WELL DONE, GOOD SERVANTS.

We are fast approaching the close of another ecclesiastical year, and its cares and labors, failures and successes will soon pass into the life history of the workers in the Lord's vineyard.

As these servants of the Lord have not lived to themselves, but have been known and felt in their works of faith and labors of love, they may also appeal confidently for the approval of their hearers.

While we now look back over the year's work in this State, our most candid judgment is, that the itinerant preachers generally have been not only loyal and diligent, but unusually successful in their labors.

We were personally advised of some cases in which the preacher and his family were really in actual want of the necessities of life; but this painful fact was not paraded in the press nor heralded from the housetop to the discredit of the communities.

Now the time has come, when the preachers may rightfully expect the just and prompt payment of the allowances made for their support.

These allowances or salaries were assessed by godly men composing the Boards of Stewards, the duly appointed representatives of the Church, and the obligation to pay them in full should not be ignored.

responded to this call. For four years in succession have you paid this fund in excess. Do not, I pray you, fall to again pay in excess.

We hope all our readers will give their thoughtful consideration and hearty approval to what he says in the following: Now, I wish to say a word or two to the stewards and members of the Church in behalf of your pastors. Do, brethren, pay them in full.

SUCCESSIONISM.

Let me state briefly what seems to me to be the truth concerning the historic episcopate. The Greek word episcopos, translated in N. T. Bishop or overseer, meaning also watcher, inspector or supervisor, etc., was a title given in the first century of the Christian era to the man who had charge of a church or parish.

It was the custom for some centuries that all the Christians resident in any one city were reckoned one church, with of course one pastor or Bishop. There might be, and indeed there soon was in the large cities many places of worship and many ministers—elders, deacons and others—but the one pastor was Bishop or overseer of all.

Ordination by Bishops is not prescribed by Scripture. It does not follow that it is contrary to Scripture, or that the Church errs in vesting this authority in Bishops—rather in setting apart certain presbyters with authority to officiate in conferring orders, and in calling these presbyters Bishops.

Again, Art 25 declares that "Orders * * * have not any visible sign or ceremony ordained of God." The same is said of Confirmation. "Those five commonly called sacraments, that is to say, Confirmation, Penance, Orders," &c., " * * * have not any visible sign or ceremony ordained of God."

ploring this increase of responsibility—they by-and-by found themselves Bishops of dioceses—not so called at first, the name came later—but so in fact.

Was there any way to avoid all this? Did not these weak churches with their feeble pastors in the midst of persecutions and surrounded by a weltering mass of heathenism, from which they had so lately escaped—did they not need the counsel, help and oversight of the stronger, wiser, more experienced Bishops in the established and cultured city churches? Could this counsel and oversight have been righteously withheld from them?

In the lapse of centuries it became necessary to come to some agreement and understanding with respect to the territory over which each of these leading Bishops had oversight, and so at length by mutual concession and consent certain well defined limits of power and jurisdiction were established and diocesan episcopacy became a definite fact throughout all Christendom.

How far all this was right or wrong I neither say nor judge. I certainly believe that the Christians of the first three centuries managed all their ecclesiastical affairs fully as wisely as those of this age would have done had we lived then and there.

But all this diocesan episcopacy was established without prescription of Holy Scripture—and, I think, without any apostolic prescription. I do not mean that it is contrary to Scripture. Not at all. It may have been all right under the conditions then; it may be all right under some conditions now, but it is not divinely ordained, not imposed on the Church by Christ or his apostles, nor of the essence of church validity or of church order.

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Now if any Bishop, dean, or priest goes drumming around the streets of Little Rock seeking to persuade some silly sheep belonging to another flock to come into their own little fold, telling said sheep, you must be confirmed by a Bishop who has been ordained by a Bishop in

the succession, and leave these human societies for the Church, and so on; let him not fail to tell such silly sheep that the only true Church holds that Confirmation and Ordination alike have no visible sign or ceremony ordained of God; that every thing spiritual and divine may be obtained among the sects, but that you must come to the Church, as to a dancing-school, to receive refinement of manners and grace and polish in movement and deportment.
