

#### DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

The Arkansas Valley Conference convened in its Nineteenth annual session in the U.B. church of Winfield, Kansas, at 8 a.m. February 22nd, 1899, Bishop J. S. Mills presiding.

Opening devotional services consisted of singing, and the offering of three voluntary prayers by Revs. Morgan and Burrill, and the Bishop.

The Bishop then favored the conference with a most instructive and highly appreciated address, of one hour, on the Spiritual life. These morning addresses from the Bishop were continued throughout the session, and were much appreciated by all present.

Promptly at 10 a. m. the business of the conference was taken up.

H. H. Zeigler was chosen secretary protem. The roll of ministers and lay delegates was called.

On motion, the first five rows of seats from the pupit were made to constitute the bar of the conference.

On first ballot H. H. Zeigler was elected secretary.

On a motion by John Morrison it was ordered that the older orders on the missionary treasury should be paid first.

On motion Rev. W. R. Funk, D. D., agent of our Publishing House at Dayton, Ohio, and Rev. Wm. M. Weekley, General Church Erection Secretary, were invited to advisory seats in the conference.

Rev. Funk then favored the conference with an interesting, spirited and practical address on our publishing interests. He stated that the indebtedness against our Publishing House was being gradually reduced, and that an earnest and special

effort is being made to pay off the entire debt by the next General Conference.

By invitation of the Bishop, Rev. Weekley also favored the Conference with a helpful address on the Church Erection interests of our denomination. He requested that the missionary and church erection money be all paid in during the day, that he might receive and receipt for the same, before returning to Dayton, Ohio.

The Bishop announced the following committees:-

On Devotion, F. P. Smith, C. A. Heudershot, and M. E. Johnson. On Candidates for the Ministry, J. R. Harner, S. Garrigus and E. A. Powell.

On Elders (Inders, Geo. Gay, W. L. Hinshaw, and Chas. E. Farney.
On Boundaries and Finance, H. S. Reigel, F. P. Smith, C. E. Heisel,
G. W. Morgan, A. V. Iddings and J. R. Harner.

Special treasurers were announced by the Bishop as follows:—

Conference Collection, Mrs. Mary J. Price. Educational Beneficiary, Mrs. J. H. Johnson. Biblical Seminary, T. S. Cunningham. General S. S. Funds, E. J. Williams. College Funds, J. A. Sanders.

The hour for opening the sessions was fixed at 9 a.m. and 2 p. m., and adjourn on motion.

On motion the name of Simon B. Mordy was referred to the Committee on Applicants.

Adjourned on motion. Benediction, S. Garrigus.

#### WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

Session opened promptly at 2 o'clock.

Devotional services were conducted by C. E. Farney.

On motion it was ordered that pastors entitled to missionary appropriation during the year just past, should have the privilege of turning over to the Branch Missionary Treasurer an order to the amount of the missionary assessment of their respective charges, instead of paying the money.

F. P. Smith, Presiding Elder of the Winfield District, read an extended and hopeful report of the year's work on his district. Elder Smith's report and character were favorably passed upon.

H. S. Reigel, Presiding Elder of the Hutchinson District, submitted a hopeful report of the year's work on his district. Report and character were favorably passed upon.

The report on Publishing interests was read and submitted by John Morrison. This was followed by earnest and inspiring, practical and instructive, descriptive and hopeful remarks from the Publishing Agent, Rev. W. R. Funk D. D., on our publishing house and publishing interests.

On motion Conference adjourned at 4:25 o'clock. Benediction, H. S. Reigel.

#### THURSDAY MORNING.

Conference was opened at 9 o'clock. After the singing of a hymn, three voluntary prayers were offered by C. E. Farney, T. S. Cunningham, and E. A. Powell.

The Bishop then gave us another highly appreciated morning lecture and Bible reading on the spiritual life.

The roll of ministers and lay delegates was called, after which the minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

The report on Publishing Interests was taken up and resumed from yesterday's session. Dr. Funk reported subscriptions taken for 42 sets of the New Century Theological Library series. Rev. Weekley spoke of the Quarterly Review, and took subscriptions for the same. On motion the report on Publishing Interests was adopted.

Pastoral reports were submitted and characters passed as follows: D. A. Williams, Greensburg Mission; C. E. Heisel, Corbin Circuit; John Morrison, Cimarron Mission; E. J. Williams, McPherson Mission; J. W. Burket, Turon Circuit; J. Barricklow, Burns Circuit; C. E. Murphy, Sego Circuit; E. R. Myers, Willow Grove Circuit; and T. S. Cunningham, Danville Circuit.

The Conference then united in heartily singing "Nearing

the City," led by Rev. Wm. M. Weekley.

Adjourned on motion at 11:30 o'clock to meet again at 2:30 p. m.

Benediction, F. P. Smith.

#### THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Mrs. M. E. Tuttle. On motion the following resolution was adopted: "Resolved that we recognize in Rev. J. H. Manning an efficient evangelist and revivalist, and commend him to the confidence of the people everywhere," signed by S. Garrigus, and J. G. Rogers.

On motion it was ordered that requests for ministerial tranfers should be referred to the committee on applicants.

The examination of pastoral reports was resumed, and the following pastors submitted reports and their characters were passed: W. L. Hinshaw, Union Chapel Circuit; Miss Hattie Battson, Sterling Mission; Jas. F. McMullen, Geuda Springs Circuit; A Burrill, Wellington Mission; P. H. Blinn, Little River Circuit; W. H. Porter, Green Ridge Circuit; J. R. Harner, Mulvane Circuit; G. W. Morgan, Hutchinson Mission; J. J. Maxey, Maize Circuit; S. W. Foulk, Garden City Mission.

On motion it was ordered that the missionary appropriations

for the coming year be limited to within the amount of the regular missionary assessment; and that an additional assesment be made sufficient to cover the present missionary indebtedness.

On motion it was voted that the assessment made for the missionary debt be collected and remitted to the Branch Missionary Treasurer during the first six months of the coming Conference year.

S. W. Foulk being absent, on motion J. R. Harner was requested by the Conference to present the interests of Church Erection in a written report. Rev. W. M. Weekley then favored the Conference with an interesting and instructive address on Church Erection interests. He also spoke of the Search Light and the Weaver Memorial Fund, and took a number of subscriptions for each.

On motion a committed on the publication of minutes was appointed consisting of the secretary, F. P. Smith, and E. A. Powell.

On motion it was voted that the one-half of church erection fund to be retained by the Conference be applied on the debt due from the Kingman church to the parent church erection society.

Adjournment on motion at 4:35 o'clock. Benediction, Rev. W. M. Weekley.

#### FRIDAY MORNING.

Conference was called to order at 9 o'clock.

After the singing of a hymn, three voluntary prayers were offered. Another hymn was sung and there followed the usual morning lecture from Bishop Mills.

The roll of ministers and lay delegates was called, and the minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

G. W. Morgan introduced a written resolution, to which were appended the names of S. Garrigus, E. A. Powell, J. E. Wilson, C. E. Murphy and G. W. Morgan, providing for the organization of a Conference Camp Meeting Association, to consist of five or more members. Sail Board of Directors to rent or buy a Tabernacle and arrange for camp meetings. After some discussion, the resolution was adopted.

On motion it was voted to require the licentiates to meet their committee on Course of Reading, and take their examinations, the day before Conference convenes in annual session.

Pastoral reports were resumed, and the following reports and characters were passed: G. W. and M. E. Tuttle, Sedgwick circuit; H. H. Zeigler, Liberty Chapel station; J. N. Edwards, Kingman mission; J. G. Rogers, Wichita station; J. A. Sanders, Beaumont circuit; C. E. Farney, Attica circuit; and E. A. Powell, Hackney circuit.

Rev. Ira Holbrook, of the Congregational church, was introduced to the Conference.

The committee on Applicants submitted a report on ministerial transfers, which report was adopted item by item. This same committee on applicants was appointed by the Bishop a committee of investigation in the case of R. B. Smith.

The list of local ministers was called and corrected. On motion, the name of Ira L. Trimble was, by his request, ordered stricken from the list. J. F. Harrison, J. E. Wilson, L. G. Garman, W. H. Porter, D. A. Williams, and E. J. Williams were each voted into the itinerancy.

On Motion C. H. Smith, by his request, was referred back to Quarterly Conference relation.

Adjourned on motion at 11:30. Benediction, Rev. Ira Holbrook.

#### FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

Devotional service conducted by G. W. Morgan.

On motion it was ordered that the different pastors secure all the "ads" for the minutes they can on their respective charges, and report same to the secretary at the earliest possible date.

The committee on boundary submitted a report, and the same was approved by vote.

The list of itinerants was called and corrected.

- F. P. Smith was re-elected one of the presiding elders on first ballot, and C. E. Farney was elected to the same office on third ballot.
- E. A. Powell, G. W. Morgan, J. R. Harner, and W. L. Hinshaw were chosen to assist in stationing the presiding elders.

The committee on Second Year of the Course of Reading submitted report, and the same was adopted.

- .C. E. Heisel, committee on Missions, read his report, and after some discussion the report was approved.
- P. Milligan, C. A. Hendershot, S. Garrigus, G. W. and M. E. Tuttle reported as conference evangelists.

Bishop Mills favored the Conference with a short, but highly instructive and hopeful address, on the foreign missionary work of the church.

The committee on First year of the Course of Reading submitted report, and the same was adopted item by item.

J. R. Harner, committee on Church Erection, by permission of the Conference, read the report on church erection adopted last year, and the same was approved.

It was voted that the next annual session be held in Wichita.

On motion it was ordered that the pastor of Wichita charge be instructed to arrange for good meals convenient to the church house, and at reduced prices if possible, where the ministers, delegates and visitors, who so desire, may take and pay for their noon-day meals during the next annual session.

Adjourned on motion at 4:35. Benediction, J. R. Harner.

#### SATURDAY MORNING.

Devotional services were opened with singing, followed by three voluntary prayers, offered by C. E. Murphy, S. Garrigus and Bishop Mills.

Another hymn was sung, followed by the usual morning lecture and Bible reading given by the Bishop on the spiritual life,

The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

President C. M. Brooke, of Lane University, was invited to an advisory seat in the Conference.

- C. A. Hendershot moved that "Inasmuch as we are not caring for our superanuated ministers as we should, a board of directors be elected with instructions to incorporate and take such steps as are necessary to securing and maintaining a home for the retired ministers of the Arkansas Valley Conference." After some discussion, the motion was approved, and a Board of Directors was elected consisting of J. R. Harner, C. E. Farney, F. P. Smith, S. Garrigus and J. Morrison.
- C. E. Farney, F. P. Smith, J. R. Harner, S. Garrigus and J. Morrison were constituted a Board of Directors for the proposed Conference Camp Meeting Association.

The committee on Finance submitted its report, which report, after receiving one amendment, was adopted.

The committee on Third Year of Course of Reading read its report, and same was adopted item by item.

On motion J. W. Burket, P. H. Blinn, J. A. Sanders and C. E. Heisel were referred to the committee on Elder's orders.

Adjourned on motion at 11:50. Benediction, Pres. C. M. Brooke.

#### SATURDAY AFTERNOON.

Session opened with Scripture reading and prayer by Pres. C. M. Brooke.

Rev. Jeffrey of the M. E. church, was introduced to the conference.

On motion it was voted to have the minutes of the Woman's Missionary Association printed in the Conference minutes.

On motion it was ordered that the Bishop's salary be raised in full during the afternoon session, and that the Sunday's collection be devoted toward paying off the older missionary orders.

On motion it was voted to increase the missionary appropriation to Hutchinson charge, out of the Sunday's collection not to exceed fifty dollars.

- E. J. Williams, committee on Sabbath Schools, read his report, and same was adopted.
- E. J. Williams was elected Sabbath School Secretary and Treasurer.

On motion it was voted that Conference observe the Sabbath School Anniversary with a suitable service on Sunday afternoon, conducted by E. J. Williams.

C. A. Hendershot, committee on Education, submitted report. Pres. C. M. Brooke and Bishop Mills each offered re-

marks on this subject, after which the report was adopted as read.

C. E. Farney, committee on Y. P. C. U., submitted his report, and the same was approved.

The committee on Elder's orders read its report, which was

adopted item by item.

C. E. Heisel, Missionary Treasurer, read an itemized report and same was approved.

J. R. Harner reported the Bishop's assessment collected in full.

The Preachers' Aid Board made report of the distribution of funds, and report was adopted.

The committee on Resolutions submitted its report, and the

same was adopted item by item.

A collection was taken for the secretary, amounting to \$10. On motion the roll of minutes and lay delegates was called to learn the number of Conference minutes wanted,

On motion it was voted to publish one thousand copies of the conference minutes, provided sufficient means can be secured to cover the necessary expense.

On motion the missionary treasury was instructed to pay S. W. Foulk's order made on the treasurer to cover the chart assessments for Garden City.

After offering a few appropriate remarks, the Bisho read the stationing committee's report.

The Devotional committee made announcements for Sunday. Adjourned on motion. Benediction, Bishop Mills.

#### EVENING SERVICES.

Tuesday night. Song and devotional service conducted by C. A. Hendershot. Preaching by Rev. W. M. Weekley. Text, Gen. 5:24. Subject, Walking with God.

Wednesday night. Opening service conducted by S. Garrigus. Sermon by Rev. W. R. Funk, D. D. Text, John 17:3. After the sermon, Rev. Weekley spoke of the Weaver Memorial Fund, and took a collection amounting to \$24.40 cash and \$15 subscription.

Thursday night. Song and devotion conducted by Mrs. M. E. Tuttle. Sermon by T. R. Sprague. Text, Luke 14:22, last clause.

Friday night. Song and prayer service conducted by W. L. Hinshaw. Sermon by Miss Hattie Battson. Text, 2nd Cor. 8:9.

Saturday night. Preliminary services conducted by C. A. Hendershot. Sermon C. E. Farney, Text, John 13:16.

#### SUNDAY'S SERVICES.

U. B. Church.. At 10;30 a. m. Bishop Mills preached from 1st John 5:4, a highly appreciated discourse to a crowded house. After the sermon P. H. Blinn, J. W. Burket, J. A. Sanders and C. E. Heisel were ordained. Before dismissal, a missionary collection was taken, amounting to \$50 cash, and \$53 subscription. At 2:30 p. m. there was a Sabbath School Anniversary service conducted by E. J. Williams. The Young Men's Christian Association of Winfield held services in the church, commencing at 3:30 o'clock. Beginning at 6:30 there was a Y. P. C. U. service conducted by H. H. Zeigler. At 7:45 J. W. Burket preached an appreciated discourse from Rev. 3:20.

The pulpits of other churches in the city were supplied as follows: Baptist:—H. H. Zeigler, morning; P. H. Blinn, evening. Methodist:—J. R. Harner, morning; Pres. C. M. Brooke, evening. Presbyterian:—A. Burrill, morning; W. L. Hinshaw, evening. Disciples:—E. J. Williams, morning;

J. A. Sanders, evening. College Chapel:—Pres. C. M. Brooke, morning; S. Garrigus, evening.

During this session communications were read from the following brethren: G. W. Leitner, W. T. Snyder, R. B. Smith, C. H. Smith and B. F. Foard.

Also, during this annual session, Revs. Switzer and Mason, of the M. E. church, and Rev. Stophlat, of the Presbyterian church, were each introduced to the Conference.

The old parsonage property, located at Mound Ridge, was sold during last year, and the new parsonage at McPherson was purchased with this money. Amount, \$200.

#### CONFERENCE REPORTS.

#### Presiding Elders' Reports.

#### WINFIELD DISTRICT.

To the Bishop and Members of the Arkansas Valley Conference, Greeting: In submitting this report I do so with gratefulness to Almighty God for his kindly remembrance and tender mercies throughout another

year, in life, health, and sustaining grace. For while the year has been fraught with care and anxiety, it has been filled with precious blessings.

Winfield District embraces fifteen fields of labor, of which I make

mention seperately.

Winfield Station. This charge was assigned to J. R. Harner. After spending one Sabbath with his people, Bro. Harner resigned, and C. A. Hendershot was appointed to fill the vacancy. Bro. Hendershot has been very successful in the work here. The most wide spread revival on the District has been here in Winfield. The result has been a wonderful quickening of the church, fifty-nine conversions, and a large increase in membership. The Y. P. C. U societies, the Sunday School, and in fact, every department of church work is in the front rank. Pastor and people are of one accord.

Hackney Circuit. E. A. Powell pastor. All of our church property is in splendid repair. Ervin Chapel has been repainted, and Seeley church repapered this year. An earnest year's labor by both pastor and people. All church interests carefully looked after. Interesting revivals held, with good results. This field has suffered from removals,

several of our best workers having gone to other localities.

Eatonville Circuit. J. E. Wilson in charge. Bro. Wilson has been very energetic, was hindered some in revival work by sickness, but his report will show earnest effort in every particular. Several additions to the church. The church house has been nicely repainted.

Peace and good will exist between Pastor and people.

Beaumont Circuit. This charge was assigned to J. A. Sanders, who resigned soon after conference. April the 22nd, J. A. Sanders of Oklahoma City, was appointed to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of the former Bro. Sanders, and completed the year to the delight and satisfaction of all concerned. This is a large and rather difficult field to travel. Bro. Sanders has been very faithful. Several good revivals have been held, resulting in additions to the church. The parsonage, now located at Beaumont, should be removed at once to a more central location.

Turon Circuit, J. W. Burket pastor. A good work has been done

on this field, and careful attention has been given to all church enterprises. A systematic method of doing business and caring for church responsibilities, has been put into practice this year. Church houses have been repaired, debts paid, and a new \$55.00 bell purchased for the Turon church by the Junior Y. P. C. U. Arrangements have been perfected providing for the early payment of the Turon church debt. Young People's societies and Sabbath schools are wide awake. A protracted meeting of considerable interest was held in Turon. Other meetings were somewhat hindered by sickness.

Geuda Springs Circuit, Assigned to W. T. Snyder. Bro. Snyder wished to enter Lane University, and resigned the charge October 1st. J. P. McMullen was appointed to fill the vacancy. Both church houses have been put in excellent repair. Yeager chapel has been recarpeted and repainted, and Johnson chapel has been repapered, repainted, and provided with a good bell. Bro. McMullen has done a good work,

conducting two series of meetings with good results.

Kingman Mission. J. N. Edwards pastor. Bro. Edwards has been very faithful, untiring in his zeal, accomplishing a good work. A protracted meeting of unusual interest was held in Kingman. Revival work in the country was hindered some by sickness. The debt on the Kingman church has been considerably reduced. Without question the greatest pall of gloom and discouragement hanging over this field is the Kingman church debt, which, as a matter of fact, our people are not able to remove.

Greenridge Circuit. W. H. Porter pastor. This has been a difficult field to travel, the extreme points being some fifty miles apart. The pastor has done the best he could, under the discouraging circumstances. He has served on a very meager salary, bu without a word of censure or complaint, displaying in a marked degree the spirit of the Saviour. Some revival interest, with a few additions to the church. His report will show the largest list of Telescopes, in pro-

portion to membership, of any charge in the district.

Mulvane Circuit. This charge was assigned to B. F. Foard, who resigned October 19th, and on November 5th, J. R. Harner was appointed to the work and completed the year in a very satisfactory manner. The outlook for the future is hopeful. The greatest hinderance on this field is the Mulvane church debt; but during the year this debt has been considerably reduced, and plans are now maturing for its early liquidation. The parsonage, one of the best in the conference, has been put in excellent repair. At Shiloh we have a local W. M. A., organized thirteen years ago, and which still enjoys a healthy existence under the efficient leadership of Sister Dora B. Shull.

Greensburg Mission. D. A. Williams pastor. The past has been a good year for general awakening on this field. Assisted by Rev. D. M. Gray, of the Kansas Conference, Bro. Williams has been very successful in revival work. One meeting held in Mullinville, resulted in forty conversions. The meeting in Greensburg resulted in several being awakened and brought to God, and the church greatly quickened. I apprehend that this pastor's report will show the greatest number of

accessions of any charge in the district.

Danville Circuit. T. S. Cunningham pastor. Some good revivals have been held, resulting in a number of conversions and accessions to the church. The pastor has untiringly brought to the front every interest of our Zion, and is to be commended for the success attained. Denominational competition is extremely sharp, ou at least a part of this field, presenting some peculiar difficulties, but Bro. Cunningham has demonstrated his fitness for the emergency. The parsonage has been neatly repapered and repainted.

Coldwater Mission. O. P. Myers in charge. This is a large and difficult field to care for, embracing a territory of rough country, with appointments far apart. But some of the most generous hearted people to be found anywhere live in the bounds of this charge. Bro. Myers has done what he could, taking up one new appointment, and receiving a few persons into the church. The outlook for the future is encouraging.

Corbin Circuit C. E. Heisel pastor. Bro. Heisel has just completed his third year on this charge. A faithful year's labor has been accomplished. Mills Chapel, located in Corbin and a beautiful temple in which to worship God, was dedicated by Bishop J. A. Mills, June 5th, 1898. Much credit is due Bro. Heisel, and his faithful membership as well, for pushing this enterprise to completion. The zealous pastor has overlooked nothing pertaining to better church equipment, and good results have obtained.

Attica Circuit. C. E. Farney pastor. Bro. Farney has done a most excellent year's work. He has been very faithful and zealous, commanding the respect and love of all. It would, indeed, be very difficult to find existing anywhere a more tender spirit of oneness and sympathy between pastor and people, than exists on Attica Charge. Church interests have been carefully considered. A precious revival was held, resulting in the awakening of the church, conversion of sinners, and an increase in membership. The most stubborn hindrance on this charge is the Attica church debt. If this debt could be removed surprising developements would soon follow.

Wellington Mission. A Burrill pastor. This is a new field, blocked out one year ago, with one small society as a nucleus to start with. Bro. Burrill has worked hard in the face of discouraging features, and done remarkably well in developing the field. We now have in Wellington an organization consisting of fourteen members. There are on this charge two interesting Y. P. C. U. socities, both senior and junior, and a good Sunday School with an enrollment of forty. In this city of vast opportunities our great need is a house in which to worship.

Valuable and greatly appreciated assistance has been rendered in various ways by the ministerial brethren. Sickness and extreme cold weather has hindered revival effort on nearly every field. Much credit is due the Ladies Aid Societies for their zeal and generosity in providing funds for general church purposes. Brethren sustaining supernumerary and superanuated relation have been able to do much in the Master's name helping others. C. H. McGrath requests that his name be erased from the conference roll, and he be granted the privilege of sustaining a quarterly conference relation.

One promising young man has been licensed to preach and another has been recommended to this body for membership. The circulation of our literature, especially the Telescope and Watchword, is consid-

erably increased.

The laity of our church are, as a rule, a generous hearted class, and as willing as any to divide their last loaf with their pastor. But our greatest need on this line of benevolence is system. On many fields we are practically without system. Are we surprised to hear the Master say, "The children of this world are wiser in their generation than the children of light?" No, indeed. There is no corporation in the world but what would reap bankruptcy within twelve months, if they transacted business with as little regard for the law of system as we often display in church work. On charges where Biblical methods are practiced, pastors' salaries and chart assessments are paid in full. God hasten the day when the system of tithing shall obtain throughout the church of the United Brethren in Christ. I wish to thank all for the kind treatment and encouragement given to me during the year. Quarterlies held, 60. Sermons preached, 211. Baptisms performed, 21. Salary—assessed, \$502; receiveed \$487.45. Paid for level help, incidental and traveling expenses, \$135.67. I beg leave to submit the following recommedations: First. That when at all practicable the pastor be returned. I regard it as very disastrous for both ministry and laity, as also for the general interests of the church, to keep constantly changing pastors. Second. That our missionary appropriations be not allowed to over reach our income, as per chart assessment. Third. The levying of an assessment for mission debt purposes sufficient to cancel all outstanding orders. Fourth. That a liberal church erection assessment be levied for home church erection purposes, centralizing our forces in this direction, looking forward to a speedy cancelation of all church erection loans.

Resignations. For reasons apparent to all, Bro. Maxey resigned Crescent mission, March 25th, 1898. On account of Sister Sprague's declining health, Bro. Sprague resigned McPherson mission, to take effect August 20th. Bro. E. J. Williams resigned Sedgwick circuit to take charge of McPherson mission, and was so appointed. Bro. and Sister Tuttle kindly accepted the appointment to Sedgwick circuit August 24th. Bro. R. B. Smith resigned Sterling mission September 14th. Bro. G. R. Jackman resigned Hutchinson mission September 22nd. Bro. G. W. Morgan resigned Maize circuit October 22nd, and was at once appointed to Hutchinson mission. Bro. J. J. Maxey kindly accepted the appointment to Maize circuit, November 10th. REPORTS

Our people at Sterling were sadly discouraged, but through the kind and earnest effort of Sister Hattie Battson their courage has been renewed, and they are endeavoring to hold on to God and the church.

Church Property. At the first quarterly held on Hudson circuit, the board of trustees for Prairie Chapel were instructed to dispose of that church house, as it was not being used. After mature deliberation they sold the house to the Methodist people. The proceeds were applied, in part, to repairing Bethel Church, and the remainder toward building a new house for the Mt. Pleasant class. During the year several church houses have been improved by painting, papering, carpeting, etc. Pleasant Valley, Pleasant Grove, Wichita, Sterling, Liberty Chapel, and Bethel have each snared in these improvements. There are nineteen church houses and seven parsonages on this dis-

trict, all in good repair generally.

General Interests. I apprehend that the pastor's reports will show progress made in the general interests of the church. Chart collections are not all full, but the pastors, in the main; I believe have pressed these claims in advance over last year. I think there is an increase in the number of Telescopes taken, though the number is yet too low. Our motto should be, One Telescope to every family. Pastor's reports will show the number of accessions, and also the amount of salary received. Some of the pastoral salaries are insufficient to cover the necessary expenses of pastor and family. If all our people would adopt the tithing system, and pay out the Lord's money systematically, much better conditions would obtain. The Sabbath Schools of the district are doing a grand work, and are well supplied with our own literature. The V. P. C. U. societies are doing good work for God and the church. Several of our young people are now in Laue University, seeking preparation for greater usefulness in life. Ministerial brothren sustaining evangelistic, supernumerary and superanuated relation have done well in rendering aid to pastors. Quarterlies held, 55. Sermons preached, 173. Salary received, \$393.29. Traveling and incidental expenses, \$79.16. Miles traveled, 5,818. I wish to thank both the ministry and laity for the kindness shown to me during the year. #### Standing Committees' Reports.

#### EDUCATION.

Education is the ground work of civilization, the corner stone of good gove:nment, the bulwark of liberty, the polish of christianity.

Without education we would have discord, heathenism, paganism and tyrany. Education means more than brain culture; it includes soul culture-the development of the spiritual man-the culture of soul and body. For this purpose there is no institution equal to a denominational school. We recognize in the Summer School of Theology at Lane University an educational opportunity seldom afforded the ministers of today; one seldom equalled-never excelled. We recognize in Lane University the proper place for the education of Uni ed Brethren young people; a school that ought to have the hearty support of every member of the church in Kansas. Therefore, Be it resolved: 1st, That we urge the lay members of every charge to demand of their pastor his attendance at the Summer School of Theology this year, and that they furnish him with the necessary funds for such purpose, above and apart from his salary. 2nd, That each pastor be required to give his hearty support to Lane University, and to urge the parents on his charge to send their children there. 3rd, That each minister be urged to finish his education at Union Biblical Seminary, and that we favor the raising of a fund for the purpose of sending to that institution each year a student who, unless he go to a foreign field, will pledge himself to return to and remain in this conference to labor for a certain specified time. #### SABBATH SCHOOLS.

"Behold I have set before you an open door." 3rd, That we earnestly recommend to our schools that as far as possible they take and use our own literature. 4th, That we again recommend the organization of Normal classes, when at all practicable, that we may have more efficient teachers in our schools. The outlook at home is not so favorable, Missionary appropriations in excess of the chart collections have rendered a very undesirable condition of affairs. Many of our brethren have toiled and sacrificed making calculations on missionary dues that have been one, two, and sometimes three years materializing. In pursuance of the above we recommend the following: 1st, That we will encourage and assist in the establishing of missions in the new lands now open for the gospel. 2nd. That we unite our prayers and efforts in behalf of missionaries in Africa in the re-establishing of our work there. 3rd, That we endeavor to stimulate missionary interest both home and foreign. 4th, That we reduce the number of mission charges in the conference, making as many as possible self supporting; and to those in urgent need, make the appropriation sufficient to materially benefit the pastor. 5th, That the chart assessment be made sufficient to cover both the mission debt and appropriations made. Your committee would submit the following report: As this is the most wonderful age in the world's history, wonderful because the common people are reading as never before, and because the printing pressums night and day, sending out a literature that is eagerly caught up and read as never before. Efforts are made to supplant the better and purer forms of literature with others that are trashy and cheap at any price. All preachers of our church are agents of the Publishing House. It is to our interest to increase the volume of our church literature, because after a sufficient capital to carry on the business is retained, the balance applies to the benefit of the traveling and retired

itinerant preachers, their widows and orphans.

Be it resolved, 1st, That the present management of the Publishing House meets with our appreciation and approval. We commend our Publishing Agent for bringing the business of the House to the more business like principle of a cash basis. During the last thirty years the House has lost over \$40,000 in bad accounts. Such an amount of money would be a good thing to have now to help the needy. 2nd, That we are pleased, but not satisfied, with the present circulation of our literature, although the Telescope has nearly reached the twenty thousand line. The circulation of the Watchword has reached nine thousand and four hundred, and should be more. The S. S. literature is the best in the history of our church. Let us endeavor to increase the circulation of all our publications, the Search Light, the Quarterly Review, the Woman's Evangel, and all. Are we not all in favor of expansion? It was American literature that gave freedom to Cuba. Spain, with a fighting record of one thousand years, went down before the power of the school and the church. 3rd, That it is the duty of every pastor of this conference, to see to it that the circulation of the Telescope on his or her field of labor be increased, to at least one subscription to every seven members. 4th, That we earnestly commend to our preachers and people the proposed New Century Theological Library series, to be edited by our own authors; and also the new book on Africa, by Bishop J. S. Mills. 5th, That it is the duty of our preachers and members, as far as possible, to take and recommend our Quarterly Review. Respectfully, John Morrison.

3. WHEREAS, The members of this conference session have been so rovally entertained and provided for by the pastor and citizens of Winfield; therefore, be it Resolved, that by a rising vote we express our sincere appreciation of their hospitality. And

WHEREAS, There has been so many resignations during the past year, and some have irregularly withdrawn and gone to sister churches; therefore be it Resolved that, in order to sustain a good standing in the conference, and in order to secure a trausfer, should one be desired, no pastor having accepted of a charge shall leave his field of labor without notifying his presiding elder at least four weeks previous to taking his leave.

5. RESOLVED, That it is the sense of this conference that the membership of each charge should grant their pastor a sufficient vacation this year to attend the Summer School of Theology at Lane University.

6. Believing that Mormonism is an enemy to the purity of the free institutions of a republican form of government, therefore be it Resolved that this Arkansas Valley Conference now assembled, pray the Congress of the United States to sustain our ideal of purity and liberty, by refusing to seat in that body the Mormon congressman elect from Utah.

8. RESOLVED, That we hereby express our disapproval of the Army Canteen system, and we urge our cougressmen to do all in their power J. G. ROGERS. Respectfully, toward abolishing the system.

Said board to have charge of tabernacie to rent same to any minister in the conference, as may be arranged for.
