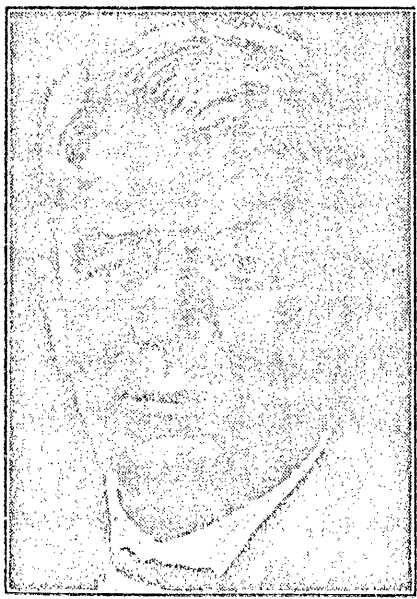

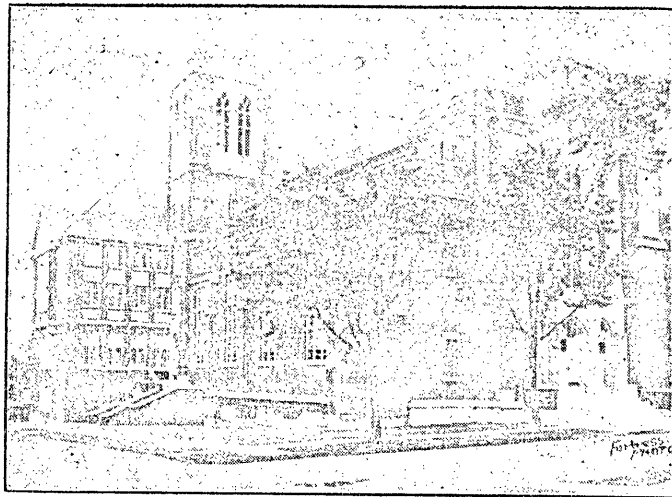

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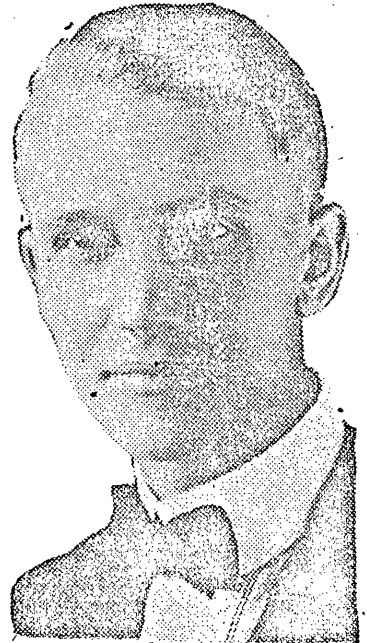

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE.

The Little Rock Conference, which meets for the ninth time in the city of Little Rock, was organized as the Ouachita Conference in 1854, and the name was changed to Little Rock Conference in 1866. Its territory includes a little less than half of the state, its northern boundary being the south lines of Scott, Yell and Perry Counties, the Arkansas River to Little Rock, the Missouri Pacific Railway (except the towns lying on that railway) to a point near Beebe, thence east to White River and down White River to its mouth. In this territory are some of the best alluvial lands, the Ouachita National Forest, the pine mills and the newly developed oil fields. The largest cities are: Little Rock, Pine Bluff, El Dorado, Hot Springs, Camden and Texarkana.

The Little Rock Conference has 61,787 members, 98 local preachers, 159 preachers in full connection and 29 on trial. These are found in seven Districts, namely, Arkadelphia, Camden, Little Rock, Monticello, Pine Bluff, Prescott, and Texarkana, 145 pastoral charges, and 447 societies. Last year there were 377 Sunday Schools, 4,387 officers and teachers, and 49,665 scholars; 236 Epworth Leagues, with 6,483 members; 155 Woman's Missionary Societies and 5,125 members. The total raised for all purposes last year was \$921,983. Jointly with the North Arkansas Conference the Little Rock Conference owns Henderson-Brown, Hendrix, and Galloway Colleges with property valued at \$1,434,000 and endowment of \$1,060,000; the Methodist Orphanage located in this city and valued at \$100,000; and the **Arkansas Methodist**, the official organ of the Church in Arkansas. The Commission managing the paper has just acquired property at Eleventh and Scott Streets, valued at \$20,000, and on it will maintain headquarters for Arkansas Methodism.

The Little Rock District, with 25 charges and 13,440 members is one of the great Districts in Southern Methodism and under the efficient leadership of the gifted and untiring presiding elder,

Dr. James Thomas, has made a remarkable record in every way, last year and this year reporting more than 100 per cent on collections.

Methodism in the city of Little Rock has always been strong. There are now ten churches with a membership of 7,283. First Church, with 2,319 members and Winfield Memorial, with 1,816, are two of the strong churches of Southern Methodism. A fuller account of local Methodism will be given next week.

Winfield Memorial Church.

Winfield Memorial Church began as a mission in 1868, with Rev. B. O. Davis as pastor. In 1870, under the leadership of Rev. Josephus Loving, the congregation built a house of worship at Twelfth and Spring Streets and was known as "Spring Street Methodist Episcopal Church, South." This building is still standing where it was built, being used now by a colored congregation. It was while the church was located here that Dr. A. R. Winfield served as pastor for four years.

During the pastorate of Rev. E. N. Evans the building at Twelfth and Spring was sold, and a new site was secured at Fifteenth and Center Streets. Plans for a new brick building were drawn, but only the chapel unit of the building was erected at first. The name of the congregation was changed at this time to "Fifteenth and Center Streets Methodist Episcopal Church, South." The main building was completed a few years later under the leadership of Rev. A. O. Evans, who was pastor for two years. On May 19, 1889, the new building was formally opened, and the name of the church changed to "Winfield Memorial Methodist Episcopal Church, South," in honor of the Rev. Dr. A. R. Winfield, a former pastor and one of the outstanding figures not only in Arkansas Methodism, but in American Methodism as well.

For more than thirty years the church carried on its ever enlarging program at this location, during which time it was served by some of the leading pastors and preachers of the Little Rock Conference. In these years Winfield Church took rank as one of the strong churches of Southern Methodism.

In 1921, while the Rev. W. B. Hogg was pastor, the property at Fifteenth and Center, outgrown by the congregation, was sold to the Orthodox Greek Catholic Church, and a beautiful lot at

Sixteenth and Louisiana was purchased. Plans were drawn for a great, modern church plant, and in the spring of 1921 work was begun on the basement unit. When this had been completed, it was occupied by the congregation, which had been using the Senior High School building while the construction was going on, and temporary buildings were erected on the church lot to house the Sunday School. In the spring of 1923 the basement and two floors of the Sunday School unit were completed, and two years later the contract was let for finishing the entire plant. The present building with its equipment represents an investment of over \$300,000.00 and is one of the finest Methodist Church buildings in the South. It stands as a glorious monument to the faith, vision, loyalty and devotion of the membership which includes more than sixteen hundred souls. The congregation faces the future with high hopes and with bright promise for large usefulness in the Kingdom of God.

Evans, 1879; Dr. A. R. Winfield, 1880; Rev. E. N. Evans, 1884; Rev. A. D. Jenkins, 1886; Rev. A. O. Evans, 1887; Rev. R. R. Moore, 1889; Rev. E. N. Evans, 1891; Rev. J. M. Hawley, 1892; Rev. J. F. Follin, 1892; Dr. Andrew Hunter, 1893; Dr. Horace Jewell, 1893; Dr. James Thomas, 1894; Rev. A. O. Evans, 1898; Rev. A. M. Trawick, 1899; Dr. James Thomas, 1900; Rev. T. Y. Ramsey, 1902; Dr. R. W. McKay, 1905; Dr. S. H. Werlein, 1907; Dr. P. C. Fletcher, 1909; Dr. J. M. Workman, 1913; Dr. J. D. Hammons, 1916; Rev. W. B. Hogg, 1920; Dr. C. M. Reves, 1923-27; Rev. Paul W. Quillian, 1927-28.

This fine church is this year the host of the Conference, as it was in 1908. Under the leadership of Rev. P. W. Quillian during the past year it has made notable progress and is recognized as a great spiritual power-house, contributing in large measure to the religious life of the city.

Many brethren and friends will sympathize with Rev. S. B. Wiggins on the death of his father, who recently passed away at his home at Brickeys, at the age of 66. The funeral was at Clarendon and was conducted by Rev. G. W. Pyles.

Rev. W. Hardy Neal, evangelist, writes that he recently closed a great meeting in Wichita, Kansas, and on November 11 will begin a meeting in Sanger, Calif. Has held 15 meetings this year. If brethren wish his services, they should address him at Green Forest, Ark.

It was the editor's privilege to spend last Sunday on Hot Springs Circuit, preaching morning and night at New Salem and at three at Gum Spring. This is the first year for Rev. H. A. F. Ault, the active pastor, and he hopes to bring up a good financial report, but will be forced to report a loss of members on account of the large number of removals, although he has added about 25 this year. He is greatly interested in the new town of the Dierks Lumber Co., Mountain Pine, about two miles from New Salem, and thinks there are great possibilities there for developing a new church. Changes must follow the creating of a town of 1,500 in a rural community. It was a great pleasure to meet friends whom I had met ten years ago and to be with Brother Ault and his family and Brother Amos Wilson who was visiting with them. On account of schooling his children Brother Ault is now living in Hot Springs, but, having a good road, is able to be much with his people.

Dr. Geo. McGlumphy, treasurer of North Arkansas Conference, writes: "Dodson Avenue, Fort Smith, E. H. Hook, pastor, J. McMurtrey, treasurer, has made a fine Golden Cross remittance. Wrote 68 personal letters.

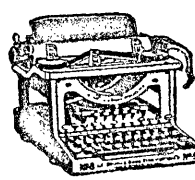
Read 15 magazines and papers.
