## NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE REPORTS

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The laymen realize the seriousness of the social and commercial situation of our day; but we also know that the development of personality with an influence to bring reverence and allegiance to God is necessary to the perpetuity of the life of our civilization. The ministry and the laity need a new work of grace. We have form with little power; we have attended to things rather than men; now, we need to seek a new growth for a renewed life.

We recommend the continuance of the whole program of stewardship training in standard classes, through Efficiency Institutes, and through the ministry of the pulpit. Emphasis, however, needs to be placed on the stewardship of life more than it does on the stewardship of property. If God really has the man, he will also have his goods.

The every-member canvass should be used in every church. The life of our church is the continued life of its membership. The individual, then, needs to be magnified.

We recommend that the second Sunday in June, or as near thereto as possible, be set apart as Laymen's Day, and that a Sunday service covering our program be held in each charge.

We recommend the election of C. A. Stuck as Conference Lay Leader.—J. M. Williams, Conference Lay Leader; M. J. Russell, Secretary.

### REPORT OF BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Reports from the Executive Secretary, and the Extension Secretary of the Board of Christian Education indicate large progress in unifying the work of Christian Education in our Conference. All phases of the work appear to be well organized, and to be meeting with hearty support from the Church.

Our schools—Valley Springs Training School and Hendrix College—are functioning effectively even in the face of grave difficulties.

Our unified program for the College has been making progress, but our college problems are only partially solved. The Galloway situation calls for serious consideration, not possible by the present Annual Conference session.

We, therefore, make the following recommendations:

That this Annual Conference approve all the steps taken by this Board of Christian Education during

the past year concerning Galloway Woman's College.

That this Annual Conference hereby direct the Board of Trustees of Galloway Woman's College to make a special study of the whole problem, including the possibilities of its reopening, the conditions under which it may be reopened with assurance of success and large service to the church, the advisability of undertaking its reopening, it being the judgment of this Conference that said Board should not reopen the college without adequate funds and reasonable certainty of large usefulness.

That the Conference authorize and instruct the Board of Trustees, if they find reopening impracticable and inadvisable, to take steps looking to the liquidation of this college and to paying off its debts.

In carrying out this resolution the Conference directs that the Trustees of the college first offer the buildings, grounds and equipments of the college at Searcy to the citizens of Searcy before they take any other steps looking to disposing of the physical properties; provided that the citizens of Searcy in taking over the college assume all debts and financial obligations against the college. If the people of Searcy accept the college and assume all debts and liabilities of the institution, the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized by this Conference to execute all necessary deeds and conveyances. If, on the other hand, the citizens of Searcy decline said offer, the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized to take any other steps necessary to liquidate the college, to pay its debts, and to this end, it is authorized to execute all deeds and conveyances necessary in carrying out these instructions; provided buildings and grounds are not liquidated without the consent of the Conference Board of Christian Education.

This Conference hereby gives its Board of Christian Education the full power of the Conference to act for it when its advice, approval or authority is sought by the Board of Trustees of Galloway Woman's College in carrying out the instructions of this Conference; provided that the Conference is in no way to be obligated financially by the action of the Board of Trustees.

That Dana Dawson and W. R. Stuck be elected trustees for Galloway Woman's College and Hendrix College to succeed themselves; and that John Erskine be elected trustee to succeed Dr. Paul Quillion, and that Mr. Lynn Smith of Texarkana be elected trustee to succeed R. E. Lee Wilson, deceased, to fill the unexpired term ending 1935.

That the entire college assessment be directed to Hendrix College.

That the Conference approve and authorize Retreats for the College, the College and Executive Secretary to work out the details with the Presiding Elder.

That the Conference consider and take appropriate action on the question of joint celebration of the Cen-

tennial of organized Arkansas Methodism and the Sem. Centennial of Hendrix College; and that a joint committee with the Little Rock Conference be appointed by the Bishop and his cabinet to work out plans for this celebration.

We recommend:

That the plan of selecting trustees for Valley Springs Training School be so changed that the Presiding Elder of the Searcy District and the pastors of Harrison Station and Batesville First Church automatically become the ministerial members of the Board on their annual appointment.

That the money which was appropriated for the Pastors' School for the year 1933 be transferred to the extension fund of the Board of Christian Education.

That Sunday School Day and Young People's Anniversary Day be observed on the same day in 1934 (date to be fixed); with programs and offering.

That the work of the Extension Secretary is to be: (a) Leading in developing definite plans for reaching the unreached persons for Christ. (b) Assisting in developing needed materials for reaching the unreached. The administration of Cokesbury training work is to be unified with standard work under the direction of the Executive Secretary.

That a Conference-wide meeting of the Conference and District Staffs of Christian Education be held soon after Conference.

For the support of the work of the Board of Christian Education we request the following assessments:

For the Pastor's School.....\$ 900.00  
For Schools and Colleges... 11,850.00  
For Conference Work (Work of Executive Secretary, Training Work, etc.)..... 6,500.00

The monies derived from the assessment for schools and colleges shall be apportioned as follows: 67.5 per cent to Hendrix College, to be expended as the Finance Committee of the Board of Trustees may direct; 22.5 per cent to Valley Springs Training School; 3.3 per cent to Student Pastor at Fayetteville, Arkansas, and 6.7 per cent for miscellaneous activities.

We recommend that Ira Brumley be appointed Executive Secretary and that Glenn F. Sanford be appointed as Extension Secretary of the Board of Christian Education; that J. Q. Schisler and A. W. Martin be appointed to the General Board Staff of Christian Education; that Nat. R. Griswold be appointed professor in Hendrix College; that A. W. Wasson and J. S. Seneker be appointed as professors in the Southern Methodist University.

We commend the work of Dr. J. M. Williams, Extension Professor of Hendrix College, in his labors for our youth and our homes. We request our pastors to talk with him about his work and make the largest use possible of his time in this important work for which he is so well qualified.—J. Q. Schisler, Chm.; Ira A. ### REPORT OF BOARD OF MISSIONS

Our Board of Missions has learned to make brick without straw. That the Board remains solvent and the program continues upon solid foundations is nothing less than a miracle.

But it must be said that the condition which faces our whole program at home and abroad is tragic. The Board has made every possible economy and further reduced giving means fatal retreat from some of our fields.

The Conference Board of Missions would recommend:

1. That the pastors and congregations give early and most faithful attention to the collection of our benevolent claims. This fund is fundamental to the very life of our Church and its far-flung program for the Kingdom of God.

2. That we make greater use of prayer as a means of promoting the Missionary enterprise.

3. That the whole constituency of the Church be given the essential information, so necessary if we would create the missionary mind in our people. The World Outlook should be widely read.

4. Every Church in the Conference should observe the Fiftieth Anniversary of Paine College, with a program and offering November 19.—Wm. Sherman, Chm.; I. L. Claud, Sec.

### REPORT OF BOARD OF TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

Rethinking the social teachings of Jesus and their application to our troubled world constitute the greatest task facing the Christian Church today.

The Church must convince its millions of earnest followers that the priceless water of life cannot be drunk alone in solitude, but must be given to a thirsty humanity; that salvation is for civilization as well as for persons, for industry and nations as well as for individual workers and citizens; that Christ-like men and a Christ-like world comprise the Kingdom of God and the goal of the Gospel.

A vital application of the social significance of the religion of our Master is necessary to save us from the ethical blindness and insensitivity to human needs which bring reproach upon the Church, rendering it powerless to meet the crisis of this hour.

We rejoice in the awakening and growth of this appreciation and understanding in the lives of an increasing number of ministers and laymen who are committed to the conviction that the law of love is the law of life in all its relationships.

In the light of these principles we offer the following recommendations:

#### World Peace

Believing that war cannot be reconciled with our belief in the sacredness of human personality the supremacy of human and spiritual values (Continued on Page 2).

ues, and the power of love, we re-  
 pudiate war as a means of settling  
 international controversies. The King-  
 dog of God cannot be built upon  
 bloodshed and violence.

Realizing that competitive arma-  
 ments lead to warfare, we are unalter-  
 ably opposed to the present building  
 program of our navy as a waste of  
 money, and an ineffective means of  
 national security.

We favor the discontinuance of  
 military training in our schools and  
 colleges, and of the Citizens' Military  
 Camps. We favor the abolition of  
 armaments and military forces, except  
 those which may be necessary for  
 police purposes.

We believe in the Commemoration  
 of Memorial Day, Independence Day,  
 and Armistice Day as opportunities  
 for the spread of the peace ideal  
 rather than for the glorification of  
 past wars.

### Prohibition

Believing that the liquor traffic is  
 destructive of human and spiritual  
 values, that it violates the principle  
 of the sacredness of human person-  
 ality and impedes the progress of the  
 Kingdom of God, we condemn it as  
 anti-Christian, and we shall continue  
 to fight against it as an enemy of  
 God and man.

We must teach our people that  
 the governmental revenues derived  
 from the sale of intoxicating liquors  
 is but a small percentage of the trib-  
 ute money paid by our citizens to the

## OBSERVATIONS ON SESSION OF NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

**JONESBORO** last week, under the efficient lead-  
 ership of Rev. H. Lynn Wade, assisted by the  
 fine people of First Church and those of the other  
 churches, entertained with unusual success. Bish-  
 op H. M. Dobbs presided, with his characteristic  
 grace, fairness, and sense of orderliness, and Sun-  
 day morning preached a strong and helpful sermon  
 on "The Obligations of Privilege." After the sacra-  
 mental service Wednesday night, organization  
 was effected by the election of Rev. E. T. Wayland  
 as secretary, and, with the calling of the roll, the  
 characters of all the preachers were passed. Thurs-  
 day morning the Report of the Board of Christian  
 Education was ably discussed and adopted. It sug-

gested the manner in which Galloway College  
 should either be re-opened or the property handled,  
 in case it is not re-opened.

The election of delegates to General Conference  
 resulted in the following selections: Clerical—J. Q.  
 Schisler, J. W. Crichlow, O. E. Goddard, Dana Daw-  
 son, C. W. Lester, and W. V. Womack; alternates—  
 S. B. Wiggins, E. T. Wayland, and J. W. Work-  
 man; lay—J. M. Williams, J. H. Reynolds, C. J.  
 Chapin, Mrs. E. F. Ellis, Sam Galloway and M. J.  
 Russell; alternates—B. M. Huddleston, Mrs. B. E.  
 Snetzer, and Mrs. A. L. Trent.

The reports showed a net gain in membership  
 of 2,539 and slight gain in the collections for Ben-  
 evolences. Significant was the decisive vote by  
 which the Conference refused to admit an appli-  
 cant who had not met the educational require-  
 ments. The class of eight received into full con-  
 nection was unusually fine. Eight preachers had  
 died, and at the memorial service Dr. O. E. God-  
 dard delivered an address full of wisdom. To a  
 large audience, Dr. Ben N. Spence, the distin-  
 guished Canadian journalist, delivered a truly great  
 message on "The Canadian Control System," in  
 which he demonstrated the utter futility of the  
 system to diminish the evils of the liquor traffic.  
 It was the verdict of the appreciative audience that  
 the address was peculiarly timely and should be  
 heard in every community in our State. The Con-  
 ference, in adopting the report of the Board of  
 Temperance and Social Service, declared continued  
 warfare on the traffic and heartily approved Gov-  
 ernor Futrell's refusal to call the Legislature to  
 modify our liquor laws. Our woman senator, Mrs.  
 Hattie W. Caraway, a member of our First Church,  
 was felicitously introduced by Dr. J. A. Anderson,  
 and made a modest statement of her views on sev-  
 eral important questions.

The General Conference was memorialized to  
 provide for election of presiding elders and rota-  
 tion in office. The memorials will later be pub-  
 lished. In all of its actions the Conference showed  
 itself to be alert and forward-looking. The cor-  
 dial invitation to go to Fayetteville next year was  
 heartily accepted. The writer had unsurpassed en-

Realizing that the repeal of the  
 Eighteenth Amendment is imminent,  
 we must endeavor to preserve those  
 statutes of the state which in a de-  
 gree safeguard us from the liquor  
 interests.

We must educate our children and  
 youth in the true meaning of tem-  
 perance, with unceasing endeavor un-  
 til the liquor traffic is banished from  
 the earth.

### The Responsibility and Duty of the Church

Under the present difficult condi-  
 tions, what is the responsibility and  
 duty of the Church? Her Lord and  
 Master, when He stood before Pilate  
 declared, "For this cause come I un-  
 to the world that I might bear wit-  
 ness to the truth." To the Truth He  
 bore witness all through his three  
 years of glorious ministry, and final-  
 ly said to the Jewish rulers, "Ye gen-  
 eration of vipers, how can ye escape  
 the damnation of Hell?" They cruci-  
 fied Him. John the Baptist told the  
 adulterous Herod the truth and he  
 was beheaded. St. Paul went to Rome  
 preaching the truth, "Christ and Him  
 Crucified," he also was beheaded. Savonarola and John Huss bore wit-  
 ness to the truth, exposing and de-  
 nouncing the corruption of Roman-  
 ism. "Bloody Mary" burned the five  
 English Bishops because they bore  
 witness to the truth. But the truth  
 to which these martyrs and our cruci-  
 fied and risen Lord bore witness was  
 not beheaded, was not burned, was  
 not crucified. That Truth for which  
 they gave their lives has come down  
 through the centuries and still stands  
 unchanged and unchanging — the  
 foundation of all real hope here and  
 hereafter.

And, today, the only question the  
 Church of Jesus Christ has to decide  
 is: Where lies the Truth? Not what

do political leaders say? Not what do  
 rulers say? Not what does the major-  
 ity say? But what is the truth? What  
 is right. What is wrong? So, on this  
 the greatest question before the world  
 today, the Church must make declara-  
 tion of the Truth.

First, the Church must continue to  
 declare, to emphasize, the basil truth,  
 which no political action can change—  
 the fact that alcohol is a narcotic  
 poison which incapacitates men for  
 citizenship, making them a menace  
 to society, and especially to their  
 own families. The Church must con-  
 tinue to stand for the local, state, and  
 national prohibition of this body and  
 soul destroying traffic as evidently  
 one of the works of the Devil, which  
 the Son of God was manifested to  
 destroy. The Church must record her  
 unchanged conviction that whatever  
 may be proposed as a substitute will  
 fail, that the final solution for this  
 national evil must be National Prohi-  
 bition. We must work to save every-  
 thing possible in our present local,  
 state, and national prohibition leg-  
 islation.

In this time of unprecedented stress  
 and strain when the very foundations  
 seem shaken, the Church of Jesus  
 Christ, regardless of public clamor, or  
 political threats, or legislative action,  
 must continue steadfastly to bear  
 witness to the truth that the legisla-  
 tion of the Liquor Traffic is a crime  
 against society and the Law of God.

We wish to commend Governor  
 Futrell for his stand in refusing to  
 include liquor legislation, should he  
 call a special session of the Legisla-  
 ture.

### Social Service

We desire to express our apprecia-  
 tion for the work of Rev. D. H. Col-  
 quette in visiting and conducting  
 services in our penal, industrial, and  
 eleemosynary institutions, and pledge

him our cooperation whenever prac-  
 ticable.

We recommend that A. H. DuLaney,  
 T. C. Chambliss, George E. Patchell,  
 and J. T. Byrd be elected trustees of  
 the Arkansas Anti-Saloon League of  
 Arkansas for the North Arkansas  
 Conference for the ensuing year.—

## Presiding Elders' Reports

### BATESVILLE DISTRICT

Jefferson Sherman, P. E.

Our collections on Benevolences are  
 about the same as last year, perhaps,  
 a little more. The salaries are less  
 than last year. As the upper part of  
 the District did not receive much ben-  
 efit from the plowing up of cotton or  
 the higher price of cotton, there be-  
 ing little cotton raised in this part, it  
 has made collections difficult. We  
 paid \$400 on Kingdom Extension, each  
 charge having made an offering to  
 this cause.

We have had some splendid revivals  
 within the church and a few that  
 reached much further and quite a  
 number were saved. More than 500  
 conversions have been reported by  
 the pastors and more than 600 have  
 been received into the church. Two  
 young men were licensed to preach  
 and one young man received on trial.

By the aid of our Conference Secre-  
 taries, Bros. Brumley and Sanford,  
 and Bro. Claud, our own District Di-  
 rector of Christian Education, we  
 have held one Standard Training  
 School and 17 Cokesbury Schools, and  
 4 Standard Classes with 196 Cokes-  
 bury credits issued and 124 Standard  
 credits, making a total of 320 credits  
 earned by our workers.

During the quadrennium 2,000 have  
 been received into the church and

1,035 credits have been given; 25 extension points have been established where our pastors preach and where Sunday Schools have been organized, thus furnishing an opportunity for more than 1,500 people for divine worship who otherwise would not have such an opportunity.

The pastors and good laymen have been true and faithful and loyal in helping to put over the program of the church. We would not forget the good work done by Bro. Claud, made possible by the good people of our First Church, Batesville.

These have been difficult years but our association and work together with the good people of the Batesville District have been pleasant and we have been happy in the work. We pray God's very richest blessings upon each and all as we go from them.

One of our pastors, Bro. J. T. Heath, has answered the great roll call and gone to his reward. He died at his post and his works follow him.

#### BOONEVILLE DISTRICT

We have had a constructive year, though most of the time we have had to make brick without straw. We have had meetings throughout the District resulting in over 400 conversions and 200 accessions to the church on profession of faith. The pastors have made 7,026 pastoral visits.

Our Sunday Schools are better organized and doing more satisfactory work than last year. We have had 82 Standard credits and 31 Cokesbury credits, three vacation Bible Schools and three institutes.

Interest in home and foreign missionary enterprise and Sunday School day has been good but contributions are small for lack of money. Some new Leagues organized and all doing well.

Distressingly few Nashville Advo-

cates—Many more Arkansas Methodists.

Twenty-four Missionary Societies composed of faithful, earnest women doing much helpful work.

Conference collections and preachers' salaries have been hard to get. Our preachers have been determined that these claims should be considered equally sacred. V. K. E. O. about \$250.

We thank God for all achieved and for new Conference year full of hope.

#### CONWAY DISTRICT

J. W. Crichlow, P. E.

The Conway District reports 750 additions to the church this year, 450 on profession of faith and 300 by certificate and otherwise. Benevolences are paid 85 per cent, salaries 90 per cent and district work 100 per cent. Six hundred fifty-nine training credits have been earned—482 Standard and 177 Cokesbury, and the Sunday School Day goals have been reached 100 per cent. All charges hit on all cylinders. There is not a blank on my chart.

#### FAYETTEVILLE DISTRICT

"How is the work over the District?" This question is very often asked by interested laymen. The answer usually given is, "The REAL WORK of the District is good, or fine, or excellent", depending on the mood of the Elder at the time. The reply almost every time is, "Oh, I mean the financial condition." Well, as important as finances are in promoting the interests of the Church, unquestionably, emphasis has been placed on them to the neglect of the "REAL WORK" of the Church—spiritual development and the salvation of the lost. Rejoicing takes place in Heaven over one sinner who repents rather than well filled treasury boxes at the Temple. Estimating the work of

the District from the latter standpoint excellent progress has been made this year.

The preachers have been faithful and patient. By their hopeful attitude and heartening messages the people are being strengthened for these trying days. Attendance on church services is increasing.

Fine progress is being made in the educational work of the local churches. There are 46 schools with an enrollment of 6,500 students under the leadership of faithful teachers many of whom are proving their worth as soul-winners and in teaching their pupils their missionary responsibility. In the Training Schools 222 Standard and 103 Cokesbury credits have been earned. Of these the presiding elder issued 111 as the result of his teaching in one district school and six Standard Classes. In five communities Vacation Schools were conducted with telling results. The "Unified Program" is making much more effective the work with the young people.

The Woman's Missionary Society is well organized and doing excellent work.

There have been 317 conversions, 654 additions on profession of faith, 249 adults and 47 infants baptized.

Approximately 62 per cent has been paid on the apportionment on Claims and 85 per cent on salaries, much of this being paid in meat, grain, fruits and vegetables.

There has been expended for building and repairing of churches and parsonages \$3,379. Indebtedness has been reduced \$6,401.

The territory of the District is being carefully allocated so that no part of it will be without some type of supervision. Twenty-one new and abandoned places are now being ministered to by our pastors, local preachers and consecrated laymen.

For the most part our people are

loyal and ready to push forward the work of a new year with faith and courage.

#### FORT SMITH DISTRICT

W. C. House, P. E.

Conversions 507; additions on profession of faith 407; additions by certificate and otherwise 286. Net gain in membership 357. Net gain in Sunday School membership 412. Training work: 95 Cokesbury Credits; 331 Standard Credits; 8 Daily Vacation Bible Schools; 9 Christian Adventure Credits; two young men licensed to preach; one young man recommended for admission on trial.

Sixteen Woman's Missionary Societies; 6 Junior Societies; 3 new Woman's Missionary Societies this year.

New roofs have been put on two churches; one church has been painted. Finances: 72 per cent paid on salaries, 50 per cent paid on benevolences, \$215 paid on Kingdom Extension with 11 charges responding; five charges paid out on salaries and four paid out on benevolences; two charges paid out on salaries but not on benevolences; one charge paid out on benevolences, but not on salaries; three charges paid out on both salaries and benevolences.

sion of faith and 372 otherwise making a total net gain in membership of 359. The net gain in Sunday School enrollment has been 466. Number of infants baptized 57.

Our training work has been rather evenly distributed over the entire District. We have had no large training schools, but training work has been done in 18 of the pastoral charges with a total number of credits reaching 248. We have had 14 vacation Bible schools and Childhood and Youth Week has been observed in a much larger and more efficient way than last year.

About 85 per cent of our Sunday Schools make regular contributions to the Home and Foreign Missionary enterprise, the Helena District leading the Conference in the amount paid to this cause. Our church at Helena is the largest contributor to this cause in the Conference. Our contribution to the Kingdom Extension offering was slightly in advance of last year.

Our regular contributions are in advance of last year by at least \$1,000 or an advance of about 15 per cent. Nine of our charges have paid out in full on the claims.

We have made some satisfactory adjustments on church debts and have paid some others in full. We have dedicated two churches and have reestablished preaching services in three other places.

It has been a good year full of hard work and efficient leadership on the part of our pastors and many of our lay workers.

cate 570, a total of 1,205; 145 infants have been dedicated to the Lord; 465 training credits have been issued in our District. We have raised a total of \$7,960 on the Conference Claims, an increase of \$2,600 over last year or an increase of 49 per cent, 82 per cent of assessment assessed; 95 per cent of salaries paid; 38 churches have paid more on the benevolences than last year; 21 paid out in full; eleven charges met their assessments on salaries and claims.

Every charge had training work and gracious revivals.

Parsonage and church property has been improved throughout the District and Church debts reduced.

Four new Churches in our Extension area are in process of erection; 31 extension points have been established.

#### PARAGOULD DISTRICT

Paragould District has 23 pastoral charges. In these are 65 churches, besides several preaching points which are attached to stations. The Conference Journal of last year shows 7,734 members. According to the figures turned in at the quarterly conferences during the past year 636 members have been added to the rolls, and 196 have been dropped on account of death, removals and otherwise. There have been slightly more than 500 conversions.

Three new congregations have been organized and one old church re-established. We have licensed to preach three young men.

Financial conditions have been as adverse as any with which we have ever been called to deal. Until within the last few weeks there has been in our rural sections practically no money, and the towns have suffered accordingly. Far more than half that has been done has been accomplished during the last month. Yet the reports will not be bad. The following charges will show an increase in their benevolence collections over last year: Corning, Marmaduke, Pocahontas, St. Francis, Lorado-Stanford, Hardy, Hoxie and Piggott, 8 charges.

The pastors have worked hard. I have never known a better spirit than has been shown by both the pastors and the officers of the several charges. All seemed to realize that we were in the face of a challenge. I really feel that they have met the challenge nobly.

Our good women are as faithful as ever, and their Missionary Societies will show a good year. I know of no District in which the young people's work has been so well organized. Training credits 110.

I may be permitted gratefully to record that the presiding elder has been blessed with fine health, travelled more miles and met more appointments than for many years past, missing only one appointment, which everybody else missed, a heavy sleet covering the earth. With all its labor and toil, it has been a joyous year for us of Paragould District.

#### SEARCY DISTRICT

#### BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

We have reason to be proud of the  
Methodist Publishing House as to its  
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best. The Christian education mate-  
rial is not only very fine, but out-  
standing in literary and religious  
value; at the same time it is cheaper  
than that from all other leading  
church publishing houses. With a  
small loss this last year, of \$14,839.56,  
they were able to draw on a reserve  
fund and pay to the superannuates,  
\$50,000.00.

The Arkansas Methodist has sur-  
prised us this year in getting through,  
and yet our liabilities are less by  
\$2,540 than last year. We have  
decreased the original purchase debt  
by \$2,000. Counting the rental on  
the residence and the \$1,000 on the  
business house, gives us an approxi-  
mate income of 7 per cent on the  
whole property.

While the Arkansas Methodist has  
been coming to us with only eight  
pages most of the time, yet it has  
been a most valuable sheet, in holding  
before our people high ideals, and

keeping us in touch with the great  
movements of the church. If there  
ever was a time when we could let  
down on the distribution and use of  
Christian Literature, it is not now.  
Our needs now are imperative.

The plans of our Arkansas Metho-  
dist Commission for maintaining the  
Arkansas Methodist are sound and it  
seems that they are altogether work-  
able. In brief, the plans are as fol-  
lows: The editor is to be paid  
through plans worked out by the pre-  
siding elders, and the money paid  
through the Conferences will be used  
in the elimination of the debt and  
some other necessary occurring ex-  
penses. The income from advertis-  
ing has been approximately \$2,000,  
and should be more during the next  
year.

It is recommended that the price  
of the paper continue at \$1.00 a year  
for single subscriptions. But it is  
urged that every church send in a  
100 per cent subscription list, which

the Home. We have placed, up to this date, 526 children in good homes in the United States, securing the very best we could for them. We have received nine children this year and have placed 13 out in homes. We have lost one little girl, Carolyn Fitzhugh, by death. In addition to receiving and placing children, our Orphanage is a clearing house for looking after orphans that we do not receive and this entails some expense.

Rev. J. W. Moore, Treasurer of the Conference Orphanage Board, reports that he has received from Brother Guy Murphy, Conference Treasurer, since last Conference, \$991.61, and a balance left over from last year \$109.75, making a total of \$1,101.36. During the year, he has paid Dr. James Thomas, Superintendent of the Arkansas Methodist Orphanage, \$1,050.00, to the Metropolitan Casualty Insurance Company, \$6.25, for renewal of bond number A-74261, and \$0.02, tax paid on check, making a total of \$1,956.27. This leaves a balance of \$38.82 on hand.

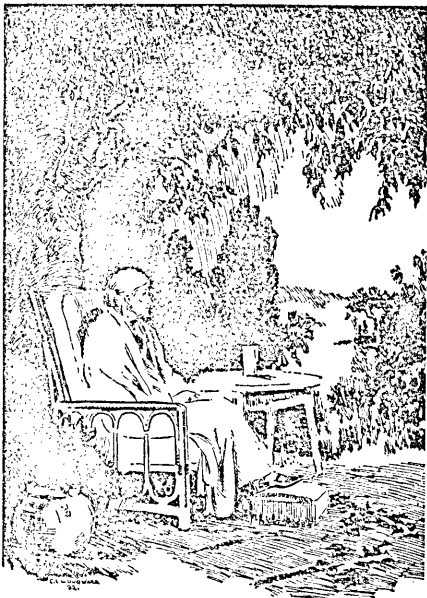

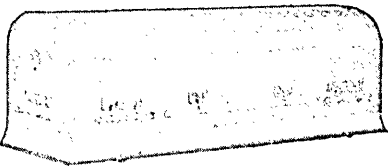
