provided that consideration shall be given to the inclusion of lay and clergy persons from small membership churches. Full-time local pastors serving charges are eligible for election or appointment to such agencies, except those dealing with qualifications, orders, and status of ministers and local pastors.
- 4. Insofar as possible, the membership of councils, boards, and agencies of the Annual Conference shall include one-third clergy, one-third laywomen, and one-

third laymen, except for the Board of Ordained Ministry. Special attention shall be given to the inclusion of clergywomen, youth, young adults, older adults, persons with a handicapping condition, and racial and ethnic minority persons in keeping with policies for general church agencies.

- 5. Members of general agencies shall serve as ex-officio members of the corresponding Annual Conference agency or its equivalent structure. If this results in a person being a member of more than one Annual Conference agency in violation of either Annual Conference policy or another provision of the Book of Discipline, the person shall choose the Annual Conference agency on which to serve."
- 2. All Disciplinary references herein are to the <u>1988 Book of Discipline of The</u> United Methodist Church.
- 3. Glossary of Terms; Abbreviations; Acronymas:
- a. North Arkansas Conference of The United Methodist Church hereinafter referred to as the <u>Conference</u>.
- b. The <u>Discipline of The United Methodist Church</u> hereinafter referred to as the <u>Discipline</u>.
- c. The North Arkansas Annual Conference hereinafter referred to as <u>The Annual Conference</u> refers to the sessions of the Annual Conferences.
- d. The word <u>agency/agencies</u> refers to all Councils; Boards; Committees; Commissions; Work Areas and other organizational entities of the Conference.
- e. <u>Ouadrennium</u> -- the four year period beginning January 1 following the adjournment of the regular session of The General Conference (1984 General Conference Quadrennium Jan. 1, 1985 thru Dec. 31, 1988) (1988 General Conference Quadrennium Jan. 1, 1989 thru Dec. 31, 1992).
- f. <u>Task Force</u> -- where authorized herein a Task Force may be established for the purpose of accomplishing specific and particular goals of an Agency. A Task Force shall be oriented to immediate tasks and will be disestablished upon completion of its assigned task. A Task Force shall always be directly amenable to the agency under which it was created.

SECTION II

- 4. Nomination; Election; Term and Tenure; Vacancies:
- a. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- all offices, established in this Structure document, are filled by nomination of the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by The Annual Conference. The right to nominate from the floor shall not be abridged.
- b. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- the term of office shall be one quadrennium (from January 1 of the first year of the quadrennium through December 31 of the last year of the quadrennium). Election, for offices to be filled at the beginning of each quadrennium, shall take place during The Annual Conference of the last year of each quadrennium. Total tenure in any one office by any individual shall not exceed one quadrennium past the one in which that tenure first began.
- Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- where only two
 people are being considered for election to an office a simple majority will elect;

where more than two persons are being considered for election to any office the one receiving the most votes shall be declared elected.

- d. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- all members and exofficio members of every agency shall have voice and vote.
- e. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- The Chairperson of each agency shall be nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and elected by The Annual Conference. Each agency shall elect other officers as it may determine are required to carry out its responsibilities and functions. At the option of the agency those officers elected and other designated members may constitute an Executive Committee.
- f. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- vacancies occurring within offices and agencies of the Conference, during the quadrennium, shall be filled by nomination of the Conference Committee on Nominations and election by the next Annual Conference.
- g. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- when a vacancy occurs between sessions of The Annual Conference and it is determined, by the Conference Committee on Nominations, that the vacancy must be filled immediately because of the nature and scope of the responsibilities of the position, that Committee may nominate and elect an individual to fill the position until The Annual Conference next convenes and elects a person, nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations, to fill the position for the remainder of the quadrennium.
- h. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- all offices and agencies established by this Structure Document shall be directly amenable to the Conference.
- i. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- all agencies of the Conference that are governed by a Charter, Constitution, or By-Laws shall operate in compliance of those documents; and this Structure Document.
- j. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- insofar as possible, the membership of all agencies of the Annual Conference shall include one-third clergy, one-third laywomen, and one-third laymen. Special attention shall be given to the inclusion of clergywomen, youth, young adults, older adults, persons with a handicapping condition, and racial and ethnic minority persons. Consideration shall be given to the inclusion of lay and clergy persons from small membership churches; and full-time local pastors serving charges.
- k. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- members of general and jurisdictional agencies of The United Methodist Church shall serve as exofficio members of the corresponding Annual Conference Agency or its equivalent structure.
- 1. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- agencies of the Conference may organize themselves into sub-groups; task forces; work groups; committees or similar groupings to facilitate meeting their assigned and assumed responsibilities and functions.
- m. Unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein -- membership on Task Forces of the Annual Conference and its agencies shall be inclusive of ethnic minorities and persons from small membership churches. Persons are limited to

membership on one Conference Task Force at any given time. Para 4j, above, shall apply.

5. It is the intent that this structure Document be in complete harmony and compliance with the Discipline. Any wording or provision herein that shall prove to be in contradiction of the Discipline shall be considered to be null and void -- it is the Discipline that shall prevail in all instances.

SECTION III

- 6. Members of The Annual Conference [P. 35 & 791, Discipline]:
- a. Clergy Members. The ministerial membership of an Annual Conference shall consist of members in full connection, probationary members, associate members, affiliate members and local pastors under full-time appointment to a pastoral charge.
- (1) Members in full connection shall have the right to vote on all matters in the Annual Conference except in the election of lay delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences; and shall have sole responsibility for all matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of ministers.
- (2) Probationary members shall have the right to vote in the Annual Conference on all matters <u>except</u> constitutional amendments, elections of delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences, and matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of ministers.
- (3) Associate and affiliate members shall have the right to vote in the Annual Conference on all matters <u>except</u> constitutional amendments, election of delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences, and matters of ordination, character and conference relations of ministers.
- (4) Local pastors under full time appointment to a pastoral charge shall have the right to vote in the Annual Conference on all matters except constitutional amendments, election of delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences, and matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of ministers.
- (5) Under special conditions, and for missional reasons, an Annual Conference may, by a two-thirds majority vote of its members present, allow local and student part-time pasters under appointment to a pasteral charge the right to vote at Annual Conference on all matters except constitutional amendments, election of clergy delegates to General and Jurisdictional or Central Conferences and matters of ordination, character and conference relations of clergy.
- b. Lay Members. There shall be a lay member from each Charge within the Annual Conference [where there is more than one minister appointed to the charge there shall be a lay member elected for each minister]. The Annual Conference shall also provide for election of Lay Members at Large to assure that there is at least an equal number of lay and clergy members of the Annual Conference. [NOTE: The Judicial Council has ruled (Judicial Council Decision #479, April 22, 1980) that there can be more lay members than clergy; however there cannot be more clergy members than lay]. The lay members of the Annual Conference shall

participate in all delibarations and vote upon all measures except on the granting or validation of license, ordination, reception into full conference membership, or any question concerning the character and official conduct of ministers; and the election of clergy delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences. When at any time a lay member is excused by the Annual Conference from further attendance during the session, the alternate lay member may be seated instead. It shall be the duty of the lay member of the Annual Conference to report on actions of the Annual Conference. Lay members shall have been for the two years next preceding their election members of The United Methodist Church and shall have been active participants in The United Methodist Church for at least four years next preceding their election.

- c. Secretary of The Annual Conference. Shall carry out those functions described in various paragraphs of the Discipline and those assigned by the Annual Conference. Additionally the Conference Secretary, in compliance with P. 747.2 of the Discipline, shall be responsible for examination of the District Conference Journals and shall assure that copies are on file in the proper files and archival repositories. The Conference Secretary shall be responsible for annual review of the North Arkansas Conference Rules of Order and to recommend them for adoption at the beginning of each Annual Conference.
- d. Statistician of The Annual Conference. Shall carry out those functions assigned by the Annual Conference, and shall make all statistical data and information available to The Annual Conference.
- e. Conference Lay Leader. Shall carry out those functions described in various paragraphs of the Discipline and those assigned by the Annual Conference. Shall serve as Chairperson of the Conference Council on Lay Life and Work. Shall, in cooperation with the Bishop, assure that each Episcopal address to The Annual Conference, addresses concerns of the Laity of the Conference; or that provision is made for a "State of the Laity" address.
- f. Conference Treasurer (P. 715.1) [Nominated by the Conference Council on Finance and Administration to the Annual Conference for election. Amendable to the Council on Finance and Administration; where they serve with voice and without vote.
 - a. The Diaconal Ministers
 - h. Conference President of United Methodist Women
 - i. Conference President of United Methodist Men
 - j. The District Lay Leaders
 - k. President (or equivalent) of Conference Youth Organization.
 - 1. Two (2) Young Persons under 25 years of age from each District.

Section IV

- 7. Agencies of The Annual Conference:
 - a. Conference Committee on Nominations [No Disciplinary Reference]
 - (1) <u>Membership</u> 16 members (8 lay and 8 clergy) with at least one member from each district. (AC) Names of persons shall be placed in nominatin from the floor of the Annual Conference. Balloting shall proceed by

written ballot. Election will be declared for the nominee receiving the most votes for the position. There shall be no division of the house in the election. A class of four persons (two clergy and two lay) shall be elected annually to a four-year term. At least two ethnic persons shall be on the Committee on Nominations at all times. Those elected shall not succeed themselves for four years. Any vacancy occurring between sessions of the Annual Conference shall be filled for the remainder of the term at the succeeding session of the Annual Conference by vote of the Annual Conference, in the same manner as described above. The Bishop and Conference Lay Leader shall serve as exofficio members with vote.. The Conference Council Director shall serve as a consultant to the Committee. This committee shall elect its own Chairperson and such other officers as it may deem necessary.

- (2) Responsibilities: The Conference Nominating Committee will nominate the Conference Secretary and the Conference Statistician; the Conference Lay Leader; and 2 persons under 25 years of age from each District; and the Chairpersons and all members of the Conference agencies (unless otherwise specified in the Discipline or herein). In January of the last year of each quadrennium the Nominating Committee shall publish a list of all offices which will be vacant at the beginning of the next quadrennium. This listing will be sent to all local churches requesting them to nominate members who meet the requirements and have the desire to serve on an Annual Conference agency. This listing will then be sent to the District Nominating Committee. The District Nominating Committee will compile a listing of District nominees for all vacancies and forward that listing to the Chariperson of the Conference Nominating Committee. Prior to Annual Conference, the Conference Nominating Committee will meet and, from the District Nominees, and from any additional nominees proposed by the Conference Nominating Committee, prepare their list of nominees for each office, to be presented to The Annual Conference for election; giving priority to the District Nominees. All nominees shall be consulted regarding their nomination. Those personnel on the District lists who are not elected to Annual Conference offices will serve as a nominee pool for ad-interim vacancies and Task Forces during the quadrennium.
- b. <u>Conference Council on Ministries [CCOM]</u> [Para. 726-727, Discipline]
 - (1) <u>Membershio</u>: Presiding Bishop; the District Superintendents; Confernce Secretary; two representatives of the conference youth organization, one of whom shall be the president; two representatives of the conference United Methodist Women, one of whom shall be the president; two representatives of the conference United Methodist Men, one of whom shall be the president; two young adults; the Conference Lay Leader (who also serves as Chairperson of the Conference Council on Lay Life and Work); one lay person and one clergy person from each District Council on Ministries (DCOM), one of whom shall be the DCOM Chairperson; coordinators of age level and family departments (Children, Youth, Young Adult, Adult and Family Life); the Chairperson of the Council on Professional Ministry. Chairpersons of the Commission on

Religion and Race and the Commission on Status and Role of Women. Conference Statistician; the Chairpersons of the Boards of Discipleship. Church and Society, Global Ministries, and Higher Education and Campus The Chairpersons of the following Committees of the Annual Conference and the Conference Council on Ministries (Committee on Communications and Publishing Interest: Committee on Planning and Research; Committee on Personnel; Committee for the Coordination of Ethnic Local Church Concerns; (D/AC) Committee on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns; Committee on Parish and Community Development;). The following shall be members without vote (with voice): Director and Associate Directors of the CCOM: Conference Treasurer; and the Chairperson of the Council on Finance and Administration. The officers of the CCOM shall be a Chairperson, a Vice-Chairperson, a secretary, and such other officers as the council may determine. All officers shall be elected by the CCOM in a manner as they shall determine. The Conference Committee on Nominations vill submit a aceleation Chairperson to the CCOM; however the election the. Chairperson will be by the membership of the CCOM. nominations may be received from the plenary session CCOM. (AC) The Nominee for Chairperson may be a current member of the council or shall automatically become a member upon election. Chairperson shall be required to vacate any other conference offices held upon his/her election.

- (2) <u>Responsibilities</u>: The CCOM shall perform those functions as defined in Para. 726.10 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Conference.
- (3) There shall be an Executive Committee composed of persons holding the following offices: Chairperson; Vice-Chairperson; Secretary; the Bishop; a Cabinet representative; the Conference Lay Leader; Chairpersons of the Boards of Church and Society, Discipleship, Global Ministries, and Higher Education and Campus Ministry; and one representative from each of the DCOM Teams on the CCOM [this person is to be chosen by the DCOM]; and the Conference representative to the General Council on Ministries. The following will serve as members of the Executive Committee without vote: Executive Director and the Associate Director(s) of the CCOM; Chairperson of CFA; Secretary of the Annual Conference.
- (4) There shall be a Personnel Committee, of no more than six, which shall be elected from the CCOM membership in a number and manner determined by the CCOM. The Personnel Committee shall elect its own Chairperson and such other officers as it may require to carry out its responsibilities. The Personnel Committee shall be empowered to make recommendations concerning staff personnel and salaries and to be in consultation with the Bishop concerning clergy appointments to CCOM staff. The Personnel Committee shall perform those functions assigned to it by the CCOM.

(5) The CCOM may form committees and task forces from within or outside its membership for the purpose of carrying out specific assignments of the Council and its agencies.

(6) The following are Agencies of the Conference Council on Ministries and

shall be amendable thereto:

(a) <u>Committee on Communications and Publishing Interests</u> (Paragraph. 726.5b. Discipline)

Membership: 9 persons. The Chairperson and eight other persons shall be nominated by the CCOM Executive Committee and shall be elected by the CCOM; the Chairperson shall serve as a member of the Council. The Area Director of Communications shall serve on this Committee without vote. It should not be deemed necessary for all members of this Committee to be members of the CCOM. Due consideration should be given to the inclusion in the membership of persons with expertise in communications and publishing. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote

<u>Responsibility:</u> The Committee shall perform those functions as defined in P.726.5b of the Discipline and those asigned to it by the Annual Conference and the CCOM.

Arkansas Area Responsibilities: There shall be a Joint (North Arkansas and Little Rock Annual Conferences) Committee on Communications which shall consist of all the members of the North Arkansas Conference Committee on Communications and Publishing Interests and all of the members of the Little Rock Conference Committee on Communications. This Joint Committee shall be jointly chaired by the two Chairpersons of the two constituent Communications Committees. The Joint Committee shall administer the adopted Arkansas Area Communications Program. The Joint Committee shall be responsible for the oversight and management of the Arkansas United Methodist newspaper; the Arkansas Area Resource Center, and the Arkansas Area Media Center. Ex-Officio members (without vote) shall be the Area Director of Communication; the Editor of the Arkansas United Methodist Newspaper; and the Area Treasurer.

(b) Committee on Planning and Research [Par. 726.5c Discipline]

Membership: The Committee shall be composed of 15 members, one of which will be the Chairperson. The Chairperson and fourteen other persons shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Nominating Committee and shall be elected by the Annual Conference; the Chairperson shall serve as a member of the CCOM. The Committee shall elect other officers and establish sub-committees as it deems necessary to carry out its responsibilities and functions. It should not be deemed necessary for all members of this Committee to be members of the CCOM. Due consideration should be given to the inclusion in the membership of

persons with expertise in planning and research. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

Responsibility: To engage in planning and research on behalf of the Conference Council on Ministries and the Annual Conference and to serve as an advisory group to the Annual Conference and its agencies. To serve as a clearing house for all planning and research projects under the sponsorship of the Annual Conference and its agencies. The Committee shall have the authority and responsibility to examine the policies and administrative practices of the agencies of the Annual Conference and make recommendations to them of ways and means by which work of the church might be more effectively performed or the cause of the church more adequately promoted. To annually review the Conference Standing Rules for adequacy and accuracy and to recommend changes thereto to the Annual Conference. The Committee shall have the authority to review this Structure document to assure that it continues to meet the functional needs of the Conference and is in unity and conformity with the Discipline: and to recommend changes hereto. When engaged in planning and research on behalf of or at the direction of The Annual Conference (i.e. Structure, Standing Rules, etc.) this Committee shall be amenable directly to the Annual Conference.

(c) Missional Priority Coordinating Committee [No Disciplinary requirement] Upon the adoption of a General Church Missional Priority a Conference Missional Priority Coordinating Committee, consisting of no more than seven members, shall be formed by the CCOM. The basis for membership will be determined by the scope and direction of the adopted General Church Missional Priority. The responsibilities of this Committee will to be to assure that the proper administrative and programmatic actions are taken to assure complete implementation of the Missional Priority.

(d) <u>Committee for the Coordination of Ethnic Local Church</u> <u>Concerns</u> (Par. 726.5a, Discipline) (D/AC)

Membership: The Committee may have up to 15 members and shall be composed of a representative from each of the following confeerence boards and agencies: Church and Society, Discipleship, Global Ministries, Higher Education and Campus Ministry, Finance and Administration (without vote), Lay Life and Work, Equitable Salaries, Parish and Community Development, Religion and Bace, United Methodist Women, Commission on Status and Bole of Women, ethnic/racial caucuses and the Conference Council on Ministries. These are the principal agencies into which

most ethnic minority local church concerns are to be institutionalized. It is recommended that at least 1/2 of the Committee be racial/ethnic persons and that 1/3 of the members be laywomen; 1/3 laymen; and 1/3 clergy. Commission on Religion and Race may name any additional at large members needed to guarantee the required ethnic makeup of the Committee. The Chairperson and the other members shall be nominated by the CCOM Executive Committee and shall be elected by the CCOM; the Chairperson shall serve as a member of the CCOM. The CCOM Chair shall be an ex-officio member with vote. The Area Consultant for the Ethnic Minority Church shall be an ex-officio member vithout vete. A member of the Corncil on Ministries staff shall be an ex-officio member vithout vote.

Responsibility: The Committee shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 726.5a of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Annual Conference and the CCOM. The Committee shall be responsible for monitoring and assuring implementation of the "Comprehensive Plan".

(e) Board of Church and Society [Par. 728.1, Discipline]

Membership: Chairperson and one representative from each District elected by the Annual Conference. The Board may elect other officers and establish committees as it deems necessary to carry out its responsibilities and functions. Task Forces may be appointed, as needed, by the Chairperson of the Board of Church and Society, using the Conference Committee on Nominations Nominee Pool as a resource. The Mission Coordinator for Christian Social Involvement of the Conference United Methodist Women shall serve as an ex-officio member of this Board. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

Responsibilities: This Board shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 728.1 of the Discipline and those tasks assigned to it by the Council on Ministries.

(f) Age-Level and Family Coerdinators [Par. 726.6, Discipline] There shall be Coordinators of Children, Youth, Young Adult, Adult and Family Life who will serve as advocates of these segments of our society and Church on the CCOM. The Young Adult, the Adult and the Family Life Coordinators shall also coordinate a comprehensive plan for Singles Ministries; and the Adult Coordinator shall also develop a comprehensive plan for Older Adult Ministries. (AC) Task Forces may be appointed, as needed, by the

Age Level and Family Coordinators, using the Conference Committee on Nominations Nominee Pool as a resource.

(g) Board of Discipleship [Par. 729, Discipline]

Membership: Board Chairperson and the Chairperson of each of the Committees functioning under this Board. Task Forces may be appointed, as needed, by the Chairperson of the Baord of Discipleship, using the Conference Committee on Nominations Nominee Pool as a resource. The Board may elect other officers and establish committees as it deems necessary to carry out its responsibilities and functions. The Conference President of UMM shall serve as an ex-officio member of this Board. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

Responsibilities: This Board shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 729 of the Discipline and those tasks assigned to it by the Council on Ministries.

The following are the Standing Committees of the Board of Discipleship:

L. Committee on Education [Par. 729.2, Discipline]

Membership: Chairperson and one representative from each District elected by the Annual Conference. The Committee may elect other officers and establish sub-committees as it deems necessary to carry out its responsibilities and functions. Task Forces may be appointed, as needed, by the Chairperson of the Committee on Education, using the Conference Committee on Nominations Nominee Pool as a resource. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

<u>Responsibilities</u>: This Committee shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 729.2 of the Discipline and those tasks assigned to it by the Council on Ministries.

2. Committee on Evangelism [Par. 729.3, Discipline]:

Membership: Chairperson and one representative from each District elected by the Annual Conference. The Committee may elect other officers and establish sub-committees as it deems necessary to carry out its responsibilities and functions. Task Forces may be appointed, as needed, by the Chairperson of the Committee on Evangelism, using the Conference Committee on Nominations Nominee Pool as a resource. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

<u>Responsibilities</u>: This Committee shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 729.3 of the Discipline and those tasks assigned to it by the Council on Ministries.

THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

3. Committee on Worship [Par. 729.4 and 729.6, Discipline]:

Membership: Chairperson and one representative from each District elected by the Annual Conference. The Committee may elect other officers and establish sub-committees as it deems necessary to carry out its responsibilities and functions. Task Forces may be appointed, as needed, by the Chairperson of the Committee on Worship, using the Conference Committee on Nominations Nominee Pool as a resource. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

Responsibilities: This Committee shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 729.4 and 729.6 of the Discipline and those tasks assigned to it by the Council on Ministries. The Worship Committee shall be responsible for planning the Devotional and Worship services for the sessions of The Annual Conference; and in consultation with the Conference Boards of Ordained and Diaconal Ministry will provide for the Annual Conference Memorial Worship Service.

4. Committee on Stewardship [Par. 729.5, Discipline]:

Membership: Chairperson and one representative from each District elected by the Annual Conference. The Committee may elect other officers and establish sub-committees as it deems necessary to carry out its responsibilities and functions. Task Forces may be appointed, as needed, by the Chairperson of the Committee on Stewardship, using the Conference Committee on Nominations Nominee Pool as a resource. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

Responsibilities: This Committee shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 729.5 of the Discipline and those tasks assigned to it by the Council on Ministries.

5. Committee on Outdoor Ministries [No Disciplinary requirement]:

Membership: Chairperson and one representative from each District elected by the Annual Conference; the District Coordinators of Outdoor Ministries. The Committee may elect other officers and establish subcommittees as it deems necessary to carry out its responsibilities and functions. Task Forces may be appointed, as needed, by the Chairperson of the Committee on Outdoor Ministries, using the Conference Committee on Nominations Nominee Pool as a resource. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

Responsibilities: The Committee on Outdoor Ministries shall carry out those outdoor ministry (CPR) functions as defined in Para. 729.1 b.c. and d and Para. 729.2d of the Discipline and those assigned to it by

the Council on Ministries. This Committee shall plan, administer and implement Outdoor Ministries in the Annual Conferences. Schedule and select the directors and curriculum for the Conference camping program for all campsites. Discover, recruit, train, assign and support leadership for Outdoor Ministries. Develop and promote standards to verify that all campsites are ready for camping. Administer the finances, building, improvement and grounds at Camp Nawake within the framework of established Conference policies and the provisions of the Discipline; and those tasks assigned to it by the Council on Ministries.

(h) Beard of Global Ministries [Par. 731.1, Discipline]

Membership: Chairperson; one representative from each District [elected by the Annual Conference]; the Conference Coordinator of Christian Global Concerns (D) of the Conference United Methodist Women; Institutional representatives (voice, without vote) from Methodist Health Systems, Memphis, TN; the United Methodist Children's Home, Little Rock, AR; Camp Aldersgate, Little Rock, AR [Note: These Institutions shall be responsible for the Travel and/or Per Diem costs of their representatives]. Task Forces may be appointed as needed, by the chairperson of the Board of Global Ministries, using the Conference Committee on Nominations Nominee Pool as a resource. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

Responsibilities: The Board of Global Ministries shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 731.1 thru 731.4 of the Discipline and those tasks assigned to it by the Council on Ministries. The Board of Global Ministries shall establish a World Hunger Task Force whose responsibility will be to keep the CCOM and the Conference aware of the World Hunger emphasis of UMCOR and the General Board of Global Ministries and to coordinate, in cooperation with the participating communions, the annual World Hunger emphasis within the Arkansas Area.

(i) <u>Beard of Higher Education and Campus Ministry</u> [Par. 732.1 thru 732.4, Discipline]

Membership: Chairperson; one representative from each District; three (CPR) representatives from each of the four Wesley Foundations (Arkansas State University, Jonesboro; Arkansas Tech University, Russellville; University of Arkansas, Fayetteville; University of Central Arkansas, Conway), the Chair of the Beard of Directors, (CPR) and a student member of the Board of Directors shall serve with vote; and each Wesley Foundation Director shall be an ex-officio member without vote. The President (or designated representative) of Hendrix College and Philander Smith College, who shall serve as ex-officio without vote. Task Forces may be appointed, as needed, by the Chairperson of the Board of

Higher Education and Campus Ministry, using the Conference Committee on Nominations Nominee Pool as a resource. The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

Responsibilities: This Board shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 732.1 thru 732.4 of the Discipline, and those tasks assigned to it by the CCOM.

c. Conference Council on Lay Life and Work [Par. 729.7, and 730, Discipline]

Membership: The Conference Lay Leader, who shall serve as the Chairperson; the Conference Director of Lay Speaking; the District Lay Leaders; one laywoman slected by the Executive Committee of the Conference United Methodist Women; one layman selected by the Executive Committee of the Conference United Methodist Men; four youth selected by the Conference Council on Youth Ministries; four at-large lay members nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and elected by The Annual Conference; and the currently elected lay-delegates to General Conference. A representative from the Cabinet and a member of the CCOM Staff shall serve as Ex-Officio members without vote.

Responsibilities: The Council shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 729.7 and 730 of the Discipline and those tasks assigned to it by the Conference. The Council shall have the responsibility to interpret and spread throughout the conference all the rich meanings of the universal priesthood of all believers, of Christian vocation, and the ministry of the laity. It shall help the Annual Conference and local churches in programs which aim to recruit and to equip the laity for the widest and most productive ministry possible throught the church. The Conference Council on Lay Life and Work, in consultation with the Conference Committee on Nominations, shall nominate and elect a lay person from within the Conference to serve as the Conference Director of Lay Speaking. The Council, through its Director of Lay Speaking, shall encourage participation in the United Methodist Church Lay Speaking program by the laity of the Conference. The Council, through the Conference Director of Lay Speaking, shall provide assistance to the Districts in planning for and facilitating training opportunities for laity involved in Lay Speaking within the Conference.

d. <u>Conference Council on Professional Ministry</u> [No Disciplinary requirement]

Membership: Chairperson; Chairpersons of the following seven agencies of the Council on Professional Ministry [Board of Ordained Ministry; Board of Diaconal Ministry; Board of Pensions; Commission on Equitable Salaries; Committee on Group Insurance; Joint Review Committee; and the Committee on Disability.].

Responsibility: Coordinate all responsibilities pertaining to professional

<u>Responsibility</u>: Coordinate all responsibilities pertaining to professional ministry. It shall no way abridge the disciplinary responsibilities of its agency groups.

(1) Board of Ordained Ministry [Par. 733, Discipline]

Membership: 15 clergy (at least one from each District of the Conference) in full connection. They shall be nominated by the Bishop after consultation with the Chairperson of the Board and the Cabinet. Membership may include a retired clergy in full connection. At least 2/3 of the members shall be graduates of seminaries listed by the University Senate. (D) Twe Lay Observers (one man and one voman) shall be elected participate in the work of the board but without vote. (CPR) least one member of the Board will be engaged in an appointment beyond the local church and will represent to the board all other clergy so assigned. The board membership shall include women and ethnic minority persons. The board shall elect a registrar and such associate registrars as it may determine, one such associate registrar to be given responsibility for candidacy; a cabinet representative shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote. The Board shall elect its own Chairperson and such other officers as it deems necessary to carry out its assigned functions and responsibilities. The Board shall be directly amenable to the Annual Conference, notwithstanding its organizational relationship with the Conference Council on Professional Ministry. (D)

Responsibilities: The Board of Ordained Ministry shall carry out those functions as defined and described in Par. 733 of the Discipline. The Board of Ordained Ministry shall act as an advisory agency for the Bishop, Cabinet and Annual Conference on all matters pertaining to the various aspects of the chaplaincy. To serve as an initial screening Board for all applicants who are asking for ecclesiastical endorsement from the Division of Chaplians and Related Ministries of The United Methodist Church and to furnish information to agencies, institutions and industry, both within and without the United Methodist Church, on the many aspects of ministry through the Chaplaincy program and to perform those functions and responsibilities assigned to it by the Council on Professional ministry and the Annual Conference.

(a) Joint Review Committee [Par. 453.1c, Discipline]

Membership: Six members and three Alternate Members as follows: Two district superintendents appointed annually by the bishop (category 1); two Board of Ordained Ministry members nominated by the chairperson and elected annually by the board (category 2); two non-Cabinet, non-Board of Ordained Ministry members in full connection, one nominated by the bishop and Cabinet, one by the Board of Ordained Ministry, and elected annually by the members in full connection in ministerial executive session (category 3). An alternate shall be provided in each of the three categories. The alternate who is not a member of the Cabinet or Board of Ordained Ministry shall be nominated by the bishop and Cabinet. The Committee shall elect its own

officers. This committee shall be amenable to the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry.

Responsibilities: The Conference Joint Review Committee shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 453.1c of the Discipline and perform those functions and responsibilities assigned to it by the Board of Ordained Ministry; the Council on Professional Ministry and the Annual Conference.

(2) Beard of Diaconal Ministry [Para.301 thru 317 and 734, Discipline] Membership: 9 members (1/3 clergy and 2/3 lay, and at least 1/2 of the lay members shall be in disconal ministry careers. preferably diacenal ministers) (D) (at least one member from each District of the Conference). They shall be nominated by the Bishop after consultation with the Executive Committee of the Board of the previous quadrennium. The Board shall elect its own Chairperson and such other officers as it deems necessary to carry out its assigned functions and responsibilities. The Beard shall be directly responsible to the organizational eetvithsteediag its Conference. Professional relationship with the Conference Council on Ministry. (D) This Board shall also function as a Committee on Deaconess and Home Missionary Service [Par. 734.5, Discipline], and shall maintain the records of and continuing relationships with all Deaconesses and Home Missionaries (either active or retired) residing within the bounds of the Conference.

Responsibilities: The Board of Diaconal Ministry shall carry out those functions as defined and described in Par. 301 thru 317 and 733 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Council on Professional Ministry and the Annual Conference.

(3) Board of Pensions [Par. 737, Discipline]

Membership: 15 members (none of which may be indebted to pension and benefit funds, plans, and programs) 1/3 laywomen; 1/3 laymen; and 1/3 clergy; elected for a term of eight years and arranged in classes as determined by the Annual Conference Nominating Committee. The members shall assume their duties at the adjournment of the conference session at which they are elected. (D) Ad-interim vacancies will be filled by the board for the remainder of the conference year in which the vacancy occurs in consultation with the Conference Committee on Nominations. Each member elected or appointed to the Board shall serve no more than eight consecutive years. The eight year tenure shall begin when the individual joins the Board. The Board shall elect its own Chairperson and such other officers as it deems necessary to carry out its assigned functions and responsibilities.

Responsibilities: The Boad of Pensions shall carry out those functions as degined and described in Par. 737 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Council on Professional Ministry and the Annual Conference.

(4) Commission on Equitable Salaries (Par. 722, Discipline)

Membership: 10 members (5 laypersons and 5 clergypersons) including at least 1 layperson and 1 clergyperson from churches of fewer than 200 members). One district superintendent named by the cabinet shall be a member. The Chairperson shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference.

Responsibilities: The Commission on Equitable Salaries shall carry out those functions as defined and described in Par. 722 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Council on Professional Ministry and the Annual Conference.

(5) Committee on Group Insurance [No Disciplinary Requirement]

Membership: 10 members [5 laypersons; and 5 clergypersons]. The

Chairperson shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations
and elected by the Annual Conference.

Responsibilities: To administer the Conference Group Insurance program and to perform those functions and responsibilities assigned to it by the Council on Professional Ministry and the Annual Conference.

(6) Joint Committee on Disability [Par. 744, Discipline]

Membership: Five members consisting of the Chairperson and Registrar of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry (or two other representatives elected by the Board of Ordained Ministry); the Chairperson and Secretary of the Conference Board of Pensions (or two other representatives elected by the Board of Pensions); and a District Superintendent. The Committee shall elect its own officers.

Responsibilities: The Conference Joint Committee on Disability shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 744 of the Discipline and perform those functions and responsibilities assigned to it by the Council on Professional Ministry and the Annual Conference.

e. Conference Council on Finance and Administration (CFA) [Par. 707-716, Discipline]

Membership: 15 members (with at least 1 more lay member than clergy members). Any ad-interim vacancy shall be filled by the CFA, in consultation with the Conference Nominating Committee. The Bishop; Cabinet representative; Director of CCOM and the Conference Treasurer shall be ex-officio members without vote. The term of office shall begin with the adjournment of the Annual Conference session at which elected and shall be for a period of four years and until their successors are elected. Churches of less than 200 members may be represented on the Council at least as high as the proportion of their total membership to the conference membership. (D) Any member of the General Council on Finance and Administration who resides within the bounds of

the conference, with vote, unless voting membership is in conflict with another provision of the Book of Discipline, or this structure document, in which case their membership shall be without vote; in either case, they shall not be eligible to serve on any agency receiving funding. The CFA shall elect its own President, Vice-President; Secretary and such other officers as it may deem necessary. The conference treasurer shall be the treasurer of the council. The treasurer shall not be eligible for voting membership on the council and shall not be eligible for election to any of those offices which are to be filled by voting members of the council.

Responsibilities: The CFA shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 709-716 of the Discipline. The apportionments to the districts recommended by CFA and adopted by the Annual Conference shall be apportioned to the local churches in accordance with Par. 711 of the Discipline. The United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas shall report to the CFA. The membership and functions of the United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas are prescribed by its charter and by-laws.

- f. <u>Conference United Methodist Women (UMW)</u> [Par. 743, Discipline] The Membership; officers, committees, functions, relationships and duties are as set forth in the Charter, Constitution and By-laws of the organization.
- g. <u>Conference United Methodist Men (UMM)</u> [No Disciplinary requirement]

The membership; officers, committees, functions, relationships and duties are as set forth in the Charter, Constitution and By-laws of the organization.

h. Conference Council on Youth Ministries (CCYN) [Par. 743, Discipline]

The Membership; officers, committees, function, relationships and duties are as set forth in the Charter, Constitution and By-laws of the organization. The makeup of the membership of the CCYM and its responsibilities shall be in compliance with Para. 743 of the Discipline. For administrative purposes the CCYM shall be related to the CCOM. (CPR) (D)

i. Conference Board of Trustees [Par. 2512-2516, Discipline]

Membership: 12 members (1/3 clergy; 1/3 laywomen; and 1/3 laymen). (D) who must be of legal age as determined by law and the lay members shall be members in good standing of local churches within the bounds of the conference. They shall be divided into four classes, each class serving a term of four years and shall serve until their successors have been elected. (D) They shall meet at least annually and organize by electing a president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer.

<u>Responsibility</u>: The Conference Board of Trustees shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 2512-2516 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Conference.

j. Commission on Archives and History [Par. 738, Discipline]

<u>Membership</u>: 9 members with at least 1 from each District. In addition to these nine members there may be added an ex-officie representative of each United Methodist shrine or landmark within the Annual Conference. (D)

<u>Responsibility</u>: The Conference Commission on Archives and History shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 738 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Conference.

Arkansas Area Responsibilities: There shall be an Arkansas Area Joint Commission on Archives and History which shall consist of all of the members of the North Arkansas Conference and Little Rock Conference Commissions on Archives and History. This Joint Commission shall be jointly chaired by the Chairpersons of the two constituent Commissions on Archives and History. Among the responsibilities of the Arkansas Area Joint Commission on Archives and History shall be the administering of the United Methodist (and its precedessor bodies) Archives in the Arkansas Room of the Hendrix College Library; and to carry out Resolution No. 2 of the November 8, 1986 Arkansas Area Sesquicentennial Conference, which instructed both Annual Conference Commissions on Archives and History to establish a suitable historical and archival depository for the United Methodist Churches in Arkansas. (CPR)

k. Commission on the Status and Role of Women [Para. 741, Discipline] Membership: Chairperson (who shall be a woman); I representative from each District; 6 at-large members (the additional at-large membership shall ensure that the total membership shall maintain the 1/3 laywomen, 1/3 laymen, and 1/3 clergy balance) (a majority of the members shall be women); all must be members of The United Methodist Church. Special consultants without vote may be used as resource persons. (D) A representative of Conference United Methodist Women; the CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

<u>Responsibility</u>: The Conference Commission on the Status and Role of Women shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 741 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Conference.

1. Commission on Religion and Race: [Par. 740, Discipline]

Membership: 12 persons (at least one from each District) (1/3 laywooden, 1/3 laywooden, 1/3 clergy) with a majority of the membership being represented by racial and ethnic minorities (Asian, Black, Hispanic and Native Americans), (D) proportionately reflecting the racial and ethnic minority constituency of the conference. Steps should also be taken to ensure adequate representation of women, youth.

young adults, elder adults, and persons with handicapping conditions. (D) The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

Responsibility: The Conference Commission on Religion and Race shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 740 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Conference.

m. Conference Committee on Courtesies [No Disciplinary requirement]

Membership: Chairperson and the following ex-officio members: Dean of the Cabinet; CCOM Director and Associate Director(s); Conference Secretary; Conference Lay Leader; and the Conference President of United Methodist Women. Responsibility: The Committee will introduce and present Institutional Representatives and other visitors of the Annual Conference as the Conference Agenda will allow. The Committee will present a closing resolution of appreciation to the Annual Conference.

n. <u>Committee on Parish and Community Development</u> [Par. 731.5, Discipline]

Membership: Chairperson (serves as a member of the Conference Council on Ministries); one representative from each District; the Secretary of the Church Extension Fund; the Secretary of the Loan Fund; and the Director of Catch the Vision (all of these with vote). (CPR) The following members without vote (exofficio): A representative of the Conference Board of Global Ministries; a Representative of the Commission on Equitable Salaries; any Church and Community Workers serving for the Conference in the Bounds of the Conference; and the CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area.

Responsibility: The Conference Committee on Parish and Community Development shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 731.5 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Conference. The entire membership of this Committee shall serve on the Committee on Area Director of Cooperative Parish Ministries with a like number of members from the Little Rock Conference, when such a Committee is required and operational.

o. <u>Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns</u> [Par.739, Discipline]

Membership: Chairperson; one representative from each District (which will be the District Coordinator for Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns for equivalent). Ex-efficio members of the Commission shall include any United Methodists residing within the conference bounds who are members of the following: the General Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns, the Governing Board of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the U.S.A., the World Methodist Council, the United Methodist delegation to the most recent World Council of Churches Assembly, and the United

Methodist delegation to the most recent plenary meeting of the Consultation on Church Union. (D) The CCOM Executive Director or Associate Director having responsibility for this area shall serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

<u>Responsibility</u>: The Conference Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 739 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Conference.

p. Committee on Episcopacy (Par. 735, Discipline)

Membership: 15 members (with at least one from each District) (1/5 laywomen, 1/5 laymen, 1/5 clergypersons, 1/5 persons to make possible the representation of racial and ethnic groups, youth, young adults, and older adults, and 1/5 persons appointed by the Bishop.) (D) One of the laypersons appointed shall be the Conference Lay Leader. In addition the lay and clergy members of the Jurisdictional Committee on Episcopacy, shall be ex-officio members with vote. (D) The Committee shall meet at least annually. It shall be convened by the Bishop and shall elect a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, and a secretary. The bishop and/or the chairperson are authorized to call additional meetings when desired. Responsibilities: The Conference Committee on Episcopacy shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 735 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Conference.

q. Episcopal Residence Committee (Arkansas Areas) [Par. 736, Discipline]

Membership: The Chairperson of the Episcopal Residence Committee shall be the Chairperson (or a representative of the Committee on Episcopacy of the Little Rock Conference; other members are the Chairperson (or his/her designate) from the Conference Committee on Episcopacy from the North Arkansas Conference; The Chairperson (or his/her designate) from the Conference Council on Finance and Administration from both the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conferences; The Chairperson (or his/her designate) from the Conference Board of Trustees from both the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conferences.

<u>Responsibility</u>: The Episcopal Residence Committee shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 736 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Conference.

r. Annual Conference Planning Committee [No Disciplinary requirement] Membership: The Bishop (who shall be the Chairperson); the CCOM Director and Associate Directors; the District Superintendents; Host institution representative and/or host pastor; the Conference Secretary; the Chairperson of the Conference Committee on Worship; five persons from the Conference Council on Lay Life and Work (two laymen; two laywomen; and the Conference Lay Leader); three ethnic minority persons (if three are not already named; the Bishop shall have the authority to appoint persons to fill this quota).

<u>Responsibility</u>: The Annual Conference Planning Committee shall plan the agenda and entertainment of the Annual Conference; set the registration fees; recommend a budget for the operating expenses of the sessions; advise the Bishop on setting the dates of the Annual Conference; and those other duties and fuctions assigned to it by the Conference.

s. Committee on Investigations [Par. 2623.3 and 2623.4, Discipline]

Membership: (For investigation of Ministerial Member or Local Pastor) 7 elders in full connection nominated by the presiding bishop and elected by the Annual Conference. Three reserve members shall also be elected. None of the members or reserve members shall be members of the Joint Review Committee or Board of Ordained Ministry, the Cablact, or immediate family members of any of the above. (D) (For investigation of Diaconal Ministers) Not less than 3 Diaconal Ministers nominated by the presiding bishop and elected by the Annual Conference. Two diaconal minister reserve members shall be elected. The Committee shall elect its own officers.

<u>Responsibilities</u>: The Conference Committee on Investigation shall carry out those functions as defined in Par. 2623.3 and 2623.4 of the Discipline and perform those functions and responsibilities assigned to it by the Annual Conference.

SECTION V

- 8. Agencies of the Districts of The Annual Conference:
 - a. <u>District Committee on Nominations</u> [No Disciplinary requirement] <u>Membershio</u>: District Superintendent (who shall be the Chairperson); six members elected by the District Conference (3 lay and 3 clergy). Names of persons shall be placed in nomination from the floor of the District Conference. A class of two persons (1 lay and 1 clergy) shall be elected annually to a three year term.

Responsibilities: To nominate to the District Conference persons to fill all of the offices within the District and those District Members to Annual Conference agencies. To receive from the Churches/Charges of the District their nominees for offices within the District and Annual Conference. To forward to the Annual Conference Nominating Committee a listing of all persons nominated by the District Nominating Committee for offices within the Annual Conference. This listing will be forwarded during the last year of the quadrennium as requested by the Conference Nominating Committee. During the quadrennium the District may send in additions or deletions to the listing as changes in membership or circumstances may require.

b. The District Conference [Par. 746, 747, Discipline]

Membership:

[Clergy] All Clergy members of the Annual Conference (both active and retired) appointed to or residing within the bounds of the District.

[Lay] All lay persons residing within the bounds of the District who hold any elected or appointed offfice within the District; Annual Conference; Jurisdiction; or General Church. Any Diaconal Ministers; Deaconesses or Home Missionaries residing within the District. Lay Persons holding the following offices within the Churches/Charges of the District: Lay Member of Annual Conference; Lay Leader(s); Church School Superintendent; Presidents of UMW; UMM; UMY; Chairpersons of the Administrative Board or Council, Council on Ministries; and Committee on Finance; District Steward (if elected); an at-large older adult, young adult and youth, if not already included in the delegation. The District Superintendent shall be the presiding officer of the District Conference. Such other officers of the District Conference may be elected as may be required to accomplish its responsibilities.

Responsibilities: To receive and act on the report from the District Committee on Nominations and elect persons to offices within the District and these District Member nominees to Annual Conference agencies; to adopt (CPR) to receive and act on the reports from the District agencies; to adopt budgets for the District Administration, Missionary, Camp and Program needs. To receive a report from the District Superintendent on the "State of the District". To apportion the District financial needs to the Churches/Charges of the District using the same apportionment formula as that used by the Annual Conference. To furnish two copies of Journal of the District Conference shall perform those functions as defined in Para. 746-747 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Annual Conference.

c. District Council on Ministries [Par. 749, 750, and 751, Discipline]

Membership: District Superintendent; District Lay Leader; Associate District Lay Leaders; District Director of Lay Speaking; District Presidents of UMW. UMM, UMY; District Director of Religion and Race; District Director of Church and Society; (D) individuals representing the following areas: Education Education, Stewardship, Worship, Global Ministries, Higher Campus Ministry, Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns; Communications; Status and Role of Women; Evangelism; Outdoor Ministries; and Parish and 'ommunity Development; Coordinators of Children, Youth, Young Adult, Adult, lder Adult, and Family Ministries. Members of Jerisdictional and eneral Church Agencies residing within the District. The District amittee on Neminations shall, insofar as possible, nominate se persons who are representing the District on Annual Verence agencies for comparable positions on the District acil on Ministries. (CPR) The Council will elect its Chairperson and other officers as it may determine are required to accomplish its isibilities. Membership shall be chesen, lasefar as possible, to de one-third clergy, one-third laywomen, and one-third a (with special attention to the inclusion of clergywomen, youth, young adults, elder adults, persons with handicapping conditions, and racial and ethnic persons) in keeping with policies for general church agencies. (D) The Council will elect one of its members (other than the Chairperson or District Superintendent) to be a member of the Conference Council on Ministries; this person shall be a layperson if the DCOM chairperson is clergy and vice-versa. The DCOM may form Committees and Task Forces as needed. The District Superintendent, who shall not be the Chairperson, is the DCOM's executive officer, and shall be responsible for implementation of adopted programs.

Responsibilities: The District Council on Ministries shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 749, 750 and 751 (D) of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Annual Conference and the District Conference.

d. District Committee on Ordained Ministry [Par. 752, Discipline]

<u>Membershio</u>: The District Superintendent and five other members in full connection in the district, including women and ethnic clergy (when appointed or residing within the District), nominated annually to the Annual Conference by the Superintendent in consultation with the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry and elected by the Annual Conference. (D) Ad-interim vacancies may be filled by the District Superintendent. The District's member(s) of the Conference Beard of Ordzined Ministry shall be a member of this Committee. *(CPR)* One layman observer and one layvoman observer may be members of the committee (vithout vote). accinated agnually by the District Superintendent and approved by the Annual Conference. (D) This Committee will elect its own Chairperson (who may not be the District Superintendent) and such other officers as may be to carry out its responsibilities. This Committee shall be amenable to the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry. (D)

Responsibilities: The District Committee on Ordained Ministry shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 752 of the Discipline and those asigned to it by the Annual Conference and the District Conference.

e. District Roard of Church Location and Building [Par. 2518-2523, Discipline]

Membership: The District Superintendent and 6 persons (1/3 clergy; 1/3 laymen; 1/3 laywomen) and where possible should be inclusive of sex, race, age, and persons with handicapping conditions. The Board shall be divided into three classes. One third shall be elected annually for a three year term. (D) All shall be nominated by the District Superintendent, in consultation with the District Nominating Committee, and elected by the Annual Conference. A chairperson and a secretary shall be elected annually at the first meeting following Annual Conference. (D)

<u>Responsibilities</u>: The District Board of Church Location and Building shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 2518-2523 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Annual Conference and the District Conference.

f. District Board of Trustees [Par. 2517, Discipline]

Membership: Nine Members (all of the lay members shall meet the same qualifications as Local Church Trustees). The District Trustees will be nominated to the District Conference by the District Superintendent, in consultation with the District Rominating Committee, and elected by the District Conference. The District Board of Trustees shall report to each session of the District Conference. (D) The Board shall elect its own Chairperson and such other officers as may be required to carry out its responsibilities.

<u>Responsibilities</u>: The District Board of Trustees shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 2517 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Annual Conference and the District Conference.

- g. Committee on the District Superintendency [Par. 754, Discipline]

 Membership: District Lay Leader; two laywomen; two laymen; two clergy; and
 two at-large members nominated by the District Nominating Committee and
 elected by the District Conference; two additional persons appointed by the
 District Superintendent; provided that at least three of the 11 members are
 clergy and seven are lay persons. The Bishop (or his/her authorized
 representative) shall be an ex-officio member of this Committee. The
 Committee shall elect its own Chairperson and such other officers as may be
 required to carry out its responsibilities.
 - <u>Responsibilities</u>: The Committee on the District Superintendency shall perform those functions as defined in Par. 754 of the Discipline and those assigned to it by the Annual Conference and the District Conference.
- h. <u>District United Methodist Women (UMW)</u> [Par. 755, Discipline]
 The Membership; officers, committees, functions, relationships and duties are as set forth in the Charter, Constitution and By-laws of the organization.
- i. <u>District United Methodist Men (UMM)</u> [No Disciplinary requirement] The Membership; officers, committees, functions, relationships and duties are as set forth in the Charter, Constitution and By-laws of the organization.
- j. <u>District Council on Youth Ministries (DCYM)</u> [Par. 756, Discipline] The Membership; officers, committees, functions, relationship and duties are as set forth in the Charter, Constitution and By-laws of the organization.

STANDING RULES OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

 The number answering the question in the pastor's report to Annual Conference "Members reported last year" shall in every case be the number of members printed in the statistical tables of the Journal of the last Annual Conference (unless there was a typographical or printing error.)

- 2. The apportioned amounts arrived at by the use of the Conference decimal are to be accepted as the official apportionment.
- 3. The apportionment for World Service and Conference Benevolences will be combined inthe statistical report; and, the amount paid will be the amount reported by the Conference Treasurer.
- 4. All statistical reports, after being checked for correctness by the District Superintendent and District auditors, shall be delivered by one of them to the Conference Statistician, within 31 days after the receipt of the final print out from the Conference Treasurer for the year just ended.
- 5. The District Superintendents are instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or of the District for insertion in the Conference Journal.
- 6. The expenses of the Annual Conference shall be paid by funds received from:
- a. Registration fees, which shall be set by the Annual Conference Planning Committee
 - b. Offerings received at the Annual Conference; and
 - c. If necessary, the Conference Administration Fund.

The expense of retired ministers, spouses, and surviving spouses shall be paid in keeping with the guidelines of the Annual Conference Planning Committee when the proper vouchers are presented. No registration fee shall be required of retired ministers, their spouses or surviving spouses.

- 7. A listing of lay members and their addresses elected as members of the Annual Conference by Charge Conferences shall be compiled by the district superintendents and sent to the conference secretary at least 90 days prior to the opening of the session.
- 8. No one shall be eligible to serve on a board or commission more than one quadrennium past the quadrennium in which tenure in that elected position first began (unless tenure is otherwise prescribed by the Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church).
- 9. That part of the report of all councils, boards, commissions and other agencies of the conference which provides for changes in policy or makes recommendations, if not printed in the Pre-Conference Journal, shall be reproduced and distributed to the membership of the conference prior to the time scheduled for action in said report. Any Resolution not printed in the Pre-Conference Journal, or that is not presented as a formal action of a Board, Commission, Committee or Agency of the

Annual Conference shall lie on the table overnight before being debated and voted on.

- 10. Each Annual Conference session shall designate a moving date. Any exceptions to the designated date shall be agreed upon by the pastors involved.
- 11. No person shall be elected by the Annual Conference to serve on more than one major Board, Committee, Commission, Agency, etc, at any one time. This (1)does not affect ex-officio positions. The Major Boards, Committees, Commissions and Agencies of the Annual Conference are as follows: The Council on Ministries (to include its Executive Committee): Committee on Planaing and Research; Board of Church and Society; Board of Global Ministries; Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry; Age Level and Family Coordinators; Board of Discipleship (and its Committees on Education, Evangelism, Worship, Stewardship aad Outdoor Ministries); Council on Lay Life and Work; Council on Professional Ministries (to include the Board of Ordained Ministry: Joint Review Committee: Beard of Diaconal Ministry: Commission on Equitable Salaries: Board of Pensions: Committee **6** Insurance; and the Joint Committee on Disability); and the Council on Figance and Administration. (CPR)
- 12. All councils, boards, committees, and commissions of the Annual Conference shall be more representative. Special consideration should be given to the use of women and youth, full-time local pastors, and ethnic minority groups.
- 13. No person shall serve as an elected trustee of more than one United Methodist related institution of the Arkansas Area at a time. No one who by virtue of their office would be an ex-officio trustee, shall serve as an elected trustee of the same agency.
- 14. Each year the Conference Council on Ministries will determine the number of additional lay persons, if any, to be named as members of the Annual Conference. Lay Delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conference and chairpersons of major boards and councils, as defined in Standing Rule Number 11 (this does not include related committees, subcommittees, Task Forces and boards), will be named by the Conference Council on Ministries as Lay Members At-Large. Persons already serving as lay members from local churches or by virtue of Discipline requirement will be excluded from those named.

When additional lay members are required to equalize representation, the Council on Ministries will notify each District Council on Ministries of the number of persons, if any, to be named, encouraging them to use the following formula with top priority to be give to Number 1, etc:

1. Ethnic minority and small membership churches.

- 2. Elected chairpersons of conference boards and agencies not included above.
 - 3. Officers of the Conference Council on Lay Life and Work.
- 4. Conference officers of United Methodist Women; United Methodist Men; and Conference Council on Youth Ministries residing within the bounds of a district.
- 5. Elected lay persons to general and jurisdictional conference boards and agencies.
- 6. District presidents of United Methodist Women; United Methodist Men and United Methodist Youth Fellowship.
 - 7. Lay members of conference boards and agencies.
 - 8. One additional youth from each district.
 - 9. United Methodist students being served by campus ministers.
 - 10. At-large district representation.
- 15. Pastors who are to move following appointment changes at the Annual Conferences shall not receive any of the June compensation from the charge which they are leaving; thus the conference appointive year and pay period shall be June 1-May 31.
- 16. Motions requesting or requiring expenditure of Annual Conference funds, which are not included in the proposed budget submitted by the Conference Council on Finance and Administration (CFA) shall first be referred to CFA who will study the proposal and report back to the Annual Conference as to where the funding would have to come from and how that would impact the overall Conference budget.
- 17. Each agency of The Annual Conference will keep records of attendance at its respective meetings. After one year, a conference agency shall be authorized to declare a vacancy in membership because of non-attendance. Once a vacancy is declared, the person shall be notified and the chairperson of the Conference Committee on Nominations shall be notified immediately.
- 18. The financial records of each District will be audited at the end of each calendar year. The results of those audits will be forwarded to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration no later than July 31 of each year.
- 19. "Roberts Rules of Order" and "Parliamentary Procedures at a Glance" by O. Garfield Jones shall be the procedural authority for the Annual Conference when not in conflict with The Discipline of The United Methodist Church.
- 20. Any proposal to change the Standing Rules shall lie on the table overnight, and then its passage shall requrie a 3/4 vote of those present and voting.



EVERETT SCRUGGS, SR.

Reverend Everett Scruggs, Sr. was born August 20, 1916, to the late Reverend George Frank Scruggs and Lillie Scruggs. Everett grew up in Lee County, receiving his early education there. Clarence's final five years were spent in Fayetteville, where he enjoyed the frequent companionship of all his family. He remained alert and interested in his family and friends through his final days.

WILLIAM O. SCROGGIN, JR. [Corrected Statement]

In this understanding Bill took courage, which he endeavored to share with others in his remaining years, that our present lawless darkness, as prophesied, will in God's time be replaced with the light of the glory of His coming, and in a cleansed earth God's servant people, restored to their Shepherd, will light the way of the other nations and peoples into His kingdom."




