FIRST DAY.

Hot Springs, Ark., Feb. 7th, 1894.

The Sixteenth Session of the Little Rock Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church met in Haven chapel, Hot Springs, Ark., Feb. 7th, 1894 at 9:00 A.M., with Bishop Bowman in the chair.

Opening Devotions .- The Secretary read the one hundred and third psalm, the conference joined in singing three stanzas of the hymn commencing.

"There is a fountain filled with blood. Drawn from Immanuel's veins"

and W. H. Crawford led in prayer. The sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered by the Bishop assisted by several elders.
