JOURNAL OF THE SESSION.

FIRST DAY.

The Little Rock Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church began its Eighth Annual Session in the St. James Chapel, in Pine Bluff, Ark., at 9 a. m., Thursday, Feb. 11, 1886.

Rev. Bishop Thomas Bowman being unavoidably detained at Memphis, Tenn., by telegram requested Rev. O. H. Smith, of the Little Rock district, to organize the conference. Devotional exercises opened by the reading of a portion of the third chapter of St. John by J. G. Thompson. W. R. R. Duncan announced the first hymn, after which prayer was offered by W. H. Crawford, who invoked the Divine Presence upon the deliberations of the Conference. Dr. Spencer, after the singing of another hymn, led the Conference in a fervent prayer. The roll of the Conference was called by Thomas Mason, Secretary of the last Conference, and seventeen members and three probationers answered to their names.

- W. O. Emory was elected Secretary, and W. H. Higgins, Assistant Secretary.
- A. J. Phillips was elected Statistical Secretary and G. N. Johnson assistant.

On motion the bar of the Conference was fixed at two seats from the altar.

On motion the hours for meeting and adjourning were fixed at 9 a. m. and 12:30 p. m

Rev. Dr. Spencer, who came representing the Church Extension Society, was introduced and spoke to the Conference of the great work of the society, and of the importance of taking the collections, after which the Conference adjourned

SECOND DAY.

Conference convened Feb. 12, 1886, at 9 o'clock a. m., Bishop Bowman presiding. Devotional services were conducted by Rev. W. H. Crawford, after which the Secretary read the journal of previous session, and it was approved.

Brother Pye, of the Western Book Concern, and Rev. T. B. Ford, of the Arkansas Conference, were introduced.

A communication from the book agents, on the Episcopal Fund, was presented by the Bishop and referred to the Presiding Elders, who were authorized to apportion the amount asked, (\$35), to the various charges of the Conference.

A communication from the Educational Society was read by the Secretary and referred to the Committee on Education.

A draft from the Chartered Fund was presented by the Bishop, and he was authorized to sign the same; also a draft from the Book Concern of \$47, dividend arising from sale of books, was presented and the Bishop authorized to sign the same.

The twentieth question was called: "Was the character of each preacher examined?"

Rev. O. H. Smith, Presiding Elder of Little Rock District, was called, his character passed, and he reported his district, after which the characters of the following Elders were passed, viz: G. N. Johnson, missionary collection \$2; W. O. Emory, missionary collection \$12; W. S. Langford, missionary collection \$20, and Thomas Mason.

Rev. G. B. Donnelly, Presiding Elder of Pine Bluff District, was called, his character passed and he reported his district.

B. J. Donnell was called and he was announced as transferred to the Mississippi Conference.

The names of the following Elders of that district were called, viz: G. W. Baber, missionary collection \$7.50; J. G. Thompson and G. W. Gill, missionary collection \$1.35, and their characters passed.

Rev. W. R. R. Duncan, Presiding Elder of Van Buren District, was called, his character passed, and he reported his district, after which announcements were made and the Conference adjourned with benediction by Bishop Bowman.

THIRD DAY.

Conference was called to order by Bishop Bowman at 9 o'clock a. m., Feb. 13, 1886. Devotional services were conducted by J. G. Thompson, after which the journal of the previous session was read and approved.

The twentieth question was resumed, and the names of the following Elders were called, viz: G. W. Taylor, missionary collection \$6; A. J. Phillips, missionary collection \$13; W. H. Higgins, missionary collection \$10; E. Roberts, missionry collection \$10; W. H. Crawford, missionary collection \$17, and

The fourth question was called: "Who are discontinued?" S. J. Brown and Osborn Wheeler were discontinued without their request. Draydon Gamble and C. G. Brooks were dis-

The thirteenth question was called: "Who are the traveling deacons of the second class?"

Seth Neal was called, being absent was continued in the second class of deacons; also H. H. McAllester and Beriah M. Cain. A. L. Richardson, Foster Wallace, U. S. Kitchens and M. Lockman were called, and the committee reported their examination and they were elected to Elder's orders.

Rev. John Carr, of the M. E. Church, South, M. W. Taylor, D. D., of the Southwestern Christian Advocate, and Mr. Jacko, of the Arkansas Mansion, were introduced.

The twelfth question was taken up: "Who are the traveling deacons of the first class?"

H. C. Dunlap, Edward Spencer and Peter Humphrey were continued in the first class of deacons.

Edward Pinkett was located at his own request. J. D. Johnson examined and passed to the second class of deacons.

The third question was taken up: "Who remain on trial?" Albert Tate, J. R. Frazier and H. R. Pinckney were examined and passed to second year. Albert Tate was elected to deacon's orders under the missionary rule. C. C. Riley was continued on trial in first year's course of study.

The fifth question was called: "Who are admitted into full connection?"

W. H. Morris, missionary collection \$5. A. Harderman and W. M. Fuller were admitted into full connection, and W. H. Morris was elected to deacon's orders, the other two being

The sixteenth question was called: "What local deacons have been elected elders?"

The tenth question was taken up: "What local preachers have been elected deacons?"

Albert L. Tate and James E. Toombs.

Having arrived at the time of adjournment the time was extended, and

The second question was taken up: "Who are admitted on trial?"

The following brethren were represented by their Presiding Elders and admitted on trial, viz: J. W. Jackson, Isaiah Williams, Allen Akrage, T. H. Hanna, J. Limons, S. Stokes, H. McDonald, H. Moore, J. E. Toombs, H. P. Coulter, William Curry, Josiah Crawley and S. B. Witherspoon.

On motion the credentials of Wm. Curry from the A. M. E. Church and T. H. Hanna from the A. M. E. Zion Church were recognized.

On motion Simon Linning's parchments were restored.

On motion a committee was appointed to try the case of Robert Boon, consisting of G. N. Johnson, W. H. Higgins, G. W. Baber, A. J. Phillips, W. S. Lankford, W. H. Crawford, G. W. Taylor, G. W. Gill, E. Roberts, J. G. Thompson, chairman, and Thomas Mason, secretary. H. R. Pinckney was elected to represent the Conference at the trial.

On motion Dr. Taylor, editor of the Southwestern Christian Advocate, was invited to speak to the Conference, which he did in an able manner, and conclusively demonstrated the fact that the Southwestern is doing, and can do more for the negroes of our church than any other church paper.

Rev. Lewis Johnston, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, was introduced.

After which announcements were made, and the conference adjourned with the benediction by Dr. Taylor, until Monday morning.

FOURTH DAY.

Conference met at 9 o'clock a. m., Feb. 15, 1886, Bishop Bowman presiding. Devotional services were conducted by O. H. Smith, after which the journal of Saturday was read and

The Committee of Trial in the case of Robert Boon made their report, which was adopted, and he was expelled from the ministry and membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

The following, complimentary to Bishop Bowman, was adopted by a rising vote.

WHEREAS, We have been favored with the presence and wisdom of our beloved Senior Bishop, Rev. Thos. Bowman, D. D., as president of our conference. And

WHEREAS, We can fully appreciate such wisdom, derived from ripe scholarship and large experience; therefore,

Resolved, That he has our prayers and best wishes for success in the future, and that the Church may be favored with his wise counsels for years to come.

Resolved, That as the organizer of our work in this State, we will ever welcome him in our midst as a Father in God and faithful Bishop of the Church. W. S. LANKFORD.

Resolutions complimentary to Dr. Marshall W. Taylor and Bro. Pye were adopted.

Thirty-third question was called: "Where shall the next Conference be held?"

Fayetteville and Hot Springs were nominated, and Fayetteville was elected.

On motion, G. W. Gill was located at his own request.

Dr. W. H. Vernor, of the American Bible Society, was introduced and spoke to the Conference in the interest of that Society, and took a collection of \$2.35 from the brethren present.

Rev. J. M. Collins, of the A. M. E. Church, was introduced. A resolution was adopted thanking Bishop Mallalieu for books donated by him for the preachers of the Conference.

The following Committees made their reports, and they were adopted. On Periodicals, Church Extension, State of Church, Bible Cause, Auditing Presiding Elders' Accounts, and Temperance. [See reports.]

The Committee on Memoirs presented the following, which was adopted:

MEMOIRS.

Sister Nancy Crawford, consort of Rev. W. H. Crawford, departed this life, May 22, 1885, at Van Buren, Ark. Sister Crawford was an acceptable member of the M. E. Church for over nineteen years, seventeen years having been spent in the itinerant work. As an affectionate wife, a loving mother and

EVENING SESSION.

Conference was called to order by Bishop Bowman, at 7:30 o'clock p. m. Religious services were conducted by J. W. Jackson. The journal of the previous session was read and

The Conference Stewards made their report and it was adopted.

The Conference Treasurer made his report and it was adopted.

The following was offered to the memory of Rev. G. W. Sams, by Thos. Mason, W. S. Lankford and W. O. Emory:

MEMOIR.

Rev. G. W. Sams was born in 1847, on the Arkansas river, below Little Rock, and died in Little Rock, Jan. 6th, 1886.

The death of Brother Sams marks an epoch in the history of the Little Rock Conference. He was, from its organization after the separation from the Arkansas Conference, one of our leading members, and was highly esteemed for the interest and zeal manifested in the discharge of the duties devolving upon him. The history of Brother Sams is filled with interesting incidents; and affords many examples, that are worthy the imitation of our young men, who are struggling to fit themselves for future usefulness. He was converted to God, and joined the M. E. Church in 1872. He was received on trial in the Arkansas Conference in 1874, at Batesville, Ark., where he lived, and he was assigned to Center Point Circuit, and served that people successfully for two years, after which he was sent to Wesley Chapel, Little Rock, in 1876. From there he went to Jacksonport station, which charge he filled during 1877 and 1878; and in 1879 he traveled the Sweet Home Circuit. In 1880 he filled the pastorate at Pine Bluff; and in 1881 he was appointed to the Presiding Eldership of the Hot Springs District, which position he filled for four years with credit to himself and his conference. In the year 1884, he represented his Conference in the General Conference. In which position he ably and faithfully acted. In consequence of failing health, although given mission work near his home, he was obliged, finally, to abandon the work. Like the watchman, he could not stand high on Zion's wall, "Pointing out the path to heaven, offering life and peace to all;" but as faithful Aaron, he was always ready to hold up the prophet's hands.

"Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord, for they rest from their labors and their works do follow them."

Resolved, That each preacher be required to pay one dollar for the publication of the minutes, and that the Presiding Elders collect the same and forward it to the Secretary as soon

A resolution appointing a committee of visitors to Philander Smith College was presented by O. H. Smith and

The following, complimentary to the Secretaries, was presented by H. R. Pinckney and adopted:

Resolved. That the thanks of this Conference be tendered the Secretaries for the careful, and intelligent manner, in which they have noted the proceedings of the Conference.

The journal was read and approved.

Dr. Taylor then announced the 816th hymn, and offered a most pathetic prayer.

Bishop Bowman in a calm and dignified manner commenced his closing remarks to the Conference, which abounded in wise suggestions and advice to the brethren. The most earnest heed was given to what he said. And his fatherly admonition will be long remembered as coming from one whose friendship and esteem we gratefully acknowledge.

REPORT ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

To Our Venerable Senior Bishop and Conference:

Your committee on the State of the Church, after a careful investigation of this subject, would most respectfully present the following:

The Methodist Church of today is working as no church has ever worked. Through her various missionary enterprises, the Gospel is being preached in all the world. Through her Church Extension Society the world is being dotted with churches, and by means of her educational enterprises, ignorance is disappearing like dew before the morning sun. The Freedmen's Aid Society, by planting schools and colleges in all the principal centers of the South, is meeting a pressing emergency that could be met in no other way, and is lifting up a long neglected people, by preparing them for usefulness on earth and happiness in heaven.

2. God and our friends all over this broad land have "done great things for us, whereof we are glad." With homes, churches and schools, God expects the two hundred thousand colored members of the Mother Church to be "co-workers" with Him in the redemption of the millions who are groping their way in darkness and superstition. Dr. Rust says: "In seventy years there will be over 50,000,000 of negroes in the United States with the almost countless number in Africa and the isles of the sea. Brethren! brethren!! what shall the harvest be!!!"

The Lexington Conference last year raised for benevolent purposes, \$657.85. The Little Rock Conference raised \$325.


