Daily Proceedings



FIRST DAY—Morning Session.

Fordyce, Ark., Thursday, January 19, 1905.

The twenty-seventh session of the Little Rock Annual Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, convened at J. M. Cox Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church at 9 o'clock a. m.

Presiding Bishop. Bishop William F. McDowell, D. D., LL. D., of Chicago, Illinois, was present as presiding Bishop.

Organization, Secretary and Assistants. G. A. Hall nominated J. W. Jackson as Secretary, who was elected by acclamation, and he nominated G. T. Saxton and L. G. Hodges as his assistants, and they were elected.

Statistical Secretary and Assistants. D. W. Nelson nominated J. J. Freeman and H. C. Dunlap nominated J. W. Burns. The Bishop appointed W. R. R. Duncan and Silas McDonald as tellers. The ballot was taken: 51 votes cast—J. W. Burns, 25; J. J. Freeman, 26. Bro. Freeman having received a majority of all the votes cast, was declared elected, and he nominated J. W. Burns, D. W. Nelson and C. McIntosh as his assistants, and they were elected.

Treasurer and Assistants.—W. Higgins nominated W. H. Morris, G. A. Hall nominated Silas McDonald, and D. W. Johnson nominated J. H. Greer. The Bishop appointed W. R. R. Duncan and J. M. Cox as tellers. The ballot was taken, 55 votes being cast. Mor-

ris received 31, McDonald 11 and Greer 13. Bro. W. H. Morris having received a majority of all the votes cast, was declared elected, and he nominated as his assistants, Silas McDonald, A. T. Stephens and W. H. Simpson, and they were elected.

Postmaster. On motion, C. W. Whitehead was elected as Postmaster.

Bar of Conference. On motion of B. J. Griffin, the bar of the Conference was fixed within the space between the third window and the altar.

Meeting and Adjournment. On motion of B. J. Griffin, the Conference meets at 8:30 a. m.; first half hour for devotion, and adjourn at 12 m.

Committees. T. R. Wamble, on behalf of the Presiding Elders, nominated the standing committees (see list), and they were ordered.

Introduction. Mrs. H. M. Nasmyth, Superintendent of Adeline Smith Home and State Treasurer of the Woman's Home Missionary, Methodist Episcopal Church, and Rev. J. W. Jennings, D. D., of Kansas City, Mo., agent of the Western Book Concern, were introduced to the Conference.

The Thirteenth Question. The Thirteenth Question was called by the Bishop: Was the Character of Every Preacher Examined? T. R. Wamble, Presiding Elder of the Clow District, was called, his character passed, and he reported his work. The following effective elders on the district were called, their characters passed and they reported their work: G. N. Johnson, David Hall, Lee Nelson, G. B. Donnelly, C. W. Whitehead, R. B. Henry, L. J. Preston, J. M. Clark and G. A. Hall.

Introduction. Rev. W. P. Thirkield, D. D., of Cincinnati, Corresponding Secretary of the Freedman's Aid and Southern Education Society, was introduced to the

Conference and delivered an address touching the work of the F. A. and S. E. Society, Philander Smith College and Adeline Smith Home.

B. J. Griffin, Presiding Elder of the Forrest City District, character passed and he reported his work. The following effective elders on the district were called, their characters passed and they reported their work: Phillip Owens, A. T. Stephens, C. A. Taylor, S. B. Davis, J. W. Jackson, J. T. Hawkins, H. Bright, S. M. Stokes, S. M. Stokes and J. T. Hawkins not being present.

Introduction. The Rev. R. E. Gillam, D. D., of St. Louis, Central Missouri Conference; S. P. Caress and H. H. Twyford of the Arkansas Conference Methodist Episcopal Church, and Mrs. A. T. Strickland, President of State Epworth League and W. H. M. Society, were introduced to the Conference.

M. N. Langston, Presiding Elder of the Fort Smith District, character passed and he reported his work. The following effective elders' characters passed and they reported their work: W. M. White, W. McIntosh, D. W. Boatner, J. W. Lewis, Silas McDonald, L. G. Hodges, G. T. Saxton and U. S. Kitchen, Bro. Kitchen not being present.

W. S. Sherrill, Presiding Elder of the Little Rock District, character passed and he reported his work on the district. The following effective elders' characters passed, and they reported their work: W. H. Morris, L. D. Daniels, who was reported as withdrawn, and, on motion of H. C. Dunlap, that L. D. Daniels be entered as having withdrawn from the church and ministry.

On motion of H. C. Dunlap, the Presiding Elder of the Little Rock District be requested to procure the parchments of said L. D. Daniels. W. R. R. Duncan,

D. H. E. Harris, D. W. Nelson, P. W. Webb, J. H. Reed. Bro. Reed also spoke of his departure to Africa. The Conference sung: "There's a Land that is Fairer Than Day." The Bishop announced the transfer of Dr. J. H. Reed to the Libera Conference Africa. W. H. Morris offered the following resolution (see resolution), which was unanimously adopted. J. J. Freeman, M. H. Foster, W. H. Simpson, M. F. Strong, G. W. Taylor and J. H. Greer.

On motion of H. C. Dunlap, that when we adjourn that we reassemble at 2 o'clock p. m. for a statistical session.

List of Committees were called; the various chairmen announced the hour of meeting after the afternoon session.

The Bishop addressed the Conference in an acceptable manner.

The Doxology was sung and the benediction pronounced by Dr. R. E. Gillam.

FIRST DAY—Afternoon Session.

The Conference convened at 2 o'clock p. m., Bishop W. F. McDowell in the chair. The Conference joined in singing, "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing." The Bishop read the letter to the Ephesians. 3d chapter. Prayer by Dr. J. H. Reed.

The minutes not being ready, reading was deferred to the morning session.

The Statistical Secretary J. J. Freeman, came forward and received the statistical reports from the brethren, and Silas McDonald, First Assistant Treasurer, came forward and received the financial reports from the brethren.

High Privilege. Dr. J. H. Reed said that there was

forty dollars due on the minutes of last year, which was quite embarrassing.

W. S. Sherrill moved that the forty dollars due on minutes be pro-rated among the five Presiding Elders and that they give their notes for the same to the publishers and collect from their respective charges in the districts.

Amendment. W. McIntosh moved as an amendment that the five Presiding Elders give their notes for the amount now due and properly pro-rate among the charges on their districts. The amendment was carried and the original motion as amended was adopted.

Thirteenth Question Resumed. Was the Character of Each Preacher Examined? W. H. Higgins, the Presiding Elder of the Pine Bluff District, character passed and he reported his work on the district.

The following effective elders' characters passed, and they reported thir work: J. W. Burns, J. B. Brown, B. J. Lewis, G. J. Izard, W. E. Pruitt, T. J. Thompson, A. S. Johnson, J. C. Adams, F. J. Jacob, B. H. Johnson, D. B. Harston, H. C. Dunlap, J. M. Cox, M. H. Foster; no report from B. H. Johnson and M. H. Foster, and Dr. J. M. Cox's report was deferred until tomorrow.

Twenty-Second Question. Who are the Supernumery Preachers? C. C. Wallace's character passed, and he was referred to the Committee on Conference Relation, his time having expired. W. J. Cunningham's character passed, and he was continued in the same relation. G. W. Thompson's and H. M. Renfro's characters passed and they were referred to the Committee on Conference Relation.

Twenty-Third Question. Who are the Superannuated Preachers? The following were called, their characters passed and they were continued in the same rela-

tion: W. H. Crawford, Elsa Roberts, S. J. Johnson, Washington Brooks, D. W. Johnson and Wm. Fuller.

Address of Dr. Gillam. The Rev. R. E. Gillam, D. D., was introduced to the Conference and spoke on the Evangelistic Movement of the Methodist Episcopal Church. His address was quite effective. The Conference sung, "A Charge to Keep I Have." Announcements were made, the Doxology was sung and the benediction was pronounced by the Bishop.

SECOND DAY—Morning Session.

Friday, January 20th, 1905.

The Conference met at 8:30 o'clock a. m. Bishop W. F. McDowell in the chair.

Religious Service. The religious services were conducted by the Bishop.

Prayer by Rev. H. H. Twyford. The Conference joined in singing, "Nearer, My God, to Thee." The Bishop read the Gospel according to St. Luke, 3rd chapter, beginning at the 7th verse. The Bishop then addressed the Conference on the Importance of the Annual Gathering, which was greatly appreciated by the Conference.

The minutes of the morning session and of the afternoon session were read and approved.

Question of High Privilege. The Bishop announced that the preachers of Pine Bluff District had a question of high privilege against W. H. Higgins, Presiding Elder of the District, that must be attended to at once. That the preachers charged that, Bro. Higgins, with having served the district faithfully for six years, and that he was not leaving the district with as much money as they desired and therefore requested the Bishop to have

Bro. W. H. Higgins brought before the bar of Conference and present him with a purse of \$12.75.

The Bishop called the Rev. W. H. Higgins before the bar of Conference and in very fitting and choice words presented him with the purse. The Rev. W. H. Higgins responded in a fitting manner.

Revs. A. S. Johnson, B. J. Lewis, Wm. Speed and J. W. Burns, Committee of the Pine Bluff District, presented the following resolution (see resolution), which was ordered spread on the Journal of the Conference.

The delinquent charges handed in their reports.

Absentees. The absentees answered to their respective names.

The Tenth Question. What Members Have Completed the Conference Course of Study? Archie R. Ray, Samuel J. Brown and Zachariah R. Fields having completed the Conference Course of Study, their characters were passed and they reported their work and were elected to Elders' Orders. M. L. Lacy's and William Speed's characters were passed and they were continued in the studies of the fourth year. M. L. Lacy was granted a superannuated relation.

The Ninth Question. What Members are in the Studies of the Fourth Year? W. A. Smith, Reuben B. Fagan and William Green. Their characters were passed and they reported their work. The Committee of Examination reported and they were advanced to the studies of the fourth year.

Introduction. Rev. Dr. J. W. Jennings, of Kansas City, Mo., was introduced to the Conference, who presented a draft from the Chartered Fund for \$22.00 and one for \$499 from Book Concern of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and on motion of H. C. Dunlap they were ordered paid.

Dr. Jennings spoke of the Book Concern, its work and usefulness.

Dr. G. G. Logan was introduced to the Conference.

Dr. J. H. Reed. Dr. J. M. Cox introduced resolution touching the departure of Dr. J. H. Reed. (See resolution.) After appropriate remarks by the Bishop the resolutions were unanimously adopted by a rising vote. Dr. Reed responded in quite a feeling manner. The Conference sang, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds," after which the Bishop sang, "Home of the Soul."

The Bishop spoke in reply to Dr. Reed that it was quite significant that a Bishop holding a Conference in Fordyce, Ark., could transfer a man to the other side of the world and know that he does not transfer him out of the church.

Dr. Logan. Dr. G. G. Logan spoke to the Conference concerning the missionary cause of the great Methodist Episcopal Church.

The Fifth Question. Who Have Been Continued on Trial? Alfred S. Miller, John L. Bryan, Alonzo M. Brooks were called, their characters were passed, they reported their work, and the Committee on Examination reported, and they were advanced to the studies of the second year. Eugene J. Pinkett, through his Presiding Elder, B. J. Griffin, asked to be discontinued.

Seat of the Next Conference. The Thirtieth Question was called: Where Shall the Next Conference Be Held? Cotton Plant and Fayetteville were placed in nomination. The vote was taken and Fayetteville was chosen. A vote of thanks was extended to Cotton Plant for its cordial invitation.

Bible Study. Dr. D. W. Boatner introduced a resolution touching the study of the Bible, and J. C. Martin

Fund (see resolution), which was adopted by a rising vote.

The Bishop spoke touching the matter involved in the resolutions.

Dr. Reed was given the parting hand. The Conference sang, "Guide Me, Oh! Thou Great Jehovah," and "God Be With You Till We Meet Again."

Introductions. Rev. Edward Green, pastor of the First Baptist Church, city, was introduced to the Conference, and he delivered an address tendering the use of his beautiful and commodious church for our Sabbath service.

The Bishop accepted on behalf of the Conference in a fitting manner.

Prof. A. D. Jacques, Principal of the Clow Seminary, was introduced and addressed the Conference concerning his work.
