## MINUTES.

THE White River Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, began its Seventeenth Session in the Southern Methodist church house in Jonesboro, Ark., on the 15th day of December, A. D., 1886, at 9 o'clock a.m.

Bishop Charles B. Galloway, presiding, called the Conference to order, conducted religious services, and opened the Conference.

A communication from the Secretary of the Board of Missions was read and referred to the Conference Board of Missions.

A communication from Josephus Anderson, Treasurer of the General Conference Delegation was read and ordered recorded.

- J. B. Sutler spoke for the Arkansas *Methodist*, in which he has bought an interest.
- C. G. Johnston, a lay delegate from Newport District, was excused from further attendance during the Conference.

Question 20:—Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?

The names of J. M. Talkington, Frank Ritter, M. M. Smith, H. T. Gregory, S. L. Cochran, Josephus Anderson, John Rhyne and E. T. Jones were called and their characters passed.

John Rhyne asked for superannuated relation; E. T. Jones, for supernumerary relation, and their requests were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.

Rev's. M. D. Early, of the Missionary Baptist Church, Charles H. Cary, late of the Arkansas Conference, William T Ready, late of the West'ern Conference, Wilbur F. Wright, late of the South West Missouri

Conference, and Edgar M. Pipkin, formerly of the Little Rock Conference, were introduced to the Conference.

Question 1:-Who are admitted on trial?

Hardy M. Cryer, from El Paso Circuit, Searcy District; Richard M. Manley, from DeView Circuit, Helena District; Stone W. Anderson, from Wheatly Circuit, Helena District; Robt. A. Jackson, from DeView Circuit, Helena District; Robt. H. Grissett, from Ash Flat Circuit, Batesville District; Fay C. Sterling, from Newberg Circuit, Batesville District; Geo. W. Smith, from Bethesda Circuit, Batesville District; Few Ball, from St. Francis Mission, Jonesboro District; recommended by their several Quarterly Conferences, and having passed an approved examination, were admitted on trial.

James E. Vick, from Taylor's Creek Circuit, Helena District; C. C. Skipper, from Walnut Ridge Circuit, Newport District, and Wm. E. Bishop, from Melbourne Circuit, Batesville District, were recommended by their several Quarterly Conferences, but, failing to pass an approved examination, were not admitted.

Question 2:-Who remain on trial, was resumed.

R. S. Deener, Wm. J. Vick, T. B. Williamson, Wm. A. Peck, and E. M. Davis stood approved examinations; their characters passed, they were continued on trial and advanced to the second year.

M. J. Hiyeley, W. S. Southworth and Michael Martz were not before the committee; their characters passed and they were continued on trial in the class of the first year.

Question 7:-Who are the Deacons of one year?

E. L. W. Arnold, J. D. Rutledge and W. E. Rutledge stood approved examinations; (E. L. W. Arnold last year,) their characters passed and they were advanced to the class of the fourth year.

#### THIRD DAY.

Friday morning, December 17, 1886, Conference was opened at 9 o'clock, Bishop Galloway presiding.

Religious services were conducted by Thos. Vincent.

The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

R w.I.G.John, D. D., Missionary Secretary, Rev. E. E. Hamilton, D. D., of the Memphis Conference; Rev. J. C. Alexander, of the St. Louis Conference, and V. V. Harlan, of the Arkansas Conference, were introduced to the Conference.

A telegram worded as follows was read from Rev. J. C. Brown:

"ST. Joe, Mo., December 17, 1886.
An absent son sends greetings to his Mother Conference. Pray for us. Ephesians VI, 23rd verse."

The Secretaries were requested to respond at once to the telegram. They sent the following telegram:

Your Mother Conference loves and prays for you. 1st Timothy, 1V Chapter, verses 12, 14, 15 and 16.

The credentials of Charles B. Hunton, as a Deacon and an Elder; and the credentials of Monroe G. Poe, as a Deacon, were surrendered to the Conference.

Craig, J. C. Ritter, M. C. Morris, C. H. Ford, N. E. Skinner, S. W. Register, F. E. Taylor, W. R. Foster, Thos. Vincent, S. D. Evans, R. D. Moon, J. F. Armstrong, E. M. Pipkins, John Moore, J. J. Alexander, J. F. Troy, F. R. Noe, W. W. Anderson, J. S. Watson, W. M. Watson, R. G. Brittain, E. M. Baker, A. C. Griffin, B. Harris, J. F. Jernigan, N. B. Fizer, I. A. Vernon were called one by one and their characters passed.

Dr. Johns addressed the Conference in behalf of the Missionary Cause.

J. F. Jernigan offered the following resolutions, which were adopted, to-wit:

Resolved, 1st, That we will take up our Foreign Missionary Collection by the 1st of March, 1887.

2nd. That we will, by the grace of God, work to double our Foreign Missionary collections the ensuing year.

Tolbert Rawlings, a minister in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church presented a letter of dismissal from Searcy Presbytery, of said Church, and asked to be recognized as an elder in the traveling connection.

Geo. Thornburgh made the point of order, that as the applicant was not recommended by a Quarterly Conference, and did not come from an accredited branch of the Methodist Church, it was not proper to recognize him.

The president decided the point not well taken upon the law, and the applicant was recognized as an elder in the traveling connection, upon condition that he take upon himself our Ordination Vows.

Question 14:-What local preachers are elected elders?

G. W. Henry, lately a minister of the Protestant Methodist Church in elders orders recommended by the Quarterly Conference of LaCrosse and Evening Shade station, Batesville District, presented his application for recognition of his orders, accompanied by a note certifying his belief in the doctrines and discipline of our Church, and he was recognized as an elder in the local ranks, on condition that he take upon himself our Ordination Vows.

The Statistical secretary made his report which was laid over until tomorrow.

H. M. Granade and N. B. Fizer offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That Rev. Andrew Hunter, D. D., is requested to preach his semi-centential ermon to the White River Conference on Sunday night Dec. 18, 1886.

Dr. E. E. Hamilton spoke fraternally to the Conference.

R. Gulley was excused from further attendance during the Conference.

Conference Adjourned with the doxology and the benediction by the president.

#### FOURTH DAY.

Conference met at 9 o'clock a.m. Bishop Galloway presiding.

Religious services were conducted by J. C. Alexander.

The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

The Committee on Conference Relations reported, recommending that John Rhyne be granted a superannuated and Ed. T Jones a supernumerary relation.

Question 17:--Who are supernnmeraries? Ed. T. Jones.

Question 18:-Who are superannuated? John Rhyne.

Question 19:—What preachers have died during the past year? None.

The Committee on Books and Periodicals made its report, No. 2, which was adopted. (See Appendix.)

John H. Dye addressed the Conference in regard to his disconnection with the Arkansas *Methodist* and his course generally during the year.

Rev. J. Ditzler, D. D., was introduced to the Conference.

Question 16:—Who are located this year? T. B. F. James, at his own request.

The Board of Education made its report which was adopted. (See Appendix.)

Question 4:-- Who are admitted into full connection?

A. M. R. Branson, Thos. Whitaker, W. A. Pendergrass and A. J. Johnson stood approved examinations before the Committee; their characters passed and they answering all the disciplinary questions, after being addressed by the president, were, by vote of the Conference, severally admitted into full connection.

Question 34:—Where shall the next session of the Conference be held? Searcy, Ark.

Resolved, 1st. That every Preacher in charge be required hereafter to

pay into the hands of the Secretary at each annual Conference \$1 to pay for publishing the minutes.

2nd. That the preacher may collect this from their Charges. And the minutes shall be sent to the preachers for free distribution and to laymen who subscribe for them.

Geo. Thornburgh moved that Louis B. Audigier be elected publisher of the minutes for this session, and that E. A. Garrison be appointed to raise thirty dollars to pay part cost of the minutes, and that the said publisher be authorized to obtain advertisements of respectable business to pay balance of cost, which motion prevailed.

The Committee on Bible Cause made its report which was adopted. (See Appendix.)

## APPENDIX.

#### REPORTS OF BOARDS AND COMMITTEES.

#### BOARD OF EDUCATION.

It is with pleasure that we note the visit to our Conference of Prof. E. E. Hoss of the Theological Department of Vanderbilt University. This University is ours, and we rejoice in the prosperity, and in the manifest indications of yet larger growth and usefulness. The present year is one of the most prosperous in its history. It now numbers more than six hundred students, and is thoroughly equiped and furnished in every department to meet the wants of the Church and the demands of the times. Among the last bequests of Wm. H. Vanderbilt was a large fund to the University, which has been applied to the erection of dormitories for students, where board and lodging can be procured at actual cost. So that the doors of our great University are now open to all our worthy young men, no matter how limited their means. We would urge the importance of presenting the claims of Vanderbilt to our people and endeavoring to fill its halls and lecture rooms with our young men.

We gladly mention the Central Collegiate Institute, located at Altus, a place "beautiful for situation," and suitable for many reasons as the location of a college. The school is now the property of the Arkansas and Little Rock Conferences. Rev. V. V. Harlan, Financial Agent, appeared before your board, stating that the school is in a prosperous condition. The catalogue of last year shows an attendance of one hundred and eighty-three students.

WHEREAS, Methodism was born in one of the most renowned Universities of the world; that she has never been able to do her work or fulfill her mission apart from her schools and colleges. And,

WHEREAS, Large numbers of our young ladies and young men leave our state annually for their education; and thus thousands of dollars are taken from us, which should remain to build up our home institutions. And.

WHEREAS, Our people have grown in numbers and wealth, and we can no longer plead our poverty as a bar to an advance in educational work.

WHEREAS, The work of building up a college is great; and the difficulties are many; yet they are not too great to be conquered by the united efforts and action of Arkansas Methodism under the blessings of God. Therefore, be it

Resolved, That we adopt the Central Collegiate Institute as our Conference school; and that we will urge our people to patronize it as far as may be possible. But this action is not to be understood as in any way binding this Conference for the financial obligations of the school.

Resolved, secondly; That we invite the Financial Agent, Bro. V. V. Harlan, to visit our various charges in the interest of the college, securing whatever funds our people may contribute.

Resolved, thirdly; That the Bishop be requested to appoint a visiting

committee of three.

Resolved, fourthly; That the conference elect, or the Bishop appoint, as the conference may order, five trustees, three ministers and two laymen, to serve with a like number of trustees from the Arkansas and Little Rock Conferences.

Resolved, That we recommend Quitman Male & Female College, located at Quitman, Cleburne Co., Ark., as well worthy of patronage. It has a fine faculty, healthy location and the best of moral surroundings, with tuition and board very cheap. [Signed]

#### BOOKS AND PERIODICALS.

The Committee on Books and Periodicals respectfully submit the following report:

We are glad to know that great success has attended the Arkansas *Methodist* during the year just past; several thousand subscribers having been added to its list. It has doubtless done great good in the bounds of our Conference in the past, and the indications are that it will be more efficient in the future. It has faithfully condemned the wrong and upheld the right. The business department has changed hands and will in future be controlled by J. B. Sutter, who is a skillful business man. We feel that it will not only be ably edited, but carefully managed in a business-like way, and hence become a greater lever to aid in lifting all the interests of the Church.

We, as your Committee, therefore, heartily endorse the Arkansas *Methodist*, and would recommend that it be adopted again as our "Conference Organ," and we further recommend that a Committee of three be appointed to act as a Publishing Committee with like Committees of the other two Conferences in the state.

The Conference then elected the following Committee: J. II. Dye, F. A. Jeffett and J. F. Jernigan.

The success attending our Publishing House at Nashville, is a source of congratulation. The judicious management of our Book Agent, together with the indomitable energy and financial ability of the Business Manager, places this Institution on a firm basis, and it stands to-day a monument to the wisdom of its managers. Your Committee commend our

Publishing House to the patronage of every Methodist in the White River Conference, and would urge upon our Ministry the importance of increased energy, in obtaining for it the patronage it merits. From the report of Rev. John B. McFerrin, D. D., Agent, we are much gratified to learn that the business has been largely increased, and the finances are in a healthy condition. The bonded indebtedness is rapidly being decreased. The influence of the House is widely felt by the stimulation and development it is giving to authorship, and the character of the books it is introducing into circulation. Among the many notable and commendable books recently published, we urge especially the circulation of "History of Methodism," by Bishop H. N. McTyeire. If our membership will read this book, they will obtain a more intelligent understanding of the Church, and their devotion to it will be deepened. Many Methodists are uninstructed in our standard literature, and do not read the valuable books which are being published from our presses. There are many Methodist homes that are not visited by any of the excellent periodicals published by our Church. If this can be remedied, all our interests will receive a new impulse of progress, and the Church will be placed in an attitude for far more aggressive work at home and in its missionary fields.

Our Sunday school periodicals are ably edited, and are fully abreast with the progress that has marked this department of Christian work. They have a large and rapidly increasing circulation, and merit it by their intrinsic value and comparative cheapness. We, therefore, urge upon our preachers to see to it that our own literature is used in every one of our Sunday Schools.

The Christian Advocate, published at Nashville, is the central organ of our Church and is in every way a credit to it. It is eminently a religious family paper, and must prove a blessing to every home into which it regularly goes. We commend it to our people as deserving a much wider circulation among them.

The Southern Methodist *Review*, edited by the general book editor at Nashville, is a strong periodical, calculated to engage the best minds. We commend it to the patronage of our people.

The Advocate of Missions, also published at Nashville and edited by Rev. I. G. John, D.D., our missionary secretary, is an excellent paper and Methodist home. Could this paper, into every should literature of our Church, and of other and other missionary the circulation it should, our people Churches, have understand fully where their money given for "Foreign sions" goes and how it is applied, and missionary zeal would be kindled anew and soon burn in every heart. Pagan altars would fall and Christian temples rise; the groans of the dying heathens would be changed to the shout of the dying Christians; all eyes would see the light; all ears would hear the story of the Cross, and a crucified Savior would be lovingly looked to even from the end of the earth.

The Book *Enterprise* of Dr. Godden at Little Rock draws its supplies from the Nashville Publishing House, and will sell at Publishing House prices. It is a home enterprise, and we commend it to our people.
