Journal of Daily Proceedings.

FIRST DAY.

PINE BLUFF, ARK., Jan. 24, 1895.

The Seventeenth session of the Little Rock Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church met in St. James M. E. Church, Pine Bluff, Ark., Jan. 24, 1895, at 8:30 A.M. and was opened with a sacramental service conducted in a very impressive manner by Bishop Walden.

Roll Call.—The Secretary of the last session called the roll of the conference and 60 members and probationers responded to their names.

Introductions.—The following visitors were introduced to the conference: Rev. A. J. Nelson, D. D., of the Arkansas Conference, Rev. J. C. Battle of the Baptist church, Rev. H. H. King of the A. M. E. church, and Rev. W. J. Rodgers of the M. E. church South.

Officers elected.—Thos. Mason was re-elected secretary, J. E. Toombs Statistical Secretary and A. J. Fletcher, Treasuer.

Assistant Secretaries.—W. O. Emory and M. N. Langston, on the nomination of the secretary, were elected assistants.

Assistant Statisticians.—B. H. Johnson, J. J. Freeman, and Seth Neal were elected assistant Statistical Secretaries.

Assistant Treasurer.—John Qualls and W. H. Higgins were elected assistant treasurers.

Time of Meeting and Adjournment.—The time of meeting and adjournment was fixed at 8:30 a.m. and 12:00 m. respectively, the first half hour to be devoted to religious services.

Conference Bar.—The bar of the conference was fixed on a line corresponding with the rear of the first window.

Standing Committees.—The report of the committee on nominating standing committees was adopted with a few amendments.

Drafts ordered.—The Bishop announced that the conference was authorized to draw on the Charter Fund for \$25.00 and on the Book Concern Dividend for \$337.00 and the drafts were ordered paid.

Apportionments.—The Bishop announced that the conference was asked to raise for General Conference expenses and for the Episcopal Fund \$98.00 each and the presiding elders were asked to apportion these amounts to the various charges.

Papers referred.—Communications from various societies were presented by the Bishop and referred to appropriate committees.

Bishop's Address.--The Bishop gave an address to the conference full of practical thought.

Classes referred.—The superannuates and the supernumeraries were referred to the committee on conference relations. The following brethren were referred to the same as a committee of inquiry: W. B. Wall, C. A. Taylor, H. M. Renfro, J. W. Killpatrick, H. W. Walton, T. R. Wamble, G. W. Lacey, W. Brooks, D. H. E. Harris, and D. W. Nelson.

Afternoon Session.—On motion of J. W. Jackson it was ordered that when we adjourn we do so to meet at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Pentecestal Service.—J. E. Toombs was appointed to conduct the pentecestal service at 4 o'clock today.

H. C. Dunlap was appointed to conduct the religious services at the opening of the conference tomorrow morning.

On motion of W. R. R. Duncan the conference adjourned. One stanza of the hymn commencing.

"My faith looks up to thee" was sung and Bishop Walden pronounced the benediction.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference met at 2 o'clock and was opened with devotional services conducted by W. R. R. Duncan.

The charges of conference were called and reports were given to the Secretaries.

Referred.—J. W. Burns and A. J. Fletcher were referred to the committee of inquiry.

13th Question.—The Thirteenth question was taken up: "Was the character of each preacher examined?"

J. W. Jackson, A. J. Phillips, W. H. Morris, and W. R. R. Duncan reported their respective districts and their characters passed.

The following effective elders reported their Mission and Freedmen's Aid Collections and number of probationers and their characters passed: W. H. Higgins, Silas McDonald, S. M. Stokes, B. H. Johnson, H. P. Coulter, H. C. Dunlap, M. H. Foster, J. E. Toombs, J. C. Crawley, U. S. Kitchens, Seth Neal, B. J. Griffin, W. J. Cunningham, June Lemons, T. H. Hanna, John Qualls, J. C. Sherrell, G. W. Taylor, G. N. Johnson, J. P. Franklin, Thos. Mason.

G. B. Donnelly was advanced to the second year but excused from the course of study because of former connection with the Conference.

Wm. B. Wall and James W. Scruggs were discontinued. William Allen was continued in the first year.

James W. Burns' character passed, the committee reported and he was continued in the second year, his presiding elder being instructed to see that his accounts are adjusted.

Introductions.—Rev. W. A. Spencer, D. D., of the Church Extension Society, Rev. E. M. Pitkin of the American Bible Society, and Rev. D. W. Comstock of the Children's Home Society were introduced and addressed the conference in the interests they represent.

Introductions.—Rev. W. F. Shedd, D. D., President of Little Rock University, Revs. J. W. Zelender and J. C. Richardson of the Central Missouri Conference, and R. C. Coulter of the Western Book Concern, were introduced.

E. W. P. Gaskins, J. C. Crawley, and W. O. Emory were referred to the committee of inquiry.

On motion it was ordered that when we adjourn we do so to meet at 2:30 this afternoon.

John H. Hamilton's character passed, the committee reported and he was advanced to the third year.

The committee of inquiry reported in the case of A. J. Fletcher, and his character passed, he reported his work and he was granted a superannuated relation at his own request and on motion of J. W. Jackson he was placed on the claimants' list.

The same committee reported H. M. Renfro, his charac-

ter passed and his presiding elder was instructed to see that he adjusted his accounts.

The same committee reported C. A. Taylor and his character passed.

The same committee reported Edward Spencer, his character passed and he was referred to the presiding elder for the adjustment of the accounts against him.

The select committee reported action in the cases of G. W. Lacey and P. B. McDonald. (See Report).

Thirtieth Question.—The thirtieth question was called: "Where shall the next conference be held?" Batesville and Fort Smith were put in nomination and Batesville was selected. The Secretary was instructed to extend a vote of thanks to the people of Fort Smith for the kind invitation.

The committee reported in the case of W. O. Emory that the little matter of debt be left with him to adjust having confidence in his purpose to do so.

Bishop's Address.—The Bishop addressed the conference briefly on practical matters.

Announcements of the Sabbath's services were made.

A session was ordered for 2:30 P.M. tomorrow for memoirs and ordinations.

The conference adjourned regularly for the pentecostal services.

FOURTH DAY.

PINE BLUFF, ARK., Jan. 28, 1895.

Conference met at 8:30 A.M. and was opened with religious services conducted by M. N. Langston. Bishop Walden

Minutes of Saturday's afternoon session were read and approved.

On Resolutions.—A. J. Fletcher and B. H. Johnson were appointed a committee on resolutions.

Benevolent Fund.—A resolution relating to the benevolent money raised during the ensuing year was presented by J.

Certificate.—The Bishop presented the certificate of the ordinations of yesterday.

Discontinued .- The committee reported in the case of E. W. P. Gaskins and he was discontinued. Recognition of Orders —Jas. H. Balch of the A. M. E. church was presented for the recognition of orders and he was recognized as a local deacon in the Methodist Episcopal

Bishop's Address .- Bishop Walden gave a twenty minute address on practical questions.

Report.—The committee on Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education reported, and pending the adoption of which Dr. J. W. Hamilton addressed the conference and took a subscription to the Building Fund for Philander Smith College.

The report was adopted.

Steward's Report.—The stewards presented their preliminary report and they were permitted to withdraw to complete the same.

The time was extended.

Afternoon Session .- On motion it was ordered, that when we adjourn it be to meet at 2:30 today.

Printing Minutes.—The Secretaries presented a resolution pertaining to the publication of the minutes and also for the purchase of a conference trunk which were adopted.

The triers of appeals and committees of examination were constituted.

J. C. Sherrell was appointed to preach the missionary sermon at the next conference with Silas McDonald alternate.

Mission Report.—The committee on missions reported and the report was accepted.

W. McIntosh was appointed to open the conference this afternoon.

The conference adjourned with the benediction by Dr. Hamilton.

Conference met at 2 o'clock, Bishop Walden in the chair. Religious services were conducted by W. McIntosh. The Stewards presented their report which was adopted. T. H. Hanna was granted a supernumerary relation at his

own request.

RESOLUTIONS.

Action of the Baltimore Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Relating to the Amendment of the Second Restrictive Rule.

WHEREAS, The General Conference of 1892, directed the submission to the Annual Conferences in the Autumn of 1895, and the Spring of 1896, of certain resolutions which provide in part, as follows:

"(1st) That we submit to the Annual Conferences the proposition to amend the Second Restrictive Rule by adding the words "And such delegates must be male members," after the words "Two lay delegates for an Annual Conference," so that it will read "Nor of more than two lay delegates for an Annual Conference, and said delegates must be male members."

"(5th.) That if the amendment so submitted does not receive the vote of three fourths of the members of the Annual Conferences, and two-thirds of the General Conference, the Second Restrictive Rule shall be so construed that the words "Lay Delegates" may include men and women, and thus be in harmony with the legislation of previous General Conferences;" and,

WHEREAS, This action involves a principle, the application of which is claimed to be without precedent, and without constitutional authority; and,

Whereas, The fifth section of said resolutions, requires, "The votes of three-fourths of the members of the Annual Conferences" to enact said proposed amendment; while the Discipline requires, so far as relates to the Annual Conferences, only the concurrent recommendation of three-fourths of all the members of the several Annual Conferences who shall be present and vote on such recommendation." Therefore be it

. Resolved, 1st. That, waiving all question of the expediency of the admission of women to the General Conference,

we declare our judgment that such admission should not be secured or sanctioned by any method that wears the suspicion of irregularity or inadequacy.

2nd. That we deem it unwise to vote upon the proposition to amend the Second Restrictive Rule in the manner proposed by the aforesaid action of the General Conference of 1892.

3rd. That we propose the following amendment to the Second Restrictive Rule to add the words, "And said delegates may be men or women," after the words, "Two Lay delegates for an Annual Conference," so that the entire clause will read, "Nor of more than two Lay delegates for an Annual Conference, and said delegates may be men or women."

4th. That we hereby record our purpose to vote on this proposed amendment at the session of this Conference in the year 1895.

5th. That the Secretary of this Conference is hereby instructed to forward to each of the Bishops, and to the secretaries of the various Annual Conferences a certified copy of this paper; and that the Bishops are hereby requested to submit this proposed amendment to the Second Restrictive Rule to all the Annual Conferences, meeting in the year 1895, and to report the vote on the same to the General Conference of 1896.

Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education.

We your committee would submit the following: regard the Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society, in its work of education and christianization as of the very first importance. No better work is being done anywhere in the South than in these schools. There have been educated since the close of the war more than 100,000 men and women, and there are now nearly 10,000 students in these schools. The great majority of physicians, a large share of the colored teachers, and most of the colored ministers in all the states of the South have been educated in our Methodist schools.

Now as we are the beneficiaries of this work, we ought to do everything in our power to aid the Society out of the distressing embarrassment through which it has been passing for the last two years. The financial depression through which we are passing, has required painful sacrifices on the part of the teachers, most of whom have suffered a cut of onequarter, and in the case of our own at Philander Smith College, one-half, in their salaries. Ought we not to feel as much interest in the salaries of these self-sacrificing co-laborers as in our own?

In view of the fact that the Society has already expended nearly \$3,000 on our new building, and now purpose to put \$4,000 more into the work as soon as we can provide \$1,000 to finish the building; we recommend that \$1,500 be apportioned among the Districts, and that every preacher raise the amount apportioned to his charge. (See apportionment be-
