MINUTES

OF THE

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE.

FIRST DAY.

PINE BLUFF, ARK., February 8, 1883.

The fifth session of the Little Rock Annual Conference convened in the Baptist church, at Pine Bluff, Ark., February 8, 1883, at 9:30 a.m., Bishop J. F. Hurst, D. D., L. L. D., in the chair.

The Bishop conducted the devotional exercises by reading the Scriptures, announcing a hymn, and leading the Conference in a fervent, earnest prayer.

The Secretary of the last Conference called the roll, and fourteen members and ten probationers responded to their names.

I. G. Pollard was elected Secretary, T. Mason, Assistant Secretary, and L. W. Elkins and W. R. R. Duncan, Statistical Secretaries.

W. O. Emory was elected Conference Treasurer.

The following committees were appointed:

On Public Worship—Pastor and Presiding Elder.

On Education and Freedman's Aid Society-T. Mason and A. J. Phillips.

On Church Extension—S. Johnson, W. H. Crawford and W. O. Emory.

On Missions—The Presiding Elders.

On Bible Cause—G. B. Donelly, W. R. R. Duncan and Presiding Elders.

On Sunday Schools and Tracts.—H. H. McAllister and U. S. Kitchens.

On Books and Periodicals—W. H. Crawford and S. Johnson.

On Publication of the Minutes-The Secretaries.

On Auditing Presiding Elders' Accounts-W. O. Emory and U.S. Kitchens.

On Book Accounts-I. G. Pollard.

A communication was presented by the Bishop, from the book agents, declaring a dividend to the Conference of \$28, proceeds of Book Concern, which was ordered paid.

A draft of \$30 from the Chartered Fund was also presented.

W. O. Emory and U. S. Kitchens were appointed Board of Stewards.

Dr. Young, of Des Moines Conference, Revs. Hutchinson and Donnell, of the A. M. E. Church, A. E. P. Albert, B. D., of the Southwestern, Morris, of the Baptist church; Gill, of the Texas Conference, Johnson, transferred from the Tennessee Conference, and Prof. Fry, of Walden Seminary, were introduced to the Conference.

A communication from the Book Agents, on the Episcopal Fund, was read by the Secretary, and, on motion, the Presiding Elders were authorized to apportion the amount asked (\$25) to the various charges of the Conference.

The twentieth question was called-

"Was the character of each preacher examined?"

I. G. Pollard and G. W. Sams reported the Little Rock and Hot Springs Districts, respectively, and their charac-

On motion, the time for meeting and adjournment was fixed at 9:30 a.m. and 12 m., to be preceded by a prayer-

The Examining Committee of the first year being absent the work was assigned to the committee of the second year.

Announcements were made, the doxology was sung, and the benediction was pronounced by Dr. Young.

SECOND DAY.

PINE BLUFF, ARK., February 9, 1883.

Conference convened at 9:30 a.m., and after devotional services conducted by B. McCain, and the singing of a melody, Bishop Hurst took the chair and called the Conference to business.

The Journal of yesterday was read and approved.

The Secretary called the list of absentees but there was no response.

The twentieth question was resumed.

The characters of R. Green, W. O. Emory (missionary collection \$11), G. B. Donelly, S. Johnson, A. J. Phillips (missionary collection \$9), W. H. Crawford (missionary collection \$7.50), and G. W. Taylor, were examined and passed.

Thomas Smith was located at his own request.

The third question was called—

"Who remain on trial?"

Seth Neal (missionary collection \$1), H. C. Dunlap (missionary collection \$3), Edward Pinkett (missionary collection \$1.25), Edward Spencer (missionary collection \$1.50), were passed to the second year, with the understanding that they bring up the incompleted study of the first year as follows: Seth Neal, "Wesley's Plain Account," H. C. Dunlap and Edward Pinkett, "Talheimer's Ancient History," and "Wesley's Plain Account." Edward Spencer, both Talheimer's History and "Wesley's Plain Account."

J. P. Mack, A. Hardman and Wm. Pope were continued in the class of the first year.

A. L. Richardson, J. L. Johnson, S. Wilson, Robert Christian, Benjamin Thornton, A. C. Carr, W. J. Parnell, J. Vagner, Green Reed and Reuben Johnson were discon-

The time was extended.

The thirteenth question was called—

"Who are the traveling deacons of the second class?"

P. Humphrey and G. N. Johnson were continued as deacons of the first class.

J. Raglin was located at his own request.

Certain papers were received and handed to appropriate committees.

Rev. Dr. Bernor, State Agent for the American Bible Society, was introduced, and made a happy presentation of the interests of the society.

Rev. Mr. Riggins, P. E., Pine Bluff District, M. E. Church South, was introduced.

Announcements were made, the doxology was sung, and the Conference adjourned with the benediction by Dr.

THIRD DAY.

PINE BLUFF, ARK., February 10, 1883.

Conference convened at 9:30 a.m., and was opened with devotional services, led by G. W. Gill, of the Texas Con-

The Journal of yesterday was read and approved.

The Committee on Bible Cause reported, and the report was adopted.

The Secretary offered the following resolution on the publication of the Minutes, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the Presiding Elders be held responsible for the expenses, and that they be authorized to withhold

from each charge to which missionary money is appropriated, the sum of \$1.50, and also that they collect as far as possible that amount from each charge, and hand it over to the Secretary at the adjournment of Conference.

The tenth question was called-

"What local preachers have been elected deacons?"

G. W. Sams presented the name of Wm. M. Fuller from the Hot Springs District. The committee reported favorably and he was elected to deacon's orders.

The fourteenth question was called—

"What traveling deacons have been elected elders?"

U. S. Kitchens was continued in the second class.

W. R. R. Duncan was asked to appear before a committee consisting of W. O. Emory, G. B. Donelly and T. Mason.

W. H. Higgins (missionary collection \$1), was reported favorably by the committee, and he was elected to elder's orders.

The eighteenth question was called-

"Who are the supernumerary preachers?"

L. W. Elkins was made effective, and A. W. Decker was continued.

A committee consisting of T. Mason and G. B. Donelly was appointed, to which was referred the case of J. G. Thompson. The Conference requested Dr. Young to meet with the committee.

The thirty-third question was called—

"Where shall the next Conference be held?"

Van Buren was nominated and represented by G. W. Sams.

Little Rock was nominated and represented by W. O. Emory.

Hot Springs was nominated by S. Johnson and represented by W. H. Crawford.

Little Rock was elected.

The fifth question was called-

"Who are admitted into full connection?"

The class was called forward, and was addressed plainly and forcibly by the Bishop. H. H. McAllister (missionary collection \$1.50), F. Wallace (missionary collection \$14.50). Committee of Examination reported favorably, and they were admitted and elected to deacon's orders.

B. McCain (missionary collection \$6). Committee reported favorably, and he was admitted, being already in orders.

The case of G. G. W. Taylor was referred to the Committee on J. G. Thompson. The time was extended.

Committee on Church Extension reported, and after a short address from Dr. Young, the report was adopted.

On motion, it was ordered that we have a night session, and the Bishop requested T. Mason to occupy the chair at the opening.

Dr. Gillet, Sunday School Agent for the South, and Prof. Corbin, of the State Normal School were introduced.

A communication from Dr. Rust was received, read by the Secretary and referred to the Presiding Elders, with the request that they apportion to the different charges the amounts asked for.

Papers from Dr. Kidder were referred to the Committee on Education.

I. G. Pollard was authorized to receive the funds of the Conference, and turn them over to the Book Agents.

Announcements were made, the doxology was sung, and the benediction was pronounced by Dr. Gillet.

NIGHT SESSION.

PINE BLUFF, ARK., February 10, 1883.

Conference convened at 7 o'clock; T. Mason in the chair.

Devotional services were conducted by A. E. P.

The Committee on Books and Periodicals reported, and after an address by A. E. P. Albert, the report was adopted.

The Bishop arrived and took the chair.

The Committee on Education and Freedman's Aid Society reported, and after short addresses from the Principal of the Walden Seminary, the Bishop, and Dr. C. H. Fowler, the report was adopted.

The Committee on Auditing Presiding Elders' Accounts made report, and the report was adopted.

The Committee on J. G. Thompson, reported as follows:

To the Bishop and Conference:

We find that J. G. Thompson has been guilty of imprudent expressions respecting a brother minister, but do not find the expressions sufficiently grave to warrant charges.

T. Mason, Chairman.

He was continued in a superannuated relation.

In the case of G. G. W. Taylor, the committee reported no jurisdiction, as the matter had been previously disposed of by the Presiding Elder.

He was admitted into full connection.

The committee on the case of W. R. R. Duncan reported as follows:

To the Bishop and Conference:

We, your committee, find that W. R. R. Duncan has been guilty of violating his vows in the continued use of tobacco, and would recommend that he receive a reprimand from the Bishop.

W. O. Emory, Chairman.

After the action of the Bishop, as recommended by the committee, he was elected to elder's orders, with the understanding that he bring up the "Word of God Written."

The Secretary announced the examining committees, the persons to preach the Missionary and Conference sermons, and the triers of appeals.

The Statistical Secretaries reported, and their report was adopted.

The characters of T. Mason and S. Johnson were examined and passed.

The second question was called—

"Who are admitted on trial?"

W. H. Morris, James T. Thompson and Christopher C. Riley were presented by the Presiding Elder of Little Rock District; C. G. Brooks, J. D. Johnson, William M. Fuller and Osborn Wheeler were presented by the Presiding Elder of Hot Springs District, and they were admitted on trial. Benjamin Donnell, of the A. M. E. Church, was presented by the Presiding Elder of Little Rock District, and he was admitted, and his orders recognized.

The third question was called—

"Who remain on trial?"

The case of M. Lockman was taken up, and he was continued in the class of the first year.

The twelfth question was taken up-

"Who are the traveling deacons of the first class?"

Robert Boone, miss. col. \$10.50, was advanced to deacon of the second class, with the understanding that he bring

The action by which A. L. Richardson was discontinued was reconsidered, and, on motion, he was continued in the

The following resolutions relating to a Conference campmeeting, were presented by G. W. Sams, and, on motion,

WHEREAS, Our camp-meeting at Sweet Home Circuit is so meagerly attended by our Conference preachers, and for the lack of efficient help, our camp-meetings for several years have been somewhat a failure; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we make the Sweet Home camp-meeting a Conference camp-meeting.

Resolved, That each Conference preacher make himself a committee to stir up the interests of this camp-meeting.

Resolved, That each preacher endeavor to put in an ap-

pearance at the camp-meeting each year, which commences on Thursday before the second Sunday, and closes on Thursday before the third Sunday in September of each year, for fifty years.

Resolved, That we organize a Camp-meeting Association, to consist of a President, a Vice President, a Secretary, a Treasurer and a Board of Managers, consisting of seven members, four of whom shall be members of Little Rock Conference, and the remaining three laymen in the M. E. Church.

The Sunday School Committee reported, and their report was adopted. The Conference was organized into a Sunday School Society, by the election of T. Mason President; S. Johnson, Secretary; W. O. Emory, Treasurer.

The Conference Stewards made their report, which was adopted.

Announcements were made, and the Conference adjourned with the benediction by A. E. P. Albert.

SUNDAY NIGHT.

FEBRUARY 11, 1883.

After an eloquent and earnest presentation of the subject of Missions, by Dr. Fowler, the Bishop called the Conference to complete its business.

The journal of yesterday was read and approved.

The names of the Board of Trustees of Walden Seminary were presented and the Board was elected.

Resolutions relating to the kindly feeling of the Conference for Bishop Hurst were adopted.

The following resolutions, relating to the management of Walden Seminary, were adopted:

Resolved, That we, as a Conference, hereby express confidence in and our highest esteem for Professor Thomas Mason, A. M., as principal of Walden Seminary, and pledge ourselves to give him our heartiest sympathy and support.

Resolved, That we hereby thank Dr. Rust for the employment of Prof. H. B. Fry, A. M., as a member of the faculty, and we tender him our warmest sympathy in his work.

Resolved, That we appreciate and approve of the efforts of Brother Pollard in planning for and securing, through the transfer of Rev. G. N. Johnson, the opening of a branch preparatory school of Walden Seminary at Forrest City.

The Bishop presented the following certificates:

Young, Gillet, Albert and Fowler, and desire at this opportunity to express our thanks to Dr. Fowler for the noble and heroic defense of our Brothers Pollard and Todd, in the dark days of K. K. barbarity, while he was editor of the Christian Advocate, and we assure him that the assault made on these brethren was malicious persecution on account of their fidelity to the Gospel of our dear Lord.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

WHEREAS, The interests of the Sunday School Union can be materially advanced by organization; therefore

Resolved, That we hereby organize this Conference into the "Little Rock Conference Sunday School Society," auxiliary to the Sunday School Union of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and that the following regulations be and are hereby adopted:

First—The officers of this society shall consist of a President, one Vice-President in each Presiding Elder's District, a Secretary and Treasurer.

Second—The officers, except the Vice-Presidents, shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Sunday Schools, and elected by the Conference.

Third—The Vice-Presidents shall be appointed by the Presiding Elders, immediately on the adjournment of the Conference, and their names reported to the Conference Secretary for publication in the minutes.

Fourth—The President and Secretary shall arrange for an anniversary at each session of the Conference, and in case no representative of the Sunday School Union is present, speakers shall be selected from the Conference.

Fifth—It shall be the duty of the Vice-Presidents to correspond with the agent of the Sunday School Union concerning the interests of the work in their respective districts, and in consultation with and under the direction of the Presiding Elder, arrange for a District Sunday School Institute or Conference, in connection with the District Conference, or at any other time determined on as appropriate.

Sixth—The officers of the society shall be a committee to arrange for such Sunday School Institute work, in connection with the Conference session, as may


