On motion Arthur Cox was passed in character and elected to Local Deacons Orders.







# FORT SMITH DISTRICT REPORT

BISHOP JONES, FELLOW MINISTERS and FRIENDS:

We are brought to this point filled with magnanimous pleasure

mixed with immeasurable regrets.

The great need of our people, both laity and clergy casts a shadow over the amount and quality of service we have been able to render during this our first year as coworker on the Fort Smith District. However, we have been able to realize the strength of our joint laborers and to sympathize and help make strong some of their weak points. All of which makes us both happy and sad to report to you our endeavors for the past Conference year.

The Fort Smith District comprises the west half of the state of Arkansas, with his head bordering the line of Missouri, nestled in the lap of the Boston Mountain, his body planked toward the center and undergirted with the Ozarks and the Petit Jean, with his toes turned up and kissed by the warm sun of Louisiana and Texas. Its chief industry is Agriculture, principally cotton-raising

This district has twenty-eight pastoral appointments with and fruit growing. forty nine preaching points. Two of these are housed in school We have 2170 full members and 1538 preparatory buildings.

A creditable percentage of our young people are in college. members. But the majority are community dwellers; thus requiring much patience and labor in supplying their need for spiritual and social development. Here we have children and youth with different degrees of knowledge and spirituality. With these we have made very definite contacts in the form of short term institutions of Religious Transfer and Indiana. ligious Education and Leadership Training; personal visitation and printed matter both self compiled and our Board's Publications.

All of this is done with no debt left.

Most of the remaining churches show some improvement in the appearance of their buildings and grounds.

Practically every minister has majored in some activity of the Church, from old-fashioned revivals to Church Property Improve-

Unfortunately for us, our three city churches which should be leading points on the city churches which should be the leading points, are laboring under very unfavorable financial circumstances. circumstances. However, our pastors have in a measure been able to cope with the local situations.

Time is not at my disposal to permit the paying of tribute to each pastor, but this much must be said: On the average you cannot discover a more loyal and efficient band of ministers on any district. Facing as they have this year, unparalleled difficulties; difficulties that in some cases have meant an insufficiently of the requisites of life. Yet not one word of complaint has come to me from any man among them. They have endured their hardships as good soldiers of the cross. Not a man breaking under the strain in either spirit, mind, or body.

After the Waters had receded, loyal to their Planters, and in love with cotton, their only method of securing livelyhood, 1400 nembers returned to their former homes to find them gone, former homes to receive pitched tents and made the largest crop for many years to receive 7, 8 and 9 cents for cotton and \$15.00 to \$20.00 per ton for seed. The cotton going to their planters, receiving from 75 cents to \$3.00 for their plante for their share from the sale of seeds. Yet they have shared with the Church, God only knows how. It will be far along in November before ber before they can receive any kind of returns for their labor.

The old Administration Building has been given entirely to the School of Home Economics. Dr. Harris has proven to be the right man in the proper time to reestablish the College standing and to assure us of a continued growing School. The student body is refined and religious, selected from Christian homes and Communities. The faculty is cooperative and well chosen. There has never been a brighter day than now for the School.

The Million Unit Fellowship The Million Unit Fellowship movement has been instilled in most every charge, with pleasing results, the quota of 110 units have been subscribed and 75% has been paid.

Finance

The reports from the Pastors will show a slight increase in al! givings except Pastors' salaries. Economic conditions have caused a slump in many charges. The major parts of the local debts have been retired and a creditable amount paid on loans from the Board of Home Missions, and Church Extension. The reports will show a 5% gain in Episcopal Fund, Conference Claimant and Area

#### New Buildings

The old dilapidated church buildings are being replaced with modern edifices. Smith Chapel at Hughes, has nearly been completed at a cost of \$900.00. Marianna, Livingston Chapel has been twothirds completed at a cost of \$800.00, without any outside assistance and with only a remaining indebtedness of \$75.00. New Churches are going up at Hunter and Brinkley. Plans have been perfected this cause. Brother Talbort be Port. \$250.00 has been raised for this cause. this cause. #### OKLAHOMA DISTRICT

Report of the District Superintendent of the Oklahoma District to the Sixtieth Annual Session of the Southwest Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church Pine Bluff, Arkansas, Oct. 20, 1937. BISHOP JONES and BRETHREN:

Twenty-five years have passed since you met in this historic City and set up your banners and hoisted your sails. Many and varied have been the changes since that remote date. You have almost an entire new conference with few exceptions. Some have gone to the East, and some to the West, while others have gone North; and many to rest.

I wish to congratulate you-my "Fathers" who are left upon your safe arrival here to participate in this, the Sixtieth Session of the Southwest Annual Conference. Coming up through the years of life's drifting contrarys those of us who are yet alive can say in the language of the Poet:

"What troubles have we seen, What conflicts have we passed; Fightings without and fears within, Since we assembled last.

But out of all, the Lord Has brought us by His Love: And still He doth His help afford, And hides our lives above."

But, for His abiding grace we could not have endured. This year has doubtless, been the most trying and testing from many viewpoints. We present this our second report to you in three sections: "The Problem," "The Program," "The Results."

The Oklahoma District as you well know comprises the entire State of Oklahoma which has a population of our group numbering 312,005; of this number the Oklahoma District claimed at the beginning of this conference year, 1,685 full members, 270 preparatory members, or, 1,955 full members and preparatory memmuzzle the ox that tread out the corn." While we are concerned This is 16.1 per cent of the populated group. It is not enough for our share. This situation presents a task which demands our toil and challenges our ability.

In the light of this fact we see the first section of our report: "The Problem"

Inadequately trained Leadership—inadequate methods of approach, and inadequate equipments, adds perplexity to the perplexed program. We often preach to our people: "Thou shall not muzzle the ox that tread out the corn." While we are concerned with treading out just enough corn for ourselves, with such limited share in the responsibility—no adequate pastoral supervision can be given, as a solution to many of our problems. the last Sunday in the Conference year to stage a rally of sufficient size to raise all of the General Claims and Conference apportionment, simply makes the problem all the more difficult. All too little is done beyond the five or six days of revival meetings.

Short Pastorage

There is little hope of any successful program of improvement in any church, when the pastor moves every one or two years. When we shall realize the possibility in the smallest appointment to make the conceivable best appointment, and are willing to apply ply ourselves to the task of developing what we have, we will be able at least to keep men on the job long enough for the people to catch a vision of the larger service in Kingdom Buildings.

Economic Strain

By economic strain, I mean that state of the human mind induced by the fear of material want. It is the state of mind in which we are apt to find all underpaid workmen. It is the leading factors ing factor in our present industrial unrest.

The minister of the gospel is subject, like every underpaid Workman, to economic strain. He is bound to feel the strain that grows out of lack of physical necessities. of mind created by material want has a tendency to make our ministry inefficient. "The Program"

Having sat at the feet of Bishop R. E. Jones in the last session of our Annual Conference, which, was the first Annual Conference held in the New Area with a Quadranium stretching before us in an entire new set up, it gave me the greatest impetus and the most exalting urge of many moons. We left Oklahoma City, Oklahoma with great hope and wonderful aspiration, feeling that we had closed one of the greatest, most constructive, and far reaching sessions in our history. I felt that a new day had dawned and victory was assured. I chose for my lot—the building of a constructive and workable program of improvement to meet the challenge in the problems of our district. Our aim was to make the Official Boards, Quarterly Conferences, Group Meetings and District Conference creative and more vitally to the entire program of the Church.

Method of Approach

Our program was presented in four projects, giving a three months period to each project:

1. Improving the Quarterly Conference

2. Improving the Program of the Church 3. Leadership Development

4. General Tabulation.

The Results

1. Quarterly conferences have been improved by eliminating the reading of reports. Quarterly conferences have become more of an institute, redirecting and remotivating the mind of the church officials.

2. The Pastors' report on the financial campaign for the local church budget shows ancrease of 21 per cent in church subscription of church members.

3. More than two thirds of the pastors are in possession of the book, "The Pastor and his own work." They are striving to become more efficient as leaders.

4. The Order of Public Worship has been improved throughout the district in all the churches.

5. Beautification Week was observed before Easter and there was marked improvement in the beautifying of several of

The Million Unit Fellowship Movement It is todays most urgent need and generator of a new and better appreciation of Christ, the Christian message, and the program of the Church. If we are to go forward, we must of necessity have the "lift" of that truth in the Million Unit Fellowship Covenant

To this movement—we have subscribed or pledge 62 units of the 77 units apportioned the district, we are hopeful of reaching our full Quota within the few months.

Personal Activities

I have made 102 quarterly visits and informed the Area Office of the general condition of each charge upon my visits. We have held two group meetings, one District Conference, which was an improvement in institute work, made two visits to Philander Smith College, and attended the Area Council meeting.

We have an increase over last year in the following items: Ministerial Support, General Administration, Area Budget and World Service.
