### 2:15 P. M. CONFERENCE BUSINESS:

The Conference is entitled to ONE lay and ONE ministerial delegate to the General Conference and the same for the Jurisdictional Conference. Two reserve delegates can be elected.

Tellers appointed: Lay - Miss Virdie Williams and James Washington.

Ministerial - E. L. Lloyd, A. M. Anderson.

Ballots were cast. Elected on the 1st ministerial Ballot was J. H. Oliver, General Conference.

On the 6th Lay Ballot, Mrs. C. G. Washington was elected to the General Conference.

On the 3rd Ballot for Jurisdictional Conference ministerial delegate, C. C. Hall was elected.

On the 2nd Ballot for Alternate delegates, Ira A. Pointer was elected. On the 3rd Ballot, Oliver W. Gibson was elected the 2nd alternate delegate.

Three Ballots were cast for Lay Jurisdictional delegate. There was no election.

CONFERENCE BOARD OF EDUCATION: Clinton A. Anderson, Chairman of the Board, presided.

M. D. Pembroke made an interim report on the work of the Conference Executive Secretary.

Mrs. Lula Tillmon made a report on the work of the Conference Director of Adult Work.

The Conference Camp Director, Mrs. C. G. Washington, reported on the Summer Camping Activities.

Recommendations from the Board were read, received and adopted. (See report)

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE: Report was read by Mrs. Henrietta Torrence.

Recommendations and Budget were received and adopted by the Conference. (Recommendation #7 is to be changed to include the salaries of the Superintendents.)

MOTION - A motion was made by Oliver W. Gibson that Bishop Clair be returned to the St. Louis Area and that the Conference instruct the Secretary to write the results of this vote to the Episcopal Committee and request our delegates to ask for the return of Bishop M. W. Clair, Jr., to the St. Louis Area for the next quadrennium.

# REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE LAY LEADER

To

The Eighty Second Session Of The Southwest Annual Conference

Bishop Clair, District Superintendents, Pastors, Laymen, visitors, and friends of the Southwest Annual Conference.

Greetings:

I deem it a pleasure to make to you this report of my Stewardship as your Conference Lay Leader. I assure you that everything that could have seen done has not been done, but all that was done was for the betterment the Southwest Conference. We have come to the closing year of this Quadrennial Emphasis, "Enlistment". Let us be mindful of our great need our own Conference for enlisting both full time and part time Christian workers.

I am indeed grateful to all of my co-workers whom I have had the good pleasure of association as we sought to put over the work of Lay activities.

Stewardship is the answer for the Southwest Conference as well as the answer for The Methodist Church. If we honestly practised Stewardship it's entirety all obstacles would be surmounted. The trouble is that misconceptions presist in explaining the meaning of Stewardship and it's applications whether reference is made to the parables or examples taken from modern every day life. The rich young ruler had kept the commandments throughout his youth, but became disturbed when he was told that he should sell all of his posessions and give to the poor. He would not do this because he believed that material possession insured security and happiness. It was difficult for him to comrehend a new organization and pattern the without economic wealth so he went away sorrowful.

The same is true with us in this modern day when we choose to try separate Stewardship from our daily activities. Until one does visualize connection between his religion and his business transactions or his

work, misconception concerning Stewardship will continue.

The continued progress of the Church depends upon man's acceptance this broad view of the meaning of Stewardship and it's implications for modern living. Individuals in every walk of life must translate his conception of Stewardship so that it's essential meaning is a functional one tracterized by service. Financiers who in addition to the profit motive interested in making it possible for community members to become owners, display a better conception of Stewardship. As one uses the alents at his disposal in order to make life more meaningful and as one elects experiences in accordance with native abilities and interests, he was evidence of a broader view of Stewardship.

Personal Labor:

It was my good pleasure through your Conference Board of Lay Activities, and the help of Bishop Clair, and Reverand Pembroke to conduct a workshop on Stewardship, August 16, 1958, at Mallalieu Methodist church, Fort Smith Arkansas. We would like to see this Workshop repeated with greater participation both ministerial and laity. We take this opportunity to express again our thanks to Bishop Clair, Rev. Pembroke, Rev. Washington and the good members of Mallalieu for everything they did to make our workshop a grand experience for all of us who attended.

It was my privilege and grand experience to attend a workshop for Conference Lay Leaders in Chicago on October the third and fourth 1958. This was the kind of meeting that really helps one who is willing to be helped. We tried to work out three topics under Lay Activities. First topic, "Where Are We Now?", second, "Where Are We Going?", third, "How Do We Get There?" This workshop was as a workshop should be. Everyone participating in all of the discussions. I shall never forget the wonderful experience we has as we worshipped at the close of the workshop in the Sky Chapel of Chicago Temple high above the rustle and bustle of the noisy city. The worship service was conducted by Dr. Charles Goff, minister for the Methodist Men's Radio Hour, and pastor of the Chicago Temple.

I attended only one District Conference which was held at Valley Grove Methodist Church in Murfreesboro, Arkansas, Friday, October 17, 1958. We had only one hour, but I think that through displays, discussions,

and lectures some good was accomplished.

From February the 8th through March the 22nd, it was my good pleasure to attend a series of six Sub District meetings on the North Little Rock District under the leadership of Rev. C. C. Hall and Mr. James B. Porter together with several Sub District Lay Leaders. Lay activities was adequately presented. We would be so happy if all of the Districts would work such a plan.

Each local church has been contacted at least three times this Conference year, without a single invitation. We are here to serve you, so do not hesitate to call on us. We are not to force our way into your local

churches, but will be too glad to serve you if invited.

Recommendations:

I. That Layman's Day be observed in each local church with a layman as speaker. We sincerely urge our pastors together with the Lay Leaders to see that this is done in each local church.

II. That we make an effort to secure and train more Lay speakers and see to it that they are certified. We also ask our District Superinten-

dents to use these Lay speakers in all the places they can.

III. That each local church of The Southwest Conference co-operate fully with The Quadrennial Emphasis "Enlistment". That is we seek to enlist not only workers in our local churches but workers on the District and Conference levels as well.

IV. That throughout the Conference, "The Every Member Canvass", be made in order that we can increase our giving so that we will be able to make the Ministry more attractive to young men as other vocations. This is one reason we have so few men coming into our Conference.

V. That we seek to organize more Methodist Men's organizations on all three of our Districts, and seek to get all delinquent clubs in good

standing.

Objectives Of The Conference Board of Lay Activities:

1. To cultivate in a more effective way our Conference, by working with our District Boards of Lay Activities.

2. To hold up the work of The Methodist Church through it's world

service agencies, especially on the fourth Sundays of each month.

3. To promote The Every Member Canvass in each local church, so that we can have funds to carry on in a more effective way as a Conference.

4. To enlist both full time and part time Christian workers for our Conference, Districts and local churches.

5. To work closely with local churches to organize more Methodist

Men's organizations.

6. To see that more men are certified as Lay Speakers and registered with our District Superintendents.

7. To bring up to date our current lists of Church Lay Leaders on

all of the Districts.

8. To strive to have an active Director of Stewardship in each local church.

In closing I wish to thank, The General Board of Lay Activities, for suidance and assistance rendered me as I sought to carry out my duties as Conference Lay Leader. I also want to thank everyone who has been of any

service to our Lay program.

"So live that when thy summons comes to join that innumerable caravan, that thou go not like a quarry slave scouraged to his dungeon but sustained and soothed by unfaultering trust approach thy grave, like one who wraps his drapery of his couch about him and lies down to pleasant dreams".

# DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S COMPOSIT REPORT

Bishop Clair and members of the Southwest Annual Conference:
The conference year now closing marks the beginning of the end of this quadrenium. It has been a year of hard work. Our success this year was made possible by Him who has called us. Out efforts would have been in vain and our labor would have borne no fruit, but for the unlimited and unspeakable grace of our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore with deep humility and thanksgiving to God, we submit this report.

During the year two of the members of the conference family moved into the father's house. Brother L. E. Douglass, a supply pastor and Brother E. C. Sanders the Executive Secretary of the Conference. They

have passed to their reward.

We have endeavored to serve 51 pastoral charges, 95 preaching places, 95 Sunday Schools, 1 College, Philander Smith College, Little Rock, Arkansas; 51 ministers and 4,921 members of our Race. We have traveled 137,000 miles through the territory located within the Conference, from Tulsa, Oklahoma to Texarkana, Arkansas and from Forest City, Arkansas to Altus, Oklahoma. We have held or caused to be held 223 Quarterly Conferences. We have held three Christian Workers Institutes, one in each District, several workshops and other meetings. These Institutes were for adults and youth. The courses were recommended by the Board of Education of Nashville, Tennessee and approved by the Conference Execu-

tive Secretary.

We have had the able leadership of a wise shepherd. The General Superintendent of the St. Louis Area, who is the president of our Annual Conference. He has and is trying to lift our Conference to an appreciable degree of success during this quadrenium. We are conscious of a deep debt of gratitude to him for his zeal and genuine concern for the welfare of the Conference. To us he has been not simply "The Bishop" but, father, brother and friend. His alert and keen mind and the hard work he has done have been a large part of our progress. He is the kind of a minister that the Master had in mind when He exhorted His diciples to "be ye wise as serpents and as harmless as doves." The ministers of the Conference have given themselves to the task this year. They have done a very good job as many of their reports will show.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION: In the field of religious education the Southwest Conference regrets the loss of a full time worker. It is unfortunate, that although we as a conference, pioneered in this work we find ourselves without a full time worker. Never the less the work has been carried on to a commendable degree. Christian Workers Institutes and Vacation Bible Schools were held all over the Conference and in every District. Youth Religious Training Camp was held at Turner Falls in Oklahoma during the Summer months.

Religious Education in the local churches is carrying on and finding its expression through the church Sunday School, Methodist Youth Fellowship, and such other training groups as best fits the local situation. We continue with hope and anticipation.

PHILANDER SMITH COLLEGE: Philander Smith College now in its 91st year continues to be the nerve-center and glorious pride of the Southwest Conference. Through the years the conference has been wanting to be steadfast and unswerving in its support of the College, not from a sense of obligation, but because the Conference recognizes the fact that it is a privilege and distinction to have the opportunity to support and nurture such fine work as has been and is being carried on at the College from its infancy. Today we are a long way from the time when washwomen and tired men brought chairs and tables and dishes to the school and left them as their humble contribution to the dream the founders had. Yet caroling down across the valley of years, that same loyalty and devotion has been a part of the methodism of the Southwest Conference. The dream and vision has broadened immeasurably, but the humbleness of sacrifice remains.

Truly these have been years of faith, loyalty, and devotion. As we look at the college high and lifted up, we are moved to lift our voices and sing till earth and heaven ring with the harmony of pride in achievement. May we let our rejoicing rise high as the listening skies. Stony has been the road we have trod, bitter the chasten rod; but we have known nothing of unborn hope. Always we have looked to the God of our weary years, the God of our silent tears, and He has kept forever in the path which has led,

and is to lead to a greater Philander Smith College.

We salute her and pledge to her our continued loyalty and support. We are not unmindful of the large contribution she is making to Methodism, and particularly to the Southwest Conference. Through the careful training of young men and women she is preparing citizens for a Christian society, citizens whose responsibility it will be to so leaven our social order that the Kingdom of God may come. President Harris and his faculty are discharging the responsibility which is theirs to a commendable degree. We say then, "Thou who has by thy might, led us into the light . . . keep us forever in the path we pray."

DISTRICT AND QUARTERLY GONFERENCES: The quarterly Conference still has a big part to play in the ongoing of the program of the church. We are using and exploiting it for the good of the churches everywhere. There is a feeling of urgency being felt everywhere. We are enslaved by the glorious prospects ahead of us, and in our feeble efforts we work for the creation of that public opinion which shall someday rule the world. We are conscious of the need for more positive and assertive action in our Districts and Conferences. There is a necessity to recover and revitalize the old and to discover and develop the new. A genius for these important tasks must be developed. Methods must be installed which can more quickly set in motion processes necessary in these areas.

THE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE: The work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service has advanced in many of its fields of endeavor under the leadership of its presidents and fine and loyal service of consecrated Conference, District and Local Secretaries, with the prayers

and hard work of the good women of the local churches, who planted the deals and principles of missions and made them blossom throughout the

whole Southwest Conference.

The women share the same conviction as that of the ministry in the program of mobilization, that the time has come in the Methodist Church for a unified coordinated all-out effort to enlist the women into this great program of world redemption. Christianity is a growing concern; Christian character is a living thing. Everything that is Christian is alive.

Conversly much of that which is dead is unchristian. The indispensible sign of life is growth. But the desire for growth must never be for that mushroom sort which springs to life over night but which wilts before the training rays of tomorrow's sun. Our efforts must be toward permanency growth and effectiveness made possible by careful planning and the tiresess effort upon the part of the ministry and the devoted women of the church who are concerned.

The deep anxiety upon the part of the consecrated women of the church to increase the opportunity for intellectual and spiritual advance, and to promote religious leadership that will fell the imperative to build a Christian fellowship, and to make the world a better place in which to live may be regarded as another sign of growth. To this end the Woman's Society of Christian Service has successfully maintained and established educational scholarships for young ladies of ability and promise to attend

our church related colleges.

We believe that a Woman's Society of Christian Service is necessary in every church to hasten the time when there shall be a new order in our world. We believe it offers the most effective channel for every woman to use her particular talent and ability for the good of the whole, as well

as to acquire a sense of creative fulfillment.

We therefore urge each pastor to study the potentialities of the women of his church. For without her there would be no local church; and without the local church it is hard to picture a world community. If she is interested in civic righteousness, in strenghtening by cooperation with other women in securing human rights for all people everywhere, then Christian social relations offer all these opportunities. Therefore there is work for all. The task is too great to be undertaken with divided hearts. We must strive together, and with a faith that all our efforts will not be in vain.

EVANGELISM: We have been mindful of our commission as Evangelists of the good news about Jesus Christ. The world is still hungry for the living bread. Should we fail in presenting this living bread to hungry souls of men, Evangelists with strange doctrines will feed them stones. The Crusade taught us, much in the field of Evangelism. Not the minister in the pulpit but the entire congregations make up the priesthood of believers who move with passion to win people to Jesus Christ. Each District Superintendent has been aware of this sacred responsibility and has worked diligently to promote evangelism in his district. The results were not always satisfactory but some were added to the church.

MISSIONS: We acknowledge that in our extension program we have not been able to exploit some important territory. Thus we must invade and establish churches. One new church is underway in North Little Rock on the North Little District. St. Mark Pine Bluff is in the lime light of development and the future is looking bright. Browns Chapel on the Little Rock District is completing a new church building. Other mission charges in the conference are under study for future development. We must broaden our program and work until every undeveloped place in the conference is set to growth. We are moving slowly but surely.

RESERVE PENSION: We have stressed the importance of the reserve Pension Fund. Meetings have been held throughout the conference emphasiz-

ing the importance of and receiving pledges for the Reserve Pension Fund.

We hope to reach our goal by 1960.

Since we received our commission from you, Bishop Clair, last June we have both your blessing and the blessing of the Almighty God. We are not going to tell you today that the voyage has been smooth all the way. It has been an eventful crossing. We have crossed billow's since we last met. We are able to describe the journey and the many problems that we have faced, but we close with these words from Edmund Burke:

Applaud us when we run Console us when we fall But let us pass on, For God's sake let us pass on.

Recommendations:

1. CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION: The enlistment of young people to the cause of Christ; the friendly counsel and consecrated guidance of youth who desire to serve through the church will be the on going of every Annual Conference, every Methodist preacher and every Layman of our great church. Dr. Frank S. Hickman has said, "The church and all it stands for must be lifted to a position of exalted esteem in the eyes of youth or presently its ranks of vocational workers will soon become thin and broken.

The need of a generation of dedicated men and women to the ideals of the Christian way challenges every board and committee on Christian higher education to continuously interpret its aims and objectives. We feel that it is ours to help youth interpret that divine urge which shapes itself into a conviction of call to some particular life work, and that it is ours to strengthen the bases and more surely determine the course of Christian Education as a major factor in the wholesome development of that conviction. We also feel that we must alert the church and kindred organizations to their particular relationship to the economic problems of our age and the possible effects on men and women of tomorrow.

We therefore recommend that there be sponsored this year a Conference wide Christian Vocations Conference financed by the Conference

Commission on Christian Vocation.

We also recommend that we request our Conference Board of Education and the Executive Secretary to organize in every District, Sub District and local church a committee on Christian Vocation with functioning secretary, so that the whole church may receive the impact of the need and opportunity.

EVANGELISM: We recommend that the Commissions on Membership and Evangelism be carefully selected, organized, and made an active force in each local church. That they be supplied with the proper literature to help make Evangelism a vital part of the program of the church, to win and develop Christian families to observe family worship, Grace at meals, Bible study, and practical Christian living.

We recommend that each Annual Conference and District hold Institutes on Evangelism to develop a more efficient group of ministerial

and lay Evangelistic leaders, or directors.

We further recommend that our local church Boards of Lay Activities, Education, and Woman's Society of Christian Service Cooperate in the promotion of Evangelism, and making Christ real by winning people and developing them into Christian personalities, and to make good every opportunity in securing recruits for the ministry and other full time Christian workers.

THE RESERVE PENSION FUND: We recommend that there shall be a Conference Board, District Board and local committees, that there shall be meetings on the Conference, District and Subdistrict levels to stress the importance and need of the Reserve Pension Fund.

We further recommend that each minister who is a member of the

m his cash salary as a contribution to the reserve pension fund.

WORLD SERVICE AND MISSIONARY PROGRAM: We recommend that each local church organize an active Board in the church and promote world service and missionary program in order that the local church may be educated in the work of our church in these fields.

We also recommend that each District Superintendent have on his Estrict a competent district missionary secretary to promote the mision-

work of the church.

RURAL AREAS AND URBAN CENTERS AND THEIR NEED OF CHURCH EXTENSION:

1. To appreciate the enormous change which has come upon rural affe during the past generation, it is necessary to note very carefully changes a transportation and communication, the educational trend among rural people to consider the revolutionary changes in farm machinery, to study recent migrations and to note the rapid progress of cooperative enterprises.

These items have a profound bearing upon rural life and are intimately

related to the problems of the country church.

With these statements as a background we inquire into the rural church's impact on this new day in the country and attempt to discover the problems which have become acute as well as those new ones which have

developed.

New roads and high speed travel have brought the rural church to a parting of the ways. The educational methods and program for adults have beened areas of life and lifted horizons. With these things in mind and even more, we ask ourselves this question, "What can the church do in the light of these new found freedoms and conditions?"

First. We recommend a leadership for the rural church of the highest possible character and training. The day has passed for the feeble, the referior and unfit in the leadership of rural people. The new age demands

the best for the country.

Second. We recommend that a commission be raised to study the larger parrish plan, and salaries for the rural minister in line with the

localities and the economical problems in given communities.

Third. We recommend the use in our rural churches the finest worship services which can be evolved, the best in fellowship meetings, issual aids, buildings and facilities and emphatic preaching of the gospel of Jesus Christ.

2. In our Urban centers we are losing our people because of inadequate bilding facilities. In these new communities where hundreds of our people are moving in, and we have only hovel, our people are joining other churches that have better buildings. They are not willing to face the embarrassment of joining a shack just to be in a Methodist church. That type of Methodist that would stay Methodist anywhere and under any condition has long since

zone to Heaven, and in the other direction.

In our larger cities where communities are changing, whites moving out, Negroes moving in, we have had some fine opportunities to buy some fine church plants and get in on the foundation of a new community, but no money available; so we fail to grasp, a great opportunity. Other groups go and buy and years later we will arrive and build a little shack when it is everlasting too late. What we need is to have the district Boards of building and location to work more cooperatively with the board of Mission and church extension to grasp worthy opportunities that meet the approval of the bishop and the conference board.

What is the remedy? First, We recommend that the Board of Missions sponsor a special day to properly present this cause to the Laymen of our

respective churches.

Second. As on the basis of the challenge that every member give at least ten (\$10.) dollars annually for church extension. Not a quota just voluntary giving. That some member of the Board present this cause at every District-meeting in the various districts.

### HIGHER EDUCATION AND PHILANDER SMITH COLLEGE REPORT

The challenge to meet the terrific demands for Higher Education has become one of our most pressing tasks. The swelling tide of college enrollment, stimulated by the desire for learning and the technical demands for successful employment, are on the move around the world. The Christian Philosophy of Life must give leadership to these demands, or men may destroy themselves by their knowledge. The role of the Christian College as a witness in the intellectual community must be that of giving a leadership which is based upon the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of man in all human relations as the one essential instrument capable of transmitting knowledge into Adundant Living for all people.

Philander Smith College, the College of your Annual Conference, is dedicated to this task. It served a total of 971 students during the fiscal year through a faculty and staff of some 50 persons with definite Christian commitment. It sent some 24 young people out into the Conferences of the area to work with local churches during the summer, 1958. It has continued to hold up the spirit of excellence in scholarship and academic integrity, and to undergird its entire program with the spirit of Christ and

the policies of the Methodist Church.

Philander Smith has continued to grow. Two new dormitories and a Student Union building will be ready for occupancy when school opens August 31, 1959. They will bring to our students conveniences equal to those provided by any institution in the country. Construction on the fourth new building is scheduled to begin this summer, with the hope of completion by Commencement, 1960. Realization of this dream depends largely upon the successful conclusion of the Development Program Campaign for \$300,000 with which each minister and many laymen of the Conference are familiar. The college family (faculty members, students, trustees) has raised approximately \$44,000 in cash and subscriptions as of May 1. The Alumni have raised approximately \$40,000 in cash and subscriptions, and individuals in the churches of the St. Louis area have given and subscribed approximately \$11,000. The total as of May 1, including cash payment and subscriptions is \$105,000. This is a report on your Philander Smith College as to its stewardship to the Annual Conference, and to every minister and layman whose concern, interest, prayers, and support otherwise have been giving to this part of the program of the Conference and our great Methodist Church.

### RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1. That the Conference take action urging every pastor and charge lay leader to attend the special Convocation at Philander Smith College, Little Rock, Arkansas, Friday, September 25, 1959, and that it specify the following persons or their proxies as certified delegates from the Annual Conference to the Convocation: All District Superintendents; Conference President, Woman's Society of Christian Service; Conference Lay Leader; Chairman, Conference Board of Education; Chairman, Conference Quadrennial Commission on Higher Education; Conference Executive Secretary of Christian Education.
- 2. That every church endeavor to fully achieve the goal of \$1.30 per member (\$1 for Philander Smith and .30 for Wesley Foundations) in keeping with paragraph 2018 of the 1956 Discipline, by the close of the ensuing Annual Conference year.

3. That the Conference approve a recommendation designating an anual District Superintendent's Day at the College, the date of which to be set at the convenience of the majority of the Cabinet, for an official visit to college.

4. That the ensuing Conference year, September, 1959 - March, 1960 designated as "The Year of Gleening" for the Development Program, tring which time the effort to secure personal gifts as presented by the

Campaign Institutes, 1958, will be followed up.

5. That there be continued a persistent and systematic effort to recruit our Methodist Students for Philander Smith, and that this effort be arganized on an Annual Conference, District, and Local Church basis.

6. That the Conference approve National Christian College Day, sponsored by the Department of Higher Education of the National Council of Carches, as an Official Day for the Conference, to be used where convenient lift up the Challenge of Christian Education.

### REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF MISSIONS

of

The Southwest Conference, Pine Bluff, Arkansas, June 11, 1959

Bishop Clair, members of the Southwest Annual Conference: It is with pleasure that I make this report of the Conference Board of Missions to rou.

At the last session of our Conference which convened in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, June 15, 1958 that program for our Board was planned for this wear. We met with the Bishop and a representative from the General Board Missions and planned for our first Conference wide Conference on mismons. During the year we had two meetings of the Conference Board. Dr. Charles F. Golden from the General Board of Missions was with us in each meeting. The first meeting was held at Wesley Chapel Methodist Church, Little Rock, Arkansas. In this meeting we studied the missionary program for the Conference and made plans for the Conference wide Conference on Missions. The second meeting was held at Philander Smith College. In has meeting we completed our program for the Conference on Missions. The Conference on Missions convened April 7 - 10, 1959 at the Mallalieu Methodist Church, Fort Smith, Arkansas, Rev. H. Reeves Washington, mastor. The theme for the Conference was "Every Methodist a Missionary." This workshop on missions came at the most opportune time and met a need of long standing in the Southwest Conference.

We had excellent leadership in our Workshop. From the General Board: Dr. Charles F. Golden, from the Division of National Missions, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; Dr. Herb Lowe, Department of Visual Education of the Joint Section of Education and Cultivation, New York, New York; Dr. Auther Moore, Jr., Associate Editor of the World Outlook. Out of Conference: Dr. Robert S. Mosby, a District Superintendent in the West

Texas Conference.

The three District Superintendents and some of the pastors and layen from Conference served as leaders in the Workshop.

The attendance was good. All the Districts were represented. The

entertainment provided by Mallalieu Church was par. excellent.

The District Superintendent met with the ministers and laymen from meir respective Districts in an evaluation session and reported their andings from which we make the following recommendations.

1. District Superintendent call a District Planning Meeting

a. Appoint a Team

b. Plan Sub-District Meetings

A. All persons from local churches concerned with missions.

B. Give the value of information received from Conference on Missions. 2. Distribute literature, and hold schools of missions in local churches where it is possible, so that the entire personnel becomes missionary minded.

3. Co-operate with other agencies in making surveys to find the needs of the community. From the evaluation of these surveys, the local

churches will take local projects.

4. District Secretaries are not present. Every effort should be made to include them in the Strategy and Projection training.

The Commission on Missions be organized and made to function in each local church.

That the Conference Treasurer be directed to disburse these funds only for direct cultivation and promotional purposes in the form of workshops, conferences, study courses for local church officers, committee and commission chairmen, travel for the necessary personnel and such clerical services that may be required.

4. That the resources of Philander Smith College be used as far as possible in the program of cultivation and promotion on the District and

Local Church levels.

5. That in each local church the Official Board comply with Paragraph

216 by holding a Planning Conference during the summer of 1959.

6. That where it is designated -- on the Conference, District and sub-District level -- we organize groups so information may be channeled

to the proper source.

- 7. That each commission study and put into action the 1959-60 Quadrennial Emphasis -- stressing greater enlistment of the individual and his development and the Local Church development (Church School). We recommend a wide use of The Methodist Story Magazine (March 1959 issue) for guidance in the 1959 Enlistment Emphasis.
  - 8. That we conduct an extensive program of leadership recruitment.
- 9. That each Local Church will plan to have at least one (1) certified instructor.
  - 10. That each Local Church will set as a goal the organization or

reactivation of a Methodist Youth Fellowship.

11. That there will be <u>strict</u> observance of and emphasis placed upon

all Special Days of the Christian calendar.

- 12. That Church School Rally Day (September, 1959) shall be observed by all Churches of the Conference. Further, that each District Superintendent and Pastor shall do everything to dramatically present the same.
- 13. That there shall be a coordination of responsibility of all agencies related to the Inter-Board Commission and the Board of Education.
- 14. That the Bishop appoint a shared (part-time) Executive Secretary to serve two Annual Conferences (Southwest and Tennessee).

### REPORT OF COMMISSION ON WORLD SERIVCE AND FINANCE

Eighty-Second Session of The Southwest Annual Conference - June 11 Pine Bluff, Arkansas

To Bishop Clair, Officers and Members of The Southwest Conference:
There comes a time in the life of every organization when operations
bould cease, momentarily, and an accounting taken on what has occured
tring the fiscal period, and a new program formulated giving a forecast

future plans, for the coming similar period.

As your servants, we have endeavored constantly to render faithful service in the discharge of our duties and have done our very best under the disting circumstances. We have held monthly meetings, as a commission, conferences with Bishop Clair and the District Superintendents, in our effort satisfy the requests of the various departments of the conference and the Church, as well as preparing the budget for the coming Conference year,

and recommendations for your consideration and approval.

Our problem has been difficult due to the lack of funds remitted by charges to the Conference Treasurer. The Commission is happy to report hat some improvement has been made on the part of charges making permodic reports to the treasurer. However, there is still need for more complete reporting. Many churches have not considered all items listed in budget. The budget, as we all know, is based upon minimum need. It s based upon the least, and not the maximum amount needed to successfully sperate our Annual Conference Program and to meet our obligations to the Ceneral Church. It undergirds the essential program of the church. It is important and necessary that each charge make full payment on its apportionment. To do otherwise will mean that some cause will suffer in our Con-Ference and in our Church. We do not suppose that it is necessary to state, bere, that there is an urgent need for promotion and cultivation among our meaders, that they and the membership must be trained to support their local church, the Conference and the General Church. There is need for more workshops, more coaching conferences and more Christian workers schools. To be able to have these must, likewise, depend upon more money and more money abundantly.

For the first time during this quadrennium, this Conference has remitted funds to the General Benevolent Causes. The funds are accumulalive and when we fail to respond, one year, the deficit is added to the next year. This, in turn, will require a constant increase in our budget - year by year - not because our budget is increased, as such, but in order to meet the deficit which has been caused by the failure, on the part of the local church to meet its entire apportionment. We call attention to these matters now because we sense a growing interest and concern throughout the Southwest Conference for the improvement of the financial and spiritual emphasis of our Christian work. We cannot separate the two. If we build the spiritual aspects and draw more Christians into our fold, our financial income will naturally increase. The pastors and lay-leaders will find it necessary to point up the importance of the various causes listed in our budget. Every one of these causes is a responsibility of our Methodist Church in general, and our Southwest Conference in particular. Let us resolve, as Christian ministers and laymen, to become more serious about our obligations to our

Church and Conference.

With the number of charges and the membership of the Southwest Conference there is no need to fall short. With the large number of persons throughout the Conference area without church homes there is no reason why we cannot build our memberships, beautify our churches and meet all our obligations to the Conference and General Church.

Seriously, Christian friends, we must begin to place our financial house in order. To this end, we submit the budget for the coming year, along with certain recommendations that we think necessary to achieve success and save the Southwest Conference through economic security for this quadrennium. It is upon the solid rock of good business that our individual and group security and happiness must be based. We submit the budget, for the new Conference year, as follows:

In cooperation with the District Superintendent, Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, Area Office and General Board of Lay Activities, a SIMULTANEOUS EVERY-MEMBER CANVASS program be planned and promoted in each District, if not at the same time, set a definite time according to the conditions in the District. The Board of Pensions of the Southwest Conference met in its annual session June 12 with Rev. Grady Adcock representing the General Board of Pensions.

After taking careful consideration of the financial status of the conference claimants fund, we recommend that the Annuity Rate for the conference year 1959 - 60 shall be raised from \$6.00 to \$8.00 per year.

The total cash salaries reported paid to the pastors of the conference for the year 1958-59 was \$55, 152.00. The 15% apportionment to the pastoral charges should have given the conference claimants fund \$8,272.80. Only \$5,232.00 was paid, leaving a deficit on the pastors at future retirement of \$3,040.80 according to paragraph 1624 of the 1956 Discipline of the Methodist Church.

We are grateful for an opportunity to make this report, and are happy to report that according to a telegram received June 10th from Dr. Harry Spencer, Executive Secretary of TRAFGO, of the Methodist Church, Nashville, Tennessee, the income for this commission was \$75,797 in May, a total of \$255,031 for the year ending May 31st. This is an increase of 38, 37%. At this same point last year the regular income from World Service was almost exactly the same. We are glad of this because we all know a little of the power of mass communication and what it will mean to present and future generations; if the church will make itself felt for good in this field.

As we read the reports each period we note that the Southwest Conference seems to lag behind. That should not be and I am sure we want to

mange it. We can if we try. Just (ten) 10¢ per member per annum will

meatly change the picture.

### CONSTITUTION

First. The name of said corporation shall be "The Southwest Con-

ference of the Methodist Church. "

Second. The object of said corporation shall be to receive, hold and administer any and all moneys, funds and property, real and personal, that may from time to time come into its hands by donation gift, devise, bequest or otherwise for any of the uses, purposes and needs of the Southwest Conference, particularly funds and property for the use and benefit of superannuated preachers, and the widows and orphans of deceased preachers of said Conference.

Third. Said Board is authorized to invest or place at interest any and all funds that may come into its hands for the use and benefit of the said Conference and shall make a full and complete report of its acts and doings in that behalf to the annual meetings of the said Southwest Conference for its approval, showing disposition of the interest and funds so received, provided always the Board shall carry out the wishes of the donors of said funds or property.

Fourth. That all vacancies in said Board shall be filled by the said Southwest Conference, but in the interim such vacancies may be filled by the remainder of said Board, and the persons so appointed to fill vacancies

shall hold until the next meeting of the said Conference.

Fifth. That the regular meeting of said Board shall be on the first day of the annual session of the said Conference and at same place as the conference is held.

Provided also the President of the Board may call a meeting of the

Board whenever deemed necessary.

Sixth. That the officers of said Board shall consist of a President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be elected every two years, provided those elected at the first meeting shall hold until the regular annual meeting.

Seventh. Four members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
