The Southwest Annual Conference of The Methodist Church convened in the Eighty-first Annual Session at Quayle Methodist Church, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Bishop Matthew W. Clair, Jr., presided over the opening session.

Bishop Clair addressed the Ministerial and Lay delegates of the Conference with much emphasis upon the responsibility of each as it relates to the call and service to the Ministry and Christian Stewardship.

The character of each District Superintendent was passed and the

report of each Pastor read.

Bishop Clair admonished Pastors and Laymen for the tremendous neglect in regard to the total Stewardship program of the Conference, which resulted in an increasing deficit in the accepted budget for the year, over against the previous year.

BUSINESS SESSION:

Organization: The Conference was called to order by Bishop Clair. ROLL CALL:

The Conference Secretary called the roll of Effective Elders, Retired Elders, Ministers on Trial, and Approved Supply Pastors.

The requests to be excused from the sessions of the Conference for illness, other legitimate reasons were presented from the following:

Allbright, Hilliard A.; Hanna, William H.; Holland, Simmie P.; London, Harlon P.; Neal, Benjamin F.; and Thompson, Lewis T. The excuses were accepted and received unanimous approval.

The Conference stood in silence while Bishop Clair offered prayer. OFFICIAL PROGRAM ADOPTED:

On motion of E. M. Douglas and second of A. L. Buchanan, that the printed program be adopted as the official guide of the sessions, granting changes to be made at the discretion of Bishop Clair. Motion carried. BAR OF THE CONFERENCE:

On motion of Fay Norman and second of Ira A. Pointer, the bar of the Conference was fixed to include the first three rows across the Sanctuary. Bishop Clair arbitrarily made the motion to include another row to eliminate crowded conditions.

On motion of C. G. Tillmon and second of W. H. D. Bright; Cortelyou C. Hall was elected Official Reporter to the Local Press, Methodist Information, and The Central Christian Advocate.

The Committee on Courtesy recommended R. J. Tolbert, Jr. to replace Edwin C. Sanders on the Committee. Recommendation accepted.

In the absence of a representative from The Methodist Publishing House, Bishop Clair presented the Conference a check in the amount of \$1,865.18, which represents the Conference's share in the profits of the publishing interests of The Methodist Church. The Secretary was authorized to write a letter of THANKS.

The character of Cleveland G. Tillmon was passed by the Ministerial delegates after which he read The Composite Report of The District Superintendents. (See Report) On motion of Clifton Mitchell and second of W. H. D. Bright that the report be adopted and become a part of the Conference Journal; and that an expression of gratitude be tendered the Superintendents. Motion carried.

CONVOCATION ON URBAN LIFE IN AMERICA, 1958

Mimeographed copies of the report of The Conference Committee on Urban Life were distributed. College, Pine Bluff, Arkansas, to resume his teaching duties. Bishop Clair stated that each Minister is required to attend the sessions of the Conference; and that he is to remain throughout, unless he, personally, asks permission of the Conference.

The report of The Commission on World Service and Finance was made by Milton A. Lawson. The report was prefaced, verbally, with a detailed statement of the apparent negligence of Ministers and Laymen to meet adequately our Stewardship obligations and the importance of our loyalty to all of the causes accepted in the adoption of the report of the Commission at the sessions of the Conference at Fort Smith, Arkansas, June 13-16, 1957.

Mimeographed copies of the report were given all delegates. The recommendations (only) were read by Milton A. Lawson, who moved the adoption of the same. Motion carried. (See Report) Bishop Clair advised that all deficits be applied to Charges wherein incurred from year to year.

Fay Norman spoke words of praise to Brother Lawson and the members of the Commission on World Service and Finance for the very detailed manner in which the Budget was presented and pro rated.

In accordance with Paragraph 686, Discipline of The Methodist Church, 1956, the District Superintendents were granted permission to hold District Conferences within the Conference year 1958-1959. Decision unanimous.

Elliott M. Douglas questioned the power of speech, and 'etc' granted Approved Supply Pastors (Paragraph 622, Discipline of The Methodist Church, 1956). Bishop Clair advised that the contents of said paragraph had been ruled unconstitutional by the Judicial Council of The Methodist Church.

Bishop Clair requested Negail R. Riley to be present at the Saturday afternoon session to be read into Full Membership of the Conference.

Carter L. Watson was requested to convene the Committee on Conference Relations immediately at the close of the afternoon session.

Maceo D. Pembroke was requested to convene the members of the Commission on Higher Education with Dr. M. Lafayette Harris at five o'clock this afternoon.

The report of The Board of Education was made by Clinton Anderson, Chairman, Mimeographed copies were given to each delegate. The recommendations (only) were read. Bishop Clair asked the acceptance of

substitute recommendations for numbers 1 and 2 as is found on the mimeographed report. On motion of Clinton Anderson, the report was received and adopted with the substitution of the aforementioned recommendations. Motion carried. (See Report)

SECTION VI - COMPOSITE REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

And are we yet alive, And see each others face. Glory and praise to Jesus give, For His redeeming grace. What troubles have we seen, What conflicts have we passed Fightings without, and fears within, Since we assembled last. But out of all the Lord Hath brought us by His love And still He doth His help afford, And hides our life above.

This was the familiar hymn of our forefathers as they met in the annual meeting. Great was their rejoicing, as they came up from all sections of the country to fellowship and give an account of their stewardship.

Today we are most grateful to them for such a rich heritage, and

praise God for the blessings we enjoy.

As we begin this annual meeting, we are conscious that our ministerial rank has been broken. Those missing are: C. H. Brooks, G. F. Tipton, P. H. Kelley and Willis D. Johnson. We commit their families to God's care and keeping.

Bishop Clair and members of the Southwest Annual Conference, I feel honored to have the privilege of bringing to you the composite report of the

district superintendents.

We are now midway in this quadrennium. A most significant spot to evaluate the past, set goals for the future and formulate plans for reaching these goals. The Emphases of this quadrennium is most appropriate for meeting the needs of this day and time. July 12, 1956 - the official body of the St. Louis Area met at headquarters to plan methods of projecting this idea for the four years ahead. There, workshops covering eight of the Area emphases were set up, and an intensive two day study was diligently pursued.

Our report is based on recommendations growing out of this workshop.

NUMBER 1 -- THE LOCAL CHURCH --

An excerpt from the document of The Inter-board Commission on The Local Church: reads -- and I quote "We seek a creative Christian Program which will cause each church member to experience such dedicated and trained relationship to Jesus Christ and His Church, that God can use him for a more perfect realization of His purpose in every area of personal and social living; and that others may be brought to join in this active fellowship, prepared to co-operate with all Christians toward achieving a Christian World Community." unquote. Guidance material for basic study, "The Self Study Guides Toward a more effective Church" and the Kit of five booklets on the Four Commissions and one committee, were systematically distributed and studied.

first..... EVANGELISM

As we review the recommendations from the Area meeting, we feel that some progress has been made in affirming the Christian Faith, through the "Four Nights for God" series, Youth Christian Witness Missions, Prayer Vigils, Workshops and other services at all levels. Results are; persons received through profession of faith; 112 preparatory members on roll, 515 Total. Full members - 4,949, but as we check potentials, we are not satisfied with the totals. There is much to do if we are to help bring this great Church's bud to glorious flower. Now the question is, "What Makes A Church Great?" The answer requires a two way observation. First, the Outward Look: Acts 5:29 "But Peter and the apostles answered we must obey God rather than men." The we, were laymen. The distinctive thing about these laymen was not their training or profession. It was a vision and Conviction. A vision of God's will for them in Jesus Christ, a conviction that they had been appointed by God to take the news of that vision to all men everywhere.

Second, the Inward Look: There is nothing spectacular about this. It is as common and as beautiful as sunshine. It's application is far wider than the activities of the church, too. Every expert political leader knows it to be true. That is why he builds up an organization that reaches personally into every home in his territory. We would not say that his motive is exactly that of imparting "some spiritual gift", but we will say, that he knows that an individual must feel like he belongs to the party. It is a sad day for any church when it ceases to be a community of concern, and

is satisfied to become a great institution.

Actually there is a personal question to be faced in all this. Can the church count on me to accept my responsibility in the job of being a responsible member of a community of concern?

EDUCATION

Paragraph 1396 of the discipline makes it mandatory that we maintain a functioning commission on education in each local church. Under the direction of the conference board of education, we have seen progress in some phases of Christian education and fallen short in some because of financial deficits and personnel. Rev. Edwin C. Sanders, the executive secretary of the conference board, with volunteer service of staff members, has been quite busy this year, supervising and holding Christian Workers' Schools, Workshops, Conferences and Institutes.

We have 23 Vacation Church Schools reported. Enrollment in Youth camps are slightly increasing. At this point we should like to emphasize the need for a special effort in recruiting Youth and Youth counselors for the Convocation being held at Jefferson City, Missouri, Lincoln University, August 4-8, 1958. The Wesley Foundation Work and Methodist Student Organizations need strengthening. It is anticipated that through the T.V. series and other methods, adult work will take on a more vigorous expres-

sion.

HIGHER EDUCATION

One of the approved recommendations in the Area meeting was "The Annual Conference Committee," in cooperation with the president of the Area College and the Executive Secretary of Conference Board of Education, develop a plan of closer working relations whereby the college may work with local churches; thus giving the local churches opportunity to better understand the college, and the college to better understand some of the problems of the local church. When the General Conference adopted the emphases upon Higher Education it declared: "The Church Universal lives and labors under the compulsion of the great commission," "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, Teaching them to observe all that I

have commanded you. "

The Church is in the world to capture the hearts of men and to make them faithful disciples of the Nazarene and also to capture their minds and establish them in the truth that leads to abundant and unending life. By Missions and Evangelism we extend the frontiers of the kingdom. By Education, we build the City of God. Our institutions of learning are the church's indispensable bulwarks against the encroaching tide of secularism and unbelief. The church must continue to look principally to her own educational institutions for trained leadership. We fear the Southwest Conference is lagging behind in this new trend of developing support for our church college. (Philander Smith.) It is grievous that some non-Methodists are coming to have a higher appreciation of our Methodist School than some of our own members. We are no longer poor. There is less reason for us to be ignorant. What we really want in our hearts, we can have. There is money, ability and other resources to undergird our school strongly and permanently, if we are dedicated enough and imaginative enough to find the way. We therefore recommend, that we dedicate ourselves especially to the task of developing an organized church wide effort to support and strengthen the Education and Expansion program of Philander Smith College.

MISSIONS

As the board of Missions program reaches the local congregation through the commission on missions and other avenues, we are awakened to the larger Out-reach of the church. It is sad that this area of concern as a local commission has not been developed as fully as could be. Few churches have a working commission on Missions and yet it is through this commission that world Christian Fellowship is promoted. We rely heavily

on the Woman's Society for information and inspiration through the study courses. Mrs. C.G. Washington, conference president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and her staff of loyal workers, (from conference officers to the individual member of the local society) have worked faithfully in supporting this program. We are grateful to the women of our church, and solicit their continued support as we seek to co-ordinate the total program within the local church. We wish to thank the Board of Mission and Church Extension, and the St. Louis area for aiding Locksburg and Anadarka in retaining their church property.

Other building and improvement to the total cost of \$33,896, can be accounted for in Murfreesboro, Danville, Maumell, Purcell, Okmulgee,

Tulsa, Guthrie, Crescent, Langston, Wewoka, Oklahoma City.

Churches and parsonages in the process of building are, Brown's Chapel, Little Rock; Springfield, Marks Chapel, Pankeys addition, and Wesley Chapel, Little Rock.

The pastors will report in full the work accomplished at the above

named places.

SOCIAL CONCERNS

Here lies vital issues close to the hearts of every Christian and a majority of non-Christians. We are living under constant pressure from within and without. Individually and collectively, Nationally and Internationally. It is our responsibility to help conform Christ like attitudes and approaches to the various problems we face.

We therefore recommend highly the organizing of Christian Social Relations Committees in each local church and these committees working

closely with the conference organization on all issues.

STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCE

Stewardship is the practical expression of one's experience of God. Therefore, all one's life, all personal abilities, and all material resources constitute a gift from God, which should be used for His glory and for the welfare of mankind. Statement from the General Board of Lay Activities material, Quote: "A new day is dawning for the church in the realm of financial support. Perhaps it would be more accurate to say that, A New Day "COULD" dawn. Always in matters relating to the human side of Christian Endeavor, there is a big "IF". The conditional phase is usually due to our willingness to accept workable plans and to follow through on them. Unquote.

We have the organizations and the stated responsibility of the organization but, like the young man who addressed Jesus with the question "What lack I yet?", we are not willing to sell what we have and follow the Master. If we could first GIVE OURSELVES, the financial dilemna we face could be

taken care of satisfactorily.

As we come to the close of this year, after evaluating the past we now look ahead. Beginning last March and continuing until March 1959, the particular stress in the local church emphasis in Methodism's quadrennial

program is upon EXPANSION.

There is the continuing challenge of our Lord to make disciples and to be witnesses unto Him. As local churches face their responsibility in this emphasis, the general boards and agencies especially related to this phase of the quadrennial program are anxious to help. We therefore make the following recommendations:

1. That we do a systematic job of promotion and cultivation, with Pastors and Laymen in interpreting the program and interest of the

Methodist Church.

2. That each District Superintendent rethink the grouping of churches on charges for doing the most effective job.

- 3. That the services of a conference rural worker be engaged to work where needed most.
- 4. That we take immediate steps to begin $\underline{\underline{\text{new}}}$ work in the following places:

Little Rock District: Arkadelphia and Malvin. North Little Rock District: West Memphis and Camden. Oklahoma District: Oklahoma City and Tulsa.

ANNUAL REPORT*
by Clinton Anderson
(Chairman of the Southwest Conference Board of Education)

To the Bishop, District Superintendents, Pastors, Laymen and friends of the Southwest Conference.

It is a privilege and personal pleasure as well to join with the other departments of our church in making my second annual report as chairman of the Southwest Conference Board of Education. Since serving for the past two years, I can appreciate to some degree the obligation to you of this office and I shall try to expand the work of this very important department

to the best of my ability.

From the earliest days of our civilization people have had the happy habit of teaming up to help their fellowmen. This is no less true in the history of Christianity and the Methodist Church in particular. This is a habit that has manifested itself in an endless variety of ways in a wide area of organized action reaching all the way from the family council up to the highest councils of our great church. The many essential resources and the Christian leadership that has been developed within the framework of the Methodist Church for human good is one of our greatest strengths as a church.

Within this wide area are such organized activities as those represented here in the form of committees, the Commissions, the departments of youth work, Social Concern, the Woman's Society of Christian Service and others.

All of us can take pride in the long way we as a church have come in supplying Christian leadership and meeting human needs in the form of offering enlightenment. Many of the shackles of poverty and ignorance have been broken. More and more people are finding a more rewarding and abundant way of life.

But we should think of all this, it seems to me, as only a beginning and a greater challenge. We are facing a new age which filled with complicated social and economical problems - will and is making increasing

demands for well trained Christian leadership.

One of the bulwarks on which the future of our society, (and I would say our civilization as well) must depend on an organized movement to provide Christian leadership.

The strength and effectiveness of an organized movement within our church can be no greater than that of its Key departments and commissions

on the Conference, District and local Church levels.

In keeping with the "quadrennial Emphasis" this Board accepted the challenge for a stronger program of Christian Education in the Southwest Conference.

In viewing the progress made during the 1957-1958 Conference year; and in the light of the foregoing observations, the recommendations for the ensuing year will be substantially the same, but calling for greater emphasis on church school Rally Day, cultivation and promotion and closer

coordination of the programs of the four commissions. At the Spring meeting of the Board the following recommendations were ordered sent to the cabinet:

- That a full time Executive Secretary be provided for, with minor extended duties.
- II. That further development of the Inter Board Commission (Item 2, page 11, the 1957 journal) be directed. Etc.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THIS CONFERENCE:

- 1. That each District Superintendent and Pastor be directed by the Bishop to place greater emphasis on the Cultivation and Promotion program of the following commissions on the District and local church levels:
 - a. Commission on Evangelism
 - b. Commission of Education
 - c. Commission on Missions
 - d. Commission on Stewardship and Finance
- That the relationship between church School Rally Day and a strong
 program of cultivation, promotion and interpretation be studied and
 the same degree of emphasis be placed on the observance of this
 day in every local church.
- 3. That the conference treasurer be directed to disburse these funds only for direct cultivation and promotional purposes in the form of workshops, conferences, study courses for local church officers, committee and commission chairmen, travel for the necessary personel and such clerical services that maybe required.
- 4. That the resources of Philander Smith College be used as far as possible in the program of cultivation and promotion on the District and local church levels.

In submitting these recommendations, we are thinking in the terms of the needs. We feel that an effective program of education for our particular conference must involve consideration of the total work of the church.

We team up well in dealing with conditions and problems of our immediate concern. But as a conference we must work together with the same firmness of purpose toward the ultimate goal of helping all the local churches through a program of cultivation, promotion and interpretation to reach their full potential.

BOARD OF EDUCATION REPORT

Bishop Clair, Fellow Ministers, and Laymen:

Certainly, it is with immeasurable gratitude that I, now, give account of my stewardship for the year now ended. Life offers no one a richer joy than of serving his fellowmen. Again, it has been my pleasure to travel over what has seemingly been an endless trail, facing the blistering sun of Summer; the enchantment of Autumn; the bleak and frosty chill of Winter; and the alluring charm of Spring.

The 'second mile' of my travels was absorbed with much enthusiasm in realization of the acceptance of our responsibility and needs by the Cabinet, Ministers, and Laymen during the trials and shipwreck of our

'maiden voyage'.

I am debtor to each of you, and, herewith, express my sincerest gratitude for your vision of meeting our needs in Christian Education as it relates to the Quadrennial Emphasis on The Local Church.

The Conference Staff of Division Workers, which is on a volunteer basis, though faced with many limitations, each of them has wrought well, and are deserving of much praise in such manner as they have been able to serve

Promotion and Cultivation:

Camping: Again, we have majored in these enterprises as an area of widening relationships and making Christian Witness the answer to 'The Burning Thirst' of our Youth. Each of these enterprises: The Oklahoma District Camp at Camp Turner Falls; The Christian Adventure Camp, and The Senior-Older Youth Assembly at Camp Aldersgate, made reports which were indicative of much growth and a desire to stand up and be counted in the approaching ecumenical trends.

Workshops, Coaching Conferences, and Christian Workers' Schools:

Each District of the Conference has had one or more Workshops on the various age levels. Resource personnel has been secured from General Board Staffs and Conference Workers to adequately interpret the total program of Christian Education. There were 712 persons who registered for and attended such training enterprises within the Conference year.

We are appreciative of the fellowship of The South Central Jurisdiction Methodist Youth Fellowship Workshop, Mount Sequoyah, Fayetteville, Arkansas. There were four Youths and one Adult Worker with Youth

who attended.

There were four Christian Workers' Schools, on the one-teacher level, conducted during the months of September and October, and three during the month of February. Mrs. Lula M. Tillmon was the Instructor for the September-October schools. The choice of her by the Department of Leadership Education, is truly the answer to our many prayers for certified leadership at home.

Leadership Education:

As a means of meeting the great need of leadership personnel within the Conference, we have striven to expand our program of recruitment. To this end, we have noted a gradual increase in the persons who have become certified.

Wherein the above totals do not give us an adequate quota to meet the needs of the Local Churches, we rejoice as we note progress in this area. Recommendations:

In the light of a continually mounting awareness on the part of 'key persons' of the Conference in regard to the effectiveness of an active program of Christian Education, I herewith submit the following:

(a) That we conduct an extensive program of 'leadership' recruitment,

(b) That each Local Church will plan to have at least one (1) certified Instructor.

(c) That each Local Church will set as a goal the organization or reactivation of a Methodist Youth Fellowship.

(d) That there will be strict observance of and emphasis placed upon all Special Days of the Christian calendar.
 (e) That the Southwest Conference will encourage and provide

their Youth quota for The Saint Louis Area Youth Convocation, Lincoln University, Jefferson City, Missouri, August 4-8,1958.

(f) That Church School Rally Day (September 28, 1958) shall be observed by all Churches of the Conference. Further, that each District Superintendent and Pastor shall do everything to dramatically present the same.

(g) That the Conference provide funds and select, at least, one family to represent the Conference at the Third Methodist National Conference on Family Life, Conrad Hilton Hotel,

Chicago, Illinois, October 17-19, 1958.

(h) That there shall be a co-ordination or responsibility of all agencies related to the Inter-Board Commission and the Board of Education.

Again, in a sense of deep humility, I say THANKS to each of you for your contribution of talent and leadership ability to the program of Christian Education.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE DIRECTOR OF ADULT WORK

By the authority of the General Conference of the Methodist Church, the Department of Christian Education of Adults issues plans and policies for

the church's program. (para. 231-244)

There is no pre-determined program of activities handed down to groups that comprise the adult divisions of local church schools. Each group should develop its program of activities in keeping with the principles and procedures underlying program development presented in the manual "Adult Work in the Church School" #4500-BC.

This manual gives guidance to the ongoing program of adult work in

and beyond the local church.

We have tried to interpret this work at every available opportunity. How well we've succeeded remains yet to be seen. Like apostles of old, we can plant and water but the increase comes from God.

Personnel or Co-Workers: 3 - District Directors; 14 - Sub District Directors. Yet to be compiled - the number of superintendents of adult div.

local, adult classes, total enrollment of adults.

A great need at this point is to involve more persons. This can be done by organizing The Conference and/or District Council of Adult Workers.

Our goal is to help local churches become Redemptive Fellowships, rather than institutions. Means and methods used for achieving this goal will be cultivation and training opportunities for adult leaders.

Training opportunities already scheduled:

SPECIAL REPORT ON PHILANDER SMITH COLLEGE FROM THE QUAD-RENNIAL COMMISSION OF CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION AND THE

CONFERENCE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Philander Smith College faces a glorious future. It has witnessed a magnificent achievement during the past 20 years in the improvement of its Physical Plant, its Faculty, the high quality of its Educational Programs, the number of students served, and the role it has played in serving the Church through its graduates, faculty, and students. Philander Smith College faces a magnificent challenge for rendering agreater service to the Church, to our young people, and to our Nation as it embarks upon the first stage of a most significant Development Program. This Program will not only sustain the High Quality of Education and Academic Accreditation which the College now enjoys in orders that its future services may be increasingly effective, but it will also increase the service which the College can render the Conferences and the Local Churches, and enable the College to serve 500 additional students.

But Philander Smith definitely stands at the crossroads. The first stage of the Development Program which should be completed in time for use in September, 1959, calls for an expenditure of \$1,500,000. The last \$300,000 of this amount must be raised within the next 12 months. Sensing this Opportunity and Challenge, the following recommendations are submitted for Annual Conference action:

1. We recommend that each Local Church will lead its membership in to full compliance with par. 2018 of the 1956 Discipline by reporting the asking of the General Church of at least \$1 per member, annually, for the support of Christian Higher Education at Philander Smith College, and that these funds be reported to the Conference Treasurer earmarked "For Christian Higher Education at Philander Smith." We further recommend that each Local Church comply with the 1956 Disciplinary request on Race Relations Sunday (Par. 250, Section 3).

2. We recommend that a series of Fund Raising Institutes be conducted throughout the Conference to be scheduled at the discretion of the Bishop and his Cabinet, preference being given to the period September 1 - November 15, 1958; and that the services of the American Campaign Services, Inc., currently retained by action of the Board of Trustees of the College be used in these Institutes.

3. In view of the widespread success of the Religious Extension Summer Services Program provided by the College (some twenty-two young people have already been signed up to work for 8 weeks each, on Districts and in Local Churches of the Area for 1958), and in view of action by this Conference authorizing such Program at the 1957 session, we strongly recommend that District Superintendents, Conference Executive Secretaries, and Local Churches make wider use of these resources by filing requests for the use of such students not later than February 1, preceding.

- 4. We strongly recommend a persistent and systematic implementation of a program of Student Recruiting on an Annual Conference, District, and Local Church basis.
- 5. We recommend Conference-wide Observance of National Christian College Day as promoted by The National Council of Churches 3rd Sunday in April.

6. In view of the present status of the Philander Smith College Development Program, we recommend that the Campaign effort for Philander Smith College be declared a "State of Emergency."

7. We strongly urge that each District Superintendent will have a Workshop on Christian Higher Education at the District Conferences, and that use be made of 'key' persons on the District and persons from the College. We further recommend that this be done in the Woman's Society of Christian Service School of Missions, Laymen's Retreats, and other Conference-wide meetings.

8. We recommend that the Commission on Education in each Local Church make wider use of films, slides and other Audio-Visual Aids produced by the College in presenting the needs and services of the College.

9. We further re-affirm the recommendations as were made in Part III of the Report of 1957. (A reprint of the same follows herewith.)

RECOMMENDATIONS -

1. We recommend a strong Program of Cultivation and Interpretation of the facts regarding the total Program of Christian Higher Education and Philander Smith College to the people of our Conference. We suggest a series of Seminars and Institutes in larger centers, at which time films of the Work be shown and "Workshop" groups organized. We recommend that appraisional Meetings be held at night following "Workshops" in order that Christian Education may be held up in such way as to make its contribution the Evangelization of the world through a trained Christian leadership.

2. We recommend wider use of students from Philander Smith College a Program of Religious Education on the District level and in Local Charches during the summer months. The College has consented to provide special training for such persons, and a Scholarship of \$200 per person for each 8-week period of service. We ask that all requests for these summer workers be filed with the President of the College not later than February 1 for the Summer succeeding. The College also provides such help to Churches within commuting distance of the Campus during the regular school session. We further recommend that plans for using students during regular session be worked out by the College and the Conference Board of Education.

3. We recommend use of the members of the Faculty and Staff of Philander Smith by District Superintendents and Local Churches wherever their services may be needed. We strongly recommend the plan for utilization of students where requested to do so recommended in 2, above and call upon our District Superintendents, our Conference Executive Secretary, and our Pastors to provide opportunities for making wider use of these students who must become the leaders of the Church in the days ahead.

4. We recommend that a Committee on Wills, Legacies, and Insurance on behalf of Educational Institutions be established in each Local Church for the purpose of implementing Endowment and Expansion necessary

to give permanence to our Program of Higher Education.

5. We recommend that recruitment efforts for Christian Vocations be redoubled in each Local Church and in each District of the Conference, in order to meet the growing needs for trained persons dedicated to full-time Christian Service. We strongly urge that these young persons be encouraged to enroll at Institutions of the Methodist Church in order to enhance the probability for commitment and training for full-time Christian service.

 We recommend the minimum giving of \$1.30 for Christian Higher Education by each Church member (\$1.00 for the College, and 30 cents for

Wesley Foundation) of the Southwest Annual Conference.

7. We recommend that all above \$3,320,00 for Annual Current Budget of Philander Smith College from the Annual Conference income be placed in the Development Program.

Willard Hotel, Washington, D. C. February 18-20, 1958

THEME: Winning The Changing City For The Changeless Christ

Bishop Clair, Ministers, and Laymen:

We proudly report the inspiration in fellowship and study which was shared with upward of one thousand Methodists who represented the total scope of Methodism throughout America.

Our delegation was composed of two members of The Urban Life Committee of the Conference, one District Superintendent, and one Minister-at-

large.

The Convocation delegates were welcomed to Washington in the interest of the Baltimore, Richmond, and Washington Areas by Bishop Paul N. Garber, Richmond Area.

The structural composition of the Convocation was a series of eight Discussion Groups with the following themes:

"What the City Does to People"

"What the Effective City Church can do For People"

"Planning and Strategy"

"The Clergy and Laity in Community Life"
"Witnessing to Our Faith in Community Life"

Each of these groups had a Bishop of The Methodist Church as presiding officer. The Discussion leaders were chosen from a most able staff of Ministers, Laymen, and members of the faculties of Schools of Theology.

Bishop Matthew W. Clair, Jr. presided with maximum efficiency over Group A 2 as it related itself to each of the themes for Discussion Groups. He, along with others who presided, will long be remembered for their non-partisan decisions in regard to meeting the needs and challenge of the 'City Church - Today' and 'What of Tomorrow' in such times of community mobilization and population shifting.

tinuous construction, yet it has not reached completion.

The Celebrants of The Holy Communion were: Bishops G. Bromley Oxnam, Glenn R. Phillips, Marshall R. Reed, Eugene M. Frank, W. Earl Ledden, Matthew W. Clair, Jr., Edgar A. Love, and Paul N. Garber. The processional was filled with the richness and dignity of the Episcopacy as each of them entered the Chancel.

An estimated twelve hundred Communicants joined in the Celebration

in acceptance of the Invitation to Repentance and Confession.

As a Conference Committee, it is our prayer that we may adequately interpret the goals set forth in this Convocation, that we shall have seen them, in a major sense, a reality at the next Quadrennial Call to the Third Convocation on Urban Life in America.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE CHAIRMAN

OF TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM

Southwest Conference Oklahoma City, Oklahoma June 11-13, 1958

We conducted a workshop on visual aid, television and radio at our conference school of mission of the Woman's Society of Christian Service held at Camp Aldersgate, July, 1957. The workshop was held each evening, Monday through Thursday. Much help was given by Philander Smith College in equipment, human resources and activities. To mention a few, Mrs. Herchel Torrence, Mr. Dabbs, Dean Gillispie and many others. Forty people took part in the activities and study of the work during the week, learning to operate projectors, tape recorders and other machines and doing free-hand painting. The introductory film - "Immortal Love" was shown four times in Arkansas and three times in Oklahoma to a total number of viewers about 300. Many leaflets and tracts have been distributed through mail and otherwise. We have asked each pastor to appoint a key person to work with him to promote the T. V. ministry. Some did, but others did not. We are sorry that all did not comply.

Mrs. C.G. Tillman and I attended the television, radio and film workshop at Dallas, Texas, May 6 through 8. We received much information and encouragement. You will be hearing much about the work done in this workshop. During this session of the Conference the recommendations were: That there will be at least one person in each local church appointed by the pastor to give special attention to the T.V. ministry fund in his or here church, and that each member be asked to pay 10 cents per year to this fund; such money to be sent to the Conference Treasurer as World Service

money; but designated for the T. V. ministry.

This person or persons will also work with the Conference Commission on television, radio and film to promote good television programs and to solicit viewers to religious program.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE LAY LEADER

to

The Eighty First Session of The Southwest Annual Conference

Bishop Clair, District Superintendents, Ministers, Laymen of the

Southwest Annual Conference, Visitors and Friends -

I come before you at this time with deep humility and an awareness of the great responsibility of this position placed upon me, to make my first annual report of my stewardship as your Conference Lay Leader. This has been a good year although we have had many obstacles to overcome. In rejoicing over the many things we have been able to accomplish, let us not lose sight of the many things we have not done. I wish to thank first of all, Bishop Clair for his guidance and inspiration, the General Board of Lay Activities for instruction and information, the District Superintendents, pastors and laymen who contributed in a large measure to the joy and encouragement that has been mine in trying to direct the Lay Activities of this wonderful Conference. Words are inadequate to express my thanks and appreciation to all of you. This first year has been one of many trials. I have been, so to speak, feeling my way around trying to find the right approach to the situation. I feel that if it is my pleasure to be elected to serve another year as your Conference Lay Leader that I can render much better service.

Personal Labor -

On July 19th, 20th, 21st, 1957 it was my privilege to attend "The Second National Conference Of Methodist Men, "held at beautiful Purdue University, West Lafayette, Indiana. The theme of this great Conference was, "Workers Together With God." Its goal was to help men of Methodism through faith, vision and action to grow into better informed, more effective wholly dedicated Christian stewards. If the laymen of our Conference, especially the men could be so aroused to attend these wonderful meetings, I feel certain that we would see gratifying changes in our local churches. How can we as members of The Southwest Annual Conference be so lax towards our Lay Activities when our beloved Bishop is a guiding member of The General Board? I hope that when the next National Conference of Methodist Men is held that Bishop Clair will be proud of the delegation from our Conference. I was not able to attend The District Conference on the Oklahoma District, but from all reports they had a wonderful Conference. Thanks to Rev. Tillmon and Brother Magill. My visit to the Little Rock District Conference was one of disappointment due to the absence of the District Lay Leader and the scarcity of the Laymen. We hope that we were able to do some good with those who came. The North Little Rock District did not see fit to send me a program of their Conference. I sincerely hope that more courtesy will be shown whoever is Conference Lay Leader another year. On November the tenth 1957 I attempted to attend a meeting of Conference Lay Leaders of the Central Jurisdiction at New Orleans, Louisiana. Due to things beyond my control, I was not able to reach the appointed place in time for the meeting. The train was tied up in Baton Rouge for several hours so I had to return home disappointed. I was determined to make one of these meetings, so I contacted the Executive Secretary of the General Board of Lay Activities, Mr. R.G. Mayfield, and made arrangements to go to Atlanta, Georgia on the fifteenth of March. There were not enough of

the Conference Lay Leaders that would attend to warrant this meeting, so it had to be called off. I have seen to it that every church has been contacted through visits and correspondence. If we are to have an effective Lay Movement in our Conference, we must have the cooperation of our ministers and our laymen.

Recommendations

I. That Laymen's Day be observed in each local church with a Lay-

man as speaker. We ask our pastors to urge his church to comply.

II. That we make an effort to secure as many as five certified Lay speakers on each district and that our district superintendents use as many Lay speakers as he possibly can on his district especially where the minister comes one or two times a month.

III. That each local church extend its ministry in the community where it is, especially in this year of expansion for example, organize an outpost

church school, community prayer meetings or group study courses.

IV. That throughout the Conference "The Every Member Canvass" be made in order that we can increase our giving so that we will be able to make the ministry as attractive to young men as other vocations. V. That we organize more Methodist Men's Clubs on all districts.

Objectives of The Conference Board of Lay Activities

1. To cultivate in a more effective way our conference, by working with our Districts' Board of Lay Activities.

2. To hold up the magnificant work of our World Service

Agencies, especially on fourth Sundays.

3. To promote an increase in per capita giving in our conference

so that we can have funds to carry on our work as a conference.

4. To recruit young men for the ministry in order that we will not become a mission conference. This is a serious situation in our conference, our young men are going into other vocations. The number of effective Elders in our Conference is decreasing each year. Laymen, this is a serious situation. Let's do something about it.

5. To work closely with local churches to organize more

Methodist Men's Clubs.

- 6. To see that more Certified Lay Speakers are registered with our District Superintendents.
- 7. To bring up to date current lists of our church Lay Leaders on each district.
- 8. To elect a Conference Director of Stewardship and District Directors of Stewardship in order that more can be accomplished in this field.

In closing I wish to thank everyone that has helped in any way to promote our lay activities in our conference and to solicit the prayers, cooperation and assistance of every minister and layman in the Southwest Conference to bring to fruition the lay work of The Methodist Church.

The lives of all great men remind us that we can make our lives sub-

lime, and departing, leave behind us footprints on the sands of time.

Footprints -- then perhaps another sailing O'er life's solemn main, A furlong shipwrecked brother. Seeing shall take heart again. Let us then be up and doing, With a heart for any fate Still pursuing, still achieving, Learn to labor and to wait.

We detect from this statistical report that we are not making the best of Christ and our resources. In no local church has the potential been reached. Each year we have fallen short even where there were marginal increases. This means that no church in the conference has done its part. We vote at the conference, go home and fail to do what we voted. We made provisions to pay MONTHLY. How many churches did this?

The Conference budget provides ONLY THE MINIMUM needs for a sound program of stewardship responsibilities to evangelism, education, missions and world service, social concern and many other needs. Each local church should not strive to meet the minimum, but do PLUS GIVING.

The Commission firmly believes that Pastors and Church Lay Leaders must set the EXAMPLE in giving. Then too, our giving must be SPIRIT-UALIZED. This will take an intensive program of promotion and cultivation as prescribed in the 1956 Discipline. Therefore, we make the following recommendations:

- 1. That the budget submitted by your Conference Commission on World Service and Finance (with necessary changes) be accepted as the budget for the Southwest Annual Conference for the year 1958-159 and that the total budget be apportioned to the Districts as follows:
 - Little Rock ----- 33%
 North Little Rock ---- 36%
 - 3. Oklahoma District ---- 31%

That the following percentage items be continued for this Conference year:

Episcopal Fund ----- 2% of Pastor's cash salary Conference Claimants Fund-15% of Pastor's cash salary Ministers' Reserve Pension

Fund ------2% of Pastor's cash salary
3. That in every case the amount apportioned to a charge for the
Episcopal and Conference Claimants Fund, as well as District Superin-

tendent's Fund and Expense shall be paid in the same proportion as the charge pays its pastor and to be remitted monthly.

4. That the end of each quarter of the Conference year be the "clearing date" on which each charge shall clear up at least one fourth of the District Superintendents.

trict Superintendent's apportionment and expense fund.
5. That the fiscal year of the Southwest Conference close May 31, and that Annual Conference reports be sent to the Treasurer and the Statistician at least ten (10) days prior to the opening date of the Conference Ses-

6. That the Conference Treasurer send a summary monthly report to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance and to the

Episcopal Office.

7. That all monies from charges be paid directly to the Conference Treasurer who will, in turn, issue receipted vouchers to the pastor and District Superintendent.

8. That each charge will send in at least 1/10 of its Annual apportionment within forty-five days after the beginning of the new Conference year.

a. That the District Superintendents plan for three roll calls in the year:

1. At District Conference

2. In the middle of January

3. Immediately following Easter

- That they try and have charges pay claims out in full at the last roll-call.
- 9. That each District Superintendent and pastor see to it that our churches carry through on Paragraph 267.1. In cooperation with the District Superintendent, Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, Area Office and General Board of Lay Activities, a SIMULTANEOUS EVERY MEMBER CANVASS PROGRAM be planned and promoted in each District, if

not at the same time, set a definite time according to conditions in the district. That the District Superintendent see to it as far in his power lies, that all persons who should be trained be present at the workshops. A great spiritual blessing is reported where the program has been tried.

10. That District Superintendent's salary and expenses be contingent

upon the proportion of such funds collected on his district.

11. That four Quarterly Conferences for the purpose of reviewing the total work of the charge be held in each charge annually. And that special attention be given to the status of claims due at that time. That the Commission on Promotion and Cultivation be requested to work with the pastor and the Committees on Promotion and Cultivation to interpret the financial program of the church. That the Commission cooperate with the Board of Lay Activities and the charge Lay Leader in promoting the Stewardship Program of the Church.

12. That bids for the printing of the conference minutes be solicited and that the contract to print be let on the joint written approval of the chairman committee on Publication and the chairman of the Commission on

World Service and Finance.

13. That each Conference Board or Commission represented in the Conference budget shall fill out vouchers in detail, (prior to meetings, etc.), concerning the nature of meeting and need for necessary funds. Such vouchers shall be sent to the Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance at least 15 days in advance, prior to the request for funds.

14. That each Conference Board or Commission shall make its budgetary request at least 30 days prior to Annual Conference - the same being sent to the Chairman of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance and in clear detail of its projected program and work for the

ensuing year.

That the Commission on World Service and Finance be furnished with names and addresses of the church lay leaders from each charge.

PETITION FOR INCORPORATION

1. That the name of this organization shall be and is "The Southwest Conference of the Methodist Church" with temporary headquarters at 1418

Chester Street in Little Rock, Arkansas.

2. That the objects and purposes of this organization are strictly outlined upon a benevolent basis, for the mutual benefit of its members, for the promotion of religious activities and for such other purposes as may be consistent with the laws of Arkansas governing the operation and conduct of such benevolent associations.

3. That a list of the officers and members are as follows: Bishop Matthew W. Clair, Jr. -----President Edwin C. Sanders ---------- Secretary G. CONSTITUTION

First. The name of said corporation shall be "The Southwest Con-

ference of the Methodist Church. "

Second. The object of said corporation shall be to receive, hold and administer any and all moneys, funds and property, real and personal, that may from time to time come into its hands by donation, gift, devise, bequest or otherwise for any of the uses, purposes and needs of the Southwest Conference, particularly funds and property for the use and benefit of superannuated preachers, and the widows and orphans of deceased preachers of said Conference.

Third. Said Board is authorized to invest or place at interest any and all funds that may come into its hands for the use and benefit of the said Conference and shall make a full and complete report of its acts and doings in that behalf to the annual meetings of the said Southwest Conference for its approval, showing disposition of the interest and funds so received, provided always the Board shall carry out the wishes of the donors of said funds or property.

Fourth. That all vacancies in said Board shall be filled by the said Southwest Conference, but in the interim such vacancies may be filled by the remainder of said Board, and the persons so appointed to fill vacancies

shall hold until the next meeting of the said Conference.

Fifth. That the regular meeting of said Board shall be on the first day of the annual session of the said-Conference and at same place as the conference is held.

Provided also the President of the Board may call a meeting of the

Board whenever deemed necessary.

Sixth. That the officers of said Board shall consist of a President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be elected every two years, provided those elected at the first meeting shall hold until the regular annual meeting.

Seventh. Four members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business."
