THE TWELFTH ANNUAL SESSION of the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church met in Mallalieu Chapel, Fort Smith, Ark., Feb. 13th, 1890 at 8 o'clock, a. m. Bishop John H. Vincent in the chair. Opening. | The Scripture lesson was read by the Bishop, W. H. Crawford led in prayer after which the Conference joined in singing one stanza of the hymn beginning:

"Come Holy Spirit heavenly Dove."

the effects of such teaching in the regular meals, and use of plates, knives, forks cups etc. We are glad to say the out-look for our School and Home at Little Rock is grander than ever before. The work in all departments is in a most flourishing condition. The walls are crowded and running over and still they come. No pains spared by the faculty in learning them the things to make them virtuous, useful members of society. It is a grand thing to say that \$45 will keep a pupil in our Home a year, and that every wellordered home becomes an object lesson to be imitated by oth-

We hope every member and friend of this Conference will pledge within themselves to do more than ever to awaken an interest in our School and Home. Let us ask God to prosper them and the generous friends of the North who so kindly supply our needs as we would ask his blessings up-

In conclusion I ask to be remembered each day in your prayers. I hope to do much good in the work assigned. on our families.

Rev. John R. Frazier.

John R. Frazier was born Nov. 27th, 1857 in Tipher County, Miss. He acquired a partial education at Rust University at Holly Springs. Was married to Miss Anna Suggs January 13th. 1881. Came to Arkansas in the Fall of '82. Was converted at Conway in Falkner County in '83, Entered the ministry in '84. He served the following ap-Pointments in the Little Rock Conference:

Clarendon, '84; Saulsburg, '85-'86; Forest City, '87; Mariana, '88. He was appointed to Batesville '89, but died before reaching his appointment.

Rev. Henry McDonald. Henry McDonald was admitted on trial in the Little Rock Conference in 1885 and served the following appointments:
