PRECONFERENCE SESSION — TUESDAY EVENING

Conference Opened — On Tuesday evening, September 30, 1941, prior to the official opening of the Conference, the entertaining Congregation with Mrs. Thelma B. Hill Presiding, presented the welcome program. The Devotional service was conducted by the Junior Church Choir, directed by Mrs. I. A. Pointer. Welcome addresses were made by representatives of the local churches and organizations of the city. Response was given by the Reverend Mr. J. N. Wallace of Tulsa, Oklahoma.

Announcements were made by the Reverend Mr. I. A. Pointer, pastor host to the Conference. Benediction..

FIRST DAY — MORNING SESSION

The Southwest Conference of the Methodist Church met in its Sixty-Fourth Annual Session (Third since Unification) in Warren Chapel Methodist Church, Ardmore, Oklahoma, Wednesday morning October 1, 1941 at nine O'clock with Bishop Robert E. Jones, resident Bishop of the Columbus Area, Presiding.

Devotional services were conducted by the Bishop, who designated J. N. Wallace, pastor of Wesley Chapel, Tulsa, Oklahoma to lead in the inspirational song service which quickly brought the Conference to a high spiritual level. Prayers were made by the Reverends W. S. Sherill and Fay Norman.

Roll Call — The Secretary of the last session of the Conference, C. K. Brown, was requested to call the roll. The following members of the Conference responded: Hillard Albright, S. B. Branch, W. H. Bar of Conference — On motion of B. F. Scott, the Bar of the Conference was made to include the area between the Chancel and the third window from the rear of the Church.

Daily Sessions. — The Conference fixed 9:00 a. m. as the hour for opening of the daily sessions of the Conference.

Consideration of Minutes. — Consideration was given to the publication of the Conference Journal and satisfactory explanation was made as to the cause of delay in publication. J. H. Taggart, Chairman of the committee on publication explained that the delay in publication was due to the lack of available money for the purpose. Due to the generosity of the Superintendent and Staff of the Arkansas State Institution for the Deaf at Little Rock, the cost of publication was reduced to a minimum of forty-five dollars.. On motion of J. H. Ellis the Conference Extended a vote of thanks to J. H. Taggart for his accomplishment with the minutes.

P. H. KELLY On motion of P. H. Kelly the Conference voted to publish the Conference Journal, and to arrange the roll of the ministers in choronological order.

Minute Money — On motion of J. H. Ellis the roll was called for the collection of Minute Money — the roll was called by districts, and the response gratifying (See report).

Intruductions — Miss L. Warrick Jurisdiction Secretary of The Womans Society of Churistian Service was introduced and delivered a brief address. G. G. Troupe, representative of the Ministerial Relief Association of Indiannapolis, Ind. was introduced and spoke concerning the work of his company. Others introduced were the Rev. J. E. Hughes, pastor, A. M. E. Church Ardmore; The Rev. D. C. Harnache of the Baptist Church, Ardmore, and the Rev. L. H. Harvey.

Announcements — S. McDonald announced that the memorial service previously scheduled for the morning would be deferred until the regular evening hour, and urged full attendance in this service.

Communion Service — Following a brief recess the Conference reassembled for the Communion Service — the service was unusually impressive and beautiful. Bishop C. C. Seleeman

of the South Central Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church and in charge of the white conferences in Arkansas and in Okla. was the celebrated guest in this service, Bishop Sealeman was introduced by Bishop Jones and at the latter's request conducted the service. The perfect coordination and consecration of the choir added much to the impressiveness of this service.

Following the introduction of Mrs. Sealeman to the Conference Bishop Sealeman pronounced the benediction.

FIRST DAY — AFTERNOON SESSION

Opening — Pursuant to adjournment the Conference reassembled at 2 P. M. with Bishop Jones, Presiding. Devotional exercises were led by C. C. Hall, who led in singing— "Jesus keep me near the Cross and "I'm going to work until my day is done". Prayer was offered by M. F. Strong.

Introduction — Mr. R. H. McAllester, Business Manager of the Central Edition of the Christian Advocate and representative of the Methodist Publishing House was introduced —He presented a draft from the Publishing House for the amount of 684.36 on motion the draft was received and turned over to the Conference Stewards for distribution with thanks to the Publishing House.

Report—District Superintendent Reports were submitted in order as follows: W. S. Sherrill, Texarkana District; J. H. Taggart Little Rock District; B. F. Scott, Oklahoma District.

Publishing Committee—A publishing committee was appointed consisting of the Secretary of the Conference, the Conference Lay Leader, District Lay Leaders, and the District Superintendents.

Treasurer's Report — On the call for the Treasurer Report J. H. Ellis Conference Treasurer announced that his report was ready, and that memographed copies were being prepared for distribution.

Lay Member's Roll — A list of the Lay Members of the Conference was ordered prepared by each District Superintendent and turned over to the Secretary for publication in the minutes.

Announcements — The committees, on Conference Relations, Ministerial Training, and Qualifications with the District

Superintendents were requested to meet with the Bishop at five o'clock P. M. at the temporary Episcopal Residence. Mrs. Green Secretary to the Bishop was introduced to the Conference.

The Bishop announced that the reports of the Pastors would be called for at the morning session on Thursday.

The Woman's Society Christian Service program was announced for the evening hour preceeding the memorial service.

The District Superintendents were requested to meet with the Pastors of their Districts immediately following the close of the afternoon session for purpose of a check up on their reports.

The Conference adjourned with benediction by the Bishop.

SECOND — DAY MORNING SESSION

Conference Opened — Pursuant to adjournment the Conference assembled at 9:00 a. m. Thursday October 2, 1941 with Bishop Jones Presiding. Devotional exercises were conducted by the Bishop. An inspiring song service was conducted by Miss Ruth Gillam, Head of the Department of Music Philander Smith College.

Minutes Approved — The minutes of the previous sessions were read and approved.

Report — B. F. Neal, District Superintendent of the Fort Smith District submitted his report.

Transfers — The Bishop announced the transfers of C. K. Brown to the Washington Conference and B. F. Neal to the Lexington Conference—their transfers to become effective at the close of this Conference Session. Kindly remarks were made by the Bishop concerning the contributions of these men to the church. Complimentary remarks concerning C. K. Brown were made by B. F. Scott and D. G. Franklin, and of B. F. Neal by J. H. Ellis and C. C. Hall. To these generous tributes fitting response was feelingly made by the recipients.

Introductions — Dr. H. Ryan, District Superintendent of the Ardmore District of the Methodist Church and Dr. Wilson and Bell (pastors of the First and Carter St. Methodist Churches respectively, were introduced to the Conference. Dr. Ryan, as spokesman brought greetings and felicitations from the

Methodist Churches of the City and Extended an invitation to the Conference members to visit the sessions of their Conference which assembles in this city two weeks hence. Dr. C. K. Brown was invited to preach Sunday October 5, at First Church, Bishop Jones expressed appreciation of the recognition given the Conference in that one of the members was invited to preach at the First Church (White) on the approaching Sabbath.

Organization — Chas. F. Golden and T. J. Griffin were nominated for the office of Secretary of the Conference—Chas. F. Golden was elected. He named as his assistants: Chas. K. Brown (for remainder of the Conference Session) T. J. Griffin, Miss Essis B. Wilson and B. W. Wynn—The Conference concurred, in these, they were elected.

C. G. Tillman was nominated and elected Statistician. He named as assistants: M. F. Strong, T. M. Johnson, R. J. Talbert, Fay Norman and W. H. D. Bright. On concurrence of the conference they were elected.

Special Ballot — The Bishop requested Clerical members of the Conference to each name four men who in their judgment worthy to be considered for the Office of District Superintendent, the names of the nominees to be written on a slip of paper distributed for that purpose.

Treasurer's Report—J. H. Ellis Conference Treasurer submitted his report, distributing memographed copies to the members of the Conference for observation.

Presentation — C. K. Brown, rising to a question of privilege in behalf of the members of the Oklahoma District presented a purse to the Rev. B. F. Scott, the retiring District Superintendent who in fitting terms expressed his appreciation for the same.

Introductions — The following visitors were introduced: Rev. S. E. Blacknell, pastor St. Paul Methodist Church, Shreveport, La.; Rev. W. D. Lester, pastor of Mason Memorial Methodist Church, Kansas City, Kansas; Dr. J. W. Golden, Field Secretary of the Central Jurisdiction Commission on Evangelism; Mrs. J. W. Golden of Memphis, Tennessee; Rev. J. J. Jackson of the Baptist Church Ardmore Oklahoma, and Dr. M. L. Harris, President of Philander Smith College,

and Representative of the Board of Education.

M. L. Harris — In an earnest address Dr. Harris expressed the hope that the Conference would hold to the same objective of \$2000 annually for the College. On motion the Conference by unanimous vote pledged itself to raise \$2000 for the College. On motion this obligation was to be assumed by the District Superintendents and apportioned to the Charges of their Districts. This money to be raised on Race Relation Day.

J. W. Golden—Dr. Golden, Representative of the Central Jurisdictional Commission on Evangelism was introduced and in an impassioned address, stressed the importance of the observance of the Universal week of Prayer as well as the general program of evangelism. He presented a program of Evangelism to the Conference for consideration. On motion the Conference adopted the program on Evangelism submitted by Dr. Golden. (See Report.)

Bishop Jones explained the financial plan by which the work in the field of Evangelism is to be carried on by the Conferences in the Central Jurisdiction, and urged the support of this work.

Announcements — The Conference was requested to begin its sessions on Friday mornings at 8:45.

The District Superintendents, members of the Board of Ministerial Training, Conference Relations and Qualifications were requested to meet again at 3:30 and at the usual place.

S. McDonald — Silas McDonald on a question of privilege acknowledged the omission of the names of several persons in the memorial service, who had died during the year.

W. D. Lester — The Rev. W. D. Lester of Kansas City, Kansas was presented and addressed the Conference briefly bringing greetings from his family and the Central West Conference.

Adjournment — Following announcements the Conference adjourned with the Benediction by the Rev. W. D. Lester.

SECOND DAY — AFTERNOON SESSION

Conference Opened — Pursuant to adjournment the Conference assembled at 2:30 P. M. with Bishop Jones, Presiding. A brief devotional service was conducted by the Bishop with

Mis R. Gillam giving direction to the music.

Dr. C. L. Calkins made a complementary statement of our increase in givings to Conference Claimants this year as compared to last year givings.

REPORTS — P. F. Scruggs made the report for the Conference Board on Conference Claimants. Report adopted (See Report.)

TREASURER'S REPORT — The Treasurer, J. H. Ellis presented his final report, which was ordered printed in the minutes (See Report.)

E. A. Love — Dr. Love was presented and asked to meet with the Commission on World Service and Finance and the Board of Missions and Church Extension.

AUDITING — On the question of Auditing the Treasurer's report, the rule prevailed that either a committee would be appointed by the Conference or a public accountant would certify the report and the same is to be printed in minutes.

TREASURER'S EXPENSE — By order of the Conference the Commission on World Service and Finance was authorized to pay Rev. Ellis his expenses during the year for clerical work, stamps, supplies, etc. in carrying out the orders of the Conference.

PRESENTATION — Following Complementary words from J. H. Ellis of the departing District Superintendent, Rev. B. F. Neal was presented a purse as a token of good will from the Fort Smith District. — Rev. Neal responded in fitting words, expressing his appreciation of the good will token.

ELECTION OF LAY LEADER — The Board of Lay Activities through its representative presented the name of J. H. Touchstone as nominee for Lay Leader another year. He was elected by unanimous vote.

TRANSPORTATION AGENT—P.F. Scuggs was elected Transportation agent for the Conference.

Pine Bluff Property — After due discussion on the disposition to be taken regarding the Pine Bluff property owned by the Conference and the debt owed on it, the Conference authorized the Trustees of the Conference to sell the property, pay off the debt and place the remaining fund in Trust for Conference Claimants within the Conference.

TRUSTEES — On the resignation of J. H. Oliver as a Trustees of the Annual Conference, J. S. Cullins was nominated and elected to fill the vacancy.

INTRODUCTIONS — Rev. R. J. Smith of the Methodists Church (White) Ardmore was introduced and brought words of greeting.

ANNOUNCEMENTS — Following announcements the Conference adjourned with benediction by Rev. R. J. Smith.

THIRD DAY — MORNING SESSION

Opening — Pursuant to adjournment the Conference assembled at 8:45 Friday morning, October 3rd, 1941, with the Conference chairman, Bishop R. E. Jones, presiding. Devotions were conducted by B. F. Scott, District Superintendent of the Oklahoma District. J. N. Wallace gave direction to the inspiring song service. Prayer was offered by P. H. Kelly, pastor of White Memorial Church, Little Rock.

Minutes Approved—The minutes of previous sessions were read and approved.

Disciplinary Questions — Disciplinary questions were asked (See condensed minutes.)

Character's passed — The characters of the District Superin-

tendents and pastors were passed. The characters of retired ministers were passed. (See List.)

Reports — C. K. Brown, chairman of the Committee on Conference Relations made the report for the Committee. The report was adopted. S. N. Thomas was granted the retired Relationship; E. A. Nunn, granted a Sabbatical year, S. S. Taylor granted the Supernumerary Relationship. J. E. Adams was transferred to the Central West Conference.

Charles F. Golden, Registrar of the Board on Ministerial Training made the report for the Board. E. M. Whaley, Character passed, continued on trial and graduated from the Conference courses of study, M. L. Brooks, Character passed, continued on trial, graduated from Conference course of study and elected to Deacon's orders. W. L. E. Cole, character passed, continued on trial, advanced to studies of the third year and elected to Deacon's orders. Roosevelt D. Crockett, admitted on trial, placed in studies of third year and elected to Deacon's orders under Seminary rule to be ordained else where. W. H. Bass, admitted on trial placed in studies of the third year and elected to Deacon's orders under Seminary rule. Theodore Walters, character pass, continued on trial and advanced to studies fourth year; J. L. Davis, J. C. Tyus, E. F. Wallace and R. B. Thorton, character passed, continued on trial and advanced to studies of the fourth year.

Minute Money — The report on minute money was read (See Report.)

Introductions — Dr. E. A. Love, representative of the Board of Missions and Church Extension was introduced and expressed the desire of speaking at length later.

Dr. Calkins of the Board of Pensions and Relief was introduced and spoke briefly of his work.

Recognition of Orders — On recommendation of the Conference Relation's Committee, R. B. Brown from the church of God in Christ, and J. C. Burns from the A. M. E. Church were presented, their orders recognized and they were received on trial and placed in the studies of the first year.

Disciplinary Questions — Disciplinary questions were resumed. Regarding question sixteen the Conference voted to follow the procedure of a stewards meeting in making appor-

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Report of the Little Rock District
Annual Conference 1941

Bishop Jones and Brethren:

A few years ago, when it fell my lot to share in the leadership of this Conference there also crowded into my thinking, How can we make one dent toward success in this great adventure? Every conscious effort has been made with this end in view.

Through the process of guidance and training, we endeavor to take possession of all about us, making the bad good and the good better. The church has that which every person needs.

We want real Christians, since we believe with Evangelist J. W. Golden, "Real Christmas are always dependable".

Before us, at this time, looms a muddled but hopeful picture of the desperate need for Christians Ideals. To rightly represent the goal of Methodist Christians, we must see to it that the Gospel is infused with every condition effecting our people, ministers and laymen, whether economic, social or educational. In other words, we realize, the Gospel must be preached to every living creature.

This report deals with a notation of some efforts made by the Little Rock District in achieving this task.

To start with, we are trying to begin at the beginning. First the district superintendent is studying the new plans and procedures of the New Church Program. The Methodist Conference on Christian Education held in Nashville, Tennessee in December 1940 was an aid in enlightenment for this work. Also, echoes from pastors Whaley and Golden who attended the Institute Council at Nashville in March added zest to the Christian Education plans for Youth of the district. Books from the Board of Education circulated by Dr. N. F. Forsyth again this year were read, studied and enjoyed. These are very helpful.

Our participation with such groups as those presenting themselves in regular District Group Meetings, The District Meeting of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, Laymen's Council, the Annual District Institute and Daily Vacation Church Schools makes us know our leadership and engage in assistance for their personal development in their several skills.

Constant attendance to Church Materials, including the Discipline, Methodist Hymnal and new publications of the several departments, keeps us pressing toward understanding and fruitful activity with our people. Since reports are our chief way of feeling the pulse of co-workers, a study of the present system of reports and records claims much of our energy.

Attendance upon the Area Council lends its usual share in increasing our knowledge of and firing our enthusiasm for this wonderful experience of Following Christ.

The Area School of Ministerial Training has its own special way of helping in facing the district responsibility.

Also some plans for raising money while promoting social and moral well-being are uppermost in our minds. We expect results from our work. And, of course, our efforts will count.

Next, our pastors are catching the spirit and feel it. Consequently, our spiritual efforts are greatly accented in each district gathering and beams out in the local churches exhibiting what we consider a healthful sign in our parish home-life.

A large percentage of clergy and laity attended the three District Group Meetings this year. We earnestly attempted Training Conferences in each; giving District and Conference Officers encouragement in presenting the phase of the work in

which he sought cooperation. As a result, we have District organizations of Woman's Society of Christian Service. Lay Activities, Directors of Age Groups in the Board of Christian Education.

A comparatively large number of laymen and pastors, some from the most outlying rural communities came together and applied themselves diligently in the two-day Seminar in Christian Education held at Philander Smith College in May.

As a result of the interest in these and other conferences of religious emphasis, we are happy to report Vacation Church Schools at Clarendon, Hunter, Batesville, Wesley, Little Rock, White Memorial, Duncan, Brown, Brickeys, Kokomo; Lonoke.

This has become a regular growing feature of our work. Through services of Philander and the Board of Education General and Conference, we feel that we are on our way. This summer's work is especially thrilling in that although the district is approximately 20% smaller by reason of the Texarkana District Formation; we have a total of more than 900 persons who received benefit from organized projects in Christian Education. This number does not include other forms of training given in Workers' Conferences, Week-end instruction, personal contact and distribution of literature.

Pastors are trying from the pulpit and other points of vantage to help calm the restlessness that surrounds us. They are aware that this is a problem of physical, mental and moral growth. Thus, we have more who are encouraging the use of hymns. In this procedure is realized a new vision of the value and possibilities manifest through worship. They are teaching youth to regard devotional services as really valuable. Practically every pastor is doing this and accomplishing results in various ways. Wesley, Little Rock, continues its ministry through the Unique University of Life and Church School with an added group of Girl Scouts.

The Methodist Youth Fellowship is taking form in some charges. Duncan is forging in this direction. White is looking in that direction. Some rural points; Brickeys, Kokomo, Hunter, Batesville, Clarendon, and Lonoke are making definite plans for this movement.

Lay Activities are taking shape. Each laymen is considered a unit of power and working strength. We are emphasizing that each has his own peculiar task. This particular group bids fair for a more favorable report in the very near future.

We often feel disappointed with efforts since our job depends not so much on technique as on Consecration and genuine Christian Experience. However, we are appreciative for the crudest expressions as long as they tend to our one Great Goal.

We have some outstanding physical or property improvements, such as, pews at Wesley, Little Rock; Parsonage at White; ceiling at Hunter; complete renovation of church at Cotton Plant; new paint and other repairs at Lonoke; inside painting at Marianna; painting at Clarendon; repairs at Batesville.

Special Revival Services played an important role this year. Financial reports are in advance of last year in most instances. Generally, marked progress is felt throughout the district. However, we deplore the common state of affairs, namely failure of our churches to attract new members and to hold those it already has.

Also, noticeably lacking is efficiency in leadership- general and Sunday School.

Our hopes and goal for the future are:
United giving and service,

Ministers and all Christian workers being very close- The W. S. C. S. is armed for service and can work wonders through its consecrated efforts. We pray for "the tie that binds" for all forces within our reach.

All interests of the General Church continue to receive our unstinted support; moral and financial.

Our District goes on record as standing wholeheartedly with our College, recognizing its influential leadership not only within our narrow bounds but its widespread benefit into the remotest recesses of our community life.

Pastors reports reflect in a small way the increase in knowledge of and respect for the various institutions of the Conference and Church. Recognition of each Special Day is recommended and encouraged.

The Sick: This year the parsonages of Brothers Tyus, Nunn,

Perry, and S. N. Thomas have been visited by serious illness.

FORT SMITH DISTRICT

Bishop Jones and Members of the Southwest Conference of the Methodist Church I beg leave to submit my 4th annual report as District Superintendent of the Fort Smith district of the above named church.

Territory of Charges

At the session of the last Conference there were thirteen churches taken from this District thereby greatly reducing the territory of travel. These churches became a part of the Texarkana District. We think the action was timely and beneficial. We have now nineteen charges of thirty-one churches.

Disturbances and Mis-Placements

We started out with eighteen Conference men and one supply pastor. J. E. Adams in the month of May left his work due to finance conditions, and went to work on the defense program.

S. P. Branch had one church in the defense area the congregation has moved out.

J. W. Winston was also in the defense area, lost both of his congregations and one of his churches was taken over by the Governor. Death entered our ranks and took the wife of B. F. Wynn of Ft. Smith, there by giving a cause of great set back in his program. P. W. Webb has recently transferred to the N. C. Conference. The defense program has greatly hampered much of our work on the district this year.

Personal Labor

I have held practically a quarterly conference on the remaining charges, four times this year, held two District Conferences one Institute, made two trips to Nashvilles, Tenn. one to Atlanta, Georgia, one to St. Louis all at the call of the church.

We held three D. V. B. Schools, all were a decided success.

Personal Labor of Pastors

Fayetteville under the pastorage of A. C. Cabean has made some progress this year installing modern conveniences in the parsonage and beautified the church. He comes with an increase of his report over last year. At Van Buren W. H. D. Bright still hold the inviable record of being the leading pastor of the district (Northern Division) At Fort Smith B. W. Wynn after having served half the year under a handicap of sickness has become master of the situation and has things well in hand.

At Morrilton J. Stokes has labored very hard with some degree of success.

At Conway P. H. Myers has been able to make some degree of increase over last year.

At North Little Rock, W. L. Cole has done an extra fine piece of work in paying and straighting out the church taxes, and indebtedness.

At Panky addition M. L. Strong has labored very hard and will have a very good report.

At Little Maumelle M. L. Brooks has done a splendid job this year. He has done some improvements on church and parsonage, and comes with an increase in his report over last year.

At Danville, with one church out and also an accident in car wreck that put Branch in the hospital for two weeks, he comes with a good report.

At HotSprings, J. H. Ellis has put in a year of labor, and will have an increase in his report of last year.

At Murfreesboro, C. H. Brooks comes with a fine report and increase over last year.

At Nashville I. P. Parker has made effort to build a church but has failed.

At Clow A. L. Buckhanan is in the process of building a church. He and his congrration have worked together in a fine way. And the results are telling.

At Paraloma, P. W. Webb sends good report.

At Lockesburg, W. H. Hanna has done great work. He has beautified one of his churches, has money raised to beautify the other. He came with an increase in his report.

At Foreman, H. Albright has build a nice church and the cost seven Hundred Dollars with a small membership practi-

cally clear of debt and comes with a great increase in his report this year.

J. W. Winston has had it very hard this year. All the year he has been disturbed through the defense program and eventually had to move out with no place to go. I trust some aid will be given to him form the Board of Home Mission at this Conference.

This District is rich with young life.

There are sixteen Juniors and high schools in the confines or its territorys and more than five hundred young people in-attendance of the same. With one hundred and sixty eight attending various Colleges through out the land.

Between the ages of one to thirteen we have 591.

Between the ages of thirteen and twenty three we have two hundred and twelve. This group of young people raised for conference claims three hundred sixty eight dollars this year and these young people have policy of church activities. They pledge to raise six hundred dollars for district funds this year. The youth, assisted in paying the District Superintendent's house rent this year. They raised \$75. 00 toward this claim. And pledge to pay adminstration expenses this year.

WOMAN SOCIETY AND LAYMEN

The woman Society under the leadership of Mrs. Jettie Ware has made much progress this year, It is organized in each charge and pledge to pay the District Supt. house rent. The Laymen staged a District Black and White Social and at this Social a pledge for the next years, budget was taken and the money raised went to the Pastors for Annual Conference Entertainment. This was a decided success. We think this movement on the part of the Laymen will prove to be of great success.

Slowly, but surely the hour has come again, when we may comfort ourselves—in climbing the step-ladder to a musical height to echo the sweet, comforting sounds of our gospel hymns. It would be joy and comfort, as well as a privilege for every delegate and visitor—should we join in singing that conference hymn of Charles Welley, a line of which follows—And are we yet alive—of course, there could well be reservation on the third verse—not for pastors, effective District Superintendents, or even Bishops, only retiring District Superintendents, can sing—"What troubles have we seen, What conflicts have we passed, Fightings without, and fears within.

It is, therefore, with a tinge of regret and satisfaction that I present this my sixth-annual report, "Parting is sometimes sweet sorrow."

It has been a real joy to work with you. The splendid response you have given and the fine cooperation you have shown toward the plans suggested as our program and procedure is proof of your loyalty. Your faithfulness in giving and serving has stabilized our organization and made possible the realization of those ideals and purposes conceived and adopted 6 years ago.

This report is continued in the presentation of the organization and survey of the charges

The District Staff of Christian Education is composed of the District Superintendent, the District Director of children, work, the district director of youth work, the district director of the adult work. And with such other associate members as may be needed from time to time. This organization promotes meetings, fellowship and training opportunities on a district basis for both, the youth and adult.

There is in reality a District Woman's Society of Christian Service organized on the district. In our judgement, we can have no Woman's Society of Christian Service until it is organized. And unless the organization continues to do as much for each of the interests involved in the new organization as it did under the separate administrations, our local work suffers a great loss and the status of our conference will become much lower than it is at the present time.

The purpose of our district organization of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, is to unite all the Societies in the district in an earnest effort to promote the work of Christian living and service, and help develop and support Christian work throughout the conference and around the world. The Society has this year raised and reported promptly its General Jurisdictional apportionments, also the asking for Conference and district cultivation. It has given special attention to Philander Smith College and Gulfside. This may be realized some time in this conference. The Society has accepted and placed in its 1941-42 Budget the District apportionment for Conference Claimants and will assume an apportionment for Gulfside.

In the District Youth Fellowship, the youth of the district is united beyond the local church to help lift the load of man-

kind and preserve their Spiritual heritage. The whole body of youth is enlisted for this purpose and we feel that it is an important achievement for our youth. For missionary support the youth of the Oklahoma District will not separate themselves from the District Conference, They endeavor, through their continued fellowship to weave both youth and adult into a unit of purpose, other wise unattainable. New powers will arise out of this great fellowship and co-operation. From it will be born a new and enlarged and contagious Spirit of loyalty that will give great impetus to the whole youth program.

In our financial efforts to strengthen our youth organization Major R. R. Wright banker in Philadelphia and, father of Bishop R. R. Wright of the Thirteenth Episcopal District of the A. M. E. Church gave the youth his personal check for ten dollars. The youth has accepted the district's apportionment for Philander Smith College to be raised by the youth organization in each local church. There is no reason to doubt the loyal support of our youth.

The District Laymans Association

This organization with the Staff of Education agreed at the last session of the District Conference to hold three; two-days, cultivation meetings on the District in the conference year 1941-42, as maybe suggested by the District Superintendent.

We set the example for such meeting in our last cultivation meeting held at Tulsa, Okla. and in the District Conference at Boley. wherein both the youth and adults may be brought into 2 or more days study of the whole program of the Church.

In the meeting held at Tulsa, Mrs. M. F. Strong, the Conference President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and Prof. J. H. Touchstone, the Conference President of Lay Activities were invited and did attend and conducted the Seminar. The wrinkles were all ironed out of our thinking and smoothed to harmony, as the problems were solved in the Woman's Society of Christian Service. The work of the Society this year will vindicate this statement.

We left both the Cultivation meeting and the District Conference with a hopeful feeling of a brighter future for the Layman not only in the district but throughout the conference, because of the service rendered by Prof. J. H. Touchstone, the

Conference Lay Leader. He has won the confidence of all those who know him, as one who at all times is willing to give his strength to the weak; his substance to the poor; his sympathy to the suffering and his heart to God.

We are grateful to both of these conference offices for coming to us, the first we have had to come to Masidonia. We speak with Tennyson-- "Their strength is as the strength of ten, Because their hearts are pure.

Survey of Charges

In the survey of the district is found that among the most difficult problems is where we have no Denominational competition and where our church is made up of many members of other denominations. The churches: Altus, Anadarko, Colbert. Crecent, Depew, Seminole, and Wynnewood.—Crecent is the exception in this case and reveals the fact, that even though there is much in the land there is so much in the man.

And now, we take you to Altus:— during my tenure we have had six pastors: Brother Paul Prewitt who retired after the first year and soon afterward passed. brother S. P. Lewis one year; he is now with the C. M. E. Church, brother Arthur Cox two years, brother A. L. Woodard three months, and brother E. M. Johnson. Altus is one of our opportunity fields——

Anadarko: -- Brother Willis Johnson served this work the first four years with the largest group of young people organized and working--- brother E. M. Johnson one half of the fifth year---- Brother Woodard will make the report for this year.

Arcadia:--- Brother O. G. Moss served this charge the first year before his retirement, brother L. S. Shaw two years and brother Willis Johnsons for the last three years--

Colbert:-- brother Nathan Coburn was appointed to this work the first year, brother L. S. Shaw the second year, then the work was put with Hugo Grant for three years. brother E. L. Steward will make the report for this year.--

Depew: C. R. Cragg a supply, C. L. Kyles a supply, who is now in the A. M. E. Church, and Sister Cora Wade supply and who will make the report.

Seminole:--Shawnee: Dr. P. W. Webb served the first two years

Brother A. L. Woodard two years and brother Cox one year at Seminole and at Shawnee.

Davis Circuit: this work was served by brother M. H. Thompson, brother P. H. Myers and brother Willis Johnson. This is one of our best opportunity fields.—

Chelsea, Grand River and Vinita: Brother Row served Vinita the first year, after he transferred back to the Central West Conference, brother W. H. Wright 2 years, and brother N. M. Riley an accepted supply two years Brother L. S. Shaw was appointed to the work last.

Grand River had only one pastor through-out my tenure. brother N. M. Riley. Brother W. H. Wright has served Chelsea for the last five years.

Guthrie-Oak Grove: Dr. D. G. Franklin has served this work the whole of my tenure.

Hugo-Grant:- Brother M. H. Thompson, and brother E. L. Steward have served this work.

Muskogee:- has had five pastors; three the first year.- only brother Guiden, Griffen and Smith have rendered any service. served this work, three years each.

Okiahoma City:-Dr. B. W. Wynn and C. K. Brown have served this work three years each

Tulas: with the exception of the time Dr. J. N. Wallace was passing by Muskogee and Dr. C. K. Brown getting to Demone h, Dr. Wallace has served this work.

Okmulgee — Brother W. M. Green has served this work the six years.

Porter-Eufaula:-Has had only two pastors, Brother, S. E. Johnson and brother M. L. Brooks. Brother J. M. Smith has helped the District Superintendent look after the work this year.

Purcell:- Brother Arthur Cox one year and brother Nathan Coburn the last five years.

Wewoka: Brother E. M. Johnson and brother G. V. Cavit and the Dist. Supt. have kept the work alive.

REPORT OF TEXARKANA DISTRICT

To the Bishop and Brethren of the Southwest Conference now in session in Warren Chapel Methodist Church Ardore, Aklahoma.

I am pleased to be here and present to you my first Annual Report as District Superintendent of the Texarkana District. This has been a year of many hardships and deprivations with both pastors and people, and yet in the face of these conditions, all the pastors have wrought well under the circumstances.

The Texarkana District is about 200 miles long by 100 miles wide. We have in this territory 28 organized churches with three mission points. With a membership of 1365. We have 27 church schools with 725 pupils and 12 Youth Fellowship organizations with 235 members. We have urged the Pastors to give special attention to the young people and their organizations in the local church. We have organized on our District two former Protestant Churches with a member-ship of 150 with a constituent roll of 50 or more. We have visited all the churches in the District and preached or lectured as we thought best for the occasion.

During my quarterly conference rounds I have given strict attention to all of the oranizations in the local churches. Such as Lay-Activity, Woman's Society of Christian Service, Brotherhood and the Youth Fellowship Council. We have urged personal Evangelism in the local church and community. We have also urged that the Pastors give more attention to the members in their churches who are on the inactive list. The Report from the Pastors will show an increase along all lines over last year. No Pastor on the District! has an easy place. Each charge

has its special difficulties. I note with special interest and great sympathy, the earnestness and faithfulness of the Pastors on the District in the face of such low salaries. I urge the people to give better support to their pastors.

Mr. Chairman and Brethren, since the church of God is one Divine Agency for bringing men and women and boys and girls into the Kingdom of God her success must be measured by souls won for Christ and his Kingdom. The work of instructing and training our young people for membership in the Church and how to give Christian Service in the community is the prime feature of our Institute Work on the District.

During the month of August we had a very fine Institute and District Conference at Lewisville, Arkansas. We held 2 Vacation Bible Schools with an enrollment of 230 children and adults.

Now Bishop and Brethren of the Conference, we are sorry that we have not done more for God and his Church. But we rejoice in all that God has wrought within us and by us, and we are trying to help him build up his Kingdom on earth. Among the Sons of men. STANDING RULES FOR THE SOUTHWEST CONFERENCE

1. Nominations: The District Superintendents shall be a standing committee on nominations and shall nominate all members of the quadrennial and annual boards, commissions and committees except where they are otherwise provided for.

2. Conference Program: The pastor-Host of the Conference, the District Superintendent in whose District the Conference is held, the chairman of the Commission on Evangelism and the chairmen of the several conference board shall constitute a committee on Conference Program. This committee shall arrange, not less than sixty days before the conference meets, for all preaching, inspirational and anniversary services. The program made by this committee shall be subject to revision as the exigencies of any situation may require or the conference direct.

3. Undergraduates: Undergraduates who remain in the same class more than two successive years or who absent themselves from the school for undergraduates held annually at Philander Smith College without securing excuse in advance will be discontinued or located unless they are in school. Extraordinary circumstances and a two-third vote of the Conference will be necessary to over ride this rule.

4. District Superintendents Salary. The District Superintendents' Salary shall be estimated and apportioned by the District Stewards under the Chairmanship of the District Superintendent of each District in a meeting called for that purpose early in the Conference year.

5. Lay Delegates: Lay Delegates to the annual Conference shall be elected annually.

6. Financial and Statistical: (1) All Conference assessments and all reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars with no columns for cents. (2) Each pastor shall settle with the Conference Treasurer and turn over his statistical report not later than the first day of the Conference, provided this report must correspond with the treasurer's report.

The District Superintendents shall furnish the Statistical Secretary with all assessments on pastoral charges not less than sixty days before the annual Conference meets.

7. Reports and resolutions: All reports resolution and other papers intended for the Conference minutes shall be typewritten and in triplicate.

8. Conference Expense Fund: The Conference Commission On World Service and Finance shall make an assesment for a Conference Expense Fund to cover the cost of all Clerical work necessary in preparing Conference records, printing, and distributing the Conference minutes, for preserving the Conference records and Documents, for Auditing Accounts, and all legitimate expense incurred by the Conference Secretary and the Conference Treasurer in carrying out the orders of the Conference. The Conference Treasurer shall be the Custodian of this Fund which shall be paid out on the order of the Conference Secretary.

9. Auditing Accounts. The audit of accounts of the funds as provided for in paragraph 801 of the Discipline shall be done by certified public accountants sufficiently in advance of the Conference session to have its report published in the Conference Journal.

10. These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided that th proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing a day before the vote is taken.
