PENCILINGS BY THE WAY.

We have found Milan the most plea mnt, active and thriving city we have visited in Italy. The population amounts to 210,000 souls. They are a manufactoring people. In fashion, parade, gaiety and display, it is the Paris of Italy; in manufactures, the Manchester, and in commerce, the Liverpool. Milan was long an Austrian province, now it is a part of the Empire of Italy. Under the Austrian government the people were forbidden to manufacture anything, and had to devote themselves to art. It is different now, or beginning to be. We found an Exhibition in full blastlarge buildings handsomely decorated and well filled with articles manufactured here and in other cities of Italy. We saw on the flag "Industria Expopete with the nations of the earth in development and progress. We visited the silk department of the

Exposition and saw the whole process of making silk goods from the cocoon to the finest ribbon, satin or silk. We mw the silk separated from the cocoon, then reeled, twisted, hanked, put in the looms, and all the looms at work. All this was from Lombardy; and I assure you it was wonderful. Much of the machinery as well as the work of the employes elicited our very warmest admiration. All the cities of Italy in all things nescessary to home and life. Fancy, as well as real ideas of and delight. I have never seen a better display in furniture, queensware and all things needful for the toilet. Some of the rich chamber sets, sideboards, book cases, easy chairs, etc. were enough to tempt the avarice of a king. The show of jewelry, dresses, and many other fine articles nearly crazed some of our company. In machinery-agricultural, horticultural implements-and time saving and money making arrangements, country is at least fifty if not one hundred years behind ours; but Italy will now begin to rise, if the nationalities will help to sustain her present government. It can never be an agricultural country like our South and West; but it may imitate our East and North in manufacturies. We are really delighted with the future of Italy since we have seen this Exposition, and feasted our eyes on the wonders already accomplished by our people. Some one shooting out of the dark, ventures to strike at my article in your paper. He says "it is calculated to do great harm." I am very sorry But let's see. "I said we have excellent laws." That idea is not original with me. The anti-whisky laws of our State elicit commendation and endorsement from the ardent and able every side. No harm here. I said,

"Let them be enforced." Is that harm? Their enforcement has given just the object lesson we need-prohibition towns, districts and counties in contrast with those where saloons are tolerated. The people are being educated. A prohibition sentiment is steadily growing. So I say Let us continue our educational

me no harm in that. I want the saloon man, if he receives license by law, put under bond to keep the Sabbath, and not to sell to minors etc. Ah! Garcon thinks that would do great harm. I can't see it, but he may be wiser than I.

I want no man licensed to sell whiskey without the written consent of his immediate neighbors. There is many a saloon doing a thriving business; to-day, that would have no existence if the law required this. I can't see the harm. I said I would roughly indicate some legislation immediately needed. I did not propose to be definite. I was not framing the statute. But Gargon seizes upon this fact of indefiniteness to say: "It is probable Mr. R. means a very small circle, for if the saloon shark could get a small circle in the immediate vicinity to give their consent, he could get a license and curse an entire community. "He thus seeks to make the impression that I would make it easy as possible for a man to set up a saloon. Now either Gargon does not know me, or he would slander me. I don't know whether to charge him with ignorance or mendacity.

If we can not get a majority to vote against license, we may try a local option petition. If we fail to get a majority of the men and woman with in three miles of a given centerthen what? As the law now stands we must submit. But I say, then let saloonist obtain the written consentnot of a majority-but of all who reside or do business within some given distance of his den-the larger the circle the better-and then if every body votes for the saloon put the smoonist under bond, and perhaps he cant find any one to go on his bond. All very likely to do harm-to the whiskey business.

-I am a prohibitionist per se. I have been advocating it thirty-five years. We have it in some states. We have see the prohibition area extended after test, she the next election. We want constitutional prohibition when we can. Gargon wants it sooner, and will do nothing for any restriction on the traffic until that comes,-nothing but sit on a stump and make mouths at those who are at work.

Had the last Legislature provided for the submission of such and amendment to the constitution, to be voted on at the coming election; it would most likely have been lost-and the cause set back for years. should the coming election show such a vote against license as will justify hope of success we shall insist that the next legislature submit the question to the



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
